The Fifty-fifth Annual Convention of the American Federation of Labor was distinguished by many interesting characteristics—none being more outstanding than the tense atmosphere by which it was surrounded.

The labor movement is dominated by men of strong convictions. The study of industrial problems and the relationships between capital and labor cause men to think along definite lines. It is not to be expected that these men will think alike or reveal unity in their conclusions. Such a situation is bound to precipitate clashes in opinion, high-strung debate, and sometimes vitrolic charges and counter-charges which leave their mark for the time being. It is inevitable that in a national organization of three and one-half million members there should be rival factions, clashes in the ranks of ambitious leadership, and clouds of dissension which at times may threaten the very foundations of the society.

It is gratifying to note, however, that the closing hours of the convention disclosed few if any indications of disintegration or threats of damage to the structure which by virtue of its inherent purpose and program fulfilled has more than passed the half century mark.

The only change in the official personnel was in the vice-presidential list in which George M. Berry tendered his resignation on account of having accepted an important position on the Federal Readjustment Board. For this succession there was a spirited contest between William Malone of Detroit, head of the street car men's organization, and Charles Howard of Indianapolis, head of the Typographical Union—the final vote showing 17,370 for the former and 11,693 for the latter.

President William Green's unanimous re-election was a testimonial of confidence in his leadership. Green was brought up in the trades union atmosphere, is a member of the United Mine Workers, and the whole-hearted zeal which he has ever displayed in the cause has given him a permanent place in the affections of unionists everywhere.

President William Green made an extended and very earnest response. He minced no words. He restated Labor's ideals. He made it plain that the great objective was the elevation of living standards for those whose toil make the major contribution to the wealth of the nation.

President Green refused to lend an accepting ear to the importunities of those seeking to foster a new Labor Party in American politics at this time. While he did not mention the Comintern by name, he did say:

No government in a foreign land, no camouflaged organization meeting on foreign soil, can tell the American Federation of Labor what to do."

President Green pointed out the sixhour day and the five-day week as the goal of labor.

The applause was especially vigorous when he said: "Under no circumstances must we be drawn into this European war."

As the heavy work of the convention must wait the organization and report of the various committees, the afternoon session was brief and featureless.

craft union proposition won by a vote of 18,025 to 10,826.

The convention went on record as favoring the thirty-hour week and the five-hour day as a paramount objective.

The convention minced no words in declaring its abhorrance of the persecution of trades unionists at the present time in Germany and in Italy. It urged the placing of a ban on the American participation in the 1936 Olympic games in Berlin.

The movement to establish a distinctive Labor Party got nowhere. A vast majority of the delegates believed the time not ripe for that kind of experimentation. They accordingly reaffirmed adherence to the long-time policy of standing by their friends and opposing their enemies in politics.

An interesting experiment in union An interesting experiment in union sentiment promotion is exemplified in the movement to promote social and cultural ideals through the medium of what is to be known as the Labor Stage, Inc., in the production of dramatic offerings. The experiment in New York will be awaited with interest, where it is believed 2,000,000 unionists will give the scheme tangible support. gible support.

This was Frances Perkins day. The Secretary of Labor in the Presidential cabinet would naturally have a place on a labor convention program. mental officials she understands the art of intoning those statistics which are expressed best in a major key and shrinks from disturbing the sensibilities of her auditors with those minor phrases reflecting the more somber background. She gave vent to breezy exhalations about reviving industry, increased employment and larger wage disbursements; but our own personal information, gleaned from the American Federationist, edited and published by President William Green, shows that there are still 20,000,000 on relief and 11,000,000 men looking for jobs. The convention did not have to wait long for opportunity to exemplify its anti-Communistic stand. The credentials of E. M. Curry, president of the Foundry Employes International Union, were rejected by the Credentials Committee and its report was adopted without a dissenting vote. The seating of Curry was opposed by the International Moulders' Union, from which he was expelled on charges of unbecoming conduct. Charges against him recited that he ran for Congress on the Communist ticket in 1932 and had been a member of a group which "stormed!" a labor convention in Cincinnati. nati.



#### Sales Tax Hardest on Poor

ABEL L. WALKER of the General Welfare Tax League has made a study which shows how the sales tax gouges the poor. A worker with an income of \$1,000 a year pays sales tax on 61 per cent of all that he buys. A man with \$1,000,000 a year spends only one per cent of his income in taxable purchases. The burden of the sales tax, therefore, is 61 times as

heavy on the poor as on the super-rich.

The poor must pay, while ways of evasion are open to the rich and well-to-do. A woman in Cincinnati, wanting a fur coat, goes over the river to Covington, Kentucky, buys it there, and has it sent. That becomes interstate commerce, not subject to the sales tax. Owners of big buildings buy coal by carloads from other States, while the man who must buy coal in half-ton lots, or less, buys at home and pays the tax.

The usual minimum payment is one cent. On a 10-cent article, this is 10 per cent, and on a nickel article,

20 per cent.

Twenty-four States now have sales taxes.

#### Mr. Mellon's Art and Taxes

NDREW W. MELLON, Secretary of the Treasury ANDREW W. MELLON, Secretary of the Treasury for nearly eleven years, and almost a dictator of the financial policy of this country for the same period, has given \$10,000,000 to found a National Gallery of Art at Washington to which he will turn over a collection of works of art valued at from \$25,000,000 to

\$40,000,000.

Which is good, so far as it goes, and better for the fact that Andrew Mellon has an understanding and appreciation of art which is all too rare in our noble To praise Mr. Mellon for his artistic taste is fair and correct. But to praise him for his "generosity" in making such an endowment is simply silly. Andrew

in making such an endowment is simply silly. Andrew Mellon has got vastly more money out of the United States than he ever will put in art galleries.

'In some cases, Mr. Mellon's money getting, while legal, no doubt, was startlingly direct. He has had a net personal income of far above \$1,000,000 a year for many, many years. In the latter part of the period of the World War, he paid—or was expected to pay—a surtax of 65 per cent on all that part of his income above the million dollar mark. His first care, when he became head of the Treasury, was to cut down the taxes of the head of the Treasury, was to cut down the taxes of the rich, including himself; and in a few years, he had secured a cut of surtaxes to a top rate of 20 per cent.

Say that Mr. Mellon had an income of \$3,000,000 a

Say that Mr. Mellon had an income of \$3,000,000 a year—and in some years it is known to have been more than that. When he came to the Treasury he paid—or should have paid—\$1,300,000 a year out of that top two millions. When he got through cutting the surtaxes of the rich, he was required to pay out of those excess takings only \$400,000 a year. He was saving \$900,000 a year that should have gone to the Treasury. Why get maudlin because he spends some of it on art?

## Why Do Big Banks Object?

NE amendment to the Constitution-Article Vis being invoked against the FDIC insurance for banks of smaller deposits. The ground is that property of the larger banks will be disproportionately taken for the protection of depositors in small banks. Yet, the statement is made, that most of our banking troubles have arisen from failures among the myriads of

small banks in the country.

That means, if it means anything, that the weak spot in the financial credit dam is in the neighborhood of the

small banks. It also means that when the dam breaks at the weak spots, the whole structure, and everything depending on it, is threatened by a general catastrophe. But the big banks are opposed to contributions from the

high spots in the dam to protect the weaker places.

Can it be, that the big banks are still counting on these periodic breaks in the dam as periods of magnificent sprees of accumulation for themselves?

This is only one of many questions which workers, and other depositors in small banks, who never expect to do any business with the Morgan and Rockefeller big banks, are rising up to ask. They want to know why the big banks should object to a general charge upon bank deposits for the general protection of the banking system at its weakest points.

#### They Won't Be Disbarred

COME eminent attorneys are greatly engrossed in publicizing a certain set of legal opinions regarding the Wagner-Connery Act, Guffey Act, Social Securities Act, et altera. By and large, these gentlemen, who by calling are members of the court in which these Acts are sooner or later to be tested, are pledged to uphold the law and the Constitution. In this particular matter, however, with or without retainers, they are engaged in asserting that the Congress of the United States, and the lawful authorities of the Nation—excepting, perhaps, the Supreme Court—have been doing unlawful things in enacting these laws, and that the laws are not valid. What they will say about the Supreme Court depends upon what that august body of nine elderly gentlemen happen to say about these enactments, when the latter brought before them for testing.

Eminent legal counsel for labor organizations have

been raising the point of legal ethics with reference to such practices. The gentlemen referred to are engaged in trying out, in advance of legal proceedings, certain opinions as to these Acts of Congress. Courts object to that, usually. They may be said to be trying to influence indexe and invites who may be said to be trying to influence

judges and juries who may be called upon to pass upon these Acts and their application. And that is bad.

They are trying to "stir up quarrels," and may be proven to be "spreading false rumors." Such acts are within the definition of "barretry." And that is very bad. But of course the gentlemen will not be disbarred. Not even if their arguments should prove to be "exciting law suits" on the part of corporations and employers of labor. Of course, they are wishing to appear to be "friends of the court"—and are simply trying out their opinions in the courts of public opinion, in advance.

#### The Lady Is Seeing Things

RS. EDWARD B. HULING, Chairman of the National Defense Committee of the D. A. R., told the New York State Conference of that order that the child labor amendment is a darksome plot to have "Federal guardians displace the parents and rear America's children."

'The amendment reads to limit, regulate and prohibit labor to all persons under eighteen years of age," de-clared Mrs. Huling. "Labor is interpreted to mean mental as well as physical labor, which means that edu cation would be absolutely in the hands of Federal control, and a great national bureau with thousands of public inspectors would intrude themselves into every home in the country.

The lady reminds one of that old story of the German student who evolved a camel from his own inner con-Mrs. Huling's horrendous conception of a Federal "plot" to steal control of the nation's children could have come from no other source. It is too fantastic, too utterly ridiculous, to be the result of sober discussion or of a reasonable examination of facts.

### Out Beyond the Surf

Where thought, unhastened by necessity or trepidation, sometimes penetrates to truth.

Here, where the shallows throw no spray, let us ponder and enjoy the lessons of the art and the work and play of life.

"The Russian government," said a wise Frenchman some two centuries ago, "is an absolute monarchy," tempered by assassination." The witticism retained much of its vitality until the old Russian Empire was gone. The last czar and his family were executed, part than assassinated but the discomfort attending rather than assassinated; but the discomfort attending the process was probably as great called by one name

as by another.

The assassination of Huey Long and the instant extinction of his killer, Weiss, has set thousands of people to searching for similar events in history, and other thousands to explaining why Weiss, perfectly certain to be killed himself, threw his life away to gratify—what emotion? Spite? Hardly. Righteousness? It has happened. In fact, almost any human emotion may lead to a killing under what a mortician might call "favorable circumstances."

Athens was working her way to a real republic some six hundred years before Christ, when a family seated itself on the throne, and stuck there. The father died in power, but a couple of young Athenian patriots started out to abolish the two brothers who had succeeded to their father's place. They got one, but the other's guards got them. But the Athenians did not think of this as a waste. A hundred years later, when the republic was real the citizens were singing songs. the republic was real, the citizens were singing songs in praise of Harmodeus and Aristogeiton, "who slew despot, and gave Athens equal laws."
The odds are fairly even that Weiss had some such

notion. Booth had it, in a crazy, distorted form, when he shot Lincoln.

Comparatively few princes were removed by assassination in western Europe after the period of religious wars had passed. William the Silent of the Netherlands was shot with poisoned bullets and Henry IV of France was killed with a dagger; but these were exceptions. The only place west of Russia where assassination was quite at home was in Italy of the Renaissance. There were almost as many butchers in that country in those days as there were artists and men of science—but the killers are not so well remembered.

One breed of carrion makers deserves especial mention; the Visconti family, which for a comparatively long time ruled Milan. They furnished both the weapons and the corpses. Galeazzo I of this line was poisoned, quite probably by his wife. A successor, Matteo II, was dispensed with by his two brothers. A few years later, one of these affectionate brothers was killed by his duriful peoplew. Not so long afterward, another memory. dutiful nephew. Not so long afterward, another member of the Visconti family, Giovanni Maria, was lynched, rather than assassinated. A considerable number of persons decided that they could do without this creature; and banded together to carry out their wish.

But in between their killings, the Visconti family

started the Cathedral of Milan.

Perhaps Weiss had read some of those old tales. Perhaps he had read of the Greek father who killed himself on the governor's doorstep when he had failed to get justice for his daughters in any other way. Or, he may have gone to Japan for a model, not in his choice of a victim, but in his willingness to destroy himself.

Nogi, Japanese general and conqueror of Port Arthur, led himself when his emperor died, that he might show his countrymen how they ought to serve their prince. The people almost adored him, partly because he was one of their great men whom the outside world could not help admiring; but their favor was as nothing compared to his conception of duty.

#### Is This Big Business Propaganda?

CTRAWS are said to show which way the wind blows and this proverb applied to a recent issue of the United States Chamber of Commerce's monthly bulletin, particularly in its presentation of alleged statistical proof of its success in red baiting, is a case in point. Politics is said to make strange bedfellows, but apparently the proposed destruction of communism is productive of even more astounding combinations if it is true what the United States Chamber of Commerce claims as to the unqualified support of its most hated enemy, the A. F. of L., in the Chamber's legislative effort to put statutes on the law books of nation, state, county and city, ostensibly aimed at the legal extermination of alleged reds, but equally applicable on occasion to the even more detestable trade unionists. So the Chamber in its bulletin lists the A. F. of L. as numerically first and the Chamber second in this combined war of annihilation; apparently pleased that its stunt of bloody shirt waving has inspired a patriotic fervor on the part of organized labor that may logically make it a party to its own future destruction.

#### ATLANTIC CITY CONVENTION

of M. delegation was given complete recognition. Following assignments were made: Committee on Local and Federated Bodies, Joseph N. Weber, chairman; Committee on Organization, Frank B. Report on the financial condition of the American Federation of Labor discloses that for the current year the total receipts amounted to \$1,032,475.31, with a balance on hand of \$565,706.36, making a total income of \$1,598,181.67. Total expenditures for the year were \$975,227.14. Balance on hand August 31, 1935, was \$622,954.53. The balance on hand consists of \$35,376.10 in the General Fund and \$587,578.43 in the Defense Fund. The report of the American Federation of Labor Building Fund shows a balance on hand of \$57,417.86.

Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor:
The establishment of the National Relations Labor Board does not necessarily mean that there will be no struggle between employers and workers, for we are not yet entering the millennium and most of us know it. It means simply this, that here is a method which can be used instead of the strike; it is an alternative to a strike when a strike would not be as useful, as wise, or as direct or as just as the method of collective bargaining. I have never found any band of honest, thoughtful laboring people who wanted the strike for its own sake. There is nothing that the average labor organization dislikes worse than having to go on strike, but they must have justice, and the important thing is to set up methods by which they can obtain justice without the necessity of a long and costly strike. Without that there can be no real cooperation in the development of our economic life.

The annual solemn memorial hour disclosed that forty-nine deaths had occurred during the year among those prominently identified with Labor's cause and who had held commanding positions of influence and official responsibility. Their names were called by Secretary Frank Morrison. The convention arose to its feet and the impressive moment of silence followed. Whereupon the Labor World moved on its way.

Spencer Miller, Secretary, Workers Education Bureau of America: With 10,000,000 of our fellow workers unemployed after two years of lavish governmental expenditure, it should be clear to anyone that subsidizing scarcely is not only a fallacious economic theory, to resolve the problem of misery in the presence of plenty, but it also aggravates the very problem which it seeks to solve. The way out for labor is to increase productivity to expand consumer demand to adjust wages to such increased production and establish a moving equilibrium between our productive and consumptive between our productive and consumptive capacity under some form of economic control in which labor will not only have a voice but a clearly defined function.

When the hour of time limitation had atruck two hundred and forty-nine resolutions had been introduced. These touched upon all manner of subjects—industrial, economic, sociological and whatnot. The final disposition thereof will be noted in the further progress of this convention story.

National Commander Ray Murphy of the American Legion: If there is any one organization in this land which de-serves the praise, the commendation and the gratitude of the American people for its courage and loyalty amid the gloom of the past five years, it is the American

Federation of Labor. While factories closed by the thousands, while bread-lines lengthened and the unemployed tramped the highways and byways in an endless procession of desperation, you kept the faith; American principles; you refused to heed the temptations of those who would have led us into chaos. If the American Federation of Labor had done nothing else (and its record of service) American rederation of Labor had done nothing else (and its record of service to America is long), it still would merit the undying thanks of every man, woman and child who loves freedom and liberty.

Miss Rose Schneiderman, President, National Women's Trade Union League: Section 7A was a definite proclamation on the right of the workers to organize. Our American girls are "snobbish," I am sorry to confess, and we have been hampered in our efforts of organization because of their false notions that to belong to a union was not the ladylike thing to do. With the President's pronouncement and the inclusion of 7A in the Recovery Act, trade unionism had become the law of the land and it suddenly became patriotic to belong to a union.

Fraternal Delegate Andrew Conley of Great Britain: I am not one of those who believe that Fascism is going to be a permanent factor in the life of our times. Its triumph will be short-lived. It has already, in my opinion, reached its climax. It was the product of abnormal political and social circumstances. As one American professor has pointed out Fascism arose (if you leave Germany aside) in countries that were predominantly agricultural, with a high percentage of illiteracy, and with no long experience of political freedom. Dictatorship, in other words, is a phenomenon mainly confined to politically backward countries. It owes its temporary success property to the foot and positive to the foot and positive to the foot and positive the contract of the second positive to the foot and positive the contract of the second positive the mainly confined to politically backward countries. It owes its temporary success, partly to that fact and partly to the fact that reactionary employers made the Fascist dictatorships their instrument for destroying the liberating movement in politics and industry which organized labor, as an international force, inspired and guided. It is not an accident, but the outcome of a conspiracy, that capitalist reaction destroyed in Italy, Germany and other countries, the political and industrial organizations of the working class with the same hammering blow which destroyed the foundation of the democratic state.

Captain J. A. P. Haydon, Canadian Trades Congress Fraternal Delegate: We both live in democratic and peace-loving countries. Along our large international boundary there are no forts or other defenses. In this respect we can teach the nations of the old world a worthwhile lesson. For more than 100 years we have lesson. For more than 100 years we have lived in complete peace and harmony. Many factors contribute to this ideal condition. The Rush-Bagot treaty provides that no battleships shall ply the Great Lakes. Over these vast inland waters, greater in size than the boundaries of some of the European nations, there has not been a battleship since the days of the War of 1812-1814. Nor do we desire nor want them. Again we have created the International Joint Commission. This important body is composed of representatives of both Canada and the United States. It deals particularly with water diversions and it has rendered many important decisions, some of them of greater moment than issues which have, in the past, caused international conflict in Europe. Never has there been a split decision. Every settlement has been unanimous. We also have an international boundary commission, again composed of equal representation of Americans and Canadians. This commission seldom makes an announcement, but the record shows that it has settled many complex and tangled disputes concerning boundary disputes, especially along the Canadian-Alaska, Maine-New Brunswick and British Columbia-Washington boundaries. However, there is one other agency which, in my opinion, has done more to preserve peace between these two American democracies than any other. It is the great international trade union movement of which the Trades and Labor Congress is a part. The constant interchange of opinions through our unions, international conventions, our trade magazines and the exchange of fraternal delegates has done more to cement these two free peoples than all government agencies. If I may be pardoned for using a term not my own, "Friendships are more potent than warships."



Major George L. Berry, Divisional Coordinator for Industrial Co-operation: I invite your co-operation in the performance of this great task. It is my judgment that both labor and management find in this task a very definite community of interest. If we can permanently eradicate, in the main, cut-throat competition in America we will have made some very definite progress. Cut-throat competition not only involves management and investment, but the results of cut-throat competition finally come out off the backs of the workers. Therefore, I repeat the statement that fair trade practices are important, not only to management, but doubly important to the workers of this country.

Miss Anna Loughlin, National Union of Tailor and Garment Workers of Great Britain: What we have got to pay re-gard to, in addition to the absorbing of gard to, in addition to the absorbing of the unemployed, is to say as workers that if the brains of science have been able to introduce technology into industry whereby mechanization has made every-thing easy and so simple that, per capita, everybody can do so much more than they did before, we as workers, we as human beings, that were brought into the world in exactly the same way as the people from the other class, have a right to the opportunities of more leisure to develop our social capabilities, our edudevelop our social capabilities, our edu-cational recreation, our educational facilities, to become more cultured—we have a right, as human beings, to the science that God has given to many of the people who have developed some of our indus-

tries in a wrong way instead of a right

Miss Katherine E. Lenroot, Children's Bureau, United States Department of Labor: As I said in the beginning, there are many serious problems before us in this country affecting our families and the future of our children, affecting the very future of America itself, for if our children cannot be given those advantages and opportunities to attain which we give all our lives and our strength and our service, then American civilization is doomed. The child labor amendment is only one part of this struggle. Other very vital issues concerning the entrance of youth into industry—the ways in which labor and education and their social forces may be united to afford youth as they enter the adult years a fair chance to work and earn and achieve—all of those vital issues are more interesting to us than this basic principle of the elimination of children from the labor market. Yet we must clean up this job begun so long ago and carry forward as a memorial to Samuel Gompers and all those others who contributed of their best to the objective which is so dear to us—the final inclusion in the basic law of our land of a charter for the children of America which will forever protect them from exploitation.

One of the most stirring hours of the entire convention period was when Matthew Woll read the report of the committee in charge of the American Federation of Labor Chest for Liberation of Workers in Europe. And, by the way, President Joseph N. Weber is secretary of that committee. American workers have no idea of the reign of terror which exists under Nazism and Fascism in Europe. For, presuming to hold any independent relationship with labor organizations, scores have been brutally murdered, others have been beaten into helplessness, and large numbers have murdered, others have been beaten into helplessness, and large numbers have committed suicide in order to end their misery. The report staggers the imagination. Nearly \$50,000 have been collected in this country and there can be no doubt that when generous American people are made acquainted with actual conditions over there their contributions will be greatly increased.
