All polar bears are left-handed.

'Get Busy Living, Or Get Busy Dying'

That's the signature line from one of the greatest movies ever, "The Shawshank Redemption." It's one of those handful of films that, when I turn on the TV and it's playing, I pretty much drop whatever I'm doing and watch the rest of the movie. Therefore, it was a bit ironic that when I asked Ed Hill, PD at Citadel's KUBL (K-Bull 93)/Salt Lake City, to write a guest column for last Friday's (April 18) R&R, he came back with a topic about creativity or, as he sees it, the lack of it on country radio now, and he used "Shawshank" as an analogy. As Hill put it, "Like Andy Dufresne (played by Tim Robbins) and Red (Morgan Freeman), country radio is in creative prison, and it's time for us to break out. We can do it with a plan that includes hope, freedom and redemption. But can you do what Andy did? Is it worth it?"

Usually I'd hesitate to give away a movie story line, but "Shawshank" is so good, it's worth watching even if you know the ending. And knowing the story is important here because what the central character, Andy Dufresne, did over a period of years was slowly tunnel his way out of prison using a small hammer while brilliantly covering his tracks. Ed Hill's contention is that country radio is creatively challenged right now. His solution? "We need to keep digging diligently every day to find that creative escape that country radio so desperately needs. I've escaped quite a few times in my career. I've masterminded some plans that would make Andy Dufresne proud. But I always end up back in the joint. Because when I'm not creating, I'm dying in prison; I need to create and free myself. Creative prison is hell. And too many stations in our biggest markets are incarcerated now."

Hill was careful not to specifically call out anybody, but he did share some general observations about a couple stations he'd spent time monitoring on the internet. "I wasted three hours one afternoon listening to a top 15 station's afternoon talent — a well-known and well-respected veteran of our format. In three hours on a Friday, that talent had no callers on the air, no contesting, no artist info and nothing relating to anything about his very beautiful town. No happiness, joy or excitement. Nothing. I did not feel anything. He said the *same* thing exactly the *same* way in 90% of his breaks, and he was not tracked. Abysmal. Recently, I had a two friends visit one of the largest American cities and tell

me how disappointed they were at the sound of this influential station. They called it slow, unimaginative. They said that station was lucky it did not have a competitor. Wow. I listened; my friends were right."

Hill believes there are four key reasons country radio is in a bad spot, creatively.

- 1. Clutter, entertainment and the *now*: "Too many country PDs are using the old rules regarding clutter, entertainment and 'the now.' Good clutter can be awesome. We need to scream for attention these days!"
- 2. Fear of the personal stamp: "Too many PDs are either afraid or unable to put their personal stamp on their station. K-Bull 93 is me. Loud. Aggressive. Fun. Stupid, cheesy, phat and fearless. Cluttered, crazy and kind. Big-hearted, emotional and competitive. Vibrant, alive and real. If you are afraid to express yourself, then your station has nothing to say. And that is what the listeners will perceive. Nothing."
- 3. Lack of passion for creativity and music: "You must be able to be moved by a song. A vocal. The words. You must be able to cry when you hear something that moves you."
- 4. "Too many scientists, not enough creationists. This is the most dangerous creative prison to be stuck in. It's a self-imposed maximum-security prison of numbers and averages. Too many times when discussing programming, I've heard about branding, strategy, research and not enough about creativity, writing and emotion."

Hill encouraged all programmers to "always stay excited about your station; I am about mine." Finally, Hill summoned that famous quote again, challenging programmers to "get busy living, or get busy dying," adding, "I'm in prison now, planning another escape. I've got a hammer, a tunnel and a big poster. I'm ready to crawl through it again. See you on the other side." I'm always curious to hear feedback on the country column in **R&R** or anything you see here, but this week, I'm especially curious. The guest column in the April 18 **R&R** by Hill was a good read. I hope if you haven't seen it yet, you'll find it and check it out.

Clear Channel Buyout Still Anything But Clear

There was more court action last week, and we don't mean tennis or the start of the NBA playoffs. No, this was more legal wrangling over the not-so-clear Clear Channel bid to become a private company again. Remember those six banks Clear Channel is suing over their refusal to finance the company's \$19.5 billion buyout? According to an April 18 article in Bloomberg.com, they've asked the Texas Supreme Court to stop the case while it considers their appeal. On April 11, Texas judge Joe Frazier Brown rejected a request by the banks — Citigroup, Morgan Stanley, Credit Suisse Group, Royal Bank of Scotland Group, Deutsche Bank and Wachovia — to dismiss the lawsuit which accuses them of backing out of the deal they made to fund Clear Channel's acquisition by Thomas H. Lee Partners and Bain Capital. The banks asked the Texas Supreme Court to rule on their new request by Tuesday

Between the initial telecast and the repeat, 9.1 million people watched Taylor, Trace, Kellie and all the other big winners. Not since last year's premier of "Dale," the movie about NASCAR legend Dale Earnhardt, have ratings been so high. CMT also reported more than five million votes were cast online by fans who ultimately picked the winners. But here's where the good people at CMT became especially Nobel-worthy. The network has created a prosocial initiative and donated \$5,000 to each winner's



charity of choice, upping the ante for Video of the Year to \$10,000. That means Taylor Swift's win for "Our Song" netted St. Jude Children's Research Hospital \$15,000 when you tack on the \$5,000 from Brad Paisley's comedy win for "Online." By nabbing three wins, Kellie Pickler basically wrote a \$15,000 check to AARP Foundation's Grandparent Program.

ON THE CHARTS

Strait Pads No. 1 Lead; Otto Gets Key To Indicator Penthouse

Country Music Hall of Fame member **George Strait** widens his lead as the artist with the most country chart-toppers, as "I Saw God Today" (MCA Nashville) becomes his 43rd trip to the R&R Country summit (2-1). He matched Conway Twitty's longtime lead with 40 No. 1 songs when "She Let Herself Go" topped the chart in January 2006, surpassed Twitty's lead when "Give It Away" ruled for two weeks in September 2006 and logged his 42nd No. 1 when "It Just Comes Natural" reigned for two weeks in February 2007. Strait first topped the chart with "Fool Hearted Memory" in August 1982.

Strait's new song draws 32.1 million audience impressions during the tracking week, with spins

detected at each of the 108 stations monitored by Nielsen BDS for chart tabulation. He captures No. 1 with an increase of 433,000 impressions.


Alan Jackson has another stellar week, repeating his double Most Added honors on both charts. This week, Jackson aggregates 71 adds between the two chart panels, six more than he turned in last week. Jackson's "Good Time" (Arista Nashville) nets 39 adds on the Indicator panel and collects 32 on the R&R Country panel.

Meanwhile on the R&R Country Indicator chart, Strait's song is nudged out of the top slot by **James Otto**'s "Just Got Started Lovin' You" (Raybaw/Warner Bros./WRN), which gains 134 spins and steps 2-1. Not to be outdone in the bullet column, Strait's song improves 93 plays and bullets at No. 2 (1-2). Otto's first chart-topper outpaces Strait by 90 plays. He bullets at No. 3 on the R&R Country list, up 907,000 impressions.

There's some movement this week on the Indicator Exclusives roll, topped again by **Trent Willmon**'s "Broken In" (Compadre/Music World/Quarterback), which advances 46-45. **Jeff Bates**' "Don't Hate Me for Lovin' You" (Black River) improves 47-46, followed by a 55-51 leap by **Rick Huckaby**'s "I Got You Covered" (HeadCoach). **Mark Chesnutt**'s "When You Love Her Like Crazy" (Lofton Creek) debuts at No. 54, ahead of a 57-55 move by **Katie Armiger**'s "Make Me Believe" (Cold River/Nine North) and a 59-57 spike by **Jennifer Hanson**'s "'73 (Everything Changes)" (Universal South).

Also noteworthy on the R&R Country chart is an 11-9 hike by **Lady Antebellum**'s "Love Don't Live Here" (Capitol Nashville). The rookie trio's debut single cracks the top 10 in its 29th chart week, the longest top 10 climb by a new artist's lead track since labelmate Luke Bryan's "All My Friends Say" needed 31 weeks in August 2007.




