

# Union Label and the Labor Movement

E are now passing into the seventh year of an economic depression which has never had its equal in all history. While there has been a large degree of recovery in certain business lines, and stocks are generally on the upgrade, the upturn has not been reflected into permanent employment for workers. It is true that through governmental projects and other Federal activities many men and women are temporarily employed, but there are still over eleven million workers who are waiting for steady work at a wage which will keep their families in comfort according to the American standard of living.

Regular employment means increased purchasing power and only through work at decent wages for all can America pull itself out of this disastrous economic situation which still confronts over forty million souls when we include the entire family with eleven millions jobless workers who are willing to work.

What is the solution of this gigantic problem of the man who wants a job, Are we going to continue gambling with fate for another seven years and just trust to luck as the dice thrower who mumbles "seven-come-eleven," hoping that it will be only four more years instead of No, we can't, and Americans ait! We must solve this unemseven. won't wait! ployment problem and the only practical solution is the one which is offered by the American Federation of Labor. It is shorter hours with no reduction in pay. By reducing hours, more workers can obtain jobs. By maintaining the prevailing weekly wage scale, and with more men at work, we shall be able to increase purchasing power. It is simple arithmetic.

If, in 1930. Senator Black's 30-hourweek bill had been passed by Congress and signed by the President. it would have done more to solve the problem of obtaining jobs for the eleven million idle workers than all the other legislation with its uncertainty owing to inefficient administration and the interpretation of the courts.

Senator Black's 30-hour-week bill is the most constructive measure that has been advanced for the solution of unemploy. ment. It will mean a six-hour day and a five-day week. It is the paramount issue of the American Federation of Labor. It is hoped that everyone who is interested in shorter work week program will write to both their United States Senators and also their representatives and ask them to vote for the Black-Connery 30ek hill. The only certain way in which the workers of America can meet technological progress, that is the use of machinery and new inventions, is to join a labor union and when they have joined in suf-

ficient numbers, they will be able, through collective bargaining, to shorten the hours of work and maintain the American wage standard.

When hours are shortened machinery will be a blessing instead of a curse. There will he more time for education and self-development. More time for spending the increased purchasing power which will accrue from shorter hours with the same pay. This is the path and the only path on which America will work its way back to better times for the average citizen. It is true that a few may prosper now and the newspapers may display this limited prosperity of the few as if it were the end of this depression for all of us, but the fact remains that millions of small independent manufacturers, business men and professional men, as well as the jobless workers, have reached the last of their savings and equities and want a general upsurge like a great tidal wave across the entire continent instead of a few ripples in Wall Street stocks.

As hours are adjusted to absorb the idle workers, we must continue to buy our own products. First, we must buy all the American-made goods that we can to keep the purchasing power at home. Then we must buy union-made goods and union services to maintain the high standards of wages, hours and working conditions which have been established by and only by the American labor movement.

The American Federation of Labor, and especially those labor unions affiliated with the Union Label Trades Department, are also deeply interested in the measure before Congress known as the Walsh Bill which provides that all persons who sell to the U. S. Government or enter into any contractual relations with it shall conform to the conditions contained in cer tain specifications, the purpose of which will be to maintain fair labor standards connection with purchases. loans or grants where Federal funds are involved directly or indirectly. This measure seeks to confirm in law the principle that the first charge on any industry is the performance of its duty to society by paying adequate wages and maintaining de-cent working conditions. It will prevent the purchase by Federal officials of foreign made and other unfair products to be used by the Government. Uncle Sam should set an example by buying Ameri-can products which are made under American standards of living, established by the American Federation of Labor.

The bill has passed the U. S. Senate and is now before the House of Representatives. In behalf of the Union Label Trades Department, I urge all members of labor unions and their friends to write to their Congressman and ask him to support the Walsh Bill.

A review of the progress made by the American Federation of Labor shows that at least one million new members were gained by the labor movement in 1935. We feel confident that an equal gain will be made in 1936. A most conservative

estimate places the organized workers at six million.

Wage gains made by the unions run into hundreds of millions of dollars. A ninety million dollar wage boost was made by one union affiliated with the A. F. of L. The railway labor unions succeeded in the restoration of a 10 per cent wage deduction, adding 170 million dollars to their pay envelopes and at the same time prevented a 15 per cent cut in wages which would have meant a loss to the railway workers of 217 millions of dollars. Numerous other examples could be given wherein labor unions have either prevented wage reductions, or gained increases.

Hours of labor have been reduced by seventy-three out of 109 national and international unions. There are now over two million union workers on a 40-hour week; half a million on a 36-hour week and over 13 thousand have already won a 30-hour week.

These facts are actual proof of the benefits of labor unions to their members. The results give the union worker greater purchasing power and more leisure time to spend their earnings for self-education advancement. Higher wages and and shorter hours are the only remedies which have been advanced to cure depression. They have been gained through the eco nomic power of organized labor through collective bargaining. They can be maintained by the American workers through the collective buying of products and services that bear the union label, shop card and working button.

Since the National Recovery Act and Agricultural Adjustment Act have both been declared unconstitutional by the United States Supreme Court, the road to legislative reforms seems to be temporarily blocked. But workers and farmers can obtain substantial advancement through organization in the eco nomic field. Great possibilities may be found in the reciprocal agreement which the Union Label Trades Department recently negotiated with the National Farmers' Union. These two organizations have agreed to buy each other's products. Time will not permit my giving in detail the provisions of this agreement, but if anyone is interested he can obtain the facts by writing to the Union Label Trades De-The first requirement in this partment. plan is that city workers join a labor union affiliated with the American Federation of Labor, and that farmers join a farmers' union.

If you are a city worker and desire to better your own conditions and those of your fellow workers, you should become acquainted with the facts concerning the American Federation of Labor.

If you are a woman member of a worker's family you can also become informed about labor unionism and you can greatly help the cause of organized labor by buying only from firms that display the union label, shop card and button.

If you desire to buy only Americanmade goods, made under American stan-

dards, always ask for union labeled products.

If you want to obtain immediate results in securing greater purchasing power, try collective bargaining through a labor union and collective buying under the union label.

The labor movement is the only organized effort to place more money in a worker's pocketbook and that problem surely concerns most of us. Results are what count and they cannot be obtained by acting alone. The big business interests may preach "rugged individualism" for the rest of us, but when it comes to action, they join their own organizations and through them they have obtained at least 80 per cent of the nation's wealth.

In the clamor of the approaching Presidential campaign when so much attention is focused on the national capital, on account of the Federal Government's activities to regain prosperity, the fact is overlooked that private enterprises, including all industries, construction and consumption, spent 95 per cent of the total amount of money expended in this country during 1935. More stress should be placed on these private enterprises and a method through which the workers can obtain their equitable share of the wealth produced. The only method as yet devised, which has been successful, is the labor union. During these trying times, many have been compelled to depend upon the government, and I am making no criticism of the efforts of any administration to help the idle workers, but for a permanent remedy we must obtain greater purchasing power through higher wages. It will require collective action to obtain wages and that is why the labor better union forms the most effective weapon Then to maintain the higher standards of living, we must buy union made goods and union services.

Not only has the American Federation of Labor been the single force in this nation that has fought for and gained shorter hours and higher wages for all working men, but it has been the pioneer in education, social legislation, workmen's compensation and other laws which are not confined in their benefits to organized workers alone. Factory inspection laws have saved the lives of thousands of workers to such an extent that in the past fifty years, together with advance of science, they have doubled the length of the average life.

No better summary of the benefits of labor unions can be made than the one expressed by the late Samuel Gompers, when he said:

"The trade union movement fosters education and uproots ignorance; shortens hours and lengthens life; raises wages and lowers usury; increases independence and decreases dependence; develops manhood and balks tyranny; discourages selfishness and establishes fraternity; induces liberality and reduces prejudice; creates rights and abolishes wrongs; lightens toil and brightens men; makes the workers' shop safer and brighter; cheers the home and fireside and makes the world better."





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### Some Lapses of the Supreme Court

THE Supreme Court in the Bedford cut stone case I imposed upon the striking workers restrictions " which Justice Brandeis, long a member of that court, described as "reminding of involuntary servitude."

The Supreme Court, in Coppage vs. Kansas, ruled that a workman has no right to a job if he will not quit his union. There was dissent here, too, but the majority of the court had its way.

The Supreme Court, in Lochner vs. New York, knocked out a New York law which limited hours of labor in bakerles to 10 a day or 60 a week. Justice Peckham, delivering the verdict of the Court, said that "clean and wholesome bread does not depend on whether a baker works but 10 hours a day or only 60 hours a week."

The Supreme Court, in Adkins vs. Children's Hospital, knocked out the minimum wage law for women in the District of Columbia. Justice Sutherland, who spoke for the court, said that "the Nineteenth Amendment emancipated women from the old doctrine of special protection."

These are a few of the cases which makes labor slow to accept the doctrine of the flawless wisdom of the Supreme Court; and a few of the reasons why labor takes no pleasure in that court's onslaught on the New Deal

Public Opinion has been taking acceleration Public Opinion has been taking so-called polls of "the people of the United States" on various questions in which the masses are vitally interested.

Some of the "polls" have indicated negative convictions toward social welfare measures and principles.

A doubt has been expressed as to whether the persons included in the "polls" accurately reflect mass public opinion. This doubt is accentuated by the result of the nsus which the Institute has taken on "Government Old Age Pensions for Needy Persons."

Persons on the Institute's mailing list were asked if they favored old age pensions. If so, how much they believed should be paid monthly to each single perso how much monthly to a husband and wife, and at what age the pension should begin.

The "poll" reveals that 80 per cent of those voted favored old age pensions, with 60 years us the most popular eligibility age.

And then comes the rub. With respect to the size of the pension, Dr. George Gallup, spokesman for the In-stitue, declares "the largest single number of voters" favored \$30 per month for one person and \$50 for a husband and wife.

There isn't a city in the United States where one person can buy food, clothing and shelter, and the other necessities which constitute even the smallest decent living, for \$30. Nor is there any city in the United States where a husband and wife can buy a similar decent living for \$50 a month.

And yet, the American Institute of Public Opinion seriously informs us that its "poll" showed a preference for the \$30 and \$50 standards.

Evidently the persons who are now required to live on old age pensions or who will come under old age pensions in the future were not included in that section of the public which makes up the Institute's voting list,

### Vital Need of Labor Press

THE freedom of the press, guaranteed to us by the Constitution, must depend, after all, upon the support which the readers of the press give to it. We need scarcely more than mention the fact that the usual daily newspaper, to say nothing of the magazines, do not feel called upon to espouse the cause of organized labor. Such fair play as is given this cause by these publications is based upon the unanswerable strength of the position of the labor movement.

But we wish to emphasize the fact that if there were no great section of the national publications known as the Labor Press, which gives its first and last loyalty to the workers of the nation, and especially to those who are members of the organizations of labor, the other sections of the nation's publicity organs would probably pay much more scant attention to the rights of labor

Circulation is the life of any publication. Given readers, any publication is in a position of power, in proportion to its friends who show their loyalty to their own cause by their subscriptions to their own press, and by their activity in helping to enlarge its circulation.

The rights of labor will always depend, to a great extent, upon the freedom of the labor press. A labor paper which circulates freely in its own community is not only an index of the power of labor in that locality; a very definite part of the organization itself, and its functions are so vital that neglect of the labor press is sure to reflect upon the qualities of the labor movement itself.

WO thousand men who fied from Italy to escape military service in Africa are interest military service in Africa are interned in Jugo-Slavian camps, and the number is increasing daily.

The general chosen to command the Ethiopian expedition was called home.

The Italians admit retirement in some quarters, and the Ethiopians claim to have repulsed a mass attack on another front.

Two regiments of Italian troops mutinied in protest against being sent to Africa.

The first two items of these four bits of news from the war zone are not open to question. The second, indeed, had to be announced by Mussolini, though the significance of it was carefully kept in the background. The Italian retirement is certain; but the victory of the Ethiopians will bear watching. The story of mutiny comes, of course, by the grapevine route; which all through the World War brought out information which the fighting powers wished to suppress.

But the stories of mutiny deserve notice, even if they are exaggerated. Italy is a poor country, unable to finance a first or even second class war. Her wage scales, before the Ethiopian expedition, were among the lowest in Europe. There is no dependable information that these wage scales have been changed; but the cost of living in Italy has climbed rapidly ever since the fighting began. Italian workers must have tightened their belts till they are sick of it; and the triumph which was to reconcile them with hardship seems to have been indefinitely postponed.

### **Clergy Attack Slums**

PROTESTANT, Catholic and Jewish clergymen in New York City have united in a joint statement denouncing slum conditions there, coupled with an appeal for a combined State and city program to reouse millions of "under-privileged citizens in the nation's metropolis.


The manifesto declares that in New York City alone more than 500,000 families, including millions of chu-dren, are still compelled to live in old tenements condemned as unfit for human habitation. In addition, it emphasizes the well-known fact that infant mortality, disease and crime are rooted in the slums and repeats the axiom that it is impossible to create in such conditions a home environment in which a wholesome family life can be maintained and nourished."

The rights to "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." set forth in the Declaration of Independence as the unalienable heritage of all our people, the clergy say, are nothing short of travesty as long as slum conditions remain.

In stressing the practicability of activity by public authorities in providing decent housing for the masses, the joint statement declares that in England the Government since 1919 has built over one million low cost rental housing units providing new homes for more than four million persons

This forward position emphasizing the responsibility of Federal, State and local governments for proper housing for the masses is a significant trend of thought in progressive circles. It is reflected in the plan backed by Senator Wagner of New York asking an appropriation of \$800,000,000 to subsidize the construction of low cost dwellings.

Among the Union Label League sanctions is the demand that each member buy Union-made goods and services



Congressman O. H. Cross of the Eleventh District of Texas has introduced a bill which would put a decided crimp in the favorite sport of the Federal courts-that

of declaring laws unconstitutional. The bill provides: That no "inferior" Federal court, which means Federal district and circuit courts, shall consider any plea which attacks the constitutionality of an act of Congress.

That any such plea shall be ordered by the court to be stricken from the record. "That in all cases which may be appealed to the

Supreme Court of the United States, the court shall pass upon the rights of the parties both as to law and fact; but in no case before the court on appeal shall the court pass upon or consider any plea which raises the question of the constitutionality of an act of Congress."

Mr. Cross bases this law on Article 3. Section 2, Clause 2, of the Constitution, which reads:

"In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers and consuls, and those in which a state shall be a party, the Supreme Court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned, the Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact. WITH SUCH EXCEPTIONS, AND UNDER SUCH REGULATIONS AS THE CONGRESS SHALL MAKE."

This means that only a state can attack the constitutionality of an act of Congress, and it must do so by filing an original suit in the Supreme Court.



The Federal courts, in large measure, have become e state church for Big Business; ready to excommuni-cate and curse by bell, book and candle any law to which Big Business objects. This assumed power of the courts is pure usurpation. There is not a line or word in the Constitution of the United States which gives any court any authority to declare any law unconstitutional.

proposed law is really conservative. Under that measure, the Supreme Court, for the first time in our history, would have definite authority to consider the constitutionality of an act of Congress; but only when a state thought the matter important enough to file an original suit in that court.

"I do not suppose that the Republic would come to an end if we lost our power to declare acts of Congress unconstitutional," said the late Justice Holmes in one of his dissenting opinions. The quotation is from memory and letter perfect; but it is substantially correct. may not b Justice Holmes might have gone farther. He might have said that the Republic is likely to come to an end of its period of liberty and glory if a handful of Federal judges may continue, without warrant of law or Constitution, to block reforms which the people demand and which Congress and the President have enacted into law.

### THE INTERNATIONAL MUSICIAN



(By CHAUNCEY A. WEAVER)

1 -Field

Authorization is made for announcement through the medium of this column that William J. Kerngood, for seventeen years Secretary of the American Federa tion of Musicians, will voluntarily retire from that position at the annual convention which convenes at Detroit, Mich., June 8, 1936.

The field will thus be opened for a successorship contest which may easily become one of the high spots of convention deliberation.

Secretary Kerngood's decision is one which must be both regretted and respected. He retires for the purpose of seeking that restoration to health which has been his concern for an extended period, and to obtain the rest which his faithful service so deservedly merits.

Secretary Kerngood has been a Federationist of uncompromising loyalty. In the early part of his career he was orchestra leader with traveling musical He was President of Local No. shows. 161, at Washington, D. C., in 1902-3-4. He was President of Local 310, of New York in 1910-11-12. During the year 1913 he was first assistant to President Joseph N. Weber. Following three years as Vice-President of the national federation he began his long career of secretarial vice as successor to the late Owen Miller.

As all readers of the International Musician know the position of National Secretary involves something more than routine keeping of records. The official publication maintenance and the management of a large printing plant are major responsibilities. Year after year the Secretary has been able to give an account of his stewardship which has received the approval of the Convention delegates. The depression years have been survived and the new Secretary will find a healthy and growing business concern over which to assume charge.

As a member of the National Executive Board Secretary Kerngood's career has been marked by independent thinking and constructive action. His colleagues on the board will see him go with sin cere regret and earnestly hope that his future years in California, where he intends to find his home, will result in rich returns on all the hopes now entertained.

It is more than a century since the pen of the English poet, William Cowper, dropped from his nerveless hand, yet the soundness of his commentaries on life stand unimpaired in the passing of the For example, he was author of years. the lines:

God made the country, and man made the town. What wonder then that health and vir-tue, gifts That alone make sweet the bitter draught That life holds out to all, should most abound And leant he threatened in the fields and groves!

It is often an urban characteristic to refer to the rural districts as "the sticks." To those who move about, in and around "where cross the crowded ways of life," there is often skepticism as to the possibility of flowers of culture budding and blossoming out in the regions where sheep and cattle roam the hills and plain, where the tall corn grows, and where the whir of the market-place does not disturb the atmosphere of bucolic calm.

These meditations are suggested by an event which took place in Des Moines during the month of January when the Iowa Farm Bureau was holding a conven tion. A feature of the proceedings was the evening presentation of "The Bo-hemian Girl." The entire cast was recruited from young people from the farms of lows. An audience of more than two thousand people witnessed the perform-

-some going under the impulse of happy expectation; others in a most incredulous frame of mind. What did these young people know about operatic interpretation, dramatic emphasis, tone color and the one hundred and one things so essential to anything like a correct elemental ensemble? Well, those who ven-tured to follow the leadings of curiosity learned something. An orchestra of 14 picked musicians from Local No. 75 played the score. Principals and chorus did the rest in a fashion which took the vast audience by storm. Voices rich and clear, fine touches of dramatic fire, and intelligent responsiveness to instructions given during very brief rehearsal opportunities, gave impressive demonstration of the talent which the "sticks" may sometimes be able to provide.

Nor rural sights alone, but rural sounds Exhilarate the spirit, and restore-The tone of languid nature.

Educational philosophy has long since made plain that things learned during the impressionable period of youth are the most permanently retained. Musical tastes acquired in the formative years will not grow stale when maturity comes, but will help to enrich the entire individual life. This central Pennsylvania experiment should be watched and studied.

It would have been an exhilarating experience to look in on the recent conference of the New York Musicians, held at Jamestown--in the county among whose Chautauqua hills we first saw the light; and out upon the beautiful lake over whose waters we played a cornet (or thought we did) as the Hamlet band made musical contribution to the participants of a Sunday School excursion. Then we would have realized how the years have flown and what changes time Leonard Campbell of hath wrought. Rochester presided. George Keene of Middletown was official pen-pusher. Forty-two delegates from all sections of the commonwealth were present. Harry J. Steeper was present as fraternal dele-gate from New Jersey. Fred W. Birn-bach represented President Weber's A large variety of subjects of office peculiar interest to musicians came up for discussion. An interesting feature of the occasion was a "Smorgasbord." The context of the official report reveals that that to which we have just referred is a lunch which Swedish people are experts in preparing-people from that nation having a dominant part in the citizenship of the Jamestown community. This fifth semi-annual conference was an all-around success. The next one will be held at Troy, with Local No. 13, on the third Sunday in May of the current year.

## The Tune Detective Goes Collegiate

HERE is a story about a pet chameleon whose owner, after experi-menting with various solid colors, put it on a piece of plaid and the little animal "busted itself trying to make That is just about what happens good." to a Tune Detective when he finds himself prowling around the composite college campus.

Our collegians borrowed most of their good tunes, but they knew where to find them, and in many cases the unanimity of their approval is remarkable. The old Irish melody, "Annie Lisle," for example, also known as "Amici," has been used by no less than seventeen colleges and over a hundred schools as an Alma Mater song. Cornell heads the list with "Far Above Cayuga's Waters," closely followed by Syracuse, Lehigh and the Universities of Chattanooga, Kansas, Missouri and North Carolina ("Hark the Sound of Tarheel Voices"). Ireland also scores with "Fair Harvard," to the familiar tune "Believe Me If All Those Endearing Young Charms," which also inspired the "Old which also inspired the Gold" of Iowa State.

Almost as popular as "Annie Lisle" is the Latin "Lauriger Horatius," best known in America as "Maryland, My Maryland," and in Germany as a Christ-mas song, "Tannenbaum, O Tannenbaum." Cornell uses it. too, as an evening song; at Pennsylvania it is called "We Gather Here." and it appears also at New York University, Mount Holyoke and elsewhere

Lots of Princeton men do not realize that the words of "Old Nassau" were originally set to the Scotch tune of "Auld Lang Syne"-which stands high among college favorites of the nationalistic type, numbering among its offspring "The Good Old Days at Penn," "In Praise of M.S.U." (Missouri) and that classic of the old college song books, "Bohunkus." Karl Langlotz composed bis fine Princeton tune only after the words of "Old Nassau" had become established.

The Irish "Son of a Gambolier" has known even more college life than "Auld Lang Syne," appearing at West Point as "He Done His Level Best," at Hobart as "A Son of a Gun," at Georgia Tech as "A Rambling Wreck" and in Missouri as "A Son of Old Missouri"-Not to speak of its original form and the "Dunderbeck" version, both popular in many colleges. It is only a step from the "Gamboller" to "Solomon Levi," originally written by a Hobart man but now best known through the M.I.T. "Take Me Back to Tech" and the far western "Utah Man."

The French flavor appears in that popular tune, "Vive la Compagnie" (also known by its chorus opening as "Vive l'Amour"), which has found a place in most of the old college song books in its original form and also boasts special words for New York University and a curious adaptation known as "Vive les Rutgers' Sons"!

The West Point Alma Mater has the German melody, "Ach, wie ist's moglich dann?" ("How Can I Leave Thee?"), also used at Western Reserve University "Dear Old Reserve." "Army Blue," 88 however, is of American origin, coming from that old close harmony favorite, "Aura Lee," known at N.Y.U. as "The Violet." "Goodnight, Navy," is naturally an adaptation of "Goodnight, Ladies," and that dignified hymn, "Old Pennsylvanta," has to admit descent from a ribald ditty called "My Last Cigar" ("Twas Off the Blue Canaries," etc.). The University of ,Pennsylvania made a more sprightly use of "John Brown's Body." which to serious music lovers remains "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" and whose other versions include the Grasshopper Song, "Glory for Columbia," and "Old John Henry Hobart Will Be Turning in His Grave." Colgate's Alma Mater is to the old "Juanita" tune.

Among still further borrowings to be found in college music mention should be made of Princeton's "Whoop Her Up"

song, which goes back to George Root's "Music in the Air," a tune also echoed at Haverford and N.Y.U. and at least partially responsible for the Hawaiian "Aloha Oe." "Old College Chum" is a widely popular version of that 19th cen-tury favorite, "Sweet Genevieve." The physiologically detailed "Virgin Stur-geon," claimed chiefly by Williams, is to the tune of "Reuben and Rachel" ("Reuben, Reuben. I've Been Thinking"). "Му Comrades, When I'm No More Drinking," sung in its original form at Yale. Columbia and Amherst, later became also "Dear Bucknell" and Haverford's "Breakfast." That beautiful melody, "Long, Long Ago" supports a burlesque "Romeo and Juliet" as well as the bawdy "Down on the Farm," beloved by the Mendelssohn and University Glee Clubs of New York. An ancient comic song known as "Hamlet, Prince of Denmark," reappears in a slightly altered form as "Dives Had a Son," in the Amherst song book (crediting an original "Scots' War Song") and eventually as "Swarthmore Had a Son," a reminder of the glorious football rivalry of the past between the warring Quakers of Swarthmore and Haverford. Curiously enough the melody we call "America," which has been used as a national anthem by fourteen different countries, has been almost ignored by the colleges, the out-standing exception being George Washington University, for which, of course, it was automatic. The Croatian folk song which Haydn turned into the Austrian hymn, later anathematized as "Deutschland uber Alles," and sanctified in every hymn book, appears as an Alma Mater song at Columbia University, Pittsburgh, Western Reserve and a few other places. Everybody ought to know that Yale's "Bright College Years" is to the tune of the German "Watch on the Rhine" (which is closely related to "The Star-Spangled Banner" as it happens). "Hail, Pennsylvania," is of course the old Russian hymn. also popular in our churches and appearing in Tschaikowsky's "1812 Overture." The Navy's "Benny Havens" is the same as the Irish "Wearing of the Green," and the Welsh "March of the Men of Harlech," one of the oldest of military tunes, has been used by Georgetown and several other colleges. The French "Marseillaise" has been adapted to collegiate purposes here and there, and Quaker Haverford's official anthem, "Comrades," is the Canadian march, "Soldiers of the King" (or "Queen").

There are also unintentional reminis-

cences to be found in college music. The much radioed "Maine Stein Song," for example, has a Brahma Hungarian dance

for its melodic ancestor, with touches of "Our Director" in the rhythmic scheme.

"Fordham Ram" is an ascending scale going back directly to the Scotch "Robin

Adair" (which has an Irish parallel, with

a more recent echo. in the French "Madelon"). A somewhat similar scale tune is the famous "W. and J. Swing," by

Thornton Allen, editor of one of the best

of the college song books. This fine melody reappears as a football song at

### STATE-USE CONVICT LABOR IS PLANNED FOR WEST VA.

Wheeling, W. Va.-Burleigh E. Oppenheim, assistant director of the Prison industries Reorganization Administration, came to Wheeling to supervise a survey of West Virginia prison industries with the objective of reconstituting them for State-use production. The study is into mean the end of selling terpreted prison-made goods in the State in the open market in competition with goods manufactured by free labor.

The survey will determine what changes in prison manufacturing are desirable. A study is also under way on unemployment among prisoners, prison conditions and the general welfare of convicts.

Contracts for the labor of convicts at Moundsville prison are held by the Klee son Company, Inc., which manufacture work pants; and J. C. Bardall Company, maker of whips and brooms.

#### SENATOR WHEELER SEES CURB ON SUPREME COURT

Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana has become one of the group of Federal legislators who believe the action of the United States Supreme Court in holding the Agricultural Adjustment Law unconstitutional should result in restrictions on the court's assumed authority to invalidate Federal statutes.

"There has been a great deal of talk about the sanctity of the Constitution," he said. "But I suggest that constitutions are made for men, not men for constitutions. On what does the Supreme Court base this claim to power? The Constitution does not expressly bestow on the court authority to override legis lative acts.

"I was not one of those who believed in the principle of curtailing production, but now I feel that if we are going to help the farmers we may have to amend the Constitution to do it."

#### SENATOR CLARK SUPPORTS PRIVATE PENSION PLANS

Washington, D. C .- Senator Clark of Missouri announced that he would renew during this session of Congress his efforts to have private pension plans sponsored by many corporations exempted from the tax provisions of the Social Security Act.

His amendment covering this subject was inserted in the Act last year by the Senate. It was finally disapproved, with the provision that a joint subcommittee of the House Ways and Means Committee and the Senate Finance Committee make a study of the question and submit a report to the 1936 session of Congress.

The Clark amendment was opposed by both the American Federation of Labor and the administration. Labor held that corporations use their pension schemes against the interests of the workers and frequently manipulate the rules so as to victimize older employes who are approaching the retirement age.

MOONEY'S COUNSEL SEES SUPREME COURT VICTORY

Washington, D. C.-John Finerty, coun sel for Tom Mooney, declared at a meet-ing here that Mooney's hope for freedom rested with the United States Supreme Court. He expressed his deep conviction that the nation's high judicial tribunal would ultimately order the doors of San Quentin unlocked for the release of the victim of perjured testimony.

Reviewing the latest phase of the case before the referee of the California Supreme Court appointed three months ago to take testimony on Mooney's demand for a writ of habeas corpus based on the perjured testimony charge, Mr. Finerty said the testimony and court records already submitted run to over 16.000 pages, with more to come when the case is renumed the latter part of January.

He declared his belief that the California Supreme Court would rule adversely on the writ. He expected the decision would be handed down in May. After that the case would go to the United States Supremo Court, which originally refused to consider it on the ground that Mooney had not exhausted all of his rights before the California courts. The present hearing ordered by the California Supreme Court is the last step in the judicial technicalities stipulated by the United States Supreme Court as necessary before that body will assume furis-diction of Mooney's demand that he be released from San Quentin prison and declared innocent of participation in the bomb outrage during the Preparedness Day Parade in San Francisco on July 3, 1916.

### MILLIONS OF IDLE GIVEN JOBS. MISS PERKINS SAYS

Washington, D. C .- A roseate view of the improved conditions of working men and women during the past three years was given by Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor, in an address before the con-vention of the International Seamen's Union of America here.

Wages, she said, are 50 per cent higher than they were at the low point of the depression, adding:

"Approximately 5,000,000 men and women who were without jobs in March, 1933, have been returned to work in private industries.

"One of the most encouraging signs of progress is the turn taken by the durable goods industries. They are always the first to suffer in a depression and the slowest to recover. They are now at their highest point since November, 1930."

One of the interesting and important developments of the month is the manner in which the labor press has launched a demand for Constitutional remedy of the Supreme Court's acts of assassination of laws.

Almost as a whole the labor press has condemned the attitude of the Supreme Court and its usurped power to nullify acts of Congress.

Much more effectively than the daily press, with more intelligence and with infinitely more fearlessness, the labor press has grasped this great issue, has shown an understanding of it and has sailed in to demand a proper protection of human rights.

The Constitution is, in truth, a great document. It protects human liberties and it works as well as the Supreme Court will let it work.

But the Supreme Court has shown that there is a point at which the Constitution is not to be allowed to work, in its present form.

. . Concealed in the whole dispute is the elemental issue between property rights and human rights. The human rights enumerated in the Bill of Rights do not meet today's needs. There must be an extension of rights so as to cover collective rights as well as personal rights.

Three eminent justices believe this could all be done within the Constitution as it stands, but six say "no" and six are a majority. That is that-most emphatically.

Now it is true enough that any remedy that will work is a good remedy, but the best remedy is one that goes furtherest to the root of the situation.

That seems to mean Constitutional Amendment.

The Supreme Court may continue to be just the same kind of tribunal it was when NRA and AAA were laid on the chopping block and slaughtered.

Once income taxes were unconstitutional; then we amended the Constitution and income taxes were made Constitutional. . . .

Congress might-so some good lawyers say-define the jurisdiction of the Supreme Court so as to prevent challenge of a law on Constitutional grounds by any individual, limiting that right to States, which would help greatly; and Congress might define the jurisdiction of the lower courts so as to prevent them from dealing with Constitutional questions at all. And perhaps the only trouble with that is that what one Congress can do another can undo, as labor knows full well.

But a Constitutional Amendment can be undone only by the people themselves and that right they must always have as long as democracy and self-government live in America.

As for the ballyhoo about "sacredness of the Constitution"-that is ballyhoo and
