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



Distribution of nearly \$5,000,000 to approximately

Under the terms of collective bargaining agreements between the 300,000 member AFL-CIO Union and the phonograph Phonograph Record Agreement, each record manufacturer contributes to the Fund payments based on its annual sale of records.
Each Federation member Each Federation member who made phonograph records receives an individual payment in proportion to his annual scale wages from recordings in relation to total wages paid to all union musicians.

This is the fifth consecutive year in which these payments have been made, President Kenin said. Total payments to musicians from this Fund, including monies now being distributed, are nearly \$15,000,000.

## The Lester Petrillo Memorial Fund Receives Contribution in Memory of Hugh J. Golden

Fund in memory of Hugh J. Golden.

It was the desire of the late Mr. Golden that friends contribute to this Fund in lieu of sending flowers in his memory. Mr. Golden, a wellknown band leader in this area, died suddenly May 18 at the age of sixty. A life-long resident of Norwalk, he was an early member of the Norwalk Symphony, was the leader of Hugh Golden's Orchestra, and was Past Vice President of Local 52. His widow is Marjorie Polhemus Golden.

The Memorial Fund was established by James C. Petrillo in the 1950's, when he was President of the A. F of M. Its purpose is to provide money to musicians unable to pursue their musical professions due to physical disabilities.

Lester Petrillo was Mr. Petrillo's son who died at the age of fifteen. Mr. Petrillo started the Fund with his own substantial contribution and continues to contribute. From the per capita tax paid the Federation each year, ten cents per member is deducted for this Fund. In addition, the Fund receives monies from private contributions.

Following is the complete text of the Lester Pet-illo Memorial Fund:

I, James C. Petrillo, do hereby give and transfer to the Executive Board of the American Federation of Musicians the sum of \$10,000.00 in trust, vesting title thereto in the members of said Executive Board as trustees, to have and to hold the same for the following purposes and upon the following conditions:

1. There shall be established a charitable trust fund to be known as the Lester Petrillo Memorial Fund for Disabled Musicians, the said Fund, and any additions thereto or income therefrom, to be used for the benefit of those members of the American Federation of Musicians whose physical disabilities prevent them from earning their livelihood as musicians, due consideration being given to the other factors of their economic condition. The terms "benefits" and "payments," as used herein, shall include, in the discretion of the trustees, the payment of money or other things of value to dependent relatives of eligible members.





The arrangement is unique to The Shoreham, and Summertime on the Terrace is a nightly attraction Tuesdays through Saturdays. Twenty-nine violins, eight violas, two cellos and a harp are under the leadership of Jerry Rodis, and the effect is out of this world

Mr. Rodis has had his own orchestra since coming to Washington from Norfolk in his youth. He led The Shoreham Strings, a group of thirteen violinists for several years during the 1950's, entertaining at the White House and State Department functions and appearing on the Ed Sullivan Show.

Not only was this past summer's show a beautiful one to listen to (many members of the National Symphony were used) but it was equally grand to look at as the male violinists moved to precise choreography reminiscent of a Busby Berkeley movie. The ladies of the ensemble, outfitted in glittering tunics, were seated during the performance on a balcony that overlooks the Terrace, maintaining the distance that ladies should keep in a 1930's setting.

The innovator of such exceptional services, Summertime on the Terrace being only one of many, is Bernard R. Bralove, President of The Shoreham Hotel Corporation. Mr. Bralove has been actively involved in the management of the Hotel since 1945. Built by his late father, Harry Bralove, The Shoreham has been owned and operated by the Bralove family for the past thirtyseven years.

## The DETROIT CONCERT BAND

Of all the bands in the United States and Europe, the Detroit Concert Band under the baton of Dr. Leonard B. Smith had the distinction of being chosen by the British Broadcasting Corporation to participate in an hour-long documentary on the life and music of John Philip Sousa which is to be televised both in this country and abroad sometime late this fall. Indeed, the selection of the Detroit Concert Band for this production reflects the high standards of its performance.

Recognizing the significance of the honor brought to Detroit, Mayor Jerome P.Cavanagh officially proclaimed June 15 "Detroit Concert Band Day" and an article which appeared in the Detroit News under the byline of Armand Gebert, who attended all the filming and recording sessions of the Sousa Documentary, was placed in the Congressional Record for June 17. The paper observed that the BBC discovered what Michigan people have known for a long time: no musical organization in the world can play a John Philip Sousa march like the Detroit Concert Band.

"Everywhere I went, during my year-long evaluation of concert bands," stated BBC producer Kenneth Corden, "the name of Leonard Smith loomed so prominently in all discussions and recommendations that it could not be ignored. His reputation for unswerving fidelity to the classic band tradition as delineated by John Philip Sousa, his uncompromising insistence upon excellence in performance, his knowledgeable and disciplined rehearsal techniques, his vast professional experience in film, TV and radio procedures, his genuine knowledge of Sousa and his compositions, his close association with members of the Sousa Band, his accurate interpretations relative to tempi and dynamics of the Sousa marches, all led us to seek him out.'



vices Activities Director Leo Perlis declared recently on Labor News Conference heard on the Mutual Broadcasting System that union-sponsored arts and cultural projects are valuable tools in helping to "enrich the quality of workers" lives." He feels "It is about time that the whole base of artistic and cultural life be extended so that more and more people participate . . . so that more and more people can and do enjoy them." That, he stated, is the aim of the AFL-CIO Demonstration Arts Projects, backed by the central labor bodies in Buffalo, Los Angeles, Minneapolis and New York City.

While the unions of actors, musicians, entertainers and



He corrects the committee's report as favorable to the resolution with an amendment that the thrust of same read as follows "That All Parties of Such Agreements Must Be Given a Copy of the Agr ement, As Well as Copies of Amendments, Modification, and/or Release From Said Agreement".

#### **RESOLUTION No. 43** LAW

WHEREAS, There has been a considerable number of problems relative to new Booking Agents that either do not function at all, or function in a manner that is detrimental to the best interests of A. F. of M. members, and

WHEREAS, A periodic review of each booking agent's activities would be in the best interests of the A. F. of M., and

WHEREAS, It is not only difficult, but almost impossible to determine whether or not an applicant for a booking agent agreement will function properly, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED, That no applicant be issued a booking agency agreement for the first year of operation as a booking agent, but be issued a permit that expires after one full year. At that time the local in whose jurisdiction said agency is operating shall investigate the applicant's record as a booking agent and recom-mend either for or against the issuance of an agreement which shall be renewed on an annual basis only upon the recommendation of the local in whose jurisdiction said booking agency operates his business. WHEREAS, Legal recognition in the United States of the moral right of musicians and other performers to receive equitable remuneration for the unauthorized use of their talents by broadcasters and other public users for profit of their recorded performances is long overdue, and the aforesaid Amendment No. 9 if adopted, would grant long delayed recognition to the rights of musicians to participate equitably in the economic benefits to be derived from public per-



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

If such student is a member of another local, he shall maintain his membership in his home local while residing in the jurisdiction of the local where the school, college, or university is located, and providing he is a bona-fide student in such school, college, or university. He may solicit, accept, and fill engage-ments in such locals' jurisdiction provided he pays the current quarterly dues and continues paying quarterly dues so long as he remains a student and is actively playing. He will not be required to pay said local's initiation fees or become a full member until such time as he leaves, or graduates from the school, college, or university, and decides to make this local's jurisdiction his permanent residence. 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
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

Thus, you are able to round out a local orchestra for public concerts, giving it body and more sound.

> The Trust Funds offer us a tremendous opportunity to work together. The money is there. It's supposed to be spent. When it is, professional musicians obtain employment at the going rate, and you and your communities are enriched by worthwhile entertainment.

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I think it's important for us to realize that "public" music doesn't necessarily equate itself with "free" music. That the rights and needs of the professional musician must be considered, and can be compatible with the exposure of those who make music an avocation, along the lines that we've discussed.

We can and should pursue cooperative participation in non-competitive areas. There are many places where youngsters can play in combos or with orchestras, and I look forward to the opportunity for us to talk informally at the conclusion of this program. Perhaps you may have specific questions to which answers will be helpful.

In conclusion now, let me just say that the community and I mean all of us when I say "community" — surely will have to realize that it must foster not only the professional, but the youngster coming because there are more young people taking music lessons today, more instruments being sold than ever before. 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

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

The documentary also includes commentaries by Dr. Smith, Leopold Sto-kowski, Sir Arthur Bliss, George Ballanchine and other prominent musicians the Sousa Band or who knew ing concerts. him personally. Original film clips and photographs of Sousa and his band are also scheduled to be shown.

Dr. Smith, who has been conductor of the Detroit Concert Band since 1946, said that being selected to perform for the BBC documentary is one of the oustanding events in the band's history.

Brought to Detroit from New York in 1937 as first trumpeter of the Detroit Symphony Orchestra and The Ford Sunday Evening Hour Orchestra, Dr. Smith had already toured the country with the Barrere Little Symphony, performed with the Firestone Hour Orchestra, The Cities Service Orchestra, March of Time and Fox Movietone orchestras, and made appearances with the famed B. A. Rolfe and Paul Whiteman orchestras. All this in addition to serving as principal cornet soloist of the Goldman Band.

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
