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

Russ Regan

On Selling Music in the New Swing Era

I keep inventing myself," says Russ legan, former singer, independent romotion man, label chief, and now President of his own Los Angeles label, tarbound. For the past six months, long with partners John Hyde and lmi Jacobus, Regan has been quietly uilding Starbound in the swing evival and contemporary music ields. In his 37 years in the business, e's worked as a promotion man for 'ecord Merchandising, discovered That's Life" for Frank Sinatra while Teneral Manager of Warner Bros. oma label, ran Uni Records as vice resident/general manager and 20th 'entury Records as President. While vM of PolyGram's west coast operaon, he moved the label into film oundtracks.

tarbound is structured to release new, frontline product as well as cull the Crown ecords catalog, which we bought or its music from the swing era. In ur first six months we've had four leases, Superstars of Dance by K.C. nd the Sunshine Band, Big Band Tedding Party by the Big Band lavers, An Old Fashioned Wedding Ibum by the Beautiful Strings, and ur latest release, Big Band Crazy y Electric Swing. We're getting colge radio play. Young kids seem to e discovering swing music. To em, it's brand new

We bought the Crown catalog from ank DiLeo, who had purchased it om the Bihari brothers and kept the asters in a warehouse in Nashville. Electric Swing is me and musician ark Anderson. We took the origial music recorded by members of p swing bands which the Biharis



recorded in Hollywood in stereo in the '60s, and we sweetened the sound by adding new drum licks, bass lines, tamborines, and handclaps. Digital technology made the sound hotter, and we added an echo to give us a live feel.

There have been compilations before, but this one is different because we arranged the tunes in four long medleys and used overdubbed instruments to bring the sound into the '90s.

If the record catches on, I'm planning on putting together a 15-piece band to play colleges. It'll have a synclavier, which can duplicate any instrument. The K.C. record features newly recorded versions of his past hits. K.C. is having his own popularity revival.

Our big challenge is breaking the Electric Swing album beyond the big city markets like Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego, where there are swing hotspots. That's up to Don Graham, who's handling our radio promotion. Macey Lipman is handling retail marketing, and he's doing an instore play promotion with 750 locations across America. Our target audience are males and females 18-35.

Young people like the swing sound because it's not boring and they get to dress up like their parents did in the '40s. It's a simple example of what goes around comes around. There's definitely a nostalgic mood in the country. Look at the albums by departed artists like Glenn Miller, Billie Holidav, Ella Fitzgerald, and Louis Armstrong on the charts. It says quality never dies. If it's great, it will live forever. There's a whole new crop of people discovering this vintage music.

We recently released our first newly recorded maxi-single, "Shower Me With Love" by Club X with Gladys Bankston. This is a Miami group which was produced by Richard Tucker. In January we'll release Philadelphia vocalist Zoba, backed by a small group on "Fax Me."

Radio is always the key to exposure. Promotion today remains the same as when I started. If you have a hit, it's a fun business. You just have to stay with it. But it takes a little longer now to break a record because there are less stations that take chances on new product.

Things change, and we have to deal with it. In distribution, the majors have gotten stronger and the independents weaker. It's certainly more difficult for an independent label to compete against the majors. But it's more gratifying when you win. Yet after 37 years, I still love the business. I work as hard as I ever have, only I'm an owner of a label for the first time in my career. I'm like an oldfashioned gunfighter. I've got to keep walking down Main Street. GAVIN


Have you checked out the new Rhythmic Country format yet? Or the Modern Nostalgia trend? How about some of the Renegade Rock stations* You think I'm Joking? Well, maybe I am. But only just.

As radio owners get fewer and fewer, formats and sub-formats get more and more numerous. How are those two trends connected? To be honest, they're not, except when you consider that the new station super groups have overall revenue imperatives and see themselves competing against other media rather than each other. And that they have long realized that they are in the business of delivering demos to advertisers, not program content to listeners. The latter is simply how they achieve the former. When you have so many stations, that means you are able to, in some cases have to, get much more

specific about who you are targeting and with what content. Hence the niches of niches.

It follows that record companies also have to live with the fact that they will need to be more and more demo savvy if they are to get the attention of the right stations at the right time with the right product.

It's Official: Quartararo Gavin's Virtual Country Is Warner Bros. Prez Seminar: Are You There?

As expected since he left Virgin Records last month, Phil Quartararo has landed as President of Warner Bros. Records, where he will work with Chairman/CEO Russ



Thyret. Quartararo begins in his new post November 3.

Making the announcement on October 14, Thyret noted Quartararo's expertise in developing long-term release and marketing strategies. "His track record has been extraordinary, and I believe he's the right person to help focus on both the present and the future with a fresh point of view." Thyret added that Quartararo's "artist-friendly management style fits well with the culture of this company."

Quartararo, a Brooklyn native who'd been President and CEO of Virgin for four years, called his appointment "a once in a lifetime opportunity." Warner Bros., he said, is "hands down, the finest company with the best roster in the history of the music business.'

The most innovative music industry seminar is taking place right now—somewhere.

Showcases include the Lynns, Martina McBride, Kenny Chesney, James T. Horn, Wynonna (pictured), the Great Divide, Sawyer Brown, Lila Mc-Cann, and a medlev from the entire Epic Nashville roster.

"It's really exciting," said Matteson. "Not only are we able to present a humorous side to seminars, but I'm also excited about our panels, one on Web sites and one being a music meeting There are some surprises in the awards show, and, over all, we had great participa tion from the labels."

Thinking About John Denver

I had not thought about John Denver for quite a while. Had you?

Once in awhile, would show up on the Today show, or in a sports highlight, playing in a golf pro-am with Bill Murray, or there'd be a blurb in the papers about a DUI bust in Aspen, and about Hunter S. Thompson maybe being in the jury. But I thought about him last night, most of the night. John Denver died when the plane he was piloting crashed into Monterey Bay around 5:45 p.m. on October 12. He was 53.

Thinking back to my personal connection with John brought back some great memories. In the late '60s, I did promotion work for Warner Bros. Records and got the first gold single of my career for "Leaving on a Jet Plane" by Peter, Paul & Mary, written by John. I



was doing local promo for Warner Bros. out of Denver, and broke that song with the help of Max Floyd at KLZ/FM, "Boss" Reagan at 95-KIMN, and

Buzz Lawrence at KHOW.

A few years later, employed by RCA, I met and worked with John during the "Rocky Mountain High," "Sunshine on My Shoulders," and "Annie's

> Song" period. He'd hit the charts a couple of years before with "Take Me Home, Country Roads," and he had other hits-and adventures on television and in films-ahead of him. Not to mention a second vocation, as an avid environmental

He was always a gentleman, and loved his music. He gave us 11

gold and four platinum albums, and memories of a much more innocent time when Rocky Mountain High had two meanings. I miss him already.

Model for Radio

On east coast and west, they've been saying farewell to Jazzbeaux. Al Collins, the loveable DJ who died September 30 of cancer, built his radio fantasyland, the Purple Grotto, at WNEW/AM in New York in the '50s, recreated it for a nice run at KSFO in San Francisco in the '60s, logged time in Los Angeles, primarily at KFI and KGBS, went back to WNEW in the '80s, and wrapped things up in the Bay Area, going from KFRC ("Magic 61") to KCSM/FM-San Mateo, with several smaller outlets in-between.

When KCSM called to include me in an on-air tribute to Jazzbeaux-I'd profiled him in the S.F. Chronicle in 1990, and we'd met just five or six weeks before his death, for GAVIN'S "First Person" feature—I made three points:





a man in his early seventies packing albums and CDs into his car and driving himself hundreds of miles a week, shuttling between three small radio stations, and spreading the musical wit and wisdom of Count Basie and other favorites. He made next to no money, and he didn't care.

 Along with other jazz disc jockeys, Jazzbeaux served as direct inspiration for the free-form FM rock generation. There was nothing announcer-ish about him; he was absolutely relaxed and conversational. Without trying to, he sounded hip, peppering his chatter with jazzy lexicon and creating his own world, with its own characters and lingo. In Jazzbeaux and his brethren, FM rock's jocks had the finest teachers.

• On the air, Jazzbeaux was the model of positivity. For the Chronicle piece, I watched him at another station, looking for a song to play for a contest. When the engineer suggested Michael Franks' "When It's Over," Jazzbeaux shook his head. "Oh, no, play something else," he said. "I don't want to play anything with the title 'When It's Over.' I want to play something like 'When It's Starting to Begin."

And so we will.

NEWS & NOTES: Russ "the Moose" Syracuse, another legendary DJ, has been hospitalized after suffering a stroke. Syracuse, whose all-night show on KYA/AM-San Francisco in the '60s is fondly remembered by a generation of Northern California listeners, is a long-time friend. But I am only one of many, and all of us wish for him what his doctors predict: a full recovery...The late B. Mitch Reed is featured, via airchecks from KMET/FM-L.A., on DCC Compact Classics' Golden Age of Underground Radio. On one stopset, he quotes Mick Jagger saying he meant for the Stones to play only a couple of years. And: "I'd rather be dead than sing 'Satisfaction' when I'm 45..." Mick turned 54 in July...Lavay Smith, the superb jazz and blues singer who fronts an ensemble called the Red Hot Skillet-Lickers, also has a fine, self-made CD out, and is one of the most sought-after acts around. One of her most recent audiences included President Clinton, in S.F. for a little fund-raising. He saw her CD, and she offered him a free copy. "Oh, may I?" he asked, as if he never gets anything for free. Lavay, and all the skillet-lickers, were charmed....

New Books Cover Rock, R&B With Heart & Soul



The Rolling Stone Book of Women in Rock

(Random House)

Rather than try to encompass the entirety of female contributions to rock & roll in one rambling think piece, *Rolling Stone* wisely offers this collection of essays exploring the impact and import of a variety of artists—from gospel, blues, and country greats who preceded rock.



through the early contributors, the role of women in the folk/protest movement of the '60s and punk in the '70s, and on into today's aggregation of rockers, balladeers, writers, producers, and innovators. Personal faves include a melancholy remembrance of Velvet



Underground chanteuse Nico (by Holly George-Warren), Christian Wright's contemplation of Tina Turner as an emancipated role model, and Ariel Swartley's comparison of the power of sex as demonstrated by the wholly disparate Wanda Jackson and Grace Slick, Good stuff.

The Rhino History of Rock 'n' Roll: The '70s

(Pocket Books)

Before you roll your eyes and dismiss this little epic as late on the bandwagon, consider this: "music of the '70s was a lot of things—innovative, uninhibited, silly, rude, off-the-wall, pretentious, offensive, charming, daring, experimental, outrageous, over the top, middle of the road, bloated, excessive,

and sometimes just plain strange—but please don't call it serious." Leave it to Rhino (via author Eric Lefcowitz) to put things in perspective. TV and movie themes. Pop. Disco. Rawk. Soul. Glam. Punk. It's all here, plus a discography and a sampler CD. Fittingly, it's got eight tracks. Freebird!

Heart & Soul: A Celebration of Black Music Style in America 1930-1975

theft. Warner Bros. execs Bob Merlis and Davin Seay lovingly chronicle a selection of artists who profoundly changed the sound of American music. Merlis and Seay infuse the text with their own enthusiasm for the music, making it more a gab session between friends than a dry thesis. Heart \mathcal{E} Soul also includes an introduction from blues queen Etta James and an amazing collection of artwork, from posters to album art and publicity shots. A gem.

Not Fade Away: The Rock & Roll Photography of Jim Marshall

(Bulfinch)

The art of rock & roll photography has only recently become a prized and valuable collectible, and the names of those responsible for the images are only now becoming well-known. But for many in the industry, the work of San Francisco's Jim Marshall will be immediately recognizable. Marshall chronicled the Summer of Love and beyond, and his images of blues greats. Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, the Grateful Dead, and others helped define an era.

Make Room for Puff Daddy


Rap artists have hit the top of sales and airplay charts, but they've rarely made a mark in the rankings for box office receipts.

If anyone can score a breakthrough, it may be Sean "Puffy" Combs, who will headline a multi-act tour from November 9 (in Auburn Hills, Mich.) to Anaheim, Calif. on December 7.

Combs, the CEO of Bad Boy Entertainment who records as Puff Daddy, has sold nearly 2.3 million copies of *No Way Out*, and put in a strong performance at the recent MTV Video Music Awards. With him on the tour are Foxy Brown, Busta Rhymes, Lil' Kim, Usher, 112, Mase, Lil' Cease, the Lox, Jay-Z, Kid Capri, and

Changing Faces.

The tour goes out at a time when black music acts, who accounted for some 21 percent of record sales in the



U.S. last year, placed only two tours in the Top 50 box-office rankings last year. And those shows—Smokin' Grooves and R. Kelly—grossed an estimated \$15 million, or two percent of the \$750 million grossed by

II 50 acts

This past summer's Smokin' Grooves tour averaged about 6,500 fans at sites that often had twice that capacity. And a fall tour with Bone Thugs-N-Harmony, Mary J. Blige, and Ginuwine, has drawn some half-of-capacity houses.

Given that imbalance between chart success and concert ticket sales, Gary Bongiovanni, Editor of *Pollstar*; was cautious about the Puff Daddy tour's chances. "Even though I suspect that this tour is going to do OK." he told the *Loc Angeles Times*, "it won't be the same as if it was a rock act that had an album that was that big. Why that is you can only guess."

San Diego's Hudson Dies

Mac Hudson, one-half of KFMB/AM's popular *Hudson* and *Bauer* morning team, died in his sleep on October 10. He was 58.



often, the answer is no. But are these decisions based on research, or on assumptions made by PDs who are, to some extent, gatekeepers for what listeners get to hear? Hardly a convention has gone by in the last ten years when someone hasn't cautioned, "Don't be too hip for the room." But the fear remains that these older, established artists are perceived as uncool or unhip by today's Top 40 audience.

Despite media coverage so intense that even a cave-dwelling hermit has no doubt heard about the tour, **Virgin** Senior VP, Promotion **Michael Plen** has spent countless hours trying to convince PDs that they should be playing the Rolling Stones. Not surprisingly, Plen's been besieged by requests for tickets from many of the same people who don't feel the band is right for their audience.

"I just don't understand the men-

tality," he says. All other media that radio competes with are investing in the Stones like they are a major event. What makes Top 40 so different that they can't be part of this? So far, he says, "Radio has no good answer."

Michael continues, "radio has niched itself so much that when an act comes along which is truly mass appeal, it's an anomaly."

He's right. After all, it's hard to argue that interest in this act *doesn't* cross demographic boundaries.

Plen admits he's confused by PDs and MDs who shout that they've been lifetime Stones fansand many of their friends, neighbors, and relatives all love them too-but that unfortunately, the band just doesn't fit their station's image. To that Michael replies, "Acts like Pearl Jam and the Smashing Pumpkins don't need to open for the Stones to get in front of a large audience. They don't think it's going to hurt their image. They pursued it because they think it's good." Ultimately, Plen is encouraged by stations that are spinning "Anybody Seen My Baby" and getting back strong research.

Reprise VP Promotion Marc Ratner relates a similar story about trying to spread the word about Fleetwood Mac. "We're having better success in the major markets with 'Silver Springs,' in terms of getting airplay and getting people to understand what's going on," he says.

Ratner stresses that, first and foremost, "Top 40 is fueled by *bit* songs. It doesn't make any differerence who the artist is, because the only decision people make is, 'Do I like this song or don't I?' Up against peer pressure, they might give a thumbs-down to a particular act," he argues, but "if a song comes on the radio by that artist and they like it, they're not gonna

Marc feels it's also extremely important to consider "listener lifestyle." Using Fleetwood Mac as an example, he explains, "At one time, every teenage girl wanted to be Stevie Nicks. Now, those women are in the primary 30-40-year old demo." Ratner recalls an amazing quote he once heard from a PD while in a discussion about a song that was number two nationally at the time, but that the programmer wasn't playing. Marc was floored when the radio guy said, "I can't let my audience tell me what to play!"

"There's a thought process out there that assumes that, if listeners don't hear it on my radio stations and I don't tell 'em about it, then they don't know or care about it," he says. "At some point, it has to be much less of 'I think, I think, I think' and become 'What does my audience think?"

Signals & Detections

Keep an eye on the title song off Beth Nielsen Chapman's Sand and Water. Those that saw Beth perform at the Conclave in July know full well the powerful impact of this song, which she composed in memory of her husband, who lost his battle with cancer three years ago. Now, Elton John has adopted the song. Last week, at a small venue in Atlanta (with Chapman in attendance), he closed his show with it, explaining that the song really touches a nerve as he deals with the deaths of good friends Gianni Versace and Diana, Princess of Wales. The performance so moved Brian Philips and Leslie Fram, that they added it at 99X.





Last month, the pair reemerged with The Wilsons, a 12-song set that teatures tracks with their famous father as well as a song written for them by Garole King and Mark Hudson. The album is a kaleidescople romp through drask mythology, payable retnearnation, and familial bonding.

Ron Fell: How would you characterize your split with Chynna Phillips?

Wendy: It was very amicable. We're very forgiving people.

Carnie: I was hurt and angry at first. I thought we had a promising career even though the second album didn't sell as much as the first album. Wendy and I intended to stay on and make a third album, but we all have to try to understand other people's

aspirations. It took me six months to get to that place after she announced, at a group meeting, that she was leaving.



How does this new album differ from your work with Chynna?

Wendy: Being on our own gave Carnie and me a lot more creative freedom to explore new territory and different sounds. I love what we've done.

Carnie: When we were promoting the second Wilson

Phillips album, Wendy and Chynna were excited about Nirvana and Pearl Jam. I didn't like them at first, but they grew on me. Wendy really pushed me to open my ears. She said we could have more guitar and that we didn't always have to play it safe. It wound up that this new album has a lot of different flavors on it.

Wendy: But still, the melodies and the harmonies will always be close to our

Just a few years ago, Wilson Phillips was the flagship act for SBK/EMI. Now you're out and they're gone. How do you feel about everything that's happened with the label in the past year?

Carnie: A lot of good people are out of work now. We'll always be grateful

for the support that company gave us in the beginning... until they dumped us right on our asses and let us go.

Wendy: That was a tough time for us, but we knew we'd record again.

How would you describe your relationships with Danny Goldberg, Steve Greenberg, and the Mercury label?

Carnie: Beyond amazing.

Wendy: They're very supportive of us. Steve Greenberg is the best A&R person I've ever met.

Carnie: Steve has 12,000 albums at his house; he's an encyclopedia of music. Danny Goldberg is the smartest man in the entire industry. We didn't know anything about him in the beginning, but he said that he loved us and that whether our father was on a lot of tracks or just one or even none, he still liked what we did.

Wendy: It was like a blessing.

What was the time line for the making of this album?

Wendy: We signed with Mercury in early '96. We began writing with Cliff Magness in June. Songs like "Goddess' Revival," "St. Joan," "I Hate Your Face." That was the catalyst for the album.

Carnie: Our dad was involved from the very beginning. Wendy had begun working with our dad on "Til I Die" even before I moved back to California from Connecticut.

How's your dad doing?

Wendy: He's doing great.

Carnie: We've brought him feelings of joy he says he'd never felt before. We've come from no communcation with him for more than a decade to him asking me to sing with him on the Rob Wasserman *Trio* album. That's really when the healing began. My dad communicates through music, so it was

always natural for us to sing together. Wendy and I began slowly with him by spending birthdays and Father's Day together, until we felt able to ask him if he wanted to record together. He said, 'Yes, of course I'd love to.'

How is he to work with? Is he eccentric?

Wendy: Very. He's like a child, very whimsical and impatient. We laugh a lot.

Carnie: We loved being in the studio with him, seeing him in his element. He gets so jazzed and he's so spontaneous. All three of us pace in the studio and we're all insecure about our voices. It was so great to have the three of us sitting on stools singing together; daddy on the low, me in the middle, and Wendy on the high. It was so intense and yet beautiful.

What are the moments on the album that you think

best capture best the familial harmonies?

Wendy: On the bridge in "Miracle," I'm an octave over dad, and Carnie and I are doing a harmony with dad within there. It's a beautiful sound of us just humming that just crescendoes and opens up like a Beach Boys sound. In the future we're gonna do more songs together. Maybe a cappella, maybe an album of all Frank Sinatra songs; he loved the idea.

I'd like to ask you about some specific songs. Tell me about "Monday Without You."

Wendy: It was written in one day by Mark Hudson, Paul Brady, and Carole King as part of an annual songwriting symposium hosted by Miles Copeland at a castle in France. Our A&R guy, Steve Greenberg, was very insistent that we record it. We were initially hesitant, because it's extremely pop and we already had all these songs with edge written and recorded.

"Miracle"

Carnie: I have only two chords in my head, so I was scared to write with my dad. I grew up with him sitting by me at the piano. Anyway, I played the two chords and he blurted out the phrase, 'Am I a fool to expect a miracle?' I said, 'That's really incredible.' That's all we had until our A&R guy suggested we sing it to Dave Stewart over the telephone. So I sang it for Dave and he taped it and finished the structure of the song and most of the lyrics.

"St. Joan"

Wendy: Psychics have told Carnie that she was Joan of Arc in a past life, so we just felt we had to write about her. We had to do some research, though. We knew she that she was a martyr and a powerful woman. We took what we learned and made it visual. We had Marc Jordan help us with the lyrics and Cliff Magness wrote the music.

Carnie Wilson took advantage of the time between albums to host a critically acclaimed television talk show for syndication by Warner Bros. The show ran from early September of 1994 until the Spring of '95. I asked her if she watched a lot of TV these days:

Carnie: I don't really watch much television anymore, but I do think Rosie O'Donnell is incredible and hysterical. We tried to do that kind of show when we pitched Warner Bros. in the beginning.

I feel very lucky that I was able to do the shows. I was proud of the ratings we got and the letters we received. I taped 150 shows and they all aired. We taped the first 50 shows and then found out the show was going to be cancelled, but we went on with the last 100 anyway.

When I finished the show, I had 20,000 unread letters which I eventually read. One letter was from a 13-year old girl whose mother weighed 700 pounds. She couldn't get out of bed or tie her own shoes; she was so unmotivated. I wrote the girl a four-page letter about my struggle with weight and sent her mom a copy of my *Great Changes* exercise video. Maybe that was my purpose.

"Candy"

Wendy: It's not just about drugs, it's also about being an American girl and being a product of society. Candy was metaphorical as in 'we're as sweet as candy.' We wanted to find a way to break that image.

"I Hate Your Face"

Wendy: It's a love song. It's about reincarnation.

Carnie: That song makes me insane. I can't wait to sing that one on stage.

"Everything I Need"

Carnie: We didn't know how it would fit on the album because it's so sweet. There's a warmth and it has a very good melody. When I hear it, I think of three people coming together to hug each other. It's got a signature sound and really, I think that wraps up the album well.



20 OUESTIONS FOR WILLE-CHICAGOS MARK EDWARDS

ills that programming opportunity same in 1984 when he became a startup partner and PD tor M8 WTP-Imilianapolis, before moving on to WSRS and WTAS-Woresster, Mass.

inspired by Quiney Medoy's excellent series of articles on mentoring in Saun, Mark and I decided to talk about how to establish vital mechanics and a philosophy for good programming administration.



RON FELL: If someone wants to program a successful major market A/C station, what professional skills are essential? What are the skills that can be learned early in one's career that will pay off big time?

MARK EDWARDS: More than skills, I think it takes a very special attitude to program in a major market situation. Dedication to the job, your people, and the industry is critical, as is an incredible sense of discipline. Keeping your focus and not getting distracted are two things every major market PD must do to win in the long run, and I don't see many people—in any market size—who have what it takes.

As far as skills, I think good PDs in any market, especially the majors, need to know how to do *every* job at the radio station and know how all the departments contribute to the final product. That's why working weekends and overnights, selling for straight commission, doing remotes, and all the

other things that you usually have to do in the first couple of jobs are so important. Doing all that stuff is how you learn how stations run. It's awful while you're doing it, but the experience pays off.

Good PDs should also be completely computer literate and know at least the basics of accounting. Computers are used to do everything, from scheduling music to running the transmitters, so knowing how they work and being comfortable with them is very important. In the new world, we're all concerned about budgets, so knowing how to read P&Ls and talk with the business manager is important, too.

What are the tasks that should make up a PD's work week?

I love being a PD, because every week is different. But most weeks should include time with the talent, work on choosing and scheduling music, and paying lots of attention to the on-air product. Besides that, spending time with other department heads, an occasional sales call, and networking with people outside your station are important. It's also a good idea to spend time listening to other stations in your market every week. Everyone on the dial

is a competitor, so you need to know what everyone is up to. Leave about 40 percent of your schedule open, because unexpected problems that need your attention arise every day.

How much of a good PD's energy should be spent on competitive strategies?

The best defense is a good offense, so doing your job and programming your station should always be a priority. You should always have a plan drawn up in case of attack. If you're being attacked, you need to defend your position. How much of your energy goes into your defense should be determined by what kind of attack you're under. As with every other part of the PD's job, the amount of time you spend on this has to be based on the amount of damage an attack can do. Keep in mind that, if a second-rate station is launching a weak attack in hopes of beating a well-established station, the worst thing you can do is overreact. In the rare event that you're under serious attack, do whatever you have to to come out victorious. Know what your strengths and weaknesses are, where you can get hurt, and how you can drive off an attacker.

Besides the obvious ratings results, what are the differences between good PDs and not-so-good PDs?

Good PDs live their product 168 hours a week. Good PDs do whatever it takes to win and surround themselves with people who have the same attitude. Good PDs stay focused and don't get distracted. Good PDs make a plan and stick to it. Good PDs know when to revise that plan and why. Good PDs

put their listeners first, before promotional partners and record people. Good PDs know that radio is a business, and revenue generation is as important—if not more—than ratings. Good PDs don't overreact to the bad or the good. Good PDs are always looking for ways to do their job better.

What are the most valuable things to be gained from networking? Why should it be done and how should it be done?

Networking is vital to success for many reasons. None of us has all the answers, so having people to share ideas with and bounce ideas off of is a huge benefit. A good network is invaluable when you're looking to fill a position—or if you find yourself needing a gig. It's also great for learning about industry trends and gaining intelligence about your competition. Networking is not a luxury; you need to make time to do it every week.

What are the things that make programming an A/C station different from the more youth-oriented formats?

A/C radio isn't about the latest fad or the coolest contest. Winning A/C stations need to be part of their listeners' lives and answer listeners' needs. The

paradigms that A/C stations work under are very different from the ones Top 40, alternative, or even Smooth Jazz stations use. While every station's situation is different, the framework for every programming and promotional decision made at an A/C station is very different from just about every other kind of radio.

What are effective ways of monitoring and evaluating your competition?

Nothing beats taking time—hopefully out of the office—to actually listen to your competition. We're all busy, so sometimes there just isn't time to do that. Running skim tapes or using a service like BDS or Mediabase can help you know what songs are being played on the stations across the street, but you won't know much about formatics or what the air personalities are saying. Listening in real time is still the best way to know your competition.

Is it fair, or necessary, to have different standards of discipline and execution for different members of an air staff?

Every air personality has a different role at the station. Sometimes that's based on daypart, sometimes it's based on personality. While everyone on the air staff, from the morning team to the newest part-timer, should be expected to maintain the same basic formatic standards, there have to be considerations for each individual. Personalities are a very important part of A/C radio, and if the PD doesn't let each member of his air staff show their personality, the station will sound stale. Treat everyone like an individual, and the station will sound great.

What elements make for the best on-air contests?

On-air contests need to complement the radio station. If they don't make sense within the framework of the station and its place in listeners' minds, the contest will do more harm than good. Knowing what your listeners expect from their favorite station can help you decide which contests to do and how to execute them on the air. Sometimes it isn't easy, but the station has to decide what's right—not the client or the PR company. Once you've decided that a promotion makes sense, come up with mechanics that work for your station. On-air contests should be simple, exciting, and easy to enter and win. Ask people in the office if they understand the contest before you put it on the air. You'd be surprised how often contests don't work because they're too complicated.

Why does A/C have such a lock on "listening at work" promotions?

In any market, the station that wins at work is the station that serves at-work listeners the best. More often than not, that station is some form of A/C, but not always. Some of the classic "at work" promotions are now being executed by country, urban, and Smooth Jazz stations. A/C music may be more universal than the songs those stations play, but that doesn't guarantee the A/C station will beat everyone at work. Knowing what listeners want and giving it to them will help you win at work. If someone does that better, the kind of music they play may not be as much of a handicap as you [the A/C PD] might think.

What can a PD do in terms of off-air events to enhance ratings?

In the A/C world, what you do *on* the air has much more impact on your ratings than what you do *off* air. Before you do a huge event, make sure the time and money you invest will pay off, either in ratings or revenue. Keep in mind that whatever time you spend promoting a big event takes time away from promoting other aspects of your station. If it's something truly unique and compelling, you may get a slight bump from an event. If it's not, you could really get hurt.

Is there any industry, other than radio, in which a "winner"

might only have five or six percent of the its market?

It's interesting, people often say that if you hit one of three in baseball, you're in the Hall of Fame. If you get one of 15 listeners in a major market, you're probably going to get a distinguished achievement award from some industry organization.


Where should a PD draw the line in his/her relationship with program suppliers and record company reps?

PDs should remember that all relationships—with record people, program suppliers, or anyone else—have to be based on business. Any decision a PD makes should be based on what's best for the radio station, not what's best for the PD. Making decisions under those guidelines will insure you're doing the right thing for your listeners and that you're following all the company policies and FCC regulations that bind us. Take advantage of the promotions that make sense, and gracefully pass on the ones that don't. Be true to your station, and your reputation will be undiminished. In the end, your reputation is the one thing you can always control.

Does A/C have an Achilles heel? In other words, where is the format vulnerable?

If A/C has an Achilles heel, it's that we can be momentarily affected by a new hot format. Many A/Cs were hurt when country got really hot, and some were nicked for the book or two that '70s stations were strong. These are short term disruptions, and most of the shares that left A/C have come back. Other formats will come and go, but A/C will (hopefully) always be there. People may leave, but they'll be back as long as the A/C station continues to be true to its mission and doesn't overreact to the latest trend.

Does A/C have to be safe to succeed? Does an A/C PD have to be?



A/C doesn't have to be safe to succeed; it has to be good. Too safe often means boring, and boring stations lose. Not safe enough often means that the station isn't paying attention to its listeners, and those stations will lose, too. Know what your listeners want and know what the limits are. Push the envelope, but don't cross the line. Once you've gone too far, it's very hard to go back because your listeners have probably already left.

Read any good (radio-related) books lately?

I don't have nearly the time to read books that I'd like. Reading three to five newspapers a day, plus magazines and other current events information on the Internet takes a lot of time. However, I'd recommend *Dig Your Well Before You're Thirsty* by Harvey Mackay to anyone who wants to be in radio at this time next year. Of course, the most important book a PD can read is the Arbitron book. Read it, and whatever other Arbitron information you can get your hands on, as soon as it gets into your station.

Are Internet web sites for radio stations just a fad? What should a good web site do?

Station web sites may be good for promotion, but I don't think they're particularly effective for sales yet. In a few years they may be the cash machine that some sales people think they are, but not yet. That said, stations should support their sites with their promotion budget and make them available to sales. However, even the best web site won't get a station ratings. Beware of putting too much time and money into something that only a fraction of your audience cares about. A good web site should be updated constantly, and should be overseen by someone whose only job is to program a web site. Programming a web site and programming a radio station have virtually nothing in common.

Are the divisions developing between various factions of A/C a permanent situation, or an overreaction to the presumed need for niche broadcasting?

A/C is the most diverse format in radio today, with lots of stations falling under our umbrella. The simple fact is that there isn't a good place to put some of the stations that aren't really A/C, but that are in the A/C world. It's important to remember that listeners don't know about "Soft A/C," "Mainstream A/C," "Modern A/C," or "Bright A/C," they just know what station they like. If someone could come up for a different name for "Modern A/C," we wouldn't even be talking about this.

Is it easier to get on top, or to stay on top?

Getting to the top is hard, but staying on top is much harder. It's easy to get cocky and take yourself too seriously when you're successful. It takes lots of discipline to stay on top, and for many PDs, that's a big order.

The mid '90s will someday be looked back on as "the good old days," just as we refer to every other past generation. What will we remember as the good from these times? What won't we recognize a decade from now?

The few people who will still be in the radio business a decade or two from now will remember the mid-'90s as a time of survival of the fittest. The people who are really committed to their careers and to their stations will rise to the top. Unfortunately, some good people will find themselves out of the business, and that's not a good thing. And I doubt that many people will wax poetic about their favorite '70s station or the impact Hootie and the Blowfish had on the generations. lacktriangle

When I first heard this bangin' new single, I had to go and check the cover. Bobby Brown sounded so much like Bobby Womackgroaning and moaning from deep inside—that I just had to make sure. "Feelin' Inside," the first single from Brown's new album Forever, is a wonderfully nasty, ultra-funky, uptempo hit that will trigger a groundswell of excitement across the landzcape. Brown is one of the premier singers of his generation, and he's now stepped up to a higher level. You can feel the transition he's made from teen star to righteous family man. All I can say is, "Mrs. Brown keep up the 300d work, girl."

USHER My Way (LaFace/Arista



The now18-year old singing sensation from Chattanooga, Tennessee is back with an explosive sophomore album, called My Way.

Usher first surfaced in 1994 with a self-titled debut that instantly earned him props all around the Urban Landzcape. This new album, co-produced by Jermaine Dupri, will leave no question that this young man, with his great voice and superstar presence, is an artist who will continue to make an important contribution to the urban music world.

My Way is another step up the ladder of confidence for Usher. "I want to show people that I've grown since my last album; writing was a big part of that process," he says. Usher cowrote six of the albums nine tracks with Durpi, including the hit single "You Make Me Wanna." Teddy Riley contributed the ballad "I Will" to this well-balanced CD of slow and funky jams.

Babyface, co-executive producer of the album with (L.A. Reid) adds his golden touch to *My Way* with two beautiful ballads. "Bed Time" is a romantic song about falling in love complete with dreamy back-

ground vocals by Shanice Wilson. Face also reworks one of his first hits, "Slow Jam" which he originally wrote for Midnight Starr, creating an additional bridge so that Usher and Monica could match their powerful vocals.

Reid describes Usher as "the king of hip-hop soul," He explains. "There hasn't been an artist with this much excitement [surrounding him] in many years. Usher is the ultimate entertainer."

IMMATURE The Journey (MCA)





Radio is jumping all over the eerie first track, "Give Up the Ghost," which features Bizzy Bones rapping in his dizzying style. It's a positive song imploring everyone to give up the old ways and pay attention to the Ten Commandments.

Other songs like "Tamika" and "I'm Not a Fool," showcase the twin lead vocals of Batman and LDB. "Ooh Wee," featuring Dazz, is a cool bend of hip-hop and R&B, while the killer ballad "Extra Extra," produced by Keith Sweat, is intricate and heartfelt.

Large/medium markets are numbers 20 to 50, and small markets will encompass all stations below number 50. This will also be the debut year for Urban A/C Station of the Year and Artist of the Year awards. The Urban A/C format, with its heavy dominance in the 25-54 demo and its increasing effect on record sales, deserves its own category. And finally, because of some outstanding work at several labels this year, I've included a Comeback Label of the Year award.

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Rock Picks

BRUTAL TRUTH Sounds of the Animal Kingdom (Relapse)

If you want to blow away pretty much any abrasive band on your playlist, look no further than Brutal Truth. This group is probably one of the only grindcore bands that can give other grindcore bands nightmares. "Extreme" doesn't even begin to describe the incessant guitar torturing and animal-like screams that careen off this CD. The band's brutal approach to music is echoed lyrically in the socio-political topics it chooses to address. "Dementia," the first track, quickly introduces the band's double-time grindcore prowess, picking up speed like a starved, rabiesinfested pittbill let loose at a cat convention. "Blue World" is slowerpaced, but stalks through a maze of sludge-filled angst. "Vision" showcases traditional death metal rhythms while the guitars run wild like a pack of serial killers at back-toschool night. "Jemenez Cricket" showcases a little more melody, but without out any trace of subtlety; excellent demonic vocals and guitars are incorporated in this one. "Average People" and "Dead Smart" are a couple more tunes that'll invoke fear and dread among your

listeners. Scare the hell out of yourself. Check out *Sounds of the Animal Kingdom*.

HUMANS BEING My Demons Disagree (Pressure Point)

The Boston-based band Humans Being boast huge mouthfuls of tripletongue growls and showcases a thick array of grizzly riffs. The band's debut, My Demons Disagree, produced by Glen Robinson (GWAR, 5 Seconds Expire, Cycle Sluts From Hell, Annihilator), will encourage your nocturnal listeners to crawl out from the basement and turn up the volume. The CD's title implies that the band's demons are in conflict, but, yours will be in total agreement regarding the dark depth of abrasivness and aggression Humans Being provides. The only thing my demons are quarreling about is which track to play first and which track to use to exorcise the born again Christians from the apartment above mine. I'll probably play all the tracks, because the crunchy guitars come flying through them all like a body through a windshield after a head-on collusion. The guitars screech wretched chords over battered vocals that end with a thud from the rhythm section. Human Being's debut is an excellent tool for maintaining the belligerent aggressive and edge of any metal show.



A3 PICKS PAUL SIMON 3 Songs From The Capeman (Warner Bros.)

Nobody writes a lyric like Paul Simon. Witness the opening verse of "Trailways Bus," where a scene is set so beautifully, you know your ears are in the gentle hands of an amazing artist. By combining the spirits of "America," "Me and Julio Down by the Schoolyard," and "Hearts and Bones,"

"Trailways Bus" travels a northern route to Washington D.C. As each word is sung, and as images of farmlands, Arizona, and Texas fly by, Simon is clearly at the very top of his game. It's easy to imagine Ruben Blades singing "Yes, I am an alien from Mars/I come to work from outer space," on a Broadway stage, for which *The Capeman* was

conceived. Two more songs, "I'm From Puerto Rico" and a Buddy Holly-sweet "Bernadette" (the first single) hint at what can only be a Paul Simon masterpiece. We anxiously await the remainder of Songs From the Capeman. It can't be anything but great.

JONATHA BROOK "Crumbs" (Refuge/MCA)

We were beginning to worry that Jonatha Brooke might not resurface soon enough. While hearing her voice behind battery and tire commercials assured us she was doing fine, what of the follow-up to her first solo album? Having finally signed with Don Gehman's Refuge imprint, here's the answer to a dozen prayers—a dozen new songs sung in the voice of an angel, unmistakably Jonatha. The opening "Secrets and Lies" (now not only the name of a great

movie, but a cool song) shows her in typically fine form, her breathy phrasing unequaled in the crowded arena of female vocals.

"Crumbs," the first radio track is beautifully produced and layered. After that and "Secrets and Lies," there's ten more to love and learn. More on those once the complete album reaches radio's hands.

HOLLY COLE Dark Dear Heart (Capitol/Metro Blue)

We've been watching Holly Cole since her debut, *Blame It on My Youth*, in 1992. After three studio albums and last year's live *It Happened One Night*, Holly has now combined nearly all the brightest elements of her past with her extreme talents as a stylist, coming up with one steady, consistent effort produced by Larry



Klein. We already have the sensitivity of Paula Cole, the mystery of Fiona Apple, the ethereal quality of Sarah McLachlan, and the organic appeal of Natalie Merchant; while Holly Cole adds something new, a smoldering quality to the Triple A music mix. Electric high points for us include "You Want More," "World Seems to Come and Go," "Onion Girl," and a cover of the Beatles' "I've Just Seen a Face," now enjoying A3 airplay. If you're looking for the old Holly, try Joni Mitchell's "River," potentially eerie territory for producer Klein (Joni's ex-beau). Nevertheless, we'd rate Dark Dear Heart the best of Holly Cole to date.

PETE BELASCO Get it Together (Verve Forecast)

Here's a rare find—an unknown artist, signed off an unsolicited

demo tape, who nicely combines the elements of jazz, blues, and lounge. Pete Belasco seems a little caught in a time warp, recording music that our College Editor Vinnie might unsuspectingly dig if we packaged it in a cheese-ball '60s cover. Using an arsenal of players (including bassist Christian McBride), Belasco adds Denny



McLain cocktail organ and sexy sax lines to songs with enough blues grit to merit Triple A consideration. In fact, Jody Denberg included the opening "All I Want" to his add list this week. Part Austin Powers, part low rent Mose Allison—check out Pete Belasco. We absolutely guarantee you have nothing like this currently on your playlist.

If Not For You

Bob Dylan On A3

ewsweek and Time magazines; I only buy them at airports. Keith and I are on our way to Art Good's Catalina Smooth Jazz festival, only an hour's hop south on dreaded Southwest

Airlines. But you have to arrive pret-BORS - JFK HOAX - EL NIÑO - MARY ALBERT ty early to get one of those grubby plastic boarding passes with a low number to insure an early board before the family travelers take up all of the overhead cargo space. Keith and Kent-pink boarding pass numbers 23 and 24--now have about an hour to kill, and that's when I see him. Bob Dylan on the cover of Newsweek snapped by Richard Avedon, staring me down for what-buying cheese and peanut butter crackers with a million different chemical preservatives? I lay down a fiver for Bob and a packet of Keeblers, and I'm set for the flight ahead.

Bob Dylan on the cover of Newsweek! It's not often that the mainstream press and pop music overlap, especially in this era of fragmentation, where one artist no longer conveniently sums up the entire music buying public. The photos inside are way cool and the article is a good one, though noticeably thin on direct quotes. Only about a fraction of it goes goo-goo with that Spokesman-for-a-generation stuff, I can even picture Bob sitting in an airport lounge somewhere—just as bored as I am—reading the article, bailing out at the midsection where it gets too analytical, skimming the rest, and catching the last paragraph just to get the gist and conclusion.

A few days later, an inch-thick stack of press clippings arrive, and it's immediately obvious that this is no ordinary Bob album. Robert Hilburn of the *L.A. Times* has the audacity to rate both Dylan's version and "the Hilburn edit," minus three or four songs he considers half-baked. A lot of people are jazzed about the Daniel Lanois reunion and the choice of sidemen. The album is a beauty, gathering comparisons to *Blonde on Blonde*

and *Blood on the Tracks*, especially takes like "Tryin' to Get to Heaven," with the line most of the writers are quoting ("when you think that you've lost everything/you find out you can always lose a little more").

First week out, the album moves 100K units, about triple the company's maximum expectations. That's when we began asking serious questions about radio's role in all this. Here's an artist that's not only mounting up some serious press and sales, but who, arguably,

invented what accounts for 75% of our format's content, that is, stream of consciousness writing. So we hit the phones for a little radio reaction.



"We reviewed it again in our music meeting and found another song to add. We originally played 'To Make You Feel My Love' and now 'Lovesick.' The press definitely had an influence. When first got the album, we were excited to get a new Bob Dylan, but when we listened, we thought it sounded like it was recorded in a garage. We were disappointed, but we know he's Bob, so we have to play him. We didn't play anything off the sampler, but when we got the whole album, it had a song that was already familiar to our audience thanks to Billy Joel, who did 'To Make You Feel My Love' and provided the perfect way for our listeners to instantly relate. Now that they're used to the sound of the album, we realized it was important to go back and look for something else. Regarding the sales, it created a big picture, proving Dylan important and viable, and proving that our listeners are interested."


Ring ring. KGSR-Austin. Jody Denberg, Program Director.

"I thought Dylan himself best assessed the record in *Newsweek* when he said, 'It is spooky because I feel spooky. I don't feel in tune with anything. I don't think it eclipses anything from my earlier period, but I think it might be shocking in its bluntness.' Here's a guy who, everyone assumed, was writing about himself, even though he denied it at the time. Now here's a record with no artifice, pretty straight-ahead, only he's a depressed old Jewish man, which is how he portrays himself. I love the record. It's not especially airplayready, mainly because it's so raw and his voice is still pinched, but we consider him a core artist, and I don't really care how he tests or about other people's rationale for not playing him. It's a strong new record, and our listeners want to hear it. We chose 'Dirt Road Blues' because it's uptempo and 'Til I Fell in Love With You.' We put the record in-actually the four-song sampler-before receiving any press. These days, the press doesn't affect what we do. The local press gave the Stones' album a star and a half, and we're going strong with two tracks. But it was tough just having the first four songs, two being six and seven minutes long. That's another reason we chose 'Dirt Road Blue,' because it was shorter. I like having the whole record, because it shows what a complete work it is. Plus, there's a lot of Texans on it, which is a selling point for me. There's Augie Meyer from the Texas Tornadoes, Cindy

Cashdollar from Asleep at the Wheel, Duke Robillard from the Fabulous Thunderbirds, and Jim Dickenson, who produced local bands like True Believers, Joe King Carrasco, and Green on Red. That's a lot of connections. We play tons of Bob Dylan beyond 'Tangled up in Blue.,' with probably 15-to-20 active songs."

"I was excited to see Dylan back together with Daniel Lanois. Oh Mercy was a heck of a record—the best Dylan album of the '80s-and I wasn't disappointed in Time out of Mind. I was just reading the Newsweek article, where Dylan says he feels spooky; I love Bob when he sounds spooky. I found some good, loping, swinging songs. 'Million Miles' was the first to hit me, it's a real serious airplay contender with that slow swing, combined with the fact that, when Dylan is having love problems, he can make them sound epic. It took me a while to get into the original four-track sampler, which I feel did its job, giving a good, indicative taste. Originally we felt 'Lovesick' was a stretch for radio play, but it also softened us up a bit for the record's different feel and sound. Once I crossed the hump, this record was as easy to get behind as the Stones record.

Crooklyn

This past weekend, we had a couple of interesting "beat" shows roll through the foggy city, Om's Deep Concentration tour (a must-see if you are able to get through the door since it will surely be a sold out show) and WordSound's WordSound I Powa showcase. I had to dip by these shows solo, as my man Matt Brown was grounded at home with a weekendlong cold.

Now, I knew the Deep Concentration tour was going to be bangin'- as Cut Chemist, DJs Wally & Swingsett, and others were tearing shit up on the one and two-but I must admit, I was a little ignorant on WordSound. Thanks to the efforts of Green Galactic's Susan Mainzer (213-466-5141) however, 1 was completely blown away by what I experienced at S.F.'s Maritime Hall.

The WordSound label/collective was started back in '93 by a cat named S.H. "Skiz" Fernandez, Jr., whom you may recognize as the author of The New Beats: Exploring the Music, Culture, and Attitudes of Hip-Hop. To date, the collectivewhich consists of way too many members to mention them all, but includes Professor Shehab, Dr. Israel, Prince Paul, Bill Laswell, and HIM—has released a total of 23 records, all independently. The crew is from varied backgrounds, from Rastafarian to Iranian, but they share a love of dub, hip-hop, and all things bass heavy. The label's name comes from a Rastafarian expression, "Wordsound have power," which, as explained in their catalog, "acknowledges the spiritual energy that emanates from the combination of words and sounds, language and rhythm, text and ambience.

The day after the show, I hooked up with Skiz to discuss his smallbut-powerful label.

"One thing people still fail to realize is that WordSound is not really a label in the traditional sense," says Skiz. "We are not concerned with hitting the charts, breaking groups, or making hits. WordSound is a guerilla think tank.

> banded together for the purpose of continual creativity. We're tired of what we hear on the radio, and what's being sold as 'underground'.

Indeed, one thing WordSound cannot be accused of is sounding like everyone else. With artists like Crooklyn Dub Consortium, Roots Control, and Scarab, much WS music is a dubadelic blend of heavy, heavy bass, smoky sample lavering, and fat-ass beats. Also thrown in the mix are drum & bass and Middle Eastern-flavored jams.

Skiz continues, "Our sound is really kind of raw and dirty. We're not coming from the standpoint of professional musicians—a lot of us can't even read music-it's all a matter of sound. Our environment has a lot to do with it; we live in an area of Brooklyn that is the epitome of post-industrial urban decay. It's like the belly of the beast. We've actually found a lot of inspiration in all of this illness, and that is what we're here to spread.

And while WordSound has yet to truly tap into America, "We have much more of a reputation in Europe," says Skiz. "Over there, it's not so genre specific, they're into having weird combinations of music.
