Bob Morgan Exec Producer, A&R, at MGM Records

NEW YORK-MGM Records' President, Mort L. Nasatir, announced that Bob Morgan has been appointed Exec Producer, A&R Operations, for the label. Morgan, who recently left Columbia Records as Director of A&R with that label's Epic and Okeh subsidiaries, joins the MGM executive staff immediately.

As Director of A&R Operations, Morgan will be responsible for all album and singles product produced by MGM and independent producers. He will supervise concept and planning for all MGM/Verve artists and be active in the acquisitions of new talent and masters. In addition, he will also produce specific albums and artists for the label.

Morgan comes to MGM from eight years of service with the Columbia organization. For the past three years he has been responsible for all popular product and A&R producers with Epic. In his four years

Morgan played a vital role in building it into a significant contributor to the overall Columbia Records group profit.

Discovered, Recorded Many

In his tenure with Columbia and Epic, Morgan was responsible for discovering many name acts which he recorded. They include the Dave Clark Five, the Yardbirds, the Brothers Four, the Clancy Brothers and Tommy Makem, Damita Jo and Enzo Stuarti.

He produced all of the Bobby Vinton Epic hits, including "Roses are Red" and "Mr. Lonely," and was responsible for the Brothers Four hit of "Greenfields." He also made singles and albums by George Maharis. Jerry Vale, Bobby Hackett, Jimmy Dean, Cliff Richard. Godfrey Cambridge and Buddy Greco, among others.

Mayhew JFK Book, **Oswald Album Out**

Alleged Assassin's Interview On Wax

NEW YORK—The hectic pace of the holiday season is not likely to abate for John F. Kennedy buff Aubrey Mayhew, also manager of Little Darlin' Records' country songster Johnny Paycheck.

Mayhew's impressive book. "The World's Tribute to John Kennedy in Medallic Art" F. (William Morrow & Co., New York, \$12.95), is just out; and "Lee Harvey Oswald Speaks!," the LP he produced for the new Truth Records (distributed by Audio Fidelity Records), is being released Tuesday, Dec. 27.

The album, Mayhew told Record World last week, is expected to garner both heavy sales and controversy. With the Kennedy clan finding itself new headlines of late, the package's appearance is most timely, as is the book's.

The material was discovered by Mayhew and consists of a 40-minute taped interview with Oswald on a New Orleans radio station. The interview was conducted by local disk jockey William K. Stuckey and broadcast on Aug. 17, 1963, three months before President Kennedy's assassination. Stuckey had been doing a series on Latin American affairs, and Oswald reportedly discoursed on the Cuban crisis of the day.

Oswald Speaks

According to the Truth Records (formed by Mayhew and Audio Fidelity just for this release) album cover, the package is "The only recorded interview of Oswald -- his ac-

tual voice - just discovered in 1966.'

Mayhew went on: "The interview shows Oswald to be an astute and calculating individual-not the idiot many made him sound after the President's assassination."

To hawk as well as herald the album's coming (and, no doubt, also to mention the arrival of his Kennedy book), Mayhew is taking on plenty of interviews. On Dec. 27, he is scheduled to do the "Today" TVer in the morning, newspaper, wire service and magazine interviews in the afternoon and to visit with CBS news in the evening.

And that's only the first day.

Walt Disney Music Co. Releasing **Commemorative LP from Disney Pix**

Proceeds To Cal Institute

The Walt Disney Music Co. has announced that early in January it will release a commemorative album of music from the late producer's films of the past three decades called "The Music of Walt Disney."

The decision to issue the package, a non-commercial entry with all profits to the California Institute of the Arts, was made after much soulsearching, it was learned last week; and plans were only consummated after word came that several other labels were going to come out with budget album commemorations.

Racusin Takes Over at RCA As Label's 'Biggest Year' Closes

NEW YORK—The succession of Norman Racusin to the post of Division Vice-President and General Manager, RCA Victor Records effective Jan. 1, following George R. Marek, is taking place at the end of the diskery's "biggest year," according to Racusin, and during one of the company's most active periods (for instance, the Colgems-RCA distributed Monkees have been topping both the singles and album charts recently.)

For that reason, when **Record** World talked with the new execelect last week, it was not surprising to learn that Racusin planned no major policy changes at present. Why should he?

But. . . .

After More, Better Ways

Racusin did have this to say to indicate the challenge he was setting himself in his new post: "The record business hasn't begun to scratch the surface where sales are concerned. Thre are between 25 and 40 million players out there. Why should we get excited when a record sells a million? With something like 'The Sound of Music' soundtrack, you're getting somewhere. Why can't we do that more often? There must be more and better ways to get to the people."

In discussing more specifically current and pending company activity, Racusin said that the company has a couple of new acts to uncork shortly who could be receiving the RCA push—that high-powered of all measures that recently accompanied the Monkees' entrance into the record world.

He noted that, as trade stories have had it, the company is looking into the publishing field, although with no definite plans so far.

'Sherry' Next Caster

The next Broadway caster from RCA is "Sherry." the adaptation of "The Man Who Came to Dinner." starring George S an ders. Racusin seemed anxious to place that score alongside company's first caster release of the year "I Do! I Do!," with Mary Martin and Robert Preston, just out and promising to be a big seller. Racusin reiterated that RCA would continue and even step up its teen market projects, which have grown significantly in the last year.

Livingston To NY Press Meet

HOLLYWOOD — Recordings of national significance will be previewed at a press conference to be held by Capitol Records, Inc. on Tuesday, Jan. 3. 1967, at New York's Americana Hotel.

Purpose of the conference will be to announce release of a new Capitol album entitled "The Controversy," an in-depth audio study of the late President's assassination, the Warren Report and the subsequent controversy.

Presiding at the conference will be Alan W. Livingston, President, Capitol Records, Inc.

According to Livingston, the new album, which is being released in the label's "Probe" documentary/news series, contains a number of news "firsts" not previously presented via other communications media,

potential is the international product on the domestic scene. He said that whereas international releases always sell reassuringly as expected in ethnic markets, he has noticed recently that sales seem to be extending beyond ethnic barriers.

To close, **Record World** asked Racusin what he thought was wrong with the record business. And Racusin answered paradoxically, "What's wrong with the record business is what's right with it. It's uncertain. It has bulges and valleys. It's a new business every day of the week. You cut a record on Tuesday, release it Thursday and all of a sudden the business has changed. You could have a big hit or a lot of compound to eat. But that's the excitement."

Caedmon's Carl

Carl Sandburg reading from his autobiography, "Always The Young Strangers," has just been released by Caedmon Records as an album.



The Rolling Stones' motion picture, "Only Lovers Left Alive," is expected to go before the cameras within the "next very few months," according to Allen Klein, business manager of the group. Vigorously denying the recently reported "mystery" about the Stones' movie plans, Klein declared, "We have had some problems with the screenplay, but these are the only problems we've ever had and they are now being sorted out."

"We have signed contracts and have already been advanced 90,000 pounds," Klein continued. "Does that sound as though there was any doubt about the picture?" Last week, Klein received 80 pages of script material from writers Keith Waterhouse and Willis Hall, who are currently at work on the screen adaptation of the Dave Wallace novel on which the picture will be based.

"We hope to have the second completed draft of the screenplay by Christmas," Klein said. "The pages are coming to us by airmail as they are completed. As soon as we have a finished script, we'll set out the production schedule. We firmly expect filming to start within the next few months."

Heliodor Changes

NEW YORK—MGM Heliodor producer Richard de Costa has announced his resignation from the classical label. De Costa, who has been supervisor of the budget line since its inception, is leaving to become manager of the American Wind Symphony Orchestra in Pittsburgh immediately after the first of the year.

Jerry Schoenbaum, MGM's classical division chief, has named Philip Fradkin as successor to the post. Fradkin previously had been Assistant Musical Director with Westminster Records.





Atlantic's Top Year: Sales Increase 50%

NEW YORK—1966 was the greatest year for Atlantic in its entire history, with sales up 50% over 1965, Ahmet Ertegun, President of the company, said last week.

"The tremendous increase in sales of Atlantic-Atco singles and LPs during 1966, following hard on the heels of the firm's great expansion in 1965, points up Atlantic's position as the fastest-growing company in the record industry," said Ertegun in his year-end report of the firm's activities. "In the United States, and all over the world, Atlantic-Atco artists dominated the charts throughout the year."

"The year was also a most impressive one for Jim Stewart's Stax and Volt labels," Ertegun continued. "It marked the emergence of Stax-Volt as the hottest R&B firm in the business with the strongest artists' roster of any firm in the R&B field. Creativeness of outstanding producers like Jim Stewart of Stax-Volt, Ollie McLaughlin of Karen and Carla, Quin Ivy, Rick Hall of Fame Records and Buddy Killen of Dial Records contributed enormously.

The year was one of the most exciting and eventful for Atlantic-Atco in many areas. The firm continued to score in singles with nearly 50 best-selling singles; Atlantic's LP sales increased 100% over the previous record-breaking year with a score of chart LPs; the company signed a flock of important pop, jazz and r&b artists to long term contracts; Atlantic greatly increased its activities on the foreign scene and signed many new licensees; Atlantic launched a new literary series: Verbum Records; and Atlantic concluded an agreement with the RCA Victor Record Club.

Single Hits

On the singles scene Atlantic burst through in the spring



with two No. 1 records. One was a million-seller with a new artist, Percy Sledge. His recording "When a Man Loves a Woman" went to No. 1 and sold over a million copies within six weeks after release. Sledge followed that up with two more big hits, "Warm and Tender Love" and "It Tears Me Up." The Young Rascals had the other No. 1 smash: "Good Lovin'," which made the boys a household name. They came through with two other smashes in 1966, "Come on Up" and "You Better Run." Atco Records had a No. 1 chart disk, the Troggs' "Wild Thing," which helped introduce the English group to U.S. audiences. The Troggs had two other big hits on Atco in 1966, "I Can't Control Myself" and "With a Girl Like You."

Bobby Darin came through with a tremendous smash for Atlantic, "If I Were a Carpenter," for one of the biggest hits of the year. And Sonny & Cher nailed down another world-wide hit on Atco with "Little Man," which made the Top 10 of the U.S. charts and went into the Top 10 in a dozen countries throughout the world. Wilson Pickett scored with four worldwide chart-busters, including "Mustang Sally," "Land of "Mustang Sally," "Land of 1,000 Dances," "Ninety - Nine and a Half Won't Do" and "Don't Fight It." Barbara Lewis went up the charts with "Make Me Belong to You," while Mary Wells had a big one with "Dear Lover."

Hits on the Karen and Carla labels included Deon Jackson's "Love Makes the World Go Round" and the Capitols' "Cool Jerk." Joe Tex kept his Dial Records' string intact with five hits including "A Sweet Woman Like You," "S.Y.S.L.J.F.M.," "I Believe I'm Gonna Make It" "I've Got to Do a Little Bit Better" and "Papa Was Too." The Shadows of Knight scored with "Gloria" on the Dunwich label, and Jimmy Hughes had a strong seller with "Neighbor, Neighbor" on Fame.

Stax and Volt hits included Carla Thomas' "B-A-B-Y," Eddie Floyd's "Knock on Wood," Sam & Dave's "Hold on, I'm Comin'," the Mar-Keys' "Philly Dog" and four Otis Redding hits, "A Lover's Prayer," "Satisfaction," "Fa-Fa-Fa-Fa-Fa" and "Try a Little Tenderness."

Best Selling Albums

Atlantic-Atco album sales increased by 100% in 1966 over

1965. Sales were sparked by "The Wondrous World of Sonny & Cher," and their previous Atco LP, "Look at Us." The Young Rascals had a smash Atlantic LP, "The Young Rascals," and Percy Sledge had two block-busters "When a Man Loves a Woman" and "Warm and Tender Soul," "The Exciting Wilson Pickett," Joe Tex' "The Love You Save" and "I've Got to Do a Little Bit Better,' "Solid Gold Soul" and Bobby Darin's "If I Were a Carpenter" were all solid sellers. "Wild Thing" by the Troggs on Atco, "Gloria" by the Shadows of Knight on Dunwich and "The Best of the Righteous Brothers" on Moonglow, all were big.

Best selling jazz LPs on Atlantic included Herbie Mann's "Our Mann Flute" and "New Mann at Newport," Charles Lloyd's "Dream Weaver," Brother Jack McDuff's "A Change is Gonna Come"; Sergio Mendes' "The Great Arrival" and the Modern Jazz Quartet's "Blues at Carnegie Hall."

On Stax and Volt the top sellers included three Otis Redding LPs: "Dictionary of Soul," "The Soul Album" and "Otis Blue"; Sam & Dave's "Hold On I'm Comin'"; and Carla Thomas' "Carla."

New Signings

Atlantic-Atco signed long term, exclusive contracts with many top artists during 1966. Among the outstanding jazz artists who joined the label were: Charles Lloyd, Jack Mc-Duff, Shelley Manne. Freddie Hubbard, Robin Kenyatta. Chick Corea and Junior Mance. Lloyd and McDuff both came through with best-selling debut LPs during the year.

Aretha Franklin was signed to a long term Atlantic contract with her first release set for early 1967. Other artists who joined Atlantic in 1966 included Keely Smith, Dee Dee Sharp. the Bitter End Singers, Tamiko Jones, Charlie Brown's Generation, the Buffalo Springfield and the Washington Square Stompers. Herbie Mann, a star on Atlantic for the past five years, signed a new long-term agreement with the company.

Through Atlantic's French affiliate Barclay, Atlantic secured the rights to distribute recordings in the United States by Mireille Mathieu, Atlantic also made arrangements to handle distribution of Willie Barney's Bright Star and Four Brothers labels and George Tobin's Brahma label.

In February, Atlantic concluded a contract with the RCA Victor Record Club which en-

Epic Gets Fame Releases for US

CBS Records, Ltd., in England has announced the signing of top British rhythm singer Georgie Fame to an exclusive long-term contract. This week, Leonard S. Levy, VP of Epic Records, announced that arrangements have been completed for Fame's recordings to be released in the United States on the Epic label.

Fame was born Clive Powell in 1943 in the coal-mining, cotton-mill world of Leigh, Lancashire. His father was a cotton spinner who played piano and accordion at the local church hall. At thirteen, Georgie was caught up in the rock-andskiffle boom that was infecting Britain, and he played piano with a local group. It was no surprise to his family when he announced soon after that he was leaving home to join a rock 'n' roll group.

Fame left for London, and there his career consisted of playing in ballrooms with various back-up groups. It wasn't long afterwards that he was chosen to join a group called the Blue Flames, which played at the Flamingo Club in Lon-

don's Soho district. Soon, the group's leader left, and Georgie found himself leading his own group. The acquisition of a Hammond organ really began to change Fame's music.

A live recording session at the club produced an LP and Georgie's first single, "Do the Dog." Several records followed, and in December, 1964, the pop-buying public discovered Fame and snapped up a quarter of a million copies of "Yeh, Yeh."

Audio Fi Labels Enjoy A Peak Period

NEW YORK — Herman D. Gimbel, President of Audio Fidelity Records, Inc., reported to his Board of Directors at the year-end meeting that Audio Fidelity Records Inc., showed a tremendous increase in sales of its labels, Audio Fidelity, Karate, Little Darlin', Audio Rarities and Kinor.

Interim reports by Alexander Grant & Co., accountants and auditors for the company, showed a domestic sales increase of 30% over the comparable period for 1965 and a 36% gain in sales by Audio Fidelity Records' foreign licensees. The Canadian operation reflected an increase of 22% over last year.

Since Gimbel assumed control of Audio Fidelity Records, Inc., the company has been undergoing a vigorous expansion program, the result of which can be seen in the sales and earnings growth of the company. Under Gimbel's direction, Audio Fidelity entered the pop market with its Karate label which, within a short period of time, enjoyed its first hit single, "Juanita Banana"; this was soon followed by the "Juanita Banana" album.


Since its inception in the middle of 1966, the Little Darlin' label singles and LP releases have appeared on the country and western charts consistently.

The Audio Fidelity label itself added about 60 new LPs during the past year. It released 15 new LPs in its classical line, including a luxurious seven-record boxed set of the nine Beethoven Symphonies, and a two-record set of Beethoven's 8th and 9th Symphonies.

Gimbel also introduced new packaging concepts for many of Audio Fidelity's new albums which were enthusiastically received by Audio Fidelity's distributors.

Carl Shaw, Vice President of the company, just returned from the West Coast after negotiating for a new jazz line, details of which will be announced at a later date.

Gimbel's plans for 1967 are to continue the company's expansion program.



New licensees for Atlantic product appointed in 1966 by Nesuhi Ertegun, Atlantic VP and Director of International Operations, included Polydor Records for England, Quality Records for Canada, Barclay Records for Belgium and Switzerland, Polydor Records for Mexico, Brazil, Peru, Columbia and Chile, Polydor Records for Holland and Teal Records for South Africa.

Atlantic Records stepped up its rack activity with the appointment of Herb Kole as Coordinator of Rack Sales. Henry Allen was named National Promo head of Atlantic-Atco Records. Johnny Bienstock was appointed Exec Assistant to Atlantic Executive Vice-President Jerry Wexler and Atlantic opened an office on the West Coast under George Furness. Sheldon Vogel was promoted to Controller of Atlantic Records.

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Late word on "Tip Toe," Robert Parker, is that it broke wide open in New Orleans and it broke in Newark off the WNJR pick, and it looks good in Miami, Charlotte, etc.

What The Record Industry Needs

Instead of throwing so much money into new product that never sells a copy, the industry should spend some of this money to acquaint the public via radio and TV spots with what is already available. Sure Records in Philadelphia used UHF TV to promote an LP called, "Polish American String Band Plays World War One Songs." Tremendous dealer activity was generated. Ads in Sunday supplements for record clubs are nice, but many people do not read. Radio is only playing a select few hits over and over. A company that doesn't have a "Sound of Music" LP or Monkees or "Winchester Cathedral" still has something good to sell. Instead of trying to sell it to a PD or to a dealer, try selling it to the consumer the way they sell cars. They'll make the dealer order it or maybe make the PD play it.

Next, start a campaign to sell a record player to every kid in a house. Push record players as THE gift to give for any occasion. The more record players you sell, the more people you have with record collections. Custom design a record player specifically for the teens—a "Miss Teen" or "Mr. Teen" player. A man with four kids who buys a \$700. stereo wants \$5. stereo records—"the best records"—or his kids won't get near that player. If the industry promoted the sale of low-priced players the way they do tape, we'd have a boom. What we just *had* was the worst year yet in the sale of record players! New ideas in promotion are badly needed!

Wrap Up

The #2 record in England behind the Tom Jones is "What Would I Be," Val Doonican, Press, and it was written by my friend Jackie Trent. She wrote the new Petula Clark with Tony Hatch, and she sings for WB label . . . We would like to thank Harry Harrison of WMCA for a thoughtful, lovely note, and we're happy to hear all the play he's getting on "May You Always" on Amy . . . "Winters Children," Capes of Good Hope, is a tremendous record . . . Solid pop sales in New England on "Everybody Dance Now," Soul City, Goodtime (Cameo) . . Atlantic Records reports that "Mustang Sally," Wilson Pickett, exploded in sales in N.Y.C. . . The Jane Morgan version of the European hit, "Kiss Tomorrow Goodbye," went on most of the key pop stations. The Lainie Kazan version on MGM is going pop in New England.

"98.6," Keith, just got the West Coast, broke in New England, Minneapolis, Florida and should come all the way in. It went top 3 in Cleveland, and is a hit in Detroit.

DOESN'T ANYONE WANT TO PLAY A SMASH: "Let's Get Lost on a Country Road," Kit Kats, Jamie, sold 28,000 in Philly and is still selling, and has sold nothing anywhere else, only because it didn't get a shot. It needs good play. It's a HIT!

because it didn't get a shot. It needs good play. It's a HIT! Ditto for "Bring the Country to the City," Tony Mason, RCA, which was a pop giant in Philly, but got played nowhere else. Now RCA has a pop hit in Detroit with "Sweetest One," Metros, and no one wants to believe it . . . We attended the University of Pennsylvania with Joe D'Imperio, head of A&R for Victor, and we know that this swingin' guy can bring RCA right up front with what's happening today, teen sound and R&B. In his student days, Joe used to make the Frank Palumbo CR Club scene and the old Click. Philly is a lot tamer since the pride of Ocean City, N.J. left. Now you find him at Danny's Hideaway.


Speaking of Philly, "I'm Gonna Miss You," Artistics, is also a solid pop smash here, and is cooking at WMCA, N.Y. These hits that sell over 350,000 R&B keep being overlooked pop! . . . Jackie Wilson hit a trade chart at Number 11 with an action mark, and never moved into the top 10, except in Record World.

"For What It's Worth," Buffalo Springfield, Atco, sounds great, and has something to say ... "Oh Woman," Nat Stuckey, Paula, will be a hit C&W, and should spread pop in many markets.

Did you know that the David Garrick version of "Dear Mrs. Appleby" went top 5 in Denmark, Singapore, Ireland, Belgium and other countries?

Bob Thompson of MTA Records informs me that "Ballad of Walter Wart," Thorndike Pickle Dish Choir, is starting well in Minneapolis, Louisville, Seattle, San Bernardino and Nashville. (Continued on page 23)

"If You Go Away," Damita Jo, Epic, is a hit in Chicago ... "A Good Love," Lorraine Ellison, WB, is a Pick at WNOR, Norfolk and KBAT. San Antonio ... "Little Black Egg," Nightcrawlers, Kapp, keeps on trying; why not, after all, it's only been around two years.

"I've Got To Have a Reason," Dave Clark 5, is an automatic ... Jerry Butler can't miss having his first pop smash since "Moon River" with his new one, "I Dig You Baby," Mercury ...

"You Won't Lead Me On," Wailers, UA, is a powerful sound, and it is getting attention in a number of places . . . WDAK, Columbus, Ga., reports "Tell Daddy," Clarence Carter, Fame, is #13 and selling. Robbs on Mercury are #9, and "Don't Go Out in the Rain," Seagulls, Date, broke open.

Inspired apparently by smashing Top 5 action at big KHJ, L.A., KIMN. Denver, went with "Knock on Wood," Eddie Floyd, Stax . . . WIBG, Philadelphia went on the Boston cooker, "Hard Lovin' Loser," Judy Collins, Elektra. Judy ranks with Joan Baez as the best folksinger in the nation, and her LPs sell very heavy. FLASH . . . WIP broke "I'll Take Care," Frankie Laine, in Philadelphia and Humdinger Matty Singer got it broken upstate. It took off like crazy. It may do 40,000 in Philadelphia. This is very big news, because Frankie Laine may mean to ABC what Al Martino means to Capitol Records.

"Gimme Some Lovin'," Spencer Davis Group, broke wide open in Philly and Baltimore for UA.

Dave Kapralik reports a number of additional top pop stations have gone on "Let's Fall in Love," Peaches and Herb, Date.

Bang-Shout Records should have three in the Top 10 come January: Freddie Scott, Neil Diamond and the McCoys. "Are You Lonely for Me," Freddie Scott, is now a Top 5 R&B giant and a number of key pop stations like WDRC-Hartford have gone with it.

Bertha Foster of WDRC New: Nino and April, Howard Tate, Young-Holt Trio, Aesops Fables, Dionne Warwick, Dave Clark 5, Felice Taylor, Mojo Men, Surprise Package and Tommy Dae.

"Wild Thing" by Senator Bobby and the Hardly-Worthit Players on Parkway is a smashing sales hit in Philly.Neil Bogart reports a monstrous breakout in Chicago on "Love So Much," New Colony Six, Centaur. Neil personally flew to Columbia, So. Carolina, to bring a hot master, produced by Joe Morris, "I've Been Hurt," Sensational Epics, and the disk is breaking big through the south.

One of the most picked records in the country is "Kind of a Drag," Buckinghams, USA.

Late report: a number of additional markets are coming in to confirm Philadelphia on hit sales on Frankie Laine's "I'll Take Care." It looks like Frankie will be one of the great comeback stories of recent years . . . Eddie Floyd is Top 6 at KHJ-L.A.

MGM Follows Biggest Year With Hottest 1st Quarter

NEW YORK—MGM Records has concluded the first quarter of its 1967 fiscal year with gross sales up 72% as compared to the first quarter of last year. according to label President Mort L. Nasatir.

"It is significant," stated Nasatir, "that each of the label's product wings contributed to the overall success picture."

The '67 first quarter figure, largest in the company's 20year history, comes hard on the heels of MGM's strongest sales and profit year in 1966. The label's 1966 billing was up 52% over the previous record total for 1965.

Nasatir cited an integrated team effort as the underlying reasons for the growth. "Top artists, top product, effective marketing and first class distributor cooperation all concontributed to the success on the national as well as the international level. It's also gratifying to know that many of our biggest stars today were introduced or have developed under the MGM growth pattern." Behind the general upswing

in sales were a number of


diversifying product moves by the firm and exploitation of potential in record and allied musical fields.

The firm acquired a number of significant soundtrack albums, like "Doctor Zhivago." which were leaders.

MGM Records also entered the tape field with a fullyrounded program that featured a strong push on four and eight track cartridge product and the highly successful introduction of the MGM Playtape 2 portable cartridge player. In commenting on this facet of company operations. Nasatir said that Playtape 2 had far exceeded expectations.

The label complex also entered the Capitol Record Club in 1966. Another growth factor has been the continued development of MGM's whollyowned Metro distribution branches in New York. Chicago and Los Angeles, and its stronger representation in the international market, especially the starting of its own company with Ricordi in Italy. Stateside, MGM has made a

"Don't It Make You Feel Kinda Bad," is the side in Cleveland and Philly on the new Radiants, but the play is split.

Alvin Cash's "Boogaloo" remains at \$1 in Chicago, and the Jimmy Robbins is large nationally ... "Look at Granny," Howard Tate, is heading toward the 100,000 mark in sales ... MGM-Verve has a top 5 hit with Spyder Turner (which was predicted first in this column), and they are pushing hard on the Royalettes (and getting Detroit sales.) Also, "Amen," Johnny Nash, is getting a lot of important play for MGM, as Harold Berkman and Ronnie Mosely keep on pushing.

The WABQ, Cleveland Pick is "Hidin' My Love," Aesops Fables, Atco, which is a hit in S.F. . . . Both WABQ & WJMO are on "Sookie Sookie," Roy Thompson, and "Ain't No Soul," Major Lance, for Okeh. Mike Payne at WABQ reports Bobby Bland, Jr. Parker and the Radiants as solid hits; and personally picks Joe Simon and Billy Butler. The Fascinations is top 10 . . . Al Perkins of KALO, Little Rock, called to report Freddy Scott as #1, and he is giving it a "Top and Bottom" because the "B" side is breaking. Mandala Raises Hullabaloo

Originating in Toronto, Canada, "The Soul Crusade of the Mandala" made its American debut at the Hullabaloo Club in Hollywood, and for three weekends more than 1,500 teenagers jammed the night spot.



Los Angeles, the city that perhaps houses more music groups than any other, received this one with disbelief. Young George Olliver, lead singer, and his Mandala caused authorities to protest their appearance and they threatened to close the Hullabaloo if the group did not conform to city laws. No one under 18 is permitted on the dance floor of a Los Angeles club, nor is a performer in costume permitted to leave the stage. Center-staged Olliver asked his audience of 1500 to leave their seats and join him in his "circle of soul." The throng charged the stage, and at one point Olliver, frequently called the High Priest of Soul, was pulled off the stage.

The Mandala's basic material rhythm and blues. Their is highlight is a number titled "The Five Steps to Soul" which features a series of monologues by Olliver which demand audience responses.

The group travels with \$1400 in lighting equipment and their own PA system valued at somewhere more than \$22,000. Their appearance and staging are striking. Their clothes are well-suited to their act, and their use of lights provides an added musical dimension. Don Troiano's guitar sound also is effective.

The Manadala is currently playing a tour of one-nighters in Canada, and manager Randy Martin plans to bring the group back to the United States in January at which time their first single, produced by Kop-pleman & Rubin Associates, "Opportunity," will be released.

concerted drive in the rhythm and blues and country music fields. The emergence of the Royalettes, Howard Tate and Spyder Turner, to name just a few, in the R&B field and the addition of key personnel in that field have made a marked difference in sales.

MGM also has opened its own C&W office in Nashville headed by Jim Vienneau. This closeness to the market has resulted in the acquisition of the Stonemans, Tompall and the Glaser Brothers and Sandy Posey to an already strong artists' roster led by Hank Williams, Jr. and Sheb Wooley. In addition, Jack Clement will be working closely with Vienneau as an independent producer.

MGM has also opened its own records division offices in Los Angeles under the guidance of Clive Fox. This operation will account for stepped up control of West Coast sales and distribution. Jesse Kaye continues to head up the West Coast talent and A&R operations with a special emphasis on soundtracks

Distribution

Nasatir also mentioned the continued sales expansion of various exclusive distribution deals as an important part of the MGM sales boom. Deutsche Grammophon classical product for example, which the label distributes in the United States, was up 20 percent over 1965 at a time when the classical business is slow generally.

The MGM Records' distributed independent Kama-Sutra label with the hit Lovin' Spoonful, was well over '65 sales figures, and the label is showing more impact with chart product from the Innocence, the Trade Winds and the Sopwith "Camel."

Soundtrack Leader

In the all-important soundtrack area, Nasatir underlined MGM's outstanding job as industry-leader with three topselling LPs "Doctor Zhivago," "Born Free" and "The Singing Nun." The recording of the Academy Award-winning Maurice Jarre score for the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer film "Zhivago" ranks among the all-time best selling soundtracks. To date the album is well over the one million mark, label asserts.

Other artists on the MGM label have also scored heavily with album product: Connie Francis, Herman's Hermits. Eric Burdon and the Animals, Sam the Sham and the Pharaohs, Roy Orbison and Lou Christie.

Verve Expansion

Nasatir also singled out the diversification of the Verve label as an imposing ingredient in the record-breaking sales results. The addition of the Righeous Brothers, the initial entry from the Mothers of Invention and from Arthur Prysock have augmented strong sales from Jimmy Smith, Stan Getz. Willie Bobo, Wes montgomery, Cal Tjader and Astrud Gilberto. Walter Wanderly's first album has also given a significant sales boost to Verve.


Talking about future becoming present, Nasatir referred to the Verve Folkways scene which continues to build nicely under label manager Jerry Schoenbaum's direction. He revealed that orders for the second Blues Project album, "Projections," have already topped sales of their first LP. Two more artists have entered as substantial sellers: Janis Ian and Laura Nyro.

The King Leo label also was formed in 1966 as a regular price deluxe, double-fold line to tie in with TV spectculars and out-of-the-ordinary childrens' product. The first numbers in this line, "How the Grinch Stole Christmas" and "You're a Good Man Charlie Brown," have been most successful

Budget Growth

In February, MGM Records added new labels to its budget representation that made a most significant contribution to the total sales picture. In addition to better-than-ever sales from its pop Metro banner, VSP was created to appeal to the budget-minded jazz buyer, Heliodor was tailored specifically for the classical buyer and Leo the Lion Records was brought up to date and scored mightily with its "live action" and education-slanted play albums. "Batman," "Superman" and many other new titles sold well.

The MGM family of labels racked up consistent chart and sales action with its major artists. The label had its biggest sales week for singles in December when more than 655,000 45s were sold.

Since its organization late in 1965. Date Records has been well represented on the charts. Matthews expressed his enthusiasm over the success Date has attained in this time, and indicated that exciting plans to further strengthen the label would be announced in a few weeks.

Stage Review Do! | Do!' Does It!

NEW YORK - Criticizing "I Do! I Do!" for its weaknesses. which really only become apparent after the final curtain falls, is looking a gift horse in the mouth.

For "I Do! I Do!" a musical adaptation of Jan de Hartog's "The Fourposter," is gifted with Mary Martin and Robert Preston as its entire cast and Gower Champion as its director.

This threesome is endlessly resourceful is bringing off the show, which quite literally revolves (and vice versa) around a bed and the married life of a couple who sleep in it during a 50-year plus marriage.

As Martin and Preston sing. dance, play instruments, change costumes, apply make-up, ride bicycles, observe the wedding night (rather too coyly), push the bed around the stage, hang diapers, clean up toys, their triumph is that this first twocharacter musical seems so easy, so relaxed and just sheer fun. And indeed, for the audience it is-highly-skilled and polished Broadway entertainment.

Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt supplied the basic material for the musical and certainly they have done no less a professional job than Martin, Preston and Champion, because you can't make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. But there are different grades of silk and Jones and Schmidt only got C+ for effort. Their work is sturdy, but not inspired, and it would have been nice to leave the theater remembering Mary Martin and or Robert Preston singing that really great love song. -

Critic Crist Proves Liners Are Important

NEW YORK - Liner notes and their importance have long been a moot topic in the trade and so a recent liner note story, turned up here last week, should be of interest.

Judith Crist, movie critic of the World Journal Tribune, and formerly of the Herald Tribune told Record World last week that she had received letters "from the four corners of the world" for the notes she wrote for RCA Victor's best-selling "The Sound of Music" soundtrack.

Mrs. Crist noted that her liner credit was "Judith Crist, The New York Herald Tribune." and therefore she was the only name on the album followed by some sort of address buyers could grab onto when they wanted to write to someone — just anyone — about how much they loved the album.

Evidently many letters arrived at Mrs. Crist's office addressed to Rodgers and Hammerstein, etc., and they were duly forwarded. But Mrs. Crist said she had received just as many "rhapsodizing" about the album and movie.

(An amusing footnote is that Mrs. Crist did not like the movie. an opinion she made quite clear in her review. Her liner notes, written long before she saw the movie, concerned the Rodgers and Hammerstein team—a slant suggested by RCA's George R. Marek who commissioned the piece.)

Mrs. Crist said the most interesting letter she had received was from a Welsh boy, who reported that the album enabled him to walk and play football again.

Mrs. Crist's latest disk stint was providing the liner notes for the new Upstairs at the Downstairs package of satirical songs and sketches.



The mailbag this holiday season has been filled with soulful greetings from members of the jazz academy across the nation. And to all, our thanks for the kind remembrances.

Among the letters received this week is one from Judson Snyder, Program Director of KJAZ, in San Francisco:



Del Shields

"Just a note to let you know that all of us here are avid readers of your column.

"In regards to cooperation from the disdistributors, we, too,

have our troubles from a minority of them. Although we've put across the message to most of them that the surest way to boost record sales is to place the music in front of the potential cuustomer's ears, a few still think that the newspaper columnists should get them first. This despite the fact that newspaper coverage of jazz albums in the Bay Area is sporadic at best.

"But the smart record companies have gotten the message. Verve buys three hours a week, Blue Note two hours, Prestige two hours and Riverside one hour. During these hours, naturally, only that particular label is aired with the emphasis on the new releases.

"Guess which record albums are best sellers in this area?

"Verve has been with us for over three years, Prestige for one year, Blue Note and Riverside are recent additions to our hour and half-hour program schedules.

"The enclosed brochure tells more about us, we signed on the air Aug. 1, 1959, and have been straight ahead 99% modern jazz ever since. The one percent? We dig back into the archives for the oldies once in a while to get down to the roots."

A Very Good Year

Speaking of the year of 1966 . . . it has been a very good year. There were so many interesting developments on the jazz scene that neither space nor time will allow us the luxury of full indulgence.

was the selling of Blue Note Records-one of the oldest jazz labels as well as one of the greatest incubators of jazz talent-to Liberty Records. Most of us waited in suspense hoping that the fine record of Blue Note would be enhanced. Fortunately, the headmasters at Liberty were aware of the keen interest that Al Lion and Frank Wolff had maintained through the years in creating the label and continued their participation. As a result Blue Note continued to produce and release some swinging LPs. There was the addition of Bernie Block as the Liberty head of the label, whose talent for merchandising and promotion was reflected in stepping up the distribution and servicing of the product.

But among the highlights

Lee Morgan, Stanly Turrentine, Wayne Shorter, Jimmy Smith and Bobby Hutcherson all came out with top albums and many found their way on the best-selling charts across the nation.

Greatest Tragedy

Possibly the greatest tragedy of all was the demise of the Limelight label. Mercury's jazz wing brought in a concept of packaging that was unanimously hailed as the greatest innovation to ever take place in jazz. Unfortunately, there was a lot missing in the grooves. There were, however, some sterling albums that should have done much better. And the fact that the company added some powerhouse names in terms of top selling artists Les McCann, Oscar Peterson, Three Sounds and Dizzy Gillespie did little to offset the need for better promotion and more extensive distribution.

Oscar Peterson's long-time trio disbanded with Ray Brown retiring from the hazards of road travel and Ed Thigpen electing to turn his attention to teaching and publishing a book on drumming.

The surprise news that followed was his adding Louis Hayes and Sam Jones, longtime Cannonball Adderley sidemen, to the group. These two swingers proved to be worthy replacements.

While on the subject of trios, Ramsey Lewis and company parted. This abrupt change

came during the height of Ramsey's popularity with the group booked solidly. This forced Ramsey to return to Chicago and he signed Cleveland Eaton and Maurice White. And the sound of Ramsey continued. In the meantime, Eldee and Red formed their own group with Don Walker and came up with a year end smash in "Wack, Wack."

Jimmy Smith, the world's number one jazz organist, turned vocalist and came up with "Got My Mojo Working" and "I'm Your Hootchie Cootchie Man." As if this weren't enough, he next turned his hand to "Peter and the Wolf" and with Oliver Nelson and a big band. Another best-seller was produced.

1966 was also the year that saw the organ move from the fringe area, as John Wilson of the New York Times put it, to the center of stage. Richard "Groove" Holmes, who had recorded a number of fine albums with Pacific Jazz, came East and recorded "Misty" on Prestige. Overnight (as we often say in show biz), he became a hot top "40" artist.

New Prestige Era Dawned

Prestige, which had gone somewhat in limbo, added the Fields' boys, Joe and Jerry and with Cal Lamplay in charge of A & R, a new era of activity emerged and Prestige was once again taking care of business.

Atlantic Records came out with the strongest set of jazz releases they had ever released. With Charlie Lloyd, Eddie Harris, Herbie Manne, Shelly Manne, Max Roach, their yearend contribution was most welcome.

And there were attempts by jazz musicians to cash in on the new jazz rock trend. Happily, we can report that only where there was musical validity was there any success.

All in all, it was a very good year. And jazz emerged from the sleeping bee to that of an art that can successfully weather all of the storms. With the addition of FM radio as the newest frontier for jazz on a seven-day week basis across the country, the once neglected child of music emerged as a full-fledgd member of the exciting world of music.

Fontana Gets Disk

CHICAGO-Via the efforts of Chicago-based A & R director Lou Reizner, Fontana Records acquired a red hot master from the Duluth, Minn. area: "Clock on the Wall" by Sounds Like Us, on the Jill Ann label.

Ahmet Ertegun, President of Atlantic-Atco Records, negotiated the agreement with Bob Bateman, owner of Hib Records of Detroit. Disk will be distributed by Atco under the Hib logo.

Spellbinders Tour

With the release of their first record, "Danny Boy," and "Help Me" being released by CBS Records in England, the Spellbinders left last week to appear on television and a two weeks tour of England. The group is arriving in London on Dec. 30 with their manager, Bill Downs, and director, Syd Shaw.

A cocktail press party will be held for them by CBS Records where they will be introduced to the press. Three television shows have been arranged and a two-week tour taking them to Liverpool and Manchester.

GABOR SZABO-Impulse A 9123 Gabor should be coming into his own as a jazz guitarist. Currently holding down the chair in Chico Hamilton's group, he has recorded a number of excellent albums on Impulse. This present outing is among the best he has done. Already a smash on the West Coast. the title tune and his poignant offering of "Bang, Bang" should be rewarded with a great deal of exposure.



Taxes & Burton Dinner


