Boston's fan appreciation day

Because they generally avoid doing interviews and only agreed to play a select handful of dates on their tour in support of the platinum *Third Stage*, many people get the impression that **Boston** is a corporation with little or no concern for their fans. Not true.

A skateboardless Metallica?

By now, every **Metallica** fan knows that the follow-up to the ground – breaking *Master of Puppets* was delayed by vocalist **James Hetfield**'s second skateboarding accident in under a year. Most people would imagine that the band would try to make Hetfield give up his second favorite pastime, but according to drummer **Lars Ulrich**, not Metallica.

"Our first worry at that time was 'Is James gonna be all right?' His arm was broken in two places—it was a lot more serious than the first accident. We didn't get pissed off until later, but by then, he knew he'd fucked up really bad, so there was no reason to say anything else on top of that."


As a result of the bad break, Metallica were forced to cancel an appearance on TV's *Saturday Night Live*, as well as a homecoming show opening for **Iron Maiden** in San Francisco. So, after all that, does Hetfield still skateboard?

"I don't know," says Ulrich. "But I haven't seen him on one since the accident."

Ace Frehley: Why I split from Kiss

It takes a lot of guts to walk away from a job where you stand to make millions with almost minimal effort. But that's exactly what **Ace Frehley** did when he bid **Kiss** a fond farewell back in 1982.

"Gene [Simmons] and Paul [Stanley] had been writing the majority of the material for Kiss," reflects Ace. "They had been singing the majority of the songs, too. When I did my solo album. I think it surprised the industry. It surprised me. After its success, I kinda realized that Kiss was holding me back, because I didn't know where all this music was coming from. It was


Drummer **Rikki Rockett** adds, "That's the beauty of this band—we're the spark of many ideas put together as one. That's what's great about rock & roll.

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Two brilliant films:

'Platoon' and 'River's Edge'

The Bedroom Window (Vestron)

A top-notch Hitchcock-style thriller about a killer on the loose, his feisty almost-victim (Elizabeth McGovern), and an affair between an executive (Steve Guttenberg) and his boss' wife (Isabelle Huppert). Filled with intriguing plot twists and nerve-destroying suspense, *The Bedroom Window* is a winner.

Blind Date (RCA/Columbia)

All the ingredients are here for an effective slapstick comedy—a girl (Kim Basinger) who goes crazy when she drinks, her obsessed ex-boyfriend (John Laroquette) and her date (Bruce Willis) for an all-important business dinner that goes predictably awry. But the formula doesn't gel: there's occasional giggles, but no real laughs.

Platoon (HBO)

Last year's Best Picture Oscar winner lives up to its reputation; it's brutal, unrelenting, moving and memorable. Unlike the psychedelic surrealism of Apocalypse Now or the cold flashiness of Full Metal Jacket, Platoon's vision of the Vietnam war is gritty and painstaking, and makes you really care about its characters: central are an idealistic new recruit (Charlie Sheen) and two sargeants-one sympathetic (Willem Dafoe), one powerful and ultimately evil (Tom Berenger). But the rest of the cast is uniformly excellent as well. Platoon deserves every one of its critical raves.

Raising Arizona (CBS/Fox)

Ethan and Joel Coen's last film, Blood Simple, mixed folksy comedy and dark, hard violence—and so does this weird but thoroughly enjoyable saga of an ex-con (Nicolas Cage) and

a policewoman (Holly Hunter) who kidnap one of a set of quintuplets.

River's Edge (Embassy)

If you only see one movie this year, make it River's Edge, a harrowing coming-of-age story about kids so real, you'd swear they go to your school. The young protagonists here (including Keanu Reeves, Crispin Glover and lone Skve Leitch) fight with their families (the kind where the stepfather threatens to beat you up), drive around with speed metal blasting, cop from a burned-out local dealer (Dennis Hopper) and face the first big moral decision of their lives: a buddy (Daniel Roebuck) has murdered his girlfriend, and the gang has to decide whether to protect him or turn him in. River's Edge is a film you'll never forget. The soundtrack LP (Enigma) features Slaver, Hallows Eve and Fates Warning.

Three Amigos (HBO)





Kill!, enlisted the aid of the 65-year-old exploitation director to pilot their first clip, "Don't Change That Song," from their self-titled debut LP.


"The Russ Meyer films," says guitarist **Brent Muscat**, "all have extremely beautiful women that are smart and powerful and really cool." "And have big boobs!" adds singer/lyricist **Taime Downe**. "I just loved that movie... and I loved that name. I said, 'I gotta have a band called that!" "Meyer's other films include Supervixens, Beyond the Valley of the Dolls and Mondo Topless.

This caused an electrical separation in the wires, creating random noise and static for the first 22 minutes of the audio program. A company called Sonic Solutions in San Francisco restored the 19-year-old audio utilizing sophisticated computer techniques.

STOCKING-STUFFERS: More Jimi Hendrix footage has been released. Rainbow Bridge featuring Jimi Hendrix (Rhino), originally released in 1971, showcases the guitar genius at the Rainbow Bridge Occult Center in Maui in the summer of 1970, just weeks before his death. The program offers rare footage of Hendrix performing in daylight, but the guitar hero reportedly had to be drugged, kidnapped and sent to Hawaii (by his manager) against his will to do this concert. Songs include "Dolly Dagger," "Foxy Lady." and "Purple Haze."

Aerosmith: Video Scrapbook (CBS/Fox) combines live footage by the veterans from the Silver Dome in Pontiac, Michigan in 1976 and "Cal Jam II" at the Ontario, California Motor Speedway and the Capitol Center in Largo, Maryland, both in 1978. Following the heels of their new smash LP, Permanent Vacation (Geffen), the package also includes newly shot introductions by lead vocalist Steven Tyler.







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Whitesnake: Comeback of the decade?

e's your classic late bloomer: the proverbial overnight success after 15 years of false starts, aborted takeoffs, and second division stardom stretching from Finland to the south of France.

"A legend in his own lunch time," David Coverdale says drily, pondering how a blues-based wailer from the English shires (who first tasted fame during Deep Purple's waning days) now finds himself cast as rock's elder statesman and MTV fave. Razorhoned. Road-tested. Aware of the speed traps and experienced enough to avoid them.

Deep Purple were among Britain's finest-a notch below Zeppelinwhen the then-unknown Coverdale replaced Ian Gillan in late '73. Over the next few years, on a succession of mammoth American tours, the band provided the singer with a fast and furious education in rock life. On albums like Burn, he honed his studio chops in state-of-the-art style, perfected his craft-though the exit of saturnine axe-hero Ritchie Blackmore (replaced by Tommy Bolin) scrawled the writing on the wall. By the end of '76, Bolin was dead of a drug overdose. Deep Purple, fragmented and bickering, finally burned out.

Whitesnake rose from the ashes. During Coverdale's early years helming the tempestuous band, turning out albums like 1980's *Ready an' Willing*, he watched the arrival and departure of a slew of battle-scarred musicians including former Purple-ites Ian Paice and Jon Lord. Despite the group's rabid European following, he finally found the strain of juggling band egos too much to handle.

Three years ago, he withdrew to concentrate on songwriting, ultimately recording what would prove to be his triple platinum American breakthrough, *Whitesnake*, with a crew of hired guns led by long-time associate Neil Murray and co-songwriter lead

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After changing his mind several times on the subject. Rudy Sarzo has finally left Quiet Riot permanently in order to stay with Whitesnake. guitarist John Sykes, formerly of Thin Lizzy. With an exhausted Coverdale suffering from poor health, those musicians moved on to other things; the tapes were stored away. But fate kicked in once Coverdale began to ponder a return to the front line. Guitarists Vivian Campbell, drummer Tommy

Aldridge and bassist Rudy Sarzo were involved with other projects; none had been involved in the making of the album. But all listened when the singer unexpectedly called.

"It was like Zen and the Art of Forming a Band," Coverdale says, recalling how the new line-up came together. "I'd spent a brutal winter in Germany. It was seriously cold. I'd lost all perspective on the album, because of the grief that had gone down with it. I'd gotten ill. It was difficult to listen to, but I had nothing else to do, and I wrote on a piece of paper who I'd like to work with. Literally, the people I wrote down are exactly who I'm working with now. Nobody crossed out, nobody approached who wasn't interested."

Initially, the three (along with Adrian Vandenberg, who contributed some guitar overdubs to *Whitesnake*) were hired for the "In the Still of the Night" video, with no promises made for anything beyond. As Coverdale says, "At that time, there was no indication whether, after my threeyear hiatus, people missed me as much as I'd missed them."

When Whitesnake went gold in three weeks, however, the singer quickly got back on the phone. "A booking agency was waving money under my nose to tour, which meant I could afford to take these people away from whatever they were involved in," he recalls. "The worst thing is to go out on a wing and a prayer. I'm not a singer in some local group, and I couldn't get musicians of the caliber I needed by relying on promises. But now it's all history."

David has plenty to smile about these days. Whitesnake cracked Billboard's Top 10 in early May and, at press time, was still selling strongly in the #2 slot. With "Here I Go Again" becoming the #1 single in the country in October—a rarity for a hard rock band—Coverdale led his all-star

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troupe on his first arena headlining tour. Around the same time, Geffen Records announced that Whitesnake's earlier LPs were being re-issued. Come An' Get It, Live...From the Heart of the City, Saints & Sinners, Snakebite, Trouble and Love Hunter are now as easily available as 1984's platinum Slide It In. By anybody's standards, that's some comeback.




So there's no looking back?

"Never," Coverdale says, savoring his current status. "It's a media hangup that I go to bed thinking about Deep Purple. I'm proud to have been associated with them, but outside of the songs, I don't think my contribution was earth-shattering. These days, you'd get a Jack Daniels bottle up your ass if you went on stage as sloppily as some superstars did in the '70s. I take what I do now very seriously."



The half-a-million strong audience at the Rock in Rio festival in Brazil didn't solve the earlier Whitesnake's personality conflicts, so Coverdale split immediately after.

Motley Crue '87: Huge triumphs, small disappointments

n many respects, 1987 was Motley Crue's best year. Once metal's youngest and wildest, the Crue are now arena veterans with four albums under their belt and, seemingly, their problems behind them. All complications surrounding vocalist Vince Neil's 1984 car accident were finally out of the way; despite a year of relative inactivity in 1986, their fans remained as loyal as ever, as proved by the L.A. rockers' sweep of last year's Circus Readers' Poll.

As Kiss did in 1983, Motley Crue

"But I really believed in the record, so I expected it to do well but I didn't think it would debut at #5. That's fucking amazing." From that spectacular entrance onto the charts, *Girls* went as high as #2, second only to Whitney Houston's #1 self-titled longplayer. At press time, the Crue's paean to their "favorite pastime" was double platinum and counting.

Motley's tour with an equally strong opening act, the now triple-platinum Whitesnake, turned out to be the soldout metal event of the summer. For the first time, the Crue had some company on stage—the Nasty Habits, Emi Canyn and Donna McDaniel, lent both

capable vocals and sexy looks to the proceedings. To prevent burnout, this tour was also the first time the group traveled by private plane. And while the guys were firing up the arenas, those fans staying home could always watch Motley Crue: Uncensored, and did-the video compilation has also passed the platinum mark (50,000 units for music videos).

On a personal level, Vince Neil seems to have adjusted nicely to a cleaner lifestyle. ("I have more fun now, cause I can remember who I was with last night and where I am," he insisted), as has bassist/songwriter Nikki Sixx, who put his new convictions into an anti-drug song, "Dancing on Glass," off Girls. Sixx also announced plans to marry singer/actress Vanity, while Lee celebrated his one-year anniversary with Dynasty star Heather Locklear. As for guitarist Mick Mars, his personal life remains as mysterious as ever, which is just how the palest and quietest member of the Crue likes it.

In short, everything went the Motleys' way-well, almost. Despite the improved chops and more complex mu-

sical arrangements in evidence on Girls, critical respect continues to elude the group. Rolling Stone's vicious cover story (entitled "Money for Nothing and the Chicks for Free") not only made the Crue sound dumb, but revealed a few of the band's secrets, like Nikki and Mick's real names (Frank Carlton Serafino Ferrano and Bob

Deal, respectively), Vince's divorce and the fact that he has received steroid shots before performances.


"Most critics hate us, but I'm not worried about it -- most critics are over 40 and over 240 anyway," said Nikki in a philosophical mood, though at other times, he growled, "I fucking despise critics. They don't know shit about music." But Tommy Lee, when asked if lack of acceptance in this area bothers him, replied grimly, "Yeah." (One also wonders what the Crue think of Aerosmith's revelation that their hit, "Dude (Looks Like a Lady)" was inspired by Vince Neil.)

But such little digs aside, the Crue's message has always been about not letting anything or anyone stop you, and the band is heading into 1988 filled with plans-especially the everprolific and ambitious Nikki Sixx. His book of short stories "is coming along fantastic," and has been one of his favorite ways to pass time on the road. Sixx also wants to try his hand at "the creative side of the camera, working in production, directing, writing, just from a learning standpoint at first. I want to write books. Fuck it, why not? I guess I should be content being a bass player in a great rock & roll band, and I am content, but I have other dreams.

"Seems every time you say 'I want to try this and this," [someone says] 'you can't do that," he continues. "Did someone write a book somewhere saying, 'You can't do it all?'"

Tommy couldn't be happier with his whirling drums and the 'Girls' tour: "We're selling out and people are going crazy!"





Bon Jovi's wildest dreams come true

hat a year it's been for Bon Jovi-the Garden State rockers no longer have to dream about what it would be like at the top of the heap, because that's where they sat through much of 1987. Their late-1986 release, Slippery When Wet, dominated the charts for months, propelling Jon and company into superstar status. Album sales are now approaching the 8.5 million mark in the United States alone. with a total of well over 10 million copies sold worldwide. Slipperv's multiplatinum success also kicked Bon Jovi's previous LPs, which had fared more than respectably as gold albums. into the platinum arena as well.

In fact, *Slippery When Wet* racked up a number of jaw-dropping vinyl achievements this year. Consider these

stats: the LP was the one album in the U.S. for eight weeks, and also hit #1 in Sweden, Norway, Finland, Switzerland and Australia. It spawned two hit singles, "You Give Love a Bad Name" and "Livin' on a Prayer" (which held the #1 slot for four weeks); another single, "Wanted Dead Or Alive," reached number seven.

Slippery's 46 weeks in the top 10 tied the tenure of Whitney Houston's formidable debut album, and its 38 weeks in the top five was the third longest run there of any '80s album, beat out only by Michael Jackson's Thriller and Bruce Springsteen's Born In The USA. Not surprisingly, Bon Jovi's home video Breakout quadrupled in sales in the wake of Slippery When Wet's success, and is now certified platinum at over 50,000 copies. Slippery When Wet is no doubt going to be a hard act to follow, but word has it that the band is z

"I'm not afraid of next year," says Jon about pressure to repeat Bon Jovi's success. "We're coming into our own as songwriters." preparing to do just that: Bon Jovi was scheduled to begin work on their next album following the Christmas holidays.



much-how bad could fame and fortune be, after all? Yet to hear Jon tell it, the trappings of success can be a colossal pain. During a springtime trip to Los Angeles, for instance, he says he was hounded non-stop by the paparazzi.

"I couldn't even go for a popsicle without there being a photographer." he sighs. "There were car chases, 25 or 30 photographers chasing us through the airport-it was pretty annoying.

"I mean, I still live in a one-bedroom apartment, and kids don't damage my place in any way. They say, 'Hey, that's where Jon lives, and ten miles away, that's where Bruce lives, and that's where Southside Johnny lives.' That's the way it is. want to play-I don't want to be chased around by photographers.


"The kids are one thing," Bon Jovi stresses. "If they ask for an autograph or picture-I did the same thing, I understand that, and I take the time to

Jon hasn't yet gotten to the point where he has to appear in disguise, although he muses with a laugh, "It would be something to consider, just so maybe you could go buy a pair of jeans by yourself. It would be a little awkward to try a pair of jeans on and there's twenty people standing there telling you how they fit."

Bon Jovi may dislike much of what comes along with being a star, but he's deeply committed to continuing his career. "I've literally had discussions with myself," he says, "saying I'd give a day off my own life to be able to sing good that day. That's a pretty sick thing to say, but that's the truth, and if you don't believe in it that much, you'll never stay #1, you know what I mean? It's hard enough to get to the top of the hill, and when you're up there, you gotta see everyone. And ... here we are." 0

rue to form, Ozzy Osbourne started off 1987 by rising from the near-dead. Thought to be breaking bread with monks in Tibet, the Oz appeared in March looking healthier than ever and ready to discuss his disappearing act and sudden emergence just in time to kick off the long-awaited double live Tribute album.

The LP, a vinyl dedication to the memory of guitarist Randy Rhoads, was released in April, just a few weeks after the fifth anniversary of his tragic death. It went on to become Ozzy's fastest charting album ever, placing in the Top 10 on the Billboard charts and achieving gold status. A simultaneous video release of "Crazy Train," filmed using what limited footage of Randy as xerography, which produces a ghostly black and white effect, went on to become a Top 10 M'TV viewers' choice.

Wormwood Scrubs Prison in London. Aside from entertaining prisoners (with his version of "Jailhouse Rock"), the tour gave Ozzy time to break in his new guitarist and work up new material away from the media spotlight.

By early fall, Ozzy began plotting for the upcoming year. Negotiations began with film executives to shoot *Seeing Stars*, a movie which casts Ozzy in the leading role of a rock star trying to rescue a waning career. The film, scheduled to be shot in January, will be directed by Penelope Spheeris (*Dudes*,

Suburbia and The Decline of Western Civilization). If all goes as planned, further touring and recording would be suspended until late spring to accommodate the filming. But not to worry, assures the self-proclaimed madman, "Tve already begun working on material for a new album."

Meanwhile, late summer reports placed Ozzy in the studio with longtime Black Sabbath drummer Bill Ward, hard at work on Bill's solo album. Still others have revealed that the forty-ish singer had a tumor removed from his ear. Of the tumor rumor, Ozzy scoffs, "It was just a little lump. At my age, you're bound to get a little lumpy." As for the future, he wistfully adds, "I wish to God there was a clone of me so I can watch myself."

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

Dokken: A year of studio work pays off

n the turbulent world of rock & roll, the ability to stay in the public eye, even when you're sequestered in a studio, is critical. Visibility is everything. To most people, anyway. To the members of Dokken, it's practically an afterthought. For the first 10 months of 1987, Jimmy Hoffa maintained a higher profile than George Lynch, Jeff Pilson, "Wild" Mick Brown and Don Dokken.

"After the [Under Lock and Key] tour ended in September last year, we decided to slow things down a bit," offers Wild Mick. "The management didn't want us to go wham, bam and put a record out. Neither did we. We wanted to take our time, think it over and make sure we had some really good stuff first."

Coming on the heels of their first platinum album, the aforementioned *Under Lock and Key*, you'd imagine the band would be anxious to keep the

momentum going, but outside of the single video "Dream Warriors" from *Nightmare on Elm Street III*, the band seemed to have fallen into the San Andreas Fault.

Releasing a single without an album or a tour is a risky proposition especially when the group in question is not known as a singles band. Frontman Don Dokken readily admits this fact, pointing out that the 65-week chart run of *Under Lock and Key* was due primarily to the 10 months the band spent touring last year. "Most bands in our genre tour forever," he explains. "You bludgeon everybody."

So what exactly did the band do in the year since their last tour ended?


"We got tired of L.A., so we moved to Arizona last October," says Mick of himself, George and Jeff. "It was always a hassle, trying to beat the traffic, and we're only an hour away by plane. It's slower paced out here. The weather's better. And besides, we've already screwed every girl in L.A.," he chortles. "Don stayed in L.A. For the most part, Jeff and George spent a lot of time piecing together all of the stuff they'd written on the road...Me, I did a lot of social work," Brown snickers.

After nearly a year of recording with producer Neil Kernon in three different studios, Dokken finally released *Back For the Attack* last October. According to Mick, it boasts a more aggressive sound: "Sorta like *Tooth and Nail*," he claims. "We really got our ya-ya's out on this one." Those yaya's continued when the L.A. quartet hit the road in support of Aerosmith last October 16th.

"It'll be great," Mick promised. "But we're still hoping to headline." After nearly 10 years of being "Everybody's Favorite Opening Act," it's about time.

Def Leppard: Creating hysteria on tour (finally!)

s year after year flew by, and Def Leppard seemed no closer to completing their long-awaited fourth album follow-up to the six-million selling *Pyromania*, a wit somewhere dubbed them "heavy metal's Boston." Vocalist Joe Elliott's friends went one better, suggesting he ought to rename the band Halley's Comet because they appeared about as often...

Well, 1987 wasn't a bad year for Boston (who made their own successful comeback), and it has turned out to be a boom year for the Leps, back in the Top Five with the 63-minutes-long *Hysteria*. With sales of over two million copies in a little more than a month after the LP's August 3rd release, the Sheffield rockers have nothing to apologize for.

The return of Def Leppard is especially welcome in light of the obstacles which Elliott, bassist Rick Savage, drummer Rick Allen, and guitarists Steve Clark and Phil Collen had to overcome. Producer Mutt Lange, whose unmatched attention to detail had helped make *High 'n' Dry* and *Pyromania* best-sellers, was at first unable to work on *Hysteria*. The band tried using replacements, such as Meat Loaf producer Jim Steinman, but found them unsatisfactory.

"One of the things we definitely don't like is wasting time and wasting money," declares Joe, centering on the problems outsiders created. When Lange was finally able to come on board, the producer damaged his knee in an accident; then Joe Elliott caught mumps and couldn't sing.

Most devastating, of course, was Rick Allen's nearly fatal car accident on New Year's Eve, 1984, which cost him his left arm. Yet, as the indomitable skinman points out, "I was back with the band six weeks after my accident, so I never really gave myself a chance to let anything go by the

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wayside." However, he adds strongly, "I will not push me playing drums with one arm, because it just hasn't changed. For the five of us, it's the same as it ever was, just better."

Even as Allen lay in his hospital room, he came up with the concept for the state-of-the-art electronic drum kit that Def Leppard has taken on tour. Consequently, the group believes that their sound on the road, this time out, is flawless, because Allen's suggested modifications have made their drum sound consistent, no matter where they play.

Having survived more than two years of hell on earth, Def Leppard felt justified in taking whatever time they needed to make *Hysteria* the album they wanted it to be. Elliott and Co. couldn't help but be aware of the fact that since the *Pyromania* tour ended in 1984, other bands had come along with

approaches that were, if not outright Leppard clones, still too close for comfort. If the group previously had any idea of coasting on their past successes, the presence of new seekers to the throne knocked that out of them.

"It helps when somebody copies a style that you've set," says Joe. "It gives you a kick up the ass to improve yourself, rather than rely on the same old formula. There are bands where you could pick one song off every album and you wouldn't know where it was from, 'cause they all sound the same. That shakes us up enough that you really make sure you don't come back with something the same." While not abandoning the thrusting drive and anthemic pop vocals that made Pyromania so compelling, the group applied somewhat more texture and polish to Hysteria, making the most of all the technological advances in recording that occurred during the last four years.

In fact, as the band kicked off several months of American road work in Glens Falls, New York on October 1st,

Def Leppard seemed equally excited about the new technical freedoms they had, as they were about greeting audiences from coast to coast. At almost every venue, their stage set would be in the round, with a rotating drum kit. allowing each person to enjoy an unblocked view of the show. Elliott also planned to bring a video camera along and tape at least part of the tour, "so we can see what we're doing wrong." Although the band doesn't expect video to play as important a role this time as MTV did in Pyromania's success, they're not turning away from it, and have completed videos for the first two singles from Hysteria, "Women" and "Animal."

Altogether, Def Leppard believe that, in their case, waiting has been worth it. By holding out until their new record met their demanding standards, Def Leppard have managed to hold their place among rock's superstars. Before *Hysteria* was released, Savage stated that he felt certain it would sell "millions of copies," an opinion which has turned out to be justified. Now, as they take *Hysteria* to the people, Def Leppard similarly have no concern about holding their own onstage.

Says Elliott, "A band and an audience is the same from the ['60s] days when Blue Cheer were gigging. You have an arena or a little club. The kids are there, the lights go off, everybody cheers, and the band comes on. We're a little more experienced now, but it's still the same path."

Megadeth: success with integrity

his was such a good year for us!" exclaims Megadeth bassist Dave Ellefson, and he isn't kidding. A just-about-gold LP (*Peace* Sells...But Who's Buying?, Capitol) and an arena tour with Alice Cooper put the speed metal up-and-comers in the major leagues in 1987. "Going to Japan was great for us, too," Ellefson adds, "being able to play to that many people. And we broke some ground on MTV—we were one of the first bands of this genre to get our video played. We pride ourselves on that."

It was also a year of changes. The end of the *Peace* tour marked the departure of guitarist Chris Poland and drummer Gar Samuelson. "It closed Chapter One of Megadeth," Dave says philosophically. "Nobody likes to make line-up changes, but it had to be done for the band to go in the direction (guitarist/vocalist) Dave [Mustaine] and I had to go in—not musically so much as to keep the band on its feet, keep it rolling. We're workaholics and we bust our asses to make sure things get done, and we won't let anything or anyone stop our momentum."

Appropriately, the Daves got to work on their new, as-yet-untitled LP within weeks of coming off their *Peace* trek. At press time, the new line-up wasn't completely solidified, although the album is almost done. But Ellefson insists this didn't pose a problem in recording. "We were lucky enough to write material on the road, so when we went off tour, we could rehearse for a couple of weeks and go right into the studio," he explains. "It's not like we went in and did it under pressure, halfassed, in spite of a line-up change. We like to be in total control. "Everyone's so *jazzed* about the new album," he adds enthusiastically. The LP will feature an anti-censorship song, "Hook in Mouth," as well as a cut about the perils of drunk driving, "502," and may include a cover of the Sex Pistols' classic, "Anarchy in the U.K." ("Dave Mustaine is the Johnny Rotten of speed metal," Ellefson quips.)

Megadeth also found time to accomodate acclaimed director Penelope Spheeris (who did their "Wake Up Dead" video); the filmmaker shot interview and concert footage for her

upcoming Decline of Western Civilization II: The Metal Years documentary.

All in all, the band's combination of intelligent lyrics and spectacular chops is paying off in a big way. "We've proven to ourselves we can do things the way we want and not conform to make money," Ellefson declares. "We sincerely believe in what we're doing—and it's working."

"Ideas come flying up all the time," says Elletson (r., with Mustaine) of Megadeth's on-the-road songwriting technique.

Metallica defies expectations

etallica not only picked themselves up by their bootstraps in 1987, following the untimely death of bassist Cliff Burton in September 1986, but they also came roaring out of the garage with a killer EP, Garage Days Re-revisited, released in September 1987.

The year began with the band making up the concert dates cancelled in November and December after guitarist James Hetfield broke his wrist in a skateboarding accident. In February, the band scrambled, heading home for a month-long vacation. Roomies Hetfield and drummer Lars Ulrich found themselves unloading the Bay Area house they had been dwelling in for several years, and looking for both a new home and rehearsal space. By March, the group had booked time in an expensive San Francisco rehearsal studio, where they found themselves

with Journey and Starship as neighbors—and were really turned off by the slick atmosphere.

So, the guys came up with a unique concept: why not build a rehearsal "garage" near Lars' house? With hammers in hand (except for James, who broke his arm in March due to yet another skateboarding accident), and newest member Jason Newsted as supervisor, the band built a garage studio in less than two months.

In June, the garage was christened with a jam session of Metallica's favorite—what else?—garage tunes.

ite—what else?—garage tunes. Ulrich and Co. really enjoyed thrashing about on these metal "closet classics" which eventually comprised the EP, recorded in L.A. the first week of July. "We hadn't played together for so long, and in the true Metallica fashion we just started playing all these stupid cover versions, and the more we played some of these cover songs, the more fun it was to play them," Lars explains. "It seemed like a cool thing to do...to initiate the garage by doing all these covers, to get back into the habit of playing together."

The EP, which quickly burst into *Billboard*'s Top 30, was first released in Europe to coincide with some festival gigs there, including the Monsters of Rock Festival in Donnington and dates with Deep Purple in Germany. Lars, however, wants all fans to know that the EP should be taken with a grain of salt. The "real" Metallica (as opposed to the "garage" Metallica, selfdubbed the Metallikatz) are now working up new material for their upcoming LP, tentatively set for release in May.

At press time, Lars revealed that "the band is getting cracking on the new material and finding a good studio. Of course, after the album comes out, we'll take on another 11-year tour!"

As for the speculation that the band will be headlining arenas on their '88



For Poison, a year of triumph

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ineteen-eighty seven started out on a somewhat depressing note for Bret Michaels. C.C. DeVille, Bobby Dall, Rikki Rockett and the entire Poison organization. The debut album (Look What the Cat Dragged In) that everyone had held such high hopes for had been steadily falling off the Billboard charts after its October peak at a paltry 110. "Cry Tough," the first single-which was a show-stopper when the band was the #1 club draw in L.A.—hadn't even cracked the Top 100. Plans were already being drawn up to have the band return to the studio by late spring.

And then a miracle happened. The first week of January saw the album do an about face. From its nadir at 191, *the Cat* leaped 22 notches up the charts, primarily due to the advance buzz on the next single, "Talk Dirty to Me."

"The way we saw it," speculates frontman Bret Michaels, "we were the



first band to be handled by both Capitol and Enigma, and nobody was really sure who was supposed to be doing what. The [album] was released in June, but it took them six months to iron it all out."

Just as *the Cat* showed signs of having nine lives, Poison was hit with Miracle #2; L.A. rock brethren Ratt had requested that they fill the opening slot for a week on their American tour. One week became two; two became a month, which eventually turned into the entire leg. By the time "Talk Dirty" slammed into the charts in mid-March, the openers were attracting almost as many fans as the headliners.


With the album striking platinum and finding an extensive residency in the Top 10, one would have imagined that friction between the two L.A. bands would have been just a guitar solo away. Bret dismisses the thought with a wave of his gloved hand.

"Naaa," he chuckles, "Ratt are great. We have no complaints at all. We even partied together, we went to the Hagler/Leonard fight together. They were always in our dressing room...we both knew we weren't there to compete

with 'em or blow them off the stage. We were there to open for them."

Drummer Rikki Rockett chimes in, "There's a difference between a rock & roll attitude and a bad attitude, and there are no bad attitudes here. Bad attitudes are un-rock & roll, but you'd be surprised at how many there are in this business. But you go down the same steps you go up, ya know?"

As Look What the Cat Dragged In breached the double platinum barrier late last spring, Poison received word that they'd be included on the bill at the Tenth Annual Texxas World Music Festival. Suddenly the four selfproclaimed "misfits" had found a place where they fit in. Yet they accepted their new-found celebrity status with some reservations.

"There are a million examples of people loving a band when they're an underdog, but when they get rich and famous, they turn into assholes," cautions Rockett. "Then people don't like


'em anymore. We want to make sure that doesn't happen to us. We don't want to end up screwing ourselves."

When the Ratt tour wound down last June, Poison scattered for a brief respite, each purchasing their own residences (Rikki and Bobby opted for a joint venture) in varying locations throughout the L.A. area. After an MTV-sponsored Hawaiian vacation (with rap trio the Fat Boys), the band returned to the studio in September with producer extraordinaire Tom Werman (Motley Crue, Ted Nugent, Cheap Trick) to begin work on their follow-up LP. Tentatively titled *Swallow This One*, the new album should be out by early spring.

When asked what the world can expect, C.C. DeVille responds cryptically, "an album of all-purpose convertible rock & roll.

"We have to go out there and face the next hurdle," he concludes. "We don't want to be remembered as one-hit wonders, so we'll just go in there and concentrate on doing what we do best—making music."

here's more to touring than just playing music. When I first started in this business, I just

wanted to play," states Ratt's wiry guitarist Warren DeMartini.

"But when you start to figure out all the bullshit that goes with this business, what keeps you motivated when you get discouraged, when you get caught against a wall somewhere, it's that you just really like playing."

It's a good thing that Warren's bandmates agree with his sentiments, because 1987 was a true mixed bag for the L.A. rodents. With the late 1986 release of their fourth slab of vinyl, *Dancing Undercover*, Ratt proved their consistency in churning out an album a year and surviving the dreaded follow-up slump. But unlike their previous platters, *Dancing Undercover* reached its platinum-plus pinnacle without a hit single; "Dance" never even neared the *Billboard* chart's Top 20.

Although it's hard to speculate, the album's three video clips ("Dance," "Body Talk" and "Slip of the Lip") and Ratt's heavier, harder-edged sound were likely instrumental in winning over the hearts of rock fans. The band's appearance—via their "Body Talk" video—in Eddie Murphy's hit movie, *The Golden Child*, probably didn't hurt, either.

The L.A. quintet also found themselves on a grueling nine-month pilgrimage to the nation's arenas. By late spring, the road-weary group were forced to take a brief break in their schedule to rejuvenate themselves before embarking on the second leg of their mammoth tour. Yet, with their opening act, Poison, threatening to eclipse them with their new-found popularity, Ratt seemed oblivious to any pressure. "There's no Poison that can kill Ratt," swarthy singer Stephen Pearcy quipped.

By the time they wrapped up their mega-watt, mega-lights, mega sweat 'n raunch roadshow at a German festival, Ratt were ripe for a vacation. The Fiji islands and other exotic ports of call beckoned, but the lure didn't prevent the hard-working rockers from plotting their next album. "It's hard for me to speculate on exactly what it's gonna sound like," DeMartini says of *Dancing Undercover*'s follow-up, "but I can say, as always, it's gonna sound different than the last record. Music is based on moods and I like changes."

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Another 'Crazy' year begins for Kiss

ineteen eighty-seven started off as a slow one for Kissall four members got January off as an extended Christmas break-but as February rolled around, Paul Stanley, Gene Simmons, Eric Carr and Bruce Kulick found themselves deep in rehearsals for their 22nd LP, Crazy Nights (originally titled Who Dares Wins). The K-Men worked on the LP from March through early July at Rumbo Recorders and Can-Am Studios in Los Angeles, and began a huge onslaught of press interviews both here and abroad in mid-July. (Gene and Paul flew to Europe in August for a whirlwind 10-city press tour, and Stanley took time out to join Bon Jovi onstage at the Monsters of Rock Festival in England on August 22nd.)

The press not only quizzed the two head Kiss men on the new LP, released in late September, but about the *Kiss Exposed* home video, released in May and still Top 10 on the *Billboard* music video chart at press time. A real treat for die-hard fans, the video shows the guys at their behind-the-scenes naughtiest—and onstage best. Not surprisingly, it officially became platinum in early July.

The long-awaited Crazy Nights tour began on November 3rd in Pensacola, Florida, after a month of rehearsals. The group had not appeared on an American stage since April Fool's Day 1986—barring some surprise appearances by Paul with Bon Jovi at the Jersey Meadowlands and with Poison at the Texxas Jam—and Stanley and Co. were itching to get back on the road. The new show, including stage attire and pyrotechnics, was kept closely under wraps until its premiere.

What makes this tour different from the 15 or more they've done since they first made "Kisstory" 14 years ago? Paul explains that, as time goes on, Kiss gets a more eclectic crowd. "I think our audience is a real mixture of our old and new fans. I can't tell you the average age of one of our fans



Europe: From Swedish sensation to American phenomenon

n May 1986, Epic Records released the second U.S. album by a young Swedish quintet known as Europe. Initial airplay was unimpressive and American rock fans seemed disinterested when, a few months later, original guitarist John Norum left the band and was replaced by fellow countryman Kee Marcello. The fact that *The Final Countdown* was produced by Kevin Elson, who had supervised Journey's multi-platinum *Frontiers*, just didn't seem to matter.

No one in the States cared much that singer/songwriter Joey Tempest, bassist John Leven, keyboardist Mic Michaeli, drummer Ian Haugland and Marcello had scored a #1 single in 14 countries, including England, France, Sweden, Finland, Switzerland, West Germany, Belgium and the Netherlands. Europe's Top 10 album status in much of the Old World was equally irrelevant with Bon Jovi mania sweeping the nation.

But, with shoppers in the midst of another Christmas buying spree, a funny thing happened. MTV began airing Tempest and Co.'s video of the album's title track. And slowly, but surely, Americans began rocking to Europe's one-two combination of hooks and looks. As New Year's Eve revelers were recuperating from their hangovers, the band was quietly creeping to #70 on *Billboard*'s top-selling album chart. Meanwhile, tickets for the band's European concert tour were becoming as hard to obtain as those for Bon Jovi's hometown metropolitan area shows.

By the second week of March, Europe had arrived as a full-fledged phenomenon on these shores. *The Final Countdown* had cracked the gold barrier (500,000 sales) and broken the Top 10 on the album charts. The band's pulsating pop-metal title track was dominating radio waves coast-to-coast and inside the Top 20 on the singles charts. Plans were announced for the band's first Stateside concert tour; breaking with convention, the Swedish sensation chose to headline large theatres without the benefit of a support act.

Even before Tempest and Co. had set

foot in the U.S., questions were being raised: Were the band just another pretty face? Could they cut it live or was their success a fluke of European faddishness?

Their April 15 North American debut at San Francisco's Warfield Theatre silenced many of their critics. Europe unveiled a finely honed show, equal parts technique, good timing and sex appeal. And they had the confidence to break one of rock's Ten

Commandments-never start your show with your big hit.

What many people hadn't realized was that Europe were actually a veteran act, with three successful European LPs under their belt. The band's nucleus (Tempest, Leven and Norum) first began jamming for fun after school in 1982. "Seems like journalists worry about [the teen idol stuff] more than we do," Leven said earlier this year. "It's important to be taken seriously," added Tempest, "but I usually

say, if a girl has a poster on the wall, when she looks at the poster she probably has the music on. If you play lousy music, the poster is not on the wall. We know we're taking it seriously. I take songwriting very seriously."

Certainly guitarist Marcello has impeccable musical credentials; he produced and helped arrange his country's anti-famine "Metal-Aid" anthem-a tune co-written by Joey Tempesteven before joining the band. And in his painstaking transposition of Rimsky-Korsakov's "Flight of the Bumblebee" from classical violin to guitar, he gave Europe's fans a show-stopping display of six string prowess.

"We don't worry about anything," the guitarist said casually, "we're just playing." Added a confident Tempest at his third U.S. show in Seattle, "We do the same show that we do in Europe and the crowds here are reacting really positively to it."

That positive reaction continued to snowball; "The Final Countdown" ultimately peaked out at #8 in March and, following in its wake, the LP went platinum in April. "Rock the Night" was released as a second single on


April 28 and also achieved Top 30 status

October saw the band's third 45. "Carrie," a rock ballad co-written by Michaeli and Tempest, the third hottest single in the land; its success propelled The Final Countdown back into the Top 20 again. A fourth single, "Cherokee," was being readied for release by the Old World rockers at press time, as the LP was approaching triple platinum.

By the time Europe's awesome achievements are added up by the statisticians, it will make mathematically certain what rock fans already know: There were three runaway success stories on the hard rock scene this year-Bon Jovi, Whitesnake and Europe. As Circus Magazine went to press, the sexy Scandinavians planned to return to the studio this month and stay there well into 1988 working on their follow-up.

But Europe almost became onealbum wonders in mid-October. As Tempest and Co. were shooting a video of "Cherokee" in Almeria, Spain, their set caught on fire. It was a serious accident; an Epic Records spokesperson claimed the band narrowly escaped death. Although the group was uninjured, several cameras were destroyed.

Kinda reminds you of what Europe did to the American charts in 1987.



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

Dokken: Just got lucky?

Los Angeles may seem like a neat place to live, with its beaches, palm trees and mellow weather, but literally hundreds of the town's most talented musicians have discovered that it can be a hard city to survive in. **Don Dokken**'s situation was far from unusual—for a while, he lived in the attic above a rock & roll club—with no windows, kitchen, shower, TV or phone. And he had to share this hellhole with his road crew and a dog!

It's because of such severe economic pressures, including gigs where the group actually has to pay the club owner in order to play, that the Los Angeles scene has been peppered with breakups and reformations. At one time, **Dokken's** floating membership included **Juan Croucier** and **Warren DeMartini** of **Ratt**, as well as **Quiet Riot's Frankie Banali**. Don himself tried to help the guys in **Great** White by producing some of their early demo tapes. Only now, five years later, have they been able to make a breakthrough.

A veteran like Don knows a lot of equally talented performers who didn't make it through the hard times. "I can think of five people off the top of my head that were so awesome, and they're working upholstering car seats, because after eight years of suffering, they said, 'enough is enough.' They just didn't make it."

Metallica's rocking holiday season

With Christmas season here, **Metallica** have decided to offer two special holiday packages to their fans. First up is a re-release, on the band's current label, Elektra, of their very first album, *Kill 'Em All*, which was originally issued on Megaforce. The Elektra pressing will include the original inner sleeve with lyrics, which was first released in very limited quantities.

This version of *Kill 'Em All* will be even longer and hotter than the original, thanks to the inclusion of covers of "Am I Evil?" and "Blitzkrieg," which were formerly B-sides available only on the European single of "Creeping Death." Those tracks were recorded just after *Ride the Lightning* was released in the spring of 1984.

Late December will also see the release of Metallica's first ever home video, appropriately titled *The \$19.98 H.V.* The tape has a tentative subtitle of "Cliff 'Em All," since all the material included features the work of original bassist **Cliff Burton**, who was tragically killed in a bus accident last year. The video includes material from the *Kill 'Em All* days, and features over a half dozen European and American concerts, with footage from TV shows and clips shot by fans.

Motley's "Crue-cified" cover tunes


Some bands shy away from playing or recording other people's material, but Motley Crue has always spiced their set with a well-chosen cover version or two. The band's enjoyment of covers goes back to their earliest days when their repertoire included the Beatles' "Paperback Writer" and 'Tonight" by the Raspberries. Since that time, of course, the Crue have recorded additional favorites on their last three LPs: "Helter Skelter" on Shout at the Devil, "Smokin' in the Boys Room" on Theatre of Pain, and most recently, "Jailhouse Rock" on Girls, Girls, Girls.

The decision to work with covers wasn't at all calculated, as drummer **Tommy Lee** explains. "We'll be doing a sound check, and we'll jam on old tunes. And we'll say, 'That sounds cool.' The only reason we wouldn't do a cover song on a record is if we quit jamming. We play a lot of other bands' stuff. It's fun."

David Coverdale's lessons in hit making

David Coverdale has been around long enough to know what a hit single sounds like...but that doesn't mean the **Whitesnake** leader knows it's a hit when he writes the tune. That's been the case with several of his most successful numbers, including his #1 smash, "Here I Go Again."

"I've never been a conscious 'singles writer,'" Coverdale maintains.

"I leave it up to the record company to pull their hair out-which one should be this, which one should be that. The whole purpose behind releasing 'Still of the Night' first was just to re-establish or reaffirm that I hadn't lost the balls or the bite after a long period of time.

"Initially, [European record companies] wanted to put out 'Is This Love' as the first single there, which would have killed me in the rock & roll sense." Instead, that bluesy ballad was issued as the second single, and became a big hit, but only after Coverdale had diverted it away from his original purpose.

"I was asked by Capitol to come up with anything for Sheena Easton or Tina Turner. They knew I was going away for a writing spree. How I put everything together is, I get ideas throughout the year and when I'm going to settle down for the project, I get away for six weeks or two months to some obscure part of the world to correlate all the bits and pieces. And that idea was for Tina, but it just got a little too good," the singer laughs.

And that's not the first time David changed plans. "Many years ago I wrote a tune for B.B. King when he was working with the Crusaders. And when I cut the demo of the song, I decided to keep it. That became the first Top 40 hit I had worldwide, 'Fool for Your Loving." 0

Stars' Instruments: **Dokken's Mick Brown attacks**

"I SAW THE BEATLES ON THE Ed Sullivan Show when I was about seven," recalls Dokken's time-piece "Wild" Mick Brown, "and that was it. I was hooked on the rock & roll and the drums. Still, it took me two years before I could get around to taking lessons."

By the time he was ten, the lessons had paid off; Brown joined his first band. "We were called The Reason Why," he moans sarcastically.


Brown eventually gravitated to the northern part of California, but left "as soon as I discovered there was nobody worth playing with there at the time." But before he split, he hooked up with guitarist George Lynch and the two relocated to L.A. together, where, over the course of the next ten years, they hacked their way through a series of club bands before striking pay dirt in the form of Don Dokken.

"Don enjoyed some of the sonas George and I had written," he recollects, "and he took them with him to Germany. The next thing I knew, he called us up and said he had a recording contract."

Dokken's come a long way since then. On their current tour with Aerosmith in support of Back for the Attack, Brown is bashing away on a customized Tama Superstar kit. Refurbished by the Percussion Center at Fort Wayne, Indiana, it consists of two 24" × 28" bass drums, a 14" × 161/2" brass shell snare (or on occasion, an 81/2" × 14" wood or chrome shell snare), 12" and 13" rack toms and 16" and 18" floor toms. He uses Tama's Power Tower rack system. For cymbals, Brown is endorsing Sabian: he's using a 20" ride, two 20" Chinas, an 18" China, two 18" rocktagons, a 20" crash and a 40" Sabian gong.

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Drum Beat

WHITESNAKE HAVE FINALLY MADE

a name for themselves in the United States. The drummer on the breakthrough *Whitesnake* album was Aynsley Dunbar; on the road, Tommy Aldridge has taken over the skins. This month, let's look at what Dunbar/ Aldridge play on the track "All Your Love Tonight."

This song has a shuffle beat, which means it is based on notes called "dotted 8ths and 16ths" (\int , \int , \int). They are counted 1 <u>e & A</u> (leave out the e &, but count it anyway) or 1 A 1 A 2 A.

"All Your Love Tonight" begins with cymbal crashes hit in conjunction with the bass drum on the "A of 3," on the "A of 4" and the "4 A" of the second bar. Then the snare comes in on the "2 A" of the second bar of the intro. The entire bar is repeated once, followed by a one bar rest, which is then followed by a triplet fill which leads to the verse. The fill is executed on the snare and it increases in volume and intensity as it makes the end of the bar (see Exercise I).

The verse groove has dotted 8ths and 16ths on the twin bass drums with the count on "1" on bass drum #2 and count of "1 A" on bass drum #1, etc. The whole bass drum phrase is counted "1 A 2 A 3 A 4 A" with a "2 and 4" on the snare and quarter notes on a closed hi-hat (see Exercise II).

The song is filled with many good parts, but one which is worthy of closer scrutiny is the fill before the solo, which consists of triplets between the #1 bass drum and the snare with flams on it. The count is "1 & A 2 & A 3 & A 4 & A." Be sure and look at Exercise III carefully to see how the triplet starts and finishes. Also, play these examples slowly at first and then worry about building speed. After the fill, go on to triplets between the two bass drums, starting on bass drum #1 and

Warm-up techniques

THIS MONTH'S GUITAR CLINIC IS somewhat different from any others to date. This time around, we're going to discuss the importance of warm-up exercises.

We can't overstress the importance of warming up before you start blasting out 100 mph runs and licks. A loosening up period is essential, especially in the colder months of the year. Professional athletes always run through warm up routines before pushing themselves to the limit; you should, too. Be aware that neglecting to warm up is risking certain muscle or tendon damage in your hands that could put you out of action for some time-if not for good. The Swedish guitar virtuoso Yngwie Malmsteen suffered from tendonitis recently, and he informed us that he believes it was due to his neglecting to warm up sufficiently before attempting to break the sound barrier.

Below are three warm-up exercises; Exercise I is a chromatic type routine that will also give your picking hand a good work out. Try to use a metronome to ensure that your timing is accurate. If you play it properly (from the open position to the 12th position and back again), you'll pick no less than 600 notes!

Exercise II is for your fretboard hand. If you do it correctly you won't move from the 5th position at any time. Due to lack of space (as was the case with the previous exercise), I've only given you a bit of the routine-I'll explain the rest in writing, as it's very straightforward. You do the hammer-on/pull-off pattern between fingers one and two, as shown. You do the same between fingers one and three, then one and four; then two and three, then two and four and finally between three and four. Your fretboard hand should get pretty tired, especially if you've never tried anything like this

Exercise III is similar to the first, except this time you only play three notes per string. If you concentrate on employing alternate picking as indicated, then this exercise will greatly



improve your plectrum control and dexterity as well as warming your hands up.

A guide to guitars under \$650

IT'S THAT TIME OF YEAR

again! That joyous season where parents, friends and loved ones descend on your local department stores like locusts on a corn field and strip the shelves bare, providing you with every gift imaginable—usually none of which you really want. But, if you happen to want a guitar this year, you're in luck. The beginner's models are cheaper than ever, and due to advances in electronics and construction, they've never sounded better.

What follows is a brief guide to some of the most recent models which list for under \$650. While this selection is by no means comprehensive, it will serve as an introduction to a handful of the more popular models available. All specifications are provided by the manufacturer and are not the results of testing by Circus Magazine. Unless specified, all prices given are manufacturer's suggested list, which means you can do a lot better if you shop around.

CARVIN

Carvin's mail-order only business has really been thriving over the past

few years, and with recent additions like the DC200TI, it's no surprise why. The DC200TI is a twin-humbucker model which features a glued-on Eastern hardrock maple neck contoured into a body manufactured from the same wood. The hardware is all triple chrome-plated and the electronics have stereo compatibility. The DC200TI comes with a Pro Kahler tremolo and block inlays. If you could purchase the DC200TI from a store, it would run you approximately \$1,199; however, directly from Carvin, it lists for only \$599. For more information, contact Carvin, 1155 Industrial Ave., Escondido, CA 92025.

CHARVEL

For the serious guitarist on a limited budget, Charvel has two great alternatives: the Model 1 and Model 1A. The Model 1 is a single-humbucker guitar with a solid basswood body, a rock maple neck and quarter-sawn maple fingerboard with a three spring tremolo system. The humbucker is a powerful Jackson J-90C ultra-high output distortion class double coil. It retails for \$399.95.

The Model 1A is identical, except it features three Jackson J-100 single-coil pickups, coupled with a five-way switch and one volume and one tone control, mounted on a pickguard. It caries a suggested list price of \$449.95.

CORT

Cort's forte lies in designing innovative beginner's models, and their latest addition comes in the form of the Space SEG3T headless guitar. With a tremolo which has been licensed by Steinberger, the Space SEG3T features three EMG designed

pickups (one humbucker, two single coils), neck-through-the-body construction, a Fibonol fingerboard. three mini-toggle switches, and one volume and one tone control. It lists for \$419.95.

EVETS

The new kids on the block, the Evets Corporation are distributing B.C. Rich's Platinum Series which feature the neo-classic Warlock, Ironbird and ST designs, all with list prices of under \$500 each. The Platinums feature B.C. Rich fine tuneable tremolos, black chrome hardware, maple necks with jumbo frets, varying pickup configurations and pickup selectors with coil tap switches. To find out more about this unique series, contact B.C. Marketing, P.O. Box 2769, Laguna Hills, CA 92654.

FENDER

The manufacturer of last year's best-selling axe, the Fender Standard Stratocaster, has spawned yet another variation on the theme-the Squier Standard.

The Standard features three single-coil Fender pickups with even pole piece heights to give better tonal balance. It's equipped with a five-position toggle switch, master volume, two tone controls and a System I locking tremolo unit. The Fender Squier Standard carries a \$369.99 suggested retail price tag.

HONDO

Hondo has built its reputation around its many cost effective beginner's models, and one of its newest is the HK 7601.

Featuring a single high-output humbucker in the bridge position and a single volume control, the HK 7601 comes with a rock maple neck, a rosewood fingerboard and a Floyd Rose-licensed HK tremolo system. It retails for \$339.95.

IBANEZ

One of Ibanez's more popular additions to their line of introductory models is the RG120. It features a contoured basswood body and neck with a rosewood fingerboard, two humbucking pickups with two Duo-sound switches, a three-way pickup selector switch, a single volume and single tone control, a Powerocker tremolo and chrome hardware. It retails for \$299.

KAMAN

While more famous for their world renown acoustic guitars, Kaman Music

Corporation has recently introduced a full line of economically priced solid body electric models.

Classically styled, these three-pickup models (two single, one humbucker or three single coil) all feature locking nut and tuneable tremolos: rosewood fingerboard models feature black hardware. All are available in red, black or white. The AM18T (with a maple fingerboard) lists for \$199.50, while the rosewood model (the AR19T) lists for \$239.50.


KRAMER

Kramer's Striker Series guitars were designed with the beginner in mind. The Striker 100ST was actually styled after the Eddie Van Halen-designed American Baretta. It features chrome hardware, a Floyd Rose tremolo II with fine tuners and a locking nut, a rosewood fretboard, a single humbucker and a single volume control. It retails for \$319.

PEAVEY

Two of Peavey's recent additions to their line of quality guitars with list prices under \$650 are the Nitro II and the Nitro III.

The Nitro II features a 22-fret rosewood fingerboard, twin exposed-coil humbucking pickups and a heavy duty three-position toggle

pickup selector switch. It also features an unusual "harmonic" placement of the rhythm pickup; rather than the standard location, the rhythm pickup is closer to the middle, resulting in less muddiness. It lists for \$534.50.



Kaman's AMI8T

The Nitro III features two single coils and a single humbucker, in addition to three individual pickup selector switches, a control on/off function for the single coils and an on/off/coil split for the humbucker. It lists for \$584.50.

B.C. RICH

B.C. Rich offers an entire line—the NJ Series—which retails for a scant \$499. Included in the NJ Series are the Bich, Ironbird, Mockingbird, ST and Warlock guitars. Featuring bolt-on necks, Kahler Flyer tremolos and varying pickup configurations, the NJ Series is available in black and "arrest me" red. For an additional \$20, color options include ultra violet, metallic red or glitter rock white. All models are assembled, inspected and tested in the U.S.

SUZUKI

Suzuki introduces the first low-cost guitar for people who can't play: the Synthia. An electronic guitar with manual or automatic play functions, the Synthia also offers a comprehensive selection of drum and walking bass patterns. The guitar offers 84 preset chords played by touching a single fret on the stringless neck. It has six voices (electric guitar, acoustic guitar, brass, synth, Vibes I and Vibes II) and it carries a retail price tag of only \$250.

WASHBURN

For the aspiring axist who wants the playability of an electric and the amplified sound of a flat top acoustic, Washburn has introduced the SBT-21.

Offering a slim, rock maple neck with a rosewood fingerboard, the SBT-21's mahogany body has been computer routed in the precise areas needed to enhance the acoustic properties of the instrument. The electronics have been designed with master volume, master tone and an exclusive midrange "fat" control to increase the presence of the instrument. The SBT-21 lists for \$429.

Test Reports: Zildjian's Special Effects Series

* * * * *

ZILDJIAN'S SPECIAL EFFECTS Series offers a range of percussive punctuation options for drummers. The

cymbal configurations are 8", 10" and 12"; they all share a tight, high-pitched splash and a consistency of sound throughout the diameter, with a sharper-edged sound closer to the bell. Changing the type of stick and the angle of attack provided some degree of variety.

The cymbals produced a combination of long vibrations after the hit and a preponderance of high-end overtones that cut well but lacked warmth and roundness in a studio environment. These drawbacks were less noticeable in live applications, where the cymbals' brassy, high-pitched edge proved an asset in high decibel environments.

Zildjian's new Z China Boy inverted splash cymbal comes in 18" and 20" sizes, and has a couple of new design twists that make it markedly superior. The Z China Boy has a swooping leading edge and a squared off bell top, which result in a sharp, very loud crash with excellent sound. The computer-hammered cymbal has plenty of top end and crispness. Its kinetic energy storage capacity was abundant yet consistent, providing a controlled sustain and a nice, even declining slope of ring after the hit. In studio applications, keeping the microphone placement pattern a bit further away than usual achieves a better result because of the volume the Z China Boy generates

The 8", 10" and 12" Special Effects cymbals are list priced at \$77, \$92 and \$107, respectively. The Z China Boy lists for \$236 in the 18" version and \$265 for the 20". We award Zildjian four-and-a-half stars for a fine outing.

Pearl's CX-900 Series and the Wild 900 Series

* * * * *

PEARL AUGMENTS TWO NEW lines of cymbals: the top of the line CX-900 Series and the Wild 900 series. Both are designed to provide flexibility for drummers with an array of playing styles.

The CX-900 group features traditional cymbal design. We took an assortment of the 20-cymbal collection into the studio and onstage, and the overall results were impressive. The pitted 18" heavy crash produces a nice initial blast, before decaying evenly with minimal overtones. Equally bombastic is the 16" medium crash. which has some colorful overtones that nonetheless didn't interfere with overall kit timbre. It doubled nicely as a quick splash cymbal for fast hand grabs. The thin crash (16") cut nicely and also made for great splashes. (8", 10" and 12" splashes are available.)

In contrast, the tonal variations within the Wild 900 series fall into a narrower band. However, the express purpose of this line is to cut through, and they do that with a vengeance. Most of the cymbals in the series are pitted in a widening pattern out from the center. We're not sure about the applicable laws of physics, but the results are cymbals that are explosive in sound. The overtones are in there, but getting to them required a heavier hand than the CX-900 series. While it's a good studio assortment, the Wild 900 series shines on stage, especially in

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situations where there aren't enough microphones to properly mike the kit. There's plenty of kinetics in the series to ensure you'll be heard.

The CX-900 series rides range from \$165 to \$230. The crash types cost from \$130 to \$200. The hats, in medium and heavy, go for \$105. Splashes and China types are priced between \$80 and \$230. All prices are list. We award them five stars.

Sabian's HH Control Series

$\star \star \star \star \star$

SABIAN CONTINUES TO EXPAND its line of cymbals, adding several new crashes and rides to its HH Control Series. The crashes come in 12", 13", 14", 15" and 16" versions, with an 18" crash/ride edition and 20" and 22" rides. Ride cymbals with higher bell sizes are also available in 18", 20" and 22" sizes.

Three cymbals by Sabian drew special mention by our testers. In the same HH series, the HH Leopard Ride cymbal delivered the best and loudest crashes in our tests. The 22" (also available in 20") cymbal is guite heavy, which gave it plenty of volume, and its pitted, unlathed texture produced a clear, penetrating and very non-resonant ping. No matter how hard you hit it, there were virtually no overtones. Its easy slope gave it a pleasant pitch. Be advised that the HH Leopard Ride is not a subtle cymbal; but while its applications are more suited to louder stuff, the right touch can draw some interesting effects out of it.

Sabian's 18" Fast Chinese is a thin, high-profile cymbal with an oversized bell and upturned edge. Its rapid decay makes it useful for quick, punchy accents.

The Rocktagon is Sabian's heaviest crash cymbal, cut into an octagonal shape. The eight-sided cymbal is laden with overtones—not the cymbal of choice for weddings and bar mitzvahs. But if you need a cymbal that can cut well and double as a Chinese-type effect splash, the Rocktagon is for you. It comes in 16" and 18" sizes.

Sabian's Leopard Ride lists for \$255 for the 20" and \$302 for the 22" version. The Fast Chinese goes for \$165, and the Rocktagon ranges from \$139 to \$189 for the 16", 18" and 20" sizes. We award them five stars.

Paiste's Series 3000

* * * * *

JUST IN TIME FOR CHRISTMAS, Paiste offers a new line of cymbals whose sonic characteristics should warm the hearts of metal lovers. The new Series 3000 line includes a 22" Power Ride cymbal, an 18" thin crash, an 18" Power Crash, a 20" Novo China-type inverted crash cymbal and a pair of 14" hi-hat cymbals, the Sound Edge 3000.

The two clear stars of this group are the thin crash and the Novo China-type cymbals. The thin crash develops one of the best mid-to-high-pitch rings we've heard in a long time. It cuts with the best of them, cleanly and briskly. The Novo China-type adds a couple of new twists to inverted cymbal design: a higher bell height which gives the cymbal a more intense slope, and an inverted edge which turns downward rather than up. The result is an extremely loud cymbal that can cut through any wall of sound. It's brassy and bombastic, with perhaps the best volume characteristics of any cymbal of its type on the market.


The Sound Edge 3000 hi-hat cymbals incorporate a swiveled edge on the lower cymbal. This adventurous design provides a consistent air escape and made the "chip" sound extremely bright and cutting when operated by pedal.

Paiste's Power Ride carried the stick impression well, and the bell provided a clear, rich ring. However, the cymbals sustained too much and too long for ride patterns when ridden on the edge. Hitting it closer to the bell produced better sonic characteristics.

Also falling a bit short of expectations was the Power Crash, with too many overtones still ringing long after the initial sustained wash was gone. This was particularly noticeable in the studio. The crash did improve with extremely hard attacks, making this cymbal a better bet for live applications.

Overall, the new Paiste line is an excellent offering and priced right, too. The Power Ride lists at \$275, the thin crash at \$200, the Power Crash at \$200, the Sound Edge 3000 hi-hats at \$370, and the Novo China-type at \$310. We give the collection four-and-a-half stars.



Alice Cooper fights back Kiss rocket back with their best



If you thought Alice Cooper came back with last year's 'Constrictor,' guess again; his current 'Raise Your Fist and' Yell' is his best in years.

Alice Cooper/Raise Your Fist and Yell (MCA)

Alice Cooper barnstorms his way through ten anthemic rockers that hearken all the way back to his classic *Billion Dollar Babies* days. Like Aerosmith, Alice has improved upon his comeback LP. Producer Michael Wagener has given the sound a harder edge than on their previous collaboration.

From the opener (and first single) "Freedom" — a diatribe against the new right — through hell-raisers like "Give the Radio Back" and "Chop, Chop, Chop," each cut stands on its own and sounds as if it were written with either the arena or video screen in mind. There are no obvious hit singles on *Raise*, but the stage is where Cooper rules, so catch his world tour which rumbles through the South- and Midwest this month.

The Great Kat/Worship Me or Die (Roadrunner)

The self-proclaimed "Goddess of Metal" just might be the hottest unknown guitar player in the business, male or female. Zipping through 100 mph solos, her brand of hyperspeed thrash is infinitely more accessible than most of her competition. Unfortunately, as far as vocals are concerned, the world only needs one Wendy O. Williams.

Kiss/Crazy Nights (Mercury)

The hottest band in the world rockets back with what just might be

their finest hour (OK, 43 minutes). More commercial than anything they've recorded since *Destroyer*, *Crazy Nights* features Kiss' first encounter with the synthesizer, more blistering fretwork by Bruce Kulick than on last year's *Asylum*, and hooks so fat that they'd get Helen Keller to headbang.

The first single, "Crazy, Crazy Nights," is probably the catchiest thing Kiss have ever recorded, but don't overlook "Bang Bang You," "Hell or High Water" or the quasi-ballad "Reason to Live." With a tour (which steamrolls through the mid west this month), look for Kiss to return to the top in a big way in '88.

Leatherwolf/(Island)

L.A. quintet debuts with their own brand of "cinema metal," comprised of one part "optimistic rock" à la Stryper,

Leatherwolf might be easy to dismiss as a generic hard rock band if not for solid tracks like "The Calling," "Cry Out" and "Rule the Night" and their three guitar attack. Given a chance to develop a more distinctive style, Leatherwolf could progress into something special.

Loverboy/Wildside (Columbia)

Commercial hard pop rock that's got platinum written all over it. The lead-off single, "Notorious," was co-written by Jon Bon Jovi and Richie Sambora, and just might be the best thing these Canadians have ever recorded. While the rest of *Wildside* doesn't match their peak, it is just strong enough to ensure airplay well into the spring.

Ramones/Halfway to Sanity (Sire)

New York's favorite punks balance hardcore ("Weasel Face"), pop ("Go Lil Camaro, Go," featuring Blondie's Debbie Harry) and metal ("Death of

Me"), but still lack the hit single that'll break 'em through to the masses. Still in all, one of the better releases of the season.

Rush/Hold Your Fire (Mercury)

For people who think that Rush



combines the pomposity of early Yes with all the negative aspects of bad metal, hold on to your hairpiece.

Hold Your Fire is their most commercial release to date (which means not really). Aimee Mann's ('til Tuesday's vocalist) guest spot on "Time Stand Still" might provide the band with the Top 20 hit single they've never had, but for those of you who long for vintage Rush & Roll, go straight for "Force Ten," "Second Nature" or "High Water." Stay tuned for a tour early next year.

Shok Paris/Steel and Starlight (IRS)

Cleveland-based quintet's debut boasts a crisp production and some appropriately gritty vocals by frontman Vic Hix. Unfortunately, their brand of speedy (but not speed) metal lacks that one hit single which could provide crossover success. With MTV rejecting metal (again) and radio being sure to play follow the leader, there's a good possibility that this one could be overlooked by the headbanging faithful.

Sword/Metallized (Combat)

A Canadian quartet with more firepower than the entire U.S. Persian Gulf fleet. Heavier than your average hard rockers but not quite thrash, this is one band that shouldn't remain on an indy label for long. Start out with "FTW" and go directly to "Children of Heaven." If you aren't hooked by the time you reach "Stoned Again," maybe you should stick with linear algebra instead of rock & roll.



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


