Further Developments in Code Situation

Relief of Musicians Through the Civil Works Administration Fund --- Employers Make Every Effort to Prevent Organizing of Real Unions --- Other Comment

ECENTLY a public hearing was held in reference to a code covering the Tent Show Industry. This code provided a minimum wage for all employes inclusive of musicians of \$10.00 week without board and \$5.50 per week with board. In other words, considering the hours of labor, the proposed wage was 20c and 11c per hour respec-It is well known that the minimum wages in codes are immediately construed by employers to be a maximum The proposed wage in this code was entirely contrary to the interests of our members and therefore, at the public hearing, I suggested and requested that the code contain a stipulation that inasmuch as the employment of musicians was concerned, their hours of labor and wages should as heretofore be determined through wage agreements, understandings and customs

A few days following, a public hearing was held in reference to the Circus Code In this code, the minimum wage which all circus employes with the exception of musicians should receive was specifically named. It appears that the employers in this instance from the outset realized that the musicians would not agree to the low minimum provided for for other workers, therefore they agreed that the code should contain the stipulation that the employment of musicians shall as heretofore remain a question of collective bargaining.

In both of the above industries our organization is left in the best possible position to continue to exercise its own economic strength to stipulate the wages and conditions under which its members should be employed.

I will repeat the statements made in former articles that members should be mindful that all codes of industries are employers' codes. The employers organize for the purpose of creating fair competition among themselves and decide upon code of fair practices in their respec-When doing so, they tive industries. agree among themselves as to the wages which they are willing to pay their em-Such wages supposed to be a minimum, are generally extremely low and I repeat again that after adopted they are practically considered to be maximum, and will be, and are used to tear down the higher established minimum of labor organizations. This leaves the organized skilled workers in an unfavorable position. Whereas the NRA did do away with sweat-shop conditions and ended child labor and did create employment for many workers by reducing working hours of others, the enforcing of a proper standard wage for organized employes continues to depend upon the activities of their organizations, that is, their ability to force, through their economic strength, a decent union wage for their members. Keeping this in

a low minimum code wage holds out the danger of being used to destroy a higher wage, that then our organization must do its utmost not to be affected by such a low wage.

The NRA so far was not in a position to create a single job for musicians. The lowering of the hours of labor to forty per week has created employment for several million other workers in industries, but the maximum hours of forty per week do not affect musicians as their hours now seldom, if ever, reach such

At the present time a bill is pending in Congress to reduce the working hours to thirty per week. Whether this will be done and what the eventual result will be for musicians remains to be seen, as the bill carries a proviso that exceptions can be made in all such cases where an employer finds it impossible to maintain his establishment under a thirty-hour-aweek law.

The policy followed by our organization insofar as the codes are concerned will no doubt be of special advantage to us if the NRA will be successful in the stimulating of the natural economic recuperating powers of our nation to the extent at least of greatly alleviating the present economic distress

Company Unions

Section 7A of the National Recovery Act provides that employes shall have a right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own That no employe shall be re choosing. quired, as a condition of employment, to join any company union or refrain from joining, organizing or assisting a labor organization of his own choosing. reason of this, labor naturally held that company unions tabooed and their unfair competition with independent unions or use by employers to destroy the latter or to prevent their organizing had ended. Employers however now claim that company unions are a means of collective bargaining and meet the requirements of the NRA. words, they interpret Section of the National Recovery Act to suit their own purpose.

The National Conference Board of Industries which recently investigated the situation, reports and maintains that its survey shows that relatively a small portion of employes are found to be dealing with employers through organized labor unions. This statement, which must be considered in the mature of propaganda, for its purpose no doubt to create the impression that wage-earners generally do not wish to deal with their employers through standard unions, whereas the truth is that they are coerced and influenced by employers with the threat

of discharge and unemployment if they join such unions.

In a report from the Coordinator of Transportation, Mr. Eastman, concerning the matter, we find the following:

Managements have participated in or supervised or retained a measure of control over the constitutions, bylaws, and other governing rules of company unions. Managements have supervised the rules governing nominations and elections of the employes representatives and officers, and have participated in election processes—at times taking charge of the count of ballots. Managements have contributed financial support to company unions, and have paid the salaries or expenses of the officers or representatives of company unions when exclusively engaged in the business of these unions. Managements have participated in the collection of dues, fees and assessments of company unions. Managements have extended special privileges such as group insurance, relief funds, and the like, exclusively to members of company unions. Managements have encouraged or advised employes to join or not to join particular organizations aged or advised employes to join or not to join particular organizations and have attempted to prevent an ex-ercise of free choice in such matters. Managements have assessed demerits, made reductions in pay, discharged or otherwise victimized employes for failure to remain members of comfailure to remain members of company unions or for soliciting membership in standard unions. Managements have kept lists of employes who are members of a labor organization and have used these lists in administering discipline or otherwise coercing employes with respect to membership in labor organizations. Managements have denied customary benefits, privileges or opportunities benefits, privileges or opportuni to members in a standard labor ganization.

The attention of the government has been called to the interpretation which employers place upon Section 7A of the National Recovery Act and attempts will be made to have the act so amended to further the organizing of independent, that is, real labor organizations, as only through them, and in no other way, can the interests of the workers be really protected.

This explanation is made for the purpose of illustrating how employers make all efforts to prevent the organizing of real unions and where such exist attempt make them ineffective through lo code wages and other policies inimicable to the interests of the workers. All of this plainly shows that labor must now, more than ever, be alert to the interests of its own members and to especially emphasize this, this explanation concerning present activities of employers who attempt to bend the NRA merely to their own advantage has been made.

Relief

For the purpose of a clear understanding of the following explanation in reference to relief of unemployed workers, it

is necessary that the difference between the two funds provided by the United States for this purpose be clearly understood. The first fund is a general relief fund allocated to the different States for the relief of the unemployed. ond is the Civil Works Administration fund. Relief under the first named fund is to apply to all workers, whereas relief under the second is only to apply to such workers who were active in construction work, that is the building of houses, roads, etc. This explanation is made for the purpose of correcting the many misunderstandings which have developed concerning the use of both funds. It is true that in a small number of cities our members did find relief through receiving employment as musicians through either fund even though the CWA fund could not be lawfully used for such pur-However, as a general proposition, musicians, in order to gain relief, were expected to earn their daily wage through manual labor and, in many cases, did so,

The President's office protested to the Administrator in Washington and requested his consideration of the position the unemployed musicians found themselves in if they found relief only in employment as manual laborers. It was pointed out to him that musicians ployed as manual laborers would find the joints of their hands stiffened to such an extent that it would greatly interfere with their again gaining such musical instrumentalists ficiency as which through years of study and pratice they had attained.

The Administrator was requested to give an opinion as to whether for these reasons the musicians should not justly be employed as such under the CWA and the other fund. I instructed our attorney and legislative agent in Washington to confer with the Administrator about the matter and thereafter personally held many conferences with his representative concerning same. During these conferences it developed that in the cities and towns in which the musicians had been made beneficiaries under the C W A fund it was, as already pointed out, unlawfully done, as the fund was only to be used for construc-noses. However, in the few instan to be used for construction purthat employment had been allocated to musicians under this fund, the arrange-ment was not to be disturbed. In addition, it developed that the fund would be exhausted on or about the middle of Feb ruary. The Administrator held that Congress without any doubt would make a new appropriation and that then efforts would be made to have the use of this fund liberalized so as to make same also available for the relief of white collar workers which, of course, includes musicians

As to the use of the general relief fund, that is, the fund which as above

stated is allocated to the different States for the relief of the unemployed, the musicians were entitled to relief which. as before said, had been given in many instances, but in most of them only if they accepted work as manual laborers.

The Administrator was found to be sympathetic to our request that musicians should in future under any fund be employed as musicians and not as manual laborers. He agreed to send a circular letter to all the State Administrators to this effect with the proviso that before he did so the President of the American Federation of Musicians on behalf of the Federation should accept the conditions enumerated in the letter to the State Administrators concerning the employment of musicians. This was done. Thereafter it was agreed that the circular letter should be sent to our local unions giving notice of the arrangement. This to the locals was to include the letter from the National Administrator to the President of our Federation and copy of the notice to the locals was to be filed with the National Administrator.

This arrangement was about to be con-summated when charges of graft in the Administration of both funds were raised which finally assumed the proportion of a public scandal, and for this reason the entire matter is now held in abevance. It is maintained that amazing manipula tions of blanket distribution of jobs were indulged in by politicians, which led to national inquiry, involving local and, in some instances, State officials. In addition to this, the charge was made that there was racketeering under the guise of labor organizations—that the scheme was to force CWA workers to form unions and to pay from \$1.00 to \$4.00 per month so that they may secure relief from this fund, that payrolls had been padded, supplies had been distributed to political favorites, that salaried municipal officials were placed on the emergency relief local staffs for additional salary, etc. At the present time the Administrator in some of the larger centers places the use and distribution of the relief funds under the control of the United States Army.

It is unfortunate that the scandal of misuse and misappropriation of relief funds interfered with the arrangement between the Administrator and our organization for the possible relief of our members. What the final outcome will be cannot be foretold. All we can do is to remain incessantly active to bring the matter to a final determination in favor of our members, and this certainly is and will continue to be done.

As to codes, the end is not yet. During the month of February a public hearing will be held in reference to a code covering amusement parks and coast resorts. The result of this hearing and the position of our organization in reference to the matter will, if possible, be explained in the next issue of the International Musician.

In an article of this kind it is only possible to dwell upon the high spots of the general situation or of important ques-tions affecting the interests of all our members and the consideration of an exhaustive report on same must be left to the next convention.





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ALTER J. CUMMINGS, Chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation Deposit Insurance Corporation, reported to President Roosevelt on January 1st that 13,423 banks out of 13,564 had been found eligible for the new deposit insurance which became effective on that day. the 141 banks found ineligible, Mr. Cummings predicted that a number of them might be insured later.

Under the new law depositors with sums up to \$2,500 will be insured against loss until July 1st, when the insurable amount will be raised to \$10,000. The insurance fund is created by a subscription of \$150,000,000 from the Federal Government to the capital stock of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, plus a subscription of \$140,000,000 from the Federal Reserve Banks, and certain assessments levied on the insured banks.

The insurance law will banish the fear of the depositors for the safety of their money, and will do much to restore faith in our banking institutions. It was vigorously opposed by the organized bankers when the bill was under consideration by the special session of Congress last summer, and their forces are arrayed to weaken the law during the present session of Congress.

The enactment of the insurance law in all its legislative stages had the united support of the American Federation of Labor. The Federation's efforts will now be mobilized to retain the measure as a necessary to protect depositors from both dishonest and inefficient

Low Wages Endanger NRA

MENACING condition of affairs was revealed at a NRA hearing of complaints against the lumber and timber products industry code. Witnesses testified to payment of wages as low as 15 cents an hour in the South.

William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, charged that in many localities in the South workers were employed only 25 hours a week, with a resultant weekly earnings of \$4.20. Mr. Green rightly declared that the situation was "absolutely untenable and that when "an industry cannot pay decent wages it has no right to exist."

Most of the workers receiving the low wages are Negroes, who have always been the victims of the worst kind of labor exploitation, both North and South. Apparently the compliance boards in the South are in too nany cases not strictly enforcing the codes, with the result that many Negroes are receiving shamefully low pay. Where they are paid code wages, they are often the victims of various kinds of "chiseling." One example is the increase of food and housing prices by mill owners to enable them to "recapture" the wage increase called for by the code.

The situation endangers the wage structure of the lumber code and because of the importance of the lumber industry (it is the fourth largest in the United States) it is a danger to the whole NRA effort to raise wages and purchasing power. It is a situation that demands immediate remedy. Will the remedy be forthcoming by prompt and vigorous action of the Recovery Act Administration?

More Banking Short-Sightedness

THE big bankers overreached themselves badly when they sought to impose a system of charges for all "services" to depositors and customers, beginning with 1934. Under the proposed schedule of charges, depositors would almost have had to pay a fee for merely entering a bank. As General Johnson said. the charges would have meant virtual suicide for the banks. Fortunately for them, Johnson suspended all provisions of the banking code, including the abnoxious charges.

The inevitable result of the proposed charges would have been a fresh wave of hoarding, a fact bankers in the smaller towns were quick to realize. The charges would also have brought a revival of the demand for an extension of the functions of the postal saving bank system, which the private bankers hate like poison

The proposed charges were another indication of the short-sightedness of the dominant elements in banking, which seem unable to sense the state of the public mind. Despite past lessons, the big banks go on trying idiotically to follow the policy of "charging all the traffic will bear." If they continue this policy it means the end of private banking.

Long Fight in Prospect

ALCOLM MUIR, division administrator of the National Recovery Act, expressed the opinion that two large classes of persons will be disappointed in 1934. The first of those is composed of those who expect a miraculous return to prosperity, the second, of those who prophecy disaster to the recovery program.

Common sense says that Mr. Muir is right. A depression which has lasted as long as the one which began in 1929 cannot be overcome in a few months. It will be a long, hard fight, but the upward march has begun and with the help of every American, recovery will be achieved and further disaster avoided.

Remedying NRA Faults

EYOND question, the National Recovery Act has been of immense benefit to the wage-earners of America. This fact, however, should not blind the workers to faults and weaknesses both in the act and in its administration.

These faults and weaknesses are fully recognized by organized labor, which is earnestly seeking remedial action. At the recent conference of representatives of national and international unions at Washington strong dissatisfaction was voiced at the operation and administration of the NRA. It was clearly revealed that labor sees plainly the imperfections of the act. This is a guarantee that it will act to bring application of the proper remedies.

strikes, lockouts and collective bargaining. It virtually repudiates the labor legislation passed since the establishment of the German Republic in 1918. It sets up a semi-feudalism based on the supreme authority and personal responsibility of the individual employer. It proclaims the principle of "leadership in business," the leader being the employer and the workers the followers. It seeks to bring back the primitive relationship of master and servant, a relationship dead long ago in all civilized nations.

The law has no more place in this day and age than has outright human slavery, which in many respects it resembles. The German workers have submitted to much at the hands of their Nazi tyrants, but if they submit to this they will submit to anything.

OVER FEDERATION FIELD

"Like as a shock of corn cometh in, in his season," is the simile used by the inspired dramatist in depicting one who comes to the brink of mortality, old and full of years,

How eminently appropriate, when applied to Thomas M. Carter, the widely known and greatly beloved New England Bandmaster, who passed away January 4, 1934, at his home at 27 Isabella Street, in Boston.

For something like three-quarters of a century, the name of Carter had been inseparably intertwined with the musical affairs of that section of country.

He was born Christmas Day, 1841, in Newton, New Hampshire.

At the age of 18, he was in the Newburyport, Massachusetts, Band. His first appearance as Band Leader was in 1861. From that time on his activities were constant. During the sixties, he constantly appeared at Saratoga Springs in concert engagements. In 1869-1870 he conducted an orchestra on the Fall River Steamboat Line.

In 1871 he organized Carter's Band.

Brother Carter made no pretense of extended work in the field of musical composition; but when anything did appear from his pen, it had merit. His well-known March, "Boston Commandary," is still being played by the best bands in the country.

To Bandmaster Carter, a band organization was a legitimate, worthwhile institution. It was something more than a mere gesture of man in a passing, playful mood. It had its place in community life. Its operation was serious business. He made the public like his band and he commanded respect by giving the public the best that was in his power. In dealing with his men, he had a happy faculty of being a thorough disciplinarian without the tyrannous irritation which some leaders seem unable to suppress.

We met Brother Carter during the convention of 1930. Tall, straight and clear-minded, his band enthusiasm seemed still unabated.

On last Christmas Day, the grand old American Band Veteran celebrated the ninety-second anniversary of his birth.

Just ten days later he had passed within the impenetrable shadows. The funeral occurred at 2 P. M. on January 6, 1934, at Mt. Auburn Chapel, Cambridge, following which the remains were cremated.

Pills and pow ders and liquid concoctions come into play as a last and not as a first resort. The surgeon's knife is utilized only in emergencies. Comparison of methods employed today with those in vogue a quarter or half century ago constitute eloquent and impressive indicia of the forward movement of the great profession which stands on the border line between sickness and health. What mead of praise can be adequate for that philanthropic inspiration which has endowed and dotted the hills

and dales and plains of our community life with these institutions which may be looked upon as nothing less than concrete expressions of purpose to fulfill the divine admonition uttered in the long ago—"Heal the sick."

And then there is the Nurse brigade. Robed in white, vigilant, flitting noiselessly from one post of duty to another, patient in the face of petulence, cheerful in the presence of gloom, we cannot help recalling that line in Sir Walter Scott's characterization of woman—"A ministering angel thou!"

Sometimes we hear the sound of

music. The radio has found its way into the hospital. No raucous flare of jazz; no tonical bombardment of anybody's "Blues;" but, like cooling breezes from nearby seas, there are wafted hither to fan the brow of fever and to lay a quieting touch on the "restless pulse of care," the soothing tones of Schubert, Schumann and Mendelssohn, whose golden melodies were not born to die.

Sometimes a cry of pain breaks the quiet of the night watches. Others may be disturbed, but we do not believe they are irritated. All are identified, in some de-gree, with a common democracy of suf-fering and "A fellow feeling makes us both charitable and kind."

Happy is he who, although having approached a hospital with something of dread, can, nevertheless, go away with a newer and finer appreciation of its ameliorating power in the "healing of the seamless dress," all administered by the hallowed touch of sympathetic hands and kindly hearts.



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The National Labor Board

An Open Letter from President Green to the Members of Federal Unions

Fellow Workers .

One of the most serious and pressing problems which Labor must meet at this time is that of securing compliance with the labor provisions of the codes which have been adopted, and with the labor provisions of the President's Re-employment Agreement in those industries for which codes are not yet in effect.

Since industries are rapidly being brought under permanent codes, it is compliance in terms of permanent codes in which we are vitally interested. Two compliance agencies exist at the present time, though probably neither is in final One is the National Compliance Board, with District Compliance Directors in various large cities throughout the country; the other is the National Labor Board, with Regional Labor Boards located in large cities in all parts of the country. It is this set-up of the National Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards which I wish to discuss with you in this OPEN LETTER. Do not forget that the National Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards which I shall discuss do not deal with all labor complaints, but only with those described in this letter. A later open letter will take with you the National Compliance Board and the types of complaint which fall within its jurisdiction.

The National Labor Board was created by the President on August 5, 1933. Its duties and functions were defined in a second Executive Order issued by President Roosevelt on December 16, 1933. They are:

(a) To settle by mediation, conciliation or arbitration all controversies between employers and employes which tend to impede the purposes of the National Industrial Recovery Act; provided, however, the board may decline to take cognizance of controversies between employers and employes in any field of trade or industry where a means of settlement provided for by agreement, industrial code or Federal law have not been invoked.

(b) To establish local or regional boards upon which employers and employers shall be equally represented, and to delegate thereto such powers and territorial jurisdiction as the National Labor Board may determine.

(c) To review the determination of the local or regional boards where public interest so requires.

(d) To make rules and regulations governing its procedure and the discharge of its functions.

Senator Robert F. Wagner is Chairman of the National Labor Board in Wash-This board is made up of an ington. equal number of representatives of employers and employes. The American Federation of Labor and its affiliated unions are represented on the board by William Green, John L. Lewis, President of the United Mine Workers of America. and George L. Berry, President of the International Printing Pressmen's and Assistants' Union. The other two Labor representatives are Father Francis J. Haas of Marquette University, Milwaukee, and the Catholic University of Washington, D. C., and Leo Wolman, Professor of Economics at Columbia University. The representatives of the employers are Louis Kirstein, Austin Finch, Pierre Du-Pont, Gerard Swope and Walter Teagle. The National Labor Board has power to establish local or Regional Labor Boards which operate under the supervision of the National Board. Regional Labor Boards, of which seventeen have now been established, are, at present, the boards to which those complaints of code violation described in this letter must be nt in the first instance. A case sent directly to Washington is referred back to the appropriate Regional Board for action. Only if the Regional Labor Board

is unable to secure an adjustment of the dispute, or needs the help of the National Labor Board in securing an adjustment, is the case referred to the National Labor Board in Washington. So far no local boards have been established, but one Sub-regional Board has been established at Toledo, Ohio.

The Regional Labor Boards are constituted on the same plan as the National Labor Board. They are made up of an equal number of representatives of employers and employes, appointed by the National Labor Board, with an impartial chairman for each board. Appointments of employers' representatives are made upon recommendations from Chambers of Commerce and trade associations. Appointment of Labor's representatives to these boards are made upon recommendations from organized labor. In general, each Regional Labor Board consists of five representatives of employers and five of employes, though this number is not fixed in the Executive Order under which the boards were created.

The National Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards are designed especially to handle those cases of non-compliance with code provisions in which a strike or lock-out is threatened or is in effect. It was the intention of the Administration to create machinery for the settlement of such disputes by means of meditation and arbitration, and, when possible, to prevent the occurrence of strikes and lock-outs. In addition, however, these boards have jurisdiction over all cases arising under Section 7 (a) of the National Industrial Recovery Act. This section reads as follows:

(1) That employes shall have the right to organize and bargain collectively through representatives of their own choosing, and shall be free from the interference, restraint, or coercion of employers of labor, or their agents, in the designation of such representatives or in self-organization or in other concerted activities for the purpose of collective bargaining or other mutual aid or protection;

(2) That no employe and no one seeking employment shall be required as a condition of employment to join any company union or to refrain from joining, organizing, or assisting a labor organization of his own choosing:

(3) That employers shall comply with the maximum hours of labor, minimum rates of pay, and other conditions of employment, approved or prescribed by the President.

In other words, if a worker is discharged for union activities; if an employer refuses to recognize employes' representatives; if union activity is prevent ed or interfered with in any manner: if recognition of a union is refused; if an employer refuses collective bargaining; if employes are forced into a company union; if an employer refuses to reinstate an employe discharged because of union activities; or if any other form of discrimination because of union activities occurs, complaints are to be submitted to the Regional or Sub-regional Labor Board with jurisdiction over the region in which is located the establishent or the employer complained against. The National Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards have jurisdiction over disputes and violations of Section 7 (a) in all industries except those in which labor adjustment machinery has been provided for in the codes; the in-dustries at present which are authorized to handle their own complaints of violations of the labor provisions of the codes are Cotton Textiles, Bituminous Coal, and several of the garment industries. Complaints in the Petroleum Industry are handled through the Labor Policy Board under the supervision of the Department of the Interior. Other industries will.

from time to time, be designated to handle their own labor cases. Notice will be given when they are so designated. Even over those industries having their own compliance machinery the National Labor Board has final authority, if it so chooses.

Thus when there occurs a violation of the type described above, the individual employe affected should at once report the case to his union officials. The first step in an attempt to secure compliance should be a thorough understanding of the provisions of the code. If the union officers are convinced that the complaint indicates a real violation, and if the vio-lation is one of those described in this letter, they should, before making a complaint to the Regional Labor Board, make every attempt to reach an understanding with the employer. The first assumption should be that violation of the code is not wilful, but is due to failure on the part of the employer to understand the provisions of the code, and to realize his responsibilities under the code governing his industry. Codes are new and often complicated; friendly discussion between union officials and employers may be sufficient to adjust difficulties and grievances, and this method should certainly be tried before the Regional Labor Board is called in.

If, however, it is impossible to secure adjustment and compliance with the code provisions, union officials should, if they are convinced they have a clear and provable case, secure all the evidence possible of the violation which has occurred or is occuring, and submit this evidence to the Regional Labor Board (if the complaint is within the jurisdiction of this board). These boards are voluntary; their time is limited; their chief value, for the present at least, is in the settlement of disputes involving a considerable number of employes. They should not be asked to act upon a mere suspicion that discrimination has occurred, as such unprovable complaints will delay action upon clear cases of violation. The statement to the board should give exact information as to the nature and extent of the violation complained of; the nature of the business conducted by the employer complained against; the number of employes affected by the violation; the attempts made at a solution of the problem, and the action taken by the employer. If the complainant does not wish his name revealed, this fact should be stated in the complaint. Complete copies of all complaints and all evidence submitted to the board must be kept in the union files.

Employes' statements which are submitted as evidence should be sworn be fore a notary. These statements should include all information bearing upon the case. If, for example, it is a case of discharge for union activities, the affidavit should give the previous record of the employe (or employes) concerned; the work performed by him; the length of time he has been employed by the company; the reason given for discharge; whether he has ever been discharged before; any evidence available which will prove that he was discharged for union activities; by whom he was discharged (give the name), the exact conversation regarding discharge; whether the complainant was told that he was temporarily laid off or permanently discharged: whether the employe (or employes) discharged has been re-employed or is still out: and whether or not the job has been filled (and if so by a union or a non-union man). Avoid general ac-cusations, and limit all evidence to a plain and sober statement of the facts. If affidavits of other employes supporting the complaint can be secured, they will very materially strengthen the case. All boards are instructed to keep secret the names of complainants, unless the nature of the complaint makes this impossible; thus employes need have no fear in making complaints or supplementary affidavits. It is well, however, to include in a complaint a definite request that names of individual employes be not

Upon receipt of such a complaint, the Regional Board must decide upon the

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evidence submitted, whether the complaint indicates a case of real violation or of dispute. If the board decides that a violation is indicated and that it has jurisdiction over the case, it immediately communicates with the employer complained against. The Regional Board has authority to carry on investigations and to call hearings of employers and employes. Unless requested by both employer and employes to do so, the Regional Labor Boards do not act as boards of arbitration. They are boards of mediation only, except when both es to the dispute or controversy ask arbitration. Any decision must be by majority vote. The Regional Labor Boards and the National Labor Board work in close co-operation with the Federal Department of Labor. The Department of Labor has put its investigators and mediators at the disposal of the boards, although the Labor Department Conciliation Service is also continuing its effective independent function.

If no adjustment can be reached through the Regional Labor Board the case is sent to the National Labor Board. This National Board in turn sends out investigators and calls hearings and makes decisions. If employers refuse to accept or abide by such decisions, or if violations continue, the case may be referred to the Attorney General for further action. Codes, once adopted, become law, and as such are enforceable through regular court procedure.

All requests for information from the Regional Labor Board should be complied with as fully and as promptly as possible. If an investigator or mediator is assigned to the case, every effort should be made to co-operate with him. no action is taken upon a complaint which has been submitted to a Regional Labor Board, within a reasonable length of time, union officials should follow up their complaint either by letter or by a personal interview with the Secretary or impartial Chairman of the board. The Regional Labor Boards are required to report daily to the National Labor Board on any cases submitted to them, and on any action taken by them. The National

Labor Board is always informed, therefore, of what is going on in the Regional Boards.

Delays are certain to occur in the settlement of disputes and the adjustment of complaints; the machinery set up is not yet complete, the powers of the Na-Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards are not yet fully determined. Changes will almost certainly occur. This is the machinery which we have at the moment, however, for the mediation and arbitration of disputes, and for the adjustment of complaints of violations of Section 7(a). Let us use it; let us co-operate fully with the boards, make every attempt to arrive at peaceful settlement of our difficulties. Peaceful methods of solving our problems should be tried before we resort to a Certainly no strike should take place until an attempt has been made to adjust the difficulty by conference with the employers and through the Regional and National Labor Boards. May I urge patience during this formative period? You will be in a much stronger position if you bear with decisions which you may believe essentially unjust, while you make use of every method of appeal for a reversal. At the present time employers will have the advantage of public resent ment against strikes, if you take hasty action which may make it impossible for labor adjustment agencies to aid you. That the National Labor Board and the Regional Labor Boards are functioning is shown by a statement issued by Senator Wagner on December 21st on the cases settled. To that date, the National Labor Board had taken jurisdiction over 155 cases: 97 of these cases involved strikes lock-outs. Of the 155 cases, 104 were settled by the board, including 15 by board decisions, and the remainder of the 104 by agreements; 25 had been referred by the National Labor Board to its Regional Boards. Some few cases were still pending. The board had, at the time this eport was issued, supervised or ordered 31 industrial elections.

I cannot emphasize too strongly the place the unions must play in code enforcement. Only the workers themselves are on hand to report violations; only the union is on hand to see that complaints of violations are submitted to the proper hoard, that sufficient evidence of violation is submitted with a complaint and that an adjustment is finally secured. A strong union, in other words, is the most effective policing agency for any code.

Please write me on any questions which arise in regard to violations of the codes Through organization let us place our representatives on the Regional and the Sub-Regional Labor Boards, and build up unions strong enough to force collective bargaining. Only in this way can we secure the full benefits of the National Industrial Recovery Act.

Gold! Aha! Gold!

There come pictures of greed, of sneak ing, cringing men, long fingered, acquisifurtive, treacherousthe power that lies in gold, the magic

This is no homily on the virtues or evils of gold. This is no philosophical dissertion, nor yet an economic treatise It is by way of having a laugh at the expense of gold.

Uncle Sam has said to all and sundry -I want all the gold now. Bring it to me, all of you and come running.

The big, lean man stands high and tall his boots and utters the command, "Stand and deliver."

So, there will be no gold in circulation. It will all be in vaults, with title vested in Uncle Sam. Its only actual value will lie in the fact that it lies there, inert, doing nothing, moving not at all, just existing. Its value lies in its existence, not in anything that it does.

Like the old story, in which all the nations pooled their gold, put it in a box and buried the box on an island, exchang ing certificates of title, but never touching the gold. Finally the island was sunk by an earthquake and the nations agreed that if nobody was told the gold had disappeared nothing would The gold became merely a mental process.

Are we coming to something like that? Anyway, we have something to think about and maybe before long a huge joke to laugh about-the joke of the centuries.

Without waiting another minute we

can have our laugh at the bankers.

A lot of their glory and power has rested in their possession of gold. They had gold in their vaults. They had They had power. Mortals humbled themselves in their presence. Now they have no more

In the past few months a lot of things have happened to bankers.

They have lost most of their standing, Now, with their gold gone, what will become of them?

Perchance they will become merely the clerks who keep track of accounts, with no more power to frighten children who come crying for gold, because there being no gold there will be no crying for it.

Perhaps we but dimly sense the great change that is in the making.

It may be for good, or it may not be for good—but this is the surest thing there is: A great change cometh over the vaults of the bankers and without the gold that gave them their former mental state they will no longer be able to have that mental state, because they never did have imagination enough to imagine that they had gold where there was no gold.

And there is another thing. Directors have been paid in gold, customarily. The twenty-dollar gold piece was a badge of rank, something like chevrons.

What now will a director do when he has to go home with merely a paper bill in his pocket, or twenty silver He is at once reduced to the mental status of common folks, shorn of his shining armor and his scintillating sword.

As go the symbols so goes the mind in many matters

But watch this business of playing with the gold. As Samuel Gompers and a couple of other fellows used to say, "There is more in it than is dreamed of in all thy philosophy, O Horatio!'

You get what you fight for. So a great many labor men said when NRA came into the national picture.

Having heard the redoubtable General

Johnson, they are more of that opinion than ever.

It seems that where the hardest fights have been made, there the best results have been gained.

Generally speaking, results have been about like that since the world began and we are learning nothing particularly new.

This man Johnson is a pretty good upstanding fighter himself and there are indications that he really likes to have a scrapper come along and stand by his

Johnson conveys the idea that he may be wrong, but not when he knows better. The idea, then, is to tell him-and tell him good and plenty.

But if Johnson is a fighter he likewise a good bit of a diplomat.

lets the columnists alone. Perhaps he ought not to consider it any of his busiess if they don't tell the truth.

Be that as it may, Richberg surely-had

the right dope. Columnists, suppos tell profound truths, often descend to the level of mere wisecracking-a sort of surface cleverness.

One column, dealing especially with NRA, deserves all the hot shots that Richberg can pour out.

Newspapermen often gain a reputation and then try to live on it forever, without ever again doing a worth-while thing. Perhaps in that they are not unlike the average run of persons, but it's too bad, just the same.

And now, to run around the map a bit more, it is interesting to observe the role in which Senator Carter Glass has cast himself.

Long the announced foe of the big bankers, he has, in this recent money program debate, taken his stand for exactly the thing the big bankers want.

That he isn't getting away with anything is, of course, another story. thing that's too bad is that he triednot for the same reasons that actuate the bankers, but, unfortunately, to the same end.

Thus do we find the inconsistencies of men. And there are plenty of inconsistent men in public life. There, for another example, is Senator Borah, who is for labor about half the time and dead set against labor the other half.

COMMENT ON World Events

Probably the most patient beast of burden in America today is the motorist. At times one thinks he has the yielding characteristics of a desert camel or the lowly pack-mule of the mountains.

It is this unprotesting motorist who is held captive, pays continuous ransom, but never gets freedom from the brigands. He pays ransom in exorbitant taxes every time he buys gasoline or other petroleum products. If he is conscious of his exploitation at all he only knows a part of the story.

He probably doesn't know, for example, that the industry's tax bill now exceeds \$1,000,000,000 a year—a colossal burden laid upon the shoulders of those who drive automobiles. He doesn't know that the gas tax alone has grown 7,500 per cent in rate and 6,000 per cent in revenues in fourteen years—a degree of acceleration that must be unprecedented in the annals of taxation.

And this isn't all of it by a long shot. The legislatures aren't satisfied yet. Campaigns are on foot to place new taxes upon already overtaxed wholesale and retail outlets. Whether these proposals fail of realization or not, other campaigns will be instigated, other taxes advocated, new burdens demanded.

When you buy ten gallons of gasoline, you are, on the average, paying sixty cents to the tax collector directly—through the Federal and State sales taxes. In some localities you pay appreciably more than this, with the possible addition of a municipal levy. Even then you haven't footed the whole bill. A very substantial percentage of the price of gasoline, not counting the sales tax, represents one or another of the twenty-four taxes the oil industry pays the Federal government, the sixty-eight taxes it pays the States, the five paid to county governments, and the nineteen paid to municipalities.

Labor is waging a big fight for restoration of the Federal government workers' pay, but it faces a determined and poweropposition which undoubtedly is backed by a large body of public opinion. Labor must make the public see that the government's pay cut policy is inconsistent with its program of raising wages in private employment and that instead of promoting recovery the pay cut policy is a factor in retarding business gain.

That Nazi Germany's new labor law, wiping out trade unionism in its entirety, and with it the right to strike and bargain collectively, will not be hailed with favor by the rest of the world is pointed out by the "Evening Star," Washington, D. C., which says:

"The authors of the law can hardly expect it to merit the approval of other countries which long since recognized certain rights of organized labor as fundamental and irrevocable."

Trade Union Heads Call for **Intensive Organization Drive**

Situation Imperatively Demands Great Unionization Efforts, Washington Conference Says-Company Union Growth Held Big Danger to Labor.

WASHINGTON. D. C .- Warning that under provisions of the National Recovery Act. employers are exerting every effort to form company unions and that the situation imperatively demands the utmost in organization effort by the bor movement, representatives of inter-national and national unions, in conference here, issued a stirring call to labor to intensify organization work throughout American industry.

Speakers, from President William Green of the American Federation of Labor, down the line of national and international union heads, declared that American labor faced a critical situation and that no time must be lost in organizing the wage-earners. It was emphasized that the rapid growth of company unions threatened the very existence of organized labor, that jurisdictional disputes must be settled in the spirit of tolerance and that organization must be pushed in whatever form or method seemed best designed to rally the workpushed ers under the banner of the labor move-

In addition to declaring for intensive and aggressive organization activities, the conference condemned continuation of wage cuts in the Federal government service and listened to complaints against the operation and administration of the The meeting was held in pursuance to action taken by the last A. F. of L. convention.

Organization Held Imperative

The conference's declaration on organization was made in approving a report submitted by a committee headed by Matthew Woll. Other members were Victor A. Olander, Arthur O. Wharton, Daniel J. Tobin, Charles P. Howard, Andrew Myrup, George Lakey, David Dubinsky and Michael Colleran.

After pointing out that it was without power and authority to change the fundamental principles of trade autonomy upon which the A. F. of L. was founded, or to alter the constitutional requirements and provisions of the Federation, the committee's report said:

"Organization among wage-earners is imperative. Industries are being organized and cartelized throughout the land. the wage-earners are through organization, free and independent of employer control or influence, labor will have suffered a distinctive loss.

"The paramount issue is not what particular form of organization shall be followed in this emergency and this unusual situation. The demand of the moment is to promote organization in whatever form or method is best designed to rally wage-earners to the cause of organized labor, bearing in mind that in the pursuit of organization the present structure, rights and interests of affiliated na nal and international unions must be followed, observed and safeguarded.

"The A. F. of L., contrary to a common belief, does not desire to dictate the form of organization that shall prevail among wage-earners. Its policy has been that of encouraging whatever form of organization in any trade, calling or industry, seems best to meet the requirements of the workers."

A. F. of L. Must Lead

After pointing out that employers are taking full advantage of the provisions of the NRA to organize and maintain company unions, the report says:

"It is in this sort of situation that the A. F. of L. must assume leadership and take command in the organizing of wage-

earners in whatever form the temporary situation may demand or require and with the objective in mind of not only protecting and promoting existing national and international unions, but in encouraging the formation of new national and international unions where no such organizations prevail.

"It must be apparent that in this endeavor of organization, conflicts of jurisdiction and claims of invasion of organization are likely to occur. If we are to meet the requirements of the moment we must accept such conflicts in the spirit of tolerance and through proper procedure correct such errors as may have or hereafter occur."

Four Recommendations

Four recommendations were made by the committee for organization work. They were:

"First: That the work of organizing by and through national and international unions, supplemented by that of the A. F. of L. through federal and local trade unions, proceed with increased vigor and determination; that the fullest possible latitude be exercised by the Executive Council in the granting of federal charwhenever a temters and that where or porary infraction of the rights of national and international unions may be involved, that the Executive Council adjust such difficulties in the spirit of taking full advantage of the immediate situation and with the ultimate recognition of the rights of all concerned.

"Second: That the Executive Council through the officers of the American Federation of Labor arrange conferences between organizers and representatives of National and International Unions, of affiliated local units and of the American Federation of Labor, General, Special and Volunteer organizers in the respective centers, for the purpose of creating complete understanding and harmony among those charged with organization work, to be followed in methods of promoting organization, so as to avoid or lessen unnecessary friction, conflict or limitations due to varying financial requirements of different National and International organizations, and forms and character of organizations being promoted.

"Third: That the officers of the American Federation of Labor call into special conferences periodically the executive officers or representatives, or representative committees of the several partments and divisions of organized labor within the American Federation of Labor to review the progress of organization made and to plan for future methods to be followed and means to be employed in furthering organization in the respective fields of endeavor.

"Fourth: That the officers of the American Federation of Labor arrange for mass meetings of wage-earners throughout the land and that all local unions be called upon to co-operate in calling and arranging for these mass meetings; that the officers of the American Federation likewise undertake to train and arrange for speakers at these and other meetings; that both the press and the radio be used to the fullest possible extent, and that every other means available be used to further the spirit of organization and promote the formation trade unions among wage-earners throughout the land."

"The conditions with which the workers are at present confronted make organization more imperative than ever," the committee said in ending its report.

"The need of workers everywhere is to get together, to organize, to exercise the principles of mutual aid, to form trade unions, the one method whereby they can effectually protect themselves in industry and meet the enormous problems of the day.'

The report was strongly championed by President Green, Vice-President Woll, Charles P. Howard, president of the International Typographical Union; Francis J. Gorman, vice-president of the United Textile Workers; Victor A. Olander, secretary-treasurer of the International Seamen's Union of America; Daniel J. Tobin, president of the Interna-tional Brotherhood of Teamsters, and others. It met with little opposition from the floor and was approved by unanimous vote.

U. S. Wage Cuts Condemned

Assailing Federal pay cuts, the conference declared that it "vigorously condemns a continuation of wage cuts in the government service as an illogical and unjust discrimination against government workers and, by offering an excuse for chiseling employers, a distinct handicap to efforts to increase consumer buying power through higher wages which is the cornerstone of the recovery program."

President Green was strong commended for his fight against Federal pay cuts and the labor movement was urged to continue to success the campaign for restoration of government pay reductions and working conditions.

The opening session of the conference was featured by a discussion of the National Recovery Act, during which the operation and administration of the act as sharply criticised.

Daniel J. Tobin was the chief critic of the NRA, declaring that while some unions felt that the act had been of as sistance to them, others charged that the codes had deprived them of benefits won by many years of struggle and sacrifice. But the NRA had awakened labor to the need of fighting for its rights and was "all to the good" in this respect, he added.

As a result of the discussion General Hugh S. Johnson, Administrator of the Recovery Act, was asked to address the following session and answer questions. The session was executive, with no report of the proceedings. It is known, however, there was lively interchange of opinion between the General and the delegates, with the administration of the NRA coming in for some vigorously worded criticism.
