




Greenberg & Schlachter: Scepter-Wand Records' Unbeatable Leaders. Their Story, and Label's, In This Issue

Sears, Roebuck Drops Chi. Distribs As Prime Source Of Supply Sept. 1

CHICAGO—The independent record distributors of Chicago were bracing to fight back last week as Sears Roebuck & Co. announced that effective Sept. 1, the local Chicago distributors will no longer be the firm's prime source of supply.

Frank Hendrix, Sears' record buyer stated that Sears is a national company and just because its headquarters are in Chicago is no reason why all record buying should come through the Chicago office. A letter to this effect went out to record manufacturers last week.

While Hendrix declined to specify what new procedures Sears would follow in purchasing records in the future, there were strong rumors in the trade that Al Levine and Lou Klayman might be involved in the future supplying of records to Sears, possibly through the establishment of a distributorship in Albany. The rumor further goes that this would be on a cost plus basis.

Levine & Klayman Reported To Be Future Supplier Of Wax To Sears

Although it was reported that several manufacturers had already been set with the new organization, those in authority at each manufacturer contacted denied that any deal had been set. Some said they had heard about it but had made no decision; some said they had been approached but would wait to see what other manufacturers did; and some said that their relations to their distributors were too important to jeopardize with such a move.

Meanwhile, reliable sources in Chicago stated that the distributors there had been meeting for the past week to decide how to counter this move. It was reported that one action they would take would be to force any manufacturer who went along with the new plan to take back his entire inventory and that no existing Chicago distributor would take his line. Distributors throughout the country, not only in Chicago, were watching carefully last week, trying to determine just what effect this situation might have on the record distributing picture and although no two agreed as to the outcome, they all voiced the opinion that if this move materializes, it could be the portent of major changes in the means of record merchandising in this country.

For instance, it was stated that it could hasten the day of the national distributor, who would act merely as a buying agent, operating without inventory, without promotion, without a warehouse and drop shipping to various points throughout the country. Under such a system users of records would deal with the majors through their local distributors or branches and would purchase independent manufacturers' product through one central source.

Epic & Colpix MOA Exhibitors

CHICAGO—Two more record companies, Epic and Colpix, have become exhibitors in the 1964 MOA Convention and Show to be held in the Sherman House Oct. 14, 15 and 16. This brings the list of record company exhibitors to eight.

Howard Cook, Director of Public Relations for Colpix Records, has notified MOA that Colpix will exhibit. Leonard S. Levy, General Manager of Epic Records, has also informed MOA that Epic will be an exhibitor.

Norman Morgan, Manager of the Star Title Strip Company of Pittsburgh, Pa., has also just signed a contract to exhibit in the MOA Convention & Show. This long-time MOA exhibitor has been assigned a booth in the record company section.

U. S. Billiards, Inc., of Amityville, N. Y., has been added to the list of exhibitors in the amusement machines section of the show. Albert Simon of U. S. Billiards told MOA last week that his firm would exhibit.

MOA Managing Director Fred Granger left for California recently to talk with West Coast record companies about exhibiting. En route he expected to call on MOA Director Peter Geritz of Mountain Distributors in Denver, Colo., to promote MOA memberships in that area.

Kazdin Upped To Col Music Ed

Andrew Kazdin has been promoted to the position of Music Editor, according to an announcement by John McClure, Director of Masterworks Artists and Repertoire for Columbia Records.

Kazdin is responsible to Mc-Clure for editing and re-recording tapes and producing albums as assigned Kazdin was transferred from Organization Planning and Management Development where he had been a Management Trainee since April, 1964. He received his Bachelor's degree in composition from the New England Conservatory of Music and his Master's degree from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, where he specialized in acoustics.

Dreyfus Brother Subs

NEW YORK—Stanley Adams, President of ASCAP, announced that the Soicety's Board of Directors has appointed Louis Dreyfus, President of Chappell & Co., Inc., to fill out the unexpired term on the ASCAP Board of his late brother, Max, who died on May 12.

Command Signs Tessie O'Shea

Tessie O'Shea has signed an exclusive recording contract with Command Records, according to an announcement by Enoch Light, Command's Managing Director.

The British vaudeville star made her Broadway debut last year in "The Girl Who Came to Supper" and won a Tony award for her performance. Her frequent guest appearances on the Ed Sullivan show have won her a permanent spot on the new fall CBS television series, "The Entertainers." Command plans an album with Tessie later this month.

Georgia Carr to VJ



Reeves, Manager N'ville Casualties

NASHVILLE — RCA Victor's Jim Reeves, 39, and his pianistmanager, Dean Manuel, 30, were found dead last week two days after their private plane crashed 10 miles outside of Nashville in a thunderstorm.

The disappearance of the country western star and his companion after they had left Bateville, Ark. had been the subject of a two-day search by civil defense workers, policemen and volunteers—many of them friends and colleagues of the late singer. The wreckage of the plane was found in a wooded area just off U. S. 31. Reeves' body was identified by a driver's license taken from the area.

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Darin Back At Capitol

HOLLYWOOD—Bobby Darin, whose exclusive recording pact with Capitol terminated last March at the artist's request, will sign a new contract to record solely with Capitol, it was announced last week by label President Alan W. Livingston.

The 28-year-old actor-singer first signed with Capitol in July, 1962. Five months ago, label granted Darin's request for release from his contract. During his hiatus from Capitol, Darin did not record for any other label.

In announcing Darin's return to Capitol, Livingston commented: "I am delighted to welcome Bobby back to Capitol. We at Capitol have always counted Bobby among the most talented performers in the business, and his special talent is one we want on this label. Our aim in the months ahead will be to showcase Bobby's talent as never before in his great career."

As a c/w artist and Grand Ole Opry star he had established a long and highly successful international career that recently widened further when he became a movie star. (He filmed "Kimberly Jim" in South Africa, where he was immensely popular, and the movie has just been released in this country.)

"Gentleman Jim" made a number of records that were successful on the pop market, namely "He'll Have to Go" and "Four Walls," but he was most popular on the country music circuit. His latest album "Moonlight and Roses" is currently at the top of the country LP chart.

His death adds to the long list of country stars who have died in violent car or plane accidents.




RCA Records 'Fiddler' Show

Screen Gems-Adler Terms

NEW YORK — The other parties in the Screen Gems vs. Lou Adler, Jan & Dean, Trousdale Music, Inc., and Dunhill Productions, Inc., etc. settlement confirmed this week that an out-of-court settlement had been reached.

The settlement was followed by a dismissal of the action with prejudice, so that it can never be brought again. Under the terms of the settlement, Adler received \$15,000.00 cash in compromise of his claim against Screen Gems for participations that were owed to him. Adler confirmed that the copyrights to "Little Old Lady (From Pasadena)" and six tunes on the Jan & Dean "Dead Man's Curve" album were turned over to Screen Gems, Trousdale Music, Inc., has received \$8,500.00 cash, with another \$1,500.00 contingent for the sale of these publishing rights in those songs from Screen Gems.

Screen Gems dropped all claims against other songs published by Trousdale Music, Inc. and against Bobby Roberts and Pierre Cossette and Adler personally. Jan & Dean recording artist agreements will remain in effect for the full terms, but part of the settlement was that Screen Gems will no longer have any creative controls over Jan & Dean records during the terms of the agreement. Under terms of the settlement, there is no restriction on the consultation and supervision of Jan

General Manager of Reprise Records, in the first combined presentation of the Warner Bros. and Reprise product to the Canadian licensee. Other defendants in the action, Don Altfeld and Jill Gibson, have signed an agreement to allow Screen Gems to publish all tunes written by them for Jan & Dean. This agreement covers only those tunes and in no way is it an exclusive writing agreement for all of Altfeld's or Gibson's material. Altfeld is one of the writers of "Little Old Lady."

The Scepter-Wand Magic

NEW YORK—With Scepter-Wand Records this week issuing its most extensive album release to date (six LPs), and actually the major single indie's first LP program per se, this seems a propitious time to take a close look at the extraordinary diskery which is now grossing near \$3,-000,000 annually.

A label which also is readying extensive activity in its new International Album Series.

A label which has helped songstress Dionne Warwick rise from obscurtiy in about a year to top single record sales, climaxed by even greater success in Europe and the featured singing spot at

A label which has just enlarged its horizons further by moving into spacious new offices at 254 West 54th St.

A label which had its beginnings — and highly successful they were—at 1650 Broadway, where it became a potent rhythm and blues force.

A label whose origins, actually, were in Passaic, N.J., where Scepter-Wand President Florence Greenberg lived and (in the late '50s) began to dream of her own record company. Talking with Mrs. Greenberg in her attractive new office last week, and Vice President Marvin Schlachter, too, Record World learned quite a bit about this most unusual label, in many ways one of the industry's most unusual.

This is how Scepter-Wand came about (it was originally called Tiara, with its name evolution self-explanatory). Mrs. Greenberg's son Stanley, who has a PhD in music, wrote a song called "Nightbeat" which they had recorded, getting their feet wet. Then her daughter brought a group of her high

bergs' attention, and they recorded them, too. They named them The Shirelles and their record, "I Met Him on a Sunday," was eventually released by Decca. Meanwhile, Mrs. Greenberg had met and teamed up with a young advertising man, Schlachter; and with Luther Dixon, a writer-producer who's now a & r chief, and Jerry Roth, an accountant, they formed Scepter, shortly after George Goldner's Gone-End company had distributed The Shirelles' next disk, "Dedicated To The One I Love." The Shirelles' first Scepter release was "Tonight's The Night," followed by the girls' first blockbuster, "Will You Still Love Me Tomorrow?"

Modest and unassuming about their accomplishments in the music industry-a distinction in itself-both Mrs. Greenberg and Schlachter confessed they had considerable misgivings in the beginning about their ability to run a record company. They were green, novices, totally uninitiated; but they came through as if touched by a magic scepter or wand. "Our success was built on promotion," Mrs. Greenberg said. "We spend money, send men on the road, artists, too, and we advertise-what ever is necessary to promote our product."

"And today my dream is coming true," Mrs. Greenberg continued. "The LP sales are covering the overhead.

"I never liked too heavy an LP catalog, though. I won't keep any albums that don't give distributors a profit, because if they aren't making a profit, neither are we. Twenty-five per cent of our business now is albums. We are expanding our catalog slowly but surely."

Schlachter said, "We had four album releases in June, but the current six will get our biggest push to date. It'll be a big program, with deals, promotion, etc., everything the other companies offer. From now on we will definitely have album programs throughout the year.

"We also just okayed the mechanicals for our first soundtrack, 'Seduced and Abandoned,' the new hit foreign film, with music by Carlo Rustichelli. This will be the first of many soundtrack albums from Italy's Cam label, which we will distribute on its original label. Joe Zerga, formerly of Transglobal Music, represents all our foreign pub-




lishing-record dealings; and he is indicative of another of the policies that have contributed to the success of Scepter: surrounding ourselves with the best, most knowledgeable people available in the fields we're involved in."

"This is something I've wanted to do for years," Mrs. Greenberg went on. "To have a well rounded catalog and—this is very important—to familiarize ourselves with the entire industry. But there are so many pitfalls in this kind of move. So many companies have taken the wrong product. But with Joe Zerga with us, we can feel secure."

The International Series, it was discovered, will probably bow early in October with six (Continued on page 17)

initial releases, including top ethnic music from many countries aimed particularly at the various strongholds in America of these creeds. What's more, Scepter is also about to acquire a gospel LP line they have been distributing for about a year and a half - "about 12 LPs," said Schlachter, "a very fine line." Jazz, too, is coming in for a big drive from the waxery, with such artists as Art Farmer, James Moody and The American Jazz Sextet, the latter comprised by many of the biggest names in the field.

Current LP Release

The current Scepter-Wand LP release: "Make Way For Dionne Warwick"; "The Greatest Sing Their Soul Favorites"; "More Great Sounds," The Kingsmen; "Passion — People — Politics," The Mighty Sparrow; "The Soul of Big Maybelle"; and "The Many Faces of Art Farmer."

Scepter-Wand also has its own artists management firm, Wand Management, headed by Paul Kantor. To quote Mrs. Greenberg, "We manage most of the acts that record for us—like Chuck Jackson, who hasn't had many real smash records, but who does great with personal appearances in r & b locations. We manage them for control, really, not for income."

The company also is involved in publishing: Zann and Flo-Mar-Lou (BMI), plus Mary Jane (ASCAP), named after Mrs. Greenberg's daughter (who, incidentally, is getting married this month-"'I couldn't be happier,' said Mrs. G.). Book Review

Dachs' 'Anything Goes' Scrutinizes Music Biz



It probably won't be long before much of the cocktail conversation in the music business will be centered around one controversial topic — David Dachs' just-published and extremely comprehensive book, "Anything Goes: The World of Popular Music" (Bobbs-Merrill, 323 pages, \$5).

Dachs, a former publicity director for Caedmon Records and now a free lance writer. has seen and talked to just about everybody in compiling his book (written primarily for the layman), but the end result may not find much favor intramurally as an altogether true representation of the biz to the public. Dach's description of the contemporary music scene is one in which most of the participants are businessmen dedicated to producing lowgrade music for teenage consumption, aided by, according to Dachs, such questionably scrupled types as BMI execs, disk jockeys and, until recently, anyone who could scrape together payola. The leading industry incentive, he suggests, is the fast buck at the expense of ennobling and enriching music.

Industry's Aware

The partial truth of this picture will not be disputed, since the entire industry is well aware of the problem and Author Dachs suggests that



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this is so. His personal prejudices do, however, creep into his thinking and frequently turn his sober *reportage* into black and white extremes. The book too often runs to heroes and villains—with no shadings. The heroes are Broadway tunesmiths, ASCAP, all songs written before 1950 and folk music. The villans are rock and roll writers, BMI, country music and Dick Clark.

These are the author's blind spots. He can see no bad in the former and no good in the latter, outside of an occasional and almost grudging exception. (In the entire book he cites only one rock and roll song as being good. That's "Rat Race," praised for its realistic and biting lyric.) When Dachs refers to the industry's self awareness and the progressive thinking and thinkers, he glosses over them as not indicative of the norm and not likely to affect immediate progress with any cogency.

Indie members conscious of these prejudices will be able to sift them out in the reading and accept the book for its excellent info and frequent insight into almost every aspect of the business. There can be no doubt that the book—right now as up-to-date as last week's chart—is a commendable reference book and guidebook to the inner workings of the industry.

But the reader-at-large may not be able to supply the grays that bring the Dachs world into sharper reality. The book is a highly accurate one, but not a completely accurate one. And that is regrettable, since its assets stand it in good stead for acceptance from the public as a definitive portrait.

Volume Notable

The volume, in particulars, is notable for a number of things; among which are its accountings of various industry problems and revolutions such as distribution. The book also includes a plethora of facts and a succession of provocative and incisive interviews. (These snappy and atmospheric chats run the gamut from Sol Handwerger's description of a publicist's long day to Jerry Blaine's defense of payola to Stephen Sondheim's call for show tunes the audience doesn't go out of the theater humming.)

HOLLYWOOD—One of the major difficulties experienced by most program directors is that they never seem to be able to find the time to plan their promotions far enough in advance to make them thoroughly effective.

While it is true that we have not quite reached the middle of August, from a programming standpoint fall is here, and now is the proper time to prepare for the three most important months of the year. It may seem a little early to most of you, but why don't you surprise the boss this year and be ready on time? Also, when you start to review all there is to be done you'll be thankful you got a little bit of a head start.



I'll bet you didn't realize that Labor Day is just four weeks off, and it's probably one of the three best times of the year for a station or public service promotion. It's the last threeday holiday before the Thanksgiving and Christmas season and the last summer outing the family will take for the year. Have you thought of a good safety promotion like "Lights On For Safety" to cover those three days when your listeners will be doing a lot of traveling? Another thought is to escort them safely out of town and back again with various safe-driv-

ing reminders, weather forecasts, road conditions and travel tips. If you're honestly concerned about the holiday death toll you can plan a Labor Day holiday promotion that will keep your listeners off the road and will also keep their ears glued to your station.

Now that you're completely prepared for Labor Day, let's not forget that school will be starting right after the holiday, and there's no better time than right now to make sure your backto-school promotions are the best in your area. Remember the tie-in with the high school you wanted to use last year? Why not set it up right now before your competition gets the same idea and beats you to it? What about the adjustments you'll have to make in your daily programming? Remember, most of the kids will be in school between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., and mothers don't often appreciate "hard rock."

If you think I'm premature in harping about fall programming, go into some of the department stores in town and see what kind of clothing they are featuring. If that doesn't convince you that summer's about over try to find a good bathing suit in your size. The smart ones are ready for fall. Are you?

It's a good thing I did all my traveling last week and the week before, for this week all kinds of activities were going on in Los Angeles and Hollywood. Lou Adler phoned and informed me his lovely wife Shelley Fabares has just concluded filming "Girl Happy" with Elvis Presley. Shelley reports that Elvis was marvelous to work with as was director Boris Segal who was directing his first comedy.

Johnny Rivers, whose new Imperial record "Mabelline" is one of the hottest records on the Coast, has been scheduled to appear on four major television shows this fall: "The Red Skelton Show," "The Jack Paar Show," "The Rowan and Martin Special" and "The Steve Allen Show."

Vee Jay Records is rushing out the first single on their newlysigned group, The Clinger Sisters, who first hit national prominence in their featured spot on the Danny Kaye-CBS television series. Title of their initial release must set some sort of a record in wackiness as well as in length: "Shoop Shoop De Doop Rama Lama Ding Dong Yeah Yeah."

Another local record is taking off very fast in the L.A. area, "Baby, Baby, All The Time," by **The Superbs** on Dore. I'm told the lead singer, **Eleanora Greene**, is a real doll and only 17. It's been rumored that **Lesley Gore** will be in town Aug. 22 to make some personal appearances. And in case you're not aware, **Patience and Prudence** are back on the recording scene with their new Chattahoochee release, "Didn't I."

New Epic Pactee Layton Has Organ, Does Travel

NEW YORK—Eddie Layton, International Music Ambassador for Hammond Organs — "Have Organ, Will Travel" has packed up for a new locale not previously on his 125,000 miles - a - year itinerary: Epic Records.

After six years with Mercury Records, Layton will now record exclusively for Epic, with his first LP, a Christmas package, already in the can under the production aegis of Bob Morgan and due probably late in October. He is also planning an all-teen slanted album, with singles no doubt on the way, too.

Next to the late John Foster Dulles, Layton is probably recent years' most traveled man. For the past four years he has made his globe-circling Hammond jaunts to just about every major city in the world, criss-crossing Europe about six times a year, hitting Alaska and many cities in Canada, then down into South America and the Caribbean area, followed by Hawaii and, of all places, the United States. He performs pop concerts for the Hammond organ dealers, but everybody comes, Layton told Record World last week.

Reaction The Same

"It's amazing," he explained. "We get 1,500 to 2,000 people at each concert, many standing and most of them screaming wildly, as if they were at a revival meeting or a rock 'n' roll concert. And the reaction is the same the world over, with audiences of all ages, backgrounds and occupations."

One reason for the enthusiastic response from his audiences at these organ concerts, aside from Layton's virtuoso, skilled playing, is the increasing popularity of the organ as a pop music instrument, via Ray Charles, Earl Grant, Dave "Baby" Cortez, Jimmy Smith, Shirley Scott, Jimmy McGriff, etc.

And no one is more aware of this interest than Layton. "In fact," he went on, "I'll be going after the teen market to a great extent in my new Epic albums. The Christmas one has a wild, unusual sound. On the more serious carol side, the Hammond is used with brass; and the other features pop material with a rhythm section. In a couple of weeks I'll be recording a completely pop, nonseasonal album.

"The organ sound is on a 45 degree angle, going up around the world. The teens are really digging it. When I first started playing the organ—I played piano first, for years—I created a lot of sounds, from birds to bongos, on the keyboard. Now with the electric bass guitar and full rhythm sections we're using, we believe we're coming up with a very commercial sound."

At World's Fair

Until October, when Layton starts his next Music Ambassador stint for Hammond, he'll be playing every day at the RCA color TV pavilion at the World's Fair, where he tapes a 15-minute show each day for viewing throughout the Fair. He also plays for the artists appearing there, as well as solo. "Organ Spectaculars" his shows are called.

He's also recording TV and radio jingles and commercials, plus is readying a half-hour FM radio series for syndication on which he will host and play organ music. To say nothing of some CinemaScope film shorts being planned now by the Hammond people.

All this, and an airlines membership card in the 100,000 Mile Club.



The hearts of Music City were saddened by the tragic deaths of RCA Victor's **Jim Reeves** and his pianist-manager **Dean Manuel** last week. The crash that took their lives happened at 5 p.m. Friday, July 31. Jim was returning from a business trip to Batesville, Ark., where he had been negotiating the purchase of some property. He was scheduled to have been at the groundbreaking ceremonies for RCA's new Nashville Studios that morning but word had come the day before that the time was right to close his property deal in Arkansas and it was something Jim had been working on for quite a while.

At 4:58 p.m. he called the Nashville Municipal Airport Tower from just south of Nashville and reported that he was entering some heavy rain. Then, the plane disappeared from the tower radar scope. Search parties were quickly organized and continued through Friday night, Saturday and up to one o'clock Sunday afternoon when the wreckage was found. All search parties contained many Music City Stars, most of them very close friends of Jim and Dean. Joint memorial services were held Monday afternoon in Nashville with funeral services for Jim in Carthage, Texas, Wednesday afternoon at 4 p.m. and for Dean in Nashville at the same time.

Jim had been my friend since the late '40s and early '50s when he was still pitching baseball in the old Evangeline League. We were around the night he recorded "Mexican Joe" in the studios of KWKH in Shreveport where he was a member of the Louisiana Hayride, the record that launched him into one of the most fabulous careers in the recording industry. He was a learned person, an astute businessman, a great artist, a wonderful person. But, most of all, just what his nickname implied: a gentleman.

To Mary and the immediate members of his family we extend our most heartfelt condolences. To Dean's wife, children and family we extend those same feelings.

The memory I shall cherish the most of Jim came during the wee small hours of the morning after the din and clatter of the disk jockey convention had died down and he sat, cross-legged, on the hotel room floor in Nashville with just a guitar and sang, with more feeling than I had ever heard, "Scarlet Ribbons," to some friends and members of RCA. If you were one of those there that morning, you, too, will never forget. We all loved him, we all respected him and most of all we'll all miss him.

What Sells: Sensational New Product

Bernstein Showcased In Col Classics Issue!

New, exciting product released this week by giants of the industry RCA Victor (to be covered next week) and Columbia is sure to have customers beating a path to their nearest record dealer. Ambitious early-fall advertising and merchandising plans, announced by both labels, will spread the good news to a potential market of millions.

Five By Bernstein

Columbia's August release is headlined by five spanking new Bernstein albums. Sure to have a walloping sale at first sight is Bernstein's new recording of that all-time classical favorite. "Grand Canyon Suite" which contains the ever-popular "Call for Philip Morris" radio signature known as "On The Trail." Bernstein and his Philharmonic players whip up a frightening storm in the "Cloudburst" sequence. The wind, album producer John McClure says, was recorded on top of Mt. Washington and it sounds right at home in the midst of the Grand Canyon. Columbia's previous recording of The Grand Canyon with Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra is one of their biggest sellers so the new Bernstein has to be a big one.

Also on the list is a sensational new recording of Berlioz' "Symphonie Fantastique." Bernstein's performance is, frankly, theatrical. But this is just what the music calls for. Album was recorded directly after Bernstein's performance with the Philharmonic, which critics said wowed the audience. Bernstein has a romantic temperament and he throws the entire battery of percussion plus the brass arsenal at the listener in a performance of whirlwind excitement. The recording, made in Manhattan Center, is exceptionally fine.

Bernstein shines as a superb classicist in two seldom-recorded Haydn Symphonies Nos. 82 and

Other Strong Releases By Mormons, Serkin-Budapest, Williams Debut

83. Bernstein has recorded little of the standard Viennese classical repertory, and it is a pleasure to hear him respond to the barnvard humor of these symphonic delights. No. 82 is called 'The Bear" because in it Haydn imitates the droning bass music popularly associated with dancing bears. The first movement of No. 83 ("The Hen") includes a portrait of a clucking hen in Haydn's best tongue-in-cheek style. The Philharmonic plays with sharp precision, and yet there is a relaxed buoyancy and charm to the performances.

Bernstein Accompanies

Bernstein's superbly gifted talents as an accompanist who dovetails the orchestral part perfectly with the soloist is showcased in two outstanding albums: Beethoven's Piano Concerto No. 3, with Rudolph Serkin, and "Three French Favorites," with Francescatti.

Serkin's performance is beautifully paced, full of virtuoso pep. His tempi are much better than Richter's (on a recent D.-G.G. album), and even though Serkin gives a relaxed performance of the playful Rondo he holds the music together with an inner tension that's thrilling to hear. Disk also includes the first name recording of Beethoven's Fantasia for Piano. Chorus and Orchestra. Serkin digs into the opening cadenza with powerful thrust and virtuoso aplomb. The final five minutes are climaxed with the glowing choral work of the Westminister Choir in a passage which sounds like a sketch for the great choral finale of his Ninth Symphony. Bernstein whips his forces up to an unforgettable finale which will have buyers plunking down hard cash the moment they hear it.

In another mood, Bernstein accompanies Zino Francescatti in "Three Violin Favorites": Saint-Saens' "Introduction and Rondo Capriccioso"; Ravel's "Tzigane" and Chausson's "Poeme." Francescatti plays with his usual incredible brilliance, and the pairing of all three on one album should give it instant appeal to all beginning classical buyers.

Bernstein Push

Label has big merchandising plans for Bernstein. Besides ads in major record publications, Columbia has developed an institutional window display that can be used with new releases or album product.

Piece shows a dramatic photo of Bernstein conducting and is an eye-stopper. Also, the Bernstein catalog will be featured in a special "Sound of Genius" brochure to be inserted in Dealer Profit Pack, a mailing that will include "The Sound of Genius," a special 12-inch prevue LP of monthly classical releases, will feature Bernstein's new albums. In the pack dealers will also receive a full copy of Bernstein's "Grand Canyon Suite."

August is an ideal month for a Bernstein push, for the maestro celebrates his 46th birthday on the 25th and stations will be saluting him with special broadcasts that day. Bernstein will reach millions this fall and winter via his four special "Young People's Concerts" to be televised over the entire CBS-Television Network.

Mormon Best Seller

Columbia cashes in on the recent (July 25-27) appearances of America's best-selling choir at the New York World's Fair with an album called "The Mormon Tabernacle Choir at The New York World's Fair."

Millions saw and heard the choir on broadcasts and telecasts from the fair grounds. On top of that, the Mormons have just completed a nine-city tour of the Midwest and East singing the repertoire on this album. With numbers like "Sing Unto God" (Handel); "Crossing the Bar"; "Sleepers, Awake" (typical Mormon repertoire), the album is destined for best-sellerdom.

The 375-voice Mormon Choir is drawn from the Mormon community in Salt Lake City. Housewives, doctors, lawyers, businessmen, farmers, etc., make up its ranks. They are welded into a glorious instrument by choir conductor Richard P. Condie who has an ear fantastically attuned to delicate choir balances. He personally auditions new members and rehearses the choir to a pitch of perfection. All Choir recordings are made in one of the acoustical marvels of the world: The Mormon Tabernacle at Salt Lake City. Album photo, which shows replica of the Tabernacle at the fair grounds, is a stopper.

Serkin Budapest

"Together for the first time" headlines the liner notes of this historic album which represents the first collaboration of pianist Rudolf Serkin with the Budapest String Quartet. Serkin is well known as a soloist but has made few chamber music recordings for Columbia. With his famous father-in-law, the late Adolf Busch, he recorded Beethoven's "Kreutzer" Sonata and with the Busch Quartet the Schumann Piano Quintet for Columbia, but these have vanished from the catalogs. This splendid new recording is the best version of the Quintet avail-

able — not withstanding Epic's recent Fleisher-Julliard recording and Artia's Richter-Borodin Quartet version. Both have their strong points, but in matters of zest, power and recording balance they must take a back seat to this new Serkin-Budapest recording. From the commercial standpoint no bigger names could be gotten together to record this chamber music masterpiece.

The recording was made under ideal circumstances in Marlboro, Vt., directly after the conclusion of Serkin's Music School. There, amid the idyllic surroundings of the Vermont countryside, these old friends collaborated on a true labor of love. They made music for their own enjoyment and joy is what characterizes their collaboration. There hasn't been a performance like this since the legendary Bauer-Flonzalev version which Victor still has in its vaults and which deserves to be put in circulation again either on Red Seal or Victrola. Despite ancient sonics it's a grand reading and the new Serkin-Budapest is in this grand tradition. Bravo Columbia, Serkin and The Budapesters!

John Williams

John Williams, who has made a few albums for Westminster (Sor Sonatas) and some small labels, makes his debut on a major label with his first Columbia recording.

The brilliant 34-year-old Australian guitarist made his first American tour last season under Hurok, and Hurok is booking him again this season so he'll be building demand for his Columbia debut album this fall and winter.

Andres Segovia, who ought to know, calls Williams "the prince of guitarists." In his American debut last year, he drew unanimous raves. In his debut album he records Bach's Fourth Lute Suite which features such well known Bach hits as the famous Gavotte (played all over the world as a violin encore) and the Praeludium (popular as a piece for string orchestra and as the opening movement of Bach's E Major Partita for Solo Violin). The overside contains popular gutiar encores from Spain and Mexico. The final one, "Il Colibre," sounds like a cousin of "The Flight of the Bumble Bee." It is a dazzling tour de force which must be played at lightning speed to make its full impact. Williams sounds like he's playing not only with his fingers -but his toes, too.

With the tremendous popularity of the guitar, this album should have a bright sales future.
