BOSTON--1930 CONVENTION CITY

77HEN the delegates assemble in Boston for the 1930 Convention they will find, as the wag once said, "Boston is not a city but a state of mind," and if ever a city was founded on definite idea Boston certainly was. This town of Boston," Emerson once said, "has a history." "It is not an accident, not a windmill, or a railroad station, a crossroad tavern, or an army barracks grown up by time and luck to a place of wealth; but a seat of humanity. of men of principle, obeying a sentiment and marching loyally whither that should lead them; so that its annals are great historical lines, inextricably national, part of the history of political liberty."

The visitor to Boston is generally attracted first to the points of historic interest, the landmarks that signify the Birth of American Liberty and the establishment of our great nation.

First settled in 1630 by the English Puritans, Boston has always been foremost in National, Educational, and Intellectual advancement, and we mention briefly here a few of the old buildings and locations where were enacted many of the important events in the progress of New England.

The English ships carrying the Puritan settlers advanced, on their arrival, up Boston Harbor, four-teen miles long and dotted with beautiful islands. It was at the head of this harbor at what is now the foot of State Street that the famous Boston Tea Party occurred, December 16, 1773, where many Boston patriots disguised as Indians threw a cargo of tea overboard from an English ship as a protest at the tax on tea.

At the head of State Street stands the old State House which should be visited by all, as it is perfectly preserved and a true example of early Colonial architec-

ture. At the back of the old State House, also on State Street, occurred the Boston Massacre.

At the head of School Street stands King's Chapel, built of granite, an impressive old church surrounded by its graveyard where lie many of the earlier distinguished sons of Massachusetts, and further along on Tremont Street, back of the noted Park Street Church, is the old Granary Burying Ground, also the long-treasured resting place of many Bostonians of Revolutionary fame.

Facing Tremont Street is Boston Common, a tract of forty-eight acres used by the early settlers as a cow pasture but long held by the City of Boston as an historic park. From the earliest Colonial times down through the days of the great World War, when the Common was the scene of many stirring meetings and events, it has loomed large in the history of our country. It was here the British Army made its camp and it was also here that the boys of Boston insisted on their right to play and had their claim allowed by the British general. The hill in the center is surmounted by the beautiful

monument "built by a grateful city" to its sons "who died on land and sea in the war which kept the Union whole, destroyed slavery and maintained the Constitution."

Across the Common on the summit of the hill, on Beacon Street, stands the wonderful Massachusetts State House, with its gilded dome, an historic masterpiece of the great architect Charles Bulfinch. Additions have been made from time to time but the original building completed in 1798 has been carefully preserved. Besides the usual offices and halls of the state departments you will be especially interested in Doric Hall where the battle flags of Massachusetts are reverently displayed.

Two churches stand out as real historical landmarks—the Old North Church and the Old South Meeting House—and

In the Metropolitan Area are more than 200 universities, colleges, normal and technical schools, music and art institutions and private schools.

Among them are Harvard University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Boston University, Tufts College, Wellesley College, Radcliffe College, Simmons College, Boston College, the New England Conservatory of Music and Boston Normal Art School. The first five—among the ten largest educational institutions in New England—have a total registration of nearly 20,000 students.

Metropolitan Boston contains 125 public libraries, with a total of nearly 3,090,000 books. Another 3,000,000 volumes are to be found in the colleges and special libraries.

Municipal Boston's world-renowned library at Copley Square with its thirty-

Sudbury, in this community is the famous "Wayside Inn," scene of Longfellow's "Tales of a Wayside Inn," built in 1686, and now owned by Henry Ford.

Cambridge, the home of Harvard University, the oldest college in America; Longfellow's House; and the site of the Washington Elm, under which tree Washington took command of the American Army, July 3, 1775.

Williamstown, where is the "Haystack Monument." the birthplace of "American Foreign Missions."

Fitchburg to North Adams, Old Mohawk Trail, "the pathway trodden by the Indians of the Five Nations on their journeys from the Hudson River to the

Connecticut."

Franklin, N. H., birthplace of Daniel Webster.

Hartford, Conn., famed for "Charter Oak." Table on which President Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation is in the Connecticut State Library.

Portland, Maine, with its famed Eastern Cemetery; and many other New England communities of outstanding historical importance.

The Convention will be held at the Copley-Plaza Hotel, most advantageously located in Copley Square—that beautiful and spacious plaza which bears the name of the noted artist of Colonial Days, John Singleton Copley.

It is but two minutes walk from the Back Bay and the Huntington Avenue stations where uniformed porters from the hotel attend the arrival and departures of all trains.

Every little service for the comfort of guests known to modern

no visit to Boston is complete without a special pilgrimage to these shrines of Colonial fame. The Old North Church stands in the North End of the city today exactly as it was when Paul Revere saw the signal lights in its belfry the night of his famous ride, and at the corner of Milk and Washington Streets is the Old South Meeting House, known the country over since the Revolutionary days. On the way from one church to the other you will visit Faneuil Hall, "the Cradle of American Liberty." A special journey should be made also to Charlestown, where Bunker Hill Monument stands, a mighty symbol of the Battle of Bunker. Hill, and while there you will be well repaid for a short trip to the Boston Navy Yard-always a place of exceptional interest with its old building and dry docks used for the care of Uncle Sam's battleships and cruisers.

In New England were established the first free public schools maintained by taxation. The oldest American colleges are to be found in this region. Boston still is one of the first educational centers of the world.

Scituate, of "Old Oaken Bucket" fame. Quincy, the birthplace of two Presidents, John Adams and John Quincy Adams. Quincy also has the first incorporated railway in America, over which was hauled the granite for Bunker Hill Monument.

Lexington, where the Minute Men defended American liberty, April 19, 1775. Concord, with its Sleepy Hollow Cemetery and the famous Bridge where was fired "the shot heard round the world," April 19, 1775.

Salem, where is the "House of Seven Gables" and the Hawthorne home.

The Thirty-fifth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians will convene at the Copley Plaza Hotel. Boston, Mass., on Monday, JUNE 9TH. 1930, at 2 P. M.

I am not in a position to furnish the same form of railroad certificates as I did last year, but each delegate, when purchasing his or her ticket, must re-quest such certificate of the railroad agent which will entitle him or her to purchase a return ticket by the same route at one-half of the regular fare.

All of the Trunk Line Associations will

instruct their agents to issue such certificates to all those purchasing tickets for Boston, beginning a few days ahead of the opening of the Convention, and it will be advisable for delegates-elect to make a proper advance inquiry of the railroad representative in their city as to all conditions governing the sale of these tickets and what the earliest purchasing date will be.

I would suggest to those delegates traveling by way of New York to Boston to make inquiry of your local agents as to purchasing by rail to New York and by boat from New York to Boston, which can be done under the same conditions as by rail all the way. A choice can be made of either the Fall River Line of the Eastern Steamship Co. lines, the former making the trip to Fall River, Mass., by boat and thence by rail to Boston, the latter making the all-water trip through the celebrated Cape Cod Canal and arriving at Boston at 3 a. I shall be pleased to furnish any adtional information regarding this b part of the trip at the request of any delegate.



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

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Labor Again Justified

DVOCATES of employes' stock ownership are as silent as the proverbial clam since the recent Wall Street collapse.

The extent of the crash will not be told-or even referred to. People forget and employes' stock ownership will again be trotted out as a panacea for industrial disputes.

The American Federation of Labor has repeatedly warned workers of the danger of investing their savings in such schemes, but this advice was overwhelmed by glib-tongued artists who talked of "depression-proof," investments. The crash showed that such stocks, even though they have a record of dividend payments, dropped as hard and as far as "cat-and-dog" stocks, that have nothing behind them.

Workers should keep in mind that there is no difference between stocks owned by them and similar stock owned by the general public.

There is no dividend guarantee behind common or preferred stock, despite contrary claims. An employer may assure workers he will protect their holdings, but this promise is worthless in a Niagara of falling values, such as Wall Street just experienced.

It is against human nature for any man to throw money into a pit whose bottom is unknown.

Stick to Your Union

UR grandfathers had a saying, "Keep your powder They meant be ready for emergencies. Should Indians come it would be awkward to have powder that would not fire. Without dry powder those pioneers might miss game that would supply the family with meat. For factory workers the warning, "Stick to your union," has a similar meaning.

Many workers who join the union during a strike or when the employer threatens to cut wages begin to wonder after the settlement whether it pays to keep on going to union meetings and paying dues. They argue that there is no longer any trouble and that they need the money to buy other things.

But what would happen if you and the other workers stopped paying dues In a very short time the employer would discover that the union was no longer powerful and he would know that he could safely do the things the union had opposed. He would have learned to make the disagreeable changes a few at a time so that-you would be caught unawares-without time to scramble back into your unions.

The company does not discharge its employment department because the controversy is settled or because it has hired all the workers needed.

The company retains its executives to take care of its interests in times of production as well as during lustrial strife.

Your city would not think of disbanding the police department until thieves and rufflans began to interfere with the peace of the community.

You wouldn't give away your winter coat just because summer has come. To leave the union just because one difficulty has been settled is equally unwise. Problems are constantly arising because changes repeatedly occur in every shop and factory. If you have a union, the union officers are watching developments so that the union may be prepared to meet them. If industry is prospering, the union representatives get ready to ask for wage increases and shorter work hours

for those who helped to create the prosperity. If industry is not prosperous, their representatives are on the alert to protect workers against proposals to reduce wages and to help remove the cause of losses.

You need a union so that as workers you can meet problems as they develop and settle them to the advantage of all concerned, so that you can increasingly feel that you have a real place and voice in the industry in which you invest your work hours.

You want to be getting better wages as each year passes. You can't do this by yourself, for you have to accept the terms the company offers. Alone you can only take it or leave it. But a union can propose better terms of work to the company and discuss the proposal with them until an agreement is reached.

You need a union constantly on the job to manage for you the business of getting you better conditions and increases in wages.

Paying your dues regularly gets for you this union service.-American Federationist.

Henry Ford has raised the pay of his employes so that his minimum is \$7. This scales up to about \$10. which will be earned by only a few. On the average, through his plant, his rates are by no means up to standard union rates. Ford ought to raise pay. But he is entitled to credit for what he has done. It is bound to be felt in other motor plants. If there is a fly in the ointment it is that before he announced that he would raise wages Ford had laid off some 30,000 men and he has said nothing about putting these men back. Where are those 30,000 going to get their pay? How are they going to "maintain purchasing power" in accordance with the White House program? Aye, there's the rub, and a serious, tragic one it is.

Latest of the unions to establish Southern homes is the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, with a fine home for aged and infirm members and their wives at Lake-

Q.—Who dedicated the American Federation of Labor Building in Washington, D. C.?

A .- President Woodrow Wilson. In his speech, he said: "I am not here to adorn the occasion. I am here to express my very deep interest in it and to show how near it lies to my heart that the legitimate objects of the great labor movement be achieved.'

Q.-Who was Francisco Ferrer?

A .- A Spanish educator who was executed by the Spanish government in 1909. The American Federation of Labor Executive Council adopted resolutions protesting against the execution of Ferrer, who was called by the resolutions a martyr to the cause of free speech, free press and free education.

Q.-What was said about "intellectuals" by an American Federation of Labor convention?

A .- The 1918 convention said: "Although we welcome the advice and the suggestions and the sympathetic support of any and all who are willing to give them to our men and women we decline to yield the leadership of our movement to those who do not work. We object to those who undertake to be the censor and mentor of the American labor movement."

Out Beyond the Surf --

Where thought, unhastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

A scientist the other day said we live in one day now as much as men lived in five days a hundred years ago. We live five times as fast.

The scientist was thinking of the marvelous inventions that have given us fast travel, fast communication, fast transportation, fast production.

He had the right idea, but was undeniably wrong in his conclusion. Our speed is much more than five times as great. We live at a much faster rate.

Many men now living have more of experience, consequently more of life, in a day in 1929 than would have been possible to them in a year in 1829. You can't think back that far, but you can get the facts.

We literally have a different world today than existed in 1829, excepting for those spots untouched by invention, which have not moved at all.

The race has yet an infinite amount of knowledge to gain. It knows little, even now, about itself, to say nothing of its tools and materials.

But how much of superstition has gone since 1829? Add that gain to the gain in methods, the gains of invention and discovery. How the world has changed.

The scientist looked backward only; he didn't forecast, else he might have regarded himself as no scientist. But wage-earners can afford to look ahead, perhaps to

Remember this: If we are living faster today, we did not gain that speed all at once. It came by degrees, and always faster. It was faster in 1850 than in 1840. It was faster in Grover Cleveland's time than it was in Andrew Jackson's time. It was faster in 1900 than in 1880. It is faster today than at any previous time. The speed has grown with every fundamental invention or discovery, generally speaking. Watch the flywheel of an engine as the power is turned on.

What does this portend? It portends what another scientist pointed out, very simply. We shall keep on gaining speed, going faster and faster.

Inventions will follow each other more closely; so will discoveries; so will human relations change more rapidly.

Accelerating speed is the immutable law of things, it seems. Observation tends to confirm the theory.

What about it? One thing is that the human race cannot afford to allow itself to be robbed of any slight degree of democratic authority and power in times of such moment.

It is no day for tyrants and dictators, either in political or industrial realms.

Humanity itself must have its hand on the throttle. With growing speed greater powers come into being. Only humanity has the competence to control power and decide issues at any time, most of all in our time.

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Whether it be a Mussolini or a mill boss, tyranny is more dangerous, more unthinkable, more intolerable today than ever.

This day of growing speed, of amazing promise, of sure marvels around the next corner, must be the day of democracy, of the people. And the people themselves will need, as years go by, more understanding than they ever in all history needed to have.

We do not live in a time to let tyrants run rampant. C. M. W.

We Summarize Our Issues



The current Los Angeles Overture, Local No. 47, contains a nearly three-column tribute to Brother C. L. We have just read the description of what is claimed to be the largest saxo-phone in the world. It is six feet and seven inches in height and requires a reed thirteen-sixteenths of an inch wide at the lip. Other dimensions of the in-strument are proportionately large, as, for instance, the rod operating the low C sharp key has a length of thirty-nine inches. The rod connected with the side C key is thirty-seven and one-half inches. We understand it is the first instrument of the kind which the American Locomo-tive Works have turned out; that with the assistance of a Ford truck it can be carried on parade and rivals the bass drum as an attraction. The tone is said to be "sonorous," which we have not the slightest disposition to doubt. In hot summer weather the bell can be used as a cyclone cellar, and when the instrument is in upright position would undoubtedly be useful as an observation tower. From the standpoint of versatility the saxo-phone always shines—especially if the metal polishers union have been properly



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

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FOLLERIN' THE BAND

HO hasn't "follered" the band up Main street, or up Broadway or Michigan boulevard? Heart pumping joyously, feet beating the ground in time! Grandly intoxicating moment of

Minstrel band, Sousa's band or just a little German band, what difference did it make? One felt inspired to dance, turn handsprings and join the circus.

And-later in life-who hasn't felt a thrill as the conductor lifted his baton for the overture to begin? A moment pregnant with the glamour of the theatre! Music casts its spell throughout all the Ages of Man.

Is it wise then, in this enlightened and prosperous day to countenance substitution of a shadow of music for the real thing in the theatre. Music is an emotional art and therefore loses an important element when delivered by a third party.

Imagine the Irish following a Music Box on St. Patrick's Day! Or fife and drum music by a Machine on Memorial Day! Incongruous? Of course, but not more so than a mechanical overture in the theatre.

Talking pictures-a new dramatic form; the radio-which transmits music directly and does reflect the artist's mood of the moment; the phonograph in the home-where living music usually is not available—are not at issue here. We are discussing only the substitution of Mechanical Music for Real Music in the theatre, in consequence of which Real Music is being eliminated in theatres.

Music has always exercised a powerful influence over the gentler nature of man. It is a universally beloved art. Would it not be deplorable if any development should diminish musical appreciation and discourage musical education?

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AN EPOCHAL OCCASION

Middletown earned a distinction and set a precedent with the annual Chamber of Commerce dinner of 1929. It was, so far as we know, the first time in the history of such occasions that representatives of labor, of business and of industry—employer and employed—have sat together, fraternizing not only in somewhat belated recognition of an intimate mutuality of interest, but with the avowed purpose of co-operating for for the common good.

So unusual was the event that some of the newspapers of New York City, ever on the alert for the extraordinary, ordered special reports of the dinner. And the speaker, Mr. Samuel O'Brien, of the International Typographical Union, accustomed though he may be to observing advances of a new spirit in the relation between capital and labor, was obviously astounded by the manifestation of it here. He would return to labor headquarters, he said, to report with great pleasure a unique and most impressive personal ex-

Mr. O'Brien is probably the first repre-sentative of a great labor organization to have that experience, for the simple reason that, with all the progress toward understanding among all elements of the population, few if any other communities have reached the point where their Chamber of Commerce can include, with the usual representatives of trade and manufacturing, the delegates, as ours includes, of six units of the American Federation of Labor. It is not astonishing therefore that Mr. O'Brien—an excellent example, by the way, of the newer type of labor

leader—should be 'mpressed.

The assemblage, with masons and banktricians and master plumbers, printers and merchants, all seated together and all cheering a symbolical cartoon of friendship, the work of a Central Labor Union official, would have astonished anybody who had not observed the development of the new spirit through the earnest efforts of such men as blunt, honest, sincere John Arfmann, who have observed the picture of existence from all angles.

An assemblage of that sort could have been produced only where the old chimera of antipathetic interests had been destroyed and replaced by the much bet-ter-founded idea *** happipness and

prosperity depends on the remuneration and protection of labor, as well as on the

safety and rate of return for capital.

We believe the entire community will agree with the statement that in projecting and carrying through their program for the Chamber of Commons dinner this year, the representatives of organized labor on the Cham'er of Commerce directorate performed a service whose benefits will be shared ultimately by a great many other communities which are still struggling with the state of the communities which are still struggling with the problems arising from the old concept that one class must necessarily be antegonistic to another class.—Middletown, N. Y., Times-
