

# 50th ANNUAL CONVENTION, A. F. OF L.

The Golden Jubilee anniversary of American Federation of Labor Convention holding was celebrated in Boston during the first two weeks of October. The surroundings were inspira-

Boston during the first two weeks of October. The surroundings were inspirational. It would be a dull and phlegmatic nature which could not become interested over a visit to such historic shrines. Nevertheless there were handicaps which at first threatened success and experiences well calculated to test the metal of the visiting delegates. Labor was called upon to pitch its tent against an American Legion background. With 75.000 Legionaires in Boston, with headquarters at the same hotel as the Labor hosts, the latter were for nearly the entire first week overshadowed in the public mind by the World War veterans. With this situation no labor delegate could or would complain as 658,-000 American trade unionists entered the war with union cards in their pockets. It was simply unfortunate that both conventions should have fallen upon the same time and place. However, as the Legion convention began to dissolve and the gallant soldier boys retrace their steps homeward, the Labor Convention began to come into its own, and before the official two weeks' sojourn had terminated all realized that the fiftieth annual Labor convention had not met in vain.

Nevertheless and notwithstanding, Boston gave the Labor convention a most cordial welcome. It was a notable opening day in spite of rival attractions. President Herbert Hoover, for the nation; Governor Frank G. Allen, for the commonwealth of Massachusetts, and Mayor James M. Curley, for the City of Boston, brought messages of felicitation, encouragement and hope.

When the fiftieth annual convention of the American Federation of Labor opened at 10 o'clock on Monday, October 6, the gavel of President William Green brought to order 418 delegates. representing ninety-one international and national unions, four departments, thirty state branches, seventy-six central bodies, thirty-five local trades and federal labor unions and five fraternal delegates.

As a musical and much appreciated incidental to the opening exercises a fine orchestra from Local No. 9, A. F. of M., under the leadership of Brother John L. Murtagh, rendered a program of highclass music.

Class music. P. Harry Jennings of the Brotherhood of Teamsters and Chauffeurs, Chairman of the Entertainment Committee, introduced Nathan Sidd, President of the Boston Central Labor Union, a temporary presiding officer.

His Eminence, Cardinal O'Connell, Archbishop of Boston, invoked the Divine blessing.

President James T. Moriarty of the Massachusetts Federation of Labor pointed out that "Boston has more history than any city in the country." and expressed the hope that "more history might be written into the archives of this convention."

Governor Frank G. Allen, of fine appearance and scholarly mien, reviewed the industrial history of Massachusetts and its pioneering innovations in the way of pro-labor legislation and showed his sympathy with present purposes when he said:

In Massachusetts we do not look backward. Our eyes are ever forward. We look to the future with a confident hopo that the 48-hour standard will eventually become general throughout the United States, as its benefits to the workers and through them to the industries themselves become more and more apparent.

The oratorical honors of this occasion must be accorded to Mayor James M. Curley. Unhampered by notes, he spoke from the heart. He spoke also as an American when he said:

# THEATRES REALIZE "LIFE" IS ESSENTIAL, "VARIETY" REPORTS

Mechanistic Houses Remind Patrons of Morgue, Manager Tells Interviewer— Other Executives See Light.

## AMERICAN FEDERATION OF MUSICIANS' ADVERTISING BEARS FRUIT

Views Expressed by Showmen Today Echo Words of Warning Uttered by President Weber Two Years Ago.

Theatres throughout the country have been embarrassed by public disapproval of the cold atmosphere prevailing when the all-sound policy is pursued, VARIETY'S Chicago correspondent has discovered in interviewing managers.

Opinions of managers today are strangely reminiscent of predictions made by the American Federation of Musicians in the newspapers more than two years ago. Even the language used recalls interviews given by President Weber in the early days of Canned Music. For instance:

"As one manager stated (to VARIETY'S correspondent)—'Many people have told me that they don't like to come to picture theatres any more because the place reminds either of a morgue or funeral chapel.'"

That sounds as though the American Federation of Musicians' advertising campaign was bearing fruit and at last penetrating even to theatre executives. We didn't suggest the "morgue" reminder, but we did say that lifeless theatres were little more than museums.

"For even the big circuit houses," the correspondent writes, "have finally noticed that people had lost the idea that the theatre was a glamorous place; and they have finally realized that the aura of glamour was essential to the wellbeing of the theatre. \* \* \* Some managers are of the opinion that vaudeville is due for its comeback primarily because the theatres must come to life. Show business, they state, depends on the theatre and the theatre must have lights and flesh and some signs of life. The present deadness and flat darkness must eventually, they believe, be relieved by the return of humanness."

These discoveries of VARIETY, a trade paper which regards the box office as the mainspring of show business, bear out the facts as far as musicians are concerned. It goes without saying that music is the chief source of glamorous atmosphere in the theatre, and the disposition of managers to turn from "all-sound" to orchestras has become more marked as the months have gone by.

The public has responded surprisingly to pleas for the preservation of the musical art, contained in American Federation of Musicians' advertisements. And in consequence, many theatres have restored orchestras. The movement back to Living Music would have been of greater volume, perhaps, if current business depression had not involved conditions. It is good to know that theatre executives are convinced that music and life are "essential to the theatre's wellbeing."

Labor convention also. Three o'clock on the opening day afternoon was the hour set for the national Chief Executive. He arrived on time, surrounded by the usual retinue. Mrs. Hoover accompanied him.

It was a fine stage setting and favorable atmosphere for a notable utterance. So far as looking for oratorical fire from President Hoover is concerned, you might as well expect pyrotechnics from an obelisk. It is not in the man. We say this in no spirit of disparagement of the President. Nature did not cast him in the oratorical mold. One must turn to the printed page to know what he said and

there the subject matter, creditable in the main, may invariably be found. After listening to his fifteen-minute address, unillumined by the flash of a smile, unembellished by a single gesture, unvaried by one rising or swelling of the voice, an auditor sees him leave the platform with the impression that the man could kiss ice water without experiencing or imparting one single emotional thrill.

Of course, the daily press carried President Hoover's Labor Convention address in full. We do not need to review the contents here. He spoke in terms of appreciation of the fine co-operation which organized labor had given the government in trying to solve the problems which long periods of depression invariably present, and reiterated the sentiment expressed before the Bankers' Association at Cleveland a few days earlier when he opposed any movement looking to a lowering of the standards of living. This was the sounding of a note of encouragement which should hearten the ranks of labor and cause them to hope for the best in the remaining days of the Hoover administration.

With the committee announcements the first day of the convention was brought to a close and the delegates dispersed to become lost in the surging, milling, rollicking Legionaire multitudes which filled the hotel and swarmed the centrifugal streets of Boston.

the noter and swarmed the centriringal streets of Boston. Tuesday, October 7, the Labor convention was in session one hour. Eighty thousand Legionaires, in all kinds of uniforms, with bands without number and drum corps galore, were scheduled for a parade which was to begin at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and continue until after nightfall. In this atmosphere of civic and patriotic pandemonium all convention deliberations would be necessarily farcical and an early adjournment was again taken.

## The Clouds of Depression

The Boston convention convened with a keen sense of responsibility. The clouds of depression, not only of national, but of international import, could not be shunted or ignored. The thought of 3,000,000 men out of work could not fail to be a most soBering influence upon any body of representative men. They realized that workers are losing faith in platitudes; that banking house bulletins of optimism are deficient in nourishment, and that rents and grocery bills and necessary wearing apparel are essential substantialities if the family circle is to be maintained.

Therefore, the delegates listened with almost painful intensity to the series of resolutions demanding that immediate steps be taken by the government and private agencies to relieve destitution and want by providing work before winter comes.

The resolutions call upon President Hoover to take the lead in a national program of relief work and see that state and local branches of the Federation should at once start action by calling on governors, mayors and other heads of private enterprises, for an immediate beginning of construction and other work. President Green made a vigorous protest against the suggestion of the "dole" system in this country. He analyzed the situations, both in Great Britain and in America, and pointed out that such a system would prove anything but satisfying here. He said the American worker wanted not charity but a job. And the convention appeared to be of similar mind.

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
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### Labor Will Press Its Wage Plan

THE recent A. F. of L. convention in Boston indicates Labor's determination to press its high-wage principle.

A quarter of a century ago the A. F. of L. convention at Norfolk declared that low wages do not shorten business depressions; they have a contrary effect. This declaration was made when low wages were supposed to reduce costs and high wages were considered an additional tax on the people.

The Norfolk declaration was elaborated at the Atlantic City convention and is now emphasized at Boston.

Labor's rejection of the low-wage economists's theory and popular acceptance of a new outlook is one of the most significant reversals of our economic history. The new viewpoint-that living standards must continually go upward-was favored by President Hoover in his address to the Boston convention.

Workers must understand the two theories that are opposite as the poles.

It is impossible to accept labor's position and at the me time be satisfied with what today is known as "a living wage."

If wages are based on sheer necessities the doctrine of "contented" workers is logical. If wages are based on labor's new wage doctrine the "contented" laborer is replaced by workers who insist on more equitable divisions of created wealth.

This question reaches into every activity of life.

If a worker is contented in the factory he is contented in every activity of life. He protests against no injustice.

The effect of labor's wage philosophy is not confined within factory walls. It reaches into every avenue of life because of the effect that intelligent dissatisfaction has on man's spiritual powers.

Labor's wage philosophy leads to greater diffusion of wealth, fewer depressions, and the development of independent, intelligent, aggressive workers.

The low-wage policy centralizes wealth and fosters a dependent spirit among workers.

There is inspiration and certainty in labor's position. Every element of autocracy and stand-patism is found in the old theory.

#### Unemployment Is Not Inevitable!

VIDENCE accumulates that the industrial managers B of the world are not accepting unemployment, and unemployment crises, as an inevitable part of industrial life.

The "stabilization of employment" is a subject which is now receiving attention in many quarters, ranging from the railroads with their co-operative shop relations and the General Electric Company, to the great dock managements of four great European cities.

Even in China, the Ministry of Agriculture and Mining and the Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Labor are jointly organizing a special committee to work out basic measures of relief. . .

Last February the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad and Shop Craft Federation No. 30 had signed an agreement looking toward this end, by reducing the weekly hours of labor instead of reducing the number of workers.

In April the convention of the Railway Employes' Department of the American Federation of Labor adopted a program which it recommended to the various units as a basis for negotiations and subsequent agreements looking toward the reduction of weekly hours,

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the limitation of apprentices, vacations with pay, estab-lishment of "minimum force," construction work in railroad shops and maintenance reserve.

THE INTERNATIONAL MUSICIAN

In June the Baltimore & Ohio Railroad took further steps, reducing the weekly hours, and arranging layoffs with a view to stabilizing the employment for those on the company's payroll.

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In March of this year the Governor of New York appointed a representative committee to consider the matter. This committee has made a preliminary report. which has been published by the State Industrial Commissioners, showing that 306 employers in that State had already in operation methods for stabilization of their employment rolls. And this committee made further recommendations, among which the first recited is of great importance. It reads:

That the idea of a steady year-round work be so incorporated in business men's thinking as to become of outstanding importance in the employer's everyday planning and action."

The committee also emphasized the planning of State and municipal constructional activities with reference to the conditions of employment generally, for the purpose of stabilization of the general field of labor.


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From Europe comes a report on four great city ports, Hamburg, Liverpool, Rotterdam and Antwerp, giving the details of organization and operation, in anticipation of the recurring periods of unemployment which occur at those centers of commercial activity from time to time.

Europe has paid more attention to these problems than America, and their unemployment provisions are based upon previous experiences of their organized labor and co-operative movements.

The classification of "permanent," "reserve" and "casual" workers, and the registration of those employed is quite clearly worked out in the Hamburg plan. Employers at that point even pay the wages through the offices of the union organizations. The system has the effect of guaranteeing employment to the regular workers, and securing the supply of skilled men at all times in proportion to the requirements of the industry.

These are signs that show an awakening and they are hopeful. Always organized labor has led the thinking, as it does today. Unemployment does not "have to be."



Q.-What is the remedy for the issuance of injunctions in labor disputes?

A .- Answering this question, the American Federation of Labor says: "The election of representatives to public office, state and national, who have definitely declared that they are opposed to the abuse of injunctions in labor disputes and favor legislation to correct these abuses. The appointment or election of enlightened liberal lawyers to our various courts so that laws enacted to regulate the use of injunctions shall be enforced as intended.'

#### Q.-Who is Bunji Suzuki?

A .- President of the Japanese General Federation of Labor. He has sometimes been called the "Samuel Gompers of Japan."

Q.-What emergency measures are recommended by the American Federation of Labor to meet the unemployment problem?

A .- The Federation's latest monthly survey of business says: "All possible assistance should be marshalled to meet this problem in a constructive way. Public construction work should be hastened and public relief provided where necessary; employers can help substantially by making every effort to provide work for a few more wage-earners; and private families can have repair work, painting and cleaning done now."

Q .- Who is the consulting engineer of the Railway Employes' Department, American Federation of Labort A .-- O. S. Beyer.

Q .- What is the oldest machinists' local union in the United States?

A.-San Francisco Lodge No. 68, International Union of Machinists, claims this honor. The lodge was formed in 1885.

Q.—Is there any national agreement between trade unions and employers providing for the five-day week?

A-Yes. Such an agreement for sprinkle-fitters was recently signed by the United Association of Plumbers and Steam Fitters of the United States and Canada and the National Automatic Sprinkler Association providing for a five-day week and a wage increase.

## Toward the Shorter Work-Day

HE American Federation of Labor has been talking about the shorter work-day and work-week. It has come out flatly for the five-day week. It did not set

up the five-hour day as an immediate and definite goal. But the Federation convention did boldly mark out

policy that must lead to drastic action toward reducing the number of hours in the work-day. The Executive Council is given the task of making a

profound study of the question, reporting to the next convention. This is progress.

Every shortening of the hours of work thus far achieved has been through organized labor. It will continue so. But, whereas in earlier years human health and welfare was the main driving cause, today the machine has come into the situation to add a new and powerful argument for reduction of hours.

The Executive Council has before it a big job. Unemployment tells us something must be done. To do the adequate thing is labor's job. To act with wisdom is as necessary as to act effectively.

### Remedy the Injunction Evil

ACH month sees a better understanding of the injunction evil. Each month recruits join the army of those fighting the menace to liberty. Each month more trade unionists are aroused.

President Green of the American Federation of Labor declares the injunction is labor's paramount issue. He does not overstate the case.

The injunction destroys human freedom and whatever destroys human freedom in any degree will broaden its field of destruction unless it is itself destroyed.

Every reactionary power is aligned against labor in this fight. But labor is on the side of progress. Labor stands on the ground allowed by the Minute Men. Candidates for Congress may not like this issue-but there it is, made not by labor, but by tyrannical judges. Freedom must triumph!

Keep an eye on candidates. Some primaries have been held, but final elections are yet to come.

Find out whether candidates are for or against the use of the injunction in industrial disputes.

The man who is for the injunction in such cases is against labor.

The injunction issue looms above all others. Let no injunction candidate escape condemnation at the polls. t

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





North Carolina has more than 20,000 cases of pellagra, a disease that results only from lack of proper food. It is an economic disease," says the doctors. Meanwhile employers continue paying the wages that make for pellagra and in addition to that continue discharging workers.

One large Southern employer pays off in envelopes advising the workers to deposit their savings in the bank. One velope contained less than \$9 for 100 hours of work. Yea, deposit your savings!' And for the love of Mike, stay away from unions! So sayeth the boss. . .

ment situation comes the issue of unem-ployment insurance and old age pensions. The resolution most directly raising the issue was introduced by Delegate Flor-ence Curtis Hanson of the American Fed-eration of Teachers. The proposal was to make the insurance a charge on industry in the same more as workmon's compensation in the same way as workmen's compensa-tion for accidents; contributions to be tion for accidents; contributions to be graduated; unemployed workers to re-ceive not less than 40 per cent of their prevailing weekly wage, with 10 per cent additional for a wife and 5 per cent for each child up to two—insurance to be paid not more than 26 weeks each year; ad-ministration to be in the hands of the State Department of Labor. As views are so far from being clearly definite, the farthest the committee was willing to go was to recommend to the

willing to go was to recommend to the National Executive Council a thorough study during the coming year and see if some tangible plans could be formulated by the date of the next annual convention.

#### The Eternal Prohibition Issue

Resolutions were offered for repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment and for modi-fication of the Volstead Act so as to per-mit the manufacture of beer, and for the

mit the manufacture of beer, and for the repeal of the Volstead Act altogether. It was expected the debate over these questions would be extended. There was only brief discussion. The Resolutions Committee refused to recommend repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, but did recommend modification of the statute to "nearmit the manufacture and sale of 2.75 permit the manufacture and sale of 2.75 per cent beer.

### Shorter Work Days

A universal five-day week for the wageearners of the country was unanimously approved by the Boston Labor convention. The proposal for the five-hour day or any further shortening of the work-day or work-week than at present was referred to the Executive Council for immediate study and recommendations to the 1931 convention. The eight-hour day for fire-fighters for this country and Canada was endorsed, as was the Saturday half-holiday for federal employes. It was pointed out that more than 500,-

It was pointed out that more than 500,-000 workers are now enjoying the five-day week of forty hours. The committee turned down a resolu-tion seeking a "nation-wide laying down of tools" for one day as a demonstration for the five-day wheek when other edu-cational means are at hand and when euch a more more would be taken advansuch a movement would be taken advan-tage of by other elements with which the Labor Federation is not in harmony.

#### Old-Age Pensions

The report of the committee dealing with this subject was in effect that oldage pensions do not mitigate the displacement of workers in the industries when they are not eligible for pensions until they reach the age of 65 years. It recommends that the Executive Council in-vestigate the problem and place the facts before the public, so that men and women grown old may at least be relegated to less hazardous and speed-up tasks, instead of being thrown out of employment altogether.

#### **Convention Location Fight**

One of the hottest fights of the session developed over the selection of a city for holding the 1931 convention. Columbus, Ohio; Salt Lake City, Utah, and Van-couver, British Columbia, were named for e balloting. The debate had not proceeded far be-

fore the liquor issue was lugged in. One faction indulged in broad inunendoes that the opposition favored the Canadian city for the reason desired liquid refreshments would be more easily obtainable. Others denounced the Canadian pro-posal in view of the fact that less than 5

per cent of Federation members resided in Canada and that money and effort should be expended for convention promotion in the United States, with special eye to improvement of conditions in the south. The outcome of the balloting, nowever, was overwhelmingly in favor of South. the far northwest Canadian city, which showed the following finals: Vancouver, 24,390 votes; Columbus, 4,057 votes; Salt Lake City, 54 votes.

#### Labor Injuctions

Some of the ablest speeches delivered were upon the general subject of the issuance of injunctions in Labor affairs. There are two bills now before the United States Congress designed to curb what Labor regards as an unwarranted use of the power of courts of equity—an issue which has reached sufficient magnitude to

## THE INTERNATIONAL MUSICIAN



The Honorable James J. Davis, Secre-tary of Labor in President Hoover's cab-inet, and nominee for United States Senator from the State of Pennsylvanis, was a visitor again this year and deliv-ered a characteristically earnest address. We there was in a large degree an en-His theme was in a large degree an en-deavor to show what the national admin-istration has tried to do in relieving the industrial depression which is the upper-most topic in the public mind. He pointed out how useless it is to decry the innova-tion of the machine. The world is feverish-iv availing every product that inventive ly awaiting every product that in tevering genius can bring forth. The problem of the hour is to know how to adjust human needs and human desires to changed con-ditions which are the inexorable incldents of an entirely new day. As an evidence of what the national govern-ment is trying to do, Secretary Davis pointed out that from the recent confer-ence of business, industrial, labor and agricultural leaders has come a public and private construction program involv-ing expenditure of seven billion dollars-amounting to \$160,000,000 more than was experienced in boom times.

The convention heard with unfeigned The convention heard with unfeigned pleasure Mr. Frank Murphy, the new mayor of Detroit. Much has been re-ported about industrial depression in Detroit. Mayor Murphy described the get-together program which had rallied all classes of civic leaders. An intensive organization plan for the registration of those out of employment was outlined. The dole system was denounced. Con-necting the man with the job is made the principal business. Mayor Murphy impressed his hearers as a man of great constructive ability and one for whom constructive ability and one for whom Michigan may open a wider range of public service in the not-far-distant future.

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Some days the flood of convention oratory almost amounted to an inundation.

Boston is so invested with and surrounded by historic and patriotic shrines that no matter in which direction you travel from the Hub center you reach them. For years I had wanted to visit the old Daniel Webster farm at Marshthe old Daniel Webster farm at Marsh-field—forty miles south of Boston. On a late afternoon, with President B. C. Mc-Sheehy of Local 126, at the wheel, and National Treasurer H. E. Brenton as spe-cial guide, Delegates Bagley, Fetterman and myself were taken to the spot where the great expounder and defender of the Federal Constitution, when official duties Federal Constitution, when official duties would permit, loved to stroll over his broad acres, carry ears of corn to the fat cattle which were his pride, and wander down toward the ocean shore and, lookdown toward the ocean shore and, look-ing out over the foam-capped breakers, exclaim: "The sea, the sea!" We saw the two elm trees which Webster planted with his own hands—naming one "Ed-ward" and the other "Julia"—in memory of two idolized children who had passed away. The Webster residence burned several years ago, but Massachusetts has erected a very fair replica of the former home on the very spot where the other erected a very fair replica of the former home on the very spot where the other taker kindly showed us the chairs on which he sat, the tables where he wrote and many household treasures he cher-ished until his death in 1852. One quar-ter of a mile to the rear of the home is the grave of the stateman who was bit the grave of the statesman who was bitterly denounced for his March 7th, 1850, speech as an inopportune disposition to speech as an inopportune disposition to compromise the rapidly expanding issue of human freedom. Webster knew that the time had not arrived for armed con-flict and time vindicated the clearness of his vision. Had civil war have been proclaimed in 1850 instead of more than a decade later the annals of American history would have recorded a different story. The grave is surrounded by an iron fence ahd marked by a plain head-stone with no inscription save the illus-trious name—"Daniel Webster."

New England doubtless has her natural charm at most any period of the year. In October she wears a garb of transcendent beauty. On a Saturday, when there was no convention session, we left in the early morning, in the custody of the faith-ful McSheehy, for an automobile drive to Fortland, Maine, a distance of 100 miles. The paved roads were a constant incen-tive to speed. The breaking waves of the adjacent ocean were dashing as high as in the days when they inspired the Felicia D. Heman's pen. The trees, in flaming and vari-colored vesture, appeared like

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gally-costumed personages, ready for the opening festivities of a masquerade ball. Amid such surroundings we felt the spirit of rhapsody. On many a farm we beheld typical Maud Mullers raking a second crop of new-mown hay. Giant yellow pumpkins reflected a golden sheen. Or-chards fairly groaned with rosy-cheeked apples. Delegate Bagley, long-time in-habitant of a Utopian fruitland on the Pacific coast, could not resist the purchase of a hatfull or two to carry back to his home eity. Portland, which claims to be a summer resort in winter and a winter resort in summer, we found to be a most a summer resort in which chains to be a summer resort in which chains to be delightful spot. From the top floor of the Hotel Eastland we looked out over a large stretch of the Atlantic and had a view over New England, which reached to the White Mountains of New Hampshire. We saw the house in which Henry Wadsworth Longfellow was born—whose poems in later years were to make him the much loved poet of childhood—not only in America, but in foreign lands as well. Portland is well worth inspection by all New England tourist visitors. The re-turn journey, which witnessed a fiery red sun set, followed by the silver pathway which the harvest moon reflected upon the waters, brought us to the end of a perfect day. perfect day.

The American Federation of Labor be-lieves in practicing what it preaches and, therefore, confined its deliberations to a five-day week.

Ralph Fetterman of Local 463, of Lincoln, made careful note of everything seen and heard and started for home with a heavy grist of new ideas, which he will doubtless present as food for thought on part of the great Mid-west Conference, of which he is the untiring promoter and press agent.

Boston has been in the throes of a joy Boston has been in the throes of a joy-ous yet dignified celebration for a goodly portion of the current year. The occa-sion was the Tercentenary observance of the founding of the Massachusetts Bay Colonies in 1630. Visitors from every state in the American union and from all parts of the world have wended their way to the many shrines of this historic com-monwealth, to linger for a brief period where men with a longing for freedom, and a vision as to where it might be found, lighted their campfires, laid new and broad foundations and then proceed and broad foundations and then proceed-ed to build "even better than they knew." Although the Boston Labor convention came near the close of this celebration period, the delegates thereto found no cooling in the fervor of welcome. The Boston people extended a glad hand and reated all comers with a courtesy which could not fail to create pleasing and last-ing memories for all visitors. May her civic altars be kept aflame with patriotic fires in all the years to come—as a con-tinuing example to the nation and to all the world!

The route back from that Saturday visit to Portland led through Biddeford—the home of that grand old down easterner, Brother C. W. Purcell—known to scores of A. F. of M. convention attendants. Of course, we made it a point to call on him. He was somewhat astounded to discover who it was knocking at the door, but soon recovered and gave us a cordial greeting. Brother Purcell will be 79 years old on the last day of November, but it is a pleasure to report that his health is better; that he is in general circula-tion about his home city, and still able to entertain his friends with his quaint comment on general affairs. This "Red" demon-stration was one of the mos. flattering tributes the labor convention enjoyed during the entire two weeks' sojourn.

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


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
