



Bottoms Up



The "Tanya Moment" was not unlike a glimpse Tanya gave radio programmers at the Country Radio Seminar a few months earlier, which NBC Dateline's Stone Phillips joked "gave a new meaning to the term 'news flash.'"

Sax...

Attempting to set a world record, sax player Kenny G played the longest single note ever on a saxophone. The Arista artist held an E flat for 45 minutes, 47 seconds at a demo at J&R Music World in New York, after warning fans that they might want to go get a cup of coffee because things could get "a little dull." Guinness Book of World Records Publisher Mark Young came up with the idea when he saw Kenny's circular breathing technique that allows breathing and playing at the same time. Sald the artist after his stunt: "I could have kept going but a plece of spit got in the way."

..and Violins

Blues musician Clarence Gatemouth Brown soothed the savage breasts of 140 passengers scheduled to fly from Johannesburg to Cape Town, South Africa. Left stranded in the terminal when their plane developed technical problems, the disgruntled passengers started getting rowdy in the airport's business class lounge...until Brown began playing his violin. The passengers were stranded 15 hours before their plane finally took off.










Dead Wrong

Fill-in host Phil Hendrie made it clear: KFI/AM-Los Angeles morning driver Bill Handel was fired for stealing paper clips, Xerox paper, headphones, a car radio, ramming his \$50,000 Suburban on the company lot, and then leaving the scene of the accident. The problem was, none of it was true. Handel, who admits to going absolutely berserk after hearing what Hendrie said about him, was on a three-day vacation in Vancouver. Hendrie, who was anything but contrite about his on-air accusations, observed that his satire was "very good promotion."

Taking a cue from Q (a.k.a. our Urban Editor Quincy McCoy), the Active Rock section reports trends regionally, plus tracks sales successes and tour numbers for acts that have crossed the barriers from Hard Rock playlists onto more mainstream airwaves.

Gavin Gets Hot

Radio is an ever-evolving medium, and so those who report on it must also continually change. To reflect a new trend in A/C playlists, Editor Ron Fell this year split his A/C panel into two units. "It's a better reflection of what's really going on," he says of the new Mainstream and Hot A/C charts. "By splitting the panel and adding more stations, we now more accurately follow songs and artists regardless of the tack they take."

A New Road

Chris Marino took the Americana helm in November when founding editor Rob Bleetstein left to pursue other musical interests. Marino came to GAVIN from the PD post at WRI.T-Cummings, Ga., which had won Americana Station of the Year at the Gavin Awards the previous February. For his part, Chris is driven to move the format forward by establishing links between radio, records, and retail. "We have a great opportunity," he says. "Especially if we all work together."



The Finish Line

started with a lot of blather in this column about game shows. That was because we were going to attempt the first ever Alternative Jeopardy at the GAVIN Seminar back in February. We pulled it off, but that was also the last time we will attempt this. The point is, the year started with such promiseas most usually do. The Enclave was still in business, Sandy Horowitz moved up in rank at Y107 in LA when Phil Manning moved to KNDD in Seattle. Jim McGuinn got blown up in Philly with WDRE, but wound up on his feet across town at Y100. Now, at the end of the year, Sandy got blown up at Y107, and The Enclave went south months ago.

We wrote about the bad '96 fall books at the beginning of '97. We wondered about the future of the format (this has now become a weekly thing). Then the Bosstones hit with "The Impression That I Get," and we kinda figured it out for another 15 minutes. At the same time, the "E" word reared it's ugly head, and I went on a crusade to make the industry (nay, the world) adopt "rhythmotech" as the official descriptor of all things electronic. Naturally, it didn't work. Or, I should say that as of this writing there is no evidence "rhythmotech" is catching on (in spite of my trying to get Crystal Method, Goldie, and Gavin from Bush to go along with it on Modern Rock Live one recent night). Hey, there's always next year; I'm not giving up.

On a brighter note, our GAVIN Alternative Anti-Charts became very popular this year. Especially this little number, which appeared just prior to the Seminar in New Orleans:

Special Seminar Anti-Behavior Bonus Chart:

Top 5 Tips to Skank the Weasels

- 1) Walk briskly through all hallways. Do not slow down. Master the onefoot-pivot-backward shuffle. This allows you to maintain forward momentum while acknowledging your attacker.
- 2) While in your hotel room, never. ever answer the phone.
- 3) Do not be seen at any central gathering point around dinner time. You could get roped into the "urong" dinner party.

- 4) Be very non-committal about dinner plans at all times.
- 5) Employ secret code words and hand signals to friends when trying to extricate yourself from dicey situ-

I swear I saw a number of people using these helpful hints last February.


Also at the February Seminar, we took Jukebox Jury into the 21st Century with hand-held audience measuring devices in addition to our panel of programmers. Third Eye Blind was the top vote getter, and wound up doing gangbusters at radio. We also wrote about Moby, K's Choice, Fluffy, James, Vallejo, BR5-49, Pulsars, Lightning Seeds, Pond. Radish, and Voodoo Glow Skulls just to name a few. Some will be back, some won't.

We got serious with music research this past summer, when Coleman Research gave us the exclusive on a national study they had just completed. Warren Kurtzman from Coleman presented the preliminary findings at this vear's Alternative Boot Camp in Boston. The bottom line? Know your market and program to it-no matter what the research tells you. And, ska and pop are bigger than we thought (although guitars ain't dead vet either).

We tried to discover the heart of America by taking a close look at markets like Peoria and Dayton. We went cross country to learn John Moschitta's secret for great ratings in the middle of Pennsylvania. Moschitta's now at WXDX in Pittsburgh, but at least we discovered Yuengling Lager. Somewhere in the middle of all this, the original Alternative Charter was unearthed. Here's how we published it:

HISTORIANS UNEARTH RARE DOCUMENT!

Archeologists digging at a remote site near Oingo Boingo's original practice garage found what is thought to be the lost Alternative Charter explaining everything. It's sort of the Rosetta Stone. Ten Commandments, Magna Carta, Constitution, and instructions for filling out an IRS 1040 short form all rolled into one. This is a very important find, since for years people have



- 1) Thou shalt play all music that does not sound like Foreigner, Journey, Aerosmith. etc. As long as it be not bad '70s AOR, it be OK 2) Thou shalt make baby bands like
- U2, R.E.M., the Cure, Pretenders. and Talking Heads thy core bands. Surround them with others who might one day be big.
- 3) Billy Idol is God. Follow him, for only be knoweth the true path.
- 4) You must rolate new songs heavily at first, for only your station playeth these songs in Sodom. Gomorrab has no outlet for this yet.
- 5) Thou shalt not use slogans like "New Wave," "Modern Rock," or "Alternative" on the air as to not scare the populous. They already think this music is weird enough.
- 6) Thou shall position thyself as merely a "Rock" station for the '80s. Albeit one that plays no Led Zeppelin or other bad AOR songs, but a rock station nonetheless. People will accept that.
- 7) One day consultants shall consort with thy station. Use only those who were among the "first.
- 8) Depeche Mode is God. Follow them, for only they knoweth the true path
- 9) Guitar rock will never come back.
- 10) "Indies?" What are indies?

All in all, it's been another fascinating year. But we're finally at the finish line. I get to take a break for a couple of weeks before jumping head first into final planning for the February Seminar in San Diego. As we leave the year, the industry is in greater transition than when it started. Just look at the Gavin Award nominees in the alternative category and consider how many of these people are not where they were just a few months ago (in some cases, weeks ago), on both the radio and record sides. 1998 will come in like a lion, and it will probably go out like a neighborhood cat that's been savaged by coyotes.

Get some rest, I'll see you in January.

Spice Girls, Savage Garden, and Hanson Herald the Return of Pop Music

Selecting an artist of the year for a song-driven format such as Top 40 is always difficult. So, as you might have guessed from the headline, I cheated and instead of one act, have chosen



three. But there is an explanation. Eavesdrop on just about any conversation regarding the format's phenomenal success in 1997, and there's a 99 percent

chance someone will point to Spice Girls,

Hanson, and Savage Garden as the keys that opened the floodgates for a sound considered passé just a few months earlier. Even more interesting is that these three acts are rarely mentioned individually but

rather usually in the same breath. I'll always remember hearing "Wannabe" in November of last year and being totally knocked out. Just a few weeks later, "I Want You" did the same thing. And then just a few days into 1997, Mike Preston (then APD/MD of WPLJ-New York) tipped me to something called "MMM Bop." A little more than a month later, that song toppled the competition dur-

ing the first ever Top 40 Jukebox Jury at our GAVIN Seminar. More than just Number One hits, these songs and artists revitalized mainstream pop music, and in so doing helped Top 40 radio enjoy one of its healthiest years in a long, long time.

A Jewel in the Radio Crown

For Jewel Kilcher, a little patience has certainly paid off. The Homer, Alaska native's debut Atlantic album, *Pieces of You*, produced by Ben Keith, was recorded at Neil Young's Broken

Arrow Ranch studios in Northern California and was released in late 1995. From it came a huge first single, "Who Will Save Your Soul," which was one of Adult Contemporary radio's biggest singles of 1996 (#25). Then came "You Were Meant for Me" in late '96, which went on to a 22-week run in our A/C

The 23-year old Jewel is striking while the iron is hot. Not only was she one of the most critically acclaimed stars of the trend-setting Lilith Fair concert series, she's also committed to writing prose and books, and she'll appear in her first feature film, a civil war era epic, *To Live On*, late next year.

Now on their third release, *When I Was Born for the 7th Time*, the quintet has taken it to another level by incorporating the production work of the Automator (Dr. Octagon), and the vocal talents of Bomb the Bass' Justin Warfield and Tarnation's Paula Frazer.

While the fusion of East Indian influences with pop sprouted in the late '60s/early '70s with songs such as Dave Pike's "Mantra," Ravi Harris and the Prophets, and other relatively obscure acts, it is the London-based Cornershop that has found the right ingredients to appeal to the global village. As frontman Tjinder Singh explains, there is "something for everyone: from country to brunch with hip-hop, cricket on the lawn with Punjabi folk music, and a squaredance before dinner with the most righteous of beats." Righteous, indeed.

Sevendust: It Began With a Seminar

Choosing just one group for hard rock/metal Artist of the Year is not an easy task. Several acts have enjoyed a good dose of success in terms of

airplay, touring, and sales this year, but there's one that shines brighter than the rest: Sevendust.

In less than three years, Sevendust has gone from a little-known Atlanta-based band to one of the hottest up-and-coming hard rock acts to cross over to commercial rock and alternative radio.

Discovered at GAVIN's 1996 Seminar in Atlanta, Sevendust quickly made its mark at hard rock/metal radio with a combination of low-end rhythms, melodic hooks, and Lajon Witherspoon's elastic vocals.

When the band's self-titled debut was released last February, it quickly landed on metal charts across the board_and spent_eight consecutive weeks at Number One on GAVIN's Hard Rock chart. It's currently GAVIN Rocks' longest charting title, with 39 consecutive weeks and counting.

Part of the Sevendust's longevity on the charts



and its appeal to hard rock radio is due to its inventive approach to hard music, especially Witherspoon's charismatic vocals. Instead of growling, screaming, shouting, or snorting, Whitherspoon actually sings. This has struck a

chord with programmers who are tired of cliché, high-pitched screams and guttural growls of hum-drum 'metal" bands. Add the band's aggressive hooks and infinite melodies to Whitherspoon's exceptional vocal range, and you have all the right ingredients.

With solid support from the hard rock/metal format, Sevendust sales blossomed—a fact that didn't escape the notice of alternative and Active Rock stations. "Black" was the first single worked to commercial rock stations, and it wasn't long before WRCX, WRIF, WXTB, KRXQ, WLZR, KBER, KTUX, WXRK, and WAAF, just to name a few, started spinning the track.

Armed with several Active Rock adds and generating more spins each week, Sevendust is now averaging 2,500 units a week sold. Not bad for a band that came from the lowly depths of "metal." Hopefully, Sevendust's success will encourage commercial rock radio to take more chances and help to dispel the notion that hard rock/metal radio doesn't break records.



Ricky Skaggs: Welcome Home

Every once in a while, an artist comes along whose talent is so big that not recognizing it should be grounds for a flogging. Ricky Skaggs is one of those artists. He burst onto the country music scene in 1981 with four number one hits and two CMA awards and, let's face it, that's when country was country. By then, Ricky was already a seasoned veteran, because by the ripe old age of 7, he had already performed on the Flatt and Scruggs' television show. Then in 1970, Skaggs (now 16) and childhood buddy Keith Whitley became members of Ralph Stanley's the Clinch Mountain Boys. After four years with Stanley, Ricky moved on to bands like the Country Gentleman, J. D. Crow and the New South, and Boone Creek, and was an integral part of Emmylou Harris's Hot Band.

OK, enough of the past. Let's move forward to

1997. This year has been an incredible year for Ricky, especially in reference to Americana. First, there was his top 5 charting release *Life Is*



a Journey on Atlantic.
And as I write this piece, his Rounder release Bluegrass Rules is currently at #3 with a bullet. Add to that his tellar appearance at In the Pines, a cover story in No Depression, and a TNN show that featured artists such

George Jones and Elvis Costello (together, no less). Throughout his career Ricky Skaggs has never compromised his musical integrity, and that is why he is editor's choice for Americana Artist of the Year. You the man, Ricky!

Chris Botti Tops the Pops

The Smooth Jazz artist community is such a diverse and accessible group of individuals, we were hard pressed to name just one editors' choice for Smooth Jazz Artist of the Year. Boney James, Rick Braun, Jeff Golub, Peter White, Craig Chaquico, and Richard Elliot, among others, sprang to mind.

We chose Chris Botti because of his well-crafted musical vision. He has combined elements of progressive rock, funk, R&B, pop, and jazz to create his own unique voice. On the Verve Forecast release, *Midnight Without You*, his

work with Paul Buchanan and Paul Joseph Moore of Blue Nile, singer Jonatha Brooke, and producer/engineer Kevin Killen (Peter Gabriel, Paula Cole) helped elevate Smooth Jazz to a hipper level. His live band, with rock guitarists Shane Fontavne and Marc Shulman, gives his performances an expanded edge. Yet tracks like "Regroovable" and "The Way Home" haven't veered over his audience's heads, either onstage or on the air.



When discussing his music, Chris is passionate about continuing to expand barriers. His music typifies Smooth Jazz radio's need to be progressive-yet-still-pop-enough to stay mass appeal. Perhaps that's why *Midnight Without You* was able to top our Smooth Jazz chart in the beginning *and* the end of 1997—and for Botti to also be nominated for GAVIN Smooth Jazz Artist *and* Album of the Year honors!

The Wallflowers Cap Two Big Years

In selecting this year's A3 Artist of the Year, we had to turn the clock back to April 19, 1996 (GAVIN #2101) when we selected the Wallflowers as "the next big A3 act." A full 20 months later, the band is indisputably our A3 1997 Artists of the Year, even amidst a bevy of strong female

In August of '96, the band performed at the Fox Theater during the fourth GAVIN A3 Summit. Meanwhile the videos kicked in, endearing Jakob Dylan to millions of viewers. By the 1997 GAVIN Seminar, the Wallflowers picked up two GAVIN Awards, for Artist of the Year and Album of the

Year. Based on the album's 1997 staying power, the Wallflowers are nominated again this year for the same categories. With over 36,000 A3 spins to



their credit, we congratulate the Wallflowers, 1997's GAVIN A3 Artists of the Year.

Busta Rhymes: The Complete Package

There are more than a few likely candidates for 1997 Gavin Rap Artist of the Year, so making this choice was difficult. Many a soloist has gone gold or platinum, had that irresistible radio smash, pulled off the incredible video, or become a "star." But once I looked for someone with all the elements that combine to create the consummate artist, the answer was clear.

Busta Rhymes has it all. The sparkling, unpredictable persona. The style that cannot be duplicated. The larger-than-life stage and screen presence, balanced with affable confidence and sincerity when he interacts with fans or demanding industry folk. He has the respect of his contemporaries as an emcee who paid dues, persevered, and is at last enjoying well-deserved fame and fortune. And most important, he is the master of his flow, which is identical to none. He knows exactly how write, deliver, and sell a hit record—and he is able to weave these hits seamlessly into albums that anyone from 8 to 80 can appreciate, leaving the haters no choice but to congratulate.

I've loved Busta since the beginning, when he was one powerful fourth of Leaders of the New School, the groundbreaking purveyors of hiphop's Golden Age. Developing relationships with artists I admire is one of my position's

greatest benefits. But I never thought I'd meet, let alone host, two GAVIN Seminar Award shows with 'Bus-A-Bus,' then watch up close as he whipped DJs—who are often the harshest critics—into an



ecstatic frenzy with live performances. I've thoroughly enjoyed watching Busta Rhymes' rise, and I'm not convinced we've seen him peak yet. So it is my honor to elect him as my format's Artist of the Year, and by extension congratulate Elektra Entertainment on a career well built.

Looking Head GAVIN EDITORS PREDICT THE FUTURE OF THEIR FORMATS

A3: Crossover and competition, the two C's that plague and bless the A3 format, will remain in force come 1998. What will be interesting is how we perceive and use those two forces.

It's no secret that Triple A's musical sense encouraged competitive formats to cherry-pick our roster, transplanting those artists onto a slick, mass appeal, Top 40ish format. This development only leads to more questions. Will A3 continue to allow itself to be niched by Modern A/C? Will such a niche eventually burn out or prosper? Or will Modern A/C give way to the next radio trend come 1999? Witness the plight of alternative, an important radio force which was used and abused, only to be tossed aside like a used piece of Kleenex when the next dance trend reared its head. How does A3 avoid making the same mistakes?

Will A3 regain its sense of musical exclusivity, or is this even necessary to compete in the world of consolidation? Instead of breaking new music, 1997's A3 credo became, who else is playing it? Will A3 regain its crown as the King of Crossover, the place where good music starts? Or is the format content to merely participate in the larger process of discovering new talent and banking on familiarity to boost its ratings? Tough questions loom for 1998.

TOP 40: For someone who gets tons of practice each week trying to make prognostications about which NFL team will or won't cover the spread and what six numbers will hit the lottery, trying to figure out what will happen in Top 40 should come as second nature, right? Obviously, I've struck out on that lottery plan more than once, since I'm here contributing my text to this feature.

So here goes: I'm guessing programmers will no longer try to find songs people like and play 'em a lot. Who needs that? And those huge, expensive promotions? Forget about those, too. Oh, and forget long stop sets. How about one hour of commercials followed by three hours of non-stop music instead?

Reality, of course, says there's about as much chance that any of those scenarios will happen as there is that the President and First Lady will spend Christmas in Baghdad. Instead, the hits will keep on comin', with fresh melodies and inventive, relatable lyrics being the keys to success. Stations that are more than music machines—the ones that truly entertain and become part of their listeners' day-to-day existence—will prevail. One final thought: Don't be surprised if rock has a bit of a Top 40 revival in '98.

ALTERNATIVE: After once again channeling the spirit of Nostradamus for a few minutes this morning, I am prepared to report to you the following:

- 1) By summer of 1998, all radio stations will belong to one company that will go by the name of Chancellorhouse-cor.
- 2) By November, Chancellorhouse-cor will divest itself of all radio properties. The market will become flooded with radio stations for sale, causing prices to drop to a point where ordinary music directors will be able to buy a radio station in a major market for no more than the price of your average sport utility vehicle. Hundreds of PDs will be fired by hundreds of formerly disgruntled MDs. GMs will be forced to do overnights.
 - 3) Fat Boy Slim wins Grammy for Best New Artist.
- 4) Prodigy puts out an album of Madonna covers. Their version of "Lucky Star" is the theme to the next *Batman* movie and becomes the second biggest selling single of all time (last year's cover of "Papa Don't Preach" by Rollins was the biggest).

PAP: 1998 will be the year commercial radio promotes "peace on the

streets," "no color lines," and "unity in the community" in an attempt to align itself with the rap-buying public. However, the emphasis will be on playing hip-hop *influenced* R&B records, especially those with high-powered rap cameos or hip-hop production styles under smooth grooves.

The marquis artists who already have platinum track records will go relatively unscathed. Unfortunately for the rest, the window for straight-up rap jams will close even more. The only hip-hop joints that will get day-parted rotation will be the ones that are so hot on the streets that radio must play them to meet audience demand. And even then, limited mixshow play is more likely than a commercial add. (Promoters and marketers, this means you must place heavy fiscal emphasis on street coverage for your artists before you even *think* of radio!)

This in turn will send non-commercial sounding but retail friendly hiphop and street-based music back underground. Westside Connection, Scarface, and Master P have proven that well-woven, gritty urban tales will always have their niche. The retail-driven 12-inch niche is also growing due to radio's narrowcasting of rap; Lord Tariq & Peter Gunz, Natural Resource, and J-Live are evidence of this. Their success proves once and for all that non-commercial rap radio does sell records. Emcees and labels, remember this, because you'll always have to come back to non-comms.

JAZZ: Jazz radio needs to identify its audience and focus on what kind of music turns them on and makes them feel good. If that means adopting forms of audience research and computer song selection systems instead of traditionally pulling music a few hours before air time, then so be it. Jazz radio has suffered from hourly cutbacks in favor of NPR-styled news and information. Yet done correctly, many major market jazz stations are beating the stuffing out of politically correct NPR nationally syndicated talk. It's time to tighten up musically and turn back the tide of our core audience getting older and older. We lost broadcast hours in Philly and Cleveland, and stations in major cities like Washington D.C. Jazz radio can no longer be all things to all listeners. —KEITH ZIMMERMAN

COLLEGE: As we all know, college radio is about as predictable as NBA superstars, so we have rounded up two "experts" on the subject to lend us a hand: Karen Dere of Tripek Records, the Bay Area's version of "Ms. Thang," and Mark B. of Om Records. The consensus: What college radio could use is an infusion of organic, soul-based influences in today's so called "electronica." This is not to be confused with that silly "acid-jazz" term; we mean artists like Roni Size, Coldcut, Portishead, and Om's own 80 Mile Beach, who all manage to maintain the human element without sounding dated. We also agree that re-issues will appear even more on our chart, as kids continue to discover the roots and inspirations of today's ground-breaking artists.

SMOOTH JAZZ: Smooth Jazz radio has enjoyed mushrooming Arbitron ratings, TSL, and cume over the past year. Yet it needs to decide if it's going to complete the evolution toward being a singles-oriented format. Can instrumental songs measure up to repeated spins like hit records on Top 40, alternative, and country stations? Careful. One track per release may not automatically be the answer.

Smooth Jazz radio has to keep thinking of ways to expand its promotional strengths on the street. So far, it's done an incredible job with CD samplers, hip charity functions, and dazzling listener concerts which have kept them a step ahead, but the competition is never too far behind.

One big challenge for the Smooth Jazz genre, now that we have an

established and impressive core artist base, is to figure out ways to spark record sales and bypass the voodoo notion that adult listeners are passive, family-oriented, couch-potato types who don't buy CDs.

URBAN: Let's face it: programming has changed drastically over the last few years. Deregulation and station consolidation have forced our business into rigid, bottom-line economic policies and have increased workloads for programmers, many of whom now have to oversee two or three stations. Radio mergers have increased the demand for more syndicated programming, as owners seek to differentiate their formats while cutting programming staffs.

As a result, the days of program directors whose only qualifications for the job were "good ears" and "people skills" are quickly vanishing from the landzcape. Today's ideal PD has to have great marketing skills, be Aribitron smart, profit-oriented, and an aggressive coach who demands high performance from his or her team players. The contemporary ideal is a motivator who can combine rapport and the ability to pass along wisdom with a talent for listening. You must commit yourself to empowering and educating your employees. Your future is at stake.

country: In 1998, I believe Nashville record labels will recommit themselves to developing existing artists, introducing just one or two new acts per year. I'm excited about this, because there are some potential superstars who could break through with the right music and attention. I also hope to see more diversity in the music and artists that do break through. We can't be afraid to draw a little outside the lines. It only adds excitement to the format—something we've lacked a bit this year. Hopefully, 1998 will be the year of embracing more variety in country music and country radio. 1997 was definitely the year of the women, so will 1998 be the year of the men? We'll just have to wait and see.

A/C: In 1998, the core artists of the Hot A/C format will be expected to repeat themselves by making follow-up albums with as many or more hits than on their previous efforts. This is necessary because the format will even-

tually be expected to develop a stable of artists, rather than merely individual songs, to solidify a relationship with the audience. Hot A/C will continue to borrow liberally from Top 40, but hopefully will not remain as white as it has been in years past. There are many talented acts of all backgrounds whose music would fit if only the format would give them a chance.

Meanwhile, mainstream A/C needs a serious kick in the butt. It's become even more boring than at any other time in the past quarter of a century. Mainstream A/C is far too safe and defensively programmed to survive through the millennium. Erosion has set in on all sides. A/C is under siege! Wake up and smell the napalm!

AMERICANA: With visionaries like Seymore Stein of Sire Records Group now investing in the Americana movement, the prospects for growth are bright.

Still, 1998 will be a crucial year for the Americana format. Expectations are high, and we have to be ready to capitalize on the music industry's new commitment to this format. How do we do this? One important step is to build on our successes, and there have been quite a few. Artist's careers are developing, and stations like KHYI, WMLB, KVOO, KFDI, KTJJ, and KNBT are thriving—and these events are just now starting to translate into record sales.

I have never met an artist who thought his or her obscurity was too hip to trade in for success, my long-term goal is to make this the commercially viable format that it deserves to be. If the advance CDs I'm receiving are any indication of the music we'll be receiving this year, we're off to a good start.

ROCKS: 1998 will witness more hard rock acts crossing over to Active Rock radio. Bands like P*st On, Limp Bizkit, Sevendust, C.O.C., Snot, and Fu Manchu—and of course the no-brainers Megadeth and Metallica—have nudged the doors open a little wider for the new year's harder acts. It will still be a long and trying effort, however, as most Active Rock stations will continue to be wary of anything that doesn't have an impressive sales record. But the fact that the above mentioned bands had a strong run at Active Rock this year is a good sign that the trend toward edgier rock bands will continue.

On Black Consultants

"I think that we've evolved in the business to where the black consultant should no longer be the rare exception. Black radio in the last few years has applied-very

successfully-real strategic planning, just like Top 40 and pop radio have done through the years. We're proving that many of our best programmers and GMs are able to handle planning, budgets, and formatics, as well as the cultural awareness that comes with the job of urban radio consulting."

"Even today, there are a lot of black-owned stations where the operator is not inclined to hire a black consultant to work with them. That's another issue, but with the shrinking number of black-owned stations, the bigger concern is to change the mindset of the prevailing powers that be."

On Personality Radio

"It's a fact that we basically killed a generation of up-and-coming personalities in the early '80s when we went to the "more music, less talk" mode. That has paved the way to fame for the few personalities that are left. Black radio is returning to its personality roots."

"Programmers should share the blame when their stations lack talent. Sometimes we don't allow jocks the opportunities to display their true potential. Imagine if you did not have someone in your life who believed in your ability and took a chance on you: where would you be today? Extend your personalities the same opportunity. Let them demonstrate what they can do; you may be surprised."

"It's a shame that we have to look at it this way instead of us just being qualified people doing our jobs. It's nice to know that we're recognized as African Americans in these positions, but it would really be nice to be recognized as the best people for the jobs."

On Competition

"You know what's really scarvand this goes beyond radio and records. As the 20th Century

comes to a close, I see the world paying more attention to being right than to being sensitive to people. We've become too competitive, and everything is about numbers. How much do I get paid? How much cume did I have? What is my gross national product? Did we come in Number One? Not did we help some people along the way or make the world a more comfortable place for people. Today it's not how we win; it's did we win! All we care about is being Number One!" —Chris Jonz, Senior National Promotion Director, Warner Bros. Jazz and Urban A/C

On Branding

"I have a BS in marketing and I'm completing requirements on an MBA, so I tend to view the station as a product. A lot of PDs don't market to the listeners. What I try to do is make sure we sell ourselves as a brand. We make sure the promotions that we do marry with what our consumers/listeners want. With consolidation, it makes sense for programmers to be as business savvy as GMs about things like gaining market share and learning the lingo of marketing."

"Branding, the latest industry buzz word for a winning strategy, has the suits in our business actually thinking of ways to form emotional attachments with listeners. They're looking to establish a distinct attitude that appeals to the listeners' sense of the world, real or imagined; a station they just don't listen to, but one they feel a part of. In today's world of consolidation, it is critical for stations to be unique in the minds of their listeners. But for branding to be effective, radio operators will have to take a leap of faith, beyond the positioning mantras and formula formats, and into the creative process of emotional imaging and the vibrancy of improvisation. Radio faces no greater challenge than to engage in and promote creativity in order for stations to profit and prosper.

On Consolidation

"Urban radio has been going through a period of urban renewal. With deregulation, Congress allowed almost unlimited station ownership, predicting the changes would increase investments and create thousands of jobs. Everybody has seen the investment part of the scenario come true, as big media companies continue to swallow up smaller companies and stand-alones. The banks, investment bankers, and stockholders are all very happy. but I haven't noticed an increase in jobs. As with conventional urban renewal, black broadcasters were among the first to be consolidated because of their vulnerabilitv. Consolidation has led to downsizing, format changes, and the lowest number of black-owned stations in decades. With the death of the minority tax certificate, the finite number of radio licenses available, and the banking industry's sole interest in funding multiple station deals, the possibility of increasing the numbers of small and minority owners is minute. Consolidation can be scary, too."

On Syndication

"Syndicators used to create products that they thought radio wanted and then threw them out there. You can't do that any more. One of the first things I did was go to radio and find out what they really needed, rather than trying to shove something down their throats."

When I was confronted with a problem or needed information concerning a certain issue, I would seek out an individual who was an expert in that area. I think one of the mistakes that young people make today is expecting very busy people to adopt them. It's not realistic. You need to remember that you don't need a long term, oneon-one situation to accomplish what you want or need.






