

REVIEW OF THE WEEK

"Action" on ABC-TV The Dick Clark production,

Dick Clark production, here The Action Is," will be ut on ABC-TV as a new Monday through Friday series, parting June 28 from 2 to 2:30

The series will feature two name guests each day, plus a group of "regulars"—singers and dancers. Steve Alaimo and Linda Scott are set as "regulars" but Clark hasn't assigned the emcee role yet.

Clark himself will act as exexecutive producer with Gene Law as producer and Hal Galli as director. The show will use a variety of location shots (Franklie Avalon on a beach, Jan and Dean at a barn dance, etc.) in addition to airing from a studio.

Meanwhile, the trade is wondering what happened to Clark's plans to air an hour long special, also tagged "Where the Action Is", on CBS-TV. One report has it that Jim Aubrey's departure from CBS also spelled the demise of the Clark program. The ABC-TV series only runs a half hour, but the format description strongly resembles that announced for the CBS special.

Whopping Gross for Beatles in NYC

Beatles concert promoter, Sid Bernstein, announced last week that a gross of \$212,000 "has already been put in the bank," against the total potential gross of \$250,000 for New York's Shea Stadium Beatles concert next August.

And the demand for tickets

continues to swell, with particularly heavy requests coming in now from such cities as Washington, Baltimore, Cleveland and Boston. Bernstein said he will seek permission from Beatles manager, Brian Epstein, to stage a second Shea Stadium concert to accommodate the out-of-towners, and would hope to open individual ticket headquarters in each city. The Shea concert, by the way, carries a maximum ticket tag of \$5.65

Surf Tie-In

The new Gee Whopper surf board and the much publicized sidewalk surfing (also known as skateboarding) were in the news this week. MGM Records made a tie-up with the manufacturer of Gee Whopper, a sort of junior version of the West Coast-originated form of surfing and the tie-in is based naturally enough, on a record called "Gee Whopper," by called "Gee Whopper," by Glenn Sutton. Meanwhile, Bobby Rydell and his manager, Frankie Daye, are excited about 12-year-old Norma Tracey, and her "Skate Board Song," on the Day-Dell label. Andre Previn will record as both a classical and pop artist for RCA Victor, according to a joint announcement from Victor's pop a. & r. division vice president, Steve Sholes, and Roger Hall, manager of Red Seal a. and r. Victor also announced last week eight new album additions to its "best of" series (seven pop and one classical) for July release. These include Sam Cooke, Skeeter Davis, Eddie Fisher, Don Gibson, Glenn Miller, Tito Rodriquez, Hugo Winterhalter and Arthur Fiedler

Atlantic—Part 2

Atlantic has released four new LP's by Hank Crawford, the Grassella Oliphant Quartette, Nat Adderley and Earl Hines, to complete its spring LP program which commenced earlier with sets by Solomon Burke, Herbie Mann and "Killer" Joe Piro. Campaign behind this group includes spot radio, in-store display and trade ads, said Len Sachs, director of Atlantic LP sales and merchandising. The label, incidentally, reports strong reaction to the Killer Joe "Discotheque" set, in New York, Pittsburgh and Philadelhpia.

20th Buys Into Freddie Film

Twentieth Century Fox Films have bought into Freddie and the Dreamers' new picture, "Cuckoo Patrol", now being made in England.

Originally produced under the aegis of Grand National Films in Britain, 20th Fox has added \$300,000 to the budget, and for this, picks up world distribution rights on "Cuckoo Patrol". They are also negotiating a seven year movie deal for Freddie and the Dreamers.

It is hoped that "Cuckoo Patrol" will be completed and ready for U.S. distribution in time for Freddie and the Dreamers Autumn tour here, probably in late October.

Herman's Tour

Agent Frank Barsalona has set additional dates for Herman's Hermit's current visit here, and is working on plans to bring them back for a July tour, with Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders.

Following their shot on the Ed Sullivan Show (June 6), Herman's Hermits will play three days at the New York Paramount from June 11 thru 13. These dates will be preceded by one nighters in other parts of the country.

The group will return to the U.S. on July 21 for a fourteen day tour, followed by three dates at the Atlantic City Steel Pier from Aug. 9-11. Television slots for that period are currently being negotiated.


NAARD Meeting

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CHANGED SOUND. Bobby Vee has the same face, same appearance, and exactly the same cordial personality he's always had. But he doesn't have the same voice.

He still lives in Fargo, North Dakota, though he'll be moving permanently to the West Coast, pretty soon. He still has a penchant for getting up early and going fishing on the twin lakes in his home district-a hobby he's enjoyed since toddling days. And he still records for Liberty, with whom he had his first hit, "Devil Or Angel." The only problem was that he hasn't been making hit records.

Then wham! Out of the blue, Bobby Vee staked his chips on a winner, which, ironically enough, wasn't cut at the Liberty studios in Hollywood, but in London, England, under the supervision of EMI

and using their own facilities. This disc, "Keep On Trying", finally puts an end to those ghastly gossips who, remembering the old days, point accusing fingers at Bobby Vee and tell him he's trying to copy the late Buddy Holly.

BOBBY PLEASED. The record is almost straight R & B. It's a ballad with a beat that builds up to a very Tamla-Motown climax. Needless to say, Bobby is delighted with its success so far, and even stuck his neck out to say that if it wasn't a hit, he's still pleased with himself for making the effort.

"I'd gotten into a pretty sticky position," he commented between long gulps of a coke. "My stuff was turning stale. I didn't have a hand in the market. I needed to

change, but also felt that I needed fresh surroundings. I've grown up now—don't come on like the little boy any more.

"As you know I'm under contract to Liberty, and Snuffy Garrett produced all my discs. We had a great run. Much longer than I originally thought. But when I needed to change, Snuffy couldn't come through with the kind of thing I wanted. For almost two years, we tried and produced nothing spectacular.

Then just recently, Snuffy left Liberty, although he's still producing Gary Lewis discs on an independent basis. I was final-

ly free to throw in all my own ideas.

THE BRITISH SOUND. "I'd recorded in England before. In fact, the disc was a smash there and didn't happen here. It was "A Forever Kind of Love". I enjoyed working in British studios. On my last trip there, quite a few months ago, I decided to record again. I had quite a few numbers in mind. One of them was "Keep On Trying". There were some rock things

"I used the EMI studios in London, and the session was produced by Ron Richards and George Martin. Boy, are they terrific! I wondered what the reaction to the disc would be. I'm thrilled to discover the result. It's being released in England a couple of weeks from now".

Why did Bobby go the R & B route? He certainly didn't deny that this was the course he was aiming for. "Well, I guess in all the excitement, most people forgot that I've always loved R & B music, and as long as I had hits, I had to continue in the same vein", said Bobby. "But I practiced. Whenever I had the chance. Then eventually, I tried it out on record".

A DIFFERENT LIGHT. A hit disc gives Bobby Vee a new lease on his career, and in his case, it throws a completely different light on it too.

Bobby has always had a good act, with plenty of variety, but he's kept it away from anything with an R & B feel. Now he can include lots more songs like "Keep On Trying" (which, incidentally, is not to be confused with the Impressions' hit of the same name).

Bobby's career started in 1959, when he and his group were asked to fill in on a and his group were asked to fill in on a date which should have been played by the late Buddy Holly. They were pretty successful, and eventually Bobby met Arnie Mills who became his personal manager and still handles him. Bobby signed with Liberty and had a succession of smashes like "Rubber Ball", "More Than I Can Say" "Take Good Care of My Baby" and "How Many Tears." He formed his own music company in association with Arnie, and swung his way around the Arnie, and swung his way around the globe to much loud applause.

SEPARATE CAREERS. In England, he teamed with the Crickets for a couple of tours. They'd been having a pretty rough time, and he did it to help them out. They were and still are great friends, but because it was the Crickets, Bobby couldn't ward off the accusing fingers. He cut an album with them, and they all played dates in the U.S. too. Now they don't work together anymore—each having careers of their own.

"I didn't purposely intend to sound like Buddy Holly" he said. "It just happened that way-the pronunciation of certain expressions maybe. There was a time when a lot of singers sounded like that. The Crickets still do, but that's their intention,

and they have every reason to do it".

Bobby Vee is still the same guy—only he finally grew up this year because the record buying public gave him a break and allowed it.



London's Moody Blues Set a Brum (Birmingham) Blues Beat

Sartorially smashing group due here June 12 for first American tour



STRANGE AND GROOVY. Then suddenly it happened here. "Go Now" by the Moody Blues. No one was more delighted than "Music Business," because we'd flown the record in from England at the beginning of the New Year. We tipped it as a winner, which wasn't really a terribly difficult forecast as it hit the top of the British charts.

We saw the Moody Blues on television too. They had a bit in "Hullabaloo" before it recessed for the summer. They're a very strange looking group in a groovy kind of way. There are five Moodies. They don't always dress alike, but sartorially they always look good. They wear Italian inspired shoes and brush their hair over to the sides of their heads. When they pose for photographs, their faces look like they were cast in stone and their eyes have a passive look.

Musically, they are led by Denny Laine and Mike Pinder, who wrote both sides of their new release on London. Titles are "From The Bottom Of My Heart" and "And My Baby's Gone." It doesn't really sound too much like 'Go Now," which has a different background altogether.

In England, when someone's doing the "moody bit," it loosely means they're either putting you on or making excuses. It's been part of the English language for some time.

DEAD SERIOUS. The Moody Blues is a good name for the kind of material they perform, but the quintet doesn't do it tongue in cheek style. They're dead serious about their music.

Record wise, it began with "Go Now," which started scratching at the British charts at the end of last year. The disc was written by Larry Banks, and sent to the group by WMCA's good guy, B. Mitchell Reed, who has since departed from the East Coast, and returned to station KFWB in Los Angeles.

Mitch, on a visit to England, flipped over the group and started plugging them like crazy on his return to New York. "Go Now," was originally written for a big band, so the Moody Blues substituted voices for brass. The record was produced by Alex Murray, who used to be Mickie Most's singing partner, and then joined British Decca as an A & R man.

The Moodies arrive here on June 12 for a four week tour with the Kinks. This will be their second trip out of England—their first was in April, when they headlined at the Paris Olympia. They only stayed 24 hours, but they managed to swing their way through fourteen night clubs in addition to playing the date!

Denny Laine is 20, and says he was born in a boat, but has always lived in Birmingham. His favorite artists are Irma Thomas, Bobby Bland, James Brown and the Beatles, but he's also a keen jazz fan. He plays lead guitar and sings lead vocals with the Moody Blues, and before joining them, led a group called The Diplomats.

WANTS LUXURY. Denny's personal ambition is to be either a songwriter or A & R man, and he would also like to live in luxury for the rest of his life. He adds at this stage that if necessary, he'll settle for plain comfort!

Mike Pinder is 23, plays electric piano and sings. His hobby is recording, and he has a sound workshop in his home in Birmingham. He takes an active interest in their own discs, and he, too, would like to try his hand at producing some day. Mike was the one who thought of the group's name. He said they were originally called "The Moody Blues Five," but later shortened it.

He loves to travel, and spent some time in Germany, with a group called The Crew Cats (not to be confused with the Crew Cuts, who are American).

Clint "Whiskers" Warwick is 24, plays bass and sings. Before turning professional, he was a carpenter, and he's still interested in woodwork. He digs Wilson Pickett and Jimmy Smith, and flips out of his head over the Beatles and Ray Charles.

He led his own group called The Rainbows before answering the blue call of the Moodies. Since joining them, he says his main ambition is to carry on being as friendly with them as he is now. He would also like to see the group making it really big.

TUDOR STYLE. Graeme Edge is 23 and the group's drummer. He, too, is from Birmingham, but says that the group have all now moved into a Tudor style house in Roehampton, South London. His kind of music is jazz—particularly modern, and he wants to sing, though so far he hasn't had the opportunity. He likes double breasted jackets (on the long side), and short girls with long straight hair. He joined the boys as a refugee from Jerry Levine and the Avengers, because he said he got talked into it by Denny.

Final member of the Moody Blues is Ray Thomas, who is nicknamed "El Riot." He plays harmonica and sings, hates rock 'n' roll, but digs the blues like crazy, especially country blues, and artists like Sonny Terry and Sonny Boy Williamson.

"El Riot" derives from the time Ray led his own group in Birmingham, called El Riot and the Rebels. Ray is 23, likes to go fishing and eat Chinese food.

THE BIG SOUND. The Moody Blues are terrifically critical of both themselves and their work. They go for big sounding vocal harmonies, and big sounding instrumental work. After the success of "Go Now" in England, it took five weeks from the release of their next disc, "I Don't Want To Go On Without You" before it hit the charts. They weren't worried, because they said that chart success isn't everything.

But the Moodies are coming here in plenty of time to promote "From The Bottom of My Heart".

THE ROUGH ROAD. Roger Miller has been through the mill of the rough road, the fading hope and the fatigue. Now he's just tired from working so much and so hard. (It's no cinch to take down five Grammy Awards like Roger recently did.) "I'm tired right now and so is my wife," he said, as he talked from the home of his in-laws in San Antonio.

"Last night I could hardly get to the place I was supposed to be going. I had to have five policemen open the way for me. That's tiring, I'll tell you. I've been resting here today but now I've got to whip on my good suit and find my grin. I've got to grin a bit tonight for the folks in San Antonio and then I'll fly back home to California.

"I was born in Texas and raised in Oklahoma but I spent a few years in Nashville. I went there after I got out of the Army in '57. I worked for seven years playing drums, guitar and hoedown fiddle for a lot of the singers down there like Ray Price

and George Jones.

"No, I very rarely appeared on the Grand Ole Opry. In all the seven years I was there they hardly let me on. Since then I just sort of let them have it I guess. I had a record deal there for a few years but I finally got dropped because I didn't get any hits. Things looked real bleak and I decided to try to get

to the Coast and get into acting.

THE GOOFY SONGS. "I didn't have any money, but Shelby Singleton of Smash came along and made me a deal, signed me and gave me an \$1,800 advance so I could move out to California. I cut an album with Jerry Kennedy and we did a whole flock of goofy songs my other a. and r. men would never let me do.

"Now I'm working so hard I'm away from home two-thirds of the year, and I'm really lazy. I'm certainly a lazy songwriter. I've finished a good many of my songs right at the record session and that includes "Dang Me," "King of the Road" and it sure includes "Engine." I guess I just get inspired under pressure. Sometimes if you think too long about a song, you can think yourself right out of something good.

'I'll get an idea and just hang onto it for awhile. Like 'King of the Road,' I got from a highway sign I saw outside of Chicago which was advertising 'trailers for rent,' the first line of the song. 'Engine' came from a short story title I saw in the Saturday Evening Post. I didn't even read the story but the title kind of stayed with me. But this last minute stuff is easy because we don't have complicated sessions . . . no voices, just four or five of us sitting around in a circle. We just sit there and play.

SONGS FOR OTHERS. "I like songwriting. I've done it for

other artists as well as myself. I'd say I wrote at least 200 songs for other people before I really started recording myself. I had records by Burl Ives, Patti Page and quite a few others. But I could never be really happy with the interpretations other people gave my songs. Not that I like my own singing. But I figure maybe I can deliver the message a little better. But I'll keep right on writing stuff, maybe even for a show someday. I'd like that. But I've got to study myself some first. I like to try to grow all the time. And it takes a lot of looking at yourself. "I tell you somebody who's going to really make it big when

he looks at himself a little more and finds the direction. That's Willie Nelson from Nashville. He's already had plenty of hits, like 'Funny How Time Slips Away.' But he's going to really find himself like I had to. He'll sort of get in tune with the world and he'll be there. He'll be so big I'll have to lay him low,

that's how big.

"Boudleaux Bryant, who wrote so many of those Everly Brothers hits, is another who's made a contribution. Man, has he made a contribution. And his wife, Felice, doesn't do bad either. Gale Garnett has a lot of real talent too. She runs in her own direction but she does the honest stuff and this is the

age of honesty in music.

THE VERSATILE HERMITS. "I think the Beatles are pretty creative too. They're the only ones I've really liked except Herman's Hermits. Those boys are very versatile and they're not following in somebody else's footsteps. With the Rolling Stones, I just don't think they're too professional. I remember when I was in England, I was on a TV show with them. They didn't talk to me. But they kept pickin' away at their guitars while I was trying to rehearse. I finally had to tell them to 'coel it'

"Bob Dylan is alright I guess. He knows his own direction. He's like me in a way because he has no certain direction. With me, if I boil it all down, I'd say I'm a country boy with worldly ideas. I try to approach the stuff with a hip attitude. I do what

I feel and I put a little philosophy into it.

BUSY SCHEDULE. "But I'll tell you, I don't know where there'll be time for all the writing I want to do. I want to do movies and I'm talking about that with some people right now in California. I've never had any great bug to work in the theater and you can get lost in TV drama but movies I want to try. They want me back in England too, to do the London Palladium show and some TV specials.

"And next September I'll be doing the Hollywood Palace show

with Bing Crosby. In October. I'll be on with Andy Williams in his show and in November I'll be on the new Dean Martin TV show. And Bob Hope has asked me to go on his annual Christmas tour of the bases. And we're even kicking around the idea of

me doing my own TV show one of these days."



Music Business in Britain by Brian Harvey On the Set with Beatles

Watching the Beatles filming one would think they've been at it for years. I dropped down to Twickenham recently to see how they are getting on with their new epic and found only John and Ringo on the set. Not all the boys are on the set each day. Each is 'called' only for scenes in which he appears. The rest of the time they have off-at

When they are wanted for a 'take' the boys are picked up from their homes early in the morning by their own chauffeur-driven Rolls Royces. After being made up and dressed they turn up on set where the scenery for the day has been built. Cameras and lighting are in place together with an army of technicians.

Before the boys arrive and during moments when they leave the set, stand-ins take their places so that progress around them is uninterrupted. Filming must be a very boring business for the artists. In any one day only a minute or less of satisfactory film might be completed! But the work and standing around waiting for everything to be just right so the bit can be filmed, might take all day.

The day we called, two small scenes were in preparation. In one, John and Ringo are hiding in the basement of an Indian restaurant from Ringo's pursuers who are after an enormous ring he wears throughout the film. In the other Ringo, still being chased, falls through the roof of a hairdressing salon where Eleanor Bron is having her hair done.

Ringo's talent for humor was obvious in the first scene. He was supposed to speak to a waiter who Ringo found standing on his head in front of an ancient boiler. The waiter, frightened by Ringo's appearance, runs to lie on a bed of nails in the next room muttering frightened curses. Ringo follows, looks surprised and then leaves.

He suggested to director Dick Lester that he should try the bed of nails with his foot to see whether it was really sharp. In the next take he did this-result? Another

hilarious incident in what will be a hilarious film.

Liberty President Bennett flew into London earlier this week for contract talks with EMI Records, Liberty's outlet in the UK. Liberty's deal with EMI is up for renewal currently and there is a flurry of activity around new Liberty releases like the latest Jackie De Shannon

Top new British group the Kinks leave Britain for their first American tour on June

To date the boys have had two smash hits here "You Really Got Me," and "Tired of Waiting." This week their newie, another composition by lead singer Ray Davies, "Set Me Free" is released together with an enormous advance order.

It is a slow mover and has similar guitar opening to their previous hits. It features their usual moody, cynical style of singing and great guitar lead work by Dave Davies. Flipside is another Ray Davies number "I Need You." The Kinks have been topping a nationwide tour bill with the Yardbirds and have packed houses at each town.

After the end of the tour (May 23) the boys holiday for a few days, appear on top TV'er "Ready Steady Go," to promote the new single and then appear in Paris for several days before coming your way.

the uninitiated the For group are all very longhaired, appear on stage in red hunting style jackets and white frilly shirts and are not kinky!

Although (as I previously reported) The Beatles should have completed work on their new film "Help" this week, they have not. In fact at press time (Friday 14th) they were still in the studio involved in long hectic sessions trying to get it all in the can.

I gather that most of the action has now been filmed but the boys have not yet completed work on the musical numbers even though these were recorded some time back.

A recording studio sequence in the film has the boys miming to new numbers which will be on the soundtrack LP due out in early August or late July. On Monday night this week the boys cut a rush session at EMI's Abbey Road studios specially for the American market. Two titles were cut—"Dizzy Miss Lizzie" and "Bad Boy."

Recording manager George Martin says that the two new tracks will be used to make up a new American LP of the group. The balance of titles will be ones released here but not in the States.

The row between British and American entertainment Unions over the banning of some UK stars from the States is not likely to be followed by a ban by the British Government. Even though these cases have been brought to their notice they refuse to get involved in the hassle.

The VAF, however, who control most British pop artists, are considering a ban. The American who became a star here whilst still unknown in the States-P. J. Proby-is to return to America for TV dates in June. He has a new single due but release date is as yet uncertain.

Cilla Black has changed her hair style. Gone are the "marmalade commas" which is how one columnist described her auburn hair. Instead she now features a curly bangs style much prettier than her previous coiffeur. . . . During the Beatles Continental tour this summer the boys will play one concert in a Madrid bullring!

Tom Jones made a big impression on his first visit to the States and returns for another Ed Sullivan appearance on June 13th. He then planes back to this country for several dates before returning your way on July 12th. Among the Stateside dates he has in the book are a week in Murray the Ks show in Brooklyn and a Shindig appearance.

Another new British group, Unit 4 Plus 2, whose first record "Concrete and Clay," was a smash, may come to the States for a record promo trip in August.

The other night pianist Billy Taylor got excited about a new project he's involved in. It's something called "Jazzmobiles," and is a plan to bring live jazz into the areas of Harlem that were torn by racial strife during last year's "long hot summer."

Billy said that he contacted a number of name musicians and received enthusiastic assurances that they would play for scale wherever and whenever the Jazzmobiles would roll.

"It will mean something to a kid in a block in Harlem to know that, say, Dizzy and guys of his stature came to his block to play music."

Billy chuckled, then shook his head as he recalled what Gerry Mulligan had told him after enthusiastically agreeing to be a part of the Jazzmo-

bile experiment. "It'll be good just to get to go up to Harlem again," Billy quoted Mulligan as saying.

"It'll be good to have him
up there in more ways than

one," Taylor noted.

The idea is an interesting one for jazzmen, and should have a salutary effect. But the beauty part, of course, is not so much whether it will have any effect, but rather the way Negro and white musicians are pitching in together to work for something they believe in. Sometimes two men just playing well together and enjoying each other's company can speak volumes into young minds and hearts. And who better than Billy Taylor and Gerry Mulligan and Dizzy Gillespie to show by doing?

NARAS SHOW A GAS

I thought the NARAS TV

show last week was a ball... despite the troubles that were aired in the papers and despite the no-show of several of the heavy names who were to have appeared. It was a well-paced and musically attractive show all the way. And the comedy bits were very funny. I was proud to have been a member of NARAS as the show played, and I must reiterate here that this year's awards and ceremonies, plus this year's TV show, have put NARAS on the map for my money.

short takes: Here are a few recent albums I've heard and dug. "The Pawnbroker" (Mercury SR 61011) is Quincy Jones' first full-fledged motion picture score, and it is a winner. Although a good part of the album is small group jazz that sounds winged, there is enough scored and deeply-felt written material that is just lovely. As a bonus, Rod Steiger and Jaime Sanchez are heard in a bit of powerful dialogue off the soundtrack that will make your hair curl.

"Rio" by Paul Winter with Luiz Bonfa, Roberto Menescal, and Luiz Eca (Columbia CS 9115/CL 2315), a lovely, languid album, has much of what made Stan Getz so famous so fast. The songs are pretty and haunting, the rhythms are soft and pulsing, and the blowing by Winter and his Brazilian cohorts is so right for the material and the times

terial and the times.

"Bach Humbug!" by the George Gruntz Quintet (Phillips PHM 200-162/PHS 600-162) is a witty exercise by one of Europe's fine young jazzmen and a cracking good group. Gruntz is a mature and swinging jazz pianist, and his musical comments on Baroque music are delightful. Good playing by the group, too; especialy flutist Emil Mangels-dorff.

"Guitar/Guitar" (Columbia CL 2330/CS 9130) features Charlie Byrd's unamplified guitar and Herb Ellis' electric guitar in a blend that is magical to hear. The two players complement each other very well. And the material they play ranges from bossa nova to down home blues to ballads to swingers. They are such pros that everything they turn a hand to comes alive. A honey of an album.

After ten days of one-nighters in Texas and New Mexico, co-starring with Roger Miller, George Jones and others, he set out for dates in Phoenix, Miami, Orlando, Jacksonville and Tampa.

Stonewall Jackson took time from Lake Waterloo to play a string of key dates in Florida, South Carolina and Pennsylvania. Meanwhile plans are being set up for Jackson's new music pubbery at 812 16th Ave., south, Nashville. . .
