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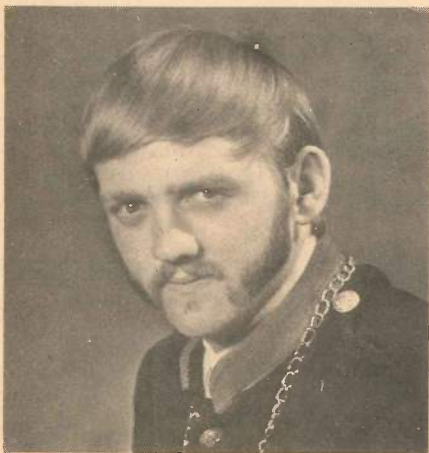

Collectors making Osaka Music

Vancouver: Warner Bros/New Syndrome recording group, The Collectors have been commissioned to lay down 30 minutes of music for the seven building complex of the Canadian Pavilion at Expo '70 to be held in Osaka Japan. Most of the music will be written by members Bill Henderson and Claire Lawrence. The group will also be involved in a Film Board feature film, as yet to be named. The film will feature a bus and it's trip through the ten provinces commencing in British Columbia and returning to this west coast port. Complete with the mud and what have you picked up on its trip, the bus will be loaded onto an Osaka bound steamer to become an important part of the Canadian display.

The Collectors have also written the score for the stage production of "Grass & Wild Strawberries" which is scheduled for a three week engagement at Vancouver's Playhouse Theatre. Jack Herschorn, manager of the Collectors, reports that 16 of these days have been completely sold out. January 3 the group will release, on Warner Bros/New Syndrome, their second album, under title of "Grass & Wild Strawberries".

Although only together for two years, The Collectors have become somewhat of a prize in the recording industry. Their first album for the WB label has already surpassed 40,000 sales and is currently selling well in the UK. Most of their concert activity

has been somewhat restricted to the Canadian and U.S. west coasts. Their first appearance east of the Rockies was the first part of December when they headlined Ben Benjamin's "Trips Festival By Candlelight" at the Sales Pavilion in Edmonton and drew a standing ovation from the more than 3000 capacity audience.

The Collectors are comprised of Ross Turney, drums; Bill Henderson, lead guitar; Glenn Miller, bass; Howie Vickers, lead singer and Trombone and Claire Lawrence, sax, organ and flute.

The Collectors received much press on their first album release, and in particular their cut of "What Love", a one piece suite lasting 19 minutes.

A musical aggregation as potentially explosive as The Collectors could, with the proper exposure, become one of the top international groups of 1969.

BRUCE LP SCORES TOP SALES

Vancouver: Allan Bruce, currently winding up a cross country promotion for his Warner Bros Seven Arts' LP release of "My World Of Song", has found exceptional interest by broadcasters in all ten of the Canadian provinces. This interest has sparked sales in the album which have now far surpassed the usual figure for a Canadian talent album. With January being "Canadian Talent Month", the promotion crew of the WB label are expected to blanket the

nation with this already well received album.

U.S. stations bordering on Canada, who have no doubt received requests from listeners having heard Bruce selections on Canadian radio, have also become Allan Bruce oriented. Their programming of cuts from the album could influence its U.S. release.

Coming up for Bruce is a couple of taping sessions for CTV's "River Inn", the first to be aired Jan. 8th.

DEW LINE BOW SINGLE

Calgary: The Dew Line, a Western Canadian recording unit have just released their initial single under the Capitol banner. Entitled "Recipe For Love" and "Sunny Sunshine Tomorrow" (72557), the disc has apparently received the nod of several radio station hit pickers which has resulted in the group chalking up good sales and one nighter dates.

Taping took place at Gaiety Productions in Hollywood.

The young five man group is comprised of Francis Munoz, drummer and lead singer; Al Gibson, bass and vocals; Pat Murphy, piano and organ; and two lead guitarists Allan Watts and Dwayne Wells.

Much of the success of the group has been due their ability to tour thousands of miles throughout the Western Provinces in their own self contained travelling lounge which accomodates the group, their two equipment managers and \$25,000 worth of equipment.

The Dew Line are managed by Rori Enterprises, of Calgary.

"COMEDY CAFE" to follow NHL

Toronto: The CBC recently announced that Montreal's popular television production of "Comedy Cafe" will replace "Barris and Company" sometime in February.

"Cafe" which stars Barrie Baldaro, Dave Broadfoot, Peter Cullen, Joan Stuart, and Ted Zeigler, is now being seen in black and white on a monthly basis in Montreal. When it goes to the network on a weekly basis in February it will switch to colour, but will continue to originate in Montreal. This arrangement will

remain for six to eight editions.

Bruce Raymond, TV program director for the English network explained, "We're anxious not to lose the Montreal flavour of Comedy Cafe, It's achieved a good deal of critical acclaim in a very short time. However, because of the shortage of colour facilities in Montreal and the unusually heavy work load in our Toronto studios in January, Comedy Cafe can't begin weekly network telecasting until February".

Producer of "Comedy Cafe" is Dale Barnes.

MIDEM STARS TO BE VIDEO TAPED

London, Eng: The second annual Midem Festival to be held in Cannes France, Jan 18 through the 24th. will see television cameras move to video tape the all star variety galas.

The tapes are to be offered to television networks throughout North American and Europe.

Those appearing at the galas include: Mary Hopkin, Aretha Franklin, Gene Pitney, 5th Dimension, Bobby Goldsboro, Canned Heat, Wilson Pickett, John Rowles and others yet to be named.

In view of the already expected success of this year's Festival, plans have apparently been made to extend Midem '70 at which time the Festival will unveil new premises designed specially for the song fest.

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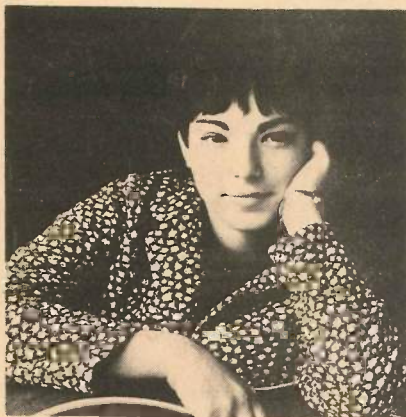

A SHINING CANADIAN STAR **DEBBIE LORI KAYE**

Toronto: When Canadian television viewers saw Debbie Lori Kaye carrying the ball in her own CBC-TV special "Hey, Little One", Monday Dec. 30, it could only add strength to the star picking ability of RPM readers who voted Debbie "Top Female Country Singer", in last year's poll.

This 18 year old tiny ball of Sault Ste. Marie talent turned out an excellent performance that could have done with a little more oomph in musical arrangements and sound. Perhaps

the Dave Thomas touch might have supplied the necessary support.

Regular viewers of CBC-TV's "Tommy Hunter Show", regarded as the top variety show in Canada, were perhaps somewhat pre-conditioned to the talents of Debbie Lori Kaye through her weekly appearances on this show, but given her own reins, Miss Kaye Certainly surpassed even the expectations of her most avid fans and no doubt gathered many more followers to the pop/country Kaye sound.

Although regarded basically as a country singer, Debbie showed fantastic pop ability with "Scarborough Fair" and "Beautiful Things". It's hoped that Debbie will keep her country image. It fits her much better, and is far more sustaining.

Columbia records has taken advantage of the television special and issued Debbie's first album for the label under the same title as the show (ELS 329).

Keeping the country image for Debbie's special was Al Cherny, who has had much success with his album outing on RCA Victor, and in tune with the music of today was that fantastic singing voice of Vancouver's Mike Campbell, who was first discovered by CBC-TV producer Ken Gibson and who is now known as

Michal Vincent. The young chanter, now being handled by Variety Artists productions is becoming an important part of the Toronto scene and is expected to cut a record session before too long.

On tap for Debbie Lori Kaye is a recording session in Germany with Debbie singing in German to be followed by a session in Israel with Debbie singing in Hebrew. Columbia also expects to release a single of Debbie's by mid-January.

ATLANTIC SIGNS CARTOONE

NYC: June Harris reports from Atlantic Records that a long term, exclusive recording contract has been signed between Atlantic and a major new British group, Cartoone. The deal was negotiated by Jerry Wexler, executive vice president of Atlantic and Marian Massey, manager of Cartoone, and Stevens H. Weiss, the

group's U.S. legal rep.

Initial album release is set for the latter part of January. Cartoone, a self contained unit of four Scotsmen, write and perform all their own material. They are: Derek Creigan, lead singer and bass guitar; Mike Allison, lead guitar; Charles Mottershead, rhythm guitar and Chick E. Coffils, drums.

Miss Harris notes "the Cartoone

sound is extremely contemporary, yet without falling into any of the established bags. Instead, it creates one of its own using a rock base, and introducing the distinctively different voice of lead singer Derek Creigan".

Producer of Cartoone is Mark London, one of the composers of "To Sir With Love".

No Canadian distributor has been named at time of writing.

TURTLES FINALLY MAKE HOMETOWN GIG

Beverly Hills: White Whale recording group, The Turtles, who have been an important part of the hit scene for almost two and a half years including over 400 concerts finally made it home to headline a night at Santa Monica Civic Auditorium Dec. 13.

The group, who recently made a fast trip up the charts with "Elenore", have never topped a major date in the Los Angeles area before. They apparently went directly into the recording industry from their Westchester High School in the Pacific Palisades area and became a big item at home strictly through their recordings.

CAROLANN GRIFFIN/IKE ISSACS GUEST ON "IT'S HAPPENING"

Toronto: The Jan. 9th and 30th editions of CTV's "It's Happening" will guest Carolann Griffin and Ike Isaacs.

The first show will feature Miss Griffin singing "Both Sides Now" and a duet with Robbie Lane in "Mornin' Glory". Ike Isaacs will sing "Magic Carpet Ride". Robbie will perform three numbers "Looking Out My Window", "I Love How You Love Me" and "A Little Help From My Friends". The Carnival, back-up group for the show will go it alone with "Privilege" and "Main Street".

On the second show Miss Griffin will sing "American Boy", and Ike Isaacs will be featured in a couple of soul hits, "I Heard It Thru The Grapevine", and "Papa's Got A Brand New Bag". Robbie will again take three numbers "The Thought Of Loving You", "In My Life" and "I'm Gonna Make You Love Me". The Carnival will perform "Bend Me Shape Me", and Do You Wanna Dance".

"It's Happening" is produced for the CTV network by Mike Steele.

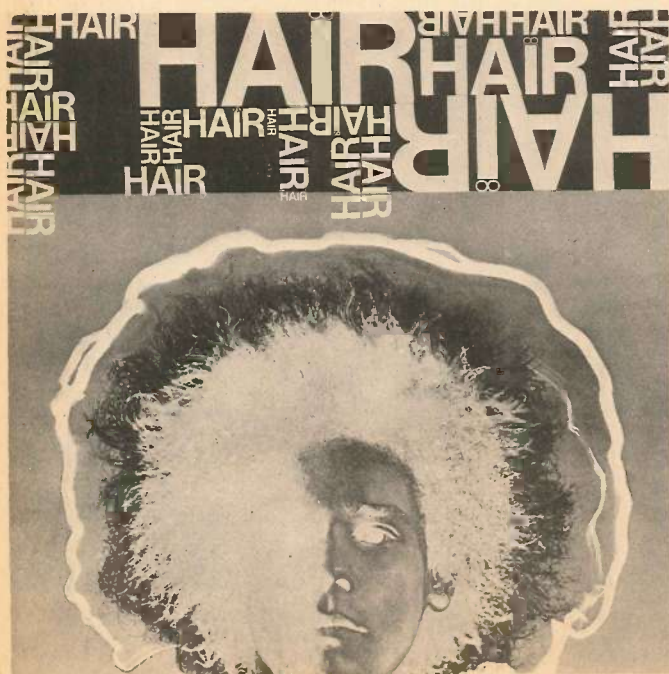

Rich Simons, promotion for Vancouver's Taylor, Pearson & Carson, reports heavy radio exposure on Andy Kim's Atlantic outing of "Rainbow Ride", "She A Lady" by John Sebastian on Kama Sutra and Wilson Pickett's Atlantic single "Hey Jude". Rich also reports that Terry Mulligan has left CKLG-FM for an indefinite period to pursue a career in local television. Tim Burge has taken Terry's on-air duties. CKLG is currently running a gigantic promotion with a specially prepared album from Atlantic-Atco for the next two weeks. All proceeds from the sale of this album go to CKLG's favourite charity.

New faces at CJME Regina belong to Mike Couchman and Brian Lang. Earl Mann, who gathered a sizeable following during his on-air duties at CHIC Brampton and later at CKEY in Toronto, is now with CHFI.

Greg Buckler, rock jock for the Evangeline Radio Network programming from CKAD in Middleton, Nova

Scotia, reports that "These Eyes" by the Guess Who on Nimbus 9, has moved to the number 5 position in only two weeks. Greg also suggests we keep our ear on the RCA Victor release of "You've Got That Lovin' Look" by Ottawa's Mythical Meadow.

Montreal's contribution to CBC Radio's "After Noon" program will originate from the bi-bi town Thursdays beginning Jan 2 at 1:15 PM EST. Hostess will be Lise Payette, who has become one of Montreal's most outstanding broadcasters. She was hostess of the popular French radio network show "Place aux Femmes" and has been featured on the CBC English radio network as hostess of "Sunday At The Fair" and as hostess of "Speak Easy". The Montreal offering will be taped the preceding day of broadcast in the 100 seat Theatre de la Place (home of the lunchtime Instant Theatre), which is in the shopping concourse of Place Ville Marie. Freda Garmaise of CBM "Magazine" fame will appear

regularly. Music will be supplied by the Yvan Landry Quartet. Announcer is Sheridan Nelson. Producer is Ramona Randall.

Ramona Randall was also producer of the CBC "Showcase" production which features Theodore Bikel skedded for airing Jan 12 at 4:03 PM EST. Bikel performed before an audience of Montreal university students and shows his versatility with a French-Canadian folk song; a Spanish love song; a 15th century song, "Peat Boy Soldiers"; a Hebrew song; and a Russian Gypsy song. Canadian folksinger Alexander Zelkine, who records for Capitol, joins Bikel in "Those Were The Days"

Hugh Curry, late of CHUM-FM has apparently incorporated a few companies, one of them being Dream Machine Ltd. He is currently on assignment from the CBC in England taping interviews with anyone and everyone of importance in the British music scene. Rumours have it he may even latch onto the new Prince of Wales for a bit of a chat.

STAN KLEES

It was recently brought to my attention that I have been writing this column for quite awhile. To be exact, it all started July the first, 1967.

The Column was originally called "What's A Nice Kid Like You Doing In A Business Like This??" It was to be a ten part series directed at young artists attempting to get into the music business.

As it often happens the ten part series never ended and became "Music Biz". To date RPM has published approximately 75 columns in this series (laughingly called "The Adventures of Stan Klees") by the editor of RPM).

The first column was called "So You Want To Be A Rock and Roll Star?" I think it bears repeating now particularly as 1969 gets started.

As you watch television, listen

to the radio and records, and read fan magazines, it all looks so easy. You learn to play a guitar and you make a record and it's a HIT, and you make a great deal of money.

That's the way smart publicists write up the overnight success of most stars, but what they fail to tell you, is exactly what this series of articles will be about. Few hits and few stars happen overnight and the very very few that do, are the ones you'll hear about most.

In the past three years I have produced approximately 150 singles. About 50% of these were never listed on the RPM "Canadian Hits" chart (The only national survey of Canadian hit action). Approximately 25% did not get above number 11, and only 10% ever got into the top 5 and approximately 5% (8 out of 150) were number 1 records in Canada. Many

were released in the U.S. but only ONE got half way up the Cash Box and Billboard charts ("My Girl Sloopy" by Little Caesar and The Consuls). So you see it is not very easy to have a hit whether you are a producer or an artist.

As bad as the Canadian figures look, let's look at the odds in the USA. There are approximately 1000 labels in the USA. Almost 100 records are released each week (singles). About 8% of these ever enter the national trade charts, 3% are by NEW artists, and my estimate of a new group or artist having a top ten record in the U.S. are about 1 in 200. Therefore the odds indicate that you have to make 200 records to have a number 1 single. Most of the positions on the charts are taken up by established artists who have had hit after hit. The odds against a NEW artist are very high.

So before you go out and buy a guitar, or start taking singing lessons, you might just follow this series of articles to see what else is against you. In the weeks to come, I will talk about making records, personal management, contracts, bookings, getting a record played on radio, unions, songwriting and publishing, promotion and many other important facets of the music industry that you should be aware of before you choose music as your career.

TOM JONES TV ALBUM

NYC: London Records has rush released the new Tom Jones LP "Help Yourself", so as to tie-in with the Welsh chanters ABC-TV spectacular, Thursday Jan. 9 at 7:30 PM EST. The show will be seen in Canada over the CTV network Jan 7 at 9 PM EST.

Appearing with Jones in his "This Is Tom Jones" special is the 5th Dimension; dancer/singer Juliet Prowse; Dick Cavett, who flew to Britain to appear in the show; and France's top songstress Mireille

Mathieu. Backing the stars in the special are the Mike Sammes Singers, the Squires group, who back Jones regularly, and Jack Parnell and his orchestra.

Jon Scoffield produced the show. Writers were Arnold Rosen, Barry Cryer and Gordon Farr, the latter, now living in Hollywood, was formerly a producer with CTV in Toronto.

London Records, on both sides of the border, will commence a large sized promo boost focusing on the new "Help Yourself" LP but

encompassing Jones' entire Parrot catalog.

Tom Jones was born in Pontypridd, South Wales on June 7, 1942. He is 6 ft, weighs 160 pounds has black hair and brown eyes. He was married at the age of sixteen and has one son.

On Feb. 7 at 7:30 PM EST, the ABC-TV network will present a 17 week series of one hour Tom Jones TV Specials. It's not known at time of writing if a Canadian network has picked up the series for Canada.

EDITORIAL

Sunday December 29th., at 10:30 PM the CBC did only what the CBC would dare to do. After delaying it's most popular program "The Way It Is" by 30 minutes for the completion of "Mark Twain Tonight", "TWII" host Patrick Watson flashed on the tube and one almost thought he was going to solo and come up with an impromptu one man show.

Watson did what only the CBC would dare to do. He did solo. Firstly he recommended several other activities including "the other" network that viewers might turn to for the 30 minutes to follow. He probably turned away a great many viewers, but what did result was possibly one

of the finest half hours the CBC has presented on television in the year 1968.

Watson's topics ranged from listener censorship, for which he tore a true but smarting piece off his viewers; advertiser's press censorship, a very true picture of what weight advertisers can exert with regard to suppression of sticky matter; parents and children, one of the finest anecdotes for the closing of the generation gap, aired to date; free information, the putting aside of news pertinent or not, until a better time; and television controversy, on which Watson must be an expert.

For those who did take Watson's

advice and went outside to roll a snowman or switched to "the other" network go our sympathies. Unfortunately the CBC doesn't make a habit of re-runs of the best of the better.

One of the prime complaints within the pseudo intellectual circles of the CBC and indeed with their viewers is the lack of a personable, knowledgeable and free thinking host of a talk show. May we suggest Patrick Watson with Ross McLean as producer and Dave Thomas looking after the musical production. It could become a Canadian habit Monday to Friday from 11:30 PM to 1 AM.

SPENCER DAVIS GROUP READYING FOURTH NORTH AMERICAN TOUR

NYC: Gen Grevatt announces that the Spencer Davis Group, who have already extended their third North American tour by three weeks, have set their fourth tour, to last eight weeks, to commence about February 25. In view of the success of their current tour it was necessary to cancel out a sold-out date in Prague, Czechoslovakia, for Dec. 22. This date has now been re-scheduled for the latter part of January. It's expected

the group will also tour Australia and New Zealand around the same date prior to their fourth North American tour.

While on campus at the University of Virginia, Davis took over as guest professor of a German class and while in New York he guested at an elementary school assembly in Monclair, N.J. where he lectured pupils on the works of Huddy (Ledbelly) Ledbetter. Accompanying himself on mouth organ and 12 string guitar, Davis gave the gathering a taste of Ledbelly blues.

CTV TO AIR CAMPBELL "GOODTIME"

Toronto: The CTV network will air "The Glen Campbell Goodtime Hour" commencing January 28 at 9 PM EST and each Tuesday thereafter.

Smo-Bros Productions, who produce the "Smothers Brothers Comedy Hour" will produce the new Campbell series, with Ken Kragen and Ken Fritz as executive producers.

Campbell hosted the summer replacement show of the Smothers Bros. and because of the popularity of his show this new series was created.


Producer is Roger Gimbel. Musical director is Nelson Riddle.

Campbell is holder of several Gold Records for sales in excess of one million. These include "Gentle On My Mind," "By The Time I Get To Pheonix" and his current top seller, "Witchita Lineman".

The popular Capitol pop/country recording artist is married and lives in Los Angeles with his wife Billie, daughter, Kelly 6, and son, Travis, aged 2.

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"LEGISLATED RADIO" - Ritchie Yorke

The two most-used words on the lips of both record people and radio station executives in Canada are "legislated radio".

But what is it all about? Is it something to do with stopping DJs from using oaths on the air, stations not giving enough news bulletins, or playing background music through commercials?

Legislated radio was, until a few months ago, the pipe dream of a few dedicated Canadian composers, producers and recording artists. They had a dream that Canadians were fully capable of making their own hit records. Most of them were trying to do it, without much success. The problem, they said, was a lack of exposure.

Prior to the last few months, visitors to Canada were dumbfounded by the almost complete lack of local pop records on the top 40 charts. A magazine survey conducted in Canada's nine major radio markets earlier this year revealed that stations were programming LESS THAN ONE PER CENT of local talent.

Obviously, something had to be wrong. Take a look at the U.S., English, Australian charts. Or anywhere else for that matter. Canada was one of the few countries (we know of no other) in the world where local talent just can't make it into the domestic record scene.

The question, of course, is who is wrong? Is Canadian talent so bad, or more precisely, do records made by Canadians in Canada sound so bad, that they don't deserve a break? Or are radio stations being anti-nationalistic, unfair, and unsympathetic to their fellow Canadians.

There appears to be guilt on both sides, but the scales lean more heavily to the broadcasters. Certainly, some Canadian record productions leave much to be desired. But more important, there are an increasing number of good, commercial records being made here, which never grace the turntables of key stations.

Although no exact figures are available, it would be fair to say that of every 100 non C&W singles produced in Canada, 60 of them will not be played by 90 per cent of the metropolitan radio stations.

The main defence offered by radio stations when confronted with such figures is that ratings would suffer if they programmed anything but proven U.S. hits. That may be true, but alternatively, it seems ridiculous that companies making their profits in Canada are not contributing to the good of the country through giving local talent a break. Not charity, but a fair chance.

The root of the problem, at this level, is that very few music directors in Canada have either the authority or the desire to pick records which haven't been charted or

predicted by Billboard, Gavin, Randall or Drake. Naturally, these sources are not picking Canadian records unless they have been released in the U.S. for the American market.

And that, as we all know, rarely happens unless a record has proven its commerciality in its domestic market.

Getting right down to the nitty gritty, no manufacturer creates merchandise that is not going to be exposed to the public. It doesn't matter whether he's in the business of baked beans, tractors or records; he must have an outlet. As it stands now in this country, the chances of such an outlet are so small that few record companies will pick up the tab on local recording sessions. The artist makes his own record, and then hustles it to the record companies. That way the company doesn't stand to lose much more than a few hundred dollars if the disc goes down the drain.

Considering that most Canadian record companies are either American owned or dominated, it says a great deal for them that they have taken the trouble to try and create domestic stars, when it's much easier to simply release parent company hits.

One should bear in mind that locally owned record companies have not done any more for Canadian talent than American-owned operations such as RCA Victor, Columbia or Capitol. In many cases, they have done less.

It's a fair assumption that Canada does have the necessary raw talent to create a local recording industry of some influence. One has only to look south of the border at the number of non-American stars who were born, raised, and gained musical education here. A partial list includes The Band (whose album, *Music From Big Pink*, is regarded as a major international trend setter on the pop scene), Steppenwolf, Ian & Sylvia, Gordon Lightfoot, Leonard Cohen, the Collectors, Kensington Market, and members of the Mamas and Papas, Union Gap, Blood Sweat and Tears, Buffalo Springfield, The Crazy World Of Arthur Brown, Rhinoceros, and many more.

True, production could be better, but that will only come when we have the best producers and engineers on tap. Money is what brings in such talent, and money only comes from sales on previous domestic hits.

Which brings us to the issue of legislation. The aforementioned band of people battling to make it in Canada have long looked at the TV situation, where to obtain a licence, an operator must program 55 per cent Canadian (or British Commonwealth) content. This ruling, although subject to all sorts of dodges (such as devoting hours of non prime time to insignificant Santa Claus parades and

sporting events) has provided the incentive for a large number of creative people to live and work in this country.

Why such a ruling was never also applied to the broadcasting scene is completely beyond most of us. It can probably be attributed to the significant lobbying strength of broadcasting in political circles.

Almost 12 months ago, the Government did away with the old and inefficient Broadcasting Control Board and set up the Canadian Radio and Television Commission.

The functions of the CRTC are broad and historic. Among other things, the Commission is to investigate the lack of Canadian content in local radio. Already, several petitions have been submitted to the CRTC supporting the idea of legislation.

This support did not come easily or in some cases, willingly. Few of us are anxious to see the diminishing freedom of the individual threatened any further. But, as some of the more bitter record producers rightly point out, they've been "battling the border" for a decade without much improvement in the situation.

Historically, Canada is a country with its industries heavily protected by various tariffs and restrictive trade agreements. No one, even if they wanted to, could import cheap wheat from say, Australia, to compete with the local industry. No one believes a domestic record industry could rival wheat as a dollar producer, but it could certainly inject new blood into a vein which has been dry for a very long time.

Radio stations often bring forward the theory that Canadians do not buy Canadian in the entertainment area. This is possibly true, but they should at least be given the opportunity of doing so. Look what has happened in other areas of the entertainment sphere in Canada - the National Ballet is widely regarded as the third best in the world, after the Bolshoi and the Royal Elizabethan; the Toronto Symphony; and new conductor, Karel Ancerl, is highly regarded in symphony circles; and the National Film Board of Canada is renowned internationally.

All this, and not one national show business personality other than Gordon Lightfoot. Even Lightfoot has sometimes experienced difficulty being programmed at some stations.

We understand that the CRTC intends to discuss the legislation issue with broadcasters in the Spring & Summer of 1969. Already, the possibility of such a legal move has forced some stations into opening their eyes to local talent. And of course, the stations, few and far between, that always have played Canadian discs, are continuing to do so.

FILM

Win Barron sends news from Paramount that Bob Newhart has been signed for starring roles in two upcoming Paramount flicks, "On A Clear Day You Can See Forever" and "Catch-22". Newhart was signed by producer Howard W. Koch to play Dr. Mason Hume, chairman of the board of a university in New York, in "Forever", which also stars Barbra Streisand and Yves Montand. Mike Nichols, director of "Catch-22" cast Newhart as Major Major, a captain in the U.S. Air Force during World War II.

"The Adventurers" which stars Yugoslavian actor Bekim Fenmiu, Candice Bergen, Ernest Borgnine, Olivia De Havilland, Charles Aznavour and Anna Moffo has been shot on location in the jungle-covered interior of the South American country of Colombia. Cast and crew now move

to Bogoto for further shooting. The film contrasts the elegance of the international "Jet Set" with the poverty and explosion of revolution in a South American republic.

Roman Polanski has been named the first recipient of the Raoul Levy Prize in France for his direction of Paramount's "Rosemary's Baby". Named for the late French producer the prize is awarded to a producer, director or actor for extraordinary achievement in motion pictures.

Mia Farrow, who starred in Polanski's "Rosemary's Baby" was recently crowned Queen of the Acapulco Film Festival following a screening of the flick to a capacity audience at the Mexican event.

Julia Phillips has been appointed to a story editor for Paramount Pictures Corporation in the New York

Office. Mrs. Phillips was formerly associate editor of fiction on and books for the Ladies Home Journal.

"Skiddoo" now drawing good houses across Canada, had its world premiere in Miami Beach. Producer/director Otto Preminger was there along with several of the film's stars including Jackie Gleason, Carol Channing, Peter Lawford and John Phillip Law. The premiere was a benefit for the Performing Arts Centre at Miami Beach. Preminger was in Toronto for the opening for which both he and his film received excellent press.

NYO IN CBC-TV SPECIAL

Toronto: A one hour CBC-TV music special "Youth and Music" Jan 8 at 10 PM EST brings the National Youth Orchestra to Canadian television viewers from coast to coast.

In the past nine years, since its inception, the NYO has built a reputation, through extremely favourable press reviews and audience popularity that they are the envy of many of our nation's professional symphony orchestras.

This special, filmed in colour at the 1968 training session in Quebec City, looks in on the 108 young musicians in classes, in rehearsal and in performance.

The NYO is comprised of musicians from eight of Canada's ten provinces and the North West Territories. Each musician had to pass a rigorous audition to qualify as a member, and for the six weeks of their intensive training and subsequent seven city tour of Quebec and Ontario, each musician had to devote up to 12 hours each day, seven days a week to become one of the "special kids" who received rave reviews for their "special music".

Under the direction of conductor Franz-Paul Decker, music director and conductor of the Montreal Symphony Orchestra, the NYO played to capacity audiences in Quebec City, Chicoutimi, Montreal, Ottawa, Sudbury, London and Toronto.

Their television special features two of their members; 19 year old Margaret Trethewey, a flautist from Montreal, and Stuart Laughton, a 16 year old trumpeter from St. Catharines, Ontario.

RITCHIE YORKE, regarded as one of the most respected pop observers in the business is the only full time pop columnist employed by any newspaper in Canada (Globe & Mail). He is also Canadian representative for Billboard. Many of Mr. Yorke's articles appear in newspapers and entertainment magazines around the world.

Works included in the special are: Nicolai's "Overture to the Merry Wives of Windsor", "Scherzo for Orchestra" by Maurice Dela, Franck's "Symphony in D Minor (3rd movement)" and Wagner's "Overture to Die Meistersinger".

During the closing credits the NYO's performance of Stravinsky's "Symphony in Three Movements" can be heard.

A PARKS-EYE VIEW OF THE CANADIAN SCENE

Well known U.S. showbiz columnist James Parks, has become one of Canada's most powerful boosters in its fight for recognition of the Canadian music industry. In his December 22, 1968 column in the New Hampshire Sunday News he writes:

"Canadian talent figures to be in strong among the winners throughout the world this coming year. Currently there is more musical talent per square mile in Canada than there is in the rest of the world but it seems that the whole world knows about it except Canada.

While Canadian talent continues to migrate to other parts of the world for recognition little is being done about the bad disc jockey situation and the talk of payola in Canadian radio.

With top producers George Taylor and Dougal Trineer considered among the best in their field of Country music, others like Doug Hutton in Calgary, Alberta; Don Grashey in Port Arthur, Ontario; Stan Klees and Gordon Hill of Toronto and Ben Kaye, Pierre Noles, Yvon Dufresne, Marty Martin and Bob Hahn, all of Montreal, are just a few of the many talented producers who have seen action in the United States and other areas.

We predict that 1969 will see the beginning of a new era for Canadian talent in that country as laws will be enacted to protect the talent from the unfair practices foisted upon by the broadcasters".

NY--(PWS)--Having money does different things to different people. Upon acquiring a good deal of gilt, some people just sit back and enjoy the material comfort it brings. Others once financially secure, cast an eye at the human condition and try to make a few changes. As of last week, The Rascals announced themselves to be in the second category. The group made clear, through their organist and spokesman Felix Cavaliere, that they were through

with the majority of American television shows and with segregated rock concerts.

"We think there are things more important than money now, and quite frankly, we're tired of seeing producers come at good groups and tell them to do a fast three minutes, then split," said Felix, making it clear that the group would not be appearing on any "establishment" television shows in the future. Since the majority of American television is establishment, this doesn't leave much for the group to appear on. They'll be showing up on public supported, educational television from now on and "The Smothers Brothers Show". At least they're trying. "added Felix.

In addition, The Rascals have announced a new concert policy, effective January first: They will not appear in concert anywhere unless half of the acts on the bill are black. "We can't control the audience," said Felix, "but we can be sure the show is integrated. So, from now on, half of the acts will be white, and half will be black, or we stay home."

The Rascals are to be commended for this, the first intelligent and constructive moves by any pop artists to do something about what's going down in the U.S.

"After Bathing At Baxter's", "The Crown Of Creation".....After that what could The Jefferson Airplane come up with as the title for their fifth album? "Bless It's Pointed Little Head" of course! But then again, the Airplane have been into strange scenes lately. Just before they left New York for a month long vacation in their hometown of San Francisco, they stayed up all night with actor Rip Torn and his wife Geraldine Page reading each other parts from Shakespeare's "Richard III". Hmmm, maybe those amplifiers at full volume do melt your brain after a while.....

Spencer Davis is getting to be quite the man about town. His new career as teacher, lecturer, and center of knowledge which became evident a few weeks ago when he did a stint as guest professor in a college German class at The University of Virginia, is blossoming. Last week Spence visited a high school just outside of New York. Wearing his pin laden Russian Czarist cap and a jacket completely emblazoned with emblems, slogans, and decals, he took the stage at the school and regaled his youthful audience with the songs of the late Huddie Ledbetter (Ledbelly). He accompanied himself on 12 string and harmonica.

Nilsson makes his television debut here with a new approach to the weekly TV show. He will sing the main title song of the show, which he has written, and will also sing lyrics commenting on the action in the story of each show, making the musical score a major element of the plot. Wonder if it will work?

Association appeared on The Ed Sullivan Show and the viewer response was so great they will be booked for six additional appearances this coming year.....Folk singer Theodore Bikel in Germany filming a television special based on the Biblical story of the prophet Heremaih.....The Move, who have been booked in the U.S. for more non-appearances than any other group, again scheduled to invade our shores. This time in late January..... Slim Harpo back at The Scene in NYC after dates around the area. Slim has captured a new white audience during his past few weeks here and one of his early albums containing "Raining In My Heart" has been reissued in the hope of putting him in the running with Albert and B.B. King for title of "Re-discovered King of the Blues".

What happens when four wealthy young men decide that there really is something wrong with the life in the U.S.A.? Well, if they happen to be The Four Seasons, they record an album about it. The group, who have been on the hit charts for some years now and have amassed a great deal of money in the process, decided that they should do a little "telling it like it is". So last year they began work on an album which would be a complete departure from their usual sing-a-long happy music. Called "Genuine Immitation Life Gazette", the album is a commentary on life and living in our time.

People expect young musicians and hippies to be upset with the way things are running in this world, but when a group of older guys, who have had financial success and are secure in their positions in the entertainment world, decided that things aren't doing too well and put their careers on the line by recording an album in protest, then maybe we'd all better sit up and listen. Even if you don't like the music they're singing, and personally, I've never been completely won over by Jake Holmes who does the music, you've got to admit that the way things are going must be pretty bad for the Four Seasons to start speaking out.

Last October Joan Baez flew to Nashville to record an album, by the time she'd finished the sessions she'd recorded three LPs, two of them made up entirely of material written by her friend Bob Dylan. This two album set, entitled "Any Day Now", will be released during the next few weeks. The cover of the album was illustrated by Joan, by the way..... "Rudolph The Red Nosed Reindeer" has sold 100,000,000 copies since Gene Autry first sang the tune back in 1949. Now the Temptations are hoping to add another million or so to the sales mark with their recording of the tune.....Three of the original Byrds now with A&M Records: Gene Clark, Mike Clarke, Chris Hillman..... Spencer Davis' new group having such a successful U.S. tour that they've extended it for three weeks and postponed their sold-out concert in

Phonodisc promotion manager Roger Stevens back from a promotion tour of South Central and the eastern counties of Ontario.
