

Numerals next to each title show its rank order on the survey named at the top of each column. The letter "P" indicates the record was a "Pick" on survey; the letter "X" means it was an "Extra" without numerical rank. If no numeral or symbol appears in a column, the record was not on the station's latest survey. This chart provides a rapid summary of each record's local popularity and radio exposure in leading markets. It also shows **regional** popularity and radio exposure by grouping markets in the East, South, Midwest and West. Each week a different radio sample is used. Music Business has been officially authorized by each station listed to publish its survey results, which have been obtained by Music Business with the cooperation and approval of the stations named.

One World

ANYONE who doesn't yet believe that there is only one world of music should be convinced by the latest happenings in that world. We are referring specifically to the release this week by Capitol Records of a new disc by the English pair, Peter and Gordon. Capitol had not intended to issue this record for a few more weeks, since the duo's current hit "World Without Love," is still selling well.

But when EMI issued the pair's followup "Nobody I Know" on Parlophone in Britain on English Columbia, enterprising deejays at the Westinghouse radio chain in the U. S., secured a copy of the English disc, had it taped and sent it out to all the Westinghouse stations. Other ingenious deejays at other alert radio stations did the same. The record was getting station listings at WABC, New York, and WQAM Miami, even though it was not yet released in this country. So Capitol here rushreleased the disc.

This harks back to the first Capitol Beatles record, that was rush-released here because station WWDC in Washington was playing the English recording on the Polydir label of "I Want To Hold Your Hand," early in December. Rather than irritate other jockeys by holding off the release until originally planned in mid-January, the disc was issued by Capitol in late December, 1963.

Another similar incident took place only a few months ago with Elvis Presley's "Viva Las Vegas," and "What'd I Say." This disc was released in England first, and was not supposed to be issued here until the picture "Viva Las Vegas" opened in the U. S. But the American jockeys got hold of the record, played it and forced the release here.

It appears that you can't release a record by artists of the stature of Elvis, The Beatles, or even Peter and Gordon in one country these days, and try to hold off from releasing it in another. It's really one world of teenagers.

Bootlegging Abroad

The record bootlegging situation remains a critical problem for the legitimate record industry here, and for artists, writers and publishers. American publishers agent and trustee, Harry Fox, in fact, retained special Philippine counsel last August to dig more deeply into the problem and to seek possible solutions.

The counsel, William H. Quasha, an American with 20 years in the Philippines under his belt, visited New York last week enlisting the support of various groups and persons for his campaign against the bootleggers; he visited with Columbia Records house counsel. Clive Davis; RCA Victor counsel, William H. Disko: Music Publishers Holding Corp. execs Herman and William Starr, Southern Music's Ralph Iverson; and RIAA executive secretary and counsel Henry Brief and Ernest Meyers.

Much of the problem stems from Formosa, Quasha explained to the Americans, and the solution lies not so much in legal prosecution (a difficult job at best) but in convincing those doing the bootlegging that they'll make a lot more money by going straight (i.e. selling legit disks at legit rather than cutthroat prices).

Quasha said he has already made the first move in this direction by holding a dinner meeting with the leading bootleggers and counterfeiters of Formosa. He said his "economic" approach . . . "you are poor men today and you can make a great deal more than you are," . . . had stimulates much interest.

Clark Five Departs

The Dave Clark Five returned to England last week in a blaze of well earned glory and increased respect, following their debut American tour. Four months ago, when the Clark combo arrived here on their first trip for a couple of Sullivan shots, it seemed inconceivable that just a few short weeks later they would be responsible for hitting a pretty hefty whack of their box office percentage guarantees, or would be the central figures in a succession of teen riots during their seventeen day tour. Yet eleven New York area concerts alone grossed over \$100,000, while increased record sales added to their overall box office success brought the total up to the region of \$1,000,000.

Now plans are well underway for a return visit in November. This will be a six week trip of one nighters, plus two Sullivan dates, and the money involved is double the amount they picked up on this tour. Concert dates are being set up from coast to coast, with a particular emphasis on the Western Seaboard and in Canada.

Prior to departing for home, Dave Clark told Music Business, "I can't believe all this really happened. I was completely knocked out with the whole deal, and delighted with the way it was handled."

Newport Lineups

THE LINEUPS for the Newport Jazz and Folk festivals are almost completed. The Jazz Festival last week announced most of its major names pointing out that Moms Mabley's appearance at Freebody Park will mark the first time a comic has ever played the Festival. Other names include Louis Armstrong, (on opening night) Muggsy Spanier, Bud Freeman, Bobby Haggart, Max Kaminsky, Edmund Hall, Joe Sullivan, George Brunis, J. C. Higgenbotham, Joe Thomas, Lou McGarrity, Jo Jones, Sarah Vaughan, Dizzy Gillespie, Stuff Smith, Ben Webster, Buck Clayton, Slam Stewart, Oscar Brown, Jr., Willie "The Lion" Smith, Dave Brubeck, Thelonious Monk, Toshiko and Billy Taylor.

The Newport Folk Festival listed its artists as follows-Thursday, July 23: Traditional Music-Songs and music of Nova Scotia, Canada and Louisiana, Southern Appalachian and Ozark instrumental and vocal traditions, and a panorama of Negro music-spirituals, blues, and jug bands. Dolly's Gold Record

Two gentlemen beaming with pleasure are George Marek, head of RCA Victor and David Merrick the Broadway producer. The gold record they received from the RIAA signifies \$1 million worth of sales of the Victor original cast album "Hello Dolly." It's the fastest selling original cast set in Victor history.

Meade Lux Lewis Dies

For those of us who are old enough (or young enough) to remember the days when Meade Lux Lewis, along with Albert Ammons, and Pete Johnson, played his rollicking brand of boogie-woogie piano at New York's Cafe Society Downtown in the early 1940's his tragic death last Saturday (7), marked the end of a happy era in the world of jazz. For Lewis, who died when a speeder rammed his car outside of Minneapolis, was a giant as a record artist and a live performer in a less complicated day, and during a much less complicated era of jazz.

Lewis was pulling out of the White House restaurant in suburban Golden Valley near Minneapolis when his car was struck from the rear by a speeding car. Lewis' car crashed into a tree and the pianist was killed instantly.

It was Lewis' record of "Honky Tonk Train Blues" that eventually made him famous throughout the world for his boogie woogie piano, style. The disk, recorded for the old Paramount label, caught the ear of John Hammond, then a jazz critic, promoter and discoverer, (now jazz a. & r. chief at Columbia). He spent five years looking for Lewis, found him washing cars in a Chicago garage, and had him make a new record of the tune. The record got Lewis attention and sales, and in 1936 he gave a concert in New York. He registered well enough to get an

engagement at the old Nick's in Greenwich Village. But that was all, and he returned to Chicago and relief. In 1938, at the famous "Spirituals To Swing" concert produced by Hammond, Lewis, along with Ammons and Pete Johnson, made boogie woogie come into its own, and the fame of the team of Lewis, Ammons and Johnson was assured. Big Joe Turner, the blues singer, and the trio, became one of the hottest acts in New York at Cafe Society downtown. And their records were smash sellers.

After the boogie-woogie craze died out, Lewis scuffled with dates at small clubs. Now and then he recorded a boogie woogie tune for a record label. but his sales never again reached the great peak of the boogie craze. He appeared on a number of TV shows, including one about Chicago jazz in 1961.

Lewis described his boogie woogie style as "cathouse music." Jazz critics described it as eight-to-the-bar left hand figures and treble riffs with the right. Lewis' idol was Jimmy Yancey, who is credited as one of the pioneers (along with Pine Top Smith) of the early boogie woogie style. Lewis was 59 when he died.

Ska Is Happening

Atlantic Records is on the ska kick on a full-steam-ahead basis. Last week the firm landed its first Jamaican ska single on the Pop 100 chart ("Jamaica Ska" by the Ska Kings at number 96) and forthwith began rushing ska dance instruction charts out to distributors, dealers and deejays across the land.

In another development, the firm signed Jamaican artist. Byron Lee, to an exclusive contract. Atlantic president, Ahmet Ertegun, has already cut a flock of sides by Lee, with the first

single, "Watermelon Man Ska" out last week. A ska album is also in the works at Atlantic.

The Arthur Murray studios are now teaching the ska and according to Atlantic spokesmen. Atlantic records are being used by the teaching staff in the 400 Murray studios in the U.S.

Spinosa To Musicor

Independent producer Chris Spinosa has been named national sales manager of Musicor Records, the Art Talmadge label, starting in October. Until then he will head sales for Music & Voice Records, another Talmadge label. He will set up the firm's national distribution. In the fall Spinosa will head for Europe to set up foreign arrangements for the label. Meanwhile Marketing Plan Associates under Merle Schirade will take care of all production and packaging of the firm's product.

Record Month

The Record Industry Association of America is instituting a National Record Month in September of this year. The RIAA will be working this summer to obtain a Presidential or Congressional citation for the month, which will be keyed to the theme "The Wonderful World Of Records." Object will be to direct the consumer's attention to Records via advertising and promotion in every city and hamlet in the U.S.

Participating companies will use logos about National Record Month in their advertising and promotional literature, and dealers will be asked to use window posters and leaflets on counters and walls. The RIAA will also work out tie-ins with other products and promotions and will work out publicity items with distributors and disk jockeys on local levels.

The RIAA is asking the cooperation and collaboration of

all other record trade groups like ARMADA, NARM, NAAM, NARRD, etc. RIAA Executive secretary Henry Brief will talk to any group who wants to help promote National Record Month.

Game of the Year

On June 24, at Noon, in New York's Central Park there will be a softball game. This is not at all unusual because softball games take place in Central Park every day. But last year the game between the two teams that will compete again on June 24, drew 5000 goggleeyed spectators (mainly male) (not necessarily fans) who cheered and ogled and aahed. The competing teams? Why the Playboy Club Bunnies, managed by Hugh Hefner, and Joe O'Brien's WMCA Good Guys. Last year the gals won the game, 7 to 6.

On the Airport Beat

The rental limousine business running from midtown Manhattan to Kennedy Airport continued brisk last week, with another British group arrival at the International Arrivals Building. In this case it was Imperial's Billy J. Kramer and the Dakotas who came in for a 10 day stay. Next in line, following Kramer was Capitol's latest British import, the team of Peter and Gordon.

An assortment of Britons and Americans were herded via radio-telephone equipped limousine (the phones have become the newest status symbol in the routine) to the Airport to meet Kramer. The group of press people were squired by Tony Barrow, press officer for Brian Epstein, who manages the group. Fifty or so vociferous, gum-chewing teeners were on hand to shout a welcome to Kramer, who then met with the press in a surprise 10 minute press conference - a surprise because earlier the press had been advised that they were being taken to see

Kramer but that there would be no time for questions. The press later found their own way back to the city since the group itself commandeered the limo.

As for Peter and Gordon, their arrival is set for 5:35 p.m. Monday (15). It may take the boys quite a time to get into town (limo or no limo) since they'll be heading into the thick of departing World's Fair visitors and an expected crush of baseball fans going to the annual Mets-Yanks sandlot ball benefit game at the new Shea Stadium which lies directly in the path of the route into the city. Plans for the duo include five days of appearances at the World's Fair starting Wednesday (17), a possible Ed Sullivan show slotting, and concerts in Honolulu with the Beach Boys July 3, 4 and 5. In between, GAC was understood to be filling out the concert schedule.

New Rodgers Songs HOLLYWOOD

Richard Rodgers delivered a pair of new songs to producer Robert Wise to be included in the film version of "The Sound

of Music". Musical, which Ernest Lehman screenplayed from the Rodgers & Hammerstein legitimate hit, stars Julie Andrews, Christopher Plummer, Richard Haydn, Peggy Wood and Eleanor Parker.

New tunes, both music and lyrics by Rodgers, are "Something Good" and "I Have Confidence In Me." The former replaces the "Ordinary Couple" from the stageshow.

Tower Names Mayer

Tower is the name of the new Capitol subsidiary label. (Named after that famous landmark, the Capitol Tower in Hollywood.) So far two executives have been named: Bud Fraser. who will head the label, and Vito Samela, the sales chief. Last week Tower named Perry Mayer to head merchandising

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and advertising. Mayer comes to the label from the agency Sheldon Marks & Associates. Before that he was with Capitol Records.

Capitol Looks About

HOLLYWOOD After repeated top-level denials, Capitol Records has admitted that it is reviewing "new prospective" advertising agencies for both its record club and pop-album business divisions.

The record club division now with Frank Vos, New York, bills over \$2 million dollars per year. The pop album division has been with Carson/Roberts, Los Angeles and bills approximately \$500,000 per year. Alan Livingston, president

Alan Livingston, president of Capitol, would like to consolidate both divisions "under one roof" if possible. They have invited 12 agencies to tell Capitol what they can do for them. Two to three "finalists" will be selected to offer final presentations.

Lampley To Prestige

Cal Lampley has joined Prestige Records as a member of the firm's a. & r. department. Lampley has been with Victor, Columbia and Warner Bros. also in a. & r. Meanwhile, at the same label, Ron Eyre has been appointed vice president in charge of sales for the label, and Bob Kirstein has been named sales manager of the Western Division. He was last with Good Time Jazz. Jerry Field takes over as Eastern division sales manager, and George Badonsky the Mid-West sales manager slot.

Le Rouge et Noir

Sergio Franchi didn't have to fight to switch, he merely requested and RCA transferred him from the Red Seal label to the regular (Black) Victor label.

Franchi, who has been under contract to RCA Victor's Red Seal label, asked the company to switch him to the pop label. RCA readily agreed.

Franchi was originally placed on Red Seal as a replacement for the departed Mario Lanza, who warbled for that division of RCA. Italian tenor's repertoire now is largely in the pop field, although he was originally destined for opera. He felt that by being on the Red Seal label, he wasn't reaching his

entire audience with his new pop album "Women In My Life."

Colpix Prepares

Heavy special merchandising is the word at Colpix as the company prepares for its forthcoming annual distributors meeting in Miami Beach Sunday (28). Getting special buildups right now are an album known as "Let Freedom Ring" (tied in with July 4th); the soundtrack of a new picture "Hey There, It's Yogi Bear," and a reservicing of Paul Petersen's "My Dad," single to tie-in with Father's Day.

Colpix general manager, Ray Lawrence, said a number of new selling aids will be introduced at the upcoming convention including a 10-pack LP display case (for soundtrack albums); a counter box and browser cards for the label's "Torchlight" singles series, a new-type "slick" book for album cover display by salesmen and a new inventory control system catalog for distributor use. Lawrence also unveiled a deal made with Seldon Manufacturing Company, for a series of Colpix boys shirts. Shirts will carry imprints of album covers in the chest and stomach area.

Also announced was a co-op ad program, terms of which will be open to all distributors who meet their quotas in orders placed at Miami Beach.

Bobby Lewis Pact

Bobby ("Tossin' and Turnin") Lewis signed with ABC-Paramount last week. The label also pacted the Sapphires, a girl group from the Quaker City. Lewis, whose biggest hit was on Beltone, will be out with his first release shortly. The Sapphires initial ABC slicing came out last week.

From a Gleam to a Reality

In Two Years Philips Has Become One of The Key American Labels

THREE YEARS AGO, Philips Records (U.S.A.) wasn't even a gleam in the eye of its parents to be, the giant Dutch-based Philips Records combine and the American Mercury Records Corporation. At the time, in fact, the marriage hadn't even taken place.

When the corporate, international wedding took place, however, the American Philips label was born as an outlet for the disk product from Philips' own worldwide resources and as a builder of strong new American talent as well. The twoyear development of the new label here, has been fantastic in terms of artist acquisitions, breadth of catalog and gross sales volume.

Authoritative sources indicate that Philips is currently running at a rate which will produce a net sales volume of more than \$5,000,000 in 1964. Declining to indicate specific figures, national sales and product manager, Lou Simon, says, "We believe we are among the top dozen labels today."

"AND THAT HAS HAPPENED really in only about 20 months," Simon continued, "Because we spent our first ten months from the time we opened shop February 1, 1962, wondering where our first hit would come from. It finally came thanks to Paul and Paula."

But Philips didn't relax. Instead, a major talent signing effort was launched,

a campaign which is still in effect today. And the artists now turning out saleable product run the gamut from pop to jazz to classical and to what Simon describes "the unique and unusual."

"We've got a reputation for this kind of thing and we like it," Simon continued. "Look at 'Dominique' for instance. Who'd have thought of that as a hit? But look what happened. Then we come along with the Swingle Singers and 'Bach's Greatest Hits,' another left-fielder maybe, but a big one for us. The trade watches for this now and we're leaning in the direction of picking out the unusual whenever we find something like that.

Philips really made the Swingles through the group's several hit LP's. On the other hand, the signing spree for recognized names is notable both for the kind of artists being latched onto and the short space of time it took to build the imposing roster.

ONE OF THE FIRST of these was Woody Herman, always a jazz name to conjure with but one who had been relatively quiet disc-wise for some time. Philips first set, "Woody Herman 1963," became a big chart album. So did two follow-ups, "Encore 1963" and "Woody Herman 1964." The '63 set pulled down a Grammy award.

Philips also signed Dizzy Gillespie and Gerry Mulligan in the intervening months. Recently, they teamed Gillespie with one of their most off-beat overseas imports, the swinging Double Six of Paris.

Incidentally, lest anybody tend to think of the Swingles and the Double Six in the same terms, it's not true, according to Simon. "The Double Six do strictly vocal interpretations of jazz instrumentals, while the Swingles, we feel, are on a broader, more commercial kick. The Swingles initial album 'Bach's Greatest Hits,' has sold over 100,000."

Joining the label's instrumental, bandoriented line-up just last week was the indomitable society maestro, Lester Lanin. Long a heavy catalog seller for Epic, he's looked to by Philips to continue his sales pace for them.

In the strictly pop field the firm is CONTINUED ON NEXT PAGE

well known for Paul and Paula and the Singing Nun. Unfortunately, neither managed to sustain over any length of time. This fact necessitated an aggressive drive to fill the void. This has been accomplished.

LATE LAST YEAR, after months of effort, the label signed the Four Seasons, which it believes to be one of the strongest pop groups in America. It's earlier sucescesses have been continued on Philips and Simon blieves its current single "Rag Doll" will be its biggest success to date.

In addition, the label has developed a previously unknown folk group, the Serendipity Singers into a major pop-folk attraction, with two successive single hits and a brisk-selling album.

Highlighting the neat mixture of domestic product and material taken through the Philips overseas reservoir, is the success here of British thrush, Dusty Springfield. Early this year, the label released her "I Only Want to Be with You," which turned into one of the biggest singles of that period, followed with "Stay Awhile." and currently "Wishin' and Hopin'," which is her third straight hit here. Also from the British well of material come the Four Pennies with "Juliet," the current top disk in England, released here a fortnight ago. The latter, and all import releases repre-

sent decisions of Lon Rizner, the label's import coordinator.

Last year too, Philips signed Nina Simone and Teresa Brewer and is mounting strong merchandising efforts behind both. More recently, the talent parade has continued with signings this past month of Jimmy Clanton and Brian Hyland. Both have been hit artists in the past and Philips is pushing hard to get their first singles, just out, off the ground.

The producing firm of Gelb and Udell made the Hyland deal with Philips and at the same time they arranged for Philips' release of a single by a new 11-year-old artist, Michele Scotti, with what they hope will be another "Bikini," summer hit, "The Boys' Camp Is Just Across the Lake from the Girls' Camp Where I Go."

PHILIPS is also very much interested in the Secrets, a new girl group, whose first hit, "Hey Big Boy," sold 260,000, according to Simon, Lonzine Cannon, a new girl singer discovered by Quincy Jones, and Alan Vallone, a teen boy singer recently pacted.

Though Philips hasn't always been as active in the country field as it would like to have been, things are on the upswing there too, with a current hit by Johnny Sea, "My Baby Walks All Over Me," Shelby Singleton and Jerry Kennedy are hard at work on additional good records.

But Philips, in its two years of real productivity, has moved in other fields too, fields like classical and spoken word, and even the offbeat kind of specialized market material made available in its deluxely packaged "Connoisseur" series.

In classical alone, the label has the rights to major artists from overseas through the parent Philips organization. These include the Concertgebouw Orchestra from Holland, the I Musici 12-man chamber orchestra from Italv, bass-baritone, Gerard Souzay, the Vienna Boys Choir, violinists David Oistrakh and Arthur Grumiaux, pianist Sviatoslav Richter and the world-renowed 'cellist, Pablo Casals.

In the Connoissur series, a group of handsome, book-fold cover sets enclosed in a thick transparent plastic outer jacket, there are such distinctive foreign offerings as Jacqualine Francois, Yves Montand, the late Edith Piaf, "The Virgin Island Steel Band," and the exciting, good-selling "Missa Luba," in which an interpretation of a Catholic Mass is performed by an African tribal vocal ensembl, another example of the Philips successful quest for off-the-beaten-track product.

In the spoken word field, the material is limited but at last one set, a reading of the play, "Uncle Vanya," has been a notable artistic success. The cast includes Sir Lawrence Olivier and Joan Plowright.

The answer to Philips' hot pace lies in product, not deals, according to Simon. Much of the credit for the product and the talent acquisitions, Simon gives to Mercury president, Irving B. Green, who he says "Is a terrific man for spotting saleable talent and grabbing it."

"We don't go all out on any kind of deals. If anything, we've been on the conservative side. Our average discount is no more than 10 per cent. We rely a lot on good publicity being turned out for us by Aaron Cushman Associates here in Chicago. Believe me, when you have good artists and you give them good publicity, you don't have to give the product away."

SIMON, who has spent 20 years in the record business, put in 16 of those years in Cincinnati with Sam Klayman's Supreme Distributors. One of the lines in the shop was Mercury, a fact which helped nurture a close relationship between Simon and Green. When the Philips situation developed, Simon was given the call.

Around him, Simon, who operates Philips under Green and Mercury executive vice president Irwin Steinberg, has built a small but effective staff of four field sales and promotion men, including Hal Charm, east; Shelly Tirk, midwest; George Steiner, West Coast; and Fred Ellis, south. Bill O'Brien is national promotion manager and Herb Rosen who recently handled New York area promotion, has now moved to the new branch, Multi-Disc in New York, where he handles promotion for Philips as before, in addition to Smash and Fontana.

For a.&r., Simon draws on the proven talents of Hal Mooney, Jack Tracy, Quincy Jones, and Singleton and Kennedy.

"WE'VE HAD A LOT OF LUCK," says Simon. "I admit that. But we've also got the artist line-up and the product now to keep us moving up. We're working to do that very thing right now with a new album "Captain from Castile" with Robert Farnon, and a brand new girl singer, Marilyn Burroughs. And I can tell you, we think we'll make it with both of them."

"MUSIC IS STILL MY LIFE"

Bobby Darin's Explosive Scene

"WE ARE BACK TO THE ROOTS. It's like 1953 all over again. Remember when r.&b. broke out, was renamed rock and roll, swept the entire music industry? That's what's happening right now. The Beatles showed that a simple record is what the kids want, and those old, complicated over-arranged records are out. And you know what—it's exciting all over again too."

The speaker is Bobby Darin, who should know whereof he speaks. Darin came to fame during the height of the rock and roll era, with hits like "Splish Splash" and "Dream Lover." He made his own special impact on the field with "Mack the Knife," and "Things," and now is getting ready to start a new singing career with a new label. (We really don't know which one it will be, but Darin admits he has narrowed it down to only two, one of which might be Colpix, run by his friend, Donnie Kirshner).

DARIN, one of the few record artists who has also been successful as a producer, writer, discoverer of talent, discoverer of writers, and the head of a bustling, music publishing-record producing firm in New York and Hollywood, has also carved a new career for himself as a movie actor. (He is good enough in that career to have been nominated for an "Oscar" for his role in "Captain Newman, M D.").

In case you might wonder how Darin manages to do all these things, and also find time for his family (his wife is the lovely Sandra Dee, and they have one child), it can be said that Darin at 28 is even more of a driving, supercharged personality than he was at 23 when he started his singing career.

A day with Darin in his New York offices, which he visited a few weeks ago, is like being with a whirlwind. He writes songs, works on songs with other writers, prepares singles and albums for his production firms, sees talent, goes over his business' finances, sets future plans with executive vice president Ed Burton, holds



conferences with the staff, and in the evenings sees talent playing at the clubs in the city. And know what-he enjoys it.

"If I had to sit doing nothing between movies I'd go crazy," says Bobby. "I dig writing and producing, and working with young people. Do you know that of the new writers I just signed, one is only 17? And he's good! I also enjoy finding talent, like Jesse Colin Young, the new folksinger on the Capitol Label. He's going to be a very important name as a singer and a writer in the near future."

"I'M HAPPY that Ed Burton and I have built a successful publishing firm in Trinity Music and a successful producing firm in T. M. Productions. We published 'The Shoop Shoop Song,' which was written by one of our staff writers, Rudy Clark. Rudy also wrote 'Beg Me,' and 'Spanish Boy.' both of which we think will be hits. And of course we produce the Wayne Newton records for Capitol, and we also make records for other labels."

The Darin music publishing operation is a substantial one. In New York Irwin Shuster is the general professional manager, while on the West coast, Harvey Geller, is the professional manager. Solly Loft works out of New York as the firm's contact man.

Trinity also has on its roster four contract writers. (As noted above Bobby just last week added three more.) The men on staff are Rudy Clark, Kenny Young, Artie Resnick and Terry Melcher (the Columbia Records producer).

Darin is still as enthusiastic and excited about the music business as he was when he broke in a decade ago. "I dig it, every part of it. I like to create. Music is still my life.

"You know," he said, "some people say that I've become unapproachable since I've become an actor. That's not true. Sure, I've had my fights with people, but there isn't a writer who can't come in to see me if he has anything worth while. And the same goes for talent. I know how I started, and how tough it was, and I'll never go high hat about myself, or to the people in the business."

THE MOST IMPORTANT aspect of the music business to Darin is the fact that he works with young people. "They keep me young, and that's the only way you can stay in this business. After all, I'm 28 and not getting any younger."

Music Business In Hollywood

Hollywood . . . Lorez Alexandria, the groovy jazz vocalist, was signed by A.B.C.'s Impulse label. Her first album "For Swingers Only" will be released within two weeks. . . . Reprise records has released a Sammy Davis (no longer Jr.) single titled "Choose." The session was arranged and conducted by the ubiquitous Jimmie Haskell. . . . Bobby Darin has composed a new song "Boss Barracuda" in honor of the new Plymouth auto. The song will be cut by THE BARRA-CUDAS (natch) for the Canjo label.

Liberty recording artist Vic Dana has signed to headline the show at the Casino Royal in Washington, D.C. Oscar Brown, Jr., opens his one man revue at the Music Box, June 12-20. Oscar does everything, as usual, but sell tickets. . . . Nancy Wilson headlines the show at Hollywood's Cocoanut Grove on July 7. Entertainment director Freddy Martin will hold over Les Brown and his orchestra for her engagement. Brown's group had been previously set to backstop the Lena Horne Grove opening on June 4.

Debbie Reynolds will headline the second Meredith Willson CBS-TV special. It airs on June 23. It's her first tv appearance in 3 years. . . Joe Pass, World Pacific's jazz guitarist, gigs on the Steve Allen

Show June 19. . . . Songwriter Libby Holden has added the Vespia Bros. to her collection for new song acts. She just finished one for Frankie Laine. The Vespia's, now appearing in Reno, are slated to headline the Playboy Club in Chicago during August. . . . Johnny Carson, NBC-TV's "Tonight" emcee, signed a Columbia recording contract. First album will be comedy chatter with satirical slants on the N. Y. World's Fair.

Andy William's Good Time Singers record their second Capitol album on June 8. Keep an eye peeled for Capitol's newest recording group, Hub Kapps and The Wheels. Ty Klyp will man the drums, Rip Kord on guitar, Ry Krisp on Bass, and famed jazz producer Dave Axelrod will produce the session. They are for real!

Nancy Wilson received a Flamingo Vegas assignment. It'll be for three weeks in August. . . . Dean Martin, Al Hirt and Eydie Gorme will star in a one hour musical in NBC-TV on Thanksgiving Day. . . . Terry Thomas, the noted British comedian and motion picture star, recorded a comedy album for Warner Bros. It'll be released during the fall. . . . Have you seen the lush cover of Clifford Scott's "Lavender Sax" album on World-Pacific? Julian Portman



There's a big story about to break in the business. It concerns one of the top executives of a troubled, but still swinging indie. The exec, now little more than a figurehead, is so anxious to get back control of the firm that he is doing everything possible to subvert the present management.

This will come as no surprise to the hippies, but there has been a big upsurge in bootleg records. Some of the top-sellers, which should have sold 700,000 to 800,000, have stopped at 500,000 and 600,-000 because of the counterfeiters, who have moved into certain markets and garnered sales. However the Philadelphia presser accused of doing the bootlegging IS NOT! We repeat-he is NOT!

Two of our favorite people, Dave Dreyer, and John Hammond, are both recovering from recent illnesses. Dave Dreyer is at home in New York recuperating nicely from his long seige. As for John Hammond, who suffered a coronary in early May, is on the road to recovery. Hammond is expected to be back at his desk at Columbia Records in August.

Elliot Lawrence is the musical director for the new show "Golden Boy," in which Sammy Davis is starring. Sam Cooke opens at the Copa in New York on June 25, follows it up with the Club Harlem in Atlantic City, and after he completes the engagement, goes out on the road in a package being set up by GAC one-nighter booker Bob Astor. . . . REVIVING A LEGENDARY ARTIST

Columbia's Ken Glancy maps major campaign on new LP by organist-singer Joe Mooney

KEN GLANCY, the executive vice president in charge of a. & r. at Columbia Records, went to The Most night club in New York last November to see the legendary Joe Mooney. "I was gassed" said Glancy. And that's why Columbia Records will soon issue an LP called "The Greatness of Joe Mooney."

"Mooney is much too good not to be on records," Glancy said. "We all know the reverence in which all of us in the trade hold him. If we all feel that strongly about him I'm sure there must be a large segment of the public who will want to listen to him too."

Columbia's Mooney disk was recorded with Ed Shaughnessy, Barry Galbreith and Mundell Lowe. Joe, of course, sings and plays organ. The firm first bought a master of Joe Mooney cut by Kay Finnegan, his manager-mentor, but decided against issuing it.

MOONEY'S current revival on the New York scene is due to the work and toil of Kay Finnegan, who has helped bring him out of semi-retirement in Florida to a real, swinging performer in the big town again. He is currently appearing at the Penthouse Club in New York. and his fans everv night include celebrities like Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett. Trini Lopez and others.

Glancy has lined up all departments of Columbia Records to mount a major push behind the Joe Mooney LP. Publicity, promotion, advertising and dealer and deejay contacts, will all be utilized to promote the Joe Mooney album. **GLANCY'S** excitement over Mooney is characteristic of the drive that he has brought to the Columbia a. & r. department. Glancy had held down many sales positions at Columbia, before taking over his a. & r. slot. His appointment to the a. & r. post reflects Columbia's policy of letting its executives gain experience in all key areas of a major record operation.

Under Glancy, Columbia is adding a number of new names to the label that he feels will add much power to the firm's already strong artist's roster. One of these is Orchestra U.S. A., under John Lewis. This modern jazz crew, which has done very well in concerts in the East, will have its first album issued in a month or so.

ANOTHER new name on the label is Linda Lloyd, a rock singer from the Coast whom Glancy expects to do well with the teen set. And Columbia has just signed The Quinto Sisters, the cute kids from the Mitch Miller show.

A wealth of product is lined up for release from Columbia starting with the firm's sales convention in Las Vegas in July. Details of these items will not be publicized until then, but it has been learned that the firm has re-cut, as part of its Broadway recreation series, two of the best-known musicals of the last two decades. using top legit names for the key roles.

ALL in all it is a busy time for the Columbia a. & r. staff sparked by Glancy and his sales-oriented approach to the firm's singles and album product. BOB ROLONTZ

Music Business in Britain

Transatlantic Records will put out the first Storyville label wax for over two years in Britain next month. There will be nine Storyville albums retailing at \$4.20 and four EPs selling at \$1.90. Featured on the discs are Sonny Boy Williamson, Sidney Becket, Leadbelly, Memphis Slim, Bill Broonzy, Lonnie Johnson, Otis Span, Big Joe Williams and Snooks Eaglin.

In September 15 more Storyville items will be put out. Transatlantic managing director Nathan Joseph also reports that he will launch a new folk and jazz label named Xtra in August.

Louise Cordet, 18-year-old Decca singer, has quit the business. She had a hit in 1962 with "I'm Just A Baby" which was produced by ex-Shadow Tony Meehan. Louise is the daughter of London club owner Helen Cordet. Her godfather is the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Philip.

Polydor has appointed Johnnie Francis as its British a&r man in readiness for its own recording operations, which are not expected to start for some months. Francis-once a member of the Dallas Boys singing group-was EMI's Capitol exploitation manager here for two years from 1960.

CBS is readying three "Camelot" albums for release in September. The show comes to London's Drury Lane in August. The albums are the original cast track, plus recordings of music from the show by Percy Faith and Andre Previn.

The Dave Clark Five will make its third North American tour in November opening in Montreal followed by five other Canadian dates and four days in Hawaii. They will then play



Industry observers here are surprised no set price is stated in view of the current fight to keep resale price maintenance in the record business. RCA Italiana general manager Guiseppe Ornato is currently visiting Britain. Selecta general manager A. W. Green is to visit Paris and Madrid to study the catalogues of local recording companies-the beginning of worldwide expansion planned for Selecta.

This week EMI issues a Beatles EP featuring three American tunes—Little Richard's "Long Tall Sally," Carl Per-kins' "Match Box," and "Slow Down," which has previously been waxed by Larry Williams. Fourth track is the Lennon-McCartney composition "I Call Your Name."

Dusty Springfield is visiting Germany and Holland and will record there. She is accompanied by her manager Vic Billings and Philips recording manager Johnny Franz.

Next week Ember issues an LP of early Roy Orbison material waxed before he joined Monument. Billy J. Kramer's "Little Children" follow-up "From A Window" will be issued here July 17. The Rolling Stones next single is expected to be two numbers recorded by the group in Chicago, and not their LP track "Tell Me" as in America. An EP "Five By Five" will be issued in July.

Many of today's disk jockeys seemingly lead a life of perpetual hazing for the sake of their respective promotion departments. The stunts have been particularly hazardous during the past few months ranging from the debilitating marathon broadasts (see May column) to sharing a cage with a lion.

The later stunt was staged by Ron Edwards, KRIZ, Ariz., to raise Phoenix, money to build a new lion house at the zoo. Edwards broadcast day and night from the cage. However he cheated a little. A wire partition separated him from his feline "friend." Canadian jockeys are equally stunt-crazy these days. For example, 187 pound Craig Cole, CJSP, Leamington, Ont. recently participated in a wrestling match with 352 pound Man-Mountain Cannon in the Essex Arena.

"Good Meanwhile the Guys" at WMCA, New York, have a unique problem of their own. They have to tell their wives that WMCA program director Ruth Meyers "ordered" them to play a second annual soft ball game against the Playboy Club Bunnies in Central Park June 24.

HOW TO KEEP A GROUP FRESH

Christy Understudies on the Ready

THE USE OF THE WORD "NEW," as applied to the New Christy Minstrels is logical. No matter who sees them, whether it's now or in two years time, their policy of keeping the group young and fresh will never change. Because of this, their brand of singing and approach to music is not likely to stagnate.

Unlike some groups who panic when they lose a member of their personnel, and then spend ages trying to find a replacement, the New Christys have this scene well under control.

"We expect people to drop out of the group" said Nick Woods. "And we're well prepared for it. For instance, only three months ago, the two original girls quit, which, I guess, isn't surprising, as we work so hard it eventually takes its toll.

work so hard it eventually takes its toll. "BUT SOME TIME AGO, we hit on the idea of recruiting new talent in readiness for the day when they could join us. The kind of policy we've been practicing is to look out for anyone promising during our travels, and take them back to Los Angeles to appear at Ledbetter's. Then, when anyone falls out of the present group, we cull from our selection. This is how some of our present day members joined us".

Which means, of course, that the new Christy's are already broken in by the time they're selected to join the existing group.

"This doesn't necessarily mean that we're always changing personnel" continued Nick. "But we have a joint understanding about always keeping the group young, fresh and on its toes. There's also the question of artists going solo. After all, I guess if my first disc on Epic hits it big, I'll probably think about quitting and going it alone."

THE NEW CHRISTYS' successful brand of singing has taken them from college campuses to the White House. Next year, it will take them on a European trek, to dates which will include the San Remo Festival, the Paris Olympia Theater and the London Palladium.

Whether they're appearing before the President or a bunch of University students, their act remains the same-sincere, humorous, entertaining and well organized.

"I remember the time we did a concert for President Johnson, and Clarence Treat, our kookie bass player—he plays it like he's still on the running track—just grinned and waved to the President like it was any other date. We don't stand on ceremony. We like people to accept us for what we are.

"Really, though, we feel most at home on college dates. We find that there seems to be more understanding and appreciation from people of our own age and background.

"For instance, we're dying to go to Russia, but rather than give a concert in the Red Square, we'd prefer to play one of their big universities".

AS IS GENERALLY KNOWN, the New Christys have been around the scene for two years. They were originally formed by Randy Sparks who wanted a group for recording purposes only. At that time, Sparks had his own trio of which Nick Woods was a member.

"In order to get the group assembled, we used to rehearse after dates in Randy's home" says Nick. "Somehow, between the dog barking, and the succession of instruments that everyone brought along, we managed to do it.

"Our first record, "This Land Is Your Land' was issued at the time of the Cuban crisis, and probably did more for us then, than it would have done at any other time. From then, we've never looked back. Right now we have "Today" and we've just completed a new album titled "The Land of Giants' which is songs based on legendary American heroes, and will be issued by Columbia in July.

"Sometimes it's difficult to find new material. Randy Sparks still writes a lot of it. If we find old stuff, we re-arrange it till it's completely away from its original style.

"WE'RE NOT A FOLK GROUP-that would make us specialists. We're entertainers, and we hope we're giving the people what they want, and what we enjoy doing most of all."

CONCERT: Thelonius Monk Carnegie Hall, N.Y.

Thelonius Monk's Carnegie Hall Concert, Saturday (6) was a happy, if schizoid affair, a masterpiece of negative diplomacy, mercurial humor, and momentary flashes of great music making. But never you mind, the entire house was in Monk's bag.

Monk's wife Nellie once remarked, "if Thelonius isn't special, then what is?" And how astute she is. He arrived on stage 35 minutes late, but nobody was the least bit perturbed. With Monk, you learn to expect nearly anything, 'cause that's what you're going to get. The first "set" was a casual warming up period with his quartet, lasting only 25 minutes, during which Monk shamelessly upstaged even his own playing with interpolated Chaplinesque choreography and whimsey. It was a sheer delight. Everybody was casually put on and they loved it.

Part Two got down to some real business though, with a ten-piece ensemble batting out some of Monk's most impressive compositions, arranged by Hall Overton. "Four in One," "Thelonious," "Monk's Mood" and "Little Rootie Tootie," warmed up the stage and the audience like everyone knew it would. Then Monk lent his magic tongue-in-touch to "Memories of You," all by his self, and the evening was now of a piece.

No encores, no bows, just a so long for now. But don't miss him next time, like. BARRY KITTLESON

NIGHT CLUB: Trini Lopez, Smothers Bros. Basin Street East, N,Y.

Trini Lopez is a standout entertainer. The lad with the slight, south-of-the-border dialect, offers just about the cleverest mixture of rock and roll and sophisticated, big night club brand of pop yet heard—an ideal recipe for the prom set plus parents. The act is currently on view in New York's Basin Street East, along with the headliners of the show, the original "put-on" twins, the Smothers Brothers.

The latter, with Lopez, went through their paces for a fullhouse trade audience at the first show Monday (8), the party hosted jointly by Mercury and Warner Brothers Records.

About the Smothers, there's little to be said that hasn't already been written. They are the greatest put-on of the latter day folk movement in the business. Using bits and pieces of familiar folk ditties as a framework of identification, they'll suddenly break out of the tune entirely to launch into a long repartee which kids the pants off TV commercials, folk songs, the American way and themselves. The rubbery facialities are enough to keep the crowd well cracked up but the off-handed dialogue does the rest.

In fact, the Smothers proved the kind of pros they are, by coming off well in the not inconsiderable job of following Lopez. Trini lays down his now familiar beat with the help of drums, bongos, fender bass and his own guitar. That's enough to assure an almost frantic audience participation and it all readily identifies with the younger element. Beyond all this, Trini has wisely brought in a swinging delegation of brassmen (three trumpets and three trombones) consisting of what must be Local 802's finest.

No matter what he does, Trini is the darling of the crowd. Starting with "La Bamba," he runs the gamut from "Kansas City," to the likes of "If You Want to Be Happy," "Granada," "Love Me With All Your Heart," "Hello Dolly," (Spanish language version), "America" (from "West Side Story") and his first hit, "If I Had a Hammer."

Smartly he gets the elders on his side all the way with a medley of oldies "Bye Bye Blackbird," "Heart of My Heart," and Helen Ward's old classic with Benny Goodman, "Goody Goody." A rousing, romping finish comes over big with Ray Charles "What'd I Say."

Trini is a good singer, plays a mean guitar, has great combo and band support and knows just when to bring the audience in on the sing-alongs. Warner's might well cut this date for a live album. REN GREVATT R

No More Cut-Ins?

Last week in Chicago a court decision was handed down that could eliminate cut-ins for renewals (the second 28 year term of a song's copyrighted life in the U.S.A.). It happened when songwriter Buck Ram sued over the tune "Afterglow," claiming he was sole author and that band-leader Phil Levant was not in fact the author of "any part of the composition" and therefore was not entitled to renewal rights under the law. (Law reads that only the author may apply for

renewal.) Circuit Court Judge of Chicago's Cook County granted an injunction permanently enjoining Levant from asserting any right, title or interest in the song.

There are a lot of songs coming up for renewal that were hits in the 30's and 40's. Many of them now bear the names of famous bandleaders and singers of that era. There is a possibility that on the renewals their names will be among the missing.

Music Business in Canada


COUNTRY MUSIC is on the upsurge in Canada. Country music has always been with us but we seem now to be turning more and more to this kind of listening. Tactful programming by GORD SYMONS of CFGM, Richmond Hill (near Toronto) has brought this station to the point on the rating charts to be a threat to the top forty stations. CFGM hasn't made these giant steps by appealing to the ignorance of the listeners with the hokey "howdy pardner" or the flat country singer backed by two guitars. Country music is a big sound lots of strings and an overall well balanced backing is giving the western sound a new image. If country shows are any indication of what's to come then look out. All shows with a western influence have been sold out lately. With the recent fall off in sales of pop American records (mainly because of the English sound) more and more record companies have come to realize the only market not affected was the Country and Western. Probably now, more attention will be given to this steady selling product that has always been here but never given the credit it deserves.

HAROLD WINSLOW, Quality Records reports that "Baby Beatle Walk" by Canadian AL MARTIN is being released in the U.S. on the Amy label, also that CHUCK BERRY's new single "No Particular Place To Go" piled up tremendous advance orders before the presswere available. The ings SEARCHERS new album "Hear! Hear! The Searchers" has also been released and initial orders indicate a smash LP. The new LP by DUSTY SPRINGFIELD "Stay Awhile" is also off to a good start.

GRACE BUNDY at London Records reports that the new single "Larry" by the ALLEN SISTERS (Shell) is off and winning battles and could be a big chart item. "Memphis" (Imp.) by JOHNNY RIVERS has started off with a bang as has the new **ROLLING STONES** "Not Fade Away" new ROLLING Grace also tells us that the LP "Golden Folk Song Hits Vol. 3" by the **JOHNNY MANN SING**-**ERS** is starting to show up as a big seller, mainly because both top forty stations in Toronto, CKEY and CHUM, are featuring this LP.

Big news for Canadians from Capitol. PAUL WHITE advises that the very popular Canadian group **THE ESQUIRES**, "Man From Adano" have just recorded in Montreal and will be ready for a release in July also that the French Canadian group LESCAILLOUX have also recorded in Montreal and will have a release shortly. In Toronto LARRY DUBIN and the **BIG MUDDYS** (Dixieland) will be releasing an LP shortly. This group is presently appearing at the Ports of Call in Toronto. Paul reports that from the classical end he has a new release by MARGARET ANN IRELAND "Music of Polish Masters", also "From "Bach to Rock" by the **YORK** UNIVERSITY CHOIR, conducted by WM. McCAULEY and a release coming up by the husband and wife team PAR-SONS and POOLE.

Johnny Rivers


The most exciting new performer on the record scene in many a year is 22 year old Johnny Rivers. In a few short months he has blossomed forth as a hot record act with the hit single "Memphis" and the strong selling album "Johnny Rivers At The Whiskey-a-GoGo," on the Imperial label.

Rivers break toward stardom has come as a result of his sensational appearance at the Whiskey-a-GoGo Club on Hollywood's Sunset Strip. Every night crowds line up to get into the new club to listen and dance to the Rivers' brand of vocalizing and guitar work. His style is based on the greats of the rhythm and blues field, and in his singing are touches of the warmth of Fats Domino, the rich sound of B. B. King, and the soulfulness of Ray Charles.

Like many another young blues-oriented singer, Rivers was born in the South, in Baton Rouge, La. He studied music while still a lad, and turned performer as soon as he reached his teens. In just a few years he had built himself a large local following.

In addition to being a singer, and a guitarist, Rivers is also an arranger and a song-writer. Among the many songs he has written are "I'll Make Believe," a hit for Rick Nelson back in 1958.

Before joining Imperial Records, a Liberty Records subsidiary, Rivers was on a number of labels, including Chancellor. His first single was produced by Dunhill Productions. His success now on records and at the Whiskey-a-GoGo Club has brought him a flock of offers to play top clubs in many sections of the country, as well as to appear on many TV variety shows. He is a young man on the way; Music Business' June "Artist Of The Month."
