

exas has always been a honkytonk hot bed. Is it surprising that Atlantic's new hatted hero, Tracy Lawrence, hails from Atlanta, Texas, part of the same 100-mile area from which labelmates Neal McCoy and Martin

Delray ventured forth? Is it surprising that Tracy's soothing baritone is rich with the Texas tradition of George Jones and etched with the stylings of his modern mentor from Kentucky, the late Keith Whitley? Not really.

"This album is country, from start to finish," Lawrence smiles. "There's no mistaking that. There's some swing, a few ballads, a little humor, all of which makes for a well-rounded first album

Tracy was in Nashville only 7 months before he got his deal at Atlantic and, though only 23 years old, he has become as knowledgeable about the business side of music as he has the creative side. His debut single/video is also the title track of the album, Sticks and Stones, which was produced by Nashville stalwart James Stroud. Tracy is enjoying out-of-the-box success with the single, gaining a record 127 adds on R&R its first week out and, since then, climbing steadily at all the trades.

"I view music as one of our greatest forms of communication and I have worked hard to develop my writing and vocal skills into a defined craft."

Tracy is looking forward to developing his performance skills as well. He feels that playing live is the most direct way to convey the emotions of his music and he's already booked through the end of 1991. With Buddy Lee booking his dates, it's safe to say that Tracy's 1992 will be a busy one. His 1991 was actually stalled when he was injured thwarting a robbery attempt early in the year. He still feels the effects, but he's ready to get going.

Lawrence has signed endorsement deals recently with Wrangler jeans and Gibson guitars and has visited a number of radio and media outlets, including appearances on Nashville Now and an upcoming episode of Crook and Chase dedicated to the new faces of '92. In addition, the Chicago Tribune recently ran a story on the country youngster. Lawrence is handled by Music Matters Management. Keep an eye and ear out for this Texas comer.

- Michael "Moses" Scrivner, a luthier whose well-crafted instruments are highly sought after, died on November 19th of heart failure. He was buried in a specially constructed rosewood laminate road case made by Carlo Cases where he worked for some time. According to Carlo President John Logan, "I know he would be pleased if he knew what we're doing." Donations to defray funeral expenses may be sent to the Moses Scrivner Memorial Fund, 2614-B Belcourt Ave. Nashville, TN 37212.
- Dennis Robbins is the first signing to Giant Records, Nashville. Robbins was most recently a member of Billy Hill (Warner Bros.), previously had a solo album on MCA, and cowrote "Two Of A Kind Workin' On A Full House" which was a hit for Garth Brooks last year. Sources indicate that Tim Mensy will be the next act to ink his name with the jolly

- New 20,000 seat Memphis, TN arena, The Pyramid, opened on November 9th with The Judds. The 32 story-high venue was designed to contain restaurants, stores and a music museum, but, as of now, much of the \$62 million facility remains unleased. According to a Pollstar story, promoter Sidney Shlenker was fired after failing to raise the necessary funds to complete the project. Shlenker's companies have filed for bankruptcy. The Pyramid is now handled by Leisure Management.
- · John Denver stated that he is not interested in creating music specifically for one format. "Let the songs fall where they naturally want to go," he explained at a recent Maudes Courtyard Nashville press luncheon to introduce his new LP Different Directions. "There are songs on this album that are folk, one or two that are country, and others that lean more towards rock and/or pop."

Denver was the Country Music Association's Entertainer of the Year in 1975; has sold over 10 million records worldwide: and is active in the world ecology movement. His first single from the new album, "Potters Wheel," is receiving video airplay on TNN and CMT.

• All aboard for the Branson Brigade. The latest to join the musical wagon train westward are Glen Campbell and Louise Mandrell who will alternate three week engagements from May through December at the new 4,000 seat Grand Palace Theater. Each of their shows will also feature a guest star, and incorporate full production, video closeups, pre-recorded videos, dancers and elaborate sets. Admission is to be under \$20 per person.

According to the theater's co-founder/ co-owner and Silver Dollar City principle, Peter Herschend, "With its size, production capacity, location and status, The Grand Palace promises to figure prominently in the future of country music entertainment. Soon artists will know they've made it when they can say, 'I've played The Grand Palace'."

• A massive crowd of 1,000 strong turned out to honor and salute CMA Executive Director To Walker-Meador who is retiring at the end of 1991. Walker's career at the CMA covers a span of 33 years. She came to the CMA as office manager and shortly thereafter graduated to Executive Director. Jo was honored on the CMA's national TV Award show as recipient of the Irving Waugh Award of Excellence and was given standing ovations at each and every function which took place during the busy CMA banquet week.

- We introduced our *Music Row* panel of Radio Tip Sheet writers in June 1990. Since that time, **Moon Mullins, Mac Daniels** and **Jay Phillips** have been laying their ears on the line. Depending upon who you speak to in any given week they're either; clairvoyant, somnambulant, or deaf. We love them all regardless of which temporary state they're in. Thanks guys....
- Legal minds from the firm of Wyatt, Tarrant, Combs, Gilbert & Milom swept out the cobwebs and threw open the dark shutters as they shined a bright light on "The Anatomy of a Controlled Composition Clause (CCC)." In

many ways, the CCC is merely a vehicle for the record labels to cut royalty costs at the expense of writers, artists and co-writers. The short seminar included some factual recitation and explanation of terms plus a very enlightening mock negotiation featuring attorney Mike Milom as the Label interest, and Malcom Mimms negotiating for the Artist's rights.

They defined a Controlled Composition (CC) as "a song written, owned or controlled in whole or in part — directly or indirectly — by Artist or Producer or in which either has an income interest." The key point is that the Artist promises to grant the label a 75% of statutory royalty rate on all CC. However that is really just the tip of the iceberg. The CCC has far reaching economic effects with respect to all facets of an artist's career. Understanding this complicated topic was immensely assisted through the mock negotiations which showed some of the specific considerations which could affect a singer/songwriter, his publisher, and his co-writers.

- Several readers have asked about how we tabulate our annual year-end Producer Honor Roll, New Act Scorecard, Top Songwriters and the September Musician Awards. We listed a compilation of annual winners of these categories in our recent 10th Anniversary issue (November 8, 1991). Although the methodology differs for each of the above categories, and is too involved to explain in detail in this space, it is largely been the work of John Lomax III and Otto Kitsinger who over the years have been our resident statisticians. Throughout the year they input the weekly chart information to their database which then allows them to "tell the past" with great accuracy. Look for the next year-end edition of Producer Honor Roll, New Act Scorecard, and Top Songwriters plus some new features in our first issue of 1992 which will be dated Jan 23.
- Shenandoah drummer Mike McGuire underwent emergency eye surgery at Breckenridge Hospital in Austin, Texas after a soda bottle shattered on the group's tour bus causing lacerations to his face and eye.

Although McGuire must remain inactive until he is fully recovered doctors were very optimistic about a full recovery.

• Kathy Mattea will be a very visible TV darling with a variety of holiday appearances. She will be seen November 29 on *The Home Show*, on NBC's *Hot Country Nights* on December 1; the *Today Show* on December 13th; and *John Denver's Cowboys, Indians and Christmas*, a CBS special also shown on December 13th.

- Celebrating its third year of operation, the New York-based Music Video Association held its annual meeting in Los Angeles during the Billboard Music Video Conference. Jeff Walker of Aristo Music Associates, Nashville was re-elected to the presidency post, Sean Fernald, Captiol Records, L.A. was chosen Vice President and Kadima Levadi, Rowe International, New York was re-elected Secretary/Treasurer. This year, the board also selected members for an advisory committee.....
- An exerpt from Benson recording act Carman's gold long-form Revival in the Land has outraged some patrons of a chain of Albuquerque cinemas. With good intentions, theater-owner Lana Garner began showing "A Witch's Invitation" before some of her feature films. The clip portrays the evil character Horowitz going head to head with a Christian man. Complaints received by New Mexico's Anti-Defamation League described the piece as "anti-semitic," but Carman responded: "If some people are of-



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

Controversy Rocks 91 Video Year

Scandal, sex, lies, a little videotape, a swell of controversy. Now that we have your attention....to some degree or other, all contributed to making the video year of 1991 a permanent burn in the memory, or at least as long as the typical business lunch.

Essentially, we can say, with no threat of reprisals, that it's been an interesting, news-worthy year that has seen the quality of clips steadily improve (although, if we see one more image of sheets blowing in the breeze....). It was a year when some dared push the envelope a little, and ended up with a whopping delivery charge.

Garth Brooks grabbed the national spotlight with "The Thunder Rolls," a piece depicting




a scenario of domestic violence which led to its summary dismissal by both TNN and CMT (Michael Jackson grabbed something else and all he had to do was re-edit). The networks cited the video's "gratuitous violence," along with unfavorable viewer reaction (and let's face it, their own public image), for their decision. On a somewhat related note. Holly Dunn requested that her video, "Maybe I Mean Yes," be pulled from the airwaves because of controversy surrounding the song itself, which many felt had connotations of date rape. Other works that helped extend the form beyond the usual vanilla flavoring included: Dwight Yoakam's "Turn it on..."; "Scars" by Ray Kennedy; the slightly skewered Kelly Willis romp, "The Heart That Love Forgot"; and the quietly elegant "Love Can Build A Bridge" from The

A few broke generally-accepted rules and managed to maintain high entertainment values. "Feed Jake" was produced without the artists (Pirates of the Mississippi) ever being on camera, but keyed into the lyrics' message of friendship, loyalty, negative stereotypes and obligation with touching emotion. K.T. Oslin's "Mary & Willi" had no lip-synch; it would have blown the entire concept. Besides, the interaction between K.T. and co-star Ray Sharkey played out a telling commentary on modern relationships. Set-up and dialogue were utilized to their best advantages.

A few broke generally-accepted rules and managed to maintain high entertainment values.

These two, in particular, helped spearhead the trend toward mini-movies, which threatened to burden a number of clips that had no real basis for experimenting with the format. Openings became unwieldy, dialogue unnecessary, and the lengthy running times turned off viewers who, in turn, turned the channel selector elsewhere. To combat this new strain of "inflation," CMT issued a set


of guidelines limiting intros to no longer than 30-40 seconds. The guidelines also suggested the full-scale elimination of nonmusical intros whenever possible, certainly when not essential to the story line. Industry reaction was mostly positive; some directors feared that creativity might be stifled. However, when watching a piece such as Travis Tritt's "Anymore," you realize that it is possible to include extended intros and maintain quality while not risking viewer burnout.

Speaking of television, TNN heightened its commitment to video programming. According to a year-end report by Aristo Video Promotions, TNN added a total of 238 clips to their playlist since January 1, ahead of last year's figure. CMT, which moved this past October to the Opryland complex, plans to expand its national audience in 1992 by reaching the mark of 20 million cable homes. The Aristo report states that, in an average week, nearly three million homes actively view CMT, and estimates that the average household watches the network 3.1 hours per week. TNN's weekday programs Video-Morning and Video P.M., show high Nielsen numbers with women ages 25-54. CMT leads other basic cable networks in delivering females 18-49 and 25-54 in prime time. Obviously, a large demand for country videos still exists, reflected in the decision this year by cable's VII-1 to resume airing This Is VII-1 Country on Saturday mornings. VH-1 also instituted Country video programming blocks and specials profiling country artists.

Back to Mr. Brooks for a moment. His performance in "The Thunder Rolls," donning wig and fake beard to play the philandering husband, represents a growing trend of artists who now want to act in their own videos. We will likely see more of this as the demand for product keeps escalating. If videos are going to continue to be released with every single, the idea well may soon run dry. There are only so many situations in which you can put an artist, unless the artists themselves take on more active roles in productions and stretch their talents further. The established stars in particular will look at acting as an additional weapon in the arsenal. In which case, the Lee Strasberg School may well have to open a Nashville branch.

You likely (hopefully) will notice that this issue announces the winners of *Music Row's* annual Music Video Awards. We, of course, believe that these represent the in-

dustry's most prestigious honors, first of all because the magazine did video awards before they were cool. 

an early '60s prom, right down to the hair styles and wardrobes. Humor, probably the hardest element to pull off in the medium, was used most effectively for Lee Roy Parnell's "Family Tree," Mark Collie's "She's Never Comin' Back," and "Turn It On" by Dwight Yoakam. Sawyer Brown's "The Walk" was one of the most moving pieces I saw all year, with regard to photography and storyline. Finally, if you'll allow one more nod to "The Thunder Rolls," for its use of editing, sound, lighting, and cinematography to create a mood of overall tension. It's sort of a reminder that art can often make you uncomfortable, which is no less valid a feeling than joy or sadness. Every clip doesn't have to be punctuated with a bunch of casting agency cowboys frolicking around the barn, forcing an aura of good times the way some beer commercials do. Making you think and pay attention are worthwhile goals, too.



SHOWCASES

Renown Nashville picker Steve Gibson presents...Carol Ann Etheridge. Steve's been recording tracks on Ms. Etheridge for the last couple of years and brought her out on stage at a recent Douglas Corner gathering. Carol's been writing with notables Don Henry and Ronnie Edwards and, refreshingly, doesn't hold a guitar. She moves around some, but is missing that captivation factor that separates artists from singers. "Hopeful Romantic (In a Hopeless Romance)" is a bonafide hit song; we'll see how it does in the hands of Mercury artist Jessica Boucher. Carol is a reliable vocalist and with the backup musicianship of Mike Severs, Larry Paxton, Dennis Wilson and band. she puts on a reliable show, but that's not enough in Nashville anymore.

As good as Carol's songs were, such was Mike Reynolds' mountain tenor voice. He did a solo hour at the Bluebird Café recently, treating the half-packed crowd to an array of country, gospel and a traditional Carter Family tune that he played on zither called "Are You Tired of Me Darling?" He and Emmylou Harris would make a killer duo. Mike is natural on stage and limber in vocal range, but he needs songs. Don't we all need something?

John and Lisa Stroud, on the same propitious eve, needed a sound man. John

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has a real good way with a rhythm and carries the energy for the whole group, something you'd rather see from the lead vocalist. "Paint This Town Blue" has been in my head for days now and the stylistic gamut they ran touched on Dixieland, a little Cajun, some blues; all sung with country soul. Nicely played dobro and mandolin as well. To me, their harmonies should be the focal point, yet those precious moments are few and far between.

Have you seen the "Uncle John's Farm" video by **Eric Blakely** on CMT? It paints a real quaint picture of

rural life drawn around a song full of old-fashioned values and lessons. Much like the bulk of this Austin-based singer's recent Bluebird set that showed convincing energy and country life in bluesy folk and country rhythms. Likeable.

CAPITOL IDEA!

Capitol Nashville surely hasn't squandered its recent surge of wealth as they flew about 80 radio and media folks down to Phoenix, Arizona for a look-see at the **Pirates** of the **Mississippi** and their newest acquisition, **Paulette Carlson**. Never wanting for anything, I fell in love with that area of the U.S. and with Paulette's new stuff.

She looks great for being 4 months a mom. getting back in shape and literally exploding into her live show. I caught a portion of the soundcheck as well and it's obvious that she's ready to get back to work. Her almost ominous voice, sometimes called the Stevie Nicks of country, is as identifiable as ever and the new songs (seven Paulette co-writes, five with heavyweights Tom Shapiro and Chris Waters) are less predictable than a lot of Nashville material and more attentive to the whole song, melody and lyrics. Our Alaskan songbird tore into her latest single "I'll Start With You" with a vengeance, eased her way into a medley of 101 stuff and brought to life new songs like "Love Goes On" and "Why Should I?" all for the benefit of a rather tough audience.

At the press conference, Paulette spoke of the no-love-lost departure from **Highway 101**, the time she finally had to write songs, how tough it is keeping enough singing breath when you're pregnant and her anxiousness to get back on tour. She has no plans to go slow, hoping to tour by bus bringing daughter **Cali** along.

When I arrived in the land that doesn't turn their clocks back, I was just in time to join the herd and get corralled out to the Pirates showcase on Friday. Feel-good Southern

country/rock, coupled with down-home barbecue ribs and chicken—mmm mmm good. The Pirates' new stuff is perhaps more adventuresome than their first outing, but true to their "Redneck Blues."

The Gavin Report's lovely liaison Cyndi Hoelzle, who it turned out was bunking across the hall, is contemplating a move to Nashville after the fire that ate Oakland burned too close to home. We'd love to have ya! Met Jack Marcus from Chevenne's KUUY and discussed the uphill battle of programming all the quality stuff coming out of Nashville. Spoke with bassmaster (as in bass guitar) Paul Uhrig, who commented on the blatant lack of Nashville representation in musician-oriented magazines, until the three banqueteers kicked us out of the hall. I followed the unmistakable sound of fun into, you guessed it, the lounge, where the inimitable Jim Bessman, Music Row's Gotham Gossip for you laymen, was directing a chorus of conversation with innocents like Cathy Gurley, Summer Harmon and Teresa George. Being the dedicated journalist that he is, he skipped out before last call to, of all things, board a 2 am. flight to Louisiana to catch a Cajun marathon.

Great music, breathtaking scenery, excellent company; a very memorable weekend.

PAULETTE CARLSON Love Goes On (Capitol CDP 7 97711 2) Producers: Jimmy Bowen and Paulette Carlson

Prime Cuts: "I'll Start With You," "The Chain Just Broke," "It's Too Bad"

Critique: As Carlson returns to solo performing—or had you forgotten her brief pre-Highway 101 stint with RCA?—she flexes her songwriting muscle. (Nothing she wrote appeared on *Paint the Town*, her last 101 album; here, she co-wrote seven of 10.) Fans of Carlson's from 101 won't be surprised; there's not much for them to miss except for Jack Daniels' guitar. Actually, it's a two-forone split with good dividends: The fiery Nikki Nelson is slightly better suited to 101's big backbeat, while Carlson seems perfectly at home wrapped in Jimmy Bowen's straight country production.



THE HARD CORPS Def Before Dishonor (Interscope/East West Records America 7 91756-2) Producers: Jam Master Jay, Joe

"The Butcher" Nicolo and the Hard Corps

Prime Cuts: "Hard Corps," "Back in Black,"
"Bring Down the House"

Critique: "You wonder if it's rap or if it's rock 'n' roll," shouts the Beast on "Bring Down the House." It's neither, he'll tell you, but it can still make the walls shatter. Pitting a white hard-rock trio against two black MC's and a DJ, the Hard Corps isn't for every taste (especially if you lean towards country). Still, rap and metal account for the bulk of record sales, so the band covers a large segment. Musically, they're descendants of Run-D.M.C.'s rock-rap hits "Rock Box" and "Walk This Way" (D.M.C.'s Jam Master Jay produced the bulk of the album.) Their crushing cover of AC/DC's "Back in Black" sounds so natural it's a wonder nobody thought to do it before. Interscope signed the Hard Corps to the biggest pop deal ever for a Nashville band (a reported \$2 million-plus for two albums). If you've ever seen them live, you'll understand why.



KEITH PALMER Keith Palmer (Epic 48611) Producer: Bob Montgomery


Prime Cuts: "Memory Lane," "Forgotten But Not Gone," "Don't Throw Me in the Briarpatch" Critique: Palmer, a long-time demo singer and songwriter (he wrote Reba's "Tell Me What's So Good About Good-bye" and "For My Broken Heart"), finally gets his shot at the big time, and he makes pretty good use of it. "Don't Throw Me in the Briarpatch" possesses the kind of Hee Haw hokiness that makes you either love it or hate it, but the best stuff ("Forgotten But Not Gone," "That's Enough To Keep Me Hangin' On") deals with the deep hurts and having to live with them. Epic picks up another wounded romantic.



TRACY LAWRENCE Sticks and Stones (Atlantic 7 82326-2) Producer: James Stroud

Prime Cuts: "Paris, Tennessee," "Sticks and Stones," "Today's Lonely Fool"

Critique: A lanky young small-town Southerner with a neatly trimmed mustache wearing a cowboy hat that hides shoulder-length blonde hair. Sound like Alan Jackson? Not enough to fool you. Still, Lawrence brings his best tear-in-the-beer voice to everything he does—the pleasantly silly "I Hope Heaven Has a Honky Tonk," the nostalgic "Dancin' to Sweet 17," and the mawkish "Somebody Paints the Wall." When he gets a song as sad as his voice—say, "Sticks and Stones" or "Today's Lonely Fool"—it's pretty potent stuff.



TOM KELL One Sad Night (Warner Bros. 9 26508-2) Producer: Josh Leo

Prime Cuts: "The Girl With the Single Rose," "Only Heaven Knows," "Texas Has Nothin' on Me"

Critique: If Tom Kell's brand of post-Eagles country-pop sounds closer to the source than most, that's because Kell brings in some ex-Eagles (Bernie Leadon, Timothy B. Schmit) to make sure he gets it right. Even the slickest

stuff makes nice ear candy, but his most personal songs—the ones that separate him from everybody else—will never make it to radio. And though his duet with Katy Moffatt establishes some folkie credentials, his duet with J.D. Souther shows where his heart is. At his best, Kell sounds like maybe Michael Martin Murphey with an edge; at his worst, he's still a better-than-average Eagles replacement.

Critique: A slow Christmas from the usually holiday-happy Nashville. This year's Christmas haul is a mixed bag, although most of it makes for festive listening.

A Brenda Lee Christmas starts with a nearly note-perfect remake of "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" and goes on to become a traditional, if uneventful, holiday album. It's heavy on string and choirs—nice enough, but nothing special.

Take 6's He Is Christmas has the opposite problem—the group rearranges "Silent Night" and a couple other standards almost beyond recognition. When they take it easy on the jazz chops—on "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing" and "Sweet Little Jesus Boy"—the results are much better. Fusion instrumentalists the Yellowjackets back the sextet on "God Rest Ye Merry Gentlemen."

Michael Martin Murphey's album is the second of his *Cowboy Songs* releases—a collection of original and traditional songs, waltzes, polkas, two-steps, and stories from cowboy storyteller Waddie Mitchell. With the same sympathetic and historical feel that characterized the original *Cowboy Songs*, Murphey collects old cowboy songs and poems—"The Cowboy Christmas Ball" and "The Christmas Trail." Then he matches them with new songs that keep the spirit.

From Tim O'Brien's "Making Plans" to Red Knuckles & the Trailblazers' hilariously mixed-up "That White Christmas Song," Sugar Hill's bluegrass-heavy Sugar Plums is a gem. Mixing familiar instrumentals (Jerry Douglas' contemplative "Away in a Manger") with obscure songs (Robin & Linda Williams' cover of Steve Earle's "Nothing But a Child"), Sugar Plums captures the essence of homemade Christmas—it's familiar but exciting, old-fashioned yet new.

I found my DISCovery Award winner in the pile of Christmas records. "Santa Won't You Bring Me a Man" isn't country at all, so many of you won't be interested in hearing it. Those of you with curious ears and a taste for cabaret jazz-pop should do yourself a favor and check out Music City's delightful Wild About Harry. You'll think you're listening to something classic by Gershwin or Porter or Kern, or some old movie-sound-track chanteuse. But you're not. These are new songs, performed by a quartet of kids who will make you close your eyes and grin from ear to ear.

Recent granddaddy Mascolo has been promoting records for over 20 years, 13 of them with RCA. Though

the majority of those years were spent with the Southeast region on the pop side of the label, he asserts that many of the Nashville acts did well in his area. "We crossed over a lot of Ronnie Milsap, Alabama, Restless Heart and Waylon Jennings records. I feel like I've been doing country all my life, though it's only been 2 1/2 years. I've always loved country music and I think it's the music of the '90s."

Ed was born and raised near Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where he married fairly young to his wife of 29 years, Carol. His music business experience began with Decca records in the early '60s where he worked in the warehouse filling orders. When they couldn't place him on the sales force at Decca, he returned to Pittsburgh. In the meantime, his brother-in-law had set up an indie promotion company in Nashville and asked Ed to come on down. He worked R&B crossovers until PolyGram, then Polydor, offered him a regional spot. From there, he went to RCA in 1978.

Ed feels there is a direct correlation between multi-country station markets and sales. "For instance, New Orleans has only one major country station, but Nashville has two and the sales figures here are just about double. And both Nashville stations are pulling great numbers in Arbitron. It's the same in a lot of other markets where both stations are doing well."

The bottom line for the label is to sell LPs, whenever and wherever they can. "I think album cuts are fine. The listeners can't buy singles anymore. If they hear a cut on the radio—be it a single or not—if they hear it and buy the album, then the song worked."



FORT SHEDD PLANS EXPANSION

The enviable success of Music Mill is a dream come true for founder Harold Shedd, now also Creative VP at PolyGram. The original Music Mill Studio was located at the site occupied today by the George Jones Museum on Demonbreun. After a couple of successful years which saw the birth of supergroup Alabama, which Shedd was producing, he was able to move the studio from its humble beginnings. He created the unique giant log cabin facility (dubbed Fort Shedd) with its authentic century-old grist mill which is now a land-mark on 18th Ave.

Our Focusrite will be the sixth in the world. There's one in England, Africa, New York and a couple in L.A. This should make us competitive with anyone, anywhere."

Paul discussed the high risk of expansion. "We're taking the chance. It's a lot of money and it's a big step. Our big concern was that we would have to raise our price, regardless of which console we purchased. So we decided we might as well raise it up and have something unique—just like Jimmy Bowen did with his digital machine. He took the chance with digital and it took off in this town. So with this piece of equipment we

It's hard to define—it's everything from the warm fireplace down to little esthetic things like the color of the walls and the lights. We do everything to make our clients as comfortable as possible," smiles Goldberg. "We even serve bagels and



There was a short silence as he stopped at the toll booth on the Massachusetts Turnpike which leads to the aging Sumner Tunnel and then comes out at the airport.

"There's no money for Christmas this year in our family," he said picking up his lament. "My wife and I are going to make cookies for everyone. We've been trying to save some good containers for a while now."

My mind wandered back to the reason I was in Boston and of course kept returning to my Grandmother's burial. My Mom had summed it up beautifully the night before at a quiet family dinner when she toasted, "We are not here tonight to moum, but to celebrate, remember and pay tribute to someone we all loved, who lived a long life."

As I peered into the grave, I realized my emotions and tears were for all of us — living and dead. For my Grandmother, but also for the

helplessness I suddenly experienced. Life is such a temporary state. To take for granted one's own life or the lives of those you love is a sad mistake.

I wanted to share these thoughts because as we enter this 1991 holiday season, we who work in the country music industry and live in Nashville have a great deal for which to be thankful and not take for granted. Our industry is growing and expanding. Not everyone is prosperous, but those who aren't have another important asset — hope.

My sincere hope is that each and every one of you enjoys safe and happy holidays and a prosperous New Year.

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
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
