

Radio Rates ACM Awards

There were roughly 12,000 people who attended the 43rd annual Academy of Country Music Awards on Sunday night at the MGM Grand Garden Arena. Everybody else watched them on TV, so it's always fascinating to compare the two experiences. Talk to most radio programmers about the show, and you'll get some really strong feedback about performances, the host, surprises and memorable "water cooler" moments that take place every year. Travis Moon, PD at Bonneville's WUBE/Cincinnati, gave Reba McEntire high marks for her 10th time hosting the awards. Moon was in the crowd Sunday night and says he "got goosebumps" giving both George Strait and Garth Brooks standing ovations in the same night: "How often do we get to do that?!" Moon also cited Kenny Chesney's live performance and called Sugarland's new song "terrific," but wished Trace Adkins was given time to perform his entire song "Then They Do." Scott Lindy of Sirius Satellite Radio mentioned Sugarland's performance too, saving the end "where Jennifer Nettles and Kristian Bush fall backwards off the stage in silhouette at the end of a killer — killer! — new song was pretty cool." Gregg Swedberg of Clear Channel's KEEY (K102)/Minneapolis and Tonya Campos, PD at Mt Wilson Broadcasters' KKGO/Los Angeles, both singled out Keith Urban's pit performance, where he was surrounded by fans. "How good is Keith Urban?" That was Swedberg, asking a rhetorical question, then quickly answering it himself: "Yeah, that good. A seemingly effortless song that was dead on with the studio version." Campos called Urban's impromptu-looking jam session "different, a nice change." The performance of the night however seems to be a consensus: Taylor Swift. "I loved Taylor Swift's performance where she dressed as Avril Lavigne. That one will move some product this week on Soundscan," says Tom Jacobsen of Regent's WGNA/Albany, N.Y. Ditto for Buzz Jackson from Citadel's KIIM/Tucson. "Holy crap, Taylor Swift's performance was awesome, but doesn't she know about the water shortage?"

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WKKT KUBL KNTY WBCT WBCT WOHK Other random comments came in about Leann Rimes looking like a rocker chick and sporting a chiseled body; Miranda Lambert's surprising win for Album of the Year, and Brooks & Dunn winning Duo of the Year for the gazillionth time, which surprised some who thought Sugarland might walk off with that trophy. After all, they'd already won Single and Song of the Year honors for "Stay."

But somewhere in all the post-show analysis and Monday morning quarterbacking, you're going to get comments about the sound quality of the TV broadcast. It seems to be the final, frustrating bugaboo left for producers of the show to figure out. Why does it sound so good in the arena - in this case, the MGM Grand Garden Arena — and not so good on TV? Regular viewers of the show have become used to at least a few sound issues: Travis Moon made a casual mention of them, saying, "It happens every year." Others are a little more harsh, with Lee Douglas from CBS Radio's KFRG/Riverside pulling no punches: "Sound problems' is putting it mildly. The TV mix made some of our best sound like they couldn't carry a tune with or without a bucket." Bill Hagy of Niniger's WXBQ/Bristol, Tenn. told R&R he couldn't even watch the entire show due to sound problems.

Chesney Completes ACM Grand Slam, Then Slams Methodology

OK, "slam" is a pretty strong word. Kenny didn't come off as a jerk or anything, but, in a classy but stern way, he did challenge this year's online fan voting as a way to choose the Entertainer of the Year, a first for the ACMs in 2008. All previous ACM Entertainer of the Year winners have been chosen by people in the industry, who are ACM members. After winning his fourth straight Entertainer trophy, which ties him with Garth for the most consecutive wins, Chesney first acknowledged the fans, saying, "This one is really extra special because, long before I had a hit record,

This Week At Callout America

Phil Vassar has his strongest researching song in many moons with "Love Is a Beautiful Thing," which spends a third consecutive week at No. 1 with country radio listeners. Females are at No. 1, men are at No. 3, and all demos rank this song overall at No. 1.

Alan Jackson moves inside the top five with "Good Time" at No. 3, up from No. 6 last week, and ranks as the No. 2 passion song. Men are the strength, ranking this song at No. 1; females are at No. 10. Younger 25-34s rank the song a No. 2, and core 35-44s are at No. 5.

Jimmy Wayne's "Do You Believe Me Now" continues to be a powerful song. At just eight weeks of age, this song has ranked in the top 10 for six weeks and in the top five for five of those. This week at No. 5 overall and kicks up the passion to No. 13. Younger 25-34s are driving the song, ranking it at No. 5 in the demo, strongly outperforming the radio spin chart with listeners.

Josh Turner is new to the top 10 with "Another Try" at No. 10, up from No. 13, and ranking as the No. 11 passion song. Core 35-44 listeners are the strength at No. 7 and No. 8 passion. Listeners 25-44 are at No. 7, up from No. 12, and at No. 11 passion.

Toby Keith is heating up with "She's a Hottie," producing big passion scores and ranking as the No. 6 passion song overall, the No. 3 passion song with men and No. 10 with females. Core 35-44 listeners rank the song at No. 5 passion.

the fans came to the shows." Chesney also said backstage, however, that he thinks the Academy made a mistake by making the award fan-voted. Calling the process a "sweepstakes," Chesney said, "I think it's a complete disrespect of the artist. It shouldn't be about pushing people's buttons on the Internet. We need to be careful about how we give this award away in the future." Chesney said

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he believes fans should be part of the process, "but not the one award every artist [makes] sacrifices to achieve." That's pretty powerful stuff from an artist who rang up \$71 million in 2007, selling 1.1 million concert tickets, and it will be interesting to see how the Academy reacts. In our interview with ACM exec. director Bob Romeo that was part of last Friday's special ACM coverage, Romeo said he hoped that more categories would move into the hands of fans as soon as next year. At least one radio guy agreed with Chesney, and the typical suggestion went something like this one from KIIM/Tucson's Buzz Jackson: "Maybe they should have created a new fan-voted award, rather than change an existing award."

I actually arrived in Las Vegas on Thursday (May 15) and, as this is being written, I'm still here, so it's fair to say I have a before, during and after perspective on this marathon weekend. There's plenty to do in Las Vegas, even without the entire country music industry landing here for several days, but, amazing as this sounds, not everybody likes to gamble, drink and stay out until the wee hours of the morning. There were other early arrivals on Thursday, and we attended a Tracy Lawrence concert with Universal South's new artist Randy Houser opening the show. Friday, the Westwood One radio remotes got underway; continuing on Saturday, which created a few challenges for the participating stations. Adding numerous interview segments to weekend programming changes the game plan a bit, especially for some stations that track weekend dayparts. There were few if any stations actually doing live shows or even segments. Every interview was recorded ahead of time, in most cases onto a laptop, edited on-site and sent back to the radio station for the jock or board-op to plug in. I was hanging out with John Paul, PD at CBS Radio's KUPL/Portland, Ore., who told me they don't even utilize the ISDN lines provided by WW1 and haven't for several years. Once he cleaned up the

audio, he simply posted it to an FTP site. Then the jock plugged the file into the digital system in the studio, and ta-da! A backstage interview. All interviews were packaged, with staging running into and out of the piece. Paul told me KUPL ran three per hour on Friday during afternoon drive and cut down to two per hour for Saturday. This was the typical plan for most stations I spoke with. Both Friday and Saturday were long days for the stations and its crews. The artists flowed in nonstop for hours on end — all day basically, which is exhausting. Several people told me by the middle of the day they were tired of hearing themselves talk and ask questions.

Saturday was just too jam-packed to try and do everything. There was an ACM charity motorcycle ride in the morning followed by a concert, then the ACM Celebrity Golf Tourney. Naturally, I tended to gravitate toward the radio remotes to watch how this was being executed, but once Saturday's sessions were done, my colleagues Ken Tucker, Wade Jessen and I attended the new artists show. The ACM presented all nominees for Best New male, Female and Group or Duo (with the exception for The Wreckers, who are not a duo anymore). Each artist was allowed to perform two songs, and, because the show was a fundraiser for the ACM charities, there was also plenty of information about how the money was raised and spent in addition to a live auction.

New Female Artist nominee Sarah Buxton had probably one of the best backup bands, like, ever, because it was Keith Urban's band, complete with its regular lead guitar player ... Keith Urban! Though it was only two songs, what was impressive was how Urban stayed in the background, not trying to take Buxton's moment. He did provide background vocals on her cover of the Bellamy Brothers' "Let Your Love Flow," however. Sunday morning, two labels threw brunches with short performances: Decca had One Flew South in its suite, while Universal South invited a ton of radio folks to see the Eli Young Band.

ON THE CHARTS

A Fitting Farewell To Eddy Arnold; Paisley Lengthens No. 1 Siege

Country Music Hall of Fame member **Eddy Arnold** returns to the R&R Country chart for the first time in a quarter-century as "To Life" (RCA) takes the Hot Shot Debut at No. 49. Arnold's chart history reaches across seven decades, starting when "Each Minute Seems a Million Years" peaked at No. 5 on sister publication *Billboard*'s country chart in 1945. Arnold most recently appeared on the airplay chart when "The Blues Don't Care Who's Got 'Em" had a brief run in early 1983. His country singles chart history during the '90s is represented by one retail title, a duet with LeAnn Rimes on his signature song, "Cattle Call" (Curb), which charted briefly in late 1999 and early 2000 on *Billboard*'s Top Country Singles Sales list.

RCA began soliciting airplay on "To Life" as a 90th birthday tribute the week before Mr. Arnold died on May 8 at age 89. He would have turned 90 on May 15, the day that most of the airplay occurred. Arnold topped the country radio scorecard 28 times during his chart career, most recently when "Then You Can Tell Me Goodbye" led for two weeks in October 1968. Meanwhile, newly crowned Academy of Country Music (ACM) Male Vocalist of the Year **Brad Paisley** notches his 11th No. 1 with "I'm Still a Guy" (Arista Nashville), the fourth chart-topper from his "5th Gear" album, which now joins Rodney Atkins' "If You're Going Through Hell" as the only albums to yield four No. 1 singles since Tim McGraw's "Set This Circus Down" in 2001-02. The new No. 1 is also Paisley's seventh consecutive No. 1 (discounting seasonal tracks), the format's best No. 1 run since Toby Keith fired seven straight No. 1 rounds, a streak that concluded with "Who's Your Daddy" in December 2002. Paisley logs a second week atop the R&R Country Indicator chart.

Taylor Swift turns heads with a double win in the Most Added race, as "Should've Said No" (Big Machine) collects 56 adds. Swift's new song inks 31 new reports on the R&R Country Indicator panel, while the R&R Country stations chime in with 25 new commitments. She takes the week's highest bow on the Indicator chart at No. 50 and opens at No. 59 on the R&R Country list.

On the Indicator Exclusives list, Trent Willmon's "Broken In" (Compadre/Music World/ Quarterback) extends its run as the highestranking title at No. 47, followed by Jeff Bates' "Don't Hate Me for Lovin' You" (Black River) at No. 52. Mark Chesnutt's "When You Love Her Like Crazy" (Lofton Creek) posts a 55-53 jump, and Rick Huckaby's "I Got You Covered" (HeadCoach) bullets at No. 54. Charlie Allen's "See If I Care" (Spinville) completes the Indicator Exclusives list at No. 60.
