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a high level. In attempting to evaluate the results of the N R A, we meet certain difficulties which are not found in experimental sciences. We cannot modify the condi-tions so as to eliminate many forces and pressures which almost unforeseen and unnoted, may have important effects. The N R A is, of course, only a portion of the New Deal. Furthermore, we cannot re-try an experiment in social control. There are so many impulses which play parts in effecting recovery and reconstruction that it is very difficult to assign this or that result to a definite cause; possibly other result to a definite cause; possibly other conditions furnish the real causative

In March, 1933, the dangers confronting the nation were so great that we were practically forced to experiment. Per-haps what we are doing should be called pioneering in a new economic order of potential plenty. the

The NRA may be studied: (1) as a recovery measure; (2) as a reform or reconstruction measure. It is certainly not a revolutionary proposal. It may be considered to be a program which changes somewhat the framework of our present order.

As a reconstruction measure, the N R A has put new limitations upon business. Its goal, with which few would disagree, seems to be the end of voluntary unem-ployment, increased national productivity, higher standards of living, a shorter working day or week, and a reduction of windfall profits or unearned incomes. According to Commissioner of Labor Sta-tistics Lubin, behind N R A with its wide-flung ramifications is the single maxim, "the welfare and profits of no private business should interfere with the wel-fare of the nation as a whole. Minimum of unfair trade practices, are all expres-sions of this maxim. They aim at elimi-nating from our economic order those who seek economic success at the expense of the health and decent living of other human beings." As a reconstruction measure, the NRA

human beings." The great depressions of earlier days— 1837, 1873, 1893—occurred in the infancy of the machine age. The United States was pushing out of the pioneer epoch. We needed more and more machinery, railways, canals and buildings to enable us to produce more, to add to the per capita productivity of the nation. The depression of 1921 followed a great war and occurred at a time when we were much behind in our requirements for buildings of a variety of types, and when the automobile industry was gaining an important foothold.

The general aim of N R A is to place limits upon competitive squabbling, to prevent, for example, the kind of com-petition which results in the sweat shop, in mere subsistence wages, in child labor, and in pricing below legitimate costs of reasonably efficient firms. It aims at regu-lated competition; but it expects within in the town feet. Undoubtedly industries in which competition works very badly will follow the railways and public utili-regulation or to governmental ownership and operation. The coal industry and petroleum industry may be pointed to as candidates for rigid control or for gov-ernmental operation. In the interests of social well-being.

social well-being. The NRA is a middle-of-the-road plan to modify but to preserve the capitalistic system. The administration may turn left or it may turn right but the hope of preserving the present order and of avoid-ing an upheaval seems to depend upon tightening the control of government upon industrial and financial affairs in the interests of the nation as a unit. If the limited governmental supervision, or is ended, we may with considerable confi-dence anticipate more rigid control of one sort or another.

sort or another. As has been indicated, when indus-trialfsts make large profits, they are prone to overexpand. In short, in the power age we are beginning to ask: can American industrialists and business men be trusted with large profits? Profits may be considered' as a sort of fee which society pays for the services of business men. Clearly, too much may be paid for such services. Is it not essential in the interests of industry considered as a pro-ductive unit to change the rules of the business game so as to reduce the oppor-tunity to obtain excessive or windfall profits and to use a steepiy graduated tax

in order to reach such incomes if they appear in spite of the new rules? The corporation which makes large profits and uses these profits to build new factories to produce automobiles, tires, textiles or shoes when we already are able to produce all that are actually needed, wastes the national wealth. It is a misdirection of human and natural energy. Purchasing power should be directed to the purchase of more autos, tires, clothing, shoes and other consum-able goods instead of toward the produc-tion of machinnes to make more of these goods.

The success of the NRA as a recon-struction plan depends in a large measure upon the possibility of business men and labor leaders seeing the social point of view. The experience of business, pro-fessional and laboring men has been such as to emphasize immediate local and indi-vidual gaing and demands. The older as to emphasize immediate local and indi-vidual gains and demands. The older theory of an era of small-scale industry and of competition was that acting ac-cording to the dictates of individual and of immediate interests resulted automat-ically in generate and here the state.

cording to the dictates of individual and of immediate interests resulted automat-ically in general and long-run benefits for the community. Granting that such argu-ments had validity when Adam Smith's book was written in 1776, the trend of sentiment expressed in the writing of conomists and in the statute books of the nation, indicates that we are abandoning this point of view. Fierce competition is no longer held to be desirable in the field of public utilities. The sweat shop, with its low wages, long hours of labor, and undesirable working conditions, is clearly a product of insui-ficiently controlled competition. Limits placed upon the field within which com-petitive forces may work does not do away with rivalry or initiative; but it may reduce the evil effects of fierce com-petition which leads to 'the payment of starvation wages and to inferiority of product. The rules of football do not end competition between teams. These rules merely bar certain competitive methods. The N K A rules try to end "jungle com-pution," the aim is to restrain the "lone woit" of industry. The hope of governmental success in enforcing the new rules of the business

The hope of governmental success in enforcing the new rules of the business game depends in no small degree upon the willingness of business leaders jointhe willingness of business leaders join-ing in trade associations to prevent the use of unfair business methods, to de-velop codes of business ethics, and to work with organizations of labor and of consumers. Unless leaders of industry and of labor can begin to visualize the United States of America as a business unit, operated for the benefit of the con-sumers—all of us—and help in the draft-ing of a cor-ordination program which will allow a reasonable amount of indi-vidual initiative and decision, together which we find in a well-organized factory, the American people are doomed, I fear, to see a breakdown within the lifetime of many here present. Within bounds determined by legisla-

Within bounds determined by legisla-tion, business organized into trade asso-ciations is expected to govern itself. Failing to do so, more and more of gov-ernmental regulations and bureaucracy may be expected in the interests of con-sumers.

Let it be repeated, we need to balance Let it be repeated, we need to balance productive capacity by actual consump-tion. We need a distribution of purchas-ing power which will allow all to buy the necessities of life. Our problem is to dilute extreme individualism with the idea of social good. Liberty on the part of the powerful may spell inefficiency for the productive machinery as a national

which Liberty of the pioneer type should be chastened by teamwork. Freedom to compete should be allowed only within limits and in accordance with the rules of the business game, which should make for increased output rather than for re-stricted output. We should not try to solve the problem of the economics of abundance by reducing it to its lowest ownmon denominator, scarcity — because we are familiar with the economics and problems of scarcity. As a reconstruction order, with the possibility of preserving as much of individual initiative as is pos-ible in a complex age of science, machin-ery and power, I believe the NRA pro-gram should be supported by those of us who are neither reactionaries nor revo-lutionists.

lutionists. Insofar as the N R A and the New Deal have begun to educate the mass of our people in regard to social responsibility for that major weakness of the present order, unemployment, insofar as it has shaken us out of the old habits of thought which come down to us from the frontier, from Adam Smith, from a vision of rug-ged individualism of a vanished pioneer people, it has accomplished a worthwhile task. In my indgment, the chief accomplich-

In my judgment, the chief accomplish-ment to date of the N RA and the New Deal is that of teaching a large number of the American people that we must be-gin in this complex interdependent age of power and machinery to think in terms of the community or of the nation as a unit. It has been well said that men are prone to confuse means with ends when they do not clearly vision the ends. This has been one of our difficulties in under-standing the complex exchange order of today. We fail to see the business of the people of the United States as a unitary project. American business in the broad sense is operated to give food, shelter, clothing, services and comforts to a hun-dred twenty-five million people. It is the United States of America incorporated. The nation as an operating and a func-tioning unit is the pioneer farm written large. Its success depends upon the reg-ular production of goods and services, not in making money in the usual sense of the term. Our President has expressed the new idea in the statement: "Private office is a public trust." Leadership in industry or in labor organization should be considered as a public trust. The atti-tude of disregarding the interests of the part of captains of industry. Not more machinery or more efficient engineering methods, important though these may be, but a new point of view is the prime need of the hour. We need a vision of a co-ordinated and co-operating civilization. A point of view which recognizes that the world of my pioneer farmer grandfather is gone, for better or for worse, but gone forever. We need an attitude of mind which will enable us to ask—what is the good and the desirable in thin new and complex age? The greatest asset which the New Deal can give each one of us at presend is a humble inquiring mind which is willing to examine changing conditions in the light of today instead of in the light of the 1890's. The American people have had their attention turned as never before to economic and social problems. The danger is that as we emerg

Company Unions Must Go

NDOUBTEDLY there lies ahead of us, and in the not far distant future, a more than likely decision as to whether America is to abandon the company union definitely.

If the issue is not settled by orderly procedure, which means a voluntary abandoning of the company union by the great corporations of the country, then we must expect it to be settled by the steady organizing of trade unions and probably with an accompaniment of strikes.

American workers are determined to have freedom and the law of the land has guaranteed them freedom. But we find that law is of little consequence unless mewhere there is the power of enforcement and the will to enforce. In such cases as this it is labor that must do the enforcing.

Political officials are customarily but little interested in whether labor enjoys the lawful right to organize and bargain collectively.

Today there are probably two million men enchained in company unions. And there is only one kind of com-pany union, all of the learned discussion to the contrary notwithstanding. That is the so-called union formed by corporations or other employers, dominated by them, directed by them and partly financed by them. It is not proper to designate as a company union any union that has been formed by the free will of the workers, whether the members of that union are employed in one plant or in several plants. A union free from employer coercion or domination is a union. The line of distinction is clear and sharp and the professional twaddle is just that much waste of words.

We are moving rapidly toward the climax of the long struggle to determine whether workers can have their own free way about forming unions. Already the unions have moved their lines up into literally hundreds of plants whose doors were closed to unions less than two years ago. Many employers who then swore they would not allow "outsiders to run their business" now sit down and negotiate agreements and they do not feel that they have sacrificed any rights worth having. change about that as conditions change. Feelings

The great citadels of wealth, like Steel, still pretend to stand firm, but even there time will bring its change. We shall yet see the day—and it will not be so far from today-when Steel will have its orderly machinery through which employers and employes will deal in harmony and with a resulting good will that probably will be so astonishing to Steel that it will not at once realize its value.

The end of industrial feudalism is coming not l cause the feudal lords want to let go, but because it is in the nature of the times that they must let go. There has been no particular change of heart or of minds on the part of the men who control great wealth, but there has been a change in the mind of the masses which, after all, does rule.

If Steel and other reluctant industries were wise they would invite in the leaders of responsible disci-plined organizations and say, "Let us reach an agree-ment." But it is seldom the wisdom of the powerful that makes for progress; it is through the enlightenment of the masses and their determination that old things must pass away.

There is indication that the President's order reducing the hours of operation in the cotton garment industry without wage change is going to be followed in other industries. Code by code they are coming up review. The President is tired of the dilly-dally tactics of recent weeks.

Obstructive Tactics Unwise

THE railroads are crying loudly over the railway pension act and a legal test of the act's constitutionality is said to be assured.

In the present temper of America, such action seems foolish. It would appear to be the better part of wisdom for the railroads to give the pension act a fair trial and see how it worked out. If it should place too great a burden on the railroads or have other serious defects, it could be amended. In the meantime there is no danger that it will ruin the railroads.

The nation is in no mood just now to stand obstructive tactics from the railroads or other great moneyed interests. It expects business of all kinds to co-operate "New Deal," and attempts to block the pension in the act will not add to the popularity of the railroads, which need friends badly in these days of growing competition from other means of transportation

POINTING out that the problem of labor relations still seems far from a satisfactory solution still seems far from a satisfactory solution, the American Federation of Labor says in its current survey of business:

Since the Administration has not yet secured for workers their legal right to organize, strikes have become necessary in very many localities to enforce the Recovery Act. These cannot help retarding business, but unless the law can be otherwise enforced, we cannot expect them to cease until workers have won recognition.'

"Labor as an organized group," the Federation adds, "is emerging to perform its function in American society. This is a necessary part of the reorganization for economic control; without it we could not hope to keep the balance between producing and consuming power.

As long as employers deny the right of the workers to organize there will be strikes. The moment the right of organization is granted, one big cause of strikes is removed. These are self-evident facts, plain to all, yet e employers do not see them.

Nothing can take the place of the Union Label. It has borne the test of years. It is the only emblem that absolutely safeguards the workers.

Small Business and Chiseling

UCH is said these days about the aches and pains M of little business men under the NRA codes. LVL Unquestionably some of them are hard put, especially where the business is not on a sound footing, and many of them are deserving of consideration.

But some of the trouble arises also in the fact that codes have raised a barrier of a kind against unrestrained chiseling; in other words, against wage slashing at will, lengthening hours, employing children and resorting to any trade practice not prohibited by the criminal code.

Some of these "little fellows" who are crying loudest now that the shoe pinches are the ones who led the way two and three years ago in the relentless wage slashing that made the depression more severe than it would have otherwise been, broke up homes, led to mortgage foreclosures, and by pressure, started the victims downward spiral in employment.

Before tears are shed for the distress of these "little fellows" something of the records of past performance should be known. If they are merely looking for lati-tude and freedom to chisel, they are entitled to no consideration whatever.

Greed at Its Worst

HE record of the tobacco industry in this country is destined to become a classic in its perfect illus-П L tration of the unlimited greed of some American business men, and their practice of the business creed

of "buy in the cheapest, and sell in the dearest market." Tobacco growers received for their product in 1929 the sum of \$286,000,000; in 1930 the sum of \$212,000,000; in 1931 the sum of \$131.000.000; and in 1932 this was reduced to \$107,000,000.

Profits of tobacco manufacturers in 1929 amounted to \$134,000,000; while in 1932 their profits were \$146,-000,000. In 1929 the number employed in tobacco manufactures was 116,119 persons, and their wages amounted to \$94,500,000, while in 1931 the number employed was 99,769, and their wages amounted to \$69,400,000.

In the growing of tobacco the whole family of the tobacco grower must work, and the average family income of tobacco growers in 1929 was \$720; but by 1932 this had dropped to the pitiful sum of \$250 average family income for the tobacco grower.

In the tobacco factories the average wage was \$815 in 1929; but in 1931 this had been cut to \$695.





RESOLUTION No. 1 **RESOLUTION No. 1** Whereas, The control of practically all the musical compositions in America has passed from the individual composers to a certain group of individuals and music publishers who have combined themselves into an organization known as the Ameri-can Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers, holding a monopolistic con-trol over practically all musical composi-tions in the United States, and Whereas, the said group of individuals

Whereas, the said group of individuals by virtue of the Copyright Laws of the United States are unregulated as to fees to be charged for the use of said music,

Whereas, By virtue of the said monopo-listic control, the said group are now in a position to dictate the terms upon which an industry dependent upon the use of music may continue to exist, which ar-bitrary power has been continuously ex-ercised to the great detriment of the pub-lic, and causing the ranks of the unem-ployed musician to increase, because of the prohibitive license fees people em-ploying musicians in public places are forced to pay, and Whereas, The said combination of cer-Whereas, By virtue of the said monopo

Whereas, The said combination of cerwhereas, The said combination of cer-tain groups, unrestricted by law, is grad-ually extending its sources of revenue, often collecting as many as three sepa-rate license fees for the rendering of one musical performance, which by fiction of law has been interpreted as three sepa-rate performances under certain circum-stances, and

stances, and Whereas, The said monopolistic com-bination is very actively engaged in enact-ing new laws in their behalf while the American Public has heretofore slept, dur-ing such invasion of their rights; now, therefore, be it

therefore, be it Resolved, That the delegates of the American Federation of Musicians in con-vention assembled, hereby instruct our National Executive Board to prepare an amendment to the Copyright Law, so that the said American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers shall be regu-lated by law as to the fees they may charge people employing musicians; and that the said National Executive Board petition Congress to conduct an investi-gation into the activities of the said American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers; and that the said Na-tional Executive Board make any recom-mendations in the said proposed copytional Executive Board make any recom-mendations in the said proposed copy-right amendment, which in its judgment will protect the thousands of musicians now unemployed throughout the country, and which unemployment is in a most substantial degree due to the activities of the said American Society of Com-posers, Authors and Publishers.
