

Mustang Expands, Sets Roessler General Mgr.

HOLLYWOOD — Signaling the start of major expansion moves at Mustang Records, it was announced last week that Ron Roessler has been named General Manager of the label. Appointment, effective immediately, was made by parent company, Stereo-Fi Corporation of California.

Roessler said that he will join Bob Keene, Mustang head, and that the two of them would embark on a concentrated campaign to build a stable of bestselling artists for Mustang and subsid, Bronco. "We're looking to build artists rather than go for the hit-and-run one-shot single," he said.

Roessler will take on sales duties while Keene remains chief A&R producer of the label, which will aim primarily toward the pop market.

Right now Mustang is on the charts with "I Fought The Law" and just out is "Love's Made a Fool Of You," the first and second single releases by the Bobby Fuller Four. This



Roessler indicated that no new groups will be signed unless he and Keene have sufficient confidence in their durability.

In conducting the search for potential big names, Roessler will maintain an open door policy and will also pursue purchasing masters.

Label will continue to be based in California with Roessler overseeing national distribution. He plans to put on independent field men in major markets.

Roessler foresees a "handin-hand" relationship with Keene as they split duties at the growing Mustang diskery.

Roessler has been with Roulette for the past two years, having moved up to the General Manager post in October. Prior to that, he was with an independent distributor for five years.

NEW YORK—The Board of Directors of Cameo/Parkway, Inc., AMEX, has announced that Alfred Rosenthal has been named Executive Vice President in charge of all company and subsidiary operations and that Jay Conway has been elected Treasurer.

In advancing Rosenthal to his new position, the board also announced that a supervisory agreement with Premier Albums, Inc., of New York headed by Phil Landwehr has been terminated.

Rosenthal has been Vice President and General Manager of Chips Dist. Corp. and subsidiaries since 1962. Before joining Chips, Rosenthal was producer of the Dick Clark American Bandstand television show and prior to that was Program Director of FM Radio at Triangle, Inc. Conway has been with Cameo since 1963 and was controller since 1964. Prior to that, Conway was with Librand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery.

In a special statement Rosenthal announced the following personnel changes. In an effort to further the strength of Wyncote budget line, Clark Gertner has been promoted to the newly created post, Manager of Sales Management of the Wyncote division. Gertner has been associated with Cameo since 1962 and has been with Wyncote since its inception in 1964.

Woods Exits WDAS

PHILADELPHIA — In a surprise move, Georgie Woods left WDAS last week after a 10-year tenure during which time he grew to be the station's top deeiay.

Among his duties for WDAS Woods produced the first two Freedom Shows which grossed over \$50,000.

Woods will continue to produce his Uptown shows in Philly and will also have his daily TV show running on WHPL.

It's expected he will join another local radio station shortly—either WCAM-Camden or WHAT.

Woods is the third station personality to leave the station in eight months. The other two were Kay Williams and Del Shields.

Five new members of the field staff were named, three filling new positions and two covering vacancies which developed through promotions. The new men are: W. Cochran, Atlanta; J. Del Medico, Seattle; J. Dill, Upstate New York; J. Nadeau, Minneapolis and W. Patterson, Hartford.

Roulette Gets 3 Big S'tracks

NEW YORK - Roulette Records has acquired recording rights for three upcoming movies - Columbia Pictures' "A Study in Terror," a new Sherlock Holmes feature; the Leningrad Kirov Ballet version of "The Sleeping Beauty" and new Cinerama feature "Russian Adventure" narrated by Bing Crosby. The last two are hard-ticket attractions. "Russian Adventure," which opened to rave reviews recently in Chicago, opens in New York April 13.

All three will be released shortly, according to label prexy Morris Levy. Move marks Roulette's biggest coup in the soundtrack field.

Atlantic Racks Up \$1,800,000 In Billings at Convention

MIAMI BEACH — Atlantic-Atco concluded its most successful sales meeting last week in Miami. During the three day confab with Atlantic and Atco distributors during which the firm introduced its April album release, the company wrote a total of \$1,800,000 worth of business, the highest ever for any Atlantic-Atco meeting.

Len Sachs, Atlantic album sales chief, said "the distributor reaction to our new releases was the most enthusiastic we have ever had at any sales meet."

The meetings were conducted by Atlantic-Atco brass Ahmet Ertgun, Jerry Wexler, Nesuhi Ertegun, Bob Kornheiser and Len Sachs. Other Atlantic staffers present were Tom Dowd, chief engineer; Sheldon Vogel, controller; Herb Kole, rack sales coordinator; and fieldmen George Badonsky, Arnold Theiss, Joe Galkin and Joe Smith.

Attending the meetings were Atlantic-Atco disributors from all over the country as well as Hawaii. Stax-Volt was represented by President Jim Stewart, A&R chief Steve Cropper and promotional head Al Bell. From Canada came President George Keane, and executive Bill Bayes and George Struth of Quality Records, Atlantic's Canadian licensee.

Nesuhi Ertegun introduced the firm's April album product, which consisted of 15 Atlantic LPs, six Atco LPs, one Stax LP, One Volt LP and one Moonglow LP. New singles by Bobby Darin, Ted Taylor, the Who and Herbie Mann were introduced by Jerry Wexler.

Among the Hottest LPs . . .

Among the hottest items at the meeting were the following LPs: "The Wondrous World of Sonny & Cher;" "The Young Rascals" and Otis Redding's "The Soul Album" on Volt.

Other albums in big demand at the meeting were the Herbie Mann LP "Monday Night at the Village Gate;" the Modern Jazz Quartet-All Star Band album "Jazz Dialogue;" "The Best of the Righteous Brothers" on Moonglow; Joe Tex' "The Love You Save;" Barbara Lewis' "It's Magic;" the new album with Patti La Belle & The Bluebelles, "Over the Rainbow;" Bent Fabric's "Never Tease Tigers;" and "Mr. Acker Bilk in Paris."

Sachs on Spring Plan

Sachs spoke at both the Atlantic and Atco meetings about the firm's spring program. He stressed the firm's intensified dealer and rack-oriented advertising and merchandising program. Atlantic-Atco has set the largest budget in its history for consumer newspaper and radio advertising, that distribs can offer to qualified dealers.

This co-op budget supplements the big consumer and trade ad program now in action at Atlantic-Atco. Sachs also showed the firm's new point of sale merchandising aids for dealers. They include four-color day-glo, silk screened motion displays for use in dealer windows, two color silk screened single mounted easels and LP slicks mounted for pop, jazz and rhythm and blues LPs.

One of the most exciting features of the meet was the final banquet and show held on Tuesday night (29) when six distributors each won a Christian Dior mink stole. Winners of the stoles were: Marvin Ginsberg (Seaboard), Len Silver (Best-Gold), Ed Walker (Delta), Jack Lewerke (Merit), Ken Kaizana (Microphone) of Honolulu and Joe Chait (Tone). Mary Wells and the Young Rascals were the stars of the Atlantic-Atco show.

All Atlantic-Atco product introduced at the sales meeting, as well as all catalog product, is being offered at a special 15% discount with 30-60-90 days deferred billing for qualified accounts. Discount program will continue through July 31. All albums are covered by the usual Atlantic-Atco 100% exchange policy.

Bates will coordinate the company's activities with licensees and artists and will secure product for prestige to release in the USA Prestige plans to enter the moderate price classical field. The New offices are located at 41 Ladbroke Grove, London WII, England.

ABC's Oliver Label Changes Ownership

Larry Newton, president of ABC-Paramount Records, Inc., has concluded negotiations with Sandy Linzer and Denny Randell, new owners of the Oliver Records label, whereby ABC-Para's domestic and international distribution of their product will continue. The formation of Oliver was announced in January, under the direction of Charlie Calello. Because of heavy business commitments, Calello has left Oliver, and has been succeeded by Linzer and Randell.

Leaving their posts as producers for Genius, Inc., Linzer and Randell bring a wealth of talent to their own record label. As both songwriters and producers, they are responsible for the current success of the Toys ("Lover's Concerto"), whose new release, announced this week, is "Silver Spoon." In addition, Linzer's lyrics and Randell's music have collaborated in the production of a number of hit disks for the Four Seasons, including "Let's Hang On" and "I'm Working My Wav Back To You." Another dual effort resulted in the Soupy Sales hit, "The Mouse," which the team wrote in three hours, as well as six of the songs in Sales' ABC-Paramount LP of the same name.

Building Song Stable

As an adjunct to Oliver records, Linzer and Randell plan to build a stable of songwriters for their publishing firm, Captain Marvel Music, Inc., although they expect to personally write much of the material they will record. Randell's brother, Bob Rand, is one of their first writers.

Linzer, a native of Hillside, N.J., scored a hit with his first song—"Dawn," written with Bob Gaudio and recorded by the Four Seasons. Randell, from the Bronx, N. Y., began his New York musical career with music publishers Shapiro Bernstein & Co., Inc. In addition to his composing talent, Randell is an arranger of note and has worked on numerous recordings by the Four Seasons.

The two partners are currently in the process of negotiating with recording artists for Oliver Records.







UA's Colossal Soundtrack Releases

United Artists Records, an industry leader in filmusic, has announced its schedule of soundtrack albums slated for release in the forthcoming months, and label President Michael Stewart feels the grouping is the most impressive ever listed.

First of the UA movie sets has just been issued, the original score for "Cast a Giant Shadow," music by Elmer Bernstein. Production stars Kirk Douglas and Senta Berger, with special appearances by Frank Sinatra, John Wayne and Yul Brynner, and is the story of Col. Mickey Marcus, a leader in Israel's fight for independence.

The James Garner-Sidney Poitier starrer, "Duel at Diablo," follows next and showcases the music of Neal Hefti. scoring his initial western.

Spring will find UA releasing the soundtrack for "Khartoum," one of the parent company's major products for 1966. Starring Charlton Heston, Laurence Olivier, Richard Johnson and Ralph Richardson, "Khartoum" is presented in Cinerama, with music by the gifted English composer, Frank Cordell. This same period will bring

"The Russians Are Coming" which boasts Carl Reiner, Eva Marie Saint, Alan Arkin, Brian Keith, Jonathan Winters and the music of Johnny Mandel, another of the more successful of the newer Hollywood composer-conductor-arrangers.

"Hawaii" a Top Push

UA Records really rolls into high gear in the fall and will close out 1966 with a quartet of tracks from major films. "Hawaii," starring Julie Andrews, Max Von Sydow, Richard Harris and John Cullum, is already shaping up as one of the most widely-awaited movies of all time, and Elmer Bernstein's original soundtrack will be one of the company's top pushes for this period.

These are the film adaptation Broadway hit, "How To Succeed In Business Without Really Trying," showcasing Frank Loesser music and lyrics, and starring Robert Morse, Michelle Lee and Rudy Vallee from the original cast; "Anyone For Venice . . .", which stars Rex Harrison, Susan Hayward, Cliff Robertson, Edie Adams and Capucine, with music by Andre Previn; and the true-to-life story of "Namu, The Killer Whale," tentatively listed for late summer show-

Orbison, well-known as a cycling buff, was involved in a race at the time of the accident. His wife, Claudette, flew from her Nashville home to London Tuesday (29) to lend her sympathies, although Orbison was understood to be meeting all dates on his heavy schedule.

An additional difficulty arose when both of the top supporting acts were sidelined for several days, with Orbison doing the entire show by himself. Lulu, key distaffer on the bill, was out of action with a sore throat while the Walker Brothers had to withdraw for several days due to injuries sustained

in a near riot at one of the performances.

Orbison's newest single, "Twinkle Toes," received a unanimously favorable response with picks on all British music papers. Orbison also performed the song on ATV's "Sunday at the London Palladium," a showcase in which he also appeared in one of the first tests for color TV to be conducted in Britain. In the States, MGM Records is releasing the disk immediately.

London's Walt Maguire also reports heavy initial excitement on "Johnny's Bugle" on the Parrot label by a new Coast singer, Carol Lombard.


Another West Coast thrush, Kelly Garrett, who made a good impression with her first Palomar sides, will have a new release shortly in "A Toy in the Hands of a Child."

Gavin Meet Panels Shine

CHICAGO—Many of the participating radio folks at Bill Gavin's Radio Program here last week sat on panels and discussed policies and views at their particular stations. The three most important panels were the non-rock and pop format station talk, the r/b talk and the country/western talk.

Mark Olds of WMAQ-Chicago chaired the non-rock and pop panel discussion and reported that discussion stressed the importance of balance and individuality in station programming and personality. It was agreed, he relayed, that management should control programming, manage radio personalities and let the personalities get involved in the music they program. Consistency of format and excellence down to the last station jingle was underlined.

The panel concurred on the view that station promotion was a valuable way to enlarge audiences.

Panel members were Russ Barrett, KMPC; Glenn Bell, WMAQ; Gertie Katzman, WNEW; Dick Carr and Elma Greer, KSOL.

Lloyd Webb, WVON-Chicago manager, reported on the r/b conclave, pointing out that the number of stations programming r/b is increasing and general acceptance by advertisers is following suit. The panel noted, he said, the large number of community service spots r/b stations utilize.

He stated that all panel members underscored the usage of current play lists complemented by good standards.

Chris Lane of WJJD-Chicago gave the report on the c/w panel talk. His cohorts, he reported, noted that country music is becoming increasingly popular and thus the big acceptance of all c/w stations. Barriers are broken as far as the advertiser is concerned and the listener, too.

New country fans—the parttime ones—are unfamiliar with artists and labels, Lane said, and therefore it is important for the country deejay to give this info.

A Screaming Hit

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Streisand Hour Delights

CBS-TV colored Barbra last week, and Miss Streisand repaid them by covering all with glory (and, ultimately, no doubt with Emmy Awards, a là last season's first one-woman show).

From the striking sign-on with Barbra beautifully singing "Draw Me a Circle" while unseen hands did just that, filling in the features of a kindergarten gamin which dissolved into the songstress' face—to the impassioned concert sign-off, it was a virtuoso hour—captured for the most part, on Barbra's latest Columbia LP titled after the show, "Color Me Barbra."

However one may feel about Miss Streisand's presence (some find her a bit over-confident, lacking warmth), there can be little doubt that she has formidable piping. Pure, with just enough nasality to make her sound distinctive, her voice and intuitive "feel" lend new life to standards and vivify even the most average new ones.

Occasionally, during her most recent hour (especially in concert) she had to shout to fight her too-loud orchestra (not uncommon with TV vocal presentations); but for the most part she received expert help from all offcamera, including coproducers Joe Layton, who also conceived and choreographed

the program, and Dwight Hemion, the director, too.

The opening in the Philadelphia Museum of Art found Barbra imagining herself to be several famous faces (a sequel to Miss Streisand's quick-change Bergdorf-Goodman episode in the first TV special, but not nearly as brilliantly edited and performed by Barbra, whose talents were given their best run ever in that earlier segment).

"That Face, That Fabulous Face"

This was followed by a colorful circus sequence and a medley of "Face" songs. Miss Streisand seems obsessed by her face, and its bizarre unevenness has no doubt played a major part in her phenomenal rise. Her close-ups were frequent and fluid, and she missed no chances to sport that profile. However, although she apparently has no illusions about her looks (she did an amusing profile-to-profile bit with an anteater in the circus scene), it does seem in this case a perverse conceit to build more than half of one's hour TV show around one's own face.

If you missed "Color Me Barbra," catch the rerun. It was an unusually tasteful TV hour, and La Streisand is a superb singer.

It's a Hit . . . It's 'Superman'

NEW YORK—Superman came to Broadway's Alvin Theater last week as the star of a new hit show, called—what else?—"It's a Bird! It's a Plane! It's Superman." Superman fans will love it. Kids will love it. Nonfans will love it. Evil-doers won't love it. Hippies will deride it.

Just about everything in this musical comedy is musical and comic and totally in keeping with the spirit of the comic strip hit of the '40s that steadfastly pitted good against evil in the wonderful city of Metropolis. Superman is a goody two shoes. Clark Kent (mild mannered by Bob Holiday) is a goody two left shoes. Lois Lane (mooned by Patricia Marand) is a lovestruck girl reporter. And there are a couple of new meanies—a vengeful Nobel Prize losing scientist (fidgeted by Michael O'Sullivan) and a spiteful gossip columnist (pranced by Jack Cassidy).

Done with Love

The songs are by Charles Strouse and Lee Adams and the book is by Robert Benton and David Newman—all of whom obviously know and love Superman and have a little milk of human krypton in their metabolisms.

The New York dailies were 4-2 in their acceptance of the new play. The Daily Planet flipped over it. The Times' Stanley Kauffmann called it "easily the best musical so far this season . . . I add at once that it would be enjoyable—in any season." This influential quote alone should guarantee quite a run for the tuner and it'll affect sales of the Columbia caster due out within a couple of weeks.

"You've Got Possibilities" and "You've Got What I Need Baby" are two ditties that are likely to step out, although there are a couple of other equally appealing numbers in the context of the show. (The truth must be told. There are a few clinkers in the score, too. A few clinker scenes as well.)

But who cares? "Super" is duper.

The MGM records soundtrack album of "Doctor Zhivago" continues to gain momentum in all phases of the music market, announces Mort Nasatir, President of MGM Records.



Columbia is honoring the 30th anniversary of Serkin's American debut in 1936. For that historic debut Serkin performed Beethoven's Fourth and Mozart's Twenty-Seventh Piano Concertos with the New York Philharmonic under the direction of Arturo Toscanini, New Serkin recordings of both works are represented in this month-long salute which has already begun.

Ads have already appeared in the March 26 Saturday Review and the April Hi Fi/Stereo Review. The latter ad is on the back of a three-page gatefold Composer Calendar. The magazine is offering additional copies of the calendar for 25 cents on a send-in basis, so the Serkin ads will get further readership above and beyond Hi Fi/Stereo Review's 625,000.

Bargain Sets

Headlining the release are two basic-library, low-price sets: "The Five Beethoven Piano Concertos," a four-record set, and "Rudolf Serkin plays Four Great Romantic Piano Concertos," a three-record set. Dealers pay for slightly more than three records in the four-record Beethoven set. The 3-record Romantic Concertos set costs them a little more than the price of two records. But many dealers, according to Munves, are offering them at special discount prices which are equal to one free record. The "Great Romantic Piano Concertos" set includes Serkin's acclaimed re-cordings of both Brahms Piano Concertos, Schumann's A Minor and Mendelssohn's First Concerto-all with Ormandy and the Philadelphia Orchestra. Ormandy shares accompanying honors shares accompanying honors with Bernstein and he New York Philharmonic in the Beethoven

Munves has forecast a bright sales future for both sets as they offer great recordings of basic repertory that beginning classical buyers purchase in droves.

The special low-prices give dealers a reason to advertise and promote them heavily. Because the sets are skinwrapped, Munves uses the back-liner of each to pre-sell the consumer with raves these recordings have already received as single LP albums. Other low-priced sets in the series are also puffed on the back liner

More Great Serkin

The remainder of the all-Serkin release consists of single LP albums: Beethoven's First Concerto (with Ormandy) and the 11 Bagatelles; Beethoven's Second Concerto coupled with Mozart's Twenty-Seventh Concerto (both with Ormandy), Mozart's 14th and 17th Concerti (with Schneider), Mozart's "Double" Concerto (which Serkin performs with his son Peter) plus two Bach Concertos for Three Pianos in which the Serkins are joined by pianists Mieczyslaw Horszowski and Ruth Laredo; a solo album on which Serkin plays Schubert's great A Major (opus Posthumous) Sonata; and an album of Mozart and Mendelssohn chamber music masterpieces from Serkin's Summer Marlboro Music Festival.

3 Win Merc Contest

NEW YORK-The first in a series of talent contests to be set up in conjunction with the Coca Cola Company and Paul Drew, Program Director of WQXI and Editor of the Southern Music Survey, was concluded last week by Mercury Records in Atlanta, Ga. The contest, held in Atlanta's Merchandise Mart, although designed to produce one winning group to be recorded by the label, brought pacts to three separate performing groups.

Mercury A&R Vice President, Shelby Singleton, who acted as one of the contest's judges, also noted that an additional five groups were sufficiently impressive to merit further private screening for recording consideration.

Billed as the "Young American Battle of the Bands," the event called for amateur selfcontained groups from the Atlanta area to play and sing for twenty minutes. Groups selected as winners were: the Fourmore, The Five Men of Note and the Lords of Atlanta. In addition to the amateur groups, 25 professional groups from the Atlanta area were auditioned during the daytime. Of these, two were selected for future recording deals: the Bushmen and the Strange Bedfellows. The new pactees will be assigned to labels within the Mercury Record Productions fold, including Philips, Fontana and Smash.

The talent finds in the Atlanta area follow closely Singleton's purchase for Smash of the master found by Merrec's Brookmire, "Double Shot" by the Swingin' Medallions which is selling briskly in several markets.

The big meetings at the Bill Gavin programming conference are over. Frank Ward, General Manager of WWRL, N.Y., was the most exciting, magnetic, dynamic and stimulating speaker there. A close second from the pop side was Pat O'Day of KJR, Seattle. Tremendous talks were given by Ed Wright, Lloyd Webb, General Manager of WVON, Arnie Schorr, owner of KGFJ, L.A., and then Lucky Cordell, P.D. of WVON, and LeBaron Taylor of WJLB were absolutely fantastic.

I pointed out to the gathering that 95% of the efforts

toward improving race relations came from the R&B stations, and I asked what the pop stations should start doing. Arnie Schorr stated that the news media were definitely inflaming the public, because he said his newsmen could find NO RIOT in WATTS the other week, despite what the papers said. LeBaron Taylor thinks that there is going to be a long hot summer!

Lloyd Webb and Arnold Schorr brought up the new CHEAPER rating systems such as Media Stat which involve the listener writing out a diary. Top 40 and R&B stations suffer greatly in such a rating because their audiences are much less inclined toward writing. In fact, if a sampling were biased in this manner, one would expect the local classical music FM station to come out #1. One station mentioned that they didn't come out as well on the Media Stat as they do on Pulse and didn't land a big chewing gum account. I pointed out that any teacher can tell you that there is a high positive correlation between kids in school who constantly chew gum and not knowing how to write and read very well. In other words, the cats who chew the most gum are the cats who say "later" when it comes to filling in a radio station listening diary.

Arnie Schorr pointed out that a big car manufacturer didn't buy his station which has 60% of the Negro pulse and is #3in the general market at night and #7 during the day. Yet this manufacturer bought 10 deep in the L.A. market, and has no other way to reach the Negro market other than thru KGFJ (Negro readership of L.A. newspapers is about 1%.) It sure is hard to figure!

Schorr also articulated his policy of not playing any R&B records that can go pop. Thus, he only plays about 70% of the national R&B hits. He wants KGFJ to be pure, stone R&B, and he's not about to force the 5 pop stations on R&B records and then have them clobber him by going right on that newly created "name" artist's next release. He pointed out that the pop stations don't go on new R&B artists unless KGFJ first warms the sales on the records. Thus, L.A. pop stations are only playing about three or four R&B records, and Arnie has no fear of them grabbing his stick. Since he has no competition to speak of, this is how he keeps his game up tight.

Much tribute was paid to Rudy Runnels and Bill Sherrard of WOL, Washington, the first R&B station to have a #1 rating across the board in any city. They have only been on the air since July. Frank Ward pointed out that the all-news station in N.Y., WINS, is grabbing 15% of the Negro audience. However, WWRL is sold out on spots. Frank, old bean, you'll never know how many people commented how fantastic, fascinating a speaker you are. I, for one, was very proud to see you up there representing R&B for us. You were unbelievable, and what you were saying upset the place. These pop owners and managers really didn't know what has been happening the last few years in R&B radio, and your classy, explosive presentation and manner landed like an H-Bomb!

The one thing that really shook those people up was when you, LeBaron Taylor and Lucky Cordell all refused to give away much information about just how you are accomplishing

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Taking Care of Business

On the Album Scene

In reviewing the top list of jazz LPs in Record World's weekly survey, one becomes aware that the top sellers remain somewhat constant As a result, many times other LPs getting strong regional reaction sometimes never break through. We will make every effort to direct attention to these LPs. We can forsee the time when jazz LPs will have a much quicker turnover in terms of "newer" LPs while still maintaining the extended life of activity among those records we might classify as staples.

Among the newer LPs, Blue Mitchell's "Down With It" (Blue Note) is very strong in New York. This trumpet alumnus from the Horace Silver Group, along with Junior Cook, ts, Gene Taylor, b, Chick Corea, p, and Aloysius Foster, d, have put together three groovey cuts for a very tasty album. Most popular cut is "High Heel Sneakers." The popularity of "Sneakers," formerly a big rock hit, was not the reason for Blue or other jazz men who have interpreted this tune. The tune has musical validity that lends itself to jazz. And with Blue this may possibly prove to be one of the biggest records he has had to date.

"Talkin' About," Grant Green (Blue Note), showcases the guitar of one of the most brilliant guitarists in the business. Grant collaborates with Larry Young on organ and Elvin Jones on drums. His horn-like approach to the guitar blends beautifully with Young's sensitive organ and the dynamics of Elvin's drumming. "Talkin' About J. C." is dedicated to John Coltrane and is a moving, challenging tune. But "People" is the gas! This ballad has Grant almost vocalizing.

"El Chico," Chico Hamilton (Impulse), is Chico's latest bid to recapture his large "Forest Flower" audience. With Al Stinson, b, Sadao Watanabe, as and f, Victor Pantoja, Latin percussion, Willie Bobo, Latin percussion and the talented Gabor Szabo, guitar, they explore the Latin jazz idiom and come off superb. "Conquistadores" is a powerful, melodic piece while "People" once again lends itself to a new transla-

tion guided by the wizardry of Gabor Szabo.

The same Mr. Szabo leaves the Chico Hamilton group temporarily and uses the talents of Gary McFarland and company to create "Gypsy '66" (Impulse). There are nine tracks on this album and Gabor gives ample evidence that he is one of the major guitar voices of today. His "Yesterday" written by the McCartney-Lennon team of the Beatles and "Gypsy '66," the title tune, should bring a great deal of attention to him. Here is an album exposing the sound of today in a rhythmic, pulsating

A Live 'Ball'

"Cannonball Adderly, Live" (Capitol) is "Ball's" first live recording since his Tokyo album. At one time, one of the largest jazz sellers, he has been looking for the right combination that would propel him back on the charts.

In this latest album, a group that included his brother, Nat, Joe Zawinul on piano and Louis Hayes, Amd Jones (now with Oscar Peterson) and Charlie Lloyd who has also departed, they have created a number of interesting and melodic tracks. A new composition written by Nat, "The Little Boy With the Sad Eyes," is an extended piece of different solo moods. There is a reworking of "Work Song" and a swinging up tempo version of Charlie Lloyd's "Sweet Georgia Bright."

Horn, Du Shon Clicking

Two vocalists this writer has been praising for some time are beginning to get their message across with the help of some musically discerning dee jays throughout the country. One is Shirley Horn, the other is Jean Du Shon.

Miss Horn can be heard on "Travelin' Light" (ABC-Paramount). Johnny Pate, a talented composer and arranger, produced the set and can easily add this latest effort to his growing list of impressive credits. Miss Horn is described as a "singer who sits in your lap when she sings."

Whether in your lap or standing at the mike, the Washington, D. C. lass has a way with a song. She is a stylist free from cliches and fresh in her approach. The title tune "Travelin' Light," "I Could Have Told You" and "Had You Tried to Forget" are delightful musical excursions that display the talent of Shirley.

"Feeling Good," Jean Du Shon (Cadet), is another fine vocalist making a strong bid for recognition and her efforts are based on pure musical legitmacy. Her album contains 12 tunes in a variety of settings with arrangements by Jimmy Jones, Oliver Nelson, Billy Byers and Torrie Zito.

Her bid is a strong one. "Wild is the Wind," "Feeling Good," "Out in the Cold Again" are highly programmable material

'Soul Message'

"Soul Message," Richard
"Groove" Holmes (Prestige),
has the exciting Errol Garner
"Misty" as the big track. This
young organist from Camden,
N.J. has had a number of fine
albums in the past but this one
should be "the clearing in the
wood" for him. "Song For My
Father," the Horace Silver
composition, is also in the album and marks the first time
this writer has heard an organ
trio group attempt this bestselling tune. Groove's offering
is warm with a Latin flavor.

"The Loop," Johnny Lytle (Tuba), has this young vibest following on the heels of his chart selling "The Village Caller." Not much can be said about Lytle that has not already been said by those of us aware of his fine work. Caught in the middle of the unfortunate Riverside bankruptcy just when his record "Lela" was beginning to make some noise, he may make up for lost time. "The Loop" is catchy and can be played on all programs. But Johnny's real forte is his way with a ballad. He rolls with a song and has a way of teasing the lyrical quality in a beautiful melodic way. "Time After Time" and "The More I See You" are excellent examples of his work.

Besides his regular group of Peppy Hinant, d, Milt Harris, Org, he is augmented by Wynton Kelly, p, George Duvivier, b, and Willie Rodriguez on some tracks.

These are just a few of the newer releases that call for more than just a few cursory lines in a column. They just become regular occupants of turntables across the country.

Pat O'Day, P.D., of KJR, Seattle, showed why he has been voted radio man of the year in the Gavin poll by giving a dynamic, electrifying speech at the recent Chi Gavin Conference.

There is no question that Pat is a fantastic speaker who knows his business and knows what should be done with a radio station as well as or better than anyone in the industry. He received a roaring ovation, and I thought Chuck Blore would jump out of his skin when he applauded Pat. Harvey Glascock, General Manager of WNEW, N. Y. gave a magnificent, beautifully produced presentation that caused a great deal of favorable comment.

The big news was the C&W and "two-way radio" talk format explosion. The least known and least understood explosion was the R&B story. When **Ed Wright** spoke about NARA, many of the radio execs didn't even know what a NARA was. Ed carefully explained that it wasn't meant to be a deejay union.

The turnout was fantastic, and the biggest names in the business were there. There is no question that this will become an annual event. It's needed.

Time magazine put Hy Lit of WIBG, Phil., in the "big-time" with a feature article recently in the Modern Living section, which described the impact of "The Philly Dog" by the Mar-Keys on Stax upon the Philly teen dancers. Time states, "As everyone should now be aware, whenever Philadelphia rocks, the rest of the U. S. rolls." (Love that Times.)

Hy explained to Time that the kids in Philly improvised on and cleaned up a risqué Kentucky dance called the dog. The precision movements and grace of the all-but-pro Philly teen dancers are now being seen coast-to-coast via syndicated TV on Seven Arts' Jerry Blavat show. I expect it to greatly influence pop programming in many localities, but that remains to be seen.

Matty Singer is really jumping about "Monday, Monday," Mamas & Papas . . . The most picked new record is "8 Miles High," Byrds . . . Julie Rifkind of Boom claims that he has no sweat to bring the Cab Calloway version of "History Repeats Itself" into pop pay-dirt.

Lorber also has a new label, General International, that Amy/Mala will distribute. He has a couple of artists signed to his production company that'll be recording for GI shortly. He records Clyde Mc-Phatter and new contractee Chris Cerf for Amy.

Songwriter-singers Gary Hall and Erik—not a team—are also on the recording agenda for Lorber within the next week or so.

Another Lorber contractee is "Hullabaloo" choreographer David Winters, a Mercury artist

Top 100 Perennial

Lorber, an arranger-producer who hasn't been absent from the Top 100 chart for the past seven years, said the biggest problem he faces in making a record is finding good material. "Unless your artists also write," he said, "it's very hard. The best young writers today are involved in their own production companies or they hold

their songs for the hot artists."

Lorber himself writes "only when I have to meet a recording deadline," and puts his tunes in his own publishing house, Interval Music, a BMl affiliate.

In looking for new artists, Lorber confided that there seem to be some geographical areas more active musically than others, and two of these, he finds, are Ithaca and North Carolina, where he travels frequently to scout talent.

The next Lorber release is Timi Yuro's "Daddy" on Mercury, which the producer-arranger described as a three-minute play about a father discouraging his daughter's marriage.

On the charts now is the Lorber-arranged "True Love" by Lesley Gore (also Mercury).

Li'l Wally Big Noise in Polka Music Today

CHICAGO—Li'l Wally (Walter E. Jagiello) recently debuted on network television via Lawrence Welk's ABC musical series drawing an enthusiastic response for his "polkatina concertina" performance and singing, not only from the audience but from the Maestro himself.

Welk commented, "You can see why this man is very popular, as he has that very special Polish beat. I thought that I had a good beat, but he's got me beat!"

Li'l Wally started entertaining at 16. In 1951, he recorded for Columbia Records. A year later, he started his own label, Jay Jay Records, a top polka record manufacturer. Sales of

his own records have exceeded the five million mark.

Wally's success led him not only to records but to playing and opening up many ballroom doors that had not featured polka entertainment. In 1965, Li'l Wally went to Europe and entertained in Paris, Rome and nine cities in Poland. Another tour is planned for 1967.

He is scheduled to entertain at the Polish American Veterans Banquet to be held this year at the Fontainebleu Hotel, Miami Beach, Fla.

Buck Owens Proves You Can Take Him Anywhere

NEW YORK CITY-BROOK-LYN-NEWARK - Buck Owens and all-star country troupe played three engagements way up East on a recent week-end that had ticket buyers lined up and as anxious as if they were in the welfare line Buck sings about

Presented in the WJRZ-Newark "Cavalcade" series of concert performances (this was No. 4), the show was emceed at Carnegie Hall on Friday, March 25, and the following night at Newark's Symphony Hall by station's Lee Arnold, and Sunday night at the Brooklyn Academy of Music by Bob Lockwood, also of WJRZ,

The demand for tickets in Newark was so heavy that a second, late evening performance was given. An extra added attraction at the first Newark show was the surprise appearance in the audience of Jimmy Dean, who was introduced to immense audience applause by both Arnold and Owens, the latter acknowledging the great debt all country performers owe TV-disk entrepreneur Dean.

Rousing, Successful Shows

Owens, of course, was the

mainstay of the evening, closing the program with—literally—a bang. Whether singing about goin' in the movies, being together again, the pleasures of one more time or having a tiger by the tail, Buck was the ultimate in country showmanship. He was not too big to allow his extremely versatile Buckaroos to share the limelight in some noisily hilarious comedy interludes that eschewed neither Beatle wigs nor gunshots and convulsed audiences. (Capitol Records, recording Owens at Carnegie for an album under these hectic conditions, was probably less amused.)

For the record, the Buckaroos are comprised by Tom Brumley, Willie Cantu. Don Rich and Doyle Holly, the last-named two getting much play, respectively, as Buck's singing assistant and wide-grinned comic cutup.

Owens in a veteran performer with a winningly off-hand vocal style and plenty of savvy. He knows exactly what to do in the spotlight, and makes no false moves when he steps out of it, either. As they say, you can take him anywhere. These Owens dates have unquestionably done much to break down those country barriers even further in the Big City.

Curless Cheered, Too

Dick Curless'straightforward, appealing country warbling. Maine-style, brought cheers; as did Johnny Paycheck's more volatile singing—and not only from residents of "Heartbreak, Tenn." Archie Campbell was both amusing (as a comic) and touching (as a singer, on "The Men in My Little Girl's Life"). The Homesteaders proved a personable, talented group, too, and a new songstress named Kay Adams was right perky and pleasing.

A special word of praise should go to Marion Worth, long-time country thrush who not only decorates a stage warmly and prettily but sings a mighty sweet song. She did her "Shake Me. I Rattle" hit of a while back, among others, and the crowds loved her.

Fans' flashbulb cameras popped constantly during all performances, and when asked later backstage if performers didn't find it a disturbance, Marion, with true down-home understanding, replied: "We're used to it. It's when they stop that we worry!"

It was announced that due to audience reaction, the all-C/W WJRZ (continuing these "Cavalcades" indefinitely) was about to increase to 5,000 watts. With Buck Owens and company in charge at these performances, the power of country music was never stronger-or more universal.

"We actually have owned a licensed booking agency for several years with American Talent Corporation, but we have done nothing to develop the agency. We feel that our investment in Neal's active, fast-growing business is a wise one with the current increase in interest in country music."

Stapp went on to point out that the operation and management of the Agency will remain completely under the direction of Neal.

"As Jack pointed out, the operation of Bob Neal Agency will be as an independent business," Neal said, "and we will continue to follow the plans we have laid out for the growth of the Bob Neal Agency. Our personnel will remain the same and our office operation will remain the same. Future plans do call for the physical location of our offices to be within the same building as Tree, and we also plan to merge operation with American Talent Corp.

Asked about any connection between the writing and music publishing careers of artists he handles with Tree, Neal pointed out that a part of the agreement between the companies made it clear that any such work by artists was in no way involved in the transaction. "Several of my artists have their own publishing firms and writing careers, and there is absolutely no thought of any interference with these careers," stated Neal.

"There is a great deal in the way of booking — television, motion pictures, and other areas where the surface has been barely scratched by country music. Through Jack's connections in the major markets and through radio and TV we hope to be able to offer our artists the most complete management and booking service available and to be able to develop and create many new artists for the field."

CMA Director Jack Stapp created tremendous excitement at the Mark Century annual breakfast when he spoke on "The Modern C&W Broadcaster." CMA Director Carl Brenner spoke before the opening session of the Gavin Conference on the subject of "Country Music Broadcasting, 1966.

Le Roy Van Dyke and his group put the finishing touches on a successful visit by the CMA to the convention when he presented "The Wide Wonderful World of Country Music" Mon-

day afternoon before some 2000 NAB members. The fast-moving show produced by Gene Nash followed an introduction by CMA Director Glaser and was considered one of the highlights of the day's agenda at the NAB.

Following the show dozens of enthusiastic broadcasters met with CMA directors to learn more about country music and to get materials from the CMA. The country music association is mailing special packages of information to broadcasters who are interested in making the switch to full-time country music.

Congratulations to Bill Gavin and all concerned on the success of their radio programming conference in Chicago the weekend of March 26 and 27!

This was one of the most productive programming seminars this writer has ever had the opportunity to attend. Every facet of radio programming was covered and every man had his say. The general concensus of opinion was that most every type of radio, with the exception of country and Western, is losing shares of listeners. Those who are losing considerable shares were quick to concede that those shares are going mainly to country and western radio and some to FM listening.

Stations like WJJD in Chicago, WPLO in Atlanta, WJRZ in Newark, KSON in San Diego, KGBS in Los Angeles, KRAK in Sacramento, KAYO in Seattle and many other major markets have made tremendous strides in gaining audiences and continue to improve. Why all this has come about was the big, almost unanswered question at the conference. For the most part it boiled down to the fact that country music radio today is as modern and swinging as any other radio available. This, plus the fact that most successful country music stations have done a tremendous job in promoting their product has gained them not only a huge share of the listening audience but also a fantastic new breed of national advertising accounts that, in the past, had not once considered using country music radio to expose their wares.

And they've found that it's paying off! Never has the old cliche "country music is getting bigger" been more in evidence as a hard down fact. And what compounds that fact is that so many of the nation's leading pop radio men are admitting it.

And now the word has leaked out that the great metropolitan market of Boston will soon be able to enjoy the sounds of a full-time country music station! There are not many major markets left, and soon they, too, will be able to listen to their very own country music radio station.

The Stonemans, most recent member of TVs growing family of syndicated shows, will premiere the first week in May and feature MGM Records' popular Stoneman Family. The new show will initially be carried by 18 markets in the Southeast. Plans call for the show to be converted to all color production at a later date. Taping of the TVer is done at WSIX-TV here in Music City under the production of Bayron Binkley and the direction of Dallas Thomas. WLAC's Bob Jennings will be the show's announcer.

Monument's Jeannie Seely has the distinction of having her new single, "Don't Touch Me" picked to hit in over 50 markets this past week! Of those 50, every major market was included. Chicago, Atlanta, Newark, Los Angeles, Houston, Portland, Akron-Cleveland, Denver, Nashville and many others including a few pop stations picked the little gal to go with this one. It's truly one of the most outstanding female performances to come along in many a moon.

The Wilburn Brothers are kept so busy on personal appearances that their secretary, Mary Frances Wright, is driving to Knoxville in order to see them. Their current tour, which opened in Alabama on March 24, will take them to Texas, Oklahoma, Tennessee and Virginia. Then, it's back to Texas and on to Georgia, North Carolina, Maryland, and Pennsylvania. Once back in Nashville, Teddy and Doyle will tape future Wilburn Brothers TV shows.
