Al Teller **On Starting Over, From the Ground Up**

In his seven years at the belm of MCA Music Entertainment Group, Al Teller took the company to grand beights in Urban and Country music; bought Geffen and GRP Records to muscle up on rock and *jazz*; guided its international expansion, led it into uncharted high-tech territories, and made the Music Group MCA Inc.'s most profitable sector

After all that, he was let go last November

Now, he's back. Not with one of the Big Six, as rumored, but with investment bankers Wasserstein Perella Entertainment, Inc. for a \$100 million music company including an independent label. Here, be explains why he chose to go relatively small.

'm just very excited about the notion of building a label from the ground up, and hopefully one that will emerge not only successfully but one that does all the right sorts of things that should be done in the music business

Long-term artist development is something that has been pushed aside a bit in recent years, in the sense that many young artists who had the good fortune of breaking are not breaking for the long term. There's an inability to sustain and build on follow-up records. We're going to try and do it the old fashioned way

The strategy for competition will be the same as I've employed all my years in this business. You put together the best team of people you can, and you sign the best talent you can. It sounds like a sim-

plistic equation, but guess whatit's one that works

Being very tightly-focused and being able to serve our artists in a thorough, comprehensive and longterm fashion will be a watchword for our group.

I think part of the problem with marketing in the '90s is overexposure. What you have now is this relentless pursuit for releasing as many singles as possible and getting maximum exposure for as many as possible. I strongly believe that comes at a great cost, which is the ultimate longevity of an artist's career. I think, in many cases, record companies would have been far smarter had they not released those one or two last videos, and iust let the audience want more instead of burning an act to a crisp.

Being a private enterprise, I don't have to worry about public guarterly reporting, or about pumping up the sales line at the expense of doing something smart on behalf of an artist. We'll have the luxury of taking our time and exercising a

great deal of patience. I'm a big believer in micromarketing. You get a band touring in a bus or van, and the challenge of a record company is to be sure that the marketing involved in whatever town or city really is there the way it should be, to take maximum advantage of their appearance in that town. That process goes on month after month, and you stay at it without regard to where the record is on the charts.

In terms of MCA's problem with rock and roll, that was not a personal problem. That was a labelinherited albatross that had to be dealt with, and frankly I thought it was being dealt with reasonably successfully in the last year, year and a half, with the major breakthrough of Live, and there were a number of young bands that were up and coming. That was not a problem that I brought to MCA, and in my time at CBS I was as involved in breaking rock bands as anyone you'd care to name. So I'm not concerned. Bottom line, it's a total non-issue.

We're going to bring in some very talented young A&R people, and it will be their responsbility to bring the artists to the label

The umbrella company is called Red Ant Entertainment, and one of the labels will be Red Ant Records. My full name is Alvin Norman Teller, so it's my initials. One of my colleagues was kicking things around and said, "Red Ant." And it just had a good sound to it. Red ants are tenacious little creatures. and they're persistent: they work well in teams. So I can rationalize it very nicely. $\ensuremath{\textit{GAVIN}}$

Al Teller Begins New Climb With 'Red Ant'

Eight months after his unceremonious dismissal as chief executive of MCA Inc.'s music division, Al Teller is back.

And, for a man who's headed not only the MCA Music Entertainment Group, but also CBS Records, Columbia, and United Artists, Teller, 51, is being relatively modest.



Entertainment, a \$100 million music industry enterprise capitalized by investors, primarily Wasserstein Perella Entertainment, Inc., an international investment bank, which is providing \$75 million of capital.

The new company, whose first project is an independent record company, will be based in Los Angeles, with offices in New York. Teller will serve as Chairman and CEO.

"It's a very exciting new chapter in my-career," said Teller, who told GAVIN that the company is up and running. "We have a telephone. It actually works. We're going to be announcing some key executive appointments over the next few weeks. We're already pursuing several artists."

The new label, Teller said, will aim at developing artists with patience (See "First Person," Page One). "I would estimate a roster size of 12 to 15 acts," he said, initially focused on rock and urban acts. with country coming later, when Red Ant is ready to create a presence in Nashville.

Teller, who has declined to discuss his surprise dismissal from MCA, which took place shortly after its majority purchase by Seagram Inc., said he was in no hurry for a new job, despite inquiries from numerous companies.

"I ultimately decided that I wanted to go the entrepreneurial route," he said. "So I wanted to get independent funding and be in business with a funding partner who'd be forward-looking."

Teller, who built a reputation as a technology-savvy executive at MCA, hopes that Red Ant will become "a major music enterprise on the Internet. I think the online world offers a great deal of opportunity for the music business as opposed to threats, and I'm very eager to move forward in that arena. It's going to be ultimately far more robust than the straight-forward transactions going on now."

Teller said he expected to stay out of bidding wars for superstar acts. "If there was an artist I was extremely excited about, or an established artist who would be interested in being with us that I love, I would certainly try to make a deal," he said, "but I wouldn't go to the point where I thought it was economically absurd, just simply for the sake of being able to say, 'We signed soand-so.' I think that's a hollow game.

"But," he admits, "the ability to resist temptation is going to be tested from time to time." Kord Lifts in San FranciscoFor our second wave of

The New Hootie: Ow!

Most bands and record companies would be delirious to report sales of 1.6 million copies of an album after three months.

But when Hootie & the Blowfish sold more than 9 million units of their debut album, *Cracked Rear View*, they fell out of the category of "most bands," and their followup, *Fairweather Johnson*, became the subject of a guessing game. Could the new album match the old one?

Of course not. Atlantic Records knew it, and, while mounting a huge marketing campaign, said that the company would be happy to move, say, 3 million. Even by that modest measure, the Hooties are only halfway there, and were last spotted occupying number 19 in album sales, compared with six months in the Top Ten for the first album.

But Hootie and Atlantic representatives are ready with answers. The band draws fans outside the arena of younger rockers and hip-hoppers who jump on their favorite acts' product as soon as it's out, the reasoning goes. Many who bought *Cracked Rear View* may not even know that the Blowfish have a new album out—despite all the hype. Ron Shapiro, General Manager at Atlantic, adds: "Many (fans) might just have discovered, when the band was on with Jay Leno last week, that Hootie had a new album."

However unaware the Hootie fans may be, Atlantic will work to reach more of them in coming weeks, placing the band on David Letterman's *Late Show* (where they played when the new album was released in April), Conan O'Brien's show, network morning programs, and *Showtime at the Apollo*.

Hootie & the Blowfish are also on a summer tour, which should only boost sales figures.

ON IMUS SHOW I Left My Mind in KLAC Hypes Sis Station On Air

KLAC/AM has been using its new Don Imus syndicated morning show to promote another station: its country sister KLAZ/FM.

During the first two weeks the Westwood One show has run in Los Angeles, parent Chancellor Broadcasting has run hourly spots 'telling KLAC's listeners about KZLA's format of more music with fewer commercial breaks and its format of eclectic country. Once Imus in the Morning is done, they are told, switch to "KZLA, Southern California's country.'

"It's unique and unusual for an AM station to tell listeners to switch their dial to FM," says veteran record promotion executive Don

Graham

In the Spring Arbitrons, KLAC was tied for 14th with a 2.7 share 12+, while KZLA was 20th with a 2.0.



Bruce Raven-Stark, the new General Manager of both stations, says the KZLA promos are designed to alert new listeners to Imus and KLAC who would not normally listen to the station's adult pop standards format

(which is also syndicated by Westwood One)

"Imus is not going to be as attractive to a KLAC demographic which is 65-plus as he will be to a lot younger demo," Raven-Stark told GAVIN. He notes there are also hourly spots for KLAC's own music as a reinforcer for its core audience. "I"m reaching out to the people who would never think of listening to the adult pop standards we play from 10 a.m. on."

Meantime, MSNBC, the new NBC/Microsoft 24-hour cable news network, has announced that it will simulcast Imus' show beginning September 3 from 6 to 9 a.m. EST. "From my standpoint," said Imus, "I'm simply going to do my radio program.'

Chas Chandler, Musician And Manager, is Dead

Death has claimed Bryan "Chas" Chandler, whose career ranged from the Animals to Jimi Hendrix.

Chandler. 57, died July 17 in a hospital in his hometown, Newcastle-Upon-Tyne in England, where he was taking tests related to an aortic aneurysm.



Chandler, a bass player, was a founding member of the Animals, which formed in 1962 (from the Alan Price Combo) and whose hits included "House of the Rising Sun," "Don't Let Me Be Misunderstood," and "We've Gotta Get Out of This Place" in the early and mid-Sixties.

When the band broke up in 1966, Chandler began managing other rock

artists. Through a girl friend of Keith Richards', he saw Jimi (then "Jimmy") Hendrix at the Cafe Wha? in New York, signed him, and produced the Jimi Hendrix Experience's first two albums. Fellow Animal John Steele (the band's drummer) became Chandler's assistant.

The Animals were inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame in 1994.

NAB Nabs 3 Commissioners

In a conference heavy on legal and regulatory issues, the National Association of Broadcasters will present three FCC commissioners in separate sessions at its 1996 NAB Radio Show in Los Angeles in October.

FCC Chairman Reed Hundt will appear at the "FCC Chairman's Breakfast," while James Quello will address a "financial breakfast." Susan Ness will appear prior to sessions on radio ownership regulations and a discussion among radio group heads.

The Radio Show, which takes place October 9-12 at the Los Angeles Convention Center, will offer some 50 sessions on management, programming, sales and marketing for radio executives. The NAB has also set up an all-day "Internet Boot Camp" seminar.

Skip Bishop Skips From RCA to MCA

Skip Bishop has been named Senior Vice President, Promotion, at MCA Records, where he will coordinate all radio promotion for MCA and related labels.

Bishop, a ten year-veteran at RCA, where he was Vice President, Pop Promotion, was a DJ and programmer before joining RCA. Praising MCA as "genuinely musical," Bishop added: "I am truly stoked to have the career opportunity of converging with talent like this."

Abbey Konowitch, Executive Vice President, was equally stoked to announce Bishop's appointment, saying his knowledge of radio and his leadership skills "will help catapult the new MCA to the forefront of building new artists and taking established artists to their highest level." But the main focus in on regulatory issues, which will



be the focus of seven sessions, including:

"Taking Full and Lawful Advantage of the Revised Radio Ownership Rules." "AM and FM Station Improvement—Making Your Station More Competitive Under FCC Rules," "Do the Crime, Pay the Fine—Where Things Stand on FCC Rule Enforcement," and "Fun and Profit Through Fun and Games: Running Successful Contests, Promotion, and CasinoGambling Spots Without Being Fined by the FCC."

Zomba Buys Pinnacle: 'We Can Compete With Majors'

In what is being called "the deal of the year" in England, the Zomba Group of Companies, which includes Jive and Silvertone Records, studios, management (producers Mutt Lange and Teddy Riley), and music equipment, has purchased a 75 percent stake in the Windsong/ Pinnacle Group, an international distribution, record and publishing company.

Zomba says the deal seals its position as the world's biggest independent music group. (The company released no financial details of the deal, which took two weeks of negotiations follwowing six months of talks.)

Clive Calder, founder of Zomba, told *Music Week* magazine in London: "In the past, we haven't had the financial muscle to compete with the majors. I feel that what will come out of this will be the first real competitor to the majors."

Steve Mason, Group Chairman of Windsong/Pinnacle, will retain a 25 percent ownership and his title, and will run Pinnacle autonomously under a five-year contract. Pinnacle's interests include distribution of music and computer software in the UK, Germany, and Benelux, Windsong Exports, and record labels, including Music for Nations, Windsong in Concert. and Conoisseur Collection.

With the Pinnacle purchase, Zomba will switch its worldwide (excluding the United States) distribution services from BMG to Pinnacle in the UK and to Rough Trade in Germany, Switzerland, and Austria.

Evergreen Buys WPNT

Evergreen Media Corp. has reached an agreement to buy WPNT/FM-Chicago from Century Broadcasting Corp. for \$68 million.

The purchase of WPNT, an A/C station, gives the Texasbased Evergreen six FM stations in the Windy City, one over current ownership limitations. Evergreen said it would sell or trade WEJM, an Urban outlet, to offset the cost of the new acquisition.

In the most recent Arbitron book, WPNT had a 2.2 12+ rating. far behind A/C leader WLIT. Similarly, WEJM had a 1.9, trailing Urban giant WGCI's 5.8.

Inside Top 40 BY DAVE SHOLIN



A Conversation With the King of the Moondoggers



Let's face it, Election Year '96 has been a yawn so far. Far more fascinating than what Bill (Clinton) or Bob (Dole) say about each other

are those chats Hillary Clinton has been having with her most famous predecessor, Eleanor Roosevelt. Sure, the First Lady has Jean Houston's assistance in making the long distance connection to Mrs. FDR, but that shouldn't stop any of us from having a one-on-one get down with history's famous or infamous.

For kicks, try making up a list of names of radio or music celebs. I'll bet a few thousand folks are talking to Elvis at this very moment. But imagine for a moment what it mustive been like to not only witness the birth of a music phenomenon, but to be one of the most important forces behind its success. That would be the legacy of Alan Freed, who was inducted into the Rock & Roll Hall of Fame's "nonperformer and early influences" category in 1986, the organization's first year. Ten years later and inspired by Hillary, I reached out to one of the most famous radio talents of all time and here's what he had to say:

Dave Sholin: Why do you think you were able to build such a strong and loyal following of listeners, especially teenagers?

Alan Freed: It was the music man! I was playin' stuff lots of people were afraid to play on Pop music stations. And I guess I didn't try to hide the fact that I was having a good time on the air or how excited I was about a new song. I wanted my audience to feel it, man. There was a lot of really sappy, dull stuff on those stations, and the kids were hungry for something new

they could dance to and that they could call their own.

DS: You played so many of those great rhythm and blues records on your show and introduced to them to white listeners. When did that start? AF: It was in Cleveland when Leo Mintz, who owned a record store, convinced me to start playing a lot of what we called "race" records. He was selling more and more of them all the time. Then when I started playing them on WJW, the craze really caught on. White audiences caught on, but it didn't happen right away. In fact, for the first five years or so, most of my listeners were Negro. But the music had feeling, emotion, and most of all man, it had soul. But I remember, it was 1955 in New York City when I put on a dance, and easily more than half of the folks there were white. That was when I first started to see that R&B was being accepted by a broader audience. DS: Do you like nicknames in radio? How did you become "King of the Moondoggers?"

AF: Hey, whatever it takes to get them to remember you. We had a lot of guys with nicknames back then-Danny "Cat Man" Stiles, Dick "Huggie Boy" Hugg, Clarence "Poppa Stoppa" Hayman, Ken "Jack the Cat" Elliott, "Jumpin" George Oxford, and George "Hound Dog" Lorenz were just a few. I started playing this crazy thing called "Moondog Symphony" on my show and man, everybody was calling for it. I started to bay like a houndog under the moon when the music played and everything eventually became moondog.

It's radio man-imaginationplayin' with their minds. Try it sometime. Soon it became the "Moondog House," the "Moondog Kingdom," and the "Moon-

dog Show." I kicked off every show with the words, "This is Alan Freed, the ol' King of the Moondoggers." DS: You are the man credited with inventing the term "Rock & Roll." True? AF: I used the name "rock & roll" back in Cleveland for my radio show *Moondog's Rock & Roll Party*. It really was another way to describe rhythm & blues and it stuck. You'll hear lots of theories, but you know it's rock & roll when you hear it. DS: Did you believe back then that the music would last when many critics

were calling rock & roll a fad? AF: Nothing was gonna stop it. Sure teens loved it, but so what? The great thing about rock & roll is that it's ageless. You don't stop diggin' it when you turn 20 or 30. It stays with you forever. It was a whole lot bigger than those small minds who thought it wouldn't last. It reflects the times, and like the times, it keeps changing. DS: Any advice for today's DJs?

AF: Don't expect your listeners to get excited about the music if you're not. Entertain every time you're on the air and they won't just be listeners, they'll become fans! ●



San Franciscon The Musical History Tour

an Francisco, home of SFO3 and the Alternative Boot Camp, has a musical history that rivals those of New York, London, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Chicago, and Nashville. Liverpool, we're not sure about, although, in the '60s, Ralph J. Gleason, the late and esteemed pop and jazz critic of the San Francisco Chronicle, called his town "the Liverpool of the West."

Now, Joel Selvin, the current pop critic at the paper, has compiled a book, San Francisco: The Musical History Tour (Chronicle Books, \$12.95), a guide to more than 200 sites in and around the city.

The book is a wealth of stories about rock and roll, blues, jazz, R&B and folk musicians who've become part of the Bay Area scene. SFOI and 2 featured Rock & Roll History Walks. Now, with this book, you can go on one of your own.

For space reasons, we have chosen a baker's dozen of Selvin's entries rather than some of his longer essays on such landmarks as the Fillmore, the Avalon, Winterland, or the Matrix. They and many more—including Jimi Hendrix's boyhood home and the surf 'n' turf place where the Eagles were born—are in the book.



Mother's

430 Broadway Folk singer Barbara Dane carved out this room as Sugar Hill, a folk club where she not only recorded a live album of her own but introduced hip San Francisco audiences to blues singers like T-Bone Walker, Mama Yancey, John Lee Hooker, and Lightnin' Hopkins. Under the management of DJs Tom Donahue and Bobby Mitchell in 1965, renamed Mother's, was probably the country's first psychedelic nightclub, with walls covered with fluorescent paintings and featuring a light show. They brought in the Lovin' Spoonful just as the band's first single, "Do You Believe in Magic," was breaking big. The club also caught some of the first ballroom bands, like the Grateful Dead, which played an early date at the short-lived club that went out of business within a year, and Great Society, featuring Grace Slick in one of that group's first dates.

Columbus Recorders

In the basement of the copper cupola now owned by Francis Ford Coppola, where old-time San Francisco political boss Abe Ruef once had his offices, the Grateful Dead pieced together the wild montage that would be the band's second album, Anthem of the Sun. Spliced together from dozens of live

recordings, previous studio sessions, and some overdubbing done here, the album ran without break over each of its two sides, seamlessly blending song into song in an attempt to capture the extemporaneous nature of the band's live performances. Engineer Richard Beggs has continued to keep the studio in operation, although now he mostly does work on Coppola's movies.

Anxious Asp 528 Green Street

Janis Joplin used to while away the afternoons drinking and playing pool during the late '60s at this Beat generation hangout, where Jack Kerouac once read his poetry, and the bathroom walls were papered with pages of the Kinsey Report.

KMPX Studios 50 Green Street

The birthplace of underground radio, the second-floor studio of KMPX was always open to visitors and a small crowd often hung out in the lobby while the disc jockeys did their thing behind a glass panel. Larry Miller started broadcasting Bob Dylan, Ravi Shankar, and other records not being played on AM radio on the all-night time slot on this otherwise foreign-language station in February 1967. In April, ex-KYA kingpin Tom Donahue took over the evening shift before Miller's, and by the end of the summer the station was full-time underground rock and making waves in the ratings.


In March 1968, the entire staff walked out on strike, protesting the absence of pay increases while the station's revenue had exploded eightfold. After announcing the impending walkout over the air for hours prior, the staffers strolled out at midnight to be greeted like champions by a huge crowd waiting outside. Before long, the Grateful Dead rolled up on a flatbed truck and, jammed away into the early morn-

ing hours. Before two months had elapsed, the strikers were back at work—at another radio station, KSAN.

Janis Joplin Apartment

112 Lyon Street, No. 3

When Big Brother and the Holding Company moved back to San Francisco from Lagunitas in early 1987, manager Julius Karpen found this apartment for the band's vocalist, a small one-bedroom with a sunny, curving balcony off the front room. Joplin shared the apartment with Country Joe McDonald during their brief affair that spring and was living here when the band made its breakthrough appearance at the Monterey Pop Festival. She was evicted more than a year later because the landlord discovered she owned a dog, after spending most of the winter in **Continued on page 62**

Inside Country

One Is the Loneliest Number



Inside Country is written this week by Associate Chart Editor Jeff House With the explosion of

megapolies and huge broadcast companies merging, Lincoln Zeve is fast becoming a minority. As a single owner of country WHYL/FM and adult standards WHYL/AM in the Harrisburg, Pa. market (Arbitron #73), Zeve is certainly a

standout in a dying breed. His radio



career began in college. where he did on-air work. Talking with radio people, he found

almost every person in every department complained about the boss. Saying that he wanted to be the one being complained about, he set a goal: to be an owner. He took the sales route, beginning as a salesperson at WKTQ in Pittsburgh. In Erie, Pa., he became Sales Manager at WLVU. Before buying WHYL in 1989, he was GM at WDLS in Oneonta, N.Y. Here, Zeve gives his perspective on radio ownership. What are your thoughts on

megapolies?

The FCC has a very flexible interpretation of ownership requirements...There are a couple of operators now that own nearly 70 to 80 percent of a market...It's enabling operators with a lot of cash flow and resources to step up to the plate and buy even more stations, and so increase their capability to increase revenue.

How does the radio station buying frenzy affect your investment?

The value of my property has increased dramatically. It's not necessarily through my doing anything, but just through my being at the right place at the right time...It's increased the number of potential buyers for any specific property. Therefore the price has gone up. What are the benefits of being a single owner?

The only benefit I can think of is that my station is worth more now. In every other way, it really becomes a more difficult situation. In Harrisburg, big broadcast companies haven't taken over yet. Do you foresee this coming?

There's been little consolidation. It's actually unusual that it hasn't [happened]. There no longer seems to be any weak sisters in the market. There were a couple and they have been consolidated. For example, my country competitor (WRKZ-Hershey) purchased another large FM in the market that had been underperforming and put an alternative format on with Howard Stern in the morning. The jury is still out, but you'd think they'll do well because they have a good signal and they're good operators. Do you think programming philoso-

phies will change as there are fewer broadcast companies?

I think it could go either way. One of the things that limited creativity was profitability. If you didn't have profits, you couldn't be highly aggressive on formats. You'd have to choose between four or five mainstream formats. On the other hand, if you control five signals in a market and you're only competing

with yourself, then you have more capability to offer more diversity [because] you may be assured of profits. In other words, you can't be aggressive on your format if you've got a lot of debt to pay.

Do you want to buy any more stations?

Prices have gone up all over. Eve looked at some smaller markets. Even in those markets when competitors can buy other competitors, they're willing to pay more for the property. I would like to [buy], but on the other hand, when you pay a lot of money for a station, you then have to turn around and have an operating plan that's going to enable you to generate the dollars and increase profitability. Can today's radio executive become an owner?

I don't know that they'll be able

to live the dream of becoming owners. I think the reality of the situation is that prices are going to be too high for people to go out and buy stations. Guys like me, owner operators, entrepreneurs, unless they're really well financed or going into really small markets...Maybe the upside of all this is that radio in smaller markets is going to become more important for people that want to own...I think in markets where there is strong competition, the competitors will buy up the stations first. Would you consider selling your stations?

If someone were to come up with a huge ungodly sum of money. I'd certainly consider it. On the other hand...if I sold, then what would I do? It's an incredible experience owning your own radio station because it's such a creative industry and an incredible business. ●

Over the last decade, radio station benefit concerts have come into high profile, in essence because they have become vitally important in the absence of touring outlets for hip-hop and younger-end R&B acts. Over the years, the stadiums that allstar packages like the Freshfest (the classic hip-hop tour featuring Whodini, Fat Boys, Grandmaster Flash, the Dynamic Breakers, and the Double Dutch Girls) and tours headlined by LL Cool J and Run D.M.C. used to call home have closed their doors to rap for security reasons. These days, in order for even multiplatinum rap acts to hit the stage, a major crossover R&B artist (like R. Kelly, TLC, or Ziggy Marley on the reggae side) must have top billing. The only way kids can catch Biggie, Wu-Tang, Tha Dogg Pound, Snoop and Warren G. on one stage is at movie theaters during Russell Simmons' rap flick The Show. Because of all this. artists of the '90s find themselves with few means of reaching their growing audience or of making tour money.

In many cases, radio has stepped in to fill this void, offering fans a means to see their favorite artists in a friendly environment. Because the Granddaddy and Grandmomma of these shows are in my home state of Cali-courtesy of KMEL-San Francisco and KKBT-Los Angeles—I'll proudly use the term most familiar to me, "Summer Jam," to describe them. These stations' concerts have set the standard of excellence that other stations try to emulate.

Through "summer jams," radio helps artists meet some of their touring objectives. These shows can get groups in front of 10,000 to 30,000 people in a particular

market, and, generally speaking, folks are so amazed they're at a concert, the shows remain peaceful, which provides the consumer with a safe show. Finally, the performers booked tend to be leading the pack in rotation on the station's playlist, which never hurts.

But what about that precious paper made on the road? Because there is usually a giving-proceeds-to-the-community component to these productions. stations secure their line-ups on a promotional basis, meaning no pocket change for the artist. (Bet on a station's pull in the market having a lot to do with the promo factor, too.) With tour blight at an all-time high, it's hard to turn down a city's only rap concert event of the year. Platinum or not, an artist without a good touring track record can't risk putting their label on Front Street with the station. When it comes time for that baby act that needs the add-or for the next single of the established group in question-the station might hold a grudge. Face it: Playlists are tight, and there are more records to choose from than ever.

Wait, there's more. Appearing at the station's summer blowout concert may not necessarily translate into airplay after the show, Mr. Label and Miss Platinum, so be clear about that when the thought of leveraging enters your mind. Neither you nor your record may be hot next year; you're only as good as your last hit.

The scene isn't completely gloomy, however; it is summer after all. With the rise of groups who really know how to work the stage and have the sales to pack the house-like the Fugees, the Roots, Busta Continued on page 21



When Doug Wilkins was in high school in Schenectedy, New York, he played basketball against Pat Riley. "Our schools were rivals," says Wilkins. "My school, Mount Pleasant, was predominantly black, and Riley's school, Linton, was a money school with great facilities and nice uniforms. We never beat Riley's team, and I'm still mad about it"

Riley went on to play basketball for Kentucky and, later, to coach the Los Angeles Lakers to back-toback championships. Wilkins played ball for a state school in Troy, New York, and, while on vacation in Los Angeles, he fell in love with the palm trees, beaches, and the chance to boo Pat Riley from courtside.

Wilkins began his career in records on the bottom, pulling orders at California Records onestop. "I was fighting rats in the warehouse, pulling eight-tracks for \$80 a week," he remembers. "I had just quit my 9 to 5 job in insurance, threw away my ties, and since basketball, I was finally involved in something I really loved-music." Wilkins moved quickly to local promotion jobs at Motown, Arista, and did a ten year stint with Columbia Records. While at CBS Wilkins was the local San Francisco rep, then moved back to L.A. as Regional Promotion Manager, West Coast Director of Promotion, and, finally, Director of Jazz Promotion. "This is my 25th year in the business," he says. "I spent 17 in LA before making the move back to New York. I was already there when Pat Riley returned to coach the Knicks."

Wilkins has spent the last six years at GRP Records, where he was recently promoted to VP of Urban Promotion.

Q: It must have been hard cheering for the Knicks when Riley was coaching your favorite team.

Dw: It was a lot easier on my emotions when he coached the Lakers. I'm glad he's in Miami now. But don't get me wrong about my grudge with Pat; it's actually very healthy. I've learned a few things from his coaching style. Like what?

One of Riley's Rules says, "You have no choice about how you lose, but you do have a choice about how you come back and prepare to win again." That relates to the competitor in meyou might knock me down, but I'll find a way up and an alternative route to victory.

What is another lesson you've learned from Riley?



how a business runs, and it will be useful to you later on, as you work your way up in a organization. In the record business, I think the people who perform best come from backgrounds where they learned the business from ground level.

Is that the advice you would give to someone who is trying to get into the business?

I would encourage them to know as much about the business as possible. Today, it's tough for untrained people coming in. When I started at CBS we had a manual that laid out the job descriptions from promotion to A&R. It showed you how to present a record to radio, follow-up, etc. I'm in the process of putting together a manual for my staff at GRP that will help them relate to

met Tommy, I've always respected his approach to music and artists. He gives the artists a lot of freedom. He respects honesty, and I can tell him exactly how I feel about anything without fear of losing my job. To Tommy, the most important things are the integrity and the quality of the artists. We have a lot in common. I know or have worked with a lot of the artists he's produced. Tommy is an interesting president because he spends so much time in the studio with our artists. His love for the music is infectious and inspires the entire staff.

GRP has made some strong strides in Urban music lately...

Yeah, Tommy wanted to expand our territory from jazz into the Urban A/C arena. We're signing more quality artists that fit into that area, like Phil Perry and George Benson.

Li Puma's back and he brings George Benson with him. Was there any concern that Urban radio would resist George 's music?

That was a major stumbling block in the beginning, because most of these young programmers are young. They didn't know George's amazing history of Number One records on the R&B charts. They didn't know that George is a legend in the jazz world for being the first jazz artist to have a platinum album. Plus, he is one of the finest guitarists in the world. It was a hard sell initially, because they looked at George as an older jazz artist. But we got through all that and his single "Holdin On" was most added record in Urban radio.

If you were programming an Urban radio station, how would you approach it?

I would be more adventurous and play a wider variety of black music. Programmers today are tentative compared to guys who helped make Urban radio a viable force. Not that long ago you could hear Earth, Wind & Fire, Herbie Hancock, Teddy Pendergrass and Bob Marley on the same station. The flow was bigger and far more interesting than the same safe titles you hear over and over again. I realize you can't play everything, but I would take great advantage of the diversity in musical tastes within the black culture and play it on my station. I would want my station to be the place that listeners would turn on to find out what's new, what's happening.

If you could change one thing in the record business, what would it be?

Well, my answer to that will take us back to your boy Pat Riley, and his philosophy, called "the disease of me." There is a leadership vacuum among black record executives, and the result is cliques and rivalries. Instead of embracing our peers when they succeed or get promoted, we work at bringing them down or participate in negative gossip. This must stop. Positive networking between black executives in radio and records is what we need to begin in earnest. Let's share information and offer encouragement to help each other grow.

WELCOME TO THE **GAVIN ALTERNATIVE BOOT CANP**


t's been a dream of many of us for a number of years to have our own summit, our own little gathering strictly for this format we currently call "Alternative." Sure, a small crowd of us would go have lunch or dinner at the NAB and sit around telling war stories and comparing notes. Or we'd skillfully dodge the dazed hangers-on at a New Music Seminar to find a session we'd be interested in, only to be ultimately disappointed as the panel degenerated into a rambling mess punctuated by whining that was loud enough to get every dog in Brooklyn howling.

Personally, I have never gotten satisfaction from anything "alternative" done at any other convention over the years. Except for one.

Every February, GAVIN would have its seminar and hand out the yearly GAVIN Awards at the Westin St. Francis in San Francisco. Even though this was a convention representing nearly every format, the magic was that it seemed like a small and intimate affair. Everyone could find everyone else merely by turning their head. Every label person we needed to see (or avoid) could be found in the lobby within three seconds. And only at the GAVIN did there seem to be relevant sessions that dealt with Alternative issues.

When I came here just over a year ago, I had two goals in mind (in addition to learning how to write). One, expand and improve the Alternative content at the main seminar in February. And, two, using the model of the GAVIN A3 Summit in Boulder, put together our very own Alternative summit.

Like the first year of the A3 Summit, we have very modest expecta-



tions. This is not a big shmooze-fest. I don't want the entire universe showing up at our doorstep. Please don't expect this to be a large unwieldy gathering. If you are here it's because you really want to be here, and you really want to learn and participate. It's easier to accomplish that with a small group of people. Take a look at the agenda contained within. We've managed to squeeze in nine sessions in two and a half days. That's more than I've ever seen for this format at any other convention.

Frankly, I wanted more. Luckily more sensible heads prevailed, they increased my medication, and we're just going to take this one step at a time. Please be critical. Since this will become a yearly event, we can certainly make changes to this summit format. More panels? Less panels? No panels? Give us your feedback.

Finally, we'd like to thank Jacobs Media and SW Networks for their participation, brain power, and clout. And I'd especially like to thank Kent and Keith Zimmerman for all their help and secret convention tips.


Simpler and Saner

time? And why am I thinking out loud?" Then I said, "Hey, don't postpone joy!" and the rest flowed like a six-pack of Anchor Steam.



In the City by the Bay, green means "get out of my way," yellow means "drive like hell," and red means "really drive like hell." Let the walker beware.

Speaking of unique atmospheric conditions, let's talk weather. Summertime in SF is unlike anywhere else, with the possible exception of Siberia. It can and does get cold. Countless out-of-towners can be spotted wearing nothing but shorts and a "Golden Gate Bridge" tank top while shivering uncontrollably and trying to appear happy. These people are not happy; they are desperately trying to remember the symptoms of frostbite. To quote Mark Twain (I think he played bass in Echo and the Bunnymen), "The coldest winter l ever spent was a summer in San Francisco." Dress in layers, 'cause the weather can change faster than a VJ's career. Remember your Grandma's advice: "Take a sweater!" A heavy jacket wouldn't be a bad idea, either.


Assuming you master the art of cardodging and insulation, you'll want to investigate the City. You can't do it all in a few days. Another overly-hyped but actually kinda swell local attraction is the Alcatraz tour. How can you not enjoy walking the same dingy halls that some of our nation's worst scum once trudged down? Besides, the little headphones you wear for the audio tour makes you look just like Johnny Slash from Square Pegs. If Betty Ford had being scouting locations for a detox center back in the '30s, "the Rock" would've been ideal. Methadone with a view. Don't forget to ask about their "terrorist hostage special," where everyone takes home a free vile of toxic nerve gas. Cosmic!

Unless you want to experience a major buzz kill, avoid Fisherman's Wharf and Pier 39 like the plague.

Plenty of blue hair, piercings, tattoos, and musicians, too. Usually all in one, but you knew that

The tag "lower" Haight refers to street numbers, but it could just as well be a comment on the vibe. Okay, it's kinda seedy, but you can't complain when you can dance at Nickie's or throw back a couple of pints at Mad Dog in the Fog. Besides, the Latin translation for "seedy" is "spiked hair." Let's face it, if you don't make at least a pit stop in the Haight during your San Francisco sojourn, you might as well turn in your membership card to the alternative nation.

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
The Mission district is also a good place to find alterna-hep cats and kittens at play, if you don't mind getting a little dirt on your Docs. After a hard night of playing those Steve Masters' Cetu Javu remixes, I could always look forward to having a drink at the Elbow Room, catching a Jackie Chan flick at the Roxie Theater, or going upscale for some cocktail lounge deco-dence at Bruno's. The perfect grunge-and-goatee late night hang is Muddy Waters coffee shop. You can slurp up caffeine and sugar while counting the various ways street people scam their way into the restroom. Warning: Beware of creeping gentrification if it's clean and brightly lit, it ain't the Mission bro

If you want to experience a variety of snazzy San Francisco night life without having to walk very far (damn, you're lazy), you can head to the corner of 11th and Folsom, south of Market. This Bermuda Triangle of adult fun features swinging hot spots like the Paradise Lounge, DNA, and Slim's. You can quaff a beer or six at the Twenty Tank Brewery, troll for fish tacos at Wahaka, or burn up some of that expense account at a restaurant called Eleven. Then there's the Holy Cow, where a depressing '80s flashback is only a pair of acid-washed jeans away. To each his own.

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Two blocks away is Hamburger Mary's, where supremely messy burgers are scarfed to the gentle sounds of a transvestite rockabilly band skonking about in the lounge. Just make sure to check your burger carefully, because the action behind the counter is so furious, the cook has been known to leave a little of himself on the grill. Don't worry, it's all protein.

You say your thirst for noise still isn't quenched? Other notable music clubs include Hotel Utah, Trocadero, and Bottom of the Hill, where all the coolest indie bands play (one time l was hanging out with some fellow Live 105 jocks and I thought I saw God during a Ruby/ Schtum double bill. Turns out it was just Jim Morrison). There's also the Great American Music Hall, a wonderful venue located in the Tenderloin district. This neighborhood never met a bottle of Thunderbird it didn't like. Don't bother to shave and be sure to bring some spare change; you'll be fine. Not far away is Miss Pearl's Jam House, where Boot Campers will cocktail party like it's 1996 on Friday. Miss Pearl's is part of the renown Phoenix Hotel, which, if you don't know, is totally Kool and the Gang. Digs of choice for touring bands, the



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

FRENTE

Get set for an outdoor mini-musical extravaganza complete with bizarro psychedelic pop compositions from Down Under. Australia's Frente, fronted by the waifish Angie Hart, concoct tripped-out, catchy bits of musicality that bring to mind weird, hypnotic fusions of Sgt. Pepper-era Beatles, ELO, and Pink Floydian riffs lifted from the late '60s. Add to that a mild dose of ecclesiastical harmonics, ambient minimalism, a dash of acoustic flamenco stylings, and a massive lump of off-kilter pop trappings, and you have the basic ingredients found on the quartet's latest offering, Shape. The artistic sculptural setting of Justin Herman's outdoor plaza is a perfect arena for Frente's unique aural presentation.

YUM YUM

Chicago's Yum Yum are purveyors of bittersweet pop melodica. Songs are

built around the lush quirkiness of the mellotron, chuqqinq orqan fuzz/hum, and rich, warm quitar tones. Fronted by Chris Holmes, the group fluctuates from an acoustic oriented 7-piece to a more trimmed down, electrically charged version. The term singer-songwriter usually conjures up images of a musician playing acoustic guitar in a coffe house. Barry's Virgin debut, The Beginning the Middle the End, is brimming with six-string driven minimalism that works as a showcase for her strong vocals. Scathing, ragged quitar accompanies her every whisper, wail, and earnest utterance. Tracks like "Nothing's Too Good," "Seeing Gun," and "Big Girl" are rife with jagged and rusty powder-keg guitar crunch. On the lyrical side of things, Barry delivers no-nonsense verse in a gruff-yet-feminine growl. Barry's live show should prove to be a powerful experience, thanks to a musical presence that is both intense and mesmerizina





An Americana band if there ever was one, the Amazing Rhythm Aces, have re-grouped and returned to action. With a new self-distributed release, Ride Again, consisting of re-worked versions of some of their more popular songs (remember "Third Rate Romance"?), Russell Smith, Jeff "Stick" Davis, James Hooker, Billy Earheart, and Butch McDade are geared up, on the road, and set to begin recording an album of new material. Muscle Shoals veteran Duncan Cameron has taken over the lead guitar slot on the album, and Jamie Hartford is doing the pickin' on the road

The Aces' wonderful musical blend of country and southern soul has always been one that defied easy categorization, and their return is most welcome from Americana corners. Their return was also extremely appreciated by the fans who turned out last weekend (July 21) at KPIG's Fat Fry Festival in Aptos, California. Also on the bill were Todd Snider. Toni Price, and Wayne Hancock. "We've always been a slotless band," said Aces' lead songwriter Smith. "But, when you've got a groove that's deep, you don't need a slot. We got back together by popular demand, basically, People just kept coming to us and saying they wanted to see us, and buy our music on CD, which we couldn't sell them, until now.

"We've recorded for so many labels that locating the masters and seeing if they were even salvageable sounded like too much trouble," he continued. "We decided that since the statute of limitations on re-recording had run out, we were free to do that, so I just called everybody in the band. We cut 20 songs, released 10 of them

on *Ride Again*, and we've got a basket full of new songs for a new album that we'll release in the beginning of next year." One of those new tunes is "Rednecks Unplugged," which they performed at the Fat Fry, leaving no doubt that these guys haven't missed a beat.

"We're taking the little red hen method of making music," continues Smith, "and we're gonna try it our way this time and seriously put all our efforts into it. We were always having to take someone else's advice or direction—or lack of it—and we're not interested in being a mass appeal band. If that

Americana Picks BY ROB BLEETSTEIN

JOHN GORKA

Between Five and Seven (High Street)

When one is seeking songs rich in lyrical honesty and musical finesse, one need look no further than John Gorka. Here on his latest album, Gorka continues to do what he does best-write, sing, and perform

songs that are rich in character and that flow gently from his soothing voice. It's comforting when an artist is at peace with himself musically and doesn't feel a need to mess with new tricks just for the sake of being different. Gorka's got something that works, and he lets it grow naturally from there.

Between Five and Seven bounces from gentle ballads to uptempo numbers that will have you humming along instantly. "Can't Make Up My Mind," "Lightning's Blues," and "My Invisible Gun" provide the umph here, while "Blue Chalk" and "Scraping Dixie" have the makings of genuine classics. John Jennings' production adds all the right touches in all the right places, and Gorka is joined by co-horts Lucy Kaplansky, Jennifer Kimball, Duke Levine, Peter Ostroushko, and Jennings throughout the album. I'd say this one is more between nine and ten.

GARY HEFFERN Painful Davs (Y)

If there's a dark side to this genre, and of course there is-Phil Ochs didn't blaze his trail for nothingthen Gary Heffern is here to tell us all about it. The Finland native, who was a part of the San Diego punk scene in the '80s (he founded the Penetrators with the late Country Dick Montana), is now a Seattle resident who rounded up some friends who happen to be somewhat famous (Peter Buck from R.E.M., Victoria Williams, and former Jayhawk Marc Olsen) to help out on Painful Days. There's an inherent twang to "(Out on the Streets) Junk is Still King," "Till There Was You," "Passin' Through," and Peter Blackstock's "Parisville.'

Heffern is able to have fun with some of the twisted elements on this disc, as proved on the very country "Torture Rack." The title track, augmented by the captivating harmonies of Carolyn Wennblom, is an overwhelming song that deserves your attention.

HAYNES BOYS (Slab)

Crawling out of Columbus, Ohio, come the Haynes Boys. And from the opening chords of "Jackie," I knew this band had something real to offer. Driving guitars, accented with the right touch of mandolin here and there, bring songs like "Murder, Murder" and "The New Franklin County Woman" to life. On the smoother-paced side, check out "Guardian Angel," "Hell on Earth," and especially "Bitters Past," which has lead Haynes Boy Timothy Easton stoking a fine harmonium. There's something about this record; dig in and see if you don't hear what I'm hearing.

I also love the fact that A/C has special programs for special music. Love Songs and light jazz shows have certainly helped me in the first few months in establishing Fourplay, Boney James, and Marilyn Scott." ●

BRYAN FERRY "Dance With Life (The Brilliant Light)" (Reprise)

This song from the soundtrack of John Travolta's *Phenomenon*, written by Martin Page and Bernie Taupin, couldn't have found a better vocalist than Bryan Ferry. As was the case with the soundtrack's first single (Eric Clapton's "Change the World"). the track's fluid melody and philosophic lyric make massive amounts of A/C airplay a logical assumption.

BEACH BOYS/ KATHY TROCCOLI "I Can Hear Music" (River North)

This 1996 Ronnettes song, made popular by the Beach Boys in 1969, is re-vitalized by lead vocals from Kathy Troccoli. The song is part of an entire album of Beach Boys songs re-done by some of Nashville's finest singers and players.

ANNE MURRAY "What Would It Take" (SBK/EMI)

This Bryan Adams/Gretchen Peters song sounds as if it were tailor-made for the distinctive vocal style of Anne Murray. Listen closely and you can hear Bryan Adams lending vocals to the track.

VOICES FOR CARE "Power of Peace" (MMI)

CELINE DION "It's All Coming Back to Me Now" (550 Music)

Millions around the world watched Celine's inspirational performance during the Opening Ceremonies at the Olympics, no doubt captivating her international audience. On this track, Jim Steinman's dramatic writing style melds perfectly with her powerful vocal, giving this production an incredibly passionate quality. Those uncomfortable with the length of the song (edit is down to 5:27) need to keep in mind that it just means the audience will listen longer. WKSE-Buffalo, WIOQ-Philly, and KISS 108-Boston out of the box!



JOHN MELLENCAMP "Key West Intermezzo (I Saw You First)" (Mercury)

Two decades of unforgettable songs makes any new release by Indiana's favorite son a real event. Compelling both lyrically and melodically, it's easy to shout the praises of this latest entry, which stands up right alongside the singersongwriter's best work. And if you haven't seen it yet, make it a point to check out the video.

PATTI ROTHBERG "Inside" (EMI)

Women rule the airwaves these days for two very good reasons: talent and exceptional songs. Now, add the name Patti Rothberg to the list. Rising quickly from her discovery in a New York subway station to heavy play at A3 and Alternative, Ms. Rothberg is more than deserving of a spot on Top 40. Though I've been patiently waiting to review this week's Record to Watch, numerous programmers have been spiking it over the last month. It's the goods.

ACE OF BASE "Never Gonna Say I'm Sorry" (Arista)

By providing the planet with all that it wants in the realm of Pop music, this Swedish foursome has yet to disappoint its ever-growing legion of fans. Thanks to the creative power of Jonas Berggren, the Ace of Base sound remains distinctive without getting stale. Early spins paint a positive future for single number three from *The Bridge*.

MAGNĂPOP "Open the Door" (Priority)

Though I'll stop short of offering to polish his footwear during the Alternative Boot Camp, credit GAVIN Alternative Editor Max Tolkoff for turning me on to this group from the land of CNN, Coca-Cola, and the '96 Summer Olympics. Already Number One for WLVY-Elmira, N.Y., the song boasts a chorus that's impossible to stop humming.

"Where It's At" (DGC)

I couldn't help a double take after the first listen to make sure this really was that creative wizard who calls himself Beck. Borrowing from several musical genres, he concocts one of the more fascinating releases out right now. Forget categorization. KQKY-Kearney, Nebraska's Mark Reid reports enormous phone action from day one. Hardly a loser, baby.

SEX PISTOLS Filthy Lucre Live (Virgin)

"Well, we're not that fucking bad after all, are we?" C'mon, if westerns were all the rage, and you were film director John Ford, you'd jump back in too, wouldn't ya? Okay, I'm hardly objective. The Sex Pistols were and are the greatest rock & roll band of all time, and one of the greatest myths of popular music was that they couldn't play. But consider this: Would any other band sound this great on their second gig after 18 years apart? John Lydon is understandably amped, playing to his mates and futbol hooligans in North London's Finsbury Park, the old neighborhood. He's never sung better. Steve Jones is a one man wrecking machine, Paul Cook lays down the baddest backbeat bar none, and Glen Matlock is on that kick drum like glue. Though the boys may still have their differences, you'd never know it here. "Fat, forty, and back" with no new songs to louse things up. Buy the book.

The Red Hot Organization is coming with something in the way of AIDS awareness for the hip-hop nation, with artists from both coasts reminding us that AIDS knows no boundaries. Though tales of drug abuse are included, mostly unprotected sex is the basis for the songs on this CD. After hearing Pete Rock and the Lost Boyz' "The Yearn," heads across the nation opened up to this compilation and, right now, a strong cut from the Wu-Tang Clan, "America," seems to be

the most popular. 8Ball and MJG's "Listen to Me Now' tells of a lesson learned too late, while Domino catches attention with the cheerleading "Sport That Raincoat." Organized Konfusion tells us that in the struggle of life, we all have to make the right "Decisions." De La Soul and Da Beatminerz drop knowledge with a little dance called "The Hustle." Mac Mall comes with Bay Area style to let it be known that "Suckas P.H." All the artists do their thang and come correct with tight beats for all. Keep an ear out for more singles to drop from this outstanding disc. As a bonus to us all, this is an enhanced CD that includes interviews, song lyrics, and a mix master game. MELVINS Stag (Atlantic/Mammoth)



Probably one of the most overlooked hard rock bands of our time, the Melvins are back with another sketchy gem. The Melvins' uncanny and grandiose guttural sound is proof that they are one of the founding fathers of what is now considered grunge. Despite all the Seattle hoopla, grunge originally spawned from the grimy gutters of San Francisco's lower Haight district, where filth is the norm and bathing is the exception. The Melvins, with their gritty nature and dizzying mixture of various musical styles, are representative of this scene. Stag, the band's latest, offers an array of the group's patented mutated rhythms and severed melodies. From the sitar-riddled hooks of "The Bit," and the blistering chords on "Buck Owens" to alien sampling on "Sterilized" and the blasting horns of "Bar-X-The Rocking M," the Melvins dish up a delightfully disturbing listen that will turn on those into genuine spuzz rock. --- ROB FIEND


