On Hootie & the Blowfish: The Followup

Hootie & the Blowfish are in the racks again. Their second album. Fairweather Johnson, is approaching 2 million in sales. But to critics, that number pales when compared to the phenomenon of the band's first

album, Cracked Rear View, and its sales of 10 million units.

Atlantic Records, however, knew that Cracked was exactly that: a phenomenon, and shipped a relatively moderate 1.5 million units of Fairweather. Three million, the company said, would be a major success. At 2 million after three months, Atlantic Records' Co-Chairman and Co-CEO Val Azzoli responds to the critics and tells why the label continues to have a hoot with Hootie.

think what Hootie & the Blowfish have done with Fairweather Johnson is great. I'm being very pragmatic about life. Once upon a time, we used to have elaborate parties if a band went platinum. If it went double platinum, we'd have bigger, elaborate parties. If it went triple platinum... well, that was almost unheard of.

So we put out this record with Hootie & the Blowfish and sold 10 million. With this album, it's almost at 3 million. SoundScan's at 1.7, 1.8, and we've shipped 2.8 million.

Hootie & the Blowfish, between Cracked Rear View and Fairweather, are selling approximately 60-70,000 records a week. The record's been out three months. It's a long race. It's not like a heavy metal or a rap band where you have that front-end, initial frenzy over it.

The success of Hootie & the

Blowfish is that it's hit all over America, from 13 year-old girls and boys to 55 year-old accountants and lawyers. It's hit all walks of life.

What this says to me is that Hootie & the Blowfish have hit their core audience, which is, let's say, 2 million. That's good! They've got a core audience of 2 million people. That's fantastic. Not many bands have a base of 2 million

Now, we've got to start again. We've got to get back to the other 8 million people, and those 8 million people don't buy a lot of records. To sell 10 million, we hit people who are going to buy maybe only one record a year; who bought it while they were buying something else; who don't even listen to radio.

I always said if we could sell 3 million on their second record-man, I'm the happiest guy in the world. We're on our way to 3 million.

Also, if they're "America's band"-Well, for the first three months of the album's release, they weren't in America. They were in England,

France, and Germany, because we're trying to make the band an international success. They've already sold as many records internationally on Fairweather Johnson as they sold all of Cracked Rear View. It's working, but it takes time, and it took time from the American market. Hootie & the Blowfish is really Americana music, and it's all about touring, making inroads, and being there. Here, they're just now doing the national shows that got them to middle America.

Hootie is close to 20 million records. The last time I looked, not many bands did that in their career

The band is ecstatic. We've had these meetings a hundred times, about how to get to the third record. The band will be judged and their credibility and staying power will be judged on the music on the third album.

Unfortunately you have to do a second album to get to the third, and Fairweather is being judged not on the merits of the record, but on how many copies it's sold, how it compares to Cracked Rear View.

They're never going to do another album like Cracked Rear View. That was a magical record. Magic happened! It's impossible to duplicate, because the world changes at all levels. Radio changes. The intangible of what is current changes.

They're really good guys, and they said, "We'll make the best record we can." We've become successful beyond their expectations. We're playing on the house money now. They're touring, selling out all their shows, including two nights at Madison Square Garden. Life is good. GAVIN

First Words


Everybody is measured these days. Whether it is our own personal performance, the national debt, or the day-to-day standings of presidential candidates-figures are diced, spliced, analyzed, reworked, extrapolated, and then compared to the number you first thought of. It's an unfair system in an unfair world. And it's not going to go away.

In our own business we have airplay, we have sales figures, we have ratings, which are all turned into charts and analyzed extensively. Careers can hang in the balance of subtle shifts in one direction or another. As providers of just such information since 1958, we wouldn't be so hypocritical as to suggest all this measurement is a bad thing. If used correctly, it can help all of us make better business decisions and achieve our goals.

Measurement is a good thing until it becomes comparison and, by some twisted logic, turns tremendous success into relative failure in some people's minds. For instance, Hootie & the Blowfish and Atlantic reached unimagined peaks with the group's first album, but at the same time they knew they

were constructing a huge mountain to climb for the second release. They are already on their way to new sales peaks most acts would kill for, and it would be a tragedy to have their success turned against them by the cynics.

There aren't too many Blowfish in the sea and we should nurture them.

Focus Groups Surprise **Alternative Boot Campers**

GAVIN'S first Alternative Boot Camp got right down to business Friday morning, as the troops at the Hyatt

Regency gathered Operations," revealing glimpse into focus groups. Led by consultant Fred Jacobs, the session provided programmers a glimpse into the minds of their target audience.

Prior to Boot Camp, conducted and filmed two focus groups in Detroit. Edited pieces of those meetings made up the bulk of this session and evoked laughs, applause, and gasps from viewers.

A&R at SFO3: It's Not The Same Old Song

SFO3, by and large, is for the young, up and coming musician. Naturally, then, many of the panels at the Press Club focused on the niche market and diverse interests of inde-

pendent musicians, but several, including the opening panel of Friday, "What is A&R and What Does it Mean to You," appealed to a wide audience.

The panel drew not only newcomers to the music business, but also radio programmers and music directors. The Media Room was filled to SRO status.

Panelists came from large

and small labels. Moderated with authority by John Coon of the internationally-oriented Modulus Music, they included Judy Ross (Epic), Mitch Brody (MCA), Hugo Burnham (EMI Publishing), Julie Gordon (The Enclave and AOL's Velvet Rope), Danny Goodwin (Virgin), and Greg Werckman (Alternative Tentacles).

They emphasized the importance of uniqueness and of the song. They are looking, they said, for acts that enter-

SF03 Keynoter Went From **Bartender to Booking Agent**

SFO3 keynoter Frank Riley, a booking agent Monterey Peninsula Artists (MPA), regaled a full house at the Press Club with lively anecdotes from his 15-year career, illustrated with snippets of music from artists he's represented.

A former bartender/waiter, Riley moved to New York City in 1981 on the whim of a friend and, with "no clue" about what they were doing, began representing bands such as the Bongos and the dbs in the club circuit.

Along the way, musicians turned him onto new clients, raw talent such as R.E.M., the Violent Femmes (who are his longest managerial relationship), the Replacements ("One of the most influential bands of the '80s"), 10,000 Maniacs, and the Indigo Girls.

Riley has molded his successful career through his

love of music and was a trifle critical of those who are in the business solely for the money.

He advised: "Be conscientious, get some luck here and there, know what you want, and persevere because if you're talented and work hard enough, you'll get it."



Riley pointed out Soul Asylum: "I first started working with them in 1983 and they really didn't become successful until 1993." The band members, he said, were committed enough "to live as musicians all that time, but now they have houses, and cars that run."

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

downsizing is not a big threat to the industry. All said their companies' recent purchases had actually created jobs, not eliminated them. They also asserted that, by owning multiple stations in a market, companies will diversify formats in order to not compete internally. This, they predict, will lead to more choices and longer devel-

opment time for non-mainstream formats.

More interesting, however, was the discussion of the challenges radio will face in the years ahead. "Radio must change its mindset," said Field. "We need to make partners out of rivals and focus on taking advertising money from [TV and print], not from other radio."

On Saturday, campers convened for more on dealing with competing formats ("Alternative Goes to War"), then split up, choosing between "Controlling Your Sales Staff" and "Anatomy of a Music Meeting."

The louder session was "Anatomy," featuring three staffers from Live 105 (KITS/FM-San Francisco), but the sales session, conducted by Paul Jacobs, proved both lively and informative. While teamwork communication between programming and sales are vital, said consultant Jacobs, they shouldn't meddle in the other's job.

He also advised a broader definition of Alternative radio's audience. Research shows listeners liking Led Zeppelin and Garth Brooks as much as they do Soundgarden. "This is not a linear audience," said Jacobs. "It's a mass audience. If we keep going down the 'too hip for the room' path, you're not making it appealing for your sales staff.'

At the music meeting, a track-by-track dissecting of Live 105's current playlist included frank talk about the roles of research ("If it agrees with you, it's great," said Acting Program Director Roland West) and stationartists politics.

In the end, West and company found only one hole among the top 15 tracks; only three out of the 46song list. And Acting Music Director Aaron Axelsen had a stack of some 40 CDs to consider.

tain—"something that gets a reaction," said Werckman-"even if it's a violent one."

Their search for new talent is not limited, some reminded, to sitting in an office listening to demos. "We're out there or on the phone," said Ross, "talking with college radio, finding out who's doing what between L.A. and New York.'

"Don't waste your money sending demos to labels," said Burnham. "Use it for gas for your van, and build up your following.

The panel agreed that attorneys seem to be playing an unusually great part in most up and coming bands-and that this is one of the more ludicrous aspects of the '90s music

business. As Goodwin said, "I've never made a record deal with an attorney...they are for making sure all the i's are dotted and t's are crossed, not for making great songs.

Like the A&R session, other panels, on production, management, performance, and other aspects of the business, featured many of the most outspoken members of the music community—and some of the most modest. "Managers are frustrated musicians," said Chris Coyle of Industrial Management.

This year's SFO was brought to a close by a brand new event: Music & Multimedia Day. (See Dave Beran's "Reality Bytes" column on page 8 for details.)

Stations Do High Jumps in Arbitrons

Our third wave of Arbitron Ratings reports shows New York powerhouse WKTU's impact on the Nassau-Suffolk book. Also, just as he did in the Big Apple, talker Bob Grant's addition to WOR/AM boosted its numbers big time. In San Diego, it's news talker KFMB and album rocker KIOZ that do the Carl Lewis thing (long jumps). In Kirby Puckettown, KOOL, the oldies station, and A/C outlet KSTP have reasons to celebrate. And in St. Louis, Alternative KPNT is rocking with a 1.3 overall jump, while KYKY's A/C format sounds great with a 1.2 boost. Gold medals for all.

REALITY BYTES

DUD: A DREAM FORMAT

GAVIN's SF03 Multimedia Day CD-ROM and Beyond panel focused on the marketing confusion that Enhanced CDs and other discs have experienced, and the idea that all roads are leading to the DVD format, which Sonic Solutions' developer MARK ELY described as the first true multimedia format. Moderator, CHUCK CORTRIGHT, CEO of Graphix Zone, called the DVD "A developer's dream that combines the best of both worlds of active interactivity and passivity." Philips Media's TED COHEN assured that "Although there's been a little bit of the bloom off the rose of multimedia, when marketing clears up confusion about discs, their potential will be realized." Addicted To Noise editor MICHAEL GOLDBERG's keynote began with his assertion that "We're at the beginning of a revolution in the way that people are going to get music over the Internet." He cited the debut of Macromedia's new Shockwave Audio as a major development, and foresees virtual record companies on the Web. The Multimedia Music as Art panel featured commercial and noncommercial perspectives steered by moderator DAVID SCHWARTZ. LEE PAIUA, of the San Francisco band HER MAJESTY THE BABY discussed her collaborations with nu.millenia on the band's upcoming Enhanced CD, and CHRIS SMITH (Om Records) and LANE DUNLOP (Netmedia/Nettwerk Records) talked about their successful Enhanced CD projects, and practical budget matters. "Broadcasting on the Internet has much more impact than an obscure radio station would," said Hotwired's KIM DANDERS. The final panel further surveyed the state of marketing and transmitting music over the Internet, Moderator LORRY FLEMING (BAM's Music Universe) talked to IUMA's TODD WILLIAMS and DG Systems' JOHN BLAIR about transmitting issues, and BMI's RICHARD CONLON pointed out that "Although there's not enormous amounts of money on the Internet yet, people should get out there and make mistakes !

Rock Bands at Heart of Bomb Blast in Atlanta

On the eve of the Olympic Games, House of Blues founder Isaac Tigrett told GAVIN about the temporary House of Blues that had been built, overlooking Centennial Park.

Halfway into the Olympics, tragedy struck the park, as a crude pipebomb exploded at 1:15 a.m. Saturday, July 17, causing two deaths and injuring 111 others.

The bomb was placed at the sound and light tower 150 feet from a concert stage where bands were performing. At the time of the explosion, Jack Mack and the Heart Attack, a seasoned rock band from Denver, were a half hour into its set,

while, across Techwood Drive, another band was playing the Rolling Stones' "Time Is on My Side."



Inside Top 40 BY DAVE SHOLIN

Who's Keepin' It Real Between the Music?



Impressed with that big, ballsy voice you've been perfecting for years? Proud of the time you spent learning to speak

Michael Martin in round, pearshaped tones? Well, if you're thinking of sending KYLD (WILD 107)-San Francisco PD Michael Martin your T&R, save the postage. Martin looks for what might accurately be described as the "anti-jock" saying, "the best radio talents reflect the people they're trying to attract. I want jocks who are living, breathing members of the audience. They just happen to be inside the control room. They should talk about topics that concern our listeners, and that means they need to eat where WILD 107 listeners eat, ride the same bus to work, travel the same freeway, and know that street with the pothole that's pissing everyone off."

Martin is passionate about the subject of talent, enough so that he responded immediately to an anonymous source who posted a critique of L.A radio stations recently on America Online. Though the "critic" gave high marks to the music on Power 106 **(KPWR)**, they took exception to the jocks, saving they needed a course in remedial radio. Martin sharply disagrees. In today's world of contemporary radio, he doesn't think the audience wants to be velled at. "They don't want big voice guys," he says. "I don't care if a jock can talk up to a post, and listeners don't care either. I do want someone to make me laugh, feel emotion, and sound like they're believable when they're talking about something going on in the street."

But what about the basics—

aren't those important? According to Michael, "The basics can be taught. But it's rough to find someone with that magic, the chemistry that makes the audience latch on to 'em. Expectation levels have risen in everything, and the public won't accept bullshit. They want the real thing. Ideally, I want to find members of my target audience and throw 'em on the air. Sure they get a set of rules, but after they've sucked it all in, shake 'em up and go on the air. We're not gonna put a clock in front of you. You know what we want and what we don't want. Deliver that in your own style. Does Howard **Stern** do the 'basics'? He mentions the radio station like you're supposed to and then what else does he do? He pushes the listeners' hot buttons and talks about what's on their mind."

Next week: On the eve of this year's **Morning Show Boot Camp**, which gets underway Thursday in New Orleans, **Talentmasters'** President **Don Anthony** shares his thoughts about "sounding real."

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



THE CORNELL **HURD BAND Cool and Unusual Punishment** (Behemoth)



Traditional country music with a twisted wit is almost becoming a subgenre of its own these days, and Cornell Hurd has placed himself right at the front of the pack with Cool and Unusual Punishment. Hurd, who first put his band together in San Jose, California in 1968, has been an Austinite for many years now. His penchant for honky-tonk hilarity puts a two-step in motion and a smile on vour face. But Hurd's tune is not one of novelty. One listen, and you know reality is at the heart of "I Don't Care What It Is That You Did When You Lived in Fort Worth" and "Seven Cups of Coffee, Fourteen Cigarettes."

The legendary Johnny Bush joins Hurd and company for several songs, including "The Cold Morning Light," and "Drivin' Nails in My Coffin." Hurd's songwriting is right up there with the likes of Junior Brown and Leroy Preston. His take on Spade Cooley's "Crazy 'Cause I Love You" rocks, and helping out all over this 17-song disc are steel masters Tom Morrell and Lucky Oceans, piano king Floyd Domino, and former Asleep at the Wheel-er Chris O'Connell.

JOHNNY RODRIGUEZ You Can Say That Again (Hightone)

The big red velvet welcome back mat is out for Johnny Rodriguez' Hightone debut. Digging into the well of some of Americana's best songwriters, Rodriguez applies his distinct vocal touch to Lucinda Williams' "Big Red Sun Blues," Dave Alvin's "Every Night About This Time," and Robert Earl Keen's "Corpus Christi Bay," which, to no surprise, is garnering top phones at Corpus' KFTX

By reuniting with longtime producers Rov Dea and Jerry Kennedy, Rodriguez adds a great touch of old comfort, while retaining a '90s feel. Be sure to check out the wonderful Western Swing of "There's Still a Lot of Love in San Antone.

THE AUSTIN **LOUNGE LIZARDS** Live Bait (Watermelon)

Yes, you can have too much fun in the music business. And, you can



sharpen your wit on subjects ranging from political nemeses ("Gingrich the Newt") to Hank Williams ("The Car Hank Died In"). On this live EP the Lizards give us a new number. the opening "Teenage Immigrant Welfare Mothers on Drugs," as well as updated versions of their classics "Highway Cafe of the Damned," and "The Golden Triangle." 
COUNTRY **DICK MONTANA** The Devil Lied To Me (Bar None)


SALAMANDER CROSSING **Passion Train** (Signature Sounds)



The Hidden Camera EP

When Portishead injected their esoteric and somber hip-hop musings into mainstream consciousness, pundits were left scrambling to define the unprecedented sounds, and "trip hop" was coined. Now, somewhere in the semantic void between "jungle" and "trip hop," the English-based Photek may be instigating another categorical crisis with his first domestic release, The Hidden Camera EP. At the cusp of a new abstract jazz-based drum and bass movement, Photek stands poised to further dissolve the already blurred boundary between the aforementioned genres with a mysteriously dark and seductive musical expanse that continues along the trail that Portishead abandoned. In what could be a soundtrack to a modern espionage drama, The Hidden Camera EP offers an operative's view into the future of a movement that has yet to be captured in the categorical gulag. Though likely to appeal to the jungle mind set, this music retains an indefinable power and originality-two qualities that become ever scarcer once a genre acquires a proper name and, ergo, a pigeonhole.--MIKE JOHNS

STEVE WYNN Melting in the Dark (Zero Hour)

Play this record for someone who's motored swiftly away from Steve Wynn's post-Dream Syndicate solo work and watch the jaded wheels come off one by one. Wynn hooked up with the Boston's Come and cut this bad boy in four days. What makes it great? Simply put, the songs. Melody is often a casualty in the pursuit of guitar noise, but "Why" finds Wynn maintaining a discernible melody amidst fierce guitar squelchings and bottomsup drums. The single, "Shelly's Blues, Pt. 2," features a harmonized chorus and lithe pop appeal, while Wynn's voice dons a familiar raspiness on the questioning "Epilogue." The rocker "Smooth" is an updated "Secret Agent Man" with distorted guitars billowing smoke signal warnings as Wynn cautions, "Flames are rising from your feet again." Don't overlook the Spanishtinged love song "For All I Care," and don't ignore the title track's freeform potpourti. —David Beran

RED HOUSE PAINTERS Songs for a Blue Guitar (Supreme/Island)

Timeless albums are seldom recognized as classics when they're initially released. And then there's the latest Red House Painters disc. Songs for a Blue Guitar. Head Painter Mark Kozelek composes and produces an album that shares the same songwriting rung as the poetic styles of Cat Stevens and Simon & Garfunkel, and boasts vintage guitars a la Neil Young. Songs also marks the debut of filmmaker John Hughes' label, Supreme Recordings, and, fittingly, there's tendencies for this to become the soundtrack to your life as its melodies haunt vour subconscious.

'Have You Forgotten" and "Song for a Blue Guitar" are sweet, ballads featuring a smooth pedal steel contributed by the brilliant Bruce Kaphan (American Music Club). The warmth of "Priest Alley Song" hints at the band's first album, Down Colorful Hill, with its references to modern day San Francisco, at once urban and pastoral. In "Trailways," subtle feedback follows humble. angelic poetry, and the band bravely reveals a long-concealed hipster secret (vou may have heard it whispered..."Ric Ocasek is cool"...) with a cover of the Cars' "All Mixed Up";

Kozelek's reading includes a pleading chorus that may elicit tears from more sensitive listeners. Indeed, should you be even slightly sensitive, *Songs for a Blue Guitar* could offer the catharsis you've been straining towards. —Sandra Derian

HOLIDAY Ready, Steady, Go! (March Records)

Handelaps are necessary accessories for certain pop songs. Try to picture a clapless "I Want to Hold Your Hand" or "Along Comes Mary," and it's easy to see the impact palmskins can add. Prey prone to pop will be rendered helpless by Holiday's sting of puree-smooth vocals and crisp guitars, as well as extras like organ, horns, and claps. The surf beat of "Gent" clicks with Unrest-like guitar and cooing vocal harmonies, while "Sandra" features a lulling horn section that melds perfectly with Josh Gennet's vocals. A distorted guitar surfaces on "It's Wrong to Love," but the band soars when it returns to the familiar pop digs of "How Do You Know?" The song's wavering moog, exultant chorus, and memorable beat make it an ideal twominute pop track. Speaking of choruses, check out the "Mrs. Brown, You've Got a Lovely Daughter" inspired chorus of "April Cries." The


Beatles/*Sgt. Pepper* influence really reveals itself on "She's Not the Person You Think You Know," and "Still in Love" rocks steady with more moog and toothy guitars. If you're looking for a break from noise guitar bands, and sixties groups like Herman's Hermits and the Turtles float your boat, go on Holiday. —DAVID BERAN

VERSUSSecret Swingers (Caroline)

Superlatives fail to describe what's easily among the best albums I've heard this year. In golf terms, you'll find both hooks (luring vocals) and slices (barbed guitars) playing through these 11 gems that never stay on predictable fairways. "Lose That Dress" crains Thurstony guitar up against Richard Baluyut's matterof-fact vocals, and it's a toss up as to whether Fontaine 'foups' amazing vocal or Pylonesque bass line steals the show on the persistent rocker "Yeah You." The forlorn background vocals peppering "Glitter of Love" swim and sparkle next to a guitar that spirals up the scale. The longer, slower "Jealous" evinces the stand-up staving power of Versus' melodies via a chiming acoustic guitar. "Shower Song" hurtles by way of skintight drumming, and "Angels Rush In" features guitars that curl lazily, then tweak into clouds of pure noise. Just when you thought it was unsafe to go in the water crowded with the female vocal/noise guitar sound, this four-piece makes it fun again. WXYC, KWBU, KVMR, and KVRX are already on intimate terms with this Secret. —DAVID BERAN

JIMMY EAT WORLD Static Prevails (Capitol)

This Tempe, Arizona foursome's towering guitar sound brings to mind mesas and canyons much the way The Edge's guitar coniures colossal images of Irish countrysides. Tonsil-shredding screaming combines with singing on the relentless rocker "Thinking, That's All," and "Rockstar" offers avalanches of distorted guitar. "Claire" mellows things out to let vocal harmonies and organ-like guitar melodies surface, while the chugging drums and tamborine of "Seventeen" transform it into a definitive three-minute rocker. "In the Same Room" begins as a dirge until a guitar kicks in, and the sonic spaces littered throughout give it a wide, expansive tone. The standout track, "Robot Factory," tweaks artificial guitar sounds with crunching guitars, while a churning bass line lurks

Goldplated Lies" One of Nashville's hippest artists, K.T. Oslin was the first female songwriter in history honored by the Country Music Association for Song of the Year (in 1988). Her previous album collections, 80's Ladies, This Woman, Love in a Small Town, and Songs From an Aging Sex Bomb, have produced such classics as "I'll Always Come Back," "Hey Bobby," and "Come Next Monday." In the early '90s, K.T. withdrew from recording and spent several years acting in television and movies. Now, however, she admits that Hollywood is not for her; the countless hours spent sitting around between scenes and the start-stop pace have made her decide that a full time acting career is not in her future. In 1995, Oslin set about recording (and co-producing with Rick Will) her new project. My Roots Are Showing collects some of her all-time favorite songs, including "Down in the Valley," which she learned in her third-grade music class. Two other highlights are the first single, "Silver Tongue and Goldplated Lies," and Irving Berlin's Prohibition-era tune "I'll See You in Cuba." Instead of using the usual crew of Nashville musicians, Oslin brought in players from diverse backgrounds to give these songs a fresh feel. By being involved in the album's production, she was able to avoid simply

MICHELLE WRIGHT (ARISTA)

Album: For Me It's You Single: "Nobody's Girl" Finally, the sensation from Canada is back. It was back in 1992 when Michelle had her last U.S. release out—the same year she was



named the Academy of Country Music's Top New Female Vocalist. Now, as her third album release hits

stores August 27, the journey begins again. Born and raised in a musical family on a farm near Merlin, Ontario, the story of Michelle starting her professional career by stealing one of her mother's singing jobs is now legendary. In the process, she became one of the most celebrated artists in Canada, with two Juno awards and thirteen Canadian Country Music Awards to her credit. Now, with For Me It's You, Michelle says she feels refreshed. There's no doubt the sound of the first single, "Nobody's Girl," is a very different Michelle Wright. Producers Tim DuBois and Jim Scherer give the song, written by Gretchen Peters, a very refreshing twist. Other producers on the album include John Guess (Reba McEntire), Val Garay (Kim Carnes), and Monty Powell (Diamond Rio), who all add to the completeness of the album. It also includes Michelle's favorite song she's ever written, "What Love Looks Like," a song she co-wrote





She

took him under her wing and taught him auitar and sonawritina. After the Marines and his other jobs, Ward moved back to



Washington and made trips to Nashville in search of a record deal. On one of these trips, he showcased for producer/Giant Records executive James

Stroud, who was impressed, but wasn't able to sign him to the label because the roster was full. After moving his family to Nashville in 1994, he worked



singing demos and eventually landed on Giant Records in November of '95. The first single, "Fall Reaching," was written by Robert Ellis Orrall and was on Orrall/Wright's album but never released as a single. Ward feels the song describes his life perfectly. Don't give up on dreams, and when there are stumbling blocks, grab on to something and make it worthwhile.

BEST BIO BITE

"I can remember being on stage [at J.R.'s Country Palace] and being paged by the [police] station or recognized by somebody I'd arrested."

Q. IF YOU COULD RECORD A DUET WITH ANYONE, WHO WOULD IT BE?



Right now, his days are spent visiting radio stations, performing showcases, and introducing his first single "Her Man," a touching ballad about a man who wants to right his wrongs to the woman he loves.



Q. IF YOU COULD COVER ANY SONG IN ANY FORMAT, WHICH ONE WOULD YOU LOVE TO DO AND WHY?


A. There's an old Hank Williams, Jr. song called "Old Habits" that my grandpa had

The sampler helps people to let people know who they are and what they're about. Now, after playing over 200 dates last year (including some dates on the Wal-Mart Tour), the trio is looking forward to recording a new

full-length album. They are currently looking for the right producer and songs that will fit their unique style. Until then, they'll continue jumping in their new air conditioned van and taking their energetic music on the road.

In true Jim Steinman fashion, Celine Dion cranks it up to bombastic levels in this memorable power ballad. Ms. Dion avoids the narrow boundaries of a fragile balladeer by making a bold statement with this newest single off of *Falling Into You*.

JOHN MELLENCAMP "Key West Intermezzo (I Saw You First)" (Mercury)

Good to have John back. This musical comeback is reminiscent of his "Jack & Diane" hit from 1982. Unlike the perpetual teenagers of "J&D," however, the new message is that it's OK to just be who you are.

BRANDY, TAMIA, GLADYS KNIGHT, & CHAKA KHAN "Missing You" (EastWest/EEG)

Two generations of great female soul singers merge for one great soundtrack gem. This over-the-top performance, from the Jada Pinkett/ Queen Latifah film *Set It Off*; is nothing short of specatucular.

HERB ALPERT "Flamingo" (Almo Sounds)

This 50-year old song, originally made popular by Herb Jeffries, is renewed by Herb Alpert with loving care. The song's indellible melody is timeless, bound to remain a true American standard. This is why we sometimes look back on the past and say, "They sure don't write 'em like they used to."

BRYAN ADAMS "Let's Make a Night to Remember" (A&M)

Unlike Adams' previous single, "The Only Thing That Looks Good on Me

Is You," this new track can get play across the A/C spectrum instead of just among the Hots. It's a seductive pop song with a reasonably convincing plea for making the most of a one-night stand.

DOG'S EYE VIEW "Small Wonders" (Columbia/CRG)

Before everything falls apart, we usually discover the humbling minutia that can either ruin a relationship or solidify it. The band captures a pensive mood with softly ringing guitars and passionate vocals.

ORLEANS "I'm on Your Side" (Dinosaur Entertainment)

John Hall and the Hoppens re-group for a charming "Lean on Me" style song. John Hall's distinctive lead vocals prove that he's still the one. Do you remember the 1976 hit, "Still the One" or maybe its reprise for an '80s ABC television fall schedule campaign?

ELECTRONIC "Forbidden City" (Warner Bros.)

Bernard Sumner, formerly with New Order, and Johnny Marr of the Smiths have found a sense of permanence with their current band, Electronic, actually formed in 1988. Their plugged-in, cutting edge music has seldom been this mellow or approachable. As a format of the approachable, we win with this one.

MICHAEL LEARNS TO ROCK

"That's Why (You Go Away)" (Cleveland International)

This Danish pop band, fronted by singer-songwriter Jascha Richter, gets a full-bodied sound in this track. It's another hapless romantic song about a guy who has nothing but heart full of memories.





Sunday afternoons (his most popular shift) is up to 4500, while the weeknights settle in between 3200 and 3800 listeners.

"I've learned that Jazz listeners like to talk to the announcer," says Sinnett. "Radio is an intriguing personal device. Listeners feel they know me even though they've never met me. They feel connected, and don't mind giving their money."

Jae estimates his Jazz music blend as 60% current, 40% recurrent. He likes to flavor his weeknight shifts with one-hour specials, each starting at 10 p.m. Monday night gives Sinnett a chance to stretch out with more "contemporary" musicians, like Mike Stern, Yellowiackets, and Vince Mendoza. who don't fall into the broad acoustic jazz category, yet are often too drivin' for Smooth Jazz radio. Tuesday nights, Jae features his own version of Smooth Jazz by playing more romantic pieces like Miles Davis' "Kind of Blue.

Besides gigging, composing, and jazzin' it up on the air, Sinnett has been conducting drum clinics in Phoenix, Denver, and Texas. WHRV has been good about giving him time off to pursue his own music, and Jae looks forward to reentering the studio.

"I haven't gone into the studio since *House and Simnett*, and I recorded that back in 1993," he says. "I haven't had anything interesting to come up with until now. In fact, I'm going into the studio next weekend, but [The record] probably won't be out until the first of next year. It will be part trio, part quartet, and part sextet."

Jae laughs. "I'll also be including two solo drum pieces, which [probably] won't get any airplay at all."

Jazz/Smooth Jazz Picks

Caravan of Dreams (Columbia)



Easily, one of the strongest Smooth Jazz releases of the year. Guitarist Peter White's major label debut is packed with prime

suspect players like Boney James, Rick Braun, Marc Antoine, and producer Paul Brown, all of whom (including White) we should now start calling the "Smooth Jazz Mafia." Like his friend Boney, Peter White is also a fine keyboardist, which bolsters his capacity to compose catchy and harmonically rich songs. The title cut and "Venice Beach" sound like slam-dunk SJ&V airplay monsters, but don't forget the spice. The haunting appeal of "Just Another Day" is, in our opinion. the most interesting thing Basia's ever sung. "Cafe Mystique" explores the Flamenco duet concept with Marc Antoine. Our personal fave is the sad chord progressions of "Bittersweet."

ALPHONSE MOUZON The Night Is Still Young (Tenacious)

Alphonse Mouzon calls his company Tenacious Music because that's the kind of drummer he is. If you're a Jazzhead, drop the laser on the opening track, and let Alphonse's fancy stick work do its magic. "Protocol" features some hurricane drumming and walking bass that will make your listeners stop what they're doing and take notice. The concept behind The Night Is Still Young is boldly unique, in that the first half of the CD is Jazz and the second half is Smooth, "Seduction" is smooth and breezy, with Gerald Albright and Mouzon exchanging biting solos passages on alto and piano respectively. It also has that mid-tempolure that SJ&V stations dig.

GARY BARTZ The Blues Chronicles: Tales of Life (Atlantic)

After the artistic buzz of last year's The Red and Orange Poems, saxophonist Gary Bartz promised he was going get even more serious with his composing skills for the follow-up. He wasn't kidding, "The Song of Loving-Kindness," "And He Called Himself a Messenger," and "Makes Me Wanna Moan" are bluesy and introspective gems that could only come from the pen of the heartfelt primary soloist. On the surface, you can marvel at the clever time signature changes of "Gangsta Jazz" or the loping reggae swing of the Bob Marley homage, "Lively Up Yourself." But venture into the weaving spirituality of "...Loving-Kindness," and you'll wonder why life-affirming Jazz is commercially penalized for not being vapid and transparent. Oh well. Who said life was fair?





TERRI & MONICA Suga (Epic)



The ingredient that makes Terri & Monica's new album, Suga, so sweet is their delicious songwriting. "We are songwriters more than anything else," explains Terri Robinson. "If you're not writing your own material, you're cutting yourself off from a vital

part of the process." The experience of writing hit songs for other artists is a vital component of the new-and-improved sound of Terri & Monica.

In the last two years, Terri Robinson has written or co-written major R&B hits like "Candy Rain" for Soul for Real and Monifa's "I Miss You." Robinson also co-wrote two 1995 hits for the female trio Total. Terri & Monica are ten-year music veterans, who first hit the scene in 1987 as part of The Gyrlz, opening for the likes of Al B. Sure, Bobby Brown, and New Edition. "We were the first to do a female version of the New Jack sound," says Monica.

With the return of the singersongwriter in full effect and with SUGA's collection of cool midtemp funk, Terri & Monica have an excellent chance of gaining overdue respect.

NICK COLIONNE "Hurry Up This Way Again" (Lake Shore Jazz)

Before I left for Chicago last week, I talked to Mike Friedman at I-O-R Marketing about the new Nick Colionne album, Arrival. I told him I liked it but was concerned that, with George Benson back on the scene, there may not be room for two jazz-oriented guitar players on Urban radio. But after I listened to the single, a remake of the Stylistics's "Hurry Up This Way Again," I knew this song was a natural for Quiet Storm and daytime airplay. When I arrived in the Windy City, Colionne's hometown, the song was already getting much respect on the radio.

Jrban Workshop Bouncing Back from a Bad Book

First of all, you must remember that failure is normal on the way to winning. A setback should be absorbed as a natural stop on the path to success. Remember, most of the biggest champions and heroes in this business came from worst-to-first situations. Practice and teach this philosophy, and it will keep your station morale from falling to unmanageable levels.

your Homework

Brake down every piece of information you can gather on your latest ratings. Compare every hour of the abitron book, and look at our weekly and monthly in-house research to determine your strengths and

weaknesses. Reassess all the promotional, marketing, music, personnel, and programming moves you and your competition made during the last rating period, then prepare two lists: What you know and What you don't know. Write a report to yourself explaining what you've uncovered and what you suspect needs to be done to turn the station around. Now you are ready to face the troops.

Just as it's always important to have a motivational staff meeting before every book begins, it's essential to have a positive one after a setback. In this meeting, use the universal "we" when referring to how poorly the team performed. Focus immediately on your plans to improve and retool the station for success. Open the meeting up for questions and suggestions from staff members. Involve them in all your quality improvement plans and share your enthusiasm for success.

Make Things Happe

Every station has different reasons for failing-marketing, personnel, spirit, or a lack of focus. Once you've ascertained your problem, take immediate steps to change it. Your new sense of urgency should be the standard around the station. A change in attitude and focus are essential steps toward success.

Ugly Americans: Hot Off the GRIDdle

Three years ago. Chuck Morris of Morris, Bliesener Management in Denver received a tape from Sean McCarthy, a young bassist with the

Austin-based band, Ugly Americans. Morris, fresh from the success of Big Head Todd & the Monsters, was looking for new bands.

"You know me, I jump when I like something," Morris said over the phone from his Denver offices, "so I hopped a plane to Austin. My first impression was a Red Hot Chili Peppers with a touch of Delbert McClinton from the H.O.R.D.E. area of music. They had this funkiness and craziness. Bob Schneider was an excellent frontman.

Morris and the band went to work with a unique first-year plan.

"Instead of going for the big record companies," he said, "we made a one-record deal with W.A.R. Records to release a live album from the Fox Theater in Boulder, produced by Jim Scott [Tom Petty, R.E.M.]."

Enter Giant Records, who officially signed the band before the W.A.R. album's release. In exchange for a point on the record, Giant kicked in enough support to finance a van and months of touring.

"Producer Don Gehman flew out and saw them in New York," said Morris. "He'd already done Hootie as well as having worked seven or eight years ago with John Mellencamp.

Gehman and the Ugly Americans worked fast and smooth, completing the record a year ago. Giant was happy with the album, titled Stereophonic Spanish Fly. Originally due in the stores in October, the release date was pushed to February of this year. Over the holidays, the record was pressed, artwork printed, advances sent out. A Christmas buzz on the record had been laved out.

Then came what seemed like bad news for the band.

Giant underwent a metamorphosis, changing their name to Revolution.

"Giant made some changes," said Morris, referring to the departure of key fans of the band. "Four weeks before Christmas, they decided to drop the band."

Label founder Irving Azoff, while

sending the band packing, sent them packing with the Gehman-produced masters, essentially allowing the band to start anew—free and clear—with a minimum of overhead to recoup.

"Irving and I are 25-year friends, said Morris, "He felt the new regime was not into the band like the old regime. The image of the band was not what they were looking for. Because of our friendship, he didn't see the sense in putting us out. I was heartbroken until I realized it was a blessing in disguise.'

Enter the February Gavin Seminar in Atlanta. At the music-evaluating On the GRIDdle session, co-hosted by Jon Peterson of WRLT, the original Giant test pressing of the Ugly Americans—specifically the opening track, "Vulcan Death Grip"—was played. One of a dozen competitors, the song was voted on, and tied for first place. Seated in the front row of the meeting was Jeff Cook of Capricorn Records. His label, the original home of the supportive Allman Brothers, had bid for the band before Giant won

"At the time of the GRIDdle," said Cook, "we weren't negotiating. Quite honestly, knowing we'd gone after the band and lost them, I was lamenting. But when I told Phil [Walden] about the response, he basically said, 'We gotta do this.'

After only a few weeks. Stereophonic Spanish Fly is off to a potent start, breaking out in Denver, Tampa, Fort Myers, and Sacramento, jumping 43-32 on the Gavin Combined chart, moving even higher, 42-26, on the Gavin A3 Commercial. As for which label made the best move, Morris is philosophical.

Time will tell who made the right decision."

WXMK-Brunswick, Ga. PD Chris Callaway alerted me to this import a few weeks ago. Y100-Miami's Rob Roberts started playing it thanks to a tape from WXLK-Roanoke's Rich E. Cunningham, who got turned on to it by his sales managers, who heard it in London. It's a gigantic hit in the U.K. for the transplanted Aussie, and is already getting spins at B96-Chicago, 'KTU-New York, and anywhere else that's been able to get their hands on a copy. Expect a label deal Stateside any day and a copy on your desk soon. Just wanted to tip this early.

TINA TURNER "Missing You" (Virgin)

A dozen years later, the amazing Tina Turner gives the song a new and vibrant urgency. After weeks of major spins at Alternative, a growing number of Top 40 programmers are giving this track nighttime exposure. One listen should reveal why it doesn't take long to react.

CROSSOVER PICKS WARREN G featuring ADINA HOWARD "What's Love Got to Do With It" (Dimension/Interscope)

It's somewhat bizarre that this release hits the street at the same time as the above pick by Tina Turner, but talk about reinventing a song. Producer Warren G knows just what to do with this Number One hit from 1984. It's part of the soundtrack from the Jackie Chan film, Supercop.

"If Your Girl Only Knew" (Blackground/Atlantic)

With a fan base that's grown quickly, there's plenty of interest in any new project from Aaliyah. This first single from her forthcoming album features the signature sound of a young supertalent.

KINSUI featuring THE BUCWEE BOIZ "U Gotta Go" (TVT)

It's summer and they're ready to party at *Phat Beach*, the flick that features this song. This cut's also available on vinyl with three others from the soundtrack, E-40's "Fatal," Eightball & MJG's "Up to No Good," and "She's Hollywood" by Roc King featuring Solo-Loc. Nothin' but fun and hella phat.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Ultra Lounge Volumes 7-12 (Capitol)

Get out your exotic match-

books and umbrella-canopied drinks for round two of Capitol's Ultra Lounge series. The Crime Scene features timeless classics like Leroy Holmes' multi-tempoed "The James Bond Theme," which features the requisite spider guitar, and Billy May's nocturnambient "Mission: Impossible." Cocktail Capers sports the hipster Hollywood Studio Orchestra's reading of "The Pink Panther Theme," and The New Classic Singers' ultra-mellow version of "Call Me," the kind of snoozak you crave at the dentist's office after inhaling laughing gas. Things heat up on the bossa nova-tinged Cha-Cha De Amour, where instrumentals like Laurindo Almeida's "Recado Bossa Nova" and Jack Costanzo/Don Swan's "Bei Mir Bist Du Schon/La Furiosa" shamelessly sizzle and shake. A Bachelor in Paris glides along the Champs via the riverboat banjo of Jerry Shard's "Can, Can, Can," and Organs in Orbit unearths spaced out Hammond landscapes. Highlights include Denny McLain's "The Girl From Ipanema/ Meditation," and Walter Wanderly's kinetic "Voce E Eu." Volume 12 saves the best for sax, and Saxophobia blows the lid off of popular favorites like the Black Orpheus theme "Samba de Orfeu" and Ray Anthony's Peter Gunn variation. Hats off (and sharkskins on) to Capitol for mixing lounge's recognizable chest-

Imagine if everyone in the town of Twin Peaks got *Laid*. The music created by Booth and the Bad Angel (Tim Booth of James and Angelo Badala-

menti of Twin Peaks, Blue Velvet, and Wild at Heart orchestral fame) would be the perfect soundtrack for just such an event. Rich, sultry atmospheric pop tunes are the key element here as Booth delivers a wide array of aural audacity ranging from the nasally Manchester twang evoked on "I Believe" to the dusty, smoked vocals that grace the liquidlaced "Dance of the Bad Angels." Like his previous collaboration with Julee Cruise, Badalamenti utilizes haunting vocals and tempestuous textures that create a billowy dreamscape of sound that fully enhances the lyrical magesty of Tim Booth. While Petty is making his movie maestro debut (he also performs the incidental movie music), Burns is breaking his sophomore jinx. Both are following up hot projects: Burns, The Brothers McMullen and Petty, Wildflowers. With the same production team (Petty, sidekick Mike Campbell, and Rick Rubin) as Wildflowers, She's the One emulates the movie in that it's barebones, simple, and emotional, Six of the songs actually appear on the movie soundtrack. Airplay faves include "Walls (Circus)," "Grew Up Fast," and Lucinda Williams' "Change the Locks."

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
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
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
