Glen Ballard **On His Latest Production: Java Records**

Glen Ballard, one of the bottest hitmakers of the '90s, has launched Java Records, a joint venture with Capitol Records. He's also formed Intrepid Entertainment, aimed at producing music-driven films, with producer David Foster and cellular phone exec John McCaw.

Though best-known for co-writing and producing Alanis Morissette's Jagged Little Pill, Ballard, a 43-yearold native of Natchez, Miss., has been writing bits since the late '70s, when be worked in Elton Jobn's office in Los Angeles. Artists who have recorded his songs include George Benson, Patti Austin, and Celine Dion. He also co-wrote "Man in the Mirror" for Michael Jackson. His production credits include Wilson Phillips, Paula Abdul, and Curtis Stigers.


Four Grammys, Seven Number One singles, and 100 million record sales later, he's brewing some Java.

ava is an opportunity to work closely with artists and be involved with all facets of development, execution, and bringing them into the marketplace. I want to do this with the same sensitivity with which we make the music.

It's a goal that's often aspired to, but it's truly my goal to create an artist-friendly label that's sensitive to the needs of artists.

I've spent most of my career nurturing artists, and, with the greatest respect, I'd love to take it even further.

As a producer, my approach has always been to be involved with as many aspects from which I could make a contribution, and where it was welcome. Also, it was kind of

natural for me, having worked with Quincy Jones for many years and learning from him-he's such a multidimensional person-to bring as much to the table as I could

At Java, I will spend a lot of time in the formation and creation of the music, but I anticipate being involved with artists where I'm needed. In some cases I won't produce the record, in some cases I will. But I want to be a direct creative source, and that will take many forms.

The lines are blurred a little as to what I'm doing. It's still all predicated on music and making sure the music and artists are represented the way they want to be represented.

I've named Amos Newman head of A&R, and will take it slowly. It's going to be a small roster. Every one will be vital and important. Our first signing is Terence Trent D'arby.

As for artists I've worked with, I would never interfere with existing contracts. As people become available, I hope they will look to us as a creative place to be.

I chose to work with Capitol because of two key people here: Gary Gersh-his sensibility toward artists is well known. And Charles Koppelman, chairman of EMI North America, is an old friend and a great music man.

If there's a common thread through all my work, it's that I believe in artists. I'm a facilitator of other people's work. I don't have a particular style. I spend a lot of time focusing on the artist and what they think. When I hear someone's voice, it speaks volumes to me, and sometimes I can help artists discover something about their own artistic soul and psyche that they couldn't get to on their own.

Radio has been and will always be vital. My first goal is to be creatively successful. I always contend that if you set high standards for yourself in the studio and you're successful in creating something that's true to the artists, that communicates, you'll find your audience.

If you present radio with a compelling record, they'll play it. There's a lot of time spent worrying about whether radio will play this or not. I spend time making sure it's great before it gets out the door.

Working with Alanis was a valuable lesson. We didn't write for radio. We just wrote to make it good.

We haven't begun our next album yet, but she has such a healthy attitude about it. She's very clear that she wants it to be a creative process, noncomparative, and true to the sensibility of the first record. It's that sensibility that will be carried forth. GAVIN

First Words

For some reason the Associated Press last Wednesday filed a report on an old story about a Federal Trade Commission inquiry into CD pricing. Newspapers ran it, radio news bulletins aired it and the record industry, just about coming to terms with flat sales, got the litters all over again.

The notion that CDs are expensive has a certain surface gloss. Sure the raw materials for simply manufacturing CDs are cheap. But that's not where the real costs lie. The much greater investment is in talent (the many failures as well as the successes), attracting radio's attention for new releases, establishing sufficient retail presence and ultimately exciting the public. And if the public ain't buying, music suddenly becomes a low margin business, however cheap the raw materials are.

Next time you buy a packet of corn flakes, you should know that the wax bag cost more than the actual corn flakes, the cardboard box cost more than the bag, getting it placed at eye level in the supermarket cost more than the box, and the marketing campaign cost more than all of that put together.

Music is not so much different from other businesses - it's just more fun. But that's no reason to cheapen the product. otherwise talented people like Glen Ballard (above) will have no incentive to test their entrepreneurial skills.

GRP/Impulse! Legend Duke DuBois Dead At 64

Duke DuBois, the legendary and much loved Senior Director of National Jazz Promotion for the GRP/ Impulse! labels, was found

dead at his home in New York City on Wednesday May 7. Further details about his death have not been announced. He was 64.

DuBois did not show up for work last Mon-

day and Tuesday at the GRP offices in New York. Concerned that he had not phoned in, the GRP staff called the police, who found him dead the following Wednesday.

DuBois was the senior statesman of the jazz promotion set, and received many GAVIN Awards for Jazz Promotion Person of the Year, including the last two years consecutively. His career in the music industry spanned the last five decades, and he worked for many labels, including GRP, Impulse!, CTI, Blue Note, Impulse!/ ABC, and Scepter.

"This unexpected news has deeply saddened all of us at the GRP Recording Company," said GRP/Impulse! president Tommy LiPuma, "and as we learn

more about Duke's passing we will keep you informed. We will all miss our friend and colleague enormously."

"Duke DuBois was the man responsible for bringing Jazz and Smooth Jazz coverage to GAVIN," said Keith Zimmerman, GAVIN Jazz Co-editor. "His impact was colossal." added Kent Zimmerman.

Steve Hicks' Capstar Shoots To 229 Stations

Capstar Broadcasting Partners has sped past the 200-station mark with a flurry of deals.

The Texas company, started by Steve Hicks and backed by Hicks, Muse, Tate & Furst, the Dallas-based leveragebuyout firm, took aim at medium-sized markets.

Its aim has proven true, as Capstar built its stable to 229 stations last week by folding in Gulfstar and its 49 signals. Gulfstar was formed by Hicks and his brother, Tom Hicks (who's also Chairman/ CEO of Hicks, Muse) in 1991.

The Gulfstar fold-in follows Capstar's purchase of Patterson Broadcasting (GAVIN, April 18, 1997) and Knight Quality Stations, its acquisition of Ameron, and a purchase/swap deal with SFX—the company Steve Hicks left to form Capstar.

30th Anniversary of 'Summer of Love'

The countdown has begun. No-not toward the mil-


lennium. That's almost old hat already. We're talking about the 30th anniversary of the Summer of Love. The blossoming of the hippie generation in the Haight-Ashbury of San Francisco is about to

get the full blown (minds) treatment.

But it ain't all peace and flowers.

In fact, the very phrase, "Summer of Love," has become a bone of contention among various forces. Bill Graham Presents, the powerful concert production company borne of that very scene, has trademarked the term, saying it did so to prevent predators from staging phony shows with phony bands and selling them as part of what happened in San Francisco in 1967.

Although BGP has said certain events can use the name—including pioneer promoter Chet Helms, who's



non-profit organization, in operation for ten years in San Francisco, raises money for children's health issues, and is planning a June concert in Golden Gate Park with the "Summer of Love" theme. "I object to the fact they have authority over a name that has been in the public domain all these years," said Ron Frazier, head of the nonprofit group.

The anticipated highlight of the festivities include the arrival on May 10 of Ken "Furthur" bus, Kesev's including whichever Merry Pranksters survived the trip from San Francisco. A kickoff party April 28 featured hundreds of '60s figures, including Big Brother & the Holding Company, It's a Beautiful Day, members of the Grateful Dead, and others jamming onstage at the original Fillmore Auditorium.

The Hall of Fame is also active on the radio front, with a syndicated radio special covering 1965-1969 in nine one-hour specials and 40 daily five-minute features. Ben Manilla Productions in San Francisco is producing the program entitled *I Want to Take You Higher*.

Combating Hate in America

Founded in 1993 in Portland, Oregon, the public aware-

ness group is dedicated to countering bigotry, homophobia, racism, violence and censorship in American politics and public life. The group relies on its financial support in the form of private and corporate gifts to fund its educational programs and grassroots organizing that include public service announcements and print ads in *Spin, Rolling Stone,* and *Interview.*

Capitol, Columbia, Epic, Elektra, Geffen, Sony, and Warner Brothers are some of the top record labels that are making major charitable grants. AHFA has also found financial and moral support from individual artists. Recent benefit concerts include those by Everclear, Peter Buck of R.E.M., Hole, and Jackson Browne.

Chaka Khan, the celebrated singer known for her work with Rufus ("Tell Me Something Good") as well as solo hits ("I'm Every Woman"; "I Feel for You"), has joined the ranks of artists-turned-DJs.

As with the others—including Roberta Flack, Isaac Hayes, and Ashford & Simpson on WRKS (KISS FM)-

New York; Greg Kihn, and Ted Nugent—Khan isn't giving up performing, only adding radio work.

Khan has joined KIBB/FM ("The

New B-100")-Los Angeles as co-host of *Romance After Dark*, a requests and dedications-fueled program of mostly ballads. It airs Mondays through Thursdays, 10 p.m. to 1 a.m.

Khan, who maintains a full recording and touring schedule, resisted the idea of a regular show. She wasn't even thinking about doing radio when she dropped into KIBB in Burbank for an in-studio visit.

But Program Director Tony Coles heard her taking



calls from listeners.

"She handled them so well and she's got this tremendous voice," he told the *Los Angeles Times*. "We thought, 'Wow, she would actually make a pretty good DJ!""

Encouraged by her sister, Tammy McCrary, who's also her manager, Khan agreed to a six-week trial. Now, she's on board, hosting

alongside Rick Hummer, whom she credits for her successful transition. "He gave me the self-assurance that I needed to relax and go with it.

That's all it is. It's basically learning how to relax."

When Khan, who has a summer tour scheduled, can't be in town, she and Hummer pretape shows, airing requests and dedications banked from previous programs.

But the singer is clearly interested in radio and its potential to expose records. "There are a lot of artists... who have albums out and nobody knows about it because they're with a crap record company," she said.

Gavin's Haslam Wins 1996 Editorial Award

New Prime Minister Tony Blair wasn't the only winner last week in England.

Alexandra Haslam, Assistant Editor at GAVIN, won a 1996 Miller Freeman Editorial Award in the annual competition sponsored by the magazine's parent company, Miller Freeman plc. The competition draws entries from some 120 magazines around the world.

Haslam won her award in the "sub editor" category. In other words, she was selected for her skills in taking raw copy and fashioning it (on occasion, pounding it) into informative and entertaining writing.

Haslam joined GAVIN in October, 1995. Besides working with Managing Editor Ben Fong-Torres on news and feature stories, she compiles and writes the industry news columns, "On the Air" and "In the Grooves."

"Long before this honor," said Fong-Torres, "I knew Alex to be a winner. It's a tribute to her—and to GAVIN to have our sentiments confirmed."

Along with winners in 14 other categories, Haslam will be honored in ceremonies in London May 7.

As a DJ, she added, she's in a position to help.

"Listener response has been incredible," says Coles. "The listeners really identify with Chaka." Coles says B-100 is talking with various companies about syndicating *Romance After Hours*.

Whalley Decides to Stick With Interscope

The folks at Interscope Records were doing happy jumps early this week following President Tom Whalley's decision to rejoin the successful label after three days away from his desk.

Whalley had been handed a multimillion-dollar offer to overhaul Hollywood Records, Walt Disney Co.'s troubled record division, and decided to leave Interscope last Friday after talks with founders Jimmy Iovine and Ted Field aimed at keeping him on broke down.

No one at Interscope would comment officially on the situation, except to say that everyone was very happy to be working again with the man who brought Tupac Shakur, the Wallflowers, Primus, and 4 Non Blondes to fame.

"I received a very respectful offer from Disney, but after reviewing everything with my family and friends over the weekend, I decided to stay where my heart is—at Interscope, with the artists and friends at the company I helped build," Whalley was quoted as saying in Tuesday's Los Angeles Times.

Whalley was named president of Interscope last year, but apparently never signed a contract that was offered to him. However, this time he signed a five-year package that ups his annual salary and increases his equity holdings.

Sources said Whalley will continue to run day-to-day operations at the label he helped put on the map following its launch in 1990.

In addition to news and features, Wall of Sound contains reviews (which are updated each Tuesday to coincide with retail release dates), charts based on Soundscan, and artist bios. his is a test of the Alternative Broadcast System. For the next 1000 words this column will conduct a test to see if you're awake.


We're going to tell you about some new music that will actually sound good on your radio station and guarantee you higher ratings (well, that last part's obviously a bald faced lie, although Arbitron did promise me that any stations found playing the following songs would have an extra two share points added to their final Spring score). I think I deserve some trust this week. In the almost two years I've been writing this column (gulp) I've made you laugh, cry, and doubt your own self worth. I've even sweated blood to elevate your convention experience. I think the least you can do for me this week is to give me the benefit of the doubt when I tell you that the following songs are exactly what you've been looking for!

As we head into Summer there's actually good music hitting your desk. Spence and I have decided to use the column this week to hip you to the most promising new releases.

PULSARS "Tunnel Song" (Almo)

If ever there was a song that just happened to come along at the right moment in time, this is it. The label that brought us Garbage has once again executed a cagey pop signing and snagged Pulsars from Chicago. Now, L of all people, understand the concept of doing what's right for your market. But obviously there are songs that can work anywhere. "Tunnel Song" is one of them. You will hear this and think immediately of the Cars and the best song they never put out. You will also hear this and think immediately (if you were part of this format in the formative years...oops, that cancels out most of you) of Wiretrain's "Chamber Of Hellos," and what a big hit it was for the format many moons ago. Please, I'm being serious now, go back to the big pile on your desk and listen to "Tunnel Song" again. Or, again and again. If you play this record 1 promise Ted Volk will do something really, really, really nice for your station.

THE LIGHTNING SEEDS "You Showed Me" Austin Powers soundtrack



First of all, Austin Powers is a very funny movie. The spy genre has never been spoofed this

way before. There's a nod to everyone from The Avengers to The Saint to Our Man Flint to the Beatles movie Help. Unlike many films, the songs on the soundtrack are an integral part of the movie-much like Trainspotting I suppose. Or, Grosse Point Blank. How refreshing. So when a funky, trippy version of "You Showed Me" made its appearance half way through the film I practically climbed out of my chair to find out who was doing this swanky update. Imagine my surprise to find out it was The Lightning Seeds. They've been dormant for far too long. A longtime format favorite, these guys could wind up back in the spotlight with "You Showed Me." I know you know this song, which was written by McGuinn and Clark of The Byrds. The Turtles had a number two hit with the original in '69. The new version is just screaming to be played on the radio. You'd be foolish not to.

RADISH "Little Pink Stars" (Mercury)

It's not like Michael Idlis has nothing to do all day. He already has major success stories with The Mighty Mighty Bosstones, Cardigans, INXS, Cake, and if you'd get off your ass and get with the program, James (your indifference to this album puzzles me, and pisses me off, but that's another story). Now comes Radish, headed by 15-year old Ben Kweller. Already a veteran of the Letterman and Conan shows, this three piece is making a lot of noise in industry-land. One listen to "Little Pink Stars" and you'll see why. It's a big guitar thing with something special called

"songwriting." Imagine Weezer with more guitars. "We call the stuff we play sugar metal," says singer/songwriter Kweller. "We like heavy guitars, but we also like nice simple pop songs that people can sing along to. I love loud guitars, but I was raised on stuff like the Beatles and the Beach Boys, so the melody thing has always been with me. My biggest songwriting idol is Rivers Cuomo from Weezer." If you're not ready to go "rhythmotech" yet, ya gotta play Radish.

POND "Spokes" (Work)



I have to admit that I actually saw the video before hearing the song on my stereo.

I also have to further admit that when I first saw the video I had no idea what I was looking at. All I can remember was saying "Who is this?" and I then turned the house upside down to find the box it came in. We put this on the latest GAVIN Alternative Video Magazine which you have in your possession. Spokes" sucks you in like no song I've heard in quite some time. You know how it always took you a few listens before you would get into the latest Pixies offering? But once you got it, you got it hard? That's the feeling I get with "Spokes." This has the potential to be a HUGE hit. Many of you in radio have been toying around with these guys for a few years now. Their first release was on Sub Pop back in 1993. And so was their second in 1995. Well, now they're signed to WORK. That means Geordie and Laura get to beat you up now (Oh, please hit me again harder-Not you Geordie, Laura!). Pond is ostensibly from Portland, Oregon. You should take a few minutes and read the very witty and clever bio the boys wrote themselves. It's very amusing. But play the song, it's a guitar thing.

This Is A Test... (cont'd) Spence's Cheat Sheet



LAMB Lamb (Mercurv)

This Manchester duo are practitioners of atmospheric speed shuffle futurolounge sounds. Programmer/DJ/ Drummer Andrew Barlow concocts sweltering, echo rhythms which enshroud the will-o-the-wisp utterances of Louise Rhodes to create a seductive sonic drift. "Lusty," the group's electronic hit, is a quasi-lilt propelled by scatter shot drum ricochets and wavering vocal spray.

"Trans Fatty Acid" descends into the realm of burbled, distorto-bass reverb where it is embossed with dark, ethereal background tones and continuously bombarded by militaristic 4/4 rhvthms.

Computerized hi-speed rhythms surge throughout "Gold," while shadow bass ebbs in the background and a lone trumpet intermittently blurts minimalistic cosmic blues.

Backmasked rhythm tracks, uptempo jazzadelic excursions, speed rail grooves and mournful sirenesque vocals make Lamb both bittersweet and succulent

GUSGUS Polydistortion (4AD)



For years the snow capped landscape of Scandinavia has created some of the most interesting modern pop music. The latest Norsk export comes from the land of Viking ghosts: Reykjavik, the capital of

geo-thermally enhanced Iceland. Comprised of DJs, filmmakers, singers, actors, and photographers, gusGus are a sonically mutated multi-media outfit. Their album is filled with shuffling rhythms, distinctively European vocals, dense atmospheric tones, and twisted funk fills. The title track is rife with elastic bass and snap-happy drum rolls. "Barry" plays like a twisted piece of '70s prog blues, while "Cold Breath '79" is a chilly mist of melancholy wrapped in Tron induced rhythms. The closing track, "Purple" is a transsonic journey through fiber optic nerve endings and neural transmitter plumage. Polydistortion is filled with a myriad of illuminating aural hallucinogens and is worth an extended trip. Be sure to check out the "Believe" remixes: there's four of 'em including the LFO remix (if you're a true blue electronic head you'll remember these cats from the mid-'80s) which is full of buzz hum and nymphet synth swirls.

VARIOUS ARTISTS Can: Sacrilege The Remixes

I'm gonna vent like a purist for a quick second. If you're gonna spin electronic music to the Alternative masses, ya gotta know your history. Make sure you study the late '70s/early '80s noodlings of Eno, Tangerine Dream, Jean-Michel Jarré, Vangelis, Kraftwerk and Can. If the latter doesn't ring a bell, they were the primary exponents of electronically infused German "kraut rock." Thanks to the visionaries at Mute (the label that brought Prodigy to American ears almost a year-and-ahalf ago) you can now get your hands on an album filled with retrofitted Can classics. 16 crisp remixes are expertly tweaked-out by the likes of Sonic Youth, Air Liquide, U.N.K.L.E., Brian Eno. The Orb. A Guy Called Gerald, and several others. The Sonic Youth remix of "Spoon" is a stygian alfair filled with ominous buzz-skirl, metallic abrasion and quirky rumblings. The U.N.K.L.E. rendition of "Vitamin C" is a hip-hop inclined rhythm workout, while the Orb's treatment of "Halleluwah" is appropriately spatial. The extreme sonic breadth of the contributors, coupled with Can's eclectic source music make this two-disc set a must for all purveyors of electronically inclined aural ecstasy. --- SPENCE D






From the Louvin and Delmore Brothers to the ever-haunting and impressionable sounds







To Jules Malamud and his staff at Impact Magazine: I apologize for my misconstrued use of the word "uneventful" in my *On-line* column April 25th, "Straight Talk Makes an Impact." It certainly wasn't my intention to imply that the Impact Convention in Miami wasn't a huge success, because on many levels, it was.

Impact has always been the leader in Urban gather-

ings, bringing together record numbers of black radio and record professionals, offering the best networking opportunities and prestigious panel members. Also, Impact has been instrumental in developing a better relationship between black Mom & Pop retailers and top record company executives. I congratulate Jules and his staff for their continued hard work and passionate commitment to providing a safe environment for change.

I used the word "uneventful" to stress the failure of the radio and record panels. Although the chairs were filled with some of the best minds in the Urban world, their refusal to acknowledge the

bad health of the Urban patient and to thereby discuss ways we could administer aid and hopefully save some lives was a disappointment. At a time when the life expectancy for black radio appears bleak and black record executives are fighting crossover departments, which are taking more and more of the Urban Landzcape from them—everyone seemed oddly complacent. Jules and his staff can only get us to the water, they can't make us drink. If we're not going to discuss our problems openly, reach some decisions, and create a proactive agenda for change in this venue, then when and where are we going to do it?

Those of you familiar with this column understand that I have dedicated these pages to improving the state of the Urban Landzcape. I have been called a rabblerouser, a troublemaker, an instigator, and an uppity Negro. These names, I relish. But call me complacent or a brown nose, and you've got a fight on your hands. That's why I get annoyed at some of today's leaders who are not fulfilling their leadership roles by clearing the path, eliminating barriers, and warning those who follow new dangers. Real leaders take stands—and sometimes they lose their jobs. That comes with the territory. That's why I admired Steve Harvey's straight talk at the Impact Awards luncheon. He took off his gloves, bared his feelings, and passionately addressed his concerns for the health of black radio and the community it serves. Today, we need courageous leaders who are willing to makes a commitment to assist and improve

both sides of the business with honest discussion and creative problem solving.

If we're not going to discuss our problems openly, reach some decisions, and create a proactive agenda for change in this venue, then when and where are we going to do it?

The odds of surviving are heavily against us in today's radio. Between deregulation and the loss of the minority tax certificate, our black ownership numbers will certainly continue to decline. But, the Telecommunications Bill is not a fait-a-compli for black radio. Just because one road is plowed over doesn't mean we can't cut another road through the woods. On the record side, black music continues to outsell many genres, but the control of the budgets and marketing plans aren't in the control of most black executives. There's light at the end of that tunnel also. We

have a history of winning; Barry Gordy is a fine example and Sylvia Rhone is another great example of what we can do when given the reins of power. So, what do we do to maintain, thrive, and survive?

If we want to be part of this business in the 21st century, we have to build a mentoring organization that can do three things: 1) maintain a strong set of goalrelated values, 2) motivate, and 3) have an effective mission statement that energizes us and is a constant source of support. We need mentors who can encourage other leaders to step up and share their knowledge; leaders who can inspire others to awaken their powers of creativity. This organization would teach by example, and draw from the energies of everyone involved to give it an equal balance of cooperation and participation, instead of the usual autocratic setup.

I urge Urban radio and music to speak out. Use this column as a forum for your opinions, ideas, and thoughts. We have to solve these dilemmas that are dramatically impacting our economic and social survival. Only together can we construct strategies to overturn this situation.

Urban Workshop A Successful Jock Meeting

he Jock Meeting is the key to keeping your air staff focused, united and fired up during rating pericds. Here's a checklist of items to help you with your next successful air talent head banging session.

1. Clearly state the goal of the radio station. "The goal of WQQQ is to be number one 18-34. We target women listeners 20-34 years old." This constant reminder keeps everyone on the same page about the direction of the station, making PD-Air talent discussions more constructive.

2. Always provide all personalities with positive feedback about their

performances. Pick out examples of excellent bits, format execution, and especially good content. To get great performances you must emphasize the good stuff.

3. When criticizing always remember to use the word "we." For example, "WE need to improve on this!" or "WE need to work on that." The last thing you want your jock meetings to produce is a feeling of you-against-them. If you don't have a solid suggestion on how to fix a problem, then don't bring it up. Using vague generalities (either negative or positive) does nothing but confuse performers and lower their confidence levels.


4. You must be honest and straightforward in all communications with your jocks. When they know you have their best interests at heart, your jocks will trust you more, and will the more likely to take your advice.

5. Try to protect your talent from criticism by upper management and listeners. Always discuss problems with them openly, and be receptive to their side of the story. If a performer feels like they have your support, they will feel freer to experiment and push the envelope of their creative potential.



DAMAGE Forever (Critique)

Will this combination of British soul, great R&B love songs, and dance grooves translate here in the U.S. to hits? Hell yeah!

Damage: Andrez, Coree, Jade, Noel, and Ras are ready to make their mark. These youngmen ranging from the ages of 18-22 have caused a sensation overseas with thousands of screaming female fans. They have the momentum, but more importantly they have a unique sound and bring real diversity to the Urban Landzacpe.

Even their video for their debut American single, "Love II Love," is unusual and fun. The video has special effects by Paul Catling who worked on the films *Aliens*, and *Judge Dredd*. Damage is what all music lovers respect: a selfstyled group that writes its own material and give themselves completely to the artistic process of making music.

After the Flood: Grand Forks Radio **Begins** Again

Radio stations in and around Grand Forks, North Dakota are now beginning the overwhelming task of cleaning up from the 500year flood of the Red River that ravaged the town. Scott Hennen, Program Director of A/C KZLT reports the station has temporarily merged its operations with sister AM KCNN and the university signal of KFJM, and, says Hennen, "we've become the information source for the community." The station did get a live interview with President Clinton from Air Force One, and national personalities like Rush Limbaugh also did extended interviews on the station. The remainder of the area's stations have been silenced due to flood damage.

I checked with Scott to see how the station is doing, and he reports that it has been a 500-year catastrophe for the staff. Station owner Dave Norman was hit the hardest. His home is a total loss, and he won't even be allowed to rebuild on the site, while Scott says he "almost feels guilty" that his own townhouse survived with little damage.

KZLT will remain in its nonmusic, all-information mode for the foreseeable future. "At the worst of times, we were down to a staff of four, and everyone has needed some extra time to tend to their personal matters. We're exhausted, and haven't had a chance to take stock of the importance of it all quite yet."

For the first time since 1989's Hurricane Hugo hit Charleston, South Carolina, Arbitron has cancelled the Spring Book for the Grand Forks market, (see News for more details) which, says Hennen, "penalizes the stations

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



*⊕ZZY <i>⊕*SB*⊕*URNE has been a driving force in rock & roll for more than three decades. Beginning in 1970, Osbourne released nine albums with metal pioneers Black Sabbath before leaving the band. As a solo artist, he's made 11 albums and toured the world seven times. Given

these accomplishments. one would think that Ozzy would be ready to sit back and enjoy the fruits of his labor. Not so.

The bat-biting lord of underworld rockers continues to assail the music industry with his creativity through his own record label, Ozz Records. He's also headlining this summer's premiere rock festival, Ozzfest, which will feature 12 hard rock/metal bands in addition to a Black rare Sabbath reunion.

Like every great warrior, Osbourne has a first officer who forms the battle plans and is responsible for making sure things go as intended. In Ozzy's case, his sergeant-at-arms and supreme commandant is Ozzy Osbourne embraces wife Sharon his wife and manager. Sharon Osbourne.

Married to Ozzy for 17 yearsand working as his manager for 19-Sharon Osbourne is the woman in front of the man. Her savvy management skills and ability to fend off the evils of the music industry have played a huge part in Ozzy's success.

Owner and CEO of her own

management company, Sharon Osbourne Management, she has been integrally involved with the creation of Ozz Records and Ozzfest. Her first priority, however, is always her one and only client, Ozzy Osbourne, "I used to manage other bands, but about four years ago, I gave up working with other



artists. I felt that I had gone past it, done it, been there, and seen it all," says Osbourne.

All this success has allowed the Osbournes the freedom to explore new music industry avenues, like the creation of their own record company.

"After I gave up managing other bands, it seemed like the most natural progression [to start a record label]. Besides, we were always being sent tapes by different artists and figured we should be doing something with all this stuff," she explains.

After mulling the idea-and with a little help from some friends-Ozz Records became a reality

> when a deal was inked for the new label to be distributed through Red Ant Entertainment.

"Since I worked with **ICEO** and owner of Red Ant] Al Teller when he was at CBS Records, and [President of Red Ant] Randy Philips is a friend of mine, it was the perfect combination," says Osbourne.

Unlike a lot of other recent start-up labels. Sharon and Ozzy had no intention of persuading "big name" VPs from other companies to join in their new venture. They wanted to work with people they were currently working with, people who weren't limited to rigid corporate environments

"We have people who've worked for us for a long time, and who

have all-around experience in the record industry in terms of promotion and sales," Osbourne says. "We don't have anybody from major labels, because anybody that's used to working with a large corporation could never come work with people like us."

Using the same formulated promotion schemes for artists, not giving bands enough time to develop, and signing groups strictly based on popular trends are just a few of the pitfalls of big corporate record companies that Ozz Records would like to avoid.

"You look at the industry now, and the A&R guys are bigger stars than the artists," says Osbourne. "Everything is formula. Three years ago, unless you came from Seattle, you were dead. What corporate labels do is go on the crest of the wave, because so few people have foresight. They just follow what is happening at the time."

Despite the name and the fact that Ozzy is the label's president, Ozz Records isn't strictly committed to hard rock and metal bands. If this were true, the label would be limiting itself and committing one of the same errors that many corporate and independent labels make. Fortunately, Ozz Records is taking a simple approach to signing artists.

"When the tapes come in, we all listen to everything, all seven of us who work there," says Osbourne. "We're looking for an eclectic group of artists. They don't have to be from any one genre of music, just as long as they're good. You could be the world's greatest whistler, and if we like it, we'll sign vou."

If you can't whistle "Dixie" live though, your chances of being signed to Ozz are slim. This company strongly embraces the concept that bands must be just as impressive on stage as they are on recordings. "We would never think of signing a band unless they could perform live," says Osbourne.



Labels and bands alike all eventually discover—in some cases too late—that extensive roadwork is the best way to achieve maximum exposure, especially if an artist lacks radio-friendly songs.

"You *can* build a band from the street. You *can* build a band without radio and MTV. It takes longer, but it can be done," assures Sharon.

Can you say Black Sabbath?

Ozz Records' first release in con-Red iunction with Ant Entertainment is Ozzfest Live. Recorded at last year's Ozzfest in San Bernardino, Calif., the disc will be available to radio at the end of May. The CD features live recordings of ten bands that played the festival, including Sepultura, Slayer, and Biohazard, plus live tracks from six of the artists that will participate in this year's tour, including Fear Factory, Neurosis, and Powerman 5000.

Ozzfest sprang from the Osbournes desire to offer people an alternative to current music festivals, most notably Lollapalooza. Its main goal is to feature up-andcoming hard rock/metal artists, those who are usually not invited to play large, festival-style concerts, and to offer people a genuine show instead of industry hype. "We studied all the festivals that were going out year after year, and it seemed everybody was trying to offer some sort of political statement instead of focusing on entertainment," says Osbourne. "I don't believe in mixing people's political cept: Offering a lineup of diverse, new, happening bands at a great ticket price," says Osbourne. "Eventually that got bastardized by the industry, and the whole philosophy went out the window."

The basic foundation for the suc-



and personal views with entertainment. One has nothing to do with the other."

Music festivals often fail because they get too bogged down by management and record label agendas, which inevitably force the entertainment aspect to be lost in a frenzy of promotional hype.

"Lollapalooza, for instance, initially came up with a great concess of any festival is to offer a genuine lineup of bands whose main goal is to entertain and make the event affordable. Osbourne sums it up: "Give a great ticket price and give the kids value for their money by entertaining them."

1996 witnessed the trial run of Ozzfest with concerts in Phoenix, Arizona and San Bernardino, California. To the surprise of many pessimists who said it wouldn't fly, both shows sold out.

"At the San Bernardino show, we had everything against us," says Sharon. "It was freezing cold, there was a sand storm, and it was basically a nightmare putting that show together so late in the year. All the same, the show was California's largest grossing show that year with an attendance of 35,000 people."

Having succeeded in its trial run, Ozzfest is now slated to hit 20 cities in two months, kicking off in Bristow, Virginia on May 24. The bands scheduled for the main stage are Ozzy Osbourne, Black Sabbath, Marilyn Manson (for selected dates only), Pantera, Type O Negative, Fear Factory, Machine Head, and Powerman 5000. The second stage lineup includes Downset, Neurosis, Slo Burn, Drain STH, Coal Chamber, and Visions of Disorder.

"We came up with a package which we felt wasn't being supplied in the marketplace," says Osbourne. "There's no event [where kids can] hear aggressive music—or harder edge music—in the form of an all-day summer event."

All the bands booked were chosen because they represent the current trends and future direction

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of the hard rock/metal scene.

"We looked for the best and heaviest bands that were available to play the main stage," says Osbourne. "The second stage was included as an opportunity for baby hard rock bands to play at a large event that normally wouldn't be offered to them."

Ozzy Osbourne was scheduled to headline the main stage right from the start, but the question was, 'Who was going to open for Ozzy?' It had to be someone that matched—or came close—to Ozzy's

caliber. Since Ozzy was already in the process of writing with original Black Sabbath guitarist Tony lommi, the light bulb in Sharon's head began to shine bright.

"There was one position we had to fill on the tour," explains Osbourne. "Everyone we wanted had other obligations, and we really needed to fill the position. I started thinking of who we could get when it dawned on me that Ozzy and Tony lommi were writing together. I figured they might as well do a set together."

With lommi on board, the Osbourne camp decided to go for broke by inviting original Black Sabbath bassist Geezer Butler to join the show. Imagine Black Sabbath opening up for Ozzy.

"We called up Geezer and he was into it and that was it," says Osbourne.

Expect to hear some Black Sabbath tunes never before played live, but don't expect to see original drummer Bill Ward behind the skins. A failed reunion four years

ago, conflicting personal views, and different agendas will result in Ward's absence from this tour.

"We were talking about doing a major reunion four years ago," explains Osbourne. "The talks eventually broke down."

As Black Sabbath, Iommi, Butler, Ward, and Tony Martin on vocals played three dates in Brazil a year and a half ago and it wasn't a smooth run.

The task of filling Ward's shoes behind the kit will fall to Ozzy Osbourne's current drummer, Mike Bordin of Faith No More.

"He plays with Ozzy when he's not with Faith No More anyway, so he was the obvious choice," says Osbourne. "Mike is an unbelievable drummer and the biggest Sabbath freak in the world. He knows the songs better than the guys in Sabbath."

Whether or not Ward's replacement will satisfy hardcore Sabbath fans remains to be seen, but it's gotta be better than no Sabbath at all. If all goes well, and Bordin satisfies the Sabbath elite, future concerts are a possibility. The same is already true of Ozzfest.

"We're already contracted to do Ozzfest next year," says Osbourne. "More than likely Ozzy won't be a part of it, but it's something we'd like to do as an annual event. Ozzfest is filling a great big gap in the marketplace because no summer festivals for hard rock fans exist."

With venues booked and tickets selling like water in the desert, Ozzfest is poised to be a very successful event. However, there have been a few snags. New Jersey's Giants Stadium is refusing to let the concert go on as planned if Marliyn Manson, the latest media-hyped "shock" band, remains on the bill.


"We spent \$35,000 in advertising for the Giants Stadium show, and tickets were supposed to go on sale on Saturday, April 19," says Osbourne. "On Friday morning [April 18], we were told by Giants Stadium officials that we weren't allowed to open the box office unless Marilyn Manson was off the bill."

Censorship is nothing new for Sharon, who fought similar battles with venues throughout Ozzy's career.

"It's so ironic that Ozzy is no problem at all, but Marilyn Manson is," laughs Osbourne. "It's the same crap we went through with Ozzy: 'Manson sacrifices people onstage, urinates on bibles. It's all so ridiculous."

If Sharon Osbourne Management applies the same tactics that helped Ozzy reinstate his banned gigs during the '80s, Manson will certainly be back on the bill ASAP.

Sharon Osbourne is a take-nocrap executive ("There are no negotiations [with Giants Stadium]," she says. "We're suing them") who will undoubtedly lead Ozz Records to success, just as she has guided her husband's career through triumph and turmoil. \oplus

BLACK SABBA+H'S Tony Iommi is the original axe man of metal. Iommi, who was among the first guitarist to introduce slow, sludge-infested hooks and mammoth chords, has been an icon of metal since his first riff with Sabbath almost 30 years ago. His unique style, which many of today's hard rock acts try to emulate, was created partly out of an accident that cut the tips of his fin-

gers. He turned his guitar down a halfstep because it was more comfortable for him to play with the strings slightly slack. The combination of squirrely strings and low-end tuning created the foundation of the Black Sabbath sound.

It's this blend of heavy guitars, methodical rhythms, and crawling tempos that many people are looking forward to when Black Sabbath reunites at this year's Ozzfest. However, it's just not the fans who are excited. The band is too.

"It's just great to be back with Ozzy and Geezer [Butler]," says lommi. "Getting back together is something I think we owe, not only to ourselves, but to everybody. It's been such a longtime in coming after all the things that have gone on over the years."

The last time the original members of Black Sabbath played together was in 1992 during Ozzy Osbourne's No More Tours tour in Costa Mesa, California. The difference between that memorable show and the upcoming reunion is the absence of drummer Bill Ward.

"Things have changed so much over the years as far as attitudes and lifestyles that I don't think Bill would be up for a long tour," says lommi. "About 15 months ago Bill, Geezer Butler, Tony Martin,

and myself did three dates in Brazil. One night backstage, one of the other bands was smoking dope in the dressing room and Bill walked past, smelled it, and went completely ape shit. He's kind of reformed now, but you can't have that kind of attitude, especially on this tour we're doing. If people are smoking dope backstage or in the audience or whatever, you can't freak out. I love Bill. I think he's

> great and he's one of my best friends, but if he was on tour with us and saw anything he didn't like, and freaked out, it would put the whole show in jeopardy. We just can't afford to have that happen."

Faith No More's Mike Bordin will be drumming for the mighty Sabbath.

"I came out to L.A. to rehearse with Mike for a couple of days, and I think he's good," says lommi. "He's really into the Sabbath stuff, he knows the songs, he's a fan, and he's a nice guy. It all clicked."

Black Sabbath has influenced countless bands over the years and continues to draw new fans, some of whom weren't even born during Sabbath's heyday.

"It's a great honor that we can still be here after 30 years, and people still look to us as an influence," says lommi. "I think there's no better reward than things like that."

Being a member of one of the most criticized and ridiculed bands of all times, lommi empathizes with the response Marilyn Manson has generated from the critics.

"I can certainly relate to what Manson's going through at the moment," says lommi. "When we [Black Sabbath] first went on tour, we got bloody banned from everywhere."

All the original members of

Black Sabbath have released solo projects of some sort with the exception of lommi, but he hopes that will change.

"I've got quite a lot of written material," he says, "but I've put everything on hold for a while. I'd love to have a solo album out at some point. I've been threatening to do one forever. I've got plenty of stuff; it's just a matter of finding


time to do it."

The existence of lommi's new songs and the reuniting of Geezer Butler and Ozzy Osbourne, generates two questions: Will there be a new Black Sabbath record? and will the band tour again after Ozzfest?

"Once we get back together," lommi replies, "who knows what's going to happen?"

There's nothing worse than having a question answered with a question, but it looks like only time will tell what the future has in store for Black Sabbath. **Đ**

Duke DuBois, a Life of Jazz & "that funny stuff"

Wednesday. Press day. Another Jazz chart safely tucked into bed. Column done. Lots of news and ratings reports. Reviews proofed and corrected. Then Suzanne Berg calls with the awful news. Duke DuBois passed away. We are devastated. The phone is ringing off the hook. People are calling as fast as the word is spreading. Jazz radio

has lost its Lion of Zion, its icon of jazz purity, its good cop of good taste. Our favorite vegetarian is gone forever. Clifford Brown now has a sidekick in heaven. We're all left scrambling for memories.

Let's get straight to the point. We don't know if there would even be GAVIN Jazz and Smooth Jazz charts without Duke DuBois. Duke was the man who led a contingent of early supporters-Cliff Gorov, Doc Remer, Harold Childs-to our door. While at GRP, he felt a void in how radio dealt with Jazz and instrumental music. In mid-1987 Jazz was either relegated to a scattered network of NPR stations and specialty shows on A/C or Album Radio. At that time, Duke was the pioneer who attempted to stitch together a network of stations playing both Jazz and "that funny stuff," which is what Duke used to always call Smooth Jazz.

For one reason or another, Duke ended up pleading his case to us. Maybe he had hit a wall at the A/C level. We were part owners of the

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business, kind of drifting at the time, assisting in Top 40, putting out a half-assed Album Radio chart, and were musically homeless. At night we'd groove to the sounds of Miles, Coltrane, and a barrage of rock n roll. During the day, it was Heart, Genesis, Janet Jackson, and Bananarama. Needless to say we were vulnerable. Duke must have

> known we were easy marks. It was no problem trading in Debbie Gibson and Whitesnake for Miles, Dizzy, Wynton, Chick, and Branford.

"Jazz needs GAVIN's integrity," he strongly stated. Little did he know how much GAVIN needed the integrity of Jazz. Or how much the Zimmermen needed a professional infusion of Jazz into

their hearts and souls. And it was Duke who injected that first hit. Ultimately, it was Duke who

talked us into starting up the section after helping us organize meetings at the GAVIN Seminar. We held a special closed door meeting first. The room was filled, butts in every chair, people lining the wall, SRO, shoulder-to-shoulder. Later, at a regularly scheduled convention meeting, Dr. George Butler stood on the stage and read a statement entitled "Why not Jazz?" Afterward, he had to slip away to produce a new signing, Harry Connick, Jr. In the audience were radio people, record folks, even musicians-all the members of the Yellowjackets-people who showed up because it was Duke who told them to come or else. Finally, we at GAVIN asked ourselves, "Why not?," and printed our first Jazz charts dated July 22, 1988. We worked all night putting the charts together. Wynton Marsalis, Spyro Gyra, Kevin Eubanks, Chuck Mangione, and the Yellowjackets were nestled in our very first Top

Five. Over on the "Adult Alternative" chart, it was Sade, David Sanborn, Spyro, Patrick O'Hearn, and Mangione. Those were the days when our two worlds overlapped, when both kinds of music co-existed with a strange tranquility—Jazz and that "funny stuff." Weeks later, a plaque arrived. It was our first chart, beautifully mounted and inscribed: "Thanks for your integrity, support & commitment to Jazz, from Duke DuBois and Doc Remer."

Duke, although he was surely the Godfather of Jazz Promotion, stood for so much more than plugging records. He was the best at it. The margins by which he won our awards bordered on the ridiculous. Just this past year he suggested we retire him from competition. "No way," we said. Duke was a musician, a drummer and a promo man with a musician's heart. He was

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equally at home on the phone, nudging a station for a hot rotation, as he was in the studio with an artist like Kevin Eubanks. Duke was the glue that allowed all of us, men and women, radio and competing labels, to hang at the bar together, to respect each other as professionals. That's what made our world different. We were the Jazz radio music community, and, dammit, we were Duke's buddies.

Duke had a long history in the music business. Besides GRP and the reactivated Impulse!, with whom he will be indelibly associated, Duke also worked with CTI, Blue Note, ABC/Impulse!, Scepter, and a wide variety of independent projects, his career spanning five fabulous decades of music. Duke could be a stickler when it came to principles. He was always quick to speak his mind; like the time he pulled aside a

for the album and I finished the album in Los Angeles and Nashville. We were done in four weeks, including the final mix and mastering."

"' Can't Get Enough' features an electric guitar solo by Larry Carlton. When I was in Nashville recording, I approached Larry about contributing because the tune seemed so Steely Dan-ish. I wanted Larry to recreate the mood from Donald Fagen's album, The Night Fly. Larry recorded four solos, and I settled on the more adventurous first take."

"I wrote 'Song for Nature' with keyboardist David HIrshfelder, who co-wrote four songs with me on The Journey . At the time, he was composing the soundtrack for the film, Shine. He had one day off, which we spent writing this tune. Warren Hill played saxophone. It's the only song I've done that features vocals."

famous Jazz musician and castigated him for playing gigs in South Africa. Duke visited an incapacitated George Jinda from Special EFX, shaved his face, and sat at his bedside. Besides Jazz, Duke had a lifelong love affair with Polynesian culture. Anybody who ever visited his office overlooking New York's West side will always remember the postcards and hula girls taped to his window sill. Duke always championed eating right and staying fit. He never touched meat. When he walked into the room, he was the man, the senior stateman, totally ageless, looking nowhere near his 64 years of age, slightly stocky,

always slim at heart, and ever the picture of health.

The Zimmermen called him Dukey Stick, our own private nickname, after an old George Duke funk song. One time, noticing his real name-Warren-etched on his American Express card, we teased him endlessly. Warren DuBois just didn't seem right, for he was the Duke, and that he will stay. Duke, the Grand Duke of Jazz Music Promotion, thanks for dragging two musically homeless guys into your world of Jazz. Jazz is both a happier and lonelier place because of you. Duke DuBois, we love you madly, but now we're kind of blue.



Inside Country by Jamie Matteson



Michael Peterson first came to my attention during this year's CRS. After asking several of my radio friends which new artists had caught their eye, Michael Peterson's performance during the pre—CRS Warner Brother's showcase was consistently mentioned. I spoke with Michael when he was in Las Vegas recently for a whirlwind radio station tour.



Jamie Matteson: Growing up were you exposed to music?

Michael Peterson: Music has always been a big part of my life. I sang my first solo at my kindergarten graduation; I played in garage bands and local dances. In high school, I was in the choir, and won some talent shows and vocalist awards. But, sports was really how I felt I could pay for college, so I pursued athletics and earned a football scholorship to Pacific Lutheran University. It was actually athletics that opened the door to the music business for me. Post-college, our team quarterback, Brad Westering, became involved with an artist named Denise Williams (best known for her multi million selling album featuring "Lets Hear it for the Boy"). Brad knew about me as a writer, on I had my first two cuts

on Denise's next album. Unfortunately, it was not a success. But, it told me I could be a songwriter, and it was a great source of encouragement to me.

When did your songwriting begin?

Throughout my freshman year of college. After experiencing some personal tragedy, I was exposed to some records that really moved and touched me in a significant way, and related to what I was going through at the time. I remember saying to friends "If I could do for other people what these songs do for me, then I want to do that more than anything else."

How did you make writing songs your profession?

My friends would tease me bacause I would write my songs in a book and put my own copyright information on them, keeping track of what I wrote and who I wrote them with. I remember one time at the Dallas airport, one guy said to me, "What do you think you are, a professional?" I always treated myself like I was a professional because I really wanted to be. After so long a time writing hundreds of songs for the sheer love of it, when I finally got paid to write songs, it was a dream come true, and I was prepared to give it everything I had.

So how did you get to Nashville? I came to town and music publisher Michael Puryear recognized me at the Shoney's buffet bar line. We met several years before at an event I played at, and we reconnected. He was the only person I knew in the industry, and over the next several years, he really opened some doors for me. He set me up to write with Jim Weatherly and introduced me to songwriter Gene Pistilli. Michael also co—

wrote with me the song "Buffalo" on my album, and it was that song that helped open the door for me to become a professional songwriter and artist in Nashville.

Which brings us to your record deal with Giant.

I signed a publishing deal in December of 1995, and in January several labels called my publisher to set up meetings to hear me as an artist. I think it was the peripheral energy of the publishing deal that created the other labels' interest. I met with six or seven labels, and Pat Finch at Famous Music was also a huge help and introduced me to Page Levy, Senior VP A&R at Warner Brothers. When it finally came down to it, Warner Brothers was the place I felt I wanted to be. It's proven so far to be a great decision. Page Levy is amazingly creative and a very astute woman.

Since you co-wrote 10 of the songs on the album, there must be a lot of personal input in these songs.

Share with us some examples of how these songs came to be.

The first single, "Drink, Swear, Steal, and Lie," to me are four words that people unfamiliar with Country music would cite as typical of our format. I thought it was funny to take the four words that epitomize a stereotype, and recreate them in a different way. For the song "When the Bartender Cries," I want to say that I am not an alcoholic, but I have experienced those type of lows when I wasn't sure I was going to make it, I didn't know how to make it, and something turned me around to help me know I would survive. The part of me in that song is the guy coming face to face with his own weakness and saying, "I have to change." In the song "Love's Great" there's a chorus with people screaming "Loves Great, When You're Not In It." We had a whole group in the studio for that one, my attorney is singing, my kids are screaming. It was pretty funny.

BACKSTREET BOYS "Quit Playing Games (With My Heart)" (Jive)



the Minus 5 is McCaughey's side project in which random friends stop by to either record or perform on stage. For this project, McCaughey has collaborated with REM's Peter Buck to pen a sort of folk & roll opera about a disgruntled hobo named Buck McCoy. Others that stop by to lend a hand include Robert Pollard from GBV and Ken Stringfellow and Jon Auer of the Posies. McCaughey's blend of folk, country, rock, and bluegrass, along with the beautiful harmonies and the occasional feedback spread throughout makes for a downright excellent listening experience. If you're into Rubber Soul/Revolver-era Beatles, the Turtles, and Velvet Underground, and don't mind a touch of good ol' country soul, then the Minus 5 are sure to satisfy your musical palate.
