



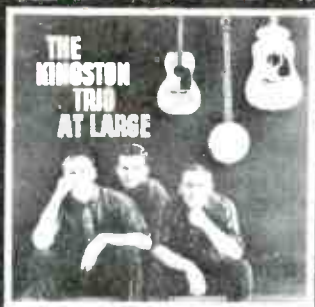

EXPOSE VS. LIFE

On July 25, the citizenry of Moscow will have a chance to view a "complete picture of American life" as represented by hi-fi and stereo music, Pepsi Cola, a doughnut machine, symphonic music, the products of some 500 exhibiting manufacturers, and possible ad lib performances by any American performers who happen to be in Moscow at the time.

The American National Exposition will open simultaneously with the Russian counterpart

which takes place in the New York Coliseum. Directing officials of the Moscow exhibition stated that since the exhibit was intended to be unbiased and without reference to political, military or other controversial matters, "some aspects of rock and roll music would not be suitable." However, some of the recorded music will be rock and roll and jazz, since "these could not be entirely omitted in a representation of American life."

Kingston Trio's great new album is titled "Kingston Trio at Large." They escaped from "Tijuana Jail."

"I don't mean to suggest," said Copland, "that jazz is not the proper interest of intellectuals, but I am thinking in terms of balance."

Lazy musicians will no doubt applaud the results of recent research into the physical strain of trumpet playing. The medics decided that a trumpeter ideally should be lying flat on his back and that it is safer to sit than to stand. It was also determined that the trumpet requires greater pressure to play than

any other instrument and that the holding of high notes can cause dizziness or blackouts.

We have a mental picture of Stan Kenton's trumpet section lying flat on their collective backs during a concert. This could give rise to a new art form called "horizontal jazz."

Ricky Nelson recently scored in "Rio Bravo," a pic which also starred a gent of considerable vocal talent, Dean Martin.

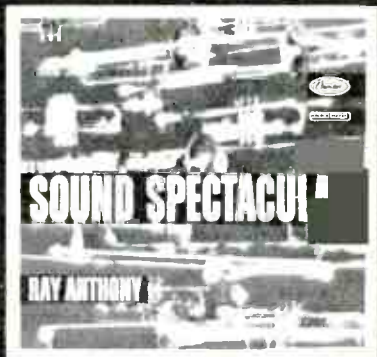
