One Hundred Cities Hold Living Music Days

Federation convention, the Liv ing Music Day movement has grown until local unions have followed the example of San Francisco and St. Paul locals in focusing public attention for a day on the Art of Music.

This far exceeds the hopes entertained by your President and members of the ecutive Board in the beginning and is a fine demonstration of the spirit and courage of our members in these trying

Great credit is due the officers and members of all these local unions, who in the face of desperate unemployment, depleted treasuries and which might well have dismayed less spirited men and women, went out and labored for their art. To the newspapers which sponsored these events, also we musicians owe a debt of grati-tude, and to the merchants who cooperated by advertising the concerts given in their stores.

If reports made to this office by local officials have been properly appraised, Living Music Day was a success in practically every city where it was observed. The few who saw room for improvement in the event, as it was staged in their cities, were all enthusiastic for repeating Living Music Day in the next and succeeding years, confident of their ability to overcome all difficulties in the light of their first experience.

The value of the advertising for Living Music, obtained from observance of Living Music Day in these great cities scattered throughout the United States and Canada, cannot be computed in dollars and cents. The newspaper space alone given over to publicizing the concerts exceeded five hundred full pages. More important even than this was the good will and spirit of appreciation that each event engendered. Newspapers, chants and all who co-operated, including the mayors of more than seventy cities, took pride in evincing their enthusiasm for the cause of the Living Art of Music. The co-operation of each individual was a public testimonial to the social value and cultural importance of music.

It is to be hoped that this auspicious beginning will be followed by continued growth and development of the Living Music Day idea. There are at least 300 cities in the United States and Canada large enough to make these events successful and profitable. By that, I mean there are that many cities in which prospects for stimulating musical emin theatres and elsewhere would amply justify the expenditure of energy and in which local unions are strong enough to make a creditable artistic showing.

Since in a year of the most disheartening depression the country has ever known this movement could grow to its present proportions, it seems reasonable to hope that another year will see the

Promotion of Living Music Day added large volume of correspondence for the President's office and brought to his desk innumerable local problems, but the responsiveness of local officers and members to his suggestions have more than repaid the labor involved.

For the benefit of members who are not yet familiar with the Living Music Day plan, it may be explained that it is one in which the local union enlists the co-operation of civic and business interests in a movement to glorify the art of music for one day. A number of cities spread the celebration over a longer period, sometimes a week, but the plan proposed by the Federation contemplates only a one-day effort.

The newspaper acts as sponsor of the event, publicizing it and selling advertising space to merchants, in which the merchants advertise concerts in their establishments on Living Music Day. The local supplies the bands and orchestras for the concerts. Services of the musicians are given in exchange for the resulting publicity.

In addition to these arrangements, which serve admirably to center public attention on Living Music, and hence on its superiority over Canned Music, most local unions have promoted evening band and orchestral concerts, block dancing in the streets, parades and other features all with the aid of publicity in the sponsoring newspapers.

In a large majority of cities it has been possible to get the mayor to issue a proclamation, setting apart the date chosen as an occasion for paying tribute to the art of music.

Many local union officials have reported that Living Music Day resulted directly in new employment opportunities, particularly for merchandise shows, style openings and other events of a business and civic character. these jobs have come through the good created by the service given the Chamber of Commerce, Merchants' Association and others interested. of community helpfulness displayed by co-operating musicians has increased sympathy between the organization and other elements in the city, healing old wounds in some cases and giving business leaders a new understanding of the civic importance of musical culture.

Space does not permit the publication of letters received from local union officials and committee chairmen, but it may be said that the enthusiasm they have expressed and the results they have reported are deeply appreciated at Fed-

A few excerpts from letters received from publishers of sponsoring newspapers will disclose the effectiveness of Living Music Day plan as a promotion:





Labor Is Victorious!

N the elections just passed organized labor won tremendous victories all along the line.

A great many friends of labor were elected and a great many enemies of labor were defeated.

Examination of the results, nationally and in states, shows that no part of the population campaigned more effectively or scored heavier gains than organized labor.

Manifestly, the result again vindicates non-partisan action, for labor was able to go into the fight striking at foes in both camps and electing friends in both.

There is a marked gain in friends in Congress and complete returns undoubtedly will show great gains in state legislature.

Worst beaten of all were the fanatical drys. Finally they got what was coming to them. They were literally mopped up. Volsteadism as an issue in American politics is now out of the way.

Modification is certain and repeal seems to be in sight, though repeal is not to be gained in a day. the overwhelming majority of the American people have made it clear that they want beer and at last they are going to have it.

As for the tariff, no great danger seems to be in store for the issues in which labor is interested. In fact, the reverse seems more likely to be true.

The great board on which labor chalks up its vic-tories is today filled with scores. And labor victories are victories for progress.

WHILE the United States has staggered under a burden of depression, and while basic cause for this condition, there have been those things that have contributed to the creation of a deeper hurt, a great misery.

Collapse in Europe struck us as we were showing

signs of recovery. That was one thing. And there was another.

The world, having largely equipped soviet Russia with machinery, was struck a terrific blow by exports largely created by that machine

In two years, 1930 and 1931, nearly two hundred million bushels of wheat were thrown into the world market by the soviets, followed by more than half a million tons in the first four months of this year.

Every bushel of soviet wheat has been sold below the world price, whatever that price has been. And it seems inevitable that, selling below the world price, this operation has ever tended to depress the world price, notch by notch.

That the great plains of Russia have struck their

blow at the great plains and prairies of America seems

This year some soviet exports are falling off, but others are gaining. Exports of manufactured articles are gaining—we are getting hit back with the products of the machines our industrialists clamored to sell and that our international bankers helped to finance.

Meanwhile the pro-soviet propaganda machine continues to grind out specious reasons for recognition of the soviets. Financially, the soviets are in bad shape. But that does not soften the blow of the exports the reds throw into the world market. Many of these can not enter the protected American market, but in those major commodities whose price in America is fixed in a world market, America feels the blow. And the rebound is felt in a thousand other ways.

Communism, at war with the world, determined to wreck the world, seems to have been doing some of that wrecking through the prosaic paths of commerce. That, too, is a part of the red plan and a vital part.

While democracy sleeps, or seeks its profits in ignorance of consequences, the reds continue their vicious operations.

And in all America the only force of consequence that is continuously alert in combatting communism is the trade union movement. Others fight fitfully, now alert, now asleep. But this will not do. There must be continuous battle.

Industrialists and bankers who seek trade, and the propagandists, paid and otherwise, miss no opportunity. new machine sent to the soviets is a weapon of war in the hands of the reds. How inane is democracy -how stupid her people!

Q.-Will there be a resolution in favor of a labor party in the coming American Federation of Labor con vention, and would such a resolution be likely to be adopted?

A .-- Any delegate may introduce any resolution and every resolution must come to the floor for action. In view of history and the traditional position of the American Federation of Labor such a resolution would seem unlikely to succeed.

-I am told the outlook is for an American Federa tion of Labor convention smaller than usual. Is that so?

A.—On the contrary, American Federation of Labor headquarters report credentials coming in at the customary rate, with indications of an even better attendance than has been the case in the last couple of years.

Q .- Does the British labor movement have permanent offices, after the manner of the American Federation of

-The British Trade Union Congress does not elect a year-'round president, but the Council elects a president after the Congress has adjourned. holds the title of president of the Council.

Q.-What is labor's attitude toward proposals for disarmament in Europe?

A .- American labor has always favored reduction of armaments. It must remain for the coming American Federation of Labor convention to define a position on current proposals, but the traditional position is for peace by agreement and understanding. This position, however, does not fall within the category of pacifism. It may be interesting to note, in this connection, that the German labor movement is opposing with vigor the Von Papen government's proposals for re-armament in

O .- I see that Tom Mooney's mother has gone to Europe. Can you tell me the purpose of the trip?

A .- Mrs. Mooney has gone to Russia as a delegate to the red International Labor Defense, accompanied by other communists.

How comes it that he can parade around the country? It's worth a bit of contemplation. The secret comes out easily.

We have had "marches" and it is probable we shall

If they were really marches there would be fewer of them, but they are not; they are automobile rides

Millions have no jobs. Many of them are unattached and unrooted. Movement means adventure and perhaps a chance at a "better break." It costs nothing-so, why

Some are married-and probably desperate. The wives are willing, too, to try the adventure-and take the chance.

Some have babies-and no brains.

Every "march" so far has "traveled on the country." That is, the towns and cities enroute have fed them and, in some fashion, housed them.

Every communist "march" has been financed for the

start by the communist organizations in the starting towns. Starting equipment consists of trucks, supposed to be in running condition. Not hard to come by in these days. And so, at a really trifling cost, the "march"

Considering the oceans of newspaper space given to the reporting of the "marches," it is cheap propaganda, as far as the communists are concerned. And every "march" so far has been theirs, with the exception of the bonus march; and they had their share in that, for they "horn in" on every promise of notoriety and wherever they think they have a remote chance to gain

The right of petition is sacred in the United States. Actually these red marches have nothing to do with the right of petition, for the communists are not marching to petition a "capitalist" government, except insofar as "petition" can be made to serve a propaganda pur-

The fact is, every communist "march" is an attack on the government and is intended to be nothing else. America has no call to be overly kind to those who

seek revolution. It has no call to be overly tolerant of rebellion. It has no call to house and feed hostile armies, marching under the command of an alien power.

No. communism will never overthrow America, because there are enough who will not stand by and allow them to proceed as they will. But, if everyone said, "let them have their way," then it might be different. Let us remember at least that these "marches" are not in any sense marches; they are propaganda expeditions, planned not for an immediate relief, but for ultimate revolution. Let us be alert.

Worn-Out Machinery

PRESIDENTIAL Commission reports that half the machinery and equipment of American industry and business is obsolete. That means it is worn out and should be replaced.

The same Commission reports that many firms have the money, but leave it out at low interest rather than spend it for needed machines and equipment. What a terrific indictment of business!

Normal expenditures for replacement run to six billion-five billion under normal! What an indictment for business!

Machinery isn't all that's obsolete. Thousands of pairs of shoes are obsolete. Thousands of pairs of pants are obsolete. Thousands of homes are obsolete. These things need replacement. In thousands of families the food supplies need replacement.

Those who need shoes and clothes and food are not refusing to buy because they lack "confidence." They are refusing to replace "equipment" because they haven't the money. Millions haven't even a thin dime.

Industry, needing machinery, having the money, refuses to buy because it fears to spend the money!

This is the kind of thing that makes a hungry man mad enough to fight.

Business needs to wake up, to get some conscience, to get some courage, to get some insight into the needs of people and the temper of people and to understand its proper place in the scheme of things.

Has industry no brains? Has business no brains? Have bankers no brains? Whence came this money that they refuse to spend while men, women and children go hungry? A lot of it came from skinning workers for all the traffic would bear.

OVER FEDERATION FIELD

(By Chauncey A. Weaver)

It is with deep sorrow and the stirring of many memories that we record the passing away of Henry Schulte of Local No. 42, A. F. of M., Racine, Wisconsin, November 16, 1932, shortly after midnight at St. Mary's Hospital in that city.

Brother Schulte had not been in good health during the past year and for the past three months had failed rapidly. Hence, the end was not wholly unexpected.

Thus came to a conclusion a life of manifold musical activities.

He was born in that city August 4, 1858, and was, therefore, 74 years, 3 months and 12 days old at the time of his death.

At the age of 13 years he made his appearance into the musical world as "the boy alto" in St. Mary's choir, in which he sang for sixty-one years. So interested was he in his work that he was made choir director and held the position for more than half a century.

For fifty-one years he was the director of Schulte's Band. For ten years he had been director of the Racine Park Board Band. He was conductor of the Racine Opera Company and also active in the direction of the Maennerchor of the Deutscher Maennerverein.

Deutscher Maennerverein.

Brother Schulte had no special interest in politics except as a citizen, yet he was persuaded to become a candidate for member of the board of supervisors in 1915, was elected, and as a result of his marked and intelligent interest in civic affairs had been kept in the position until the time of his death.

In 1882 Brother Schulte was united in marriage with Theresa Schneider, who preceded him to the Great Beyond seventeen years ago. He leaves four children—Karl, manager, of the Little Symphony Orchestra of Chicago, and Frederick, Marie and Robert, all of Racine.

Brother Schulte was a charter member of Local No. 42 and was a delegate to something like twenty-five national conventions. Many will remember him. His personality was quiet and unobtrusive, but a closer acquaintance readily revealed him as a man of fine resourcefulness and a capacity for friendship which was enduring.

Some things which happened during the Labor Convention period, but which are no part of the convention proceedings, may be recorded in this communication, because the time and space make the same available.

Springfield, Ohio, the home of Local No. 160, is only a two-hour ride from Cincinnati. The local was organized by Joseph N. Weber thirty-one years ago. Monday, November 22, was arranged for a Living Music Day observance. President Weber attended and was accompanied by James C. Petrillo, President of Local No. 10, of Chicago; President Harry J. Steeper of Local No. 526 of Jersey City, and Edward Canavan, President of Local No. 802, of New York.

One of the fine features of the affair was that the same was given under the joint auspices of the Trade and Labor Assembly and the Retail Merchants' Association—thus recognizing the value and importance of music in community life and not forcing the local to carry the entire burden of its exploitation.

During the day local orchestras were stationed in the downtown stores and places of business. In the evening the Springfield Concert Orchestra gave a fine program under the direction of Roger Garrett. President Weber gave a brief address, complimenting the city upon its progress and of the fine public spirit displayed in making Music Day a notable

Springfield has furnished a good illustration of what can be accomplished in the way of giving music the emphasis which it deserves.

We spent Thanksgiving Day in Cincin-The morning paper we read that day contained an Associated Press interview with a prominent orchestra leader in which, in notes of deep despair, he declared that "America has grown music dumb." His orchestra is one of those widely classified nationally as "popular." He employs high-grade music uns-men who could probably play any grade of music placed before them. In the course of the day radio opportunity was afforded to hear him. The first strain was brilliantly played. Then came the diversion, the travesty, the burlesque. The clarinet gave a wonderful imitation of the squealing of a pig trying to crawl under a nicket-fence. The trumpet substituted for its golden tones the reedy blare of blowing into a tin-bucket and indulging in a legato skate over the compass of his instrument. The bass saxophone barked like a sea-lion. Then followed an instant of silence. There was a smattering of applauce and the terpsichorean revellers, exhausted from stepping to the gyrations of the fox trot wheeze, turned once more to their frappe and cigarettes. After listening to this kind of musical pabulum for about three-quarters of an hour, we felt constrained to affirm the leader's sentiment-"America has grown music dumb.

In the evening we went to Emery Hall



and heard the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra under the masterful direction of Eugene Goossens. There was fine attendance and an enthusiastic reception for every number rendered. Cherubini's overture, "Anacreon," Haydn's Symphony No. 2 (The London), and Pizzetti's "Rondo Veneziano" were the chief features of the program. Every orchestral section showed superb balance. The interpretative skill was notable and the satisfaction of the evening's listening was a memory to be long cherished.

We can understand how an interminable diet of fox trots might eventually force the conviction of "musically dumb," but we are equally convinced that if real music is played by musicians who know how to translate the score, dumbness will give place to appreciation and weariness will yield to delight.

Such were the impressions gleaned from a day in Cincinnati.

FAMOUS BANDMASTERS

EMIL MOLLENHAUER

In Germany lived a celebrated family of musicians named Mollenhauer. Friedrich, born in 1818, and Eduard, 1827, were violinists. They both came America with Julien's Orchestra in 1853. and remained as teachers, soloists, and orchestral players. Eduard was a pupil of Ernst, and Spohr, and as late as 1905, was featured as a soloist at Keith's Thea tre, Boston. Another brother, Heinrich, 1825, cellist, followed in 1856, started a school in Brooklyn, which for many years was carried on by his sons. Emil Mollen-hauer, son of Friedrich, was born in Brooklyn, August 4, 1855; died in Boston, December 10, 1927. His home life from infancy was spent in a strictly musical atmosphere. Mollenhauer was to the born, and came by his inheritance naturally. At 9 he appeared as a child prodigy in Niblo's Garden, New York; at 17 he was in his uncle Eduard's orchestra, Booth's Theatre, where the immortal Joseph: Jefferson appeared in "Rip Van Winkle" during the entire six months run of the show. At this period he joined the Theodore Thomas Orchestra, and the Dr. Leopold Damrosch New York Symphony Orchestra, playing all sorts of prouous engagements until 1883, which time he went to Boston for a season of opera at the Bijou Theatre, but soon grew homesick and returned to his in Brooklyn. Returning in 1884, he played with the Boston Symphony Orchestra, under Wilhelm Gericke, until the end of the 1888-89 season. In these three world renowned orchestras, he had not only played violin, but those great conductors, recognizing his wonderful talent, appointed him to play incidental piano parts, and to accompany vocal, and instrumental artists, whose solos were usually played with the full orchestra. whose encores were mostly given with piano accompaniment. Although a strict orchestral player, a fine violinist, and master piano accompanist. Mollenhauer had as much musical experience as any human. As a musician he played every conceivable branch of the theatrical profession; vaudeville, burlesque, the drama, musical comedy, light and grand opera. He also did his share of the dance business, and when his father led the old Woods Minstrels' Orchestra, young Emil blacked-up and played violin. When the Boston Symphony Orchestra was formed in 1881. George W. Stewart was one of the original members, playing bass trombone ten years. Mollenhauer came three years later taking his place among the first violins on one side of the stage. He was a handsome young fellow with a shock of coal black hair, and a sweeping bow arm that was the talk of the whole Opposite on the third riser among the brass instruments sat Stewart, he of unerring judgment, with eyes that saw, and ears that heard, soft spoken, calm, patient, reserved, collected, who then and there, began to make plans which carved a career for both. Stewart had long played baritone in the Germania Band, becoming its manager in 1886. 1889 both he and Mollenhauer resigned from the Boston Symphony, and the Boston Festival Orchestra was the result.

From 1889 to 1913 inclusive, it made 25 spring trips extending from Boston along the Canadian border as far west as Chicago, Milwaukee and Minneapolis; south by the Mississippi River to the Gulf of Mexico, and north again up the Atlantic Coast. Carl Zerrahn conducted the first Victor Herbert, the second; and on the third Herbert divided the honors with Tschalkowsky. Mollenhauer was first violinist under the latter two. Thereafter Mollenhauer led until the end. Many an argument he had in his time, and when he and Herbert clashed it was a case of "an irresistible force meeting an immovable body.

Noting by this time the general makeup of his new conductor. Stewart took the

young man aside and very politely told him a few things about deportment, affability, and so forth. Among other things he suggested a serious study of Mollenhauer went to Chadwick theory. for that purpose, but after a very few lessons the teacher told Stewart he could teach Mollenhauer nothing, save a few rules. Again with that cultivated demeanor, Stewart assured them there was no cause for anxiety as he had a most capable young violinist would lead their chorus, which he did to the great satisfaction of every-This, and similar engagements, paved the way for his appointment as conductor of the Handel and Haydn Society in 1899, and the Apollo Club in 1901, remaining 28 years with one and 25 years with the other, or within a short time before his death.

When Mollenhauer stepped upon the box he had the time and place to show the real conductor. In music he was as deep as the ocean, but in other things, shallow as the Platte. The span between triumph and tragedy is often less than the span of the hand. He had none of the social graces, nor did he dominate any intellectual group; he pulled down the pillars of his own temple, but some saving gesture always seemed to guard him from solemn nonsense.

Before assuming the leadership of the Germania Band in 1889 he played cymbals, as Stewart wanted him to get the routine of the band instruments. about two concerts he knew more than the rest of its members The band had been led by William Rietzel, who played piccolo with the 7th Regi ment of New York, and viola in the Bos ton Symphony. It was as well organized and rehearsed as any 30-piece band in history. Rietzel was an adept in condensing compositions that would sound well in a small band. These arrangements now repose peacefully in the magnificent library of George W. Stewart. Mollenhauer succeeded Rietzel many of the large journals were distaste-

If George Cohan's "Over There" lodged in the Library of Congress in Washington, what might not be said of Emil Mollenhauer's own band arrange-ments of Schumann's "Traumerei," Sul-livan's "Golden Legend" and "The Lost Chord," Wagner's "Tannhauser," Cha brier's "Gwendoline" and "Espana," Cha Lalo's "Le Roi d'Ys," Svensden's "Corona tion," and a beautiful transcription of Verdi's "Requiem." In writing about this man we are simply frying to warm ourselves at the ashes of the past. He was a child by nature; a giant in music, so unbending that all who came within his grasp were hopelessly crushed by his in-Woe be unto him who dividuality. crossed swords with Mollenhauer over a part, or any question of harmony, or a That player became a fish transposition. in the Mollenhauer net. Those who played with him were but butterflies under the pin. He was a living volcano who belched forth sparks and whose discharge of musical lava was overwhelming, and whose roar made Scollay Square tremble. The Boston Municipal Band of forty was organized in 1897, under Mayor Quincy, and for six summers, until 1903, Mollenhauer was leader. At that time the ambition of every Boston bandsman was to play in that organization. The men were paid \$25 for five weekly concerts, including two free rehearsals, which, incidentally, were nothing short of legalized riots. "Nature in the raw is seldom mild." The young men were terrified, but the old routined players knew that beneath that rough, uncouth exterior was a nature kind and sympathetic as a woman's. Thousands of fine musicians

throughout the United States served their apprenticeship with him. Musicians owe him a debt of gratitude payable in pect and admiration. He had no patience with pretense and puppery, and simply refused to waste his time, or take any interest in the man who could not his part, but was quick to discover and encourage talent in the young who were willing and anxious to learn. was a good man who helped many a poor boy or girl over the rough places through free lessons and coaching. Mollenhauer used much the same method as Kate Ryan, the actress, who in later years bea prominent coach for amateur theatricals. After endless rehearsals some society girl would ask: "Am I all right now, Miss Ryan?" "No, let it go, it's as good now as it'll ever Neither lost any time on inferior talent.

In the early '90s, a raw, curly-headed trombone player, Aiden P. Ripley, joined the band. It seemed to many that Mollenhauer was unusually severe on the new recruit, but he saw material and possibilities in the young fellow. Once he said to him: "Don't you know you are playing one note of a triad, and that it is of only relative importance?" The rest of the section took the hint. Ripley had played the "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep" variations like oil. "Young man," said Mollenhauer, "if you are to be a soloist in this band you will play so and so, and immediately indicated a list of arias he would conduct for him. "And further," said he, "it will do you no harm to take a few harmony lessons from Chadwick. Ripley did, and as the years went on, came back with a list of melodies probably unparalleled in the trombone field. He outdid anything ever done in that direction. In the peace, quiet, and shade of his own garden, or his tent at camp with a band from the original orchestral scores, Ripley arranged "Celeste Aida," "Salve Dimora" from Faust, "Gloría a te," Cujus Animam," Evening Star," Bemberg's "Arioso," and others. How well he played those numbers is a matter of history. Although Mollenhauer was merciless in his criticisms, he found no fault with the Ripley progressions and modulations. Probably no exclusive trombonist was ever such a fine musician. He made the trombone belong in any sort of combination, large or small. He had the proper attack, the tension, coordination and fine points which accounted for his Under this system only good pure tone. could result. Beside being talented, he was social. Believe it or not, Ripley, it seems to me, when he played, practiced no physical economy, nor did he tax a single ounce of vitality, but gave, un sparingly, of his experience, and divided for the pleasure and and edification of his audience.

In 1904 the Stewart-Mollenhauer organization became known as the Boston Band. It played hundreds of engagements, the most important were the St. Louis and San Francisco expositions, in 1904 and 1915; Electric Park, Kansas City, in 1915; Willow Grove, Philadelphia, in 1911; all with 65 men. The band also played many years for the Harvard College Class Days and commencements. When Mollenhauer conducted a band, his idea was that it was not a band at all. but rather the full wind and percussion section of a complete, grand orchestra with the same instruments differing only in numerical strength. He never made much of a hit in encores, but in classical numbers his band played correctly and with an authority probably never exceeded. Under his banner at one time or another Herbert Clarke, Richard Shuebruk, Ernest Williams and Walter Smith had played. What memories! What golden-voiced tones to come out of a brass trumpet! "But why paint the lily?"

Many are the Mollenhauer anecdotes An ambitious choral leader went to him to study conducting. Mollenhauer play some oratorio on the piano, with the pupil standing aside waving a baton in the air. After some bars of a straightaway melody, in a burst of enthusiasm he said: "Mr. Mollenhauer, the Lord called me to be a conductor." "Yes," said Mollenhauer, "but the Lord made a mistake."





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An Irishman called at his house and said: "I have a son, I want some information."
"What is it?" "How much do you charge
for violin lessons?" "\$5.00," said Mollenfor violin lessons?" hauer. In making his exit the Irishman exclaimed: "That's all the information I want." On a blistering hot day during a band concert on the Boston Common one of the four tuba players sent a substitute. Nothing worse could have happened than to have Lassen's "Fest" overture on the program. When that terrific passage for tuba came, Mollenhauer scowled and scowled at the man. At the finish he said: "Gentlemen of the tuba section, I see one man making his face go, but I don't hear a note."

His manager, George W. Stewart, had written and played quite a few variations for baritone. One fearfully hot day at the Point of Pines, he played Levy's "Carnival of Venese" with its usual length of difficulties, theme, single, double and triple tongueing, to say nothing of a long Cadenza. After each band number Mollenhauer had a habit of stepping over to Stewart's chair, placing his hand on the back of it as if it were a place of refuge. Stewart took his seat; both were perspiring freely. Stewart said: "My goodness. that is an awful thing to play on a hot day." "Yes," said Mollenhauer, "it's an awful thing to listen to, too."

Some may recall only his shortcomings, but all will remember the faithful work of—Emil Mollenhauer.

SHORT STORIES ON WEALTH

THE RELATION OF HEALTH TO WORK

We are only just now waking up to the importance of this relation. The employer, when he beats down the laborer's wage unmercifully, on the theory "I am just bargaining-just as I would if buying cotton or anything else—I will get this labor for the least I can," does not realize that the other man is at a disadvantage in the bargaining, that the curse of the poor is their poverty and that, in the end, wages thus beaten down will not give the employer a decent day's work. For in such cases the laborer accepts, in his dire distress, a lower wage than in the long run will sustain him in working In that case the employer is likely to lose.

This principle applies especially to child labor. It would be funny if it wasn't pathetic to think of how many hours in England they tried to work a child a century ago. A child wasn't built for it, and of course it dwarfed him for life, and not only employers, but England as a nation lost by it.

The same is true to a large extent of women and even of men. Woman's labor if involving strain beyond her physiological capacities, especially in certain phases of her cyclical life, means grave harm and especially to the next generation, for the most important labor of womanhood is not in earning money. It is the labor by which children are brought into the world. The phsysiology of labor, especially of women's labor, ought to be most carefully considered by the employer even in his own interest. Some employers encourage their women employes to take one day off each month without deduction of pay.

All sorts of instances could be given where a shortening of the hours of labor increased the product. One of the most interesting and extreme cases I know of is that of "Golden Rule Nash." He was a successful clothing manufacturer Cincinnati. He stumbled on his big idea Once he had a debt owing by accident. him, which the debtor was unable to pay in money. So this debtor turned over to Nash a sweatshop. Nash never had had a sweatshop before and when he realized that was on his hands he was much dis-turbed. His wife likewise felt that it was a disgrace to be connected with that sort of thing. But he couldn't attend to selling it right away because he had a farm out west which he needed first to visit.

So, just to keep the sweatshop going for a few weeks and at the same time not to give up his trip west, he hurriedly visited it-he had never met the employes before—called them all together, and said, "I am going to increase your wages.

He did that merely as a gift, so that he wouldn't lie awake nights thinking he was grinding the faces of the poor. never thought of his act as good business On the contrary, he was quite sure it would turn profits into a loss; but was willing to take the loss as a contribution to charity. He thought he could stand it until he could get that white elephant off his hands and let someone else grind the faces of the poor.

So he had the employes file by him, one by one, and raised their pay. He noticed in particular one skinny old woman who looked as though she was about to die anyway working her fingers off, and he asked her what she got. was so absurdly low that he said, "Mother, I don't know what you are worth, but I will multiply that by five." Then he went off on a trip, which took more time than he had expected. He got worried about how much out of pocket he So as soon as he got back would be. he went to the bookkeeper and said, "how's business?" He replied, "Fine." "How much money have we been losing since I have been away?" The book-

keeper replied, "We are making money. When he came to look into it he was much astonished to find that these people, who, when they were ground down were inefficient for lack of food and soldiering because of resentment, had come realize that he was a human being, and set out to do something for him in return. He suddenly waked up to the idea that this was an application of the Golden Rule, and that the Golden Rule has a cash So he adopted it as a principle in his business, preached it and got the sobriquette of "Golden Rule Nash.

I am convinced that the higher wages-until you get up to the high salaries where people spend injuriously for themselves—the greater the health, and the greater the efficiency. Moreover, it follows that raising the wages up to a certain point raises efficiency in a greater proportion. The point at which the employer gets the highest return will of course differ with circumstances and with each occupation and individual.

Often it is good business to shorten the hours. If, to take an impossibly extreme case, you would have people working 24 hours a day it is perfectly obvious you better shorten to 23 to give hour's sleep. It is perfectly obvious that you can do more in the 23 than you can do in 24 hours. No one ever thought of working people any such hours, but they have worked them 12 or 14 hours, and that, is almost equally futile from the standpoint of profits to the employer.

In many cases an eight-hour day, or a seven-hour day, or even a six-hour day, is more productive than a ten-hour or twelve-hour day. And so, on such a basis the employer can often raise a minimum, just as Nash raised it without even running foul of the law of supply and de-Instead of costing something to the employer, it returns something.

Finally, it must be emphasized that the employee's point of view, even when he knows enough of the physiology of labor and of human nature to get the most profit out of his employees, is not important except as a means to an end. The important matter is the welfare of the employees themselves. If the employer will not voluntarily forward that welfare he should be coerced to do either by law or by the force of labor unions. One of the most useful functions of labor unions is to insist on healthful conditions of work and hours of labor-this in addition to getting the highest real wages obtainable.
