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
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

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

Roundabout The Row



TNN Allies With Country Weekly; Radio Monolith Emerges

TNN CHANGES AWARDS PARTNER—TNN and Country Weekly magazine have signed a long term agreement to produce a fan-voted country music awards show, effectively dumping nine-year partner Music City News from TNN's annual Fan Fair week fete. The alliance will produce the first show next June, and TNN will telecast the awards live from the Gaylord Entertainment Center. Conflict arose last week as MCN learned of the TNN/Country Weekly alliance from reports in Nashville's newspaper, The Tennessean. MCN publisher Mike Jones told Music Row publisher

David Ross that personal notification would have been a "matter of civility," and that his last communication was with TNN's Brian Hughes who said "he would get back to me." Jones also insists, "MCN has an ironclad contract giving us the arena for our

award show." TNN contends they hold the contract to the arena for the dates in question. TNN has produced and telecast an annual fanvoted country music awards show since April 1988 when it introduced the Viewer's Choice Awards. In 1990, that awards show merged with the Music City News Awards to become the TNN Music City News Country Awards.

MONO-LITHIC RADIO—The nation's two largest radio groups, Clear Channel Communications and AMFM Inc., have initiated a merger that will create a company with nearly 1,000 radio stations, 425,000 billboards and two radio networks. For an estimated \$23.5 billion in stock—which makes the deal tax free—plus the assumption of \$6.1 billion in AMFM debt, Clear Channel gets AMFM's 443 radio stations. The merger establishes the country's dominant radio company and sets the stage for significant spinoffs, many in major markets.

GIANT DROPS BAER IN REORGANIZATION—

Connie Baer, Giant Records' VP Marketing and Artist Development, has exited the label. According to label heads **Doug Johnson** and **John Burns**, Baer's position was eliminated due to financial cutbacks. This announcement comes only weeks after the label added an in-house six-member promotion team.

CMA EXITS NETHERLANDS—The CMA is reorganizing its European operations and has closed its Netherlands office. The Netherlands operations duties will be shared by the CMA's Nashville headquarters, the London office, and assisted by Cologne-based Jan Garich, who handles CMA operations in Germany, Switzerland and Austria. Karen Holt, who headed the Netherlands unit, will reportedly join business communications company Baxter Associates based in the Netherlands.

UMG ATTENDS CATALOG—Universal Music Group has established Universal Music Enterprises (UME), to market UMG's catalog, the largest in the country, and specialty releases from each of the company's U.S. labels. Headed by **Bruce Resnikoff**, President, UME will operate with its own fully dedicated resources such as product development, marketing, publicity and creative services. UME will be the umbrella organization for five independent businesses which report to Mr. Resnikoff: Catalog Management, UTV Records, Hip-O Records, Universal Music Special Markets and Universal Film & Television Music.

OPRY COMES HOME-The Grand Ole Opry will return to the Ryman Auditorium for four weekends in January. According to a report in The Tennessean, Opry general manager Pete Fisher says there are no plans to make the move permanent, but acknowledges that occasional visits to the Ryman are likely. The live radio show will be held at the "Mother Church of Country Music" on Jan. 7-8, 14-15, 21-22 and 28-29. While the Opry is temporarily at the Ryman, cleaning and a few minor upgrades will be made to the Grand Ole Opry House on Briley Parkway, Fisher said. The Ryman, originally named the Union Gospel Tabernacle, opened for religious services and other public events on May 12, 1892. It housed the Opry from 1943-74.



From Hard Drive To Hip: An MP3 Primer

here are all kinds of fascinating statistics available regarding MP3s. For example, "MP3" is one of the most frequently used queries on internet search engines. Major MP3 sites log hundreds of thousands of hits daily and thousands of MP3 downloads hourly. At CDNow, arguably the largest online music retailer, buyers often have the choice of having a CD shipped to them or downloading the album in MP3. It seems as if every week at least one major label announces an alliance with a software company to "develop and distribute the next generation of digital music." Does anyone still believe this MP3 thing is just a fad?

Regardless of how you feel about the considerable legal ramifications surrounding internet music distribution, you can still legally enjoy all that MP3 technology rather easily. First of all, it is important to understand that there is nothing inherently illegal about the MP3 file format. The law affords you the capability to create an MP3 file for your personal use from a legitimately obtained CD just as the law afforded you the capability to create a

cassette for your personal use from that same CD.

However, be aware that the law does not provide you with the right to pass that same MP3 along to other people. Once you know how to create an MP3, you may discover how deceptively easy it is to pass MP3s along. Resist that temptation lest you find yourself as part of another statistic—counterfeit internet music arrests and indictments are up more than 250 percent this year.

That being said, you are now ready to dive headfirst into the wonderful world of MP3s. You may be thinking to yourself, "Me?!? Create a music file?!? I don't even know what end of my computer to plug in, let alone create an MP-whatchacallit." There was a time when you would have been right to be leery. In the not too distant past, creating an MP3 was a formidable and time-consuming task, even to those who knew exactly what they were doing. As with all things technological (except maybe your VCR), advances in technology simplified the process. In no time at all you can be creating MP3s just like you create Word documents.

MUST BE THIS TALL TO RIDE

In order to create an MP3, you must have the following:

- Pentium-class (or higher) Windows 95/98 computer or,
- PowerPC Macintosh running system OS 7.6.1 or higher
- CD-ROM drive (IDE or SCSI)
- System compatible sound card connected to your CD-ROM drive

(Note: If you can play audio CDs from your computer, your sound card is connected to your CD-ROM drive.)

There is some unique terminology to creating digital music that you should know before you start. Not to worry, none of these are difficult concepts—computer people make stuff like this up because they think it sounds cool. Understanding these terms will help you understand your computer a little better:

Ripping—Digitally extracting audio from a CD to produce an exact copy without loss of quality. Simply put, ripping copies the music off the CD and temporarily stores it in the computer. Example: "I just ripped 'Ready To Run' off Fly."

Encoding—Converting analog or digital multimedia content into compressed form, typically in the MP3 format. Example: "I ripped the song, but I still need to encode it."

Bit Rate—Speed (in seconds) at which information (in bits) is transferred for compression. Think of bit rate as a section of water pipe. The bigger the pipe, the more water it can transfer and the larger the amount of water in the pipe. All of these analogies are important for one reason only—bit rate has a direct correlation with file size. Higher bit rate equals higher sound quality, but at the cost of a larger file size. Lower bit rate means greater compression—smaller files—but reduced sound quality. "CD quality" recording is widely held to be 128kbps.

Now that you've checked your system for the appropriate requirements and have a few of the buzz words down, it's time to choose a computer program for creating and/or playing MP3 files.

SWISS ARMY PROGRAM

There are no less than 97 software programs that play MP3 files (including Windows' own MediaPlayer). However, there are only a handful of programs that can both create and play MP3s. These programs are known as "all-in-one" utilities and provide for the easiest conversion of CDs into MP3s.

MusicMatch 4.2 OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$29.99 URL: www.musicmatch.com

Version 4.2 was just released a few weeks ago and is already gaining strong support. It includes a player, ripper/encoder, and a music



library (for organizing your MP3s). It also has MP3 streaming support, which allows you to listen to Internet radio. In addition, MusicMatch has line-in audio recording capabilities, so you can generate an MP3 from a secondary audio source, such as cassette tape or vinyl. If you are one of those people who can't handle two minutes of silence, this program also allows you to listen to the CD you are recording while you create your MP3.

Real Jukebox Plus OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$29.99 URL: www.real.com



From one of the leaders in Internet multimedia technology, Real Jukebox plays virtually any kind of music file, even some pretty obscure ones. Like other programs in this class, it includes a player and ripper/encoder. It also has a library feature to organize your MP3s and CDs. Real Jukebox gives you the option of hearing what you are recording in real time, or you can opt to record silently.

AudioCatalyst Workshop 2.01 OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$29.95 URL: www.xingtech.com



The ripper/encoder in this program is the one that others seek to emulate. For those of you who like a lot of control over what you are recording, this program is hard to beat. A player and ripper/encoder come standard with this software bundle, as well as an MP3 editor. The editor allows you to mix MP3s together and tweak them to your heart's content. For the rest of our discussion,

AudioCatalyst will be the program that we use to demonstrate how to create MP3s.

SoundJam MP OS: Macintosh 7.6.1 or later Price: \$39.99 URL: www.soundjam.com



SoundJam is currently the only all-in-one utility available for Macintosh users. But that's OK, because by all accounts it's a good program. A ripper/encoder and a player, both with well-planned interfaces, make this a good choice for the other 10% of personal computer users.

PLAYBACK ONLY

The programs listed above are the most popular all-in-one utilities on the market today. They vary slightly in interface and features, so you may want to try several before you choose the one you like best. All have a trial period or evaluation version, so you can try several before you upgrade to the full version. For those who want the ability to play MP3s, but aren't necessarily interested in creating the files, check out the programs below.



Far and away the most popular MP3 player, WinAmp does not have a ripper/encoder as part of its program. You will have to use another program (such as the AudioCatalyst stand-alone software) to actually create your MP3s. However, should you choose to go with a playback-only program, WinAmp has some very nice features (such

JOHN BERRY Wildest Dreams

(Lyric Street 650005)

Producer: Mark Spiro

Prime Cuts: "Power Windows,"
"Salvation," "You'll Be In My
Heart"

Critique: John Berry's first album for Lyric Street Records is an ode to one's faith in the power of love: God's love, the love of a woman, the love of mankind, and love's ability to save, to heal, to nourish. The album consists of songs so positive it could just as easily find a home on Contemporary Christian charts as on country charts. Berry is easily one of the most talented singers in any genre. But he is not really a country singer, and there's little on Wildest Dreams to indicate otherwise. Now don't get me wrong—it's an excellently produced, wonderfully sung collection of pop songs. In fact, Berry's never sounded better. On his earlier Capitol albums his big voice was all too often buried beneath layers of quitars, drums and echo. Here, it's up front and personal and warmer than ever. He soars on Phil Collins' "You'll Be In My Heart" and rocks hard with the single "Power Windows." He also delivers an anti-violence message with the rhythmic "You're The Voice." One of the album's most powerful and moving songs is Gary Burr's "Salvation." The trucker's tale of lost love, wrong roads and a plastic Jesus comes closest to country and is eloquently sung by Berry. On "Rescued Me" the lyrics could be about a woman's love or God's saving grace as Berry sings: I lost my faith, lost my pride/Burdened by the storms of life/But my heart found shelter, my soul found peace/ When you came and rescued me. Perhaps this will be the album that will help rescue John Berry's recording career.

Clint Black D'lectrified

(RCA-67823) Producer: Clint Black Prime Cuts: "When I Said I Do." "Been There," "Who I Used To Be" Critique: Over the last 10 years, Clint Black's music has evolved at a steady pace yet never straved too far from his country roots. D'lectrified, however, changes all of that. As the name implies, there's not a single electric instrument among its 14 songs. Instead there's a deluge of piano, harmonica and even horns, which blend into a unique and creative hybrid that can, at times, hardly be considered country. But that seems to be the whole point. With four cover songs, this is also the first album that isn't entirely Blackwritten material. Produced by Black, D'lectrified starts with a cover of The Marshall Tucker Band's "Bob My Life Away." If it weren't for Black's voice, I'd surely have checked to see if I'd picked up the right album. He follows with "Are You Sure Waylon Done It This Way," a liberal and admirable remake of Waylon Jennings' former hit. The album's stand-out is the beautiful "When I Said I Do," which pairs Black with wife Lisa Hartman. His voice also floats effortlessly with Steve Wariner's on the superb "Been There." Other collaborators include Bruce Hornsby, Kenny Loggins and a vocal intro from Monty Python funnyman Eric Idle on the humorous, albeit bizarre "The Galaxy Song." Black, inspired by Eric Clapton's remake of "Layla," gives fresh arrangements to his old hits—"Burn One Down," "No Time To Kill," and a tender instrumental of "Something That We Do." While you have to appreciate his complete disregard for playing it safe in a time when everybody else is, Black's latest offering is, at times, a bit too different.

TRACY BYRD It's About Time

(RCA-67881) Producers: Billy Joe Walker Jr., Tracy Byrd Prime Cuts: "Every Time I Do," "Ain't It Just Like A Woman," "A Little Love"

Critique: Besides the fact that this is Tracy Byrd's debut release on RCA, and his first since leaving MCA after six best-selling albums. the other thing one notices after a single listen is there are no dopey (though hit-smelling) ditties that, for better or worse, have helped to make him a star. While this may not be the through-and-through country record that Byrd has so longed to make, it comes close, though it doesn't really take off until nearly halfway down. The first part of the CD is taken up with family-oriented material that seems true yet somewhat forced. That includes the catchy title cut, another in the line of "Cat's In The Cradle," as well as more contrived sentimental pap from Skip Ewing in "Put Your Hand In Mine." But with "Every Time I Do," a chuqqing Shawn Camp-penned heartbreaker that features Byrd's falsetto yelp, things start to get better. The rock-edged, Waylonesque "Love, You Ain't Seen The Last Of Me" keeps things moving in the right direction. As does the shuffle "Undo The Right," the Hank Cochran-Willie Nelson chestnut. Here, it's easy to see where Byrd got much of his singing style. Byrd comes up with a strong pair of ballads in "Ain't It Just Like A Woman." and "A Little Love." On the rambunctious Cajun-styled two-step "Something To Brag About," Byrd finally cuts loose to end his RCA debut. Throughout, he and co-producer Walker work hard to deliver some of the singer's most relaxed and finest recorded performances.

JERRY KILGORE Love Trip

(Virgin 47828-2) Producers: Steve Bogard, Jeff Stevens, Scott Hendricks Prime Cuts: "The More I Love You," "The Look," "The Real Thing," "Cactus In A Coffee Can" Critique: With acts like Julie Reeves and Jerry Kilgore on their roster it appears that Virgin Records is trying to make their mark on Nashville by doing something other Music Row labels have forgotten how to do-releasing country songs performed by country acts. Vaquely reminiscent of early George Strait, Kilgore is the real deal. Not only is he a legitimate country act, he is also a stand-up songwriter with six co-write credits on this debut. He executes his tales of heartbreak and heartbeats in a smooth, rich style of cowboy crooning in such a relaxed manner that you get the impression that Kilgore has never been in a hurry in his life. There are only a few true uptempos on Love Trip, but it just proves that it's the content not the bpm that makes a great project. You can almost smell the sawdust and see the two-steppers as he strolls through each cut. "Cactus In A Coffee Can," a Steve Seskin/Allen Shamblin creation, is a beautiful but tragic story song that will move even the toughest heartsanother "Don't Laugh At Me" from these brilliant writers that could do for Kilgore what their previous hit did for Mark Wills. The Bogard/Stevens/Hendricks production collaboration is mellow sophistication loaded with thick fiddles, lonesome steel quitars and tasteful piano. This is a truly classy project. Thank goodness Virgin had the vision to sign a cowboy over a pretty boy. Hopefully, it's a trend that will catch on.

Works The Room

Always remember, boys and girls, it's not how much you sell or how cute you are that matters in this business. It's how fabulous a party you give. Mark Hartley hosted one for the books when he feted Clint Black (9/30).

Clint's D'Lectrified CD is a dandy, no doubt about that. But the party celebrating its release was something else. The invitation read that we were to head to Shady Acre Farm in Leiper's Fork. So we did. Who knew Mark had such a palace out there? Pam Tillis and I were walking through the mansion scraping our chins off the floor. "I think I counted nine sitting rooms," I said, "and this isn't even their primary residence!" "That is what really hurts," replied Pam. "We are definitely in the wrong ends of the business."

Mark told me that the original log-cabin room of the house had been kept in tact because it had a "magical" quality. Generations of the Reynolds family were born and died there and today "the most amazing songs are written there," he added. The home is used as a writer's retreat by performing songwriters so fabulous that he wouldn't even drop their names. Features include Brazilian cherry floors, a quest wing as big as your whole house, a master suite to die for and fireplaces and balconies everywhere. It overlooks exquisite Tennessee scenery, including a pond with an island in its center containing a lighted gazebo. accessible via a walking bridge. I won't even go into the patio, flower beds and fountain. A bonfire helped heat the chilly night.

Patsy Bruce remains the unchallenged queen of party tossers. Her Events Unlimited imported tamales wrapped in corn husks from Santa Barbara. Tortillas were filled with your choice of beef, chicken or—get this—lobster. Sweetened Mexicali shrimp and mountains of mouth watering quacamole were everywhere. A mariachi band played in the copious kitchen and got their guitars autographed by the stars. Larry Carlton, Chris Parr, Steve Buchanan & Ree Guyer Buchanan, Lon Helton, Nancy Shapiro, Bonnie Garner, Shannon, Ron Huntsman, Brian Mansfield, David Ross, Janet E. Williams and Brad Schmitt were bug-eyed over the fabulousness of it all.

Joe Galante announced that all of Clint's prior RCA albums are now platinum. Steve Wariner presented his buddy with an Ovation mandolin. "We're about to have the Clint and Steve show," said Black, "because we're both so hard to get along with." Lisa Hartman Black reported that she got over any stage fright on the first date of the D'Lectrified tour when she came out to do her part on "When I Said I Do" in front of a wildly enthusiastic hometown crowd of 20,000 in Houston. She's just as nice as her husband is; and her four pop LPs of 1978-86 were really quite good. They now

maintain a home in Green Hills, by the way.

Fabulous in quite another way was Bill Friskics-Warren's 40th birthday bash in East Nashville (10/2). Holly Street isn't exactly Shady Lane Farm, but the backyard was decorated with party lights, fall decorations and tables with bright cloths. The noble Americana scribe invited Mike McCall, Jim Ridley, Ellen Pryor, Mike Janus, Elaine Wood and neighbor Chuck Mead of BR5-49, among others. Earthy folk sounds were provided by Tommy Goldsmith, Tomi Lunsford, Tom House and Scott Chase. Hog Heaven was the source of the delectable barbecue.

From there we headed to the Nashville Symphony's 54th season kick-off concert (10/2) at TPAC. It was a pops concert featuring K.T. Oslin, Lee Levine and the Jack Daniels Original Silver Cornet Band. Teddy Bart and Karlen Evins hosted, struggling mightily with glitching mics. Despite her years off the road, Oslin was in superb voice and was a revelation especially on the Gershwin standards.

She also whisked us through her Broadway background, pausing memorably to perform "I'll Never Fall in Love Again" (from Promises, Promises) with Sam Bacco, Kenny Malone and Biff Watson as her nifty rhythm trio. Ronn Huff conducted, showcasing his world-class skills as an arranger. In addition to Malone and Watson, David Hungate and David Hutsinger sat in from Music Row to back the diva. The always mighty MCA Records brought out its big guns Vince and Reba, fortified by upstarts Chely and Alecia, to claim this issue's Label of the Day award. But the powerhouse failed to claim either of our other two categories.

In fact, all of the majors let us down in the quest for new talent. Curb had a good shot with a smooth baritone guy named Lesley McDaniel. (As long as I'm on the topic, what is the deal with releasing guys like this and Steve Holy with absolutely NO media set-up? I have never even heard of these people prior to tonight.) Asylum's entry in our sweepstakes is the equally worthy Chad Austin. But both were trumped by little Soundwaves Records, which presents us with both a swing disc and a comedy entry from a fellow named Carroll Brown, our DISCovery Awardee of the day.

Susan Ashton has had a remarkably successful career in Christian music. Others of her peers have attempted country crossovers and failed (Kim Hill, Russ Taff, etc.). If there is a record that can do what has thus far seemed impossible, Susan's sexy "Closer" is surely it. This Disc of the Day has what all of the best performances of tonight have, personality. Play her, Trace Adkins, Dolly Parton, Kenny Rogers, Hank Williams III, Charlie Robison and The Mavericks and remind yourself that diversity, individual identities and, yes, personality are what used to make country music great.

Millennium marketing is all termed "company" rented space about the "niche." Randy Wachtler and 615 Music happily found theirs years ago, as a leader in background and "identity" music, 615 and its staff of six composers create music beds for approximately 200 television stations nationwide, along with title themes and underscores for such series as TNN's Life & Times, A&E's Biography (for which 615 won an Emmy in 1996), and Movies In Time for the History Channel.

Wachtler, a Minneapolis native and skilled musician, started 615 in 1985 while attending Middle Tennessee State University. "We almost starved to death for three years," he laughs. The loosely-



behind Masterfonics Studio, and went about the task of nicheseeking. In 1988, 615 developed an award-winning musical spot for the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers. "That snowballed into other work," Wachtler says. "People knew we did the Lakers spot, and all of a sudden they wanted to meet with us."

The snowball has evolved into a near-avalanche. "We are the second largest studio in the country for background and promotional music," Wachtler says evenly. "We've scored about 225 episodes of different series, and created commercial music for Wendy's, Ford, Sears."

Composing in the commercial area involves a combination of

music and psychology. "We try to create something simple enough to remember, but not too complicated for the listener," Wachtler explains. "You come up with note combinations that give the client a personality. If you're doing music for a TV station's newscast, it's often very fast-paced and creates a sense of urgency. What the music is trying to say is, 'There's something going on, and we have the answer. It's important for you to watch.' Other stations might want to sound more authoritative, which is where large orchestras come into play. We have to think as marketing people, not just as music people. A client has only two ways to get to the consumer-through the eyes and through the ears. Our job is to set the tone."

The bulk of the writing is done by the staff composers and, occasionally, freelancers. "We're always looking for hot young writers who are proficient in scoring. We also develop pieces with some of the songwriters around town when the client needs lyrics along with the music. Greg Barnhill and I recently wrote a song for the Cleveland Browns promotional campaign, for example." Another current project stars actor Kelsey Grammer (Frasier) in a singing role, performing a 615-composed tune for World Animal Day, set to air on cable's Animal Planet channel.

After numerous requests from clients, Wachtler launched the 615 Music Library, a collection of 65 CDs containing several different styles of background music. "Television stations, corporations and other clients use the library when they need certain types of music for background," Wachtler says. "We produce 10 new CDs a year for the library."

Wachtler looks to movie soundtracks as the next logical area for the company. "We haven't really competed in that arena yet, but I would love to do films. Our main studio can accommodate 48 pieces. so I believe we could handle that. It would be great to hear more soundtracks coming out of Nashville."



It is our duty as creative people to stir the pot, continue to dream, be unrealistic, a little unreasonable and highly irreverent while remaining inspired enough to write something that will bust all the gates down.

Bob DiPiero is one of the most celebrated, successful songwriters in the Nashville songwriting community. He earned his stripes in his home-town rock'n'roll circuit, which also put him through Youngtown State University's Dana School of Music. DiPiero moved to Nashville in the late '70s and taught music lessons to support himself while he developed his songwriting skills and career. His first publishing deal was with the legendary Combine Music, home of such high-caliber writers as Kris Kristofferson, Tony Joe White and Larry Gatlin. His first cut was with Reba McEntire, but his career was launched with the Oak Ridge Boys' recording of "American Made." We asked DiPiero how he has sustained such an extraordinary career.

I think I've sustained my career by approaching what I do not as a job, but as being a student. This is a learning process. And a student is never done learning, as far as I'm concerned. As long as you continue to learn, your viewpoint is a fresh one. What did you mean about simplifying the process of getting the song to the consumer? There are some great minds in this business—Tony

Brown, Tim DuBois—I have great respect for the top of the creative food chain in this town. It's that middle part of the food chain that should try and help the process, not try to impose their belief. I think a lot of good songs get lost and a lot of artists' careers get diluted in that process. What was it like being a

Combine writer in those early days? There are three major watershed events in my life as far as being a musician and a songwriter. One was seeing the Beatles on the Ed Sullivan Show, one was a professor I had in school, Tony Leonardi, who was a total be-bop jazz fanatic and so inspirational. And the third is Combine. It was like being in a musical petrie dish. [Bob] Beckham was one of the last of the old school publishers. He had an uncanny ability to find one-of-a-kind characters. A lot of it was serendipity; it was a small in-house organization, and Beckham didn't even allow us to write with anyone outside of Combine, which was great because it allowed me to hang around someone like Dennis Linde, who I think is one of the true geniuses of Nashville. I got to be around people like Steve Earle and John Scott Sherrill and Tim Krekel—people who were trying to do what I was trying to do. We were like a gang. If you could

have any three people from any time in history over to dinner, who would they be? Jesus, Marilyn Monroe and John Lennon.

as EQ and playlist editors pictured above) that make it worth considering. WinAmp is a fully featured shareware program, so it is also a good choice for those on a budget.




Likewise, MacAst is included in this list because MacAmp is the most popular Macintosh MP3 player. Like WinAmp, MacAst does not have ripping/encoding capabilities, so a standalone ripper/encoder will be needed to generate MP3s. Again, advanced users will like the extra features MacAst has to offer them.


CONNECT THE DOTS

So you have made a totally objective decision and selected one of the all-in-one utilities listed above. There is nothing tricky about the installation process, just install the software as you would any other. For most of us, that means clicking "yes" and "ok" whenever asked a question. Once installation is complete, stick an audio CD into your CD-ROM drive and launch the ripper/encoder program (AudioCatalyst, in this case).


Your screen most likely looks something like this.




Select the track of the CD you wish to make into an MP3 (you can select them all, if you wish), and click the "Grab" button. The program rips the audio CD...



...and then encodes the file into MP3.



The program will then tell you that the MP3 was copied OK by providing a Checksum.



You can now play the MP3 by clicking the "Player" button in the ripper/encoder. The buttons on the MP3 player look and operate similar to a CD player. The Play List Editor allows you to string MP3s together so that you can listen to one right after the other.



One final interesting thing you can do to your MP3 is give it an ID tag so it doesn't have to go by the mundane name of "Track 2" any longer. Once the the ID tag is established, you never have to wonder about what you are listening to again.



The default settings on these software programs are usually pretty close to where they need to be. However, I have always had to change at least one thing on every computer I have installed ripper/encoder software on—it's called "rip offset." Without going into too much detail about why this needs to be changed, the rip offset tells the computer to ignore the first few pieces of information it receives from the CD-ROM drive. Doing this eliminates a "pop" that the CD-ROM drive is likely to create when reading the audio CD.

If you hear a "pop" after creating your first MP3, access the "General Settings" menu. Simply eliminate a few frames of audio until the "pop" disappears. Telling the computer to spin-up the CD-ROM drive before reading the audio may help, also.



CUT THE CHORD

So now you have this neat little file on your computer that you can play any time you want. It sounds just like a CD, only you don't need your CD player to listen to it. It's...nice, but probably seems somewhat innocuous. At this point you may be wondering what the hubbub was about in the first place.

The turmoil over MP3s surfaced when they freed themselves from desktop computers. Earlier this year, Diamond Multimedia introduced the Rio. The Rio wasn't the first portable MP3 player, but it was the first to be marketed by a corporation as large as Diamond Multimedia. The Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) attempted to prevent Diamond Multimedia from selling the device until copyright safeguards were in place, but ultimately lost the case. Diamond countersued the RIAA, and once everyone agreed to disagree, they settled their differences out of court.

The result of all this legal squabbling is that there are now more than two-dozen hardware MP3 players available to the consumer. They range from rack-sized home stereo units to in-dash car units and walk-man-sized portables. Portable MP3 players are the least expensive and most popular.

Here are a few things you should look for in a portable MP3 player:

- Memory—More memory equals more music.
 As a general rule, 1 MB of memory equals
 1 minute of music. Therefore, 32 MB should be the acceptable minimum. Also look for players with memory expansion capabilities.
- Transfer Rate—The speed at which MP3s get out of the computer and into the portable player. The higher the transfer rate, the less time you spend waiting. USB ports are the fastest, followed by parallel ports. Avoid serial ports at all costs, unless you relish waiting on your computer.
- Features—EQ controls, a built-in FM radio, an organizer, and high quality headphones are just a few of the bells and whistles that some MP3 players offer. Decide which features are important to you.
- Software—Some portable players come bundled with great ripper/encoder software. If your portable player doesn't have good software, you may find yourself purchasing some.
- Signal-To-Noise Ratio—This tells you how loud the music is in relation to the "background" noise or "hiss." The higher this number, the better. Avoid a signal-tonoise ratio of less than 80 dB.
- Design—The great thing about portable MP3 players is their small size and durability. Some players compromise function for form. Magnesium-cased units are generally regarded to be more durable than their plastic-cased counterparts.

NOTABLE PORTABLES

Now that you know some of the things to look for, here's an overview of some the best handheld MP3 players. (Note: Prices were not available for all models.)

Creative Labs is no newcomer to the multimedia realm, so it's no surprise that the Nomad is a solid package. The Nomad comes with several unique features, including an FM tuner, voice recording capabilities, and an equalizer. It also recharges its batteries while files are being transferred through its parallel port cradle. The Nomad has 32 MB of memory internally and an additional 32 MB of memory in the expandable SmartMedia memory slot. A full-featured version of MusicMatch is included, and the Nomad's

audio manager has drawn high praise from many users. This player is assembled in a classy magnesium case.

The company that started the portable MP3 player revolution less than a year ago has already followed-up with a second-generation portable player, available in December. The Rio 500 sports more memory (64 MB), a USB port connection (a blessing for Macintosh users), and a trio of colors (metallic gray, translucent teal and translucent purple).

The Rio 500's older sibling, the 300, is still available at a reduced price. The Rio 300 has less memory (32 MB), a parallel port, and several color variations (including camouflage). All Rios come bundled with MusicMatch Jukebox LE and Diamond Multimedia's own version of an audio manager.



Eiger Labs MPMan F20 OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$200 URL: www.eigerlabs.com

It is a little-known fact the MPMan was actually the first portable MP3 player. The F20 is the second generation player from Eiger Labs, and is the only portable MP3 player to have a MegaBass EQ setting.



i2Go eGo OS: Windows 95/98, Macintosh Price: \$269 (64 MB), \$349 (96 MB) URL: www.i2go.com

This device is really nifty. Brand new on the market, the eGo is touted as "the portable for your hip or for your car," which makes one think it is pretty big. However, it's physical dimensions are not much bigger than other portable players in this class. The distinguishing characteristic of the eGo is the compact Flash II memory. Flash II memory is compatible with the new IBM microdrive (see sidebar). With two Flash II memory slots, the iGo could conceivably store 680 MB of MP3s—that's over 12 hours of CD quality music. From the factory, you get your choice of a 96 MB or 64 MB Flash RAM card. In addition to its headphone and line-output jacks, the eGo has a built-in speaker.



I-Jam MP3 Player OS: Windows 95/98, Macintosh Price: \$219.95 URL: www.ijamworld.com

The I-Jam wants to be your workout buddy. A durable neoprene shell covers the smallest of the portable MP3 players. This player does not have any built in memory. Instead, it comes with two SanDisk MultiMedia cards that fit in the SanDisk memory slot. Each 16 MB card costs about \$20.00, and the unit comes with a memory card drive which plugs into your parallel port on the computer (a USB memory card drive will is now available). The I-Jam therefore requires an additional step in the MP3 process-loading MP3s onto the SanDisk cards before loading the cards into portable player. This player also has the most elaborate EO and an FM tuner.



Pontis MPlayer3 OS: Windows 95/98, Macintosh Price: \$190 URL: www.mplayer3.com

About the only thing the Pontis MPlayer3 has going for it is that it is Macintosh and Linux compatible. It's the biggest, slowest (thanks to its serial port connection), and has virtually no memory (16MB). It also appears to be the least durable of all the players reviewed, with sliding doors for the batteries and memory cards.



RFC Distribution jazPiper MV32P OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$189 URL: www.jazpiper.nl

The jazPiper includes a built-in organizer that can store up to 250 names and phone numbers. It contains 32 MB of memory (expandable to 64 MB with the addition of SmartMedia). It also contains the most fully featured voice recorder and an equalizer with four preset levels. However, bundled software is somewhat skimpy—an unregistered version of Cowan Jet-Audio which must be registered to rip/encode more than one track at a time.



Sensory Science Rave MP2100 OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$299.95 URL: ww.sensoryscience.com

The Rave attempts to distinguish itself from the competition by including an elaborate built-in electronic organizer. The organizer can store up to 4,000 telephone numbers and has built-in voice recording capability. It is also the only portable MP3 player to include a truly high quality set of Sennheiser earphones. The 64 MB Rave connects via parallel port and comes bundled with AudioCatalyst and FreeAmp.

Samsung is hoping that the Yepp will help launch its own encryption system (SecuMAX), which was designed to eliminate piracy. The Yepp also stores and plays MP3 files with its 32MB of memory. Other Yepp Series players (the Yepp D and the Yepp E) have voice recording and radio tuner capabilities.



BELMONT UNIVERSITY Casio E-100 OS: Windows 95/98 Price: \$449 URL: www.casio.com

The Casio E-100 is not a dedicated MP3 player. Some players strive to be a player first and an organizer second, but the E-100 is a Personal Information Manager (PIM) first and an MP3 player second. Nonetheless, it is currently the only PIM capable of playing MP3s. This feature is derived from the fact that it is the only PIM with a headphone jack. The E-100 runs Windows CE, which is stripped down version of the Windows 95/98 interface. It also has voice recording capability. The E-100 is the largest gadget (5.11" x 3.26" x .78") and the most expensive, but it is undoubtedly the most powerful. If you want to free your MP3s from your desk, but can't justify spending \$200 for a portable player alone, the E-100 may be your best option.

WHAT'S NEXT

As with all things electronic, digital music compression is constantly transforming. When it goes on sale in December, the Diamond Rio 500PMP will support the newly developed Secure Digital Music Initiative format (SDMI) in addition to MP3s. Diamond has already stated that its next generation of MP3 players will support the IBM microdrive (see sidebar). Watch for other manufacturers to follow suit with more memory and playback capabilities.

Which digital music format (MP3, SDMI, LiquidAudio, SecuMax) ultimately prevails is somewhat irrelevant. All digital audio works pretty much the same way, and all digital audio can be manipulated rather easily. It isn't hard to get involved in the "revolution." Once you discover how easy it is, you might even find that you enjoy being a revolutionary.



Mighty Mini

No, that's not trick photography, those are real golf balls next to the new IBM microdrive. It comes in two configurations—a 170MB version and a 340 MB version. The microdrive uses an adapter to fit into PC Card Type II slots, or it can fit into Compact Flash+ Type II slots that are becoming increasingly common among handheld devices. Numerous companies have pledged support for the microdrive, including: Diamond Multimedia, Kodak, Clarion, Nikon, Minolta, Samsung, and Sanyo. Global Positioning Systems (GPS), wearable PCs, and personal audio players are all expected to be practical applications of this amazing technology.

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It's A Wide, Wide World; Jack Ingram Calls Out

The world wide web continues to expand the horizons of musicians and music lovers in every genre. It seems every day another four or five web sites are launched for the melodically inclined. There's Napster — www.napster.com/— a veritable ABC of MP3 and a scary look at "the future of MP3 music through a virtual trading community." If you're one of those concerned with the proliferation of free MP3's, check out this one.

Another site for fringe dwellers/shoppers: Essential Media — www.essentialmedia.com/ A guide to the "best" of alternative culture in print, sound, video.

And then there's my favorite new site—though it can be a bit confusing to navigate—an internet radio network: www.gogaga.com. You can tune in to a variety of homespun radio formats, including world beat (www.eardrum.com), ska/reggae (www.dubwire.com); and my favorite, www.twangbox.com; classic country bluegrass, rockabilly and more. We'll be looking at issues surrounding independent music and the net in the months to come. In the meantime...

 JazzGarage has created an alternative way to release, publish and market original jazz music to a worldwide audience in MP3 format. Musicians publish their original jazz

compositions and members download music on a cost-per-tune basis. JazzGarage is the first music publishing entity that allows musicians to upload their music for free and directly benefit musicians with a 50% share of the member download fees. Members can sample at no cost, and download original jazz music arranged by genre, geographic origin and artist at 70¢ per song.

Ingram's got songwriting heart and musical grit that falls somewhere between Merle Haggard and Steve Earle. On this Lucky Dog debut, Ingram either wrote or co-wrote 11 of the 12 tunes, sharing credit with such stellar roots writers as Bruce Robison, Todd Snider and Jim Lauderdale. The litmus test for me is how it plays at home. I found myself walking around the house snapping my fingers, grooving, and meandering back into the music room for the tunes that suggest a more tender aire-those are wonderful and sometimes surprising. But Ingram's power is clearly in the rockers thanks in large part to his razor sharp team, the Beat Up Ford Band. The power house honky tonkers include "How Many Days," "Barbie Doll" and "Mustang Burn," a revved-up number that reportedly caused at least one Music Row publicist to get a speeding ticket. So maybe you should not listen while driving. But by all means, listen. #

"Oh, man. Some of these songs just don't cut it," frets WBCT's Doug Montgomery. With the exception of the week's only new release, "Smile" by Lonestar, there isn't much cause for collective optimism on the SongPower Index. Comparing the week's scores with SPI research reveals only one song—Lonestar again—has a lock on even reaching the top 40. Only two returning songs exhibit any positive momentum. Still, absent our panel's agreement on definitive hits, individual reporters do find plenty to like. And they all seem to agree on Lonestar's single, which has a better than average (56%) shot at the top five, based on its SPI of 8.38.

"BNA has found the perfect way to follow up an eight-week No. 1 single," says Lance Houston at WTXT. "This is a flat out stone cold smash," agrees KEEY's Gregg Swedberg. "What a brilliant play on BNA's part to follow up a major No. 1 with another that likely will be. Lonestar will be at a whole new level after this one is done. Just the thing for the Fall book. Easily the best song in the batch." Karen Williams at WCOW says, "I predict another hit for Lonestar! Lonely Grill is a great album. too." KBUL's Tom Jordan wonders if a change of pace might be in order. "Great song," he says, "but is this the right time to follow a song like 'Amazed' with another ballad that isn't as strong? We'll definitely play it, but I think an uptempo would have been better at this point to keep the momentum moving." WSTH's Ted Turner has no problem with BNA's song selection. "We fired up the phones by using this as the pick it or kick it song of the week. The phones lit up more for this song than any song we've ever used. Could be bigger than 'Amazed."' KGEE's Boomer Kingston adds, "Our listeners are smiling for this one with instant hot phones." Kelly Thompson at KXKC says, "Perfect follow up to this year's strongest

country needs is more male listeners to the format," he says. "Aaron will certainly give my country what it needs." Jordan concurs. "Aaron Tippin is exactly what this country station needs." KRRV's Scott Bryant, however, taps the word play to Tippin's detriment. "What this country needs are better written songs than this one." Kingston's cryptic quote is, "Mom once said if you don't have anything nice to say, don't say anything at all." Thompson is listening to the opinions that count, "Trust me, play this song. My phones haven't stopped since spin one, and it has been my most requested song eight days in a row. Males and females are calling for Tippin." WFMB's Mark Phillips closes with vet another twist on the song title. "What this country needs is more songs that sound like this," he says. "We added it a week ago and it's getting requests."

"Cold Hard Truth" drops more than half a point this week for **George Jones**. "The Cold Hard Truth is, how many 'country pds' will actually play this on their station?" asks Jordan. "I will. We are country and this is what it's all about...being able to play a rockin' Shania and George on the same station." Swedberg smirks, "I'm waiting for the one-

minute Alan Jackson live version."

The SPI number for "Little Bird" indicates obvious mixed feelings among programmers for the **Sherrié Austin** tune. "This song grabbed my attention from the first listen," says Bryant

affirmatively. "Has hit written all over it." Houston, however, says, "I think there are much better cuts on the Sherrié Austin album than the current single."

Keith Harling's "Bring It On" drops for the second week in a row. KSOP's Debby Turpin is on the bandwagon, though. "Cool, haunting song. Keith's vocals are killer." Houston agrees with the latter, but not the former. "I'm very impressed with the much improved sound of Keith's voice on this single, but the song is in the average department."

"God Gave Me You" holds steady this week for **Bryan White**. "Best thing I've heard from him in a long time," cheers Houston. "It's nice to have Bryan back doing what really got him rolling." In the "what's he really saying" department, Swedberg offers, "Well, it's much better than the last one."
