2 - Way English Traffic Curtailed

LONDON - Two-way traffic between the states and England for musicians has been curtailed for a bit, according to an agreement reached last week between the British Musicians Union and the American Federation of Musicians.

Existing contracts will not be affected, however.

The AF of M requested the temporary ban because they feel that English groups of late (through their agents) have taken advantage of the bookings in the states by exceeding the performing dates allowed them on their union permits.

The announcement was made by Harry Francis, assistant secretary of the British union, who reported that the AF of M had made the request. He stated that if the ban is lifted within a few days it will have little effect on the exchange of talent, but as a longer ban will create financial hardship among the more popular groups.

He also felt record sales would be affected.

'Until Clearer Understanding'

He said that the ban will remain in force until a "clearer understanding of the exchange agreement" could be reached with the promoters.

Francis said that the union ban had no connection with the recent refusal by American immigration authorities to let

Westinghouse's Phonovid **TV** from Record NEW YORK- A new system

whereby television pictures plus music and voice can be played by record has been perfected by Westinghouse.

The corporation unveiled the new process, called "Phonovid," last week. Dr. William E. Shoupp, vice president for research at Westinghouse, said that up to 400 still pictures and 40 minutes of sound can be recorded on two sides of a 12-inch record that the company has tagged a "videodisc." Right now the record-TV

combine is priced at \$10,000. Describing the operation of

the new process, Dr. Shoupp stressed, "The record is not just an audio recording that triggers pictures from a slide projector. Both the audio sig-nal and the video signal are present in the grooves of the record and both are picked up by the phonograph needle."

The corporation foresees Phonovid as a new audio-visual system for classroom instruction, industrial and military training, vocational education and sales presentations.

The record, played on an ordinary turntable could be "shown," Dr. Shoupp mentioned, on any number of television receivers in a classroom or throughout an entire building. In time, of course, although Dr. Shoupp made no speculation, "Phonovid" would seem a likely prospect for the consumer market on a wider scale. When the price comes down there would seem to be no stopping

Hit Songwriting's Name of the Game Lincoln Chase Clicks Via Shirley Ellis Waxings, 'New Sound'

NEW YORK - Come on. everybody,/I said now let's play a game./I'll bet I can make a rhyme/Out of anybody's name./Lincoln!/Lincoln, Lincoln, Bo Bincoln.

Lincoln Lincoln Bo Bincoln stands for Lincoln Chase who penned "The Name Game" for Shirley Ellis to sing on the Congress label and thereby carry the twosome (or threesome) to their second tremendous joint single success (the first, of course, was Congress' "Nitty Gritty").

Lincoln and Shirley were just about to join the Dick Clark Caravan for four weeks of playing the name game throughout the mid-west when Record World spoke to them last week. Both were excited over the success of "The Name Game" and its follow-up "The Clap Pat Song" and were equally enthusiastic about their next single, which they refused to discuss at any length. Shirley would only say, "If you think you were scratching your head over the last two . . .

Chase said he was particularly pleased over the current clicks for a couple of diverse reasons. The first is that he feels he is establishing his "new sound, my new beat" that first got the public tapping its feet with "Nitty Gritty." He explained that the beat depended upon dividing each measure of music into eighths and then accentuating certain eighths in each successive bar.

Chase has been using his beat as "the solidifying factor" for each of Shirley's songs and will continue to do so. He will also continue to use the idea of games for a while, because he feels the fun of playing a game attracts kids and the 'nostalgia" connected with children's pastimes attracts adults.

Shirley certainly won't object. "Lincoln has made my life so easy," she says. "I hardly have to work at all when I get in front of an audience. The audience participation is built into the songs and people love to sing them." (Lincoln and Shirley spend a lot of time clap patting each other on the back

for their contributions to their act. For instance, Lincoln states frequently that the idea for the "Name Game" came from Shirley.)

Another reason Chase is happy over the "Name Game" click is due to a reward that came totally unexpected. It seems that various Boards of Education across the country have contacted him to say that, in classes where retarded children are taught, the "Name Game" has been used with great success to teach children to follow directions-a normally difficult process.

Chase suspects that the beat has a hypnotic effect of some sort under which the children can be guided more easily. He plans to do some research on the subject shortly in conjunction with education organizations.

A third reason Chase is pleased with current activity is that it means his name is becoming more important, his credits are growing, his bank account is expanding and he can now move on to working with new personalities under his recently formed L. Chase, Inc. banner. Although Chase plans to continue appearing with Shirley and strengthen his billing in the act, he said that Shirley is sufficiently established so that he doesn't need to devote himself to her full time.

For a couple of years he's been keeping his eye on some performers in whom he sees a great deal of potential and he expects to sign them to exclusive L. Chase, Inc. contracts soon at which time he will begin building them from the ground up as he did with Shirley over the past five years.

Chase also plans to continue his association with Congress and Al Gallico's publishing house because he's been very pleased with the way things have worked out for all concerned. "The 'Name Game' single may have fallen off the charts," he said, "but it's still selling well and will probably do so for a long time since it is like a game."

Rifkind, an experienced record man, was an independent producer of TV specials before his appointment as head of Bang. He formerly was with MGM-Verve for five years as National Promotion Manager. Rifkind also ran their R&B.

Recording Material

Web IV was recently organized by Ahmet and Nesuhi Ertegun, Jerry Wexler, and Berns. Berns is currently in London, recording material for the new label. He also is setting up foreign affiliations and licensing arrangements for Bang, and arranging for recording rights for European artists for Atlantic and Bang records.

NEW YORK—JJC Records, a division of Joseph Csida Enterprises, Inc. has made its first deal to distribute worldwide the product of another manufacturer. Future Policy

As a matter of future policy JJC Records will produce new LPs of its own in both the World of the Theatre series and in the Posterity series as well as seek to handle international distribution of product of a similar nature.

Pat Sabatino, Sales Manager of JJC, reports that three new JJC albums will be released in May. However, the Youmans package will be distributed by JJC under the Evergreen label.

For the first time in its 10year history, ABC-Paramount Records, Inc., has made available its entire album catalog for record club distribution, it was revealed last week by Larry Newton, President.

The terms of a contract signed by Newton and Alan Livingston, President of Capitol Records, Inc., negotiated through Edward L. Nash, who heads up the Capitol Record Club, provides for distribution of ABC-Paramount, Impulse, Command and Westminster albums through the Capitol Record Club.

Arrangements a re being made for an initial offering through the club of 22 ABC-Paramount, seven Impulse, 12 Command, and two Westminster packages. The Capitol Record Club will make additional selections regularly from catalogs of the four labels.

The Capitol offering will include top names from ABC-Paramount and its subsidiaries: Ray Charles, the Impressions, the Barry Sisters, Frank Fontaine, Soupy Sales, Carol Channing, Carlos Montoya, Elton Britt, Gary McFarland, Yusef Lateef, John Coltrane, Shirley Scott, Charlie Mingus, Enoch Light, the Ray Charles Singers, Tony Mottola and the Robert DeCormier Folk Singers. Also included are the percussion albums on the Command label, hailed as milestones in stereo sound; and classical LPs by John Williams and Herman Scherchen on the Westminster label.

"This marketing departure for our labels is one which we anticipate with a great deal of pleasure," said Newton. "I'm particularly happy to be associated with the Capitol Record Club because I feel that it will distribute our product in many areas heretofore unavailable to us, and will be of mutual benefit both in widening the reputation of our labels and strengthening the catalog of the Club."






Campaign Highlights



The 23-year-old vocalist's fifth Columbia LP, "My Name is Barbra," which includes featured songs from the production, is being rushed to the stores this week.



Umbrellas Aren't So Bad

HOLLYWOOD-Consider the particular problem of the little station in an outlying area that is sitting under the umbrella of a large city or metropolis.

In most cases these stations have a very difficult time because the big stations in the big cities have the money to buy the talent to make them sound better. Usually their signals are all-encompassing, so when ratings are taken they are for the metropolitan area. Since the little station's signal frequently reaches only the outlying parts of the city in which he is located, his chance for showing up on the metropolitan survey is slight.



With only a small chance for important ratings and with no money to buy big talent, the plight of the little station seems hopeless. But such is not always the case. Several stations actually have taken advantage of their size, and have gone after the ratings supposedly owned by the metropolitan stations. The fact is, most large stations are encumbered with large staffs, policies and politics. That often makes them move more slowly on important issues, and occasionally it makes them a little less sincere or friendly with their audiences.

Ted Randal If the little station \plays very carefully (and honestly) to the local audience it knows it reaches, and offers them a simply designed format that is not cluttered up with all kinds of gimmicks, he can acquire a loyal audience that can mean big ratings for him in his own city. He can successfully compete with the big station, and win. He can also do very well with the local sponsors, the downtown merchants who are never called on by the big stations and who could not afford their rates if they were.

As an example, KLIV in San Jose boosted its ratings from a three to a 17 simply by being well ahead of the San Francisco stations with their records. KWIZ is making strong strides in Santa Ana by claiming the world's record for playing re-bound sounds. The response has been so good for them they've ordered a rating taken (which will not include Los Angeles).

It's not easy to make money under an umbrella, but with a little creativity and optimism it is possible.

It sure is pleasant when some of your friends make it big but still remain nice people. A good example is Bob Thompson, public relations director for SESAC and ROSA organizational public relations consultant (whatever all that means); he has to be successful with those titles, but he hasn't changed a bit since he was doing record promotion on the West Coast three years ago.

While he was in town we caught the Greenwood County Singers doing a very exciting session for Kapp. They won't let me tell you the title of the record they cut, but it's going to be a beauty.

More about the Byrds ('cause they're comin' on). They'll appear on "Hullabaloo" for its final show of the season, and naturally they'll do "Mr. Tambourine Man." Don't miss them; they're something to see . . . Guess who's at the

Ash Grove in Los Angeles? Only the oldest living blues singer in the world, Son House, that's who. Though he disappeared from the musical world for a couple of years, he's back now, and he's drawing big crowds. Son's been singing longer than most of us have been alive . . . This one's not been around too long, but he's mighty popular, Robert Goulet, and he'll be pleasing them at the Cocoanut Grove until the 17th.

A couple more of our local favorites are cutting a wide swath: Sonny & Cher will be featured in the June 1 issue of Look Magazine, in a 7-page color article dealing with the pop record industry . . . Johnny Rivers' new Imperial single, "The Seventh Son" should be in your hands at any moment ... To put the final touch on my "nice people" story, Glenn Campbell is receiving some of the acclaim his talent deserves.

Hanna - Barbera Releases May 10

HOLLYWOOD—Hanna- Barbera Records has targeted May 10 as the date for its premiere release of LPs and singles, VP and General Manager Don Bohanan announced.

Initial HBR plans call for the release of 11 singles and six long play albums, all of which will feature the worldfamous Hanna-Barbera cartoon characters.

The six LP releases are titled: "Monster Shindig," "Flintstones Flip Fables," "Huckleberry Hound Tells Stories of Uncle Remus," "Yogi Bear And Boo Boo," "Magilla Gorilla Tells Ogee The Story Of Alice In Wonderland" and "Pixie & Dixie With Mr. Jinks Tells The Story of Cinderella."

1) Telephone calls from artists (Huckeberry Hound, Fred Flintstone, Yogi Bear, etc.) to key radio stations, djs and their children, record columnists, newspaper editors, etc.

2) Complete mailers and publicity to all media.

4) TV promotion tie-ins where record product will be exposed and featured as major prizes.

5) Station breaks featuring the voices of Yogi, Huckleberry Hound, etc.

6) Special press kits made available and saturation mailing made to major magazines and newspapers.

7) Four-color and full-page ads in all music trade publications.

8) Cooperative advertising schedule.

9) Full use of Hanna-Barbera character costumes for in-store record promotions.

10) Merchandising of records will be integrated into the more than 400 comic books, color books, and other printed Hanna-Barbera materials.



Porter Tunes Uncovered

NEW YORK - If Cole Porter's song has ended, it seems that new melodies linger on.

Dr. Albert Sirmay, chief editor of Chappell and Co., Porter's publishing affiliation, reported last week that 100 unpublished Porter tunes have been found in his Waldorf Towers apartment since the composer's death last Oct.

The stockpile of songs, written for the most part for shows or musicals over the years from 1924-55, should provide enough material, Sirmay surmised, for a couple of Broadway shows, although no plans have been made as vet. "I would call the material a rich musical heritage," Sirmay went on. "There are dozens of excellent songs."

Sirmay refused to estimate the value of the songs and indeed, what with the royalties that could accrue, the tunes may be invaluable. Currently the Porter estate receives about \$100,000 annually in rovalties.

The discovery of the Porter songs is reminiscent of the discovery a couple of years ago of a Jerome Kern cache that included songs enough for at least one full Broadway score. It was announced at that time that lyricist Dorothy Fields was going to provide lyrics for a show. Nothing has happened since, however.

NEW YORK—Wayne Fontana and the Mindbenders broke it up in the states recently, although for a while it didn't look as if they were going to get out of Liverpool. "The American Embassy in

"The American Embassy in Liverpool didn't think we were 'unique' enough," Wayne said, referring to a problem occasionally faced by the abundance of British acts currently anxious to get into the U.S. What turned the trick? "A very nice lady at the Embassy. She was in charge and liked us," the ingratiating Wayne said with a wink. "We got our visa."

So that's how it's done!

And, actually, the boys do have at least one unique accomplishment of no mean import on the record industry scene: they have provided Fontana's first No. 1 record in America, "The Game of Love," also the name of their LP.

The Manchester-raised boys' American trip was "mainly promotional," it was learned. "Our agent, Danny Betesh, is also here negotiating for a motion picture for us in which we'll not only sing but act."

The Shutterbugs

Wayne and his 'benders had also become shutterbugs upon arrival in America, causing Mercury-Fontana Records officials some consternation. Soon after they had arrived, the boys left their hotel suite for an ostensibly brief browsing visit to a nearby camera shop and were several hours getting back.

The diskery folk were in an uproar and were just about to ring up the bobbies when the group showed, with several new cameras.


"Look," said one of the 'benders to the **Record World** interviewer. "Wayne's an expert at space photography."





Cap Opens Mex Label

HOLLYWOOD—Capitol Records, Inc. (CRI) established its own record company in Mexico City on May 1 as the pivotal step in an international marketing plan designed to increase the label's penetration in all Latin Countries.

Announcement of this major corporate development was made by Alan W. Livingston, CRI President, who stated that the new firm will bear the name Discos Capital De Mexico, S.A. Capitol will own the company jointly with one of Mexico's leading industrialist, Emilio Azcarraga, head of Mexican TV (Telesistema Mexicano, S.A.)

In charge of the operation for Capitol is Lloyd W. Dunn, Vice-President, Capitol Records, Inc., who in recent months has conducted an intensive study of Latin American record markets. Andre Midani, for nine years a top executive of Odeon in Brazil, has been named General Manager of Discos Capitol De Mexico. Organizationally, Discos Capitol De Mexico is the Mexican counterpart of Capitol Records of Canada (CRC), of which Dunn is President.

According to Dunn, the new firm will market its first products on July 1. The firm will have exclusive sales and distribution rights to the Capitol, Tower and Angel labels, as well as for recordings originating with Electric & Musical Industries, Ltd. (EMI), of England and its world wide subsidiary companies.

Dunn stated that, while the firm has no plans to build its own factories, it is now in the process of constructing recording studios and executive offices in Mexico City. Design work for the new installations has been undertaken by Edward Uecke, Capitol's Director of Development Engineering, and Kent Fursee, Manager of Electronic Maintenance.
