Millions Want Real Music

ADVERTISING APPEAL RALLIES HOSTS IN WAR ON CANNED ART

Theatregoers Seize Chance to Convince Exhibi-tors They Want Living Music in Program.

COUPONS SWAMP OFFICE

Campaign in Sight If Union Members Get Busy in Their Own Behalf.

THE fastest-growing organization in the world! That's the Music Defense League. Every mail brings hundreds of signed membership coupons, representing theatre patrons in every State in the Union and every Province in the Dominion.

Tens of thousands were re ceived in the first two weeks of the campaign, and the volume of returns is growing as newspaper and magazine advertisements are extended into new fields. Announcement of definite results will be reserved until a later date.

This campaign represents an

This campaign represents an honest, practical endeavor to amass tangible evidence that the public really wants living or-chestras and organists in the theatres and that a large portion of the public looks with positive disfavor on attempts to economize by substituting mechanical music. When this evidence is ready, it will be revealed with-out any sort of reservation or exaggeration.

Coupons are being filed under cities alphabetically, so it will be possible to lay them before any interested party in any city as proof that the theatregoers of that particular place want real

Before this drive to assemble a petition for real music was inaugurated, leaders of the Federation were confident that the public response would be noteworthy. They were not, how-ever, prepared for the flood of coupons that ensued immediately after the advertisements were printed in January. The office force was snowed under by the first mails.

Stenographers and clerks at headquarters were all drafted to open the letters, but their efforts were insufficient to keep pace with the job. Large boxes were provided for filing, and extra help was engaged.

Substitution is Checked

Many music lovers, not content with gning coupons, wrote long letters signing coupons, wrote long letters describing their objections to canned music and their yearning for return of living music. Many asked for blank coupons in order that their friends might join the Music Defense League. Most correspondents prefaced their comments with the statement that they were not musicians, only music lovers. Several musicians, only music lovers. Several offered financial assistance in the camnsicians paign and a few actually enclosed money ess to say, the money was returned with thanks and the explanation that the eration is able to conduct the camaign without such help.

The general advertising campaign warning against the substitution of canned music, was launched October 21. 1929. The announcement of the Music Defense League organization was not made in the newspapers until January 13, 1930. It can be reported that the immediate of the state of t diate effect of advertising was that the spread of canned music substitution was checked. In some cities, also, orchestras

and organists were restored.

Federation leaders have known that the task of regaining an appreciable por-tion of the ground lost in the "sound" invasion would be a long one. Certain theatrical interests were prepared to go to great lengths to convince the public that canned music was a superior sort of product. It is believed that the propa-

task rather is to convince unwilling theatre interests that they must give the public real music in order to attain the greatest possible prosperity. That is a

public real music in order to attain the greatest possible prosperity. That is a large order and will require patience as well as skill and money.

Familiar as they are with the general policies of the theatre, musicians know that the picture exhibitors will give the public what it wants when they are once convinced that the public really knows. convinced that the public really knows what it does want. To convince them is the Federation's business.

Exposing a Fallacy
The Federation is not out to put mechanically reproduced music out of business. That would be impossible, and to try it would be foolhardy and a waste of money. The radio and the phonograph-

in-the-home are highly prized by the people. The Federation does aim, however, to restrict thea-trical use of canned music as a substitute for real music. In short, real music is valuable entertainment and should have a place on any well-balanced pro-gram, even if the pictures do or sing.

Canned music does not take the place of real music. Mu-sicians know this and our campaign is evoking evidence that nearly everyone else knows it. Music is an emotional art and the human element is essential to its enjoyment. There is a subtle difference between real and canned music that is difficult to describe, but not at all difficult to detect. The finest of symphony orchestras, when canned, fail to reach the responsive sensibilities of the hearer in the way that even a small or-chestra, in the flesh, does. With that truth in mind it is easier to feel confidence in the eventual success of the advertising cam-paign. We are not "butting our heads against a stone wall," as some skeptical ones suggest, but are exposing a palpable

we are exposing a palpable failacy.

At the beginning of this campaign local union officials were asked to enlist all members in local drives to get coupons signed. The Federation offered to supply blank coupons in any number, also window cards and ballot boxes for collecting coupons in music stores. Within a few days 150 local unions had ordered a total of 500,000 coupons. That was splendid.

Some Locals Lag Behind

Some locals, however, have failed to co-operate to the extent of their ability. In the general rejoicing over results obtained this is a very sour note. It is high time they were getting aboard the band-wagon.

It is not much to ask each member circulate among his friends and acquaint-ances, who love music, and get coupons signed. It is such thorough tactics that win any contest, political or otherwise. There are 150,000 musicians in the country. If all of them support this worthy cause in a practical way, and persuade their families and friends to do likewise, the victory is assured.

The advertising campaign is producing great results, but in a struggle of this sort every vote counts and we will be very foolish to rely entirely on volunteer memberships.

In short, these parties would like to divert musical wages to their own pockets.

What the Public Wants Sooner or later it is inevitable that all patrons will perceive that "sound is simply phonograph music and that they were being asked to pay to hear what

"sound" promoters, was not content to wait until the public made this discovery for itself. By that time irreparable damage might have been done. The advertising campaign has informed the public of the true situation. It will continue to combat the plans of these financially powerful interests.

The efficacy of advertising as a means of presenting an issue of this sort to the public has been demonstrated by this campaign. Newspapers have been keenly interested in the outcome, as the Federation is really pioneering in this field. We have no means of selling our product directly, as have most advertisers. The

Some Film Advertising That Is a Boomerang

THE motion picture field has the reputation of being a well-organized, closely-knit industry that keeps a careful eve on the publicity and propaganda of its members. It is also an industry that has kept a close watch on the activities of other branches of the amusement business, in many cases going out of its way to criticize the weaknesses of less influential departments of the show world.

The powerful publicity and legislative branches of the industry have been careful to promote the idea in the mind of the public that pictures are an asset to any community, that they mean money to the community, that they are legitimate, that they are constructive, that they are vital to the wellbeing of the community.

With all this in mind, then, it is difficult for us to understand how the industry's watchdogs overlooked the full-page advertisement that appeared recently in one of the film trade papers. Maybe they did not realize that it left them wide open. Maybe they did not see that in it they admitted doing what they have constantly decried in others.

It is our opinion that this advertisement is a blight on the picture business, and that we are doing a constructive service to that industry in pointing it out. We don't know who was responsible for the writing of the copy, but we do know that for the good of the business it might better never have been published. May we say also that if the paper publishing it had been wide awake to the slur it cast on the industry it claims to uphold it would never have allowed it to appear in its pages.

The heading of this full-page ad read: "Show of the Century Piles Up Repeat Bookings!" Among other things, it then displayed prominently these tell-tale "Mammoth setup TO MILK YOUR TOWN DURING THE EASTER HOLIDAYS .

Not satisfied with this, the writer of the ad wished to impress his readers, so he further said: "Show campaigns and grand-scale advertising available to put over sensational attraction AND ABSOLUTELY SQUEEZE EVERY LAST DIME OUT OF YOUR TOWN.

May we inquire whether or not the motion picture people care anything about the good will of the merchants, the bankers the civic organizations in cities and towns having picture theatres? May we ask, after this, if the picture people can throw stones at others?

We believe that such advertising as this is detrimental to the good will, not only of the motion picture industry, but of the amusement world in general. We think that steps should be taken to investigate the negligence that allowed such copy to reach print .-The Billboard.

A Great Campaign Begins

ITH fine courage and determination the American Federation of Labor bar ican Federation of Labor has launched the great Southern organizing campaign.

This is not the first great organizing campaign to be undertaken in the history of American labor, but it is undoubtedly the greatest and it has the brightest prospects.

The last great venture was the campaign to organize the steel industry, which, even in the face of the W. Z. Foster handicap, by no means entirely failed.

The Southern campaign was launched because the workers demanded organizing help. Organizing work could not be prevented. The economic situation demands it; oppression cries for the relief that can come only through trade unionism.

The American Federation of Labor undertakes another step in the fulfillment of its historic mission. It is engaged in writing another splendid page of an illustrious and inspiring history of human progress.

Q .- How many labor banks are there in the United States?

A .- Twenty-two, according to the latest figures, compiled by the industrial relations section of Princeton University.

Q.-What is the best known example of union-management cooperation?

A .- Cooperation in the shops of the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad, known as the "B. & O. plan."

Q.—What is the biggest local trade union in the United

A .- New York Typographical Union No. 6, known as "Big Six," with a membership which recently passed 10,000, is said to be the biggest local union in America, if not in the world.

Q.-What Cleveland employer recently advocated a five-day week for government employees and the declaration of Saturday as a holiday by Congress?

A.-Edgar E. Adams, one of the largest employers of labor in Cleveland.

Q.-Where and when were trade unionists first tried in the United States for "combination and conspiracy to raise their wages"?

A.-In Philadelphia, in 1806. The unionists were boot and shoe makers. They were fined \$8 each.

Q.-When was the Baltimore & Ohio plan of cooperation between management and trade unions

-In February, 1923.

Q.—What is meant by productivity of labor?

A .- The output of a worker in a given time. It is best expressed in the form of output per hour, but in the absence of an hourly record of time, may be stated as output per day, per crew, per week, or even in larger time units.

Q.—Is the opinion held among officials of departments of labor that much ill health is caused by improper working conditions?

A .- Yes. For example, John Roach, Deputy Commissioner of Labor of New Jersey, recently said that there is no doubt that a large percentage of sickness among workers is due to improper working conditions, exposures to poisonous trade substances, fatigue and sustained effort beyond the strength of the individual. He added that when industry operates carefully so that poisonous substances are handled by trained men; when dusts, gases and fumes are collected at the point of origin, and when workmen in general are given health protection there is no doubt that there is a most favorable effect on the health of working groups.

Out Beyond the Surf --

Where thought, unhastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth. Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

There has been in Washington in recent weeks an affair of major proportions about which very few persons have got excited and about which the sensationloving portion of the press has been just as silent as the more conservative portion of the press.

There seems to be no good reason for this silence, but all things are not bulwarked by good reasons and so we arrive nowhere by speculating in that direction. Or maybe it is that all things have good reasons which are quite frequently invisible to the naked eye.

Anyway, many affairs pass in the night without ever assuming the proper proportions of a scandal. And so it is in this case.

The whole story can be told in three sentences, as follows:

The Navy Wage Board of Review had a hearing to determine wage rates for the coming year.

To that hearing came three men who represented all of the organized shipbuilding interests, protesting aganist any wage raise which might be reflected in the rates of wages they and their yards would have to pay.

There was no navy wage increase and the three gentlemen are doubtless very happy!

The Shearer case was little if any more important than this episode, and yet-and yet, well, everyone has heard about Mr. Shearer and almost nobody has heard about the three gentlemen of the shipbuilding business.

Secretary of the Navy Adams, as chilly as any New England granite, gravely said wages would remain as they are, wondering, doubtless, why he should even have to say anything about so plebian a matter of wages.

Why was this episode so important? First, it was important and significant because ALL wages are to remain "as is." Second, under the Jones-White Act, enacted to stimulate American shipbuilding, twenty ships are now under construction.

More than that, the shipbuilders expect soon to have contracts for forty more ships. Now: The navy has the best mechanics and most of the mechanics that the yards will have to try to get when they get those additional

Does it take long to surmise that if navy yard wages were raised it would cost the private yards more to get those mechanics when the time comes?

Now those statements and that final question happen to set forth certain facts. It would never do to say, or even to surmise that the Secretary of the Navy, a stern New Englander, sought to check any effort to raise navy yard wages for civilian employes, or that his final order was promulgated to that effect for the benefit of private shipyards who had sent their representatives to Washington to argue against an increase.

The facts simply are that the three men arrived in Washington and made their representations and that they have the satisfaction of knowing that their point of view was sustained by official order.

Of one thing you can be sure: Your local daily newspaper has not printed these facts. And one more thing: Secretary Adams didn't help Mr. Hoover's prosperity program along a bit.

Down South In Dixie

OWHERE in the United States is there a readier, more understanding response to that idea of chivalry which is deepest embodied in the old and familiar idea of a square deal and fair play.

The organizing campaign launched by the American Federation of Labor aims only to secure for wage earners in Dixie-as everywhere-just that and nothing more. A square deal and fair play-that is the idea that is the actuating force in everything for which trade unionism stands.


It is no question of North or South, East or West. It is merely a question of principle. Some of the most hard-boiled employers in the South came from the North. Some of the best are of the very marrow of the South.

Trade unionism is not sectional. It is national and international. Trade unionism is a principle translated into a workable device. It helps make civilization better.







IS THIS A MACHADO JOKE .- Either Dictator Machado is putting over his best joke of the winter or else the Associated Press is all mixed up. The A. P. reports that on January 15 a national labor congress will be held in Havana with 4,000 delegates from the interior and 2,000 from Havana. It is known that a longshoremen's meeting is listed for that date, but any national congress of unions of the sort described would have to be a government affair, with the delegates mobilized, marched in and told what not

MONTREAL LABOR AGAIN DE-MANDS OLD-AGE PENSIONS - The Montreal Trades and Labor Council has again urged its demand that the Quebec government place the province under the Dominion old-age pension scheme. The proposal of the provincial government to establish institutions as "homes" for old people, says labor, removes the government's previous arguments against oldage pensions, the argument that families could always care for aged people.

NEW ORLEANS CARMEN ELECT-Edwin Peyroux was re-elected president of the street carmen's union, which has been on strike since July 2, in the annual election by a close margin. After the election Mr. Peyroux said, "We shall continue upon our present policies, and we will fully expect to win this strike."

BIG CANADIAN CORPORATIONS IN-CREASE PROFITS-For big business in Canada the past year has been one of progress, generally. Some 60 big corporations, issuing statements covering their fiscal year 1928-1929, reported increases in net profits of 26.5 per cent. Quite a number of trade unions secured small wage increases, but in the unorganized occupations wages remained stationary. The cost of living in 1929 was slightly greater than in 1928, according to the Department of Labor index, the increase being in foods.

NON-UNION PRESSERS BACK DRESS STRIKE-Enthusiasm for the forthcoming general strike prevailed at a meeting of 600 non-union dress pressers in New York City, called by the Joint Board of Cloak and Dress Makers to gain new recruits for the union.

Many filed their applications for union membership at once. Others indicated their intention to do so also. Speakers from the floor, including some former followers of the expelled Communist group in the union, urged that the workers forget past disputes, and unite in the formation of a strong union. Only in this manner, they said, could working conditions be improved.

TWO MILLIONS REPORTED IDLE IN GERMANY-Dispatches from Berlin say that about 2,000,000 persons, of whom 1,400,000 are receiving public relief, were unemployed in Germany as 1929 ended. This represents an increase of about 900,-000 over the beginning of 1929. The reasons given for this huge total are the consolidation of industry, the bankruptcy of many companies and the difficulty of

Federation friends of Mr. and Mrs. Albert A. Greenbaum, from all parts of the jurisdiction will help to swell the chorus of local felicitation and sincerely hope that their golden anniversary will be fully as auspicious and serene.

The industrial Utopia, where capital and labor shall break the bread of brotherhood at the same banquet table, and there discuss the problems which pertain to a common hope and ambition, may not be so very far away. "From this time on, merchants, business men and workers of this city are united in a common cause." An excellent portrait of Brother Keene appears on the first page of the paper. The Federation knows George as an energetic worker. He used to come to national conventions from Local No. 302, Haverhill, Mass., but has found a field of activity in his new location where he is bound to give a good account of himself.

Speaking of good band marches, Brother Joseph L. Rainey of Local No. 349, Manchester. N. H., expresses his long-time appreciation of "Our Director" by Brother F. E. Bigelow—recently deceased. In a letter to Brother B. C. McSheehy, of the North Shore Musician, Brother Rainey, after commenting upon the widespread use of the number both in America and in Europe, says:

My step quickens with delight when I hear Sousa's "Stars and Stripes"; my feet move irresistably at the sound of Reeves' "2d Conn.," but my main thrill is in marching ahead of 500 or more schoolboys playing the flowing trio of Bigelow's "Our Director" and for this march he should be held in greatest reverence and love by every schoolboy musician, professional musician, semi-professional musician, amateur musician, besides the thousands of drum corps members throughout the world. When bands, through lack of ability, were unable to perform the more difficult marches, they always found a friend in "Our Director," that they could rely on. Bigelow has left us, but his march carries on to the tramp of marching feet.

The Cherry

Tree Where with our Little Hatchet we tell the truth about many things, sometimes profoundly, sometimes flippantly, sometimes recklessly

Here and there over the country are men whose hearts beat for the trade union movement, who have done it yoeman service and who have edged away into other fields.

There's that man Carl Sandburg, who spends his time writing pieces for the Chicago Daily News and writing books. Once upon a time he was a labor reporter, turning out some of the best labor news copy ever written. One of the great mysteries of life is the mystery of why Sandburg didn't keep on writing labor news until he became famous as a great labor reporter, which he would have been.

But he went down a different path and became famous as a poet. It is pertinent to talk about Sandburg just now because within the past few weeks two new books by him have been announced. Lucky is the man who gets one onto the book store counters in a season; here is a man who puts two across.

With one of these new books Sandburg leaps to rare financial heights. The book retails at \$25. It is called "Steichen, the Photographer." The second book is at the other extreme. It's a children's book, called "Rootabaga Country," the third of the Rootabaga series.

Steichen, subject of the de luxe \$25 book, is Sandburg's brother-in-law. Steichen, born in Milwaukee, where Sandburg once worked and where he was married, started life cleaning spittoons at \$3 a week and rose to be one of the world's great photographers. Midway in his career he drew advertising pictures, among which was the famous picture for the Cascaret "They work while you sleep" poster. He was an army colonel, chief of the photographic section of the air service during the war.

Sandburg has produced a beautiful book, filled with famous photographs. But his book about Abraham Lincoln stands firmly as his most magnificent product.

Once buffeted hard by poverty, Carl Sandburg still exercises great economy of motion and greater economy of words. Few men can say as much in ten words as he packs into them. He should have stuck to writing labor news, which he knew how to write into poetry and drama and romance. But if he had done that we shouldn't have had the most wonderful Lincoln book ever written and we shouldn't have his volumes of striking poetry.

into the ranks of America's remarkable writers. There is Franklyn E. Wolfe, Californian, veteran and pioneer telegrapher, one of the fastest men that ever worked a press wire. Driven into journalism out of a strike that happened many years ago, Wolfe has done some of the finest stunts labor news reporting ever saw. He's a stunt man who sees ten jumps ahead of the other fellow, but withal a philosopher and a rare jokester.

Wolfe today writes one of the best columns in America, though the teatable set of New York wouldn't like that verdict. He draws on a fund of experience and observation richer than was possible to philosophers of earlier and less mobile times. He writes things that laugh out of his pages, things that get to the inside of human beings as they are and things that have in them the profound wisdom of the ages.

Far away from labor work in his daily occupation, Wolfe, like Sandburg, puts into everything he does the heart-beat of the under dog, the aspiration of the yearning masses. Many of his pieces have been carried by International Labor News Service during the past year.

Economic Status of the Southern Textile Industry

Federal Council of Churches Makes Report on the Subject—Suggests Need of a Governmental Inquiry.

In view of the Southern organizing campaign, launched by the American Federation of Labor and beginning with the initial conference in Charlotte, N. C., presided over by President Green, a feature of a recent report by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, must be of especial interest to labor. The report is the result of painstaking investigations and observations in the textile strike areas of North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. Although the labor troubles in Marion, N. C., and the outbreak in Gastonia are dealth with at considerable length, the union worker who is about to embark on his efforts of getting to the bottom of the troubles in the South and do his share in the endeavor to alleviate them, cannot fail to derive some benefit from this report, especially that feature of it which has to do with the economic phase of the subject, underlying all the factors.

For those of the Workers' Education Bureau, whose interests have recently been especially centered on the economic problems confronting New England, the report has an added claim to attention. because many of the striking facts, variations in productivity, hours of labor, wages and so on, are brought to the surface by comparing conditions in New England with those of the cotton-growing States.

As to the matter of wages, for example, the report has this to say: "Obviously the wages in the Northern States are well above those in the Southern States, but such wage comparisons do not tell the whole story. The difference is partly compensated for by other returns to the Southern employes which are not in the form of money wages. Homes in mill villages are provided at low rental by Southern employers, and churches, schools, and various forms of welfare work are frequently maintained largely at their expense. However, according to an estimate of the Bureau of Commercial and Industrial Affairs of the Boston Chamber of Commerce, in 1926, the difference in cost of rent of houses per operative between New England and the South, would not appear to exceed 7 cents on the hourly wage rate. Although food, clothing, fuel and light cost less in the South it is estimated that a differential of 5 cents per hour is ample for these items.'

Overexpansion

The economic feature of the report begins by picturing the importance of overexpansion among latter day labor troubles. "The textile industry, like the soft coal industry, is generally characterized as overexpanded," states the report. "Nowhere is competition more ruthless than in industries which are able to produce much more than the consumers demand. This competition, which is severe both between different sections of the country and between different producing concerns in the same section, frequently takes the form of exploitation of the wage workers in order to gain competitive advantage.

"The productive capacity of the cotton goods industry as represented by the total number of spindles in place steadily increased from 26,939,415 in 1907 to 37,928,792 in 1925. Since 1925, they have decreased to 35,539,956 in 1928, an indication that competition has been effective in putting many concerns out of business. But throughout the years between 1907 and 1928 there has been a considerable margin between the spindles in place and the spindles in use. Thus, in 1925, at the height of productive capacity, there were

2,896.546 spindles idle and in 1928, after considerable deflation, there were 1,970,-164 idle, a difference of only 926,382. Evidently the industry is still overexpanded after three years in which productive capacity has been steadily reduced.

"Productive capacity has also been greatly increased by improvements in textile machinery. In 1913, warpers were built which could warp 350 yards per minute while in 1929 warpers are in use which can warp 750 yards per minute. Similarly, in 1913 looms could produce 120 picks per minute and now looms are in use that can produce 220 picks per minute. While there are many milis with machinery much behind this state of proficiency the tendency is constantly to remodel machinery in the interest of increased production at lower cost and the saving of labor. Where a weaver formerly operated from 30 to 36 looms, plants are now built in which he is expected to tend from 90 to 118.

"Since 1905, most of the increase in productive capacity has taken place in the cotton-growing States and an increasing proportion of the business has gone to these States. In 1905, the cottongrowing States had about half as many active cotton spindles in operation as there were in the New England States-7,631,331 and 14,202,971 respectively. By 1921, New England had reached its maximum number of active spindles, 18,387,-789, an increase of 4,184,818 over 1905, while the cotton-growing States had 15,708,988 active spindles, an increase of 8.077.657. Since 1921, the active spindles in New England have decreased to 13,-815,242 in 1928 and those in the cottongrowing States have increased to 18,281,-754. However, the full force of the competitive advantage of this increase in productive capacity by the cotton-growing States can be appreciated only in terms of active spindle hours. These States have steadily had an advantage in the number of hours per day and per week in which they could work their equipment and their employes. Even in 1921-22, when the cotton-growing States had 2,678,801 fewer active spindles than the New England States, their active spindle hours were 47.841.112.275 as compared to 36,783,239,798 in the New England States. By 1927-28 the active spindle hours of the cotton-growing States had increased to 65,272,570,540, or by about 39 per cent, and in the New England States they had decreased to 27,862,204,584, or by about 24 per cent.

"This transition of major cotton manufacturing capacity from the New England States to the cotton-growing States is also indicated by the relative amount of cotton used. In 1900 New England used 386,330 bales more than the cotton-growing States, while in 1928 the cotton-growing States used 3,675,411 bales more than New England.

"At the same time that productive capacity has been increasing the demand for cotton-made goods in many lines has dropped, particularly for women's clothing. Not only so, but our imports of cotton manufactures have substantially increased.

"In addition to the factors mentioned, attention has recently centered upon night work as one of the principal causes of overproduction and depression in the industry. In a recently published symposium by Southern manufacturers on what is wrong with the textile industry a large portion of the complaints were centered upon night work as a cause of overproduction. One manufacturer was frank enough to say that the owners and

 operators of cotton mills instead of trying to work their employes the greatest possible number of hours day and night should discontinue night work and pay their employes more for their work. Another said: 'I do not hesitate to say that in my opinion the major trouble in the industry is overproduction due to night work, which creates a situation of mass production without mass demand. * * * I believe that night work, with particular reference to women and young folks, is an economic fallacy and a social evil, and I do not believe that an enlightened public opinion will permit it to continue indefinitely.' In the opinion of another 'the only way that I know to help the situation is to pass a law prohibiting women working in mills at night."

Wages and Hours

Data gathered by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics for 1928 show that the comparative wages in Southern and Northern States run quite uniformly like this:

Alabama, both male and female working 55 hours per week average, male, \$14.58; female, \$11.88. North Carolina, male and female working 55.8 hours per week, male, \$17.41; female, \$14.62. South Carolina, both male and female working 55 hours per week, male, \$15.46; female, \$12.32.

Massachusetts, males working 49.7 hours per week, \$21.22; females, 47.9 hours, \$16.91; New Hampshire, males working 53.9, \$24.52; females, 53.3 hours, \$20.31. New York, males working 48.6 hours, \$21.34; females, 48.4 hours, \$18.15.

The report goes on to say:

"It must be noted that the average fulltime earnings per week are representative only of the earnings of those who were fortunate enough to have full-time work during payroll periods selected as 'normal' from June to September, 1928. The assumption, however, that the workers earned these weekly rates every week in the year is not warranted for no account is taken of unemployment. Taking the opportunity for employment in 1923 as a base equaling 100, the index since that year has been 83 in 1924, 84 in 1925 and 83.1 in 1926. In connection with the use of 1923 as a base it should be kept in mind that there was also considerable unemployment in that year although it was comparatively a good year. The index of payroll totals was 80.7 in 1924, 81.9 in 1925 and 81 in 1926.

"The most reliable data available to estimate average yearly earnings are the total wages and total number of wage workers in each State as presented in the census of manufacturers. The average yearly earnings in the following tables are obtained by dividing total wages by the

Although lack of opportunity to work at certain times may lower these averages they may also be increased by earnings from overtime when business is good. In any event they approximate what the average worker has for his support during a year.

"Obviously the wages in Northern

States are well above those in Southern States, but such wage comparisons do not tell the whole story. The difference is partly compensated for by other returns to the Southern employe which are not in the form of money wages. Homes in mill villages are provided at low rental by Southern employers, and churches, schools, and various forms of welfare work are frequently maintained largely at their expense. However, according to an estimate of the Bureau of Commercial and Industrial Affairs of the Boston Chamber of Commerce in 1926 the difference in cost of rent of houses per operative between New England and the South would not appear to exceed 7 cents on the hourly wage rate. Although food, clothing, fuel and light cost less in the South it is estimated that a differential of 5 cents per hour is ample for these items. Since this estimate is made by those who are in a position to get at comparative data from the books of competing concerns and since the data are used in connection with a study concerned with facts indicating that by different methods of management and marketing New England could compete with the South, the differentials given for these items are probably reasonable. But even a 12-cent differential added to the hourly rates of the Southern States in many cases leaves them with a distinct advantage over the Northern States.

Relative Living Costs

"To formulate comparative statements of the cost of living and to reduce them to reliable figures is a very complex and difficult problem. Standards of living vary not only between classes of people in accordance with income but they vary between different sections of the nation and between localities within each section. Even if it were possible to obtain reliable data on the prices of every kind of family expenditure the problem would remain to establish a budget which could be considered as fairly representative of the needs of American families. It is rather easy to obtain comparative prices on standardized food products and fuel and light, but, in connection with clothing, needs vary greatly with climate and the articles are not standardized as to Accommodations for shelter vary greatly even when rents are priced on a per room basis. Thus the available data on comparative cost of living are at best mere estimates arrived at after every effort to overcome the difficulties involved.

"The National Industrial Conference Board made a study of comparative cost of living in Fall River and Lawrence. Massachusetts, and in Greenville, S. C., Pelzer, S. C., and Charlotte, N. C., covering the period from October, 1919, to February, 1920. Using what it called a fair minimum standard for a man, wife and three children under 14 years of age the Board arrived at figures which, corrected for the decline in price indexes between 1920 and 1927, give the following yearly requirements as of the latter year: Fall River, Mass., \$1,052.25: Lawrence, Mass., \$1.150.21; Greenville, S. C., \$1,156.69; Pelzer, S. C., \$1,140.50; and Charlotte, N. C., \$1,193.57, for those living in company houses, and \$1,266.31 for those living in non-company houses. In so far as these cities are fairly representative of the cost of living in the sections in which they are situated it is apparent that the difference in cost of living between Northern and Southern cities is not considerable. It is also evident that in all cases the average yearly earnings according to the census of manufacturers in 1927 are below what has been established by the Board as a fair minimum budget .- Since 1927 neither wages in the textile industry nor the cost of living has varied greatly. Where wage cuts have been put into effect they have been greater than the decrease in the cost of

"As to hours of labor, the legal limitation on hours of work have placed New England at a considerable disadvantage. On this point the Boston Chamber of Commerce Report says: 'If women are allowed to work only 54 hours a week,

Connecticut limits women to 55 hours, Rhode Island, New Hampshire and Maine to 54; Massachusetts allows 48 hours as a maximum; but no Southern State requires less than 54 hours and the majority set the maximum at 60 hours. And as to evening work and to night work: 'No Southern State prohibits night work for women. Thus weekly operating schedules as high as 120 hours per week may be developed, although Southern mills usually arrange working hours on schedules allowing from 100 to 110 hours for two shifts. But in Connecticut no women are allowed to work later than 10 P. M.; in Massachusetts a similar prohibition holds for all industries except cotton manufacturing and here women are not permitted to work after 6 P. M. This results in a considerable Southern advantage in its ability to make machinery and equipment more productive.' That the South has

made use of its advantage is indicated by the increase in active spindle hours

"Obviously, for the good of the industry there is need for comprehensive data on comparative costs of every kind, on the earnings on actual investment, on wastes due to obsolete equipment and inefficient management, and on the amount of Northern capital invested in Southern mills. In order to deal with the labor problem constructively throughout the industry there is need for more reliable and comprehensive data on wages and the cost of living. This is fundamental as an approach to limiting ruthless competition and raising the competitive level for both employers and employes. Similarly there is need for greater uniformity in the hours of work, whether it in attained by common agreement or legislation. Nothing short of a governmental inquiry, with ample appropriation, can supply this need for facts."
