



Colpix/Dimension Records Transfers To Hollywood

NEW YORK - Bob Yorke, Vice President and General Manager of Colpix/Dimension Records, announces that the record companies will move to new quarters in Hollywood as of Dec. 1.

With the addition of Orrin Keepnews as Merchandising Manager and Ben Hurwitz as General Sales Manager, an executive staff for the diskeries has almost been completed. Lenny Adelman, who has had a long association with Columbia Pictures Corp., has been appointed comptroller of the record companies. Ray Lawrence, who has also been with Colpix/ Dimension in various capacities, has been named Field Sales Manager. Bernie Freedman will continue as Production Manager. Jack Lewis will be east coast A & R Director. Stu Phillips was recently signed to head west coast A & R operations.

Keepnews is a veteran of many years in the music business, principally with Riverside Records, which he co-founded in 1952. His duties with Colpix/Dimension will include functioning in advertising, promotional, press and album merchandising areas.

Hurwitz was formerly eastern sales manager for Crown Records. In that position, he was in charge of the handling and routing of Crown products in the east and the opening up of new channels of distribution. He was also president of Berry Sales Co., Inc., a record merchandising firm. As General Sales Manager of Colpix/Dimension Records, he will be primarily concerned with distributor relations, the devising of selling programs and the supervision of rack jobber and one-stop operations.

Yorke stated that the new Colpix/Dimension management team has been designed to allow for full flexibility and management strength. The first endeavors of his new staff will be to construct a new release program and to broaden and strengthen the catalogues of both companies.

Between now and the first of January, the staff of the record companies will be traveling around the country to acquaint distributors with the various programs set up for 1965.

The new Colpix/Dimension offices will be located in the former Reprise Records building at 1347 Cahuenga Blvd.

NEW YORK - Christie Barter, Music Editor of Cue Magazine and contributing Editor of Hi-Fi/Stereo Review, will join Capitol Records Distributing Corp. (CRDC) on Dec. 1 as Manager, Press & Information Services (East).

Announcement of Barter's appointment to the new CRDC post was made today by Brown Meggs, CRDC Vice President for Merchandising, Advertising & Public Relations. Barter, who will headquarter in CRDC's New York offices at 1290 Avenue of the Americas, will report directly to Meggs. Barter will be responsible for CRDC publicrelations, press-relations and Capitol-and Angel-label publicity activities originating in New York.

Barter, 35, has served as Music Editor of Cue since 1959, with editorial responsibility for records, tapes, high-fidelity components, the New York FMradio log, concerts and the New York musical scene in general. Since 1961, he has also been principal stereo-tape reviewer for Hi-Fi/Stereo Review. Previously, he served as an assistant editor of Musical America and worked in the artist-management field. NEW HAVEN—Opening day for the November tour of Dick Clark's "Caravan of Stars" was SRO at the 5500-seat New Haven Arena here, it was reported by Ed McAdams, head of tour operations.

Scale at \$2.50 top brought \$14,800 into the till for the single performance, a record for the house. This was the first date of 22 on the tour and was sponsored by WAVZ Radio.

He will also be active in obtaining recordings from the firm's extensive catalogs and in addi-

Sill has been functioning as an independent producer and operated his own music publishing firms after selling his interest in Philles Records in 1962.

Atco Records has purchased a master, "The Girl From New Orleans" by Holly Cleveland, which has already stirred up considerable interest there.


`Laundromat' 45 Leads To \$\$\$

In one of those unique twists that makes the record business the unpredictable business that it is, Roulette, this past week, experienced immediate reaction to an overnight novelty smash. It all happened before the record was even shipped.

It started when Roulette purchased a master. The song, a spoof of the current hit "Leader Of The Pack," is entitled "Leader Of The Laundromat." It was written by Paul Vance and Lee Pockriss (writers of still another novelty "Itsy Bitsy smash. Teenv Weeny Yellow Polka Dot Bikini"). "Leader Of The Laundromat" was recorded by The Detergents-naturally.

A few days after the purchase was made, Roulette stayed open on Saturday of last week, and mailed out about 200 deejay copies around the country. On Monday, the record broke wide open in New York and by the end of the week, when the full deejay shipment was being sent to distributors, and initial commercial pressings were being shipped, the label had booked over 70,000 in orders. In most cases, the diskery reported that one day's play at one station was enough to get immediate sales response at the consumer level.

According to Morris Levy, President of Roulette, this is the first time the company has jumped off with a record before deejay shipments.



Merc Gives a...

CHICAGO—To damn or not to damn... that was the question at Mercury Records last week as perplexed company execs coped with the problem of the last line of Leroy Van Dyke's new single, "Anne of A Thousand Days" . . . reminiscent of the controversy over "Big Bad John."

In the original pressing of "Anne," the final line of the song has an injured husband commenting coldly about his wife with the line made famous by Rhett Butler: "Frankly my dear, I don't give a damn."

Mercury VP Kenny Myers spun the disks for Art Roberts, program director of Chicago's WLS, who thought some listeners might object to that final "damn." And so did PDs at a number of other stations. So Myers stopped the presses to remove the offending word. In the new version, Van Dyke's voice fades away into the distance as he hits the bad word.

Problem solved? No. Next Mercury began to receive calls from stations such as WKDA in Nashville and WSHO in New Orleans. What had happened to the "damn" they demanded. So, Mercury is shipping a

new single: "Anne of A Thousand Days" is on both sides: One with a damn, one without a damn.





Togetherness Fox' Motto A&R Chief Wayne Works With Pic, TV Co.'s; Wants Balance

NEW YORK—A closer coordination between the 20th Century Fox film and TV companies with the record company —that's the word (or one of them) since Bernie Wayne took over as A&R chief at the diskery Oct. 2, 1964.

Wayne, also an outstanding pop song composer, opined: "A hit record can greatly increase the value of a star. Look at TV's Richard Chamberlain. Or George Maharis, also on TV then, who did my song 'Laughing On The Outside' and proved that a successful record is a tremendous all-around help to any performer. And Bobby Vinton's recording of my 'Blue Velvet' gave him a whole new image as a singer of modern standards."

Wayne quickly added that 20th Century Fox Records was not concentrating all its fire in one field, as the Mary Wells pop hit recording of "Ain't It The Truth" proves. "Any record company that goes in for one type of record is traveling a swift road to oblivion. A really successful record company should have roots in all fields, must be well balanced."

20th Century Fox Records has proved to be exceptionally well-balanced since Wayne's instatement. The deal for acquisition of hot artist Mary Wells was finalized after Wayne's arrival; and the label also recorded the title songs of four top Fox movies: "Goodbye Charlie," by Joya Sherril, "Guns of Batasi," by John Addison; and "Rio Conchos" b/w "Fate is The Hunter," by Johnny Desmond.

One of the company's biggest current pushes is on Lenny Maxwell's novelty single, "A

Wayne heads for California this week to confer with 20th Century Fox Pictures' Musical Director Lionel Newman on a number of interesting projects which should bring to fruition Wayne's goal of a closer relationship between the diskery and the movie and TV outfits.

just recorded the title song for us. While on the Coast I'll also record Bette Davis on the title tune from her co-starring picture with Olivia de Havilland, 'Hush . . . Hush, Sweet Charlotte.' (Bette's single will be more of a recitation than a singing vocal.) Two newcomers, Mia Farrow from Fox TV's 'Peyton Place,' and Charmian Carr, from the Fox film 'The Sound of Music,' will also be recorded on our single records. So will Tony Franciosa, currently starring in his own comedy series. 'Valentine's Day,' on Fox television.'

Wayne continued, "Another project very close to my heart is an album of sides cut some years ago by a singer who was a favorite of mine as a kid. Buddy Clarke. Back in the late '30s he sang for Jack Haley in a Fox film called 'Wake Up and Live' and I'm working on an album of Clarke's tunes from that picture right now. It'll be out early in '65."

Wayne is anxious to credit other Fox record company execs who have helped to bring the firm to the one of its most prosperous and promising periods. There's Len Lewis, National Sales Chief; Al Calder, head of publicity and ExploitaChock Full of Songs

How many songs has Wayne written? "About 2,000," he laughed. He asked if the writer had seen the Broadway show, "Ben Franklin in Paris." How had he liked the music? He had liked it well enough. "I'm glad," said Wayne, "because Mark Sandrich Jr., its composer, is a good friend of mine. In fact, some years ago I wrote a tune for his wife, actress Vanessa Brown, which became popular. It was called 'Vanessa,' a lovely, musical name, I thought. One day while lunching with Vanessa I told her how much I liked her name and she said. 'My real name is Smylla Brind.'

Wayne also wrote "There She Is, Miss America" in 1955 for the Miss America Beauty Pageant — which he claims has become a standard with "only nine performances on TV." His most lucrative ditty, however, begins, "Chock Full of Nuts is such heavenly coffee. . . ."

"When I came to 20th Century Fox Records," Wayne went on, "some people said, God, he's a songwriter — he'll be doing all his own songs. One day someone brought me a master on my song, 'Laughing on The Outside.' I had to turn it down because it just wasn't right for us!"

Beatlemania Revisited!

HOLLYWOOD—Not since the late '50s has there been a week in the record and radio industries like last week, for that was "The week of **The Beatles.**" Since many of you were involved, since most of you are interested, this is the story.

The Beatles' record "I Feel Fine" c/w "She's A Woman" was due to be released to disk jockeys on Tuesday, Nov. 17. All disk jockeys around the nation were to receive their copies at the same time so that no one could scream "Exclusive."

On Saturday, Nov. 7, Dave Hull of KRLA in Pasadena obtained a pressed copy of the record, and the station started playing it immediately as an exclusive. On Tuesday, Nov. 10, KFWB in Los Angeles received a call from a listener asking why they were

not playing the new Beatles' record, and after listening to a few weak excuses politely informed them that the record was available at a local record store. They called the record store (which had received a box of 25 by some fluke) and were told there was one left if they wanted to purchase it. KFWB's program director Jim Hawthorne dashed to the store, bought the record and put it on the air. Now there were two. Sam Riddle, dj for KFWB, played the record on his "Ninth St. West" TV show that same night, and an alert program director in San Bernardino

recorded the record from Sam's show, and that night it was heard on KFXM. Now there were three.

By this time, KFWB and KRLA had stopped interrupting their records with the term "exclusive," so it was an easy matter to tape the record off the air if one desired. That being the case, KRLA consented to make taped dubs for a few of their friends, and by Wednesday night one could hear The Beatles' new record being played in Los Angeles, San Bernardino, Fresno and Phoenix.

Calls started pouring in from all over the country offering large sums of money to KRLA and its disk jockeys if they would send them a taped dub of the most important record to hit the United States since the old Elvis Presley days. Denver called; Sacramento called; Phoenix called (the other station); Seattle called; and others called, but to no avail. The record (or taped dub) was not for sale except to those few who had already received it.

By Thursday, Nov. 12, there was so much pressure on Capitol Records to release the single for everyone that the big company was frantically phoning London for an okay on an early release. On this same day, Thursday, KQV in Pittsburgh obtained a copy which they immediately aired and then sent down their telephone line for their sister station in New York, WABC.

On Friday, Nov. 13, Capitol informed the multitude of djs who had been calling them for five days that they now had single copies of "I Feel Fine" and "She's A Woman," and they were sending them out by air mail that same day. But that wasn't fast enough for some of the stations. Clint Churchill, owner of KYA in San Francisco, had Bill Keffury, his program director, fly down to pick up his copy personally. To make certain their sister station in Oakland, KEWB, had a copy before KYA could get theirs on the air, Don Anti, KFWB's music librarian, picked up a copy and headed for the airport and San Francisco. As might be expected, both Anti and Keffury were making a mad dash for the Los Angeles International Airport at the same time, neither with the knowledge that he was racing the other.

Now, almost all of the stations are playing the record, and most tempers have quieted or calmed down.

It truly was the most exciting week I've seen in the business for several years, but I'm glad it's all over. Or is it? The new Beatles' album is due to be released next week, and though Capitol is taking every precaution to see that the same bedlam does not reoccur, we can only wait and see if any dj is inventive enough to obtain a copy prior to its regular release date.

Old Pros Are The Life Of 'Pajama Party'

The most interest in the latest American International Pictures' seemingly once-a-month series of teen-age color filmusicals, "Pajama Party," is engendered by people over 40. Which is an indication right off that everything with "PP" hasn't materialized *exactly* as planned.

Annette Funicello is back as the young heroine in this newest game of beach blanket bingo (which, incidentally, "Pajama Party" announces in the amusing closing credits will be the title of the next AIP naval epic), poised and maturing herself right onto the same studio's equally lucrative assembly line of Vincent Price horror films. Frankie Avalon has been sacrificed to some extent this time in favor of Tommy Kirk—Frankie turns up only in a cameo appearance. But cameos (remember way back when they were played by bit actors and were called bits, before the stars got a hold of them?) turn up frequently, between endless shots of frugging femme fannies—Renie Riano (once the screen's Maggie of "Maggie and Jiggs"), Kerry Kollmar as a sub-teen voyeur and his mom, Dorothy Kilgallen (riding a motorcycle and a cow, no less!). And Dorothy Lamour.

Miss Lamour only has one scene as the head saleslady in the dress shop of Aunt Wendy (Elsa Lanchester), obliging bunk mother to a bunch of one-track minded teens. But the former sarong girl has aged attractively and does a delightful, wild spoof of herself and the island musicals she used to do, singing "In my day we didn't do it that way" while she watusis up a typhoon. Time and a bit of excess poundage have not enhanced her stepping, and her singing was never quite as good as Frances Langford's; but Dottie, whether through old-fashioned glamour, personality, nostalgia or the ability to convey anxious-to-please intentions (probably all four), lifts the audience to a peak of fun with this one number no one else in the film manages.

Next to La Lamour, Miss Lanchester is responsible for the most merriment (along with the cutter, who has arranged the passing fannies for laughs much of the time). Her best scene: (Continued on page 21)

The following year, it could be heard blaring from radios from Piccadilly to Tokyo. The original Autry record has reached the 6,000,-000 mark, an all-time best seller of Columbia Records. There have been more than 300 records of the song made by almost every important recording artist. "Rudolph" has been published in 95 different arrangements for orchestra, band, choral and instrumental use. It has been translated into countless languages. There are 15 new recordings this year.



UA Music Hums With Action; Big Demand For Film Scores

The United Artists Music Company is experiencing its greatest activity in some months in the field of film music, primarily with the scores of "Goldfinger" and "Topkapi," it was announced by Murray Deutch,

Deutch reports that the recording activity surrounding these two films has been unprecedented in the recent history of the company.

In addition to the United Artists Records original soundtrack album on "Goldfinger" by composer-conductor John Barry, the company has a single instrumental version of the title tune by Barry and a single vocal recording by popular Shirley Bassey who sings the song over the film's titles and is also heard on the soundtrack album. In England, where the film has opened to tremendous reviews and business, Miss Bassey's single version of the song has already climbed to the top of that nation's hit parade charts. Also on the United Artists label is an instrumental version of "Goldfinger" by Prez Prado. Mercury Records is issuing a single by Teresa Brewer and the song is also included in a new album by the songstress. Santo and Johnny, the new hit pop team, have recorded "Goldfinger" on both an instrumental single and an album for Canadian-American Records.

RCA Victor Records will have an instrumental single and album as performed by Marty Gold and his orchestra while Warner Bros. Records will issue instrumental single and album versions by The Londonderry Strings.

Other instrumental albums and singles of "Goldfinger" will be coming from Billy Strange on Crescendo Records, Jack La Forge on Regina Records, The Oxford-Twelve on World Art-(Continued on page 21)

the opening of her safe which demands preparations almost as involved as Jack Benny's trip to his underground vault. This skilled comedienne has a large part but awful lines and proves her dedication by not blanching while saying them. Buster Keaton, although playing an Indian, is not so lucky. Called upon to do increasingly demeaning stunts, he is positively ashen when he has to pick off a pair of oozing sunnyside eggs from his fine stone face. Other oldsters include Jesse White and Ben Lessy, the amiable villains who team with Keaton for a forehead-slapping trio role you know was originally meant for The Three Stooges.

The youngsters also include Jody McCrea and Capitol Records songstress Donna Loren; and Susan Hart and Bobbi Shaw, who provide two funny bits, the former's perhaps unintentional, the latter's in-. Lying around their room in gold mules and pjs that would pack a burley house, the voluptuous Misses Hart and Funicello share a musical interlude, all wide-eyed and sweet, culminating with Miss Funicello playfully tossing a pillow at Miss Hart, who responds with such a startled "Oh!" that one can only assume Miss Funicello had put one of her mules in the pillow. Miss Shaw's big moment comes when Martian Tommy Kirk scares her out of her bathtub, into a towel and down the stairs where she stops on the last step, throws her arms around redskin Keaton-his face buried in her extraordinary upper register-and nearly shivvers his head off. They didn't do it this way in Andy Hardy's day, either.

The teen idiom songs by Guy Hemric and Jerry Styner are definite plusses; and director Don Weis gets the most from a screenplay loaded with dialogue of the "Not if I have anything to say about it!"-"Here we go again!" school. Kids love a pajama party, and they certainly don't put adults to sleep. This "Pajama Party" should not shatter tradition.

Consignment Policy At King

King Records, under Prexy Sydney Nathan, has embarked on a new method of selling their records to dealers - consignment. They are no longer selling records in bulk. Instead they are placing their albums in stores and charging dealers (\$2.19) only for albums sold. The dealer returns the unsold items at no cost.

An article Nathan is now sending to dealers, called "My 25 Years in the Record Business," sums up his decision to go on the consignment tack. The most important reason is that, on consignment, he feels, dealers can be persuaded to accept more records on a trial basisthereby giving added retail exposure. Nathan writes, "You can't sell an item unless the retail buyer sees it. If he never

gets to see it, there's no way possible to sell it."


There are initial problems, Nathan states, such as getting a large enough stock in order to distribute plentifully to all his dealers. Another wrinkle is convincing dealers that there is no catch in the consignment approach.

These obstacles, he says, are disappearing gradually.

In order to encourage business men with small sales space to take on the additional King product, Nathan is purchasing single and double racks for placement where needed.

As a part of the program, Nathan is no longer referring to his field men as "salesmen." They are now known as "service

Impulse! Inks Russian Jazzmen



Boris Midney and Igor Barukshtis, the two Russian jazzmen who attracted the attention of the world when they recently defected to the West, have been signed to an exclusive recording contract by Impulse! Records, ABC-Paramount's jazz subsidiary.

Command's Enoch Light Heralds December as Steinberg Month

NEW YORK — December is all things to all people with its rush of holidays and seasonal activity; and Command Records (Classical Division) will be especially festive this year's end since at that diskery December is William Steinberg Month.

Conductor Steinberg is the mainstay at the label, appearing on 14 of their now 28 classical releases. And he's important to the diskery for one big reason, Command General Manager Enoch Light told **Record** World last week: "He's the greatest conductor in the world today. He's in the great tradition. He's a giant."

To promote Steinberg (and the rest of the Command classical line), the label execs have planned a number of special events for December. First off, Command will release a two-volume set of selections from Steinberg catalog items. The set, under the title "Command Performance," is the first sampler of Command product and Light stressed the fact that each of the 14 bands were selected by Steinberg and are complete movements. "None of those belches of music you get on some other samplers," Light said. (The samplers will be sold individually to buyers who want it that way).

The albums will be offered to dealers at a special low price. Also available for dealers will be streamers, easel back signs and browsers which will have slots for the "Command Performance" disks and other products as well. New High In Sound

Light is especially proud of Steinberg and his work for the company because he feels that, dating from the conductor's first recording (Brahms Second Symphony), he "established a new high in sound. He created a standard of performance and sound reproduction which has raised standards throughout the industry. That's his biggest contribution," Light continued, "and heads of companies have told me that themselves."

Light mentioned that many skeptics pooh-poohed the idea of another Brahms' Second when plans were first announced. But sales, Light felt, have proven that "people will buy something that has been recorded many times if it is done especially well. Of course, anybody can do Brahms, but who can do it best?" Light confided that sales on the Command Brahms 2nd have exceeded 75,000.

Command, under Light guidance and assistance from his associate producers Julie Klages and Robert Byrne, is intent on excellence in all its classical product (and, indeed, all product) and for that reason the label has no release schedule and no budgeting. "The budget," Light stated, "is complete when the record is done to the best of our ability. We'll do something over and over and over and over if we have to.

"And I think it's a good idea. We've proved to the industry that you don't have to bring out a lot of albums to make a lot of money."

Fox Selling

Right now Light is also proud of the Virgil Fox work for the diskery. "He seems to have a tremendous audience. Everything of his we bring out sells well," Light said. "We also have a new recording by Daniel Barenboim of the Beethoven Clavier Sonata. That's a real tough one and he does a good job. The album already is getting good acceptance from consumers."

"And consumers," Light said in conclusion, "are the most important part of the business. They're more knowledgeable than many people in the industry care to think. We treat the public as being smart, and it seems to be a good way to run a company."



Thanksgiving will be celebrated this week, and when it's over - the start of the 1964 Christmas shopping season. Inbetween cold turkey sandwiches, consumers will be racing around trying to check names off their lists.

And this year more than in the past few seasons, manufacturers are making a stepped-up bid for shopping attention. Deluxe record packages of all sizes and prices have been introduced formally or released royally during the past few weeks in time to catch seasonal attention.

Kapp Records, in fact, has embarked on a major campaign to re-impress the public with the idea of records as ideal gifts. A new series of threerecord packages under the line title "My Gift to You" was introduced by the label last week to appeal to the Christmas shoppers and subsequently to gift-givers the year round.

In announcing the new line, Kapp veep Al Cahn said that "both the industry and the consumer have been overlooking records as gift possibilities." With the series, which emphasizes the gift angle rather than the Kapp name, Cahn said, "No longer will the consumer leave the record shop to go to a gift ship because no one has properly suggested to him that records beautifully packaged make wonderful gifts for birthdays, Valentine's Day, anniversaries or any other occasion. The record dealer, for the first time, can have his own gift department." (By "department" Cahn meant the gift browsers Kapp has made available to dealers.) The project's prime slogan is "the perfect gift for all occasions."

Waxery, Cahn said, came up with the new idea when it realized that frequent discounting of records have robbed them of prestige as gifts. Most gifts, Kapp researchers discovered, range in \$7-12 bracket.

The "My Gift to You" items are aimed at that bracket. The three-disk packages are tied together by artists represented and/or theme. Each is available in mono or stereo and comes in a blue (for men) box or red (for women). The introductory release of seven sets includes Jack Jones—"Call Me Irresponsible," "She Loves Me" and "Bewitched"; Roger Wil-liams — "Maria," "Fabulous Country and Western Hits" and

"Academy Award Winners"; Chad Mitchell Trio - "Mighty Day On Campus," "At The Bitter End" and "Blowin' In The Wind"; a set consisting of -Louis Armstrong — "Hell "Hello, Dolly!"; Joe Harnell - "Fly Me To The Moon" and Hugo Winterhalter - "The Best Of '64"; Roger Voisin - "Music For Trumpet and Orchestra"; The Do-Re-Mi Children's Chorus — "Do-Re-Mi," "Do-Re-Mi-Fa-So-La" and "On Top Of Spaghetti"; Opera Without Words — "Madame Butterfly," "Carmen" and "La Boheme."

Kapp already reports encouraging acceptance by dealers of the new idea. Diskery plans to back up dealer acceptance with trade-consumer ads, streamers, counter displays and newspaper ad mate for co-op insertion.

Classy Capitol Releases

Other waxeries as well, if not as extensively, seem to be jumping on the gift-push bandwagon with extra-classy releases scheduled this month. Capitol has sent out a group of de luxe set of two-, three- or four-record lengths. These packages include "The Guy

Lombardo Years," a four-record set, "Tennessee Ernie Ford Sings the World's Best-loved Hymns," "The Definite Piaf," "The Jazz Story," an anthology of jazz performances, The Kingston's Trio's "The Folk Ear," "Hawaiian Calls" and "The Beatles Story." All sets are available in mono and stereo and include lengthy notes and pictures.

From Columbia comes a new item for their legacy collection -"Mexico-The Cultural Life in Music and Art." The package is a combination book and record replete with text in English and Spanish and photos and paintings detailing Mexican history. It's going at \$15 and \$16 for mono and stereo.

Col is also appealing to Christmas shoppers via its Sunday supplement. The special magazine, being inserted in newspapers across the country this month, is part of the label's fall-winter advertising campaign and, as such, is planned to be effective for five or six months to come.

Label's William Gallagher said a few weeks ago that last (Continued on page 28)
