HOLLYWOOD—Tom Morgan has been appointed Director of Eastern Operations and Executive Producer for Capitol Records, Inc. The announcement was made by Alan W. Livingston, President of CRI, and Voyle Gilmore, Vice-President of Artists and Repertore.

Morgan has been in New York aince early March. He left Los Angeles, where he had been CRI's Director of Artists' Contracts and General Manager of Beechwood Music Corporation, to take over responsibilities from Executive A&R Producer Simon Rady, who later passed away,

Morgan will be responsible for the administration of Capitol's Eastern Executive Offices. He will also continue his present duties as an Executive A&R Producer and will maintain A&R activities, investigation and negotiation for Broadway show properties and original-cast albums, discovery of new talent, and contract negotiations with artists. Morgan will report to Livingston, and as Exercise to the contract of t

Morgan started with Capitol Records Distributing Corp., CRI's subsidiary, as a salesman in Los Angeles in 1951. In 1954 he was promoted to Boston Sales Manager and two

HOLLYWOOD - Formation of an independent record firm was announced last week by its four partners Jay Lasker, Lou Adler, Bobby Roberts and Pierre Cossette.

Starting operations immediately is Dunhill Records, Inc., which combines the sales, production and management talents of four top creative experts in their respective fields.

According to the principals, Dunhill Records was created to fulfill the real needs of a company in today's progressive record market, which must concern itself with the entire entertainment field in order to enhance the sales potential of its artists.

Executive Line-up

Executive line-up for the new company covers every aspect in knowledge and experience in the areas important to the development of such a company, geared to the fullest promotion and guidance for its artists.

Lasker, formerly with Kapp and Reprise Records, was more recently exec vice-president of Vee-Jay Records, whose rise in the industry last year is largely credited to his imaginative direction merchandising ideas and administrative experience.

Adler, who for many years was a successful independent record producer, launching such top recording careers as those of Jan and Dean, served as vice-president of a major publishing operation, Alton Music, exiting when the company was sold to a major film company. He then joined with Cossette and Roberts to establish his own record-producing Dunhill Productions, firm which is responsible for the recording career of Johnny Rivers

Also signed to Dunhill Productions are John Bubbles, the Fantastic Baggies, Shelley Fabares and Terry Black.

Pierre Cossette and Bobby Roberts are teamed in the management firm which represents such stars as Ann-Margret, Vic Damone, Jan and Dean, Shelley Fabares, Johnny Riv-ers, John Raitt, Anna Maria Alberghetti, Dick Shawn and Terry Black.

Dunhill Records, it was stated, will have a small but varied roster of artists concentrating on the commercial single market, but also taking advantage of the management firm's knowledge of exposure and guidance to help launch artists in the album field.

One of the major assets of the new company, its executives feel, is the association with Cossette and Roberts, whose proven management abilities will be invaluable in Dunhill's plans to build its artists as major stars in the entire field of entertainment rather than in the recording industry alone.

Distribution set-up for the new company has not been finalized. No commitments have vet been made for foreign licensing agreements, Lasker said, pointing out that this matter too is under careful scrutiny due to the "one-world nature" of the business today.

The firms have established quarters in Beverly Hills, at 321 South Beverly Drive.

Department stores screening this film are arranging crossplugs via in-store displays and co-op advertising for both the Gee Whopper Surf-Board and the disk. Be Prepared

HOLLYWOOD-The fact that the Boy Scouts have used the words "Be Prepared" as their motto for so many years should be an indication of the value of those two words, but to most disk jockeys they are foreign.

In the past few weeks I have done critiques on quite a few air checks, and the one thing I noticed was that most of the djs were either loosely prepared or not prepared at all.

In questioning these deejays and others, many have replied, "I work best off the top of my head." Many of you (perhaps most) will agree with the preceding quotation, but the actual fact is that almost no one does his best work "off the top of his head." It is



true there are many jocks who automatically pre-pare a good portion of their shows but don't consider the work and the research as preparation. These men make up music lists, read the daily paper for items that will be of current interest to their listeners, check the commercials for lead-ins and in general keep their eyes open for local activity about which they can make some appropriate and interesting comments. That is preparation, and those men who put forth that kind of extra effort usually are repaid handsome-

Ted Randal Ted Randal | ly. Unfortunately, most of the younger disk jockeys are not aware how much better their shows can be with preparation; additionally, they are unaware of the first steps to

take toward preparation. It is not difficult to prepare a show properly, but it does take some time and effort. Each record should be checked carefully, so that it is played at the most advantageous time; every commercial opening and closing should be checked and memorized or written down; wild tracks should be scheduled; humorous or informative bits should be placed strategically; station or show plugs should be planned in advance, and tie-ins and lead-ins should be rehearsed if necessary.

A show is only as good as the amount of effort you have put into it, and once you inject preparation into your show, you'll be so pleased with the results you'll never want to be unprepared again.

I think this is my scoop of the year: big ears have told me that Andre Previn is leaving Columbia and moving to RCA Victor. If the move is made (and it's likely), there'll be no animosity . . Lou Adler is very excited

about wife Shelley Fabares' first single release on the newly formed Dunhill label, but he's very quiet about the title. On the other hand, he's not so quiet about the tremendous success of Johnny Rivers at the Copa in New York.

Eighteen record dealers from Japan were in town last week, That doesn't sound like much of an item, but these were the top 18 Victor dealers (out of 1400), and they won a threeyear contest. They were shown the RCA studios, taken to see Elvis Presley at MGM, whisked out to Disneyland and Knott's Berry Farm and fed soda pop, hamburgers and watermelon.

AM-FM Duplicate Programming Ban Would Benefit Disk Biz

BY GIL FAGGEN

NEW YORK—The broadcasting and record industries are waiting with much anxiety for the Oct. 15, 1965, deadline, when by FCC order, big rockers and other AM stations with dually owned FM outlets will have to cease duplicate programming.

The new rules limiting dually owned AM-FM outlets to 50% program duplication, in cities of over 100,000 population, were to go into effect this August. However, the many requests by stations for exemption from the non-duplication ruling has forced the postponement.

In New York, for example, classical music station WQXR is arguing that its distinctive format is just as much savored on FM as AM and the audience would lose out if they were forced into another format on FM

CBS several months ago became the first of the networks to seek a blanket exemption from the FCC for its seven owned FM stations. The CBS petition position are the properties of the properties of the properties of the transport of the properties of the first properties. The network noted that in the New York area alone, there are 56 different aural signals.

To increase from 56 to 71 the program services currently available in the Gotham area, GRS added, will not increase the diversity of program choices available to the FM-oriented lateners. But FM-only station owners believe the division in programming, even if only for a limited part of the broadcast day, will give a boost to the whole FM service.

Industry Would Gain

The record industry is the alimete service that stands to gain much when the non-duplication order goes into effect. In New York City alone program sources will increase by 15—giving just that much more opportunity for the exposure of record product.

Although it is only conjecture at this point, the separation ruling may force many FM operators out of their highbrow rut into a more pop music groove—which may include rock 'n' roll. Presently the nation's No. I market has only one AM station, WMCA, playing new contemporary record releases (WABC has

a tight hit-only play list, WINS is now all news), an FM "rocker" would be a boon to the city's promotion fraternity. The same holds true in other large markets where exposure for new record product is a sticky wicket.

As the separate programming of an FM station will no doubt involve sharp increases in operating costs for station owners, few are expected to turn their FM outlets to talk or information programming. Music is destined to be the major staple, as in AM radio today.

Programmers will be forced to explore more carefully the vast array of album product being made available every month -most of which never gets to be played on the air. In addition, as the search develops for programming material and formats for these "new" FM stations, the diversified offerings of the record industry may inspire interesting, specialized programs based on a specific musical-record peg. It would not be too far out to predict that New York, albeit other major markets involved, may have an all-country music FMer, a FM station programming nothing but new albums and singles or exclusively "golden oldies."

The impending non-duplication gambit, while appearing to be a Godsend for the record industry, is being viewed by most broadcasters with horror.

Denver, for example, already, served by 16 AM and six FM stations could wind up with five or six more FM outlest at a time when only a handfull of the city's stations are operating in the black. More competition is bound to spread the available advertising dollars even thinner. Increased operating costs with fewer ad dollars can only lead to less effective programming.

FM Shot in Arm

At this point it's a wait-andsee attitude for both the broadcasting and record industries. How the sound medium evolves in the next year or so could be of crucial importance to both, and the radio listener as well.

can't help getting the message. With his jockeying, producing and generally being available whenever he can help the cause. (the deejay will again do some of the M.C.'ing at Newport this year), Fega himself might just be the start of the jazz "renaissance" he's

looking for.

Anyway, we can all sit back after midnight and renew some old listening habits, because Mort Fega is back.

Clark 'Young World's Fair'

NEW YORK-Entertainment exec and TV personality Dick Clark announced last week at a press conference here his plans for a "Young World's Fair." The "Fair" will premiere in Chicago Oct. 27-31 and will visit five other cities in 1965 and a minimum of 30 cities in 1966

The "Young World's Fair" will be international in scope and encompass all industries which appeal to young people. It will be a traveling exhibit, much like the automobile show, and it will play in similar auditoriums and exhibition halls but will include the young styles in clothes, autos, cosmetics, records, motion pictures, etc. that might appeal to the younger generation.

Clark revealed that entertainment would be an integral part of each show and that a large and complex organization is being established to devote full time to this one project.

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Ole Opry On Prime TV

NASHVILLE - The Grand Ole Opry will be seen practically coast to coast on prime time television come next fall. Plans are now in the works for 39 half hour shows to be syndicated in 40 major stations across the country.

Negotiations are being handled by WSM in cooperation with the local Nobel Dury advertising agency. Money being put up by Opry founder and sponsor National Life and Accident Insurance Co.

Programs would be taped live at the weekly Friday night Opry performances with WSM-TV's Jud Collins and newsman John Cameron Swavze sharing emcee duties.

Elmer Alley of WSM will direct. The pilot film will be taped June 11 with airings set for Saturday night (in most areas) starting Sept. 25.

Nobel Dury prexy William S. (Bill) Graham said that stations in San Francisco, Los Angeles, Houston, Atlanta, Dallas, Oklahoma City, Fort Worth, Kansas City, St. Louis, Dayton, Detroit and Columbus have already bought the series and that deals are being worked out with about two dozen other major city TV stations.

"The show," Graham said, "will be televised in nearly every region in the U.S., except the east."

The shows, Graham detailed, will headline no particular star but will use the services of all Opry members plus guest artists like Roger Miller and Chet Atkins.

Initial capitalization for the series is figured to be somewhere around half a million dollars.

SEATTLE - Jerden Records has debuted its first four national releases with their own network of independent distribs, according to Jerry Dennon, President of Jerden Music and independent producer. Initial Jerden product in-

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

Horowitz A Sensation! Col Rushes 'Live' LP

NEW YORK - On Sunday afternoon, May 9 at 3:38 p.m. Vladimir Horowitz walked out on the stage of Carnegie Hall to touch off a rousing ovation the N.Y. Times called "one of the most dramatic events in recent musical history."

Two weeks before over 1,500 Horowitz fans lined up along 57th Street the night before tickets went on sale. Two hours after the box office opened, on Monday morning, tickets were sold out. Tickets were in such great demand even Horowitz brother-in-law, Walter Toscanini, had to wait in line. All New York newspapers carried stories on the incredible box office line which ran down 57th St. and wound around Avenue of the Americas.

100 Standees

The day of the concert 100 standing room tickets went on sale and were snapped up within an hour. Carnegie Hall was jammed with notables for the concert. Conductors Leonard Bernstein and Leopold Stokowski were in the audience, as were pianists Van Cliburn and Gary Graffman.

Other music world greats in the audience were Met Opera Stars Richard Tucker and George London, impressarios Sol Hurok and Rudolf Bing as well as Dame Margot Fonteyn and Rudolf Nureyev. Wires of congratulations poured in from great artists who couldn't attend because of previous commitments: Artur Rubinstein, Richter. Eugene Sviatoslav Ormandy, etc.

No sooner had Horowitz walked out on the stage than the huge audience gave him a thundering ovation that would have gone on for at least five minutes had not the pianist silenced them with a wave of his hand. Horowitz held his audience enthralled as he unfolded a greater Horowitz than anyone had ever heard before. In the 12 years he'd been absent from the concert stage Horowitz had developed into a poet who sang the heavenly melodies of the Schumann Fantasia in a simple, direct, heartfelt way that he could not have accomplished 12 years before. In the opening number—the Bach-Busoni Organ Toccata in C Major-Horowitz was magnificent in his articulation of the thundering bass line that caps the towering fugue. He showed, in the middle section, an introspective lyricism that was missing from the Horowitz of a dozen years ago.

In the second half of the concert Horowitz unleashed his arsenal of amazing effects in the stunning conclusion of the Scriabin Sonata No. 9. The sonic pile-up of chords and tone clusters was breathtaking. In the

Horowitz is now an exclusive Columbia artist, having signed with the label in 1962 Three of his Columbia albums have won NARAS Grammys as the Best Solo Album of the Year. His newest. "Horowitz plays Scarlatti' is on the seller trade charts. Besides Columbia, Horowitz' earlier RCA albums are moving very well, too.

To focus attention on Horowitz' new Columbia albums, Creative Services Director Leonard Burkat is planning a campaign built around the slogan; "Only Columbia Has The Horowitz of Today." Judging from the newspaper critics-who pointed out that Horowitz has added heart to his fireworks-this should be a potent hook to capture the major share of the sales for Columbia's recent product. Horowitz' last RCA album was released in the late 1950s.

Chopin group Horowitz was magnificent in the little F Major Etude which he ripped off with such aplomb and finesse that it drew gasps of astonishment and delight from the audience. Capstone of the recital was Horowitz' magnificent rendition of the Chopin G Minor Ballade. It had an airy spaciousness, a grandeur and nobility missing in earlier Horowitz performances. Its stormy, rhapsodic conclusion brought down the

house At the conclusion of Horoprogram the audience wouldn't let him go until he had played four encores. Perhaps the most significant change in Horowitz was revealed in his fourth encore; Schumann's simple, songful "Träumerei" which was delivered with a flowing lyricism and warmth that touched the audience. Horowitz, always able to unleash a thundering arsenal of keyboard fireworks, has added to them the heart of a poet.

Columbia Records recorded the entire concert. Album producer

Tom Frost has already taken the acetates to Horowitz for his approval. If all goes well the album should be on the market within three weeks.

Meanwhile, Columbia's Sales Department is going all-out on a special presentation to dealers which wraps up the great press coverage before and after the concert. There will be a special promotion kit that includes ad mats, streamers and other pointof-sale material. Requests are already pouring in from key classical disk jockies who want to be first in their markets to "Horowitz at Carnegie

Columbia's Creative Services Leonard Department, under Burkat, produced a handsome, six-page brochure which saluted (Continued on page 48)

Lavalle plays show music (and will include much of that ilk on his next RCA release. which'll feature overtures from six recent Broadway shows, and always plays Richard Rodgers' official Fair march. "Fair is Fair." (Lavalle has recorded other Fair music for RCA—Ferde Grofé's "World's Fair Suite.")

Throughout the day he also highlights members of his band in solos, jazz combos, ("even progressive jazz"), a special Dixieland group ("Nuns seem to like Dixieland a lot") and

three singing instrumentalists. As he goes on his fairly set daily ride, Lavalle gathers followers-and gets a deep tan, as do his men. The tanned band gets conducted by scores of guest conductors daily-chilcheerleaders, elderly ladies, all subbing for dapper. cheerful Lavalle who stands by

and beams. Since Lavalle leads his men to the fair-goers rather than wait for them to come to him he gets to see all parts of the Fair and knows just about everybody. "It's really like one big family after awhile," he said. And last year many of the Fair-workers participated in a celebration of Lavalle's birthday, during which he collected five birthday cakes, while girls from the Philippine Pavilion sang "Hello, Dolly" (as they do everyday),

"The idea is for everybody to have fun, for everybody to be happy," Lavalle said, summarizing his job.

Lavalle's happy affiliation with the World's Fair is surpassed by only one other affiliation-his 21-year sponsorship by Cities Service which dates back to radio's Chamber Music Society of Lower Basin Street, the early stamping, stomping grounds of personalities like Dinah Shore and Lena Horne.

When the Fair is over, Lavalle may be departing on a 60-city cross country tour with his "only professional band that travels." He's just returned from one that marched through 40 cities and was highly successful. There's also the possibility of a State Department tour, Lavalle confided.

In the meantime the 172 arms will stay on those 10 wheels and entertain another eight million people.

This is our first chance since returning to Music City, USA, to take a good look at the big country music spectacular that was presented on the stage of the Paramount Theater in New York the first week in May.

Financially, the show was classed as a flop. And credit for the failure of the show to do any measurable box-office business must be handed to those responsible for the advertising and promotion of the show. In the immediate New York area there was practically no promotion of the fact that the show was going to be at the Paramount. This was pointed up by the fact that many people in the trade, based in the New York area. were not aware of it. Many of them stopped by the theater during the show to say that they had just heard about it. There were others who said they knew nothing about it until they saw some of the performers on ABC-TV's "Nightlife" show on the Friday night of the opening. Some even came in because they chanced to be passing through Times Square and happened to see the Paramount marquee displaying most of the Opry star's names.

As we had stated in this column some weeks prior to the opening of that show, "the success or failure of the show depends upon the amount of advertising and promotion devoted to it." The demand for this type entertainment in New York City is definitely there. But, the people must be made aware of it. The show itself could not be blamed, because it was a good, well produced, excellently performed country music show. This is not just our opinion. It was also the opinion of some of the toughest critics in the New York area. It was also the opinion of many people in the trade . . . both pop and coun-

. . . who stopped in.

It was also evidenced by the fans who did turn out. They loved it! Most of them came backstage after each show to express their enjoyment and voice the desire for more of this

type entertainment in that area. There are those who cry that Broadway or New York is not ready for country music . . . or vice versa. With those, we cannot agree. The people in that area are not a lot different from those in other parts of the country where Grand Ole Opry shows set attendance records everyday. Record sales in New York attest to that fact. Promotion is still the secret, and even New York must learn that some day,

We must congratulate all the artists on the show for going through 23 straight performances in seven days and presenting each one of them as though they were playing to a packed house. Dave Dudley, Dick Curless, Kitty Wells, Johnny Wright. Bill Phillips, Ruby Wright, Lester Flatt & Earl Scruggs and Hank Snow did a terrific job. The critics gave them that much. And from all of us here, a few bouquets to the stage personnel at the Paramount. It was a general feeling among all the Opry stars that never had they worked with a nicer, more cooperative bunch of guys. To Bob Levine, Don Nasca, Harry, Les, Bob, Don and all the guys backstage at the Paramount . . thanks! Maybe someday, we can all try it over again. At least, let's hope so.

Since we just got back to Music City it is going to take us a few days to catch up on what's happening. Things happen here so fast if you miss a week or 10 days it's kinda' hard to catch un.
