SLEEPERS OF THE WEEK



'Flying' Campaign



The gigantic mobile billboard of "Those Magnificent Men in Their Flying Machines" almost covers the entire 10 story building at 47th and 7th Avenue in New York where the film world premiered on June 16. The soundtrack album (score by Ron Goodwin) was just released by 20th Century Fox Records to coincide with the films' opening and a big campaign is already in the works.

Columbia Swings On Disk Charts

NEW YORK—Eugene Weiss, Director of National Promotion, spoke last week of Columbia's strong showing on pop charts:

"There is every indication that the label's success in this area will continue in the future. Columbia Records has introduced the Byrds, a California-based group credited with initiating the new trend of folk-rock, and their debut single, 'Mr. Tambourine Man,' has soared to the No. 1 spot. Recognizing the current popularity of the English sound, Columbia signed Britain's leading duo, Chad and Jeremy, who have been successfully recorded in the United States by Columbia Artists and Repertoire producer Lor Crane. The duo's debut Columbia single and album of the same title, 'Before and After,' have both skyrocketed to high places on the charts.

"Nevertheless, along with the emphasis now being placed on the teen market, Columbia continues to garner success with records by standard artists."

Among Columbia's other smash singles are Patti Page's "Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte," Robert Goulet's "Summer Sounds," Jimmy Dean's "The First Thing Ev'ry Morning" and Barbra Streisand's "My Man." In addition, several new singles are breaking rapidly throughout the country and seem destined for placement on the charts. Included is Steve Lawrence's "Last Night I Made a Little Girl Cry."

The Columbia popular albums which have recently appeared in the chart spotlight are the Byrds' "Mr. Tambourine Man," Chad and Jermey's "Before and After," Barbra Streisand's "My Name is Barbra," Andy Williams' "Dear Heart," Bob Dylan's "Bringing It All Back Home," Patti Page's "Hush, Hush, Sweet Charlotte." Robert Goulet's "Begin to Love," Andy Williams' "Hawaiian Wedding Song," The New Christy Minstrels' "Chim, Chim, Cher-ee," Tony Bennett's "Songs for the Jet Set" and Jerry Vale's "Have You Looked Into Your Heart."

The sound track, C/W and classical waxings are also making notable advances.

"Upon acceptance of this proposal by the members of ARMADA, the Executive Director of NARM will proceed to expand NARM's facilities and activities in order to present to the new members programs which will be of direct interest and importance to their segments of the record industry."

In a meeting of ARMADA members held Friday, June 17, it was voted unanimously to accept the NARM proposal.

In addition to actively encouraging all distributorowned rack jobbing companies to affiliate as regular members of NARM, the NARM associate membership is being expanded to include the traditional record distributors of iobbers.

In issuing the invitation to members of ARMADA to affiliate with NARM, the NARM Board of Directors felt that any move which would work toward the establishment of closer relationships among all facets of the manufacturing and distributing elements of our industry can only result in benefit for all.

Invitation to Distribs

Jules Malamud, Exec Director, stated: "We will do everything we can to expand the activities of NARM to include distributors. However, NARM is the trade association representing the record merchandising (rack jobbing) segment of the industry, and will continue in this role. Our very successful Person to Person Sales Conferences will be continued as in the past, with the manufacturers meeting with the rack merchandisers. Our basic structure and goals will be directed as in the past, toward the development of better understanding and closer cooperation among the regular and associate members of NARM. As the regular membership of NARM has endeavored in the past to include the manufacturing segment of the industry in NARM activity, so will it now expand its program to include the entire scope of record distribution "

RCA, Lear Jet Tape Cartridge

NEW YORK—A new stereo recorded tape cartridge system designed to expand the entertainment medium for automobiles, and adaptable for a number of other commercial uses, was demonstrated last week by RCA Victor Records in cooperation with the Lear Jet Corporation.

Unveiled for the press in the Hilton Hotel were an innovational stereo cartridge developed by the Lear Jet organization, a new 8-track duplicating technique created by RCA Victor Records, and a compact radio-tape player created by Lear Jet to accept the cartridge. The instrument combines the functions of both radio and tape player in a package no larger than some of the smallest auto radios now in use.

Suggested list price for the tape player with radio is \$179 and for the tape player without radio, \$159.

George R. Marek, Vice President and General Manager of the RCA Victor Record Division, hailing the premiered tape cartridge system, said, "It provides a most important and tremendously exciting new way by which millions can enjoy music and by which the record industry can reach an enormous new public—a public-onthe-move—with its product."

An initial release of 150 cartridges selected from bestselling albums from the RCA Victor roster of "The World's Greatest Artists" will be made in September, it was reported by Irwin J. Tarr, Manager, Planning and Merchandising. All categories of music—Popular, Red Seal, Original Cast, Film Soundtrack and Children's albums—will be covered in the release.

Monthly Releases

There will be both single LP equivalents and "Twin Packs," which are the equivalents of two-LP albums, represented in the initial release. Subsequently, Tarr pointed out, there will be monthly new releases in all categories.

Manufacturer's nationally advertised prices for the Stereo 8 recorded tape cartridge (optional with dealers) are as follows: For a single LP equivalent cartridge (Popular or Red Seal), \$6.95; for a "Twin Pack" (Popular or Red Seal), \$9.95; for an Original Cast or Film Soundtrack cartridge, \$7.95.

In discussing the tape cartridge system, Marek noted that officials at other record companies had been invited to consider making use of both the new tape and cartridge so that their catalogs could be made available to Americans literally on-the-go. "With this system," Marek added, "motorists are bathed in music; surrounded by sound in the small space of a car, they become inundated by its beauty and experience a unique listening thrill."

Mercury, Dot, Command and, possibly, Warner Bros.-Reprise are preparing releases.

'Knack' Star Signs

20th Century-Fox Records has signed European motion picture star Ray Brooks who is appearing in the United Artist flick, "The Knack," to a recording contract. The film won the Cannes Film Festval award.

20th Century-Fox Records will introduce its new "International Series" with the Brooks release, "Runaround," backed with "Everybody's Got A Secret." The single is being rushed to coincide with the U.A. film.





Tower Label's 1st Year Successful

BY DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK—On July 1 Tower Records celebrates its first fiscal year of action—and they're in the black, too, Vito Samela, National Sales and Promotion Manager, told Record World last week.

It's been an extremely satisfying year for all concerned at Tower, the label started, Samela added, "to develop a profitable record company by working mostly with unknown talent," as well as to provide additional exposure and promotion for EMI product in America.

The new blood Tower has transfused into the industry has proved healthy beyond expectations. The label has had the No. 1 single in the country, "I'm Telling You Now," by Freddie and the Dreamers, and also did top business with the group's "You Were Made For Me." They have had such chart items as "Tombstone Every Mile" and "Six Times a Day," by Dick Curless (who, incidentally, will be recording in Nashville soon, although he has long been known as an "Up North" country singer); "Chitlins," by Gus Jenkins; "Apache '65," the Arrows: "This Sporting Life" and "You Turn Me On," Ian Whitcomb; "Little Lonely One," Tom Jones; "Say You'll Be Mine," the Rosebuds; and "Che Sera Sera," Earl

And this week Tower is bringing out a new single by Robin Kingsley (Ian Whitcomb's brother) titled "In and Out," as well as a deck by the Sunrays (the artists on the first record ever released by Tower last Sept. 8), this one called "I Live for the Sun." There is also a Joe Leahy instrumental coming up, "Life," with an interesting history that will provide a story of its own if it clicks.

The label has not yet made a strong impression with female artists, but they do have Mary Miller and some others for whom they have great hopes.

Tower brought out its first albums in February, 1965, and these included "Sing a Song with The Beatles"; "Apache '65," the Arrows; "Tombstone Every Mile," Dick Curless; the Freddie and the Dreamers LP and Ian Whitcomb's "You Turn Me On" package.

"Actually," Samela continued, "we've been in the black since we formed our subsidiary label, Uptown Records, several weeks ago to handle rhythm and blues. Uptown has the same officers, same everything as Tower. The initial reaction by distributors and deejays has been good. We'll have albums from hit singles on Uptown."

Tower is anxious to stress the knowledgeable skill with which Eddie Ray (a 15-year veteran of R&B experience) is overseeing Uptown label activities—"his baby," as it were. Uptown wants it known, too, that it is deadly serious in its R&B aspirations and is out to give the established R&B diskeries a run for their rhythm and blues.

"We've had material in just about every field now; and, with the right product we intend to expand into a full-line record company." Samela said.

record company," Samela said.
Although the A&R work is done from the Coast, Samela said that he screens masters and send the good ones out to Ray. "Everything that's submitted to us, we listen to," he avowed.

As for the English groups that have played a considerable part in the Tower success story, Samela had this to say: "The English groups will still sell if they have the sound people want. A record is not going to sell just because it's an English group, but only if it's good. Give the people what they want and they'll buy it."

Tower Records is proving it can do the latter with the best of them.

Warners Cuts Price

BURBANK, CALIF. — Warner Bros. Records this week took the lead among independent record manufacturers in announcing a reduction in the suggested price list of its albums from the previous \$3.98 monaural price to \$3.79. Stereo albums will similarly be reduced from \$4.98 to \$4.79.

J. K. (Mike) Maitland, President of Warner Bros. Records, declared, "As a major producer of phonograph records, we applaud the action of the President in the removal of the excise tax, and as a firm indication of our belief we have taken the action in reducing the suggested list price of our records in the hope that it will stimulate the economy of our industry."

The new policy will be applicable to Warner Bros., Reprise and Loma Records. Commensurate changes in the wholesale and suggested dealer cost price are being made, with mark-up percentages remaining the same. Warner Bros. notified its distributors of the new policy last weekend, and also instructed them with regard to their eligibility for excise tax refunds.



Col Announces New Prices

MGM Adjusts Price Structure

NEW YORK—In line with President Lyndon B. Johnson's request that savings resulting from the recent repeal of the Federal Excise Tax be passed along to the consumers, MGM and Verve Records, Divisions of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Inc., have adjusted the price structure on MGM, Verve and Metro product lines.

MGM prexy Mort L. Nasatir stated that, effective immediately, the company has adjusted its pricing structures so that new suggested dealer costs will be 40 percent off the current suggested list prices.

Currently suggested list prices for general MGM LP product are \$3.98, \$4.98; Verve albums are slotted at \$4.98, \$5.98; while Metro is \$1.98 mono and stereo. Singles on both labels, and on the MGM-distributed Kama-Sutra label, currently list at 98 cents.

Nasatir pointed out that the company was not changing its suggested list prices because they "constitute the financial basis for the majority of the record company's contractual arrangements. A change in the suggested list price," he said, "would prove to be a costly and complicated way of passing along the tax saving. Instead, we have determined that an adjustment at the dealer-distributor level is the most flexible and efficient way to handle the price reductions . . . We are urging all our distributors and dealers to make these savings available to customers as soon as possible."

HOLLYWOOD—Alan W. Livingston, President of Capitol Records, Inc., and its subsidiary, the Capitol Record Club, Inc., has unveiled a new, three-point program which CRCI has launched in an attempt to attract an even greater share of the Record Club market.

The program, as outlined by Livingston, consisted of three major categories:

- 1. Increased advertising dollars for the Club.
- 2. Additional investment in Record Club facilities and personnel.
- 3. Wider variety of product. Livingston said that CRCI has more than doubled its multi-million dollar advertising and promotion budget. More than a dozen consumer publications have been added to its advertising schedule for the coming year.

He also said that since last August when planning commenced on the new program, CRCI had substantially strengthened its Record Club management team, bringing mail order experts to Hollywood and transferring personnel from other Capitol operations to the Club.

Livingston added that in order to speed up service to Record Club members and to handle the Club's rapidlyincreasing volume, CRCI had established a major shipping center in the Chicago area and has also added new data processing equipment and procedures.

"Most important," Livingston said, "is the addition of six new labels in the past months, giving members a choice of albums by such artists as . . . Roger Miller, Al Hirt, Tijuana Brass, Gerry and the Pace-Makers, the Impressions, Ray Charles, Ella Fitzgerald, Connie Francis and the Ray Charles Singers." Livingston said that the Club was also negotiating with several other labels. He expected to announce additional product by mid-July.

Lieberson Degree

Goddard Lieberson, President of Columbia Records, was awarded an honorary degree of Doctor of Music on Thursday, June 17, at the fortieth commencement exercises of The Cleveland Institute of Music. Lieberson's was the first honorary doctorate ever conferred by the Institute.

Bob Riesdorf, former owner of Dolton Records, has been set by Liberty Records to produce upcoming recording sessions exclusively for Vic Dana at singer's request.

Stallion Label Formed By Koppelman & Rubin

NEW YORK—Charlie Koppelman and Don Rubin have just established their own record label, Stallion Records, and stopped up at Record World offices last week to give some of the details.

Sam Weiss is acting in General Manager capacity for the new label. And Koppelman and Rubin have already put on promo men in two areas—Steve Sandler in New England and Earl Glicken in the mid-West.

Everything for the label will be supplied by Koppelman and Rubin's Koppelman-Rubin Associates. "We will continue doing our independent production work," either Koppelman or Rubin said, "and if we think something is right for our label, we'll release it that way."

"Of course," the other partner added, "a small label is not equipped to handle a lot of product. And we will release only one record at a time."

Feeding Stallion

Feeding material to Stallion will undoubtedly be the writers and producers signed to K-R, the list including Art Kornfeld, Joe Wissert, Gary Klein, Jimmy Roach, Ray Fox, Neil Shepard and Steve Duboff.

Both young execs stress that they are looking for outside material—masters, songs, artists—as well, and to underscore the point, they mentioned that the first single, "A Little Lovin'," was brought to them and they liked it well enough to postpone everything else they were considering to kick off the label.

The Rubin-Koppelman pubbery, Chardon, is already perking along.

And the twosome has a big secret they are letting out. They've signed a new group called the Lovin' Spoonful (sic) and all they can say about this clan is that they're something to look forward to.

Label offices are at 1650 Broadway, where the K-R duo stress they are "going all out."

Stern's Insists On Price Cut

NEW YORK—Manny Wells, head of New York Record Distributors, received the following letter last week from Allan Bloostein, President of Stern's:

I was very disturbed to learn that Columbia Records will not reduce their cost prices by the amount of the Federal Excise Tax. As you known, President Johnson said "This excise tax bill will make its maximum contribution to our economic health only if business pass along to consumers the full amount of the reduction in the tax. And today I urge every manufacturer and every retailer in this country to do just that." We agree with the President of the United States! We think that the decision of any manufacturer to use this tax reduction as an opportunity to raise his prices is not keeping faith with the intention of the tax bill and is not in the best tradition of progressive American business.

Consequently, we have decided not to purchase merchandise from any manufacturer who has not reduced his prices by the amount of the excise tax. Do not ship us any such merchandise. Should our customers ask for this merchandise we will tell them which manufacturers have decided not to pass the savings along to the consumer and explain our decision not to be part of a breach of good faith with the President, the Congress and the public.

Atlantic Lowers

Jerry Wexler, Atlantic Records VP, has announced that the label welcomes the removal of the excise tax on phonograph records "and the stimulus this will mean to sales."

"At Atlantic/Atco," Wexler stated, "we always sold our product to our wholesalers at the lowest possible price consistent with the high quality of our product. We will continue to follow that policy."

He added, "We would be happy to join all other responsible record manufacturers publicizing our wholesale prices for the edification of all within the trade. Over 15% discount on our entire LP line will continue through the end of June. Our suggested retail prices will be lowered to commensurate with the rest of the industry."

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Nina Simone's Cause: The Right to 'Feel'

Philips' Unique Artist Hopes Her Music Helps Keep Emotion Alive

BY DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK — Nina Simone, an extraordinarily involving artist off stage as well as on, feels humanity needs nore "madness."

She was referring specifically in her choice of words to a line from the motion picture "Zorba the Greek," in which the lusty Zorba tells his rather passive companion that what he needs is "a little madness." Practically on the eve of the start of her six-country European jaunt, Nina took a breather—which turned out to be not one at all for the dynamic Philips star—and told Record World more about what she feels is a great contemporary ill and how she fights it.

"Music is a medium to me, a means to an end," she explained last week. "I have a compulsion to communicate moods and emotions by what ever means I can. And I feel emotion is dying, what we feel is dying, everything

is so orderly! Raising your voice has become a crime! I want to evoke joy, sadness, pain."

As in much of her performing, nearly every work Nina utters seems to have an exclamation point after it.

Won't Be Machine!

"I have nothing against machines," she continued, "but I won't be one! People sit on the trains like zombies. But watch what happens when there's a snowstorm in the city. People warm up, speak to one another—they're all in the same mess.

"When I was growing up in North Carolina, there was such communication! A friend walked in a room and you knew immediately what was on his mind. Now they say, what the heck are you talking about? He didn't say he felt bad."

Nina says thank God for discothèques. "I like the idea of

people being urged to use their bodies as never before. It's wonderful for kids to learn the value of their bodies."

Not long ago a girlfriend of Nina's opined: "Things are so decadent because there's nothing we can't have." The singer concurred.

And continued: "I wish we had a day here in America in which we could go crazy, just go out and have a ball. We need the chance for even the big executives to go and get drunk and have fun—they would be a lot better at their work, I know. We don't have siestas, we don't even have a good coffee break!"

What we are starting to have is a kind of fear, "something we haven't felt for some time. We're having this water shortage here now, and it's getting worse. It's better to be afraid than complacent."

Nina, who'll return from her European work in early August, said that she is especially fond of playing colleges (although she hopes to be able to start spending more time at home with her husband, Andy Stroud, and daughter, Lisa Celeste). "I love colleges—they have such fresh enthusiasm; the air is full of it. The college student is not so critical yet, so jaded; he wants anything you have, and you can feel it the minute you get on the stage."

New Philips Album

Her latest Philips album, "Pastel Blues," will be out in a few weeks and contains material Nina feels will be "emotionally easier for the man in the street to grasp. (In the past, listeners frequently took five or six hearings to become fans.) Blues things that I've had in my repertoire but never recorded—some people don't even know I sing blues."

Nina, who started out to be a concert pianist and discovered she was a singer by accident, covers a wide musical spectrum in her literally incomparable performances, frequently very off-beat numbers. "I want to be remembered," she says. "If there are 10 people singing 'September Song,' I'll sing something else. It may not always be commercial, but I'll be remembered!"

Again, on human passivity, Nina admitted: "It's getting harder for me to cry now. I am a victim, too. But I'll go on fighting to keep some measure of balance!"

As composer, Grean wrote and produced "The Thing," "Sweet Violets," "He'll Have To Stay," "I Dreamed," plus other selections.

As Vice President of Trinity Music, Grean was responsible for developing numerous copyrights including "Green Door," "Little Blue Man" and "I Dreamed," and with Csida-Grean Associates managed such artists as Betty Johnson, Bobby Darin, Jim Lowe and Eddy Arnold.

Stanley Mills and Bernie Pollack continue in their successful activities as General Professional Manager and Coordinator for Public Performances, respectively. Grean will coordinate his duties with the Dacapo Productions team of Don Walker, Hal Hastings and Arnie Goland, who recently joined Mills Music as independent researchers to develop the Mills' catalog items.

HOLLYWOOD—Perhaps some of you may recall the article I wrote for Record World last August, "The Explosive Exclusive." Today I had lunch with an important radio executive who asked me, "Is it possible to set up a code between radio stations and record companies that will be honored by both so that exclusives can be eliminated once and for all?"

Rather than try to answer his question at this point, I am going to repeat a portion of that article because my feelings are the same today as they were then. It stated:

The exclusives battle goes on. Though it is not as out in

the open as it has been, it is still a cause of great concern to record manufacturers. Many stations continue to threaten total elimination of one company's product from their playlist if they don't get a particular record before their competition, or they make the same threat if their competition gets a particular record before they do. The battle over exclusives is not a healthy one for either the radio stations or the record companies involved, and the surprising thing is that it is still existent. It is, not because most of the popular music

stations desire a continuing battle to receive an important record first, but primarily because most manufacturers have not set up a satisfactory system for servicing. It would seem to be a simple chore to see that each station receives its records at the same time as its competitors, but there are many stations and many personal factors involved.

Ours also is a business of expediency, and expediency breeds error and confusion. If you throw a few publishers and producers into the pot (not to mention some excited promotion people) quite an explosive brew is concocted. There are almost no advantages for either the radio station or record company involved when an exclusive is given. The station's listeners can only be disturbed because the record they are hearing is not available for their purchase, and future sales for the record itself are disseminated by premature play.

Perhaps a meeting of the minds would start a workable system which would eventually eliminate the exclusive. The sooner it is eliminated the sooner we can get on with improving some of the other sorely lacking areas of our business."

I can only agree with the radio executive that our industries do need some kind of a code relative to exclusives. He is ready to talk about it, and so am I. Can we get started on it now?

If you were asked to go to Alaska for three days, would you? I would (if the money was good enough), and so would Jimmie Rodgers. Fact is, he'll be there July 23, 24 and 25 along with the Shenandoah Trio . . . It is kinda fun to travel, but it's even more fun when they come to you. according to Sonny & Cher. They relate that Murray the K spent half the night last Saturday night tracking them down to set them for the last day of shooting for his CBS special, "It's What's Happening. Baby." The show will be aired June 28 for the President's Job Opportunities. An interesting aside is the tremendous battle being waged between Cher and the Byrds for top honors on the song "All I Really Want To Do."

the first time in a long time two such popular West Coasters have been involved in a musical free-for-all.

Mike Clifford is growing in stature beautifully these days. He just finished "Village of the Giants," and he's also been set for "Shindig" for July 28 . . . Sam Riddle is getting ready to host the first annual TV Teen Age Music and Dance Festival ("Tamadance") at the world-famous Hollywood Palladium, which will be televised over KHJ-TV on July 9, 10 and 11. At least 20 bands will be vying in a contest, providing music throughout the shows. Top recording artists also have been set to perform, including Sonny & Cher, Joey Paige, Freddie Cannon, Mike Clifford, Jerry Naylor and the Crickets, Chuck Berry and Lulu Porter.

Col - Screen Gems Opens London Subsid

NEW YORK—Don Kirshner, President of Columbia Pictures-Screen Gems Music Division, has announced establishment of new London offices, as recognition of "the biggest tendency in today's entertainment business—the wiping out of national frontiers."

Heading the subsidiary, which will operate as Screen Gems-Columbia Music, Ltd., will be Jack Magraw, Londoner whose talents and accomplishments are well-known in British music circles. Offices will be at 28-29 St. James's Square.

Kirshner listed several primary purposes as underlying formation of the British branch:

- 1. Exploitation in Europe of material from this country, and acquisition of British and other foreign catalogues for marketing here.
- 2. Development of new songwriting talent in England under a program similar to the present subsidization of creative talents in this country.
- 3. Marketing of entire catalogues of world origin in Britain.
 - 4. A constant lookout on the

Continent for independent songs for exploitation throughout the world.

- 5. Concentrate exploitation on motion pictures and television music. They will work closely with the Columbia Pictures office in England to exploit the musical products of motion pictures being produced there and assist on ideas for music in movies.
- 6. Acquisition, for Colpix, the Columbia Pictures disk label, of British and Continental masters.
- 7. Looming large, also, among the new organization's plans will be activity in the London show area. It is publishing the score of the current West End musical hit, "Our Man Crichton." Kirshner inaugurated less than two months ago a new musical theatre development division under Lehman Engel, Broadway musical director, which will work closely with the London organization.

"Our business grows more international with every passing day and almost every new project," Kirshner declared, "and increasingly, national boundaries are getting more and more meaningless."

Maxin Steers Big 3 To 'Rolls' Ride

Under the direction of Arnold Maxin, the Big 3 Music Corporation (Robbins-Feist-Miller) has clicked with one of its most productive record exploitation campaigns in years.

The Big 3 disk drive on music from MGM's "The Yellow Rolls-Royce," which also represents Maxin's initial assignment as Executive Veep of the pubbery, is a success via its strong record coverage and extensive disk jockey play. The four lead tunes from the Riz Ortolani score, "Theme From The Yellow Rolls-Royce," "Forget Domani," "Mae" and "Now And Then" have been released on 12 major singles plus album action as well, "Forget Domani" is currently on the pop charts with versions by Frank Sinatra (Reprise) and Connie Francis (MGM).

Big 3 international affiliates have broadened the campaign with "Rolls-Royce" tunes represented on some 20 singles released in Canada, Britain, Belgium, France, Italy, Sweden and Spain. The pubbery is now adding impetus to the drive with the introduction of Paul Vance's new lyric created for the original instrumental "Mae."

It was a Thursday . . . or was it a Friday? No, it was Thursday . . . it MUST have been a Thursday. That's right, it was, because on a Thursday I always find it hard to push back those newly laundered sheets and blankets and vacate my rather large, comfortable, inexpensive bed in order to shower, partake of coffee, drive to London airport and fly to Manchester for the BBC-TV show "Top of the Pops." Actually, I only make this Manchester trip one Thursday in four.

When I arrived at the studio, sitting at the grand piano was one Albert Bacharach. Mind

you, I only assume that his Christian name is Albert because he's referred to as Bert, which over here is short for Albert, but then again, Albert, or others unknown, obviously decided that the "E" had to be substituted for a "U," turning the Christian operation in to Burt. So, I'm open to criticism, and if it's not an abbreviation for Albert, then someone please relieve my grammatical agonies!

However, this chappie Bacharach was weaving thought after thought on the keyboard and gave me a quick pre-sample of "What's New Pussycat" and eventually burt . . . er, sorry, . . . burst into his current British smash, "Trains and Boats and Planes'

It was at this stage that I admired the way the composer

had incorporated all the fantastic essential travel facets lyrically into a song that has swept the country. That was, until I found that I had been booked to DJ a show on the Isle of Man! You see, I had to be back in London by 1:30 p.m. the next day to record another show, and my secretary, on making travel arrangements, had a very nasty British shock to relate. I just didn't have a hope of getting back to London airport, let alone a London recording studio before 2 p.m.! You see, a direct plane from the Isle wouldn't land me before 5 p.m., and if I caught another flight and changed at Manchester, then I couldn't land before 2 p.m. Boats? Not one in sight that could sail me across the sea in time to make any connection that would ease the problem. Trains? Well, what the . . . is the good of a train to me if there isn't a boat that can "Get Me To the Train on Time"?! (Good title for a Stanley Holloway song, no?)

So there! It's all very well for A. B. Bacharach and Coy to write a song about it, but it's got to be practical chaps, prac-

Each new Lanza release is greeted with an immediate rush to purchase the supply. Lanza albums, previously released and available to the public, maintain a steady and important sales volume.

Unveiling the waxed sculpture were Mario Lanza's four children, Colleen, Ellisa, Marc and Damon, his parents Mr. & Mrs. Anthony Cocozza, and friend Terry Robinson. The sculptured image is of Lanza in one of his favorite roles of "Rigoletto" from his 1950 film, "The Great Caruso."

Also aiding at the unveiling ceremonies were Lanza's fellow players from his first two films, Kathryn Grayson and Eduard Franz.

Other Hollywood personalities present were Fabian, Dean Jones, Rory Calhoun, Lita Baron, Dorothy Kirsten, Danny Scholl and orchestra leader Dick Stabile.

Allen Parkinson, curator of the Museum, said, "In all the years that the museum has been functioning, there has never been a crowd of this magnitude and enthusiasm for one individual." Many of the members present came from cities throughout the United States, including a delegation from the Italian Embassy. Lanza died in Rome in 1959.

The legend of Lanza lives on . . . and will continue as long as records are produced and films are re-released. Walter Winchell brought out in a recent column that Mario Lanza is one of the great film favorites in Russia . . . they started to play "The Great Caruso" last year.

First NY Folk **Fest Cheered**

Voice Coach Menotti:

Identity Uppermost to Singer

NEW YORK -- Best selling records sell for a variety of reasons. When a singer gets a best-selling record, it is for a variety of reasons plus one the voice coach. Of course, the contribution a voice coach makes toward selling a record is incalculable, but most singers would affirm that it is also undeniable.

One of the foremost vocal coaches around is Carlo Men-Here's a partial and ranging list of singers (and non-singers) he's coached: Pat Boone, Frankie Avalon, Judy Garland, Connie Francis, Jan

better than Dave Von Ronk's satirical and contemporary viewpoint is better than Muddy Water's riveting, languorous blues is better than John Hurt's traditional wails is better than Eric Von Schmidt's introspective, highly personal meanderings is better than Mose Allison's after dinner mint tartness is better than Chuck Berry's ingratiating and faultless showmanship.

Word had it that the entire weekend was on that level. So the Festival will be welcomed back next year, probably with recording companies saving things for posterity.

Obviously, Menotti has a lot to say about singers, singing and recording and Record World went over to his Carnegie Hall (where else?) apartment-studio to hear him say it.

First off, Menotti held up his latest "do-it-yourself" record package-"The Art of Modern Singing" on his own Lauriadel label. The two-disk set includes a full repertoire of exercises and tips to the aspiring singer and Menotti has just released it as a followup to his first such package-"The Art of Singing." He explained that the second package stressed "modern" singing. which he defined simply as being "more natural" singing.

And, Menotti, went on to say, the best recording nowadays artists "are the ones who sing naturally—the one who possess an identity." He stressed this possession of distinctive identity and said that this is probably the most important single factor in creating a successful singer. way a singer finds his identity. he said, is by performing. "A true singer," he proffered, "is one who doesn't have to turn to the A&R man to find out what his sound is. He knows how to operate his voice.'

Menotti talked about some of the problems singers seem to have in common. For instance, he said that when a singer loses his voice, it's because he's probably been pushing it. Opening nights, he suggested, seem to make singers push hard "because they want to give their best. You never hear of an opera star losing his voice—except for illness-he said, because they are trained and know how to control their voices." (As a corollary to this observation, Menotti suggested singers carry their own amplifying equipment with them.)

"Also," he said, "singers

don't really lose their voices. With age voice doesn't get lost. It mellows. Of course, the voice acquires certain limitations, but a good singer knows what his are."

There are a number of singers, Menotti said, who 'try to be cute by contorting their faces - pulling their mouths to the side-to get certain vocal effects. There is a possibility that singers can control vibrato somewhat by doing this but otherwise it doesn't help the singer at all. And it certainly isn't enjoyable to watch. To them I would say 'wrinkle your nose, but don't twist your mouth.'

At that point the teacher talked about some singers and non-singers he liked and why. "Crooning," he began, "is an art in itself. I would define a crooner as someone who doesn't use the full power of his voice. It's what I call 'separating syllables correctly.' He puts the right meaning behind each word."

Another school of singing, Menotti pointed out is the current musical comedy talksinging inaugurated by Rex Harrison in "My Fair Lady" and used by the likes of Robert Preston in "The Music Man," Maurice Evans in "Tenderloin" and Richard Burton in "Camelot." "This is the most difficult task someone can do." he said. "It's actually singing in rhythm. It requires a great sense of inflection. Of course, classically trained actors like Harrison and Evans are well equipped. They are used to the music of poetry."

Menotti also pooh-poohed the music business cliche that in today's market a bad voice is almost more successful than a good voice. "It's not true." he emphasized. "I've heard singers with bad voices and they just haven't been successful. The ones who stick around have good voices."

"Most singers," Menotti concluded (pointing out jovially that he is not looking for students), "only go to an instructor because they're not sure of themselves and want to be They may have reassured. certain technical problems, but they could actually iron those out themselves."

He then consulted his appointment book to find out when and with whom he would be doing his reassuring next.

THE ANSWERS

Larry Uttal, General Man-



ager, Bell Records, Inc.: I cannot object in any way to any of my distributors carrying a cover of any

of my records by any of their other lines since distributors are not creators of the product they carry. Since they are not responsible for any covers they might carry, it behooves the manufacturer who has made this cover to be responsible for any additional promotion that this competitive situation may necessitate. Not only do I feel that distributors are not responsible for the cover record they carry, I also feel that many times a situation like this can put them in an untenable position from which I have to almost always absolve them from all responsibility.

Leonard Scheer, Director of



Single Sales:
I sympathize with a distributor who is put into a position of handling the same song by

different artists on different labels at the same time. Most distributors have loyalty to all suppliers and under normal situations receive quite a bit of pressure from each manufacturer, on cover records there is that much more. I would like to feel that my distributor gives me an edge over competitive records, but that is not the case. Having been involved in many cover situations of late, I feel that a distributor's allegiance has to be to the supplier who released his record first. then becomes the responsibility of the manufacturer who covers to have his field force create the enthusiasm, excitement, exposure and sales to make his record the important one. Then, a distributor must realistically decide where the most money can be made and go all the way with the one with the most potential.

not make cover records nor can anybody cover us, for the simple reason that in today's market the smallest producer or label can come out with a record and overnight get national distribution. Years ago, cover records were made by larger companies taking the arrangement of the smaller companies and copying it verbatim. They enjoyed great success simply because of their distribution ability. Today, the teenagers will buy THE version because of the sound and lyrics and anyone foolish enough to attempt to cover the original record will have the problem of having his own distributors. in many cases, handling the original. It is that simple. To sum up. I believe that records made today are simply different "versions" of the song.

Andy Miele, United Artists:



No one knows where the next hit record is coming from—for all we know it may be a cover record. The

distributor who is fortunate enough to have both versions of a good song must truly take on the duties of being a record distributor-not an AR man. It is not the distributor's responsibility to decide which of the records is going to be the big money maker, he must treat each version with equal excitement and effort, and as the distributor he should not sit and wait for one of the versions to break in another market. The record distributor must have the ingenuity to work both versions in fairness to both record companies, artists and the public. Radio stations and the public should decide which of the records is really the hit.

Sonny and Cher Build A Better Garage

LOS ANGELES—A year ago they were flat broke and pawning typewriters and other items in order to raise money to get together a recording session. They did and made "Baby, Don't Go." They were and are Sonny and Cher, whose newest release, Atco's "I Got You, Babe" was Record World "sleeper of the week" two weeks ago.

Sonny and Cher couldn't be more excited about the single—especially because they were uncertain about the cut when they set out to do it. Sonny wrote the song—in which two lovers bandy their affections back and forth—and Cher told Record World last week that she hadn't particularly liked the song at first

"Things sound different in our garage, where Sonny always plays them first," Cher said. But she added she loved the song now. Sonny writes most of the married duo's songs, but not all.

He didn't write all the songs for the album they cut last week. "I want all good material. There's no quicker way to destroy an album than throwing in all your own songs," he said. "We want to make sure we have songs the kids'll like."

What the kids like is very important to Sonny and Cher. Both of them identify with young folks because, as Cher put it, "Kids accept you more than parents. I like kids. I don't like adults."

Sonny and Cher state that their fans like them despite the fact that they're married, and actually because of that fact. "They seem to like to see two young married people who are very much in love and not arguing," Cher said. And Sonny added, "That doesn't stop them from coming up to either of us and telling us that they love us and that if we ever get a divorce . . ."

Sonny also produces all the Sonny-Cher sides and the Cher sides the pretty Mrs. does under her Imperial contract. ("All I Really Want to Do" is the current one.) Sonny also is producing a number of other folks—all according to his exclusive producing contract with York-Pala, which is owned by Charles Green and Brian Stone. In fact, it was as arranger of Cher's songs that Sonny and Cher started. He would sing harmony when Cher was rehearsing and one thing led to another and to the present team.

Production work for Sonny is being curtailed somewhat these days since his performing schedule is growing. The twosome has an awesome schedule lined up with two "Shindigs" at the end of July, appearances in the new flick, "Wild on the Beach," an English tour, tours with the Dave Clark Five and the Kinks, an outing as sole performers at the Academy of TV Arts and Sciences picnic just a few of the many on the agenda.

COMPASS Computes Wax Sales Potential

LOS ANGELES—COMPASS, a new development employing an electronic computer to predict, with 98% accuracy, the probability of a new recording becoming a sales hit, was introduced here recently.

Unveiled at a press conference at the Beverly Hills Hotel by Allen D. Allen and by Record World's Ted Randal, co-creators and partners in COMPASS, the new service was described as bringing "space-age technology to the music-radio business for the first time."

COMPASS, which is an abbreviation for Computer Assessed Record Data, has been tailored by Randal and Allen as a nation-wide service for radio stations, record manufacturers and distributors. Employing a specially developed electronic computer called SIRUP, for Single Record Unit Projector, the COMPASS service will project the "hit probability percentage" of all new recordings immediately following their national release and in followup.

Armed With Sales

Developed by Allen, the computer is armed with the previous sales performances of more than 10,000 records released during the past two years. To this "memory" is added a continuing flow of pertinent information regarding each new record release compiled by Randal from selected sources. SIRUP then processes all of the information to project the probability-percentage of the record be-

coming a hit.

The computer analysis is broken down into three categories, projecting the probability of the record hitting: a) the top 50; b) the top 10 and c) the number one in sales.

COMPASS data is transmitted to subscribers by Bell System Teletype (TWX) compatible with most radio station systems at a rate of 60 words per minute. The data is transmitted directly from the computer to a punched tape which programs the teletype. Companies not having the TWX service will receive the data by wire or air mail special delivery.

Regular COMPASS service started for initial subscribers on June 8, 1965.

Mills VP Attends NAMM Meet

Warren Ling, Vice President and General Manager of Mills Music, Inc., currently delving into the research and product development of the catalog, will make his first contact with the industry's jobbers and dealers while attending the firm's exhibit at the National Association of Music Merchants Convention at the Conrad Hilton, Chicago, June 27-July 1.

Mills, perhaps the longest exhibiting music publisher at this show, will be in Room 951, displaying their sheet music hits, educational publications including the best-selling Michael Aaron Piano Method, guitar books and many new items such as their all-organ volumes "The Music of Leroy Anderson" and "Mills Song Shindig."

General Sales Manager Robert E. Teck with Bernard Kalban, manager educational department, will accompany Ling to Chicago.

An interesting biographical fact about Sonny and Cher is that they once recorded as Caesar and Cleopatra because of Cher's long hair and Sonny's long hair ("it was long way before the Beatles did it").

The team is still interested in doing things before everybody else does. "It's important to be different; it's important to be unique; and it's important to have personality," Sonny concluded.

Better Knowledge Of Customer Top Need In LP Biz: Leslie

NEW YORK—"The best defense against the avalanche of LP product that gluts the market and winds up as 'cut-outs'," according to Pickwick International President Cy Leslie, "is a clearer picture in the record industry of the ultimate consumer." Leslie indicated that he was referring specifically to the female adult album buyer.

The remarks were part of an address given by the Pickwick chief at a national meeting held last week and attended jointly by both distributors and co-distributors (rack jobbers, etc.). The speech marked the final phase of the introduction of Pickwick/33 the new \$2.00 label composed of selected material not now in the active catalogs of Capitol, Warner Brothers, ABC-Paramount, Reprise, Everest and Jubilee Records.

"Everyone knows that the majority of the adult album buyers are women." However, Leslie stated, not enough manufacturers, merchandisers and retailers have taken the time and trouble to determine sufficient additional facts about their customer to be able to intelligently select the type of product she will buy. "Such a procedure," Leslie indicated, "is common practice in virtually every other consumer oriented industry except ours.

"Today more than 25 million women—more than one-third of all women over 14 years of age —work for pay away from home. By 1970, it's estimated there will be 30 million women in the labor force.

More Money Than Ever

"This means that your customers have more money than ever before and less time to spend it in 'specialty' stores.

They must concentrate their buying power in one place where they can get 'everything they need.'

"Altogether, more than 58% of the women in the United States receive some income. This group earns about \$60 billion a year in wages and salaries and in income from self-employment. More than 51% of the individual stockholders in the U.S. are women with some 2.8 billion shares registered in their names at an estimated market value of more than \$120 billion. All told, women control about 75% of the nation's wealth.

"But money isn't the only significant factor. Greater education (more than 1.5 million women are enrolled in college) is another item that should be taken into consideration in planning classical, semi-classical and 'better' music catalogs.

"Furthermore, this thriving female market will continue to grow. Women already outnumber men by more than 4 million, they outlive them and more of them are being born."

"One more significant point," Leslie said. "This year, half of the total population will be 25 years old or less. There are now about 11.5 million girls under 20, with \$6.5 billion of their own money to spend. While teenage girls make up only 13% of the total female population, they buy 50% of all phonograph records sold.

"The interpretation of these statistics is a matter for the individual manufacturer, distributor and retailer. What is important for the future economic health of our business is we be aware of the facts and take them into consideration when we try to reach the consumer with the product that SHE wants."

Tele-Tune System Waxie Maxie Hit

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Waxie Maxie's Quality Music Stores has inaugurated an innovation in record merchandising by providing 24 hour exposure, via telephone, of the record of the week.

Batteries of telephone answering devices are hooked up to answer the calls and play the tapes. The new "tele-tune" system is being publicized extensively on all Waxie Maxie's radio and TV time, and initial response has been "tremendous," tying up the machines far into the night.
