Work Relief and Wage Rates

DURING this depression most of the methods of remuneration known to man have been tried by our various relief administrations. Some administrations have applied and reapplied all of them at various times—the prevailing wage with or without a 30-cent hourly minimum, the C. W. A. rates which ranged from 40 cents to \$1.75 per hour, rates three-quarters the prevailing scale, a flat rate for all workers regardless of skill or effort with such rates ranging all the way from 20 to 60 cents, the C. C. C. "security payment" of \$1.00 a day, plus board and lodging, piece rates of various sorts, 5-and-10-cent-per-hour bonuses for good behavior, flat credit rates of 20 to 50 cents for those working our food orders—not to mention other types of payment in kind and more indirect methods of remuneration.

Under the new four-billion-dollar works program the administration proposes a total "security payment" averaging \$50 per month, with perhaps an \$80 to \$100 monthly maximum for certain groups of workers. There are also indications that differential rather than flat hourly rates for all will be paid for various kinds of labor under the new program. According to the bill, the President "may fix different rates of wages for various types of work on any project" and such rates can vary also as between communities, but they are not to "affect adversely or otherwise tend to decrease the going rate of wages paid for work of a similar nature."

Under certain circumstances it will be extremely difficult to prove that commercial wage rates have been adversely affected by relief-wage policies even though one may feel pretty sure that they have. It is hard to measure the influence of one specific factor upon the net result of a combination of factors. Often one cannot weigh with mathematical accuracy the net effect of differing relief rates upon normal wage scales. Nor are the motives that induce employers to reduce wages easy to uncover. So far our relief administrators have gingerly avoided this thorny problem, although under the new set-up it will be part of Mr. Harry Hopkins' duties. No studies have been made and no criteria have been established by which to judge the effects of relief activities upon normal employment and pay. But surely some attention will have to be given such matters by Mr. Hopkins and his assistants. Since the bill specifically provides that hourly rates for relief work shall not "affect adversely or otherwise tend to decrease the going rate," investigators will have to be appointed and investigations, in response to complaints, will have to be made. The formulation of some clear and definite policy is called for.

As already stated, a motley variety of methods for relief payment have been applied during this depression, and there exists a considerable amount of data that indicates the effects of different relief

policies upon normal rates of pay. Certainly in many communities up until C. W. A. commenced operations, commercial wage rates were appreciably depressed in some occupations by relief wage policies. The C. W. A. affected rates of pay in just the opposite direction. In some instances union members, in the building trades for example, had been undercutting the hourly rates called for by the union agreements. C. W. A. for the time being put a stop to that. That the wage rate paid for relief employment is of some importance to normal enterprise is also shown by the fact that the F. E. R. A. felt it necessary to repeal the 30-cent minimum rate in farm districts.

It is absurd then to maintain, as some officials tried to in connection with C. C. C. and other projects, that there is some kind of a "neutral" wage rate and "neutral" relief work which exists in a sort of splendid isolation, insulated from the workaday world. As long as relief work is worthwhile and value-creating, its effect upon normal operations and normal wage rates will be far from nil. When the government hires relief labor on a grand scale, the rates paid for such labor are bound to influence favorably or otherwise the standards prevailing in public and private enterprise. A grave responsibility, therefore, rests upon the President and his aides in selecting work projects and fixing wage rates for at least three and a half million workmen.

Neither can the work be separated from the wage. Just as there is no "non-competitive" wage for relief work, so there is no "non-competitive" relief employment, unless it be reraking leaves or polishing the pavement with toothbrushes. All worthwhile work is competitive. The question is one of degree rather than kind. The false notion of non-competitive work, discredited by former experience, both here and abroad, has been expounded and exploded anew during this depression. However, as more and more public work was earmarked for the unemployed on relief, it became obvious that relief employment could not be both value-creating and ineffective at the same time.

That the question of wage rates and work are inseparably tied together is apparent when one stops to consider what has taken place and what is taking place with regard to relief. In New York City, between April and December of last year, relief labor was employed to paint 24 million square feet and to erect 51 thousand square feet of public buildings. At the same time 40 miles of water pipe, 30 miles of sewers and 168 miles of new highways were constructed by relief employes and over 3 million square yards of roads were repaved or resurfaced. While all this was going on, appropri-

ations to pay for that work in the customary manner were continually decreased. According to the newspapers, the Mayor of New York stated that the highways to be constructed in New York City under the new 4-billion-dollar program "were of the type usually paid for by city-wide assessment, which would relieve the burden on city taxpayers." The savings to taxpayers accomplished by any such procedure, of course, will cause still more unemployment amongst road workers, construction employes, painters and other laboring groups.

A relief director in another large city has stated that the "various departments of the city government were contacted and made cognizant of the fact that we had so many men at their disposal for any work on which they might wish to use them." He went on to say that relief labor was then engaged in work on gigantic city projects already begun before the relief program was inaugurated on such an extensive scale, projects which initially were to be completed by regularly hired labor. This same official stated that "through the relief workers of the Department of Public Affairs has been able to lay off many of its regular employes." In other words, as the city's right hand was hiring relief clients at low rates of pay its left hand was firing higher-paid workmen, increasing unemployment and, therefore, further stimulating this expanding business of relief. The same sort of thing has happened in cities and counties all over the country.

If low-paid relief clients displace higher-paid public employes, the effect on prevailing rates of pay is apparent. Not only is the average rate thereby reduced, but displacement causes the regular demand or need for public employes to decrease at the very time that the supply of labor seeking employment is enhanced by the number of former employes ousted by relief activities. If supply increases as demand dwindles, the answer, so far as commercial rates of pay are concerned, is obvious. Not only that, but if, as the President has stated, the 4-billion-dollar appropriation is to be dispersed in part as loans rather than grants to local governmental units, then local demand for regular public employes and contracts let for public work will be a negligible item for a number of years to come. Local funds simply won't be available for various kinds of public construction if they are being siphoned to Washington in payment for past works done on a relief basis.

The experience of other countries where less than the prevailing rate has been paid on relief projects is instructive. Australia and New Zealand have found that the more relief employment approaches normal work, the more the scale of pay is a matter of importance to

the existing public and private economy. In New Zealand last year it was alleged that "much work which has been done for local authorities at relief wages would, in the absence of any subsidy, have been done at normal rates" and in the customary manner. The English, from their 50-year experience with relief employment on municipal work, found that the tendency to displace the regular, better-paid employes by relief workers was rapidly accelerated when wage rates considerably below the prevailing rates were paid on relief projects.

Judging from the relief projects and the wage policy, one suspects that the two-year program that the Social Democrat Government in Sweden has so successfully engineered may have been the model for our new 4-billion-dollar works program. Private employment in Sweden is now back to the 1929 figure and the budget is balanced with a large part of the public works appropriation for last year unspent at the beginning of this year. Sweden was especially fortunate so far as the danger of displacement is concerned. Since the Swedish road authorities always carefully plan their normal operations three years in advance, there was little question whether low relief wages and works projects were causing a corresponding contraction in the normal programs for the ensuing three years.

Under the Swedish public works program skilled labor received the ordinary market rate; practically all of the work was done on a piece-rate basis, and a labor government was in office. There was constant study of the lowest general rates paid for unskilled labor in each locality. Though in high-wage communities the rates for relief work were kept at as much as 20 per cent below the lowest general rate established in the open market for common labor, relief rates were closely and quickly adjusted to each change in the market rates.

After three years, during which a million to four million relief workers have been kept busy by "made work" projects of all sorts and sizes, it will be difficult for the Federal Government, in selecting work projects, to steer between the Scylla of silly and fantastic tasks and the Charybdis of competitive work which destroys opportunities for normal public and private employment by the very act of creating work for the employables on relief. Already many jobs that were in store for those who normally earn a living by public works have been handed over to the unemployed on relief rolls, often resulting in a reduction of normal wage rates as well as of regular employment. The need for a body, similar to that set up in Sweden, which would collect and interpret current wage data and closely check the effects of relief projects and pay upon normal employment and commercial wage scales is evident if the 4-billion-dollar works fund is to be spent wisely and well.

"THE MUSIC MAKER"

In San Francisco, on the Pacific Coast, a new magazine is being established, primarily for music composers and his interpreter. The editorial policy will be strongly union, educational and national in scope.

Twenty pages of new American music will be published each month. Compositions may be submitted from classical to ultra-modern, and for voice or instrumentation.

One of the major aims of the magazine will be the support of the principle of civic and State subsidization of symphony and opera. It will also vie with the Federation of Music Clubs in fighting for the American musician and seek to improve his status. A national board member of which is lending the fullest cooperation.

The annual subscription will be \$3.00, and every subscriber will have the right to submit compositions. These will be judged by a board headed by Alfred Hertz, and represent public school music, the radio, modern music, the Federation of Music Clubs, an outstanding pianist, with Redfern Mason as the editor.

The successful compositions will be printed. The copyright will become the property of the composer, and he will also be given the plates from which it is printed. He will, therefore, be able to print as many copies of his work as he wishes.

The magazine will deal with national questions, such as the subsidization of symphony and orchestra, the radio, public school music, the Federation of Music Clubs, the Musicians' Union, outstanding conductors, etc.

The "Music Maker" will be strongly union. The editor, Redfern Mason, for over twenty years was music editor of the Hearst Examiner. He is now president of the San Francisco Newspaper Guild. At their recent convention in Cleveland the Guild voted for affiliation with the A. F. of M. Walter J. Rudolph will be the publisher.

The first issue of the magazine will be about September 15th from the headquarters in the Kress Building in San Francisco.

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Labor and the Constitution

AMONG the deplorable results of the United States Supreme Court's decision invalidating the National Industrial Recovery Act is the conviction forced on working men and women that they are without the protection of the Federal Constitution in the field of industrial relations.

Those who own and control our industries employ millions of working men and women scattered throughout all of the forty-eight States.

Under our system of production, the workers sell the use of their labor power for a price called wages. The amount of wages received determines the living standards the workers can buy for themselves and their families. The length of the work week determines the leisure the workers have to enjoy some of the wonderful blessings of our modern civilization, largely appropriated hitherto by the privileged classes.

Actuated solely by the motive of maximum profits, employers quite generally attempt to beat down wages and lengthen hours. Because they are stronger economically than the masses of unorganized workers and because they have a monopoly of work opportunities, employers have been to a large degree successful in these attempts to depress the living standards of large numbers of working men and women.

These oppressed workers looked to the Government for protection against this inhuman exploitation decreed by the lords of industry. Standing on the declaration in the preamble to the Federal Constitution that one of the objects of the Government which it established is to "promote the general welfare," Congress met this just demand of the workers by making the National Recovery Act the law of the land. Firmly convinced that improving the standards of labor is definitely connected with the general welfare, Congress by the Recovery Act authorized the establishment of fair practice codes under which it was illegal for employers to drive wages down below certain minimums, or compel workers to toil beyond certain maximum hours, or employ children under sixteen years of age or under eighteen years in hazardous occupations.

In the course of time this social-progress law was appealed to the Supreme Court by a low-wage and long-hour employer and was promptly held unconstitutional by that high judicial body.

In its decision, the Court told these millions of workers that the Federal Constitution does not give the Government authority to protect oppressed working men and women against the anti-social policies of subversive employers.

On the contrary, the Court in effect declared that the Constitution confers on employers not only the right to impose wages so low that workers are unable to buy a decent living for themselves and their families, excessively long hours and inhuman work conditions, but also gave employers freedom to chain thousands of children to the wheels of industry—all of which outrages were prohibited by the Recovery Act.

The inescapable conviction which the Supreme Court's decision imposes on millions of working men and women is that so far as protection for decent wages, hours and work conditions is concerned, they are alien to the Constitution, but that employers who wish to establish low labor standards in order to increase profits are thoroughly safeguarded by that document in the prosecution of their nefarious policy.

The great problem now confronting the American people is that of expanding the Federal Constitution so that it will include within its protection the millions of men and women who work for wages.

Resumption of Child Labor

ONE of the most regrettable results of the edict of the Supreme Court invalidating the National Recovery Act is the inevitable resumption of child labor exploitation by anti-social employers.

According to the U. S. census of 1930 approximately 130,000 children under 16 years of age were on the payrolls of industrial employers. By industries the number of employed children were: Textile industry, 20,000; clothing, 9,000; other branches of manufacture, 40,000; hotels, restaurants, beauty parlors and laundries, 8,000; stores, 28,000; clerical occupations, mainly errand and messenger service, 17,000.

The codes of fair practice established by authority of the Recovery Act, which were destroyed by the Supreme Court decision, prohibited employment of these child workers with the exception of 14 and 15-year-old children in stores, who were permitted to work three hours a day before and after school hours.

Taking into consideration some decline in the employment of children during the depression, the National Child Labor Committee estimates that fully 100,000 minors were barred from industry by the codes.

Before the NRA, employers put around 50,000 boys and girls 16 and 17 years old to work in hazardous occupations. Saw mill and planing mill employers alone employed 12,000 minors in dangerous work. Under the NRA fair practice codes, which the Supreme Court held obnoxious to the Federal Constitution, the employment of these 50,000 minors in occupations which menaced their life and health was prohibited.

Freed from the "regimentation" of the NRA by the Supreme Court's edict, ruthless employers will again chain thousands of children to the wheels of industry and turn their tender bodies into interest coupons and dividend checks.

Pending the ratification by twelve more States of the Child Labor Amendment to the Constitution something can be done to protect these boys and girls by including in Federal contracts a clause prohibiting their employment in the manufacture of the goods purchased by the government. But the total volume of those goods is such a small portion of the output of industry that the ban will not go far toward the extinction of the evil.

For the present every child labor exploiter in the country can proceed in the ghoulish work of transforming the flesh and blood and mind of children into profits with the knowledge that this inhuman activity is under the protection of the Federal Constitution as interpreted by the Supreme Court.

Labor Queries

Questions and Answers on Labor: What It Has Done; Where It Stands on Problems of the Day; Its Aim and Program; Who's Who in the Ranks of the Organized Toilers.

Q.—What is a shop card?

A.—A shop card is a printed sign which is displayed in the window or on the wall of all shops and business places whose employes are unionized.

Q.—Did organized labor from its beginning fight child labor?

A.—Yes. The American Federation of Labor, in its first constitution adopted in 1881, said: "We are in favor of the passage of laws in the several States forbidding the employment of children under the age of 14 in any capacity under penalty of fine and imprisonment."

Q.—Who said: "Whoever produces anything by weary labor, does not need a revelation from heaven to teach him that he has a right to the thing produced?"

A.—Robert G. Ingersoll.

Q.—What was the Order of Railway Clerks of America?

A.—This was the original name of the Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees.

Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, un-
hastened by necessity or
trepidation, sometimes
penetrates to truth.
Here, where the shal-
lows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the
lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

Steel will fight the Wagner-Connelly labor disputes act. What may well be called an official declaration of war was made by E. T. Weir, chairman of the Board of the National Steel Corporation, the very day that the bill passed.

"I am advised by our general counsel," said Mr. Weir, "that the Wagner-Connelly bill is unconstitutional, on the ground that our labor is not in interstate commerce. Furthermore, no law can, under the Constitution, take away from the workers of this country their most treasured and valued right of deciding for themselves by whom and in what manner they will be represented in negotiations.

There is no fairness or equity in such a law, and for the protection of millions of our workers, the law will be contested."

As a sample of hypocrisy, this is hard to beat. But it is an old story in the unceasing fight of Big Business against labor. Twenty years ago, employers fought the eight-hour law for women on the ground that women had a right to work more than eight hours, if they wanted to. One of the women in whose name the suit was brought was put on the stand. Under the cross-examination of Louis D. Brandeis, then lawyer for the groups defending the law and since Justice of the U. S. Supreme Court, she explained that her pay was so small that she couldn't earn a living in eight hours a day.

If there were any doubt about the labor-baiting attitude of the steel companies, the following quotation from the magazine "Steel" would end that doubt. In a department devoted to the automobile industry, "Steel" says:

"Ford continues the envy of other manufacturers in handling labor. It appears that recently a number of malcontents were detected in various departments in the Rouge (River Rouge plant). Quietly they were all transferred to one department, then this department's work was farmed out, the department was closed, and the malcontents were out of a job.

"Incidentally," Steel goes on, "General Motors boasted up to the time of its recent Toledo strike that it had no undercover men in its plants. This situation is being remedied, and henceforth General Motors will have a close check on sentiment within its plants."

There, from the inside, is a revelation of what Big Business magnates, especially in the steel industry, really feel and think. They are in a state of covert war with their employes. They envy anyone like Ford, who has shown an unholy generalship in putting labor at a hopeless disadvantage. They regularly employ spies on their workers.

The difference between the economic tyranny of the steel and automobile industries today and the political tyranny of the Austrian principalities in Italy ninety years ago is not spacious. But when will labor get its Garibaldi?

Unfair Labor Practices Made Illegal

FOR years anti-labor employers have made use of sundry un-American schemes to prevent working men and women from enrolling in trade unions and using trade union collective bargaining to raise wages, shorten hours and improve work conditions.

Many of these schemes have approached forms of violence and have militated against trade union organization because of the fear of victimization which the workers knew employers did not hesitate to apply. A number of the more outstanding devices used by certain types of employers to terrorize the workers are described in the Wagner-Connelly Labor Disputes Act, passed by Congress, as "unfair labor practices" and are made illegal by the Act, which prohibits an employer from:

Dominating or interfering with the formation or administration of any labor organization or contributing financial or other support to it.

Discriminating with regard to employment or employment terms so as to encourage or discourage membership in any labor organization.

Discharging employes for giving testimony given or charges filed under the Act.

Refusing to bargain collectively with the duly elected representatives of his employes.

Under the Act the National Labor Relations Board is empowered to use Federal laws and the Federal courts to enforce the prohibition of these "unfair labor practices."

The Wagner-Connelly Act opens new opportunities for the workers of the United States to enroll in bona fide trade unions and use their organized strength to achieve at least an approach to economic liberty.

We would like to hear this particular piano teacher play. We'll bet that his technique resembles the rapid drawing of a cane along a picket fence; and that under his touch a glissando would sound like the raucous reverberations of a riveting machine. Is he not familiar with that ancient maxim: "Physician, heal thyself?" It might not be a bad idea for this particular ivory tickler to consult a psychiatrist, himself. Meanwhile, Dear Lizzie, go ahead with your bassooning. We feel safe in predicting that in later life you will not be adjudged any more insane than you were at the time of your original selection of an instrument. If we were to offer a bit of advice it would be—Do not confine yourself to a miserly forty-five minutes per day. Greet the dawn with a few excerpts from the "Damnation of Faust." When noontide heats are blazing, run over—as far as you can—"In Cellar Cool." And then when purple twilight ushers in the hour of evening rest, "By the Waters of Minnetonka" should be sufficient to prepare you, and your distracted neighbors as well, for a night of sweet repose.

One of the delightful entertainment features of the Asbury Park convention was the appearance of Phil Spitalny, of Cleveland, and his bevy of orchestral beauties, who rendered a snappy program of standard and lighter musical offerings. The delegates cheered the musicians to the echo—also recalling with pleasure the fine concert they gave at the Cleveland convention one year before.

Did you ever hear of a Local jurisdiction where jobs are so plentiful, and the musicians so busy that there is no time in which to rehearse? We have discovered just such a place on the Federation map. It is Local No. 171, Springfield, Mass. In one of the newspapers of that city we find nearly a column story outlining musical activities under the classification of ERA project. There are summer dances attended by as high as two thousand young people. Homes for the aged are constantly favored. All societies and local clubs are displaying a feverish desire for musical supply. Musicians from 18 to 60 are in constant demand. Art galleries are calling for musical features. Request selections range from Ludwig Beethoven to Irvin Berlin. Band concerts in city parks will be an all-summer delight. Secretary E. H. Lyman is threatened with an attack of writer's cramp making out so many new applications for membership and signing receipts for back dues. The most cynical and skeptical are now beginning to admit there is a Santa Claus and that he may be as gracious in his benefactions in mid-summer as in the snow-time of the year. We sincerely hope this Halcyon period will be protracted—even though ERA might be declared unconstitutional later on. For when a local community once obtains a genuine taste of the sweets of high-grade musical offering they can usually be persuaded to unite in a demand for the continuation thereof.

The Russian Soviet authorities have announced that easy divorces in that country must come to an end. Has Moscow been turning Hollywood?

So many people have heard and enjoyed Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians over the radio they were especially delighted to see, as well as hear, them face to face when they appeared at an Asbury Park banquet and entertainment during convention week. It is a great organization.

Interesting news gleanings come from Local No. 89 to the effect that Brother Harry E. Barber, member of the organization, has just been elected Mayor of the city of Decatur, Illinois, by one of the largest majorities ever received by a candidate for that office. Mayor Barber is not only a band musician, but a vocalist as well, and his campaign singing is said to have been an effective element in his success. He has been active as manager of the Goodman Band—an institution whose genesis dates from the year 1856 and still functions in local affairs. One of his first official acts was the appointing of our old friend, Chas. P. Housum, as secretary of the Local Liquor Control Commission. Brother Housum, who has expatiated many times upon the virtues of cold water before gatherings of the Order of Big Canines, at former Federation conventions, can be depended upon to see to it that the repeal of the 18th Amendment is rigidly enforced. Last, but not least, the Decatur Park Board has agreed that the citizens shall be regaled with a series of band concerts during the current summer season. Our felicitations to the victors and best wishes for all the interesting and progressive possibilities incidental thereto.

After nearly one hundred and fifty years of service the Constitution of the United States, itself, has never been declared unconstitutional.

We have a newspaper photograph before us which depicts several young women—some creeping, some at an angle of a 90-degree posture, some in other attitudes difficult to describe. At first blush we took it to be a group playing leapfrog. Inspecting the text, however, we discovered they were going through the practice courses necessary to be presented to the queen of England. Americans who are willing to crawl rather than insist upon the traditional upright and independent stature of the people of the nation to which they belong, ought to expatriate themselves entirely without delay, and take up abode in an atmosphere of royalty where they can grovel to their heart's content.

The Hudson Valley Conference continues to function as a sectional organization, interested in the welfare of its membership, and always with an eye single to conserving the interests of the American Federation of Musicians at large. The last conference was held at Middletown, N. Y. Twenty-seven delegates were present. Delegates reviewed their respective Local situations. All were at least holding their own in spite of trying industrial times; many reported increased membership. Brother G. Bert Henderson, of the National President's office, reviewed the work of the year from the National headquarter's standpoint. George B. Wood, President of Poughkeepsie Local, No. 238, was named chairman for the ensuing period and John A. Cole,

Secretary of Kingston Local, No. 215, was continued as secretary of the Conference. The next Conference will be held at Poughkeepsie.

On the Sunday immediately preceding the opening of the Asbury Park convention opportunity was afforded to attend the New York-New Jersey Conference in session at Jersey City, Local No. 526. The entertaining Local gave a fine demonstration of genuine hospitality. The time of the Conference was devoted to a discussion of the problems which nearly every Local has to meet. The Conference, however, decided to dissolve—believing that owing to certain inherent distinctions relative to the two States that a dissolution was advisable, and this was done. The divorce was in the best of feeling and without alimony claims being presented from either side. All visiting delegates from the Federation at large were glad of the opportunity to see this energetic company of down east musicians in action along legislative and constructive lines.

The *Chicago Intermezzo* of recent date carries the following:

One of the best known musicians in the East, a figure of national importance for many years, died in April at the age of fifty-one. Will Dodge, a Yankee of the Yankees, was conducting a concert at the Michaelangelo School Hall in Boston when he suffered a severe heart attack and collapsed on the platform. He was rushed to the Haymarket Relief Hospital where every effort was made to relieve him, but the stroke was a fatal one and he died within a few hours.

Mr. Dodge was the first man to lead a symphonic orchestra in a radio program in New England. He was formerly conductor of the Boston Municipal Orchestra and had been at one time assistant concert master for the Boston Opera company. At the time of his death he was leader of the E. R. A. orchestra, better known as the E. R. A. Symphony Orchestra, and had been since its inception. He was very prominent in musical affairs throughout the Eastern States and was greatly admired and esteemed by all who knew him.

The subject of the foregoing paragraph was a son of the late William G. Dodge, long a prominent member of Local No. 9, delegate from Boston to many National conventions, and in his later years assistant to President Joseph N. Weber.

We are pleased to note that Secretary Vincent Speciale, of Local No. 661, Atlantic City, has been appointed to the responsible position of interpreter in the local courts of that city. Brother Speciale is a fluent writer and we doubt not he will exemplify the same facility in the interpretation of witnesses' testimony to the understanding of judge and jury.

In less than one year from this date all the Presidential candidates will have been nominated and be making their initial spurs for position. O, boy! What a campaign!

The death of Henry Conrad, at the age of 65, is announced in the Official Journal of Local No. 802, of New York. Brother Conrad served as president of his organization and had been delegate to three National conventions. In reviewing his professional career, the Journal says:

A pioneer in the dance craze just after the turn of the century, Brother Conrad blazed the way for the name bands today. His introduction of the two-step at Berger's Restaurant, Newport, in 1905, started him on the road to fame, and for over a decade he held undisputed leadership in the society field, playing for twenty consecutive summers at the Newport Casino, and during the winters at Bradley's Casino at Palm Beach, Fla.

General poor health, climaxed by a severe heart attack was the cause of death.

The tiger woman, Clara Phillips, who disposed of an alleged rival by the hammer method, is inhaling the atmosphere of perfect freedom again. She was convicted of murder in the first degree and given a life sentence. One day when the door-keeper was not looking, she made her exit and succeeded in traveling as far as Honduras before being again apprehended. In face of this interesting record the California pardon and parole board turned her loose again at the expiration of twelve years' incarceration. The dispatches report that, "When she left she carried a violin, a saxophone and a banjo." Had the prison authorities thought to provide her a harp and fitted her with a pair of wings, she would doubtless have been starring as an angel in Hollywood by this time.

Mid-summer heat is intensified by the inevitable argument as to why the high school bands should, or should not, be permitted to play the park concerts.

Memories of Asbury Park help to keep one cool in some degree.

The Honorable Coxy has been nominated for President again by some man out in Nebraska. The Coxy running-gear may be a bit squeaky in some of the joints, but when the time comes for nominating Presidents every two years instead of every four, his locomotion will function with greater freedom. His presidency in running may be inspired by the ambition to see his beloved State of Ohio retain her extended distinction as "the Mother of Presidents."

Bureaucracy is spreading. We now have Assistant Presidents of the United States.

It is claimed that taxes will be higher next year. Blessed are they that have not, for they shall be comforted.

It is reported that Congressmen are anxious to get home and repair their political fences. They expect to use, according to report, a good deal of barbed wire in the performance.

The eclipse of the moon last month was a brilliant success. Both the rich and the poor could enjoy it. No syndicate was able to secure the exclusive exhibition rights.

This is a wonderful age. With a good radio one can hear a band concert these times, at some hour of the day or night, in most every State in the Union.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Convention called to order at 2:15 P. M. by President Weber.

The Convention unanimously endorses the Black-Connelly Thirty-Hour Work Bill. The same action is taken on the Wagner Labor Disputes Bill.

Further endorsement is given to all old-age and unemployment insurance legislation.

The Committee on President's Report submits, through chairman Curry, the following report:

To the Officers and Delegates to the Fortieth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Musicians assembled.
Asbury Park, N. J.
June 13, 1935.

The report of the President to this Convention is so comprehensive in scope regarding the affairs of the Federation and the social, political, economic situations and conditions affecting the welfare of the musician that a detailed or itemized reference to each subject covered would entail using considerable time and space without benefit to the Convention.

The report in itself is a literal education on labor principles, economic conditions, social philosophy, governmental legislation, etc.

Every vital problem of the American Federation of Musicians has been covered in detail.

Of particular interest and value to the delegates is that in this report can be found detailed information and facts on every subject of importance brought before this Convention by proposed legislation.

It is plainly evident that if each delegate would avail themselves of this treasure house of information and experience a great deal of valueless resolutions and debate would be avoided.

Out of the wealth of information and detail we find a profound knowledge of applied psychology, a deep human understanding and sympathy indicated in the following excerpts from the report which can well be kept in mind when formulating the future laws and policies of the Federation.

Speaking of guarding against the lowering of our wages and conditions, his report reads:

"This is the thing which involves us in many controversies with employers and which often necessitates the use of our economic strength. Now this strength exists in direct relationship with the dependence of the employer upon the services of our members and the strength and ability of the Local to enforce its rules, even though the competition between its members for employment may be, and generally is, keen."

He further states on the rights of the Convention in relation to its officers:

"As to the rights of the Convention to be well informed of anything and everything germane to the welfare of our members there can be no question. It is the duty of officers to furnish such. This must be done in a manner not conducive to the establishing or increasing of the popularity of any officer, but in a manner best suited to the advance of the interests of the organization, even if by doing so an officer may become less popular. In such an instance, he must find his reward in his own conscience, knowing that he has performed a duty, the obligation to perform which must be sacred unless he be merely a political opportunist."

This committee feels the Federation should feel exceedingly proud that they have chosen for their leader one so completely capable and alert to their needs and problems as reflected in his report to this Convention.

To the Officers and Delegates in Convention assembled.

GREETINGS:

Your Committee begs leave to submit the following report on the finances of the Federation:

A careful examination of the Audit for the year ending April 30, 1935, discloses the financial condition of the Federation to be in a decidedly healthful state. In its examination of the figures presented the Committee was given the whole-hearted co-operation of both Secretary and

Treasurer, both of whom appeared before the Committee on several occasions and explained in detail the workings of their respective offices. Every question put to them was answered in a way which enabled the Committee to arrive at a correct understanding of the problems by which their departments are confronted.

In addition, the Auditor, who was in Asbury Park during Convention week, assisted the Committee in its deliberations, enlightening them on every point submitted to him. The audit itself is a model document of its kind, and has been prepared in such a manner as to be easily understood, even by those who could never hope to qualify as expert accountants.

The receipts for the fiscal year ending April 30, 1935, show a considerable surplus over expenditures, and this, the accuracy of which is certified to by the auditors, is perhaps the finest tribute which could be paid the officers involved.

Concerning the manner in which the Secretary and Treasurer have conducted the affairs of the offices they fill, the Committee has no fault to find and no criticism to offer.

However, they have one suggestion which they would like to make—a suggestion that has for its purpose the clarifying of an item which has been handled in a conflicting manner by the two offices:

In 1929 a loan of \$2,000.00 was made to one of the Locals. This loan has been "written off" in the Treasurer's office, but still appears on the books of the Secretary under the head of "items receivable." This is slightly confusing to the general membership. But so long as the item remains on the books of the Secretary as an "item receivable," the Auditor is in duty bound to record it that way. No other course is open to him. To avoid this conflict of figures in future audits, and, in order that the record may be the same in both offices, your Committee suggests that this item be "written off" the books of the Secretary, the same as it has off the books of the Treasurer.

In concluding this report, which is notable, chiefly for its brevity, the Finance Committee has great satisfaction in expressing to the present incumbents unbounded admiration for the splendid services given during their tenure of office.

The Committee on Law continues its report:

Recommendation of the President:

(16)
 Amend 3rd Paragraph of Article XIII, Section 18, to read:

If Local submits satisfactory evidence to the Federation that an employer has, in collusion with members of the Federation other than members of the Local in whose jurisdiction the engagement is played, circumvented the laws of the Fed-

eration in paying the musicians less than the price, then the Federation may place the establishment of such employer on the forbidden territory list.

The Committee amends by adding the following:

If, however, evidence satisfactory to the Federation is submitted which discloses that an employer attempted to induce a contracting member, or members, of a Local to accept less than the price of an engagement and while making such attempt threatens to engage a traveling orchestra, or band, if his proposal is rejected, or subsequent, to refusal of members to accept engagement for less than the proper price, the employer does engage a traveling orchestra, or band, then the Federation shall have the right to declare such employer and his establishment forbidden territory.

The Convention adopts the recommendation of the President, as amended by the Committee.

Recommendation of the President:

"Traveling musicians playing in a hotel, restaurant, inn or cafe in the jurisdiction of a Local cannot either board or room, or both, at such hotel, restaurant, inn or cafe, or in any hotel or apartment controlled by said management. This rule supersedes any Local law concerning the same matter. Engagements in a hotel, restaurant, inn or cafe outside of the jurisdiction of a Local in which the National law provides that same may be accepted with or without board and room are exempt from this rule."

The report of the Committee is favorable to the recommendation.

Discussed by delegate Love. The favorable report of the Committee is concurred in by the Convention.

RESOLUTION NO. 65

Whereas, Since every traveling engagement requires a 10% collection, the traveling card is no longer necessary for the purpose of keeping a check on traveling musicians and orchestras, and

Whereas, The \$2.00 traveling card is an unequitable tax in that it is in no way proportionate to the musician's earning power, and is, therefore, an unequitable burden; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved by the delegates here assembled that the \$2.00 traveling card law be and is hereby stricken from the By-Laws of this American Federation of Musicians.

RESOLUTION NO. 47

Whereas, It has been deemed mandatory on the Local Unions of the A. F. of M. to collect fines and other claims from traveling members and bands who appear in public under the jurisdiction of the Local Union; and as a great deal of time is necessary to be expended in the enforcement of these demands of the Federation requiring some expense for the execution of the request, it behooves the signers of these resolutions that it would become a more equitable procedure to arrange through the offices of the Federation for the allowance of a stipulated amount in the form of a percentage to be paid to the Local Union making these collections and performing these services for the A. F. of M. and its affiliated Local Unions.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, To amend Article IX of the By-Laws in Rights and Duties of Locals by inserting a new section to read:

"In the collection of all fines, added initiations and applications for the account of the A. F. of M. the Local making such collection shall receive 15% of the amount collected."

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That all booking agencies, corporate or otherwise, MUST, before employing or representing members of the A. F. of M. make application to the office of the National President for the purpose of obtaining permission or license to employ or represent members of the A. F. of M. And, be it further

Resolved, That in the event said booking agency or corporation should, at any time, violate or cause to be violated any of the rules or regulations of the A. F. of M., the permission or license may be removed by the National President, and members of the A. F. of M. forbidden, under penalty, to take part in any manner in the activities of such booking agency or corporation.

Resolved, That the acts of Booking Agencies, corporate or otherwise, in violation of Union Rules shall be construed to be the acts of any one or all bands or orchestras belonging to or being booked by said Booking Agency or agencies and such member bands or orchestras shall be held subject to the penalties provided for the infraction of Union Rules violated by the Booking Agency or agencies to which they belong in the same manner as if they had committed the infraction direct and in person.

Whereas, Remote control sustaining programs which are unquestionably semi-commercial in character played by bands or orchestras from Cafes, Hotels, Clubs, Inns, Ballrooms, Dance Halls, Taverns, Restaurants or other places have and are seriously affecting the employment of members in radio stations and elsewhere, and

Whereas, Lack of proper policing, charges and restrictions is also resulting in the piracy of these programs by unscrupulous recording and transcription companies for which service the musicians are not paid, and

Whereas, These programs over chains and networks are in many instances unpaid for at the source, constituting unfair competition,

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That chain and network remote control programs, sustaining in character, originating from any source other than the studios proper or such place as may (for audience purposes) be construed as a studio, be prohibited, unless paid for at the regular commercial program rate of the Local in which it originates, or at a price established by the International Executive Board.

Orchestras playing in places herein mentioned to be permitted to play local remote control programs for price set by or at the discretion of the Local in which same is played, said services or program not to be re-broadcast and to be confined to licensed wave length of the station from which it originates.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary with whom such affidavit has been filed to direct a communication to each Local specified in the affidavit, so that each Local Secretary shall be informed of the depositing of a transfer card by the suspended or member of their Local. Violation of this section shall be subject to the penalties provided by By-Laws.

Whereas, It is generally recognized that no solution immediate in effect can be found, and any beneficial result will only be secured as the culmination of years of effort;

Therefore, Be It Resolved, The President of the A. F. of M. appoint a committee or commission to evolve plans to form a non-profit-sharing or mutual corporation or society similar in structure to the corporations now controlling the copyright field and calculated to give the composers and authors their just share in the financial accretments.

And calculated to share the exorbitant fees now charged by these corporations between the composer and the user, namely, the employer of musicians. And, further,

That plans be evolved to analyze the uses and popularity of particular compositions now controlled by the corporations for the purpose of sponsoring similar compositions to be used in substitution by the membership of the A. F. of M. wherever possible.

Be It Further Resolved, That the Executive Board of the A. F. of M. shall be empowered to set in motion any plans formed by this committee and judged worthy by said board.

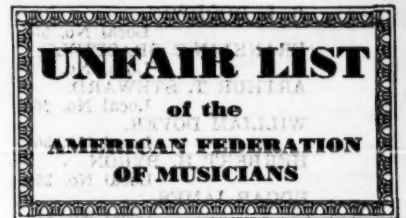
