Labels Urge Congress Broaden Copyright Law

WASHINGTON, D. C. — On Tuesday, March 21, phonograph record companies urged Congress to broaden the nation's copyright law so as to require those whose businesses are based on the playing of recordings—radio and TV stations, juke boxes, commercial background music services and discotheque—to pay royalties to record companies and performers.

The plea was made before a Senate Judiciary Subcommittee considering revision of the current copyright law, most of the provisions of which date back to 1909.

Testifying were representatives of the Record Industry Association of America, whose members make and sell about 90% of all the recordings in the United States.

The record companies, while generally supporting the revision bill, also testified in opposition to a provision that would increase by 25% the royalties payable to music publishers on popular records and by 100% on classical recordings. They warned that the consequences of such a rate hike would be a build-up of pressures leading toward increased retail prices or less musical content per record, a decline in the output of musical recordings, less employment for musicians and other artists and the forced exit from the industry of smaller, less financially stable record companies. The public would be the ultimate loser, they declared.

Kama Sutra Bows New Buddah Label

NEW YORK — Kama Sutra, the independent production company, will start its own independently distributed label, Buddah Records, to include all categories of the contemporary music scene, from jazz to Latin American to premium, etc.

The Kama Sutra label is distributed by MGM Records.

Buddah will bow in mid or late April, and will have its own distribution. The new label also will have outside producers.

The new label will be helmed by Kama Sutra principals Phil Steinberg, Hy Mizrahi and Artie Ripp. K-S VP Frank Mell is currently in Europe settling international representation.

The first release on Buddah will include albums as well as singles.

Testifying in behalf of the record industry were its special counsel. Thurman Arnold, a partner in the Washington law firm of Arnold & Porter; David Kapp, President of Kapp Record, Inc., and currently President of RIAA; Clive J. Davis, VP and General Manager of CBS Records; Alan W. Livingston, President of the Capitol Records; Jarrell McCracken, President of Word Records; Isabelle Marks, Assistant Secretary of Decca Records; Sidney Diamond, Counsel to London Records, Inc., and Special Counsel to RIAA, and Ernest Meyers, the Association's General Counsel. A statement was filed in behalf of Norman Racusin, VP and General Manager of the RCA Victor Record Division, who could not be present at the hearing.

Under current copyright law, music publishers and composers share royalties accrued from public performances - live and recorded - of their music on radio, TV, theaters, night clubs, and the like. Record companies and performing artists have never before been entitled to receive royalties from the public performance of their recordings, a right that prevails in most areas of the world, except behind the iron curtain. Juke box owners are now exempt from paying royalties to publishers and composers, but the revision bill currently before the Subcommittee would remove that exemption.

Stressed Contributions

Record industry witnesses pointed out that a copyright in a performance has for many vears been vested in other creative art forms - musical, dramatic and literary works, as well motion pictures. stressed that the creative contributions of the record industry in pairing the right song with the right artist, arranging and orchestrating it so that it best shows off the performer's talent, was as important as fitting actors to roles in motion pictures; that arranging microphones in a studio and engineering a recording so as to produce the right sound and tone, pitch, reverberation, etc., was to the record industry what the proper set design and lighting was to the production of a motion picture.

The end result of this creative effort on the part of record companies and performers is a

Date Celebrates Big 1st Year Expanding

Date Records, after an impressive first year of operation since its reactivation by Columbia Records early in 1966, is not resting on its laurels.

According to Ed Mathews, Manager, Date Records, the label is solidifying its successes and acquiring new artists and properties to enhance its future. In short, through selective master purchases backed by thorough promotion and artist development, Date is moving out on all fronts. Date product is distributed nationally by Columbia Records' distributors.

"Despite the fast expansion of Date, we are striving to continue the person-to-person contact that has meant so much to our success," Mathews commented regarding Date's position of prominence in the current market. He continued, "The label has enjoyed an exceptional track record during its first year of operation, primarily because of our ability to deal directly and decisively with new talents."

Building on solid success, Date has released a second Peaches and Herb single, "Close Your Eyes," which is already heading fast up the charts, following the duo's first hit, "Let's Fall in Love." Their first album, "Let's Fall in Love," has just been released and has hit the charts. Records by Peaches and Herb, who have been christened "The Sweethearts of Soul" by disk jockeys, are independently produced by Dave Kapralik's Daedalus Productions.

Hit Foundation

Further expanding on a hit foundation, Date has released an album by The Arbors, "A Symphony for Susan," which is already on the charts. The way for the LP was paved by the group's hit Date single of the same title, which achieved high chart position and established the Arbors as hitmakers. The Arbors' recordings are independently produced by Richard E. Carney.

These important solidifications complete, Date is now expanding further. The label recently announced the signing of the Coasters to an exclusive recording contract, in a production agreement with Leiber and Stoller. The famed group's first Date single, "Soul Pad" c/w "Down Home Girl," has just been released. A

Coasters album is already in production.

In addition, further penetration into the pop rhythm-andblues market is expected with the soon-to-be-released master purchase "I Stand Accused (Of Loving You)" by the Glories. The female group is produced by Bob Yorey Productions.

Entering Country

Date is also entering the Country-and-Western market. Mathews recently announced the signing of the promising artist Van Trevor. Trevor's recordings will be produced for Date by Dick Hurd of Stanrich Productions. Van Trevor has had two C&W hits on the Band Box label-"Born to Be in Love With You" and "Our Side." An album containing his current hits is now being prepared for Date release.

Other Date artists, meanwhile, are also receiving heavy Date promotion in the label's success consolidation. Date has just released a new single by the Seagulls, "Twiggs," a song written for the newly prominent British model Twiggy. The group performed the song for Twiggy and a large number of fashion-business luminaries at a party for Twiggy given last week by photographer Bert Stern in his Manhattan studio. A new Cannibal and the Headhunters single, "Shake a Tail Feather" c/w "Fairest of Them All," is slated for immediate release.

Staff Grows

This increased activity has made it necessary for Date to expand its promo staff. Ed Mathews will soon announce

phonograph record which today the principal medium by which new music and artists are introduced and continuously made available for public appreciation.

Introduced into the record was a study indicating that better than 73% of total radio broadcasting time is devoted to recordings and that profits of radio stations have been following a steadily upward trend.

The proposal from the record industry was that a performance copyright be vested in phonograph record companies with proceeds from royalties collected from radio stations, juke box owners and other commercial users of sound recordings to be split equally between the record companies and the performers.

In arguing against the proposed increase in the royalty rate payable to publishers and composers, the record industry reps pointed out that the percentage of the industry's net sales represented in payments to music publishers steadily increased from 8% in 1955 to 11.1% in 1964. While the record companies' sales have been increasing, and the music publishers' share of the royalty dollar has also been going up, profits after taxes for the record industry declined from 3.6% in 1965 to 1.7% in 1964.

Furthermore, the industry's average rate on net worth in 1955 was 5.5%; in 1964 it had dropped to 3.8%. This information was incorporated in a study prepared by Prof. John D. Glover of the Harvard Business School and the Cambridge Research Institute of Cambridge, Massachusetts.

It was stressed that publishers received royalties on recordings sold whether or not the record companies even make back their original investment in producing the recording.





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

In addition to the normal rash of new record activity expected to take shape as the films near completion and premiere dates, Chappell has kicked off a huge new production project on its literally hundreds of separate publication versions of these scores and of individual song material from each.

One of the most interesting features of the campaign involves a cooperative effort between Chappell and Warner Brothers Records, label on which the soundtrack LP of "Camelot" will be released. John Cacavas, Chappell's Director of Publications, has prepared a special marching band arrangement of the overture from "Camelot," and Warner Brothers will use this as the backbone of a colorful kit designating a series of unique

marching band formations and routines. Known as the "Half-Time Kit," the package will be used by high school and college marching bands for half-time shows at football games next fall

Both "Camelot" and "Half a Sixpence" are in an advanced stage of production. "Funny Girl," to star Barbra Streisand, is scheduled to start filming shortly. "On a Clear Day" will also star Miss Streisand, and will commence shooting upon the completion of "Funny Girl."

Shooting on "Finian's Rainbow" will begin sometime during the summer and will star Fred Astaire and Petula Clark. "Paint Your Wagon" is also due to go before the cameras later this year.

Chappell, publisher of all the scores involved, will produce new covers for all its publications, and has planned new promotional mailings to begin in the near future. The publications include, among others, arrangements of the scores and of individual songs for marching band, concert band, orchestra, small instrumental groups, and choruses.

Monument Music Publishing Firms Start Global Program

HOLLYWOOD—Marking the first of various expansion moves in the organizing and controlling of their own foreign music publishing agreements, Monument president Fred Foster announced this week (27) that the initial contracts have been and are being signed for the launching of the hundreds of Monument-owned copyrights abroad with representation in England, France, Italy, Belgium, Germany, Switzerland, Austria, Holland, Scandinavia, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, etc.

Under the guidance of Monument VP and international Director Bobby Weiss, a program of country-by-country alliance has been negotiated instead of a one world agreement with any one large publishing organization. "We believe in obtaining the strongest possible publisher representation in every country," said Weiss, "and also insuring a full percentage of re-


turns instead of winding up with siphoned-off profits."

NEW YORK — The Klayman brothers of Cincinnati — Sam, Lou, Al and the late Ike—comprise one of the royal families of the music business, retail and distributions ends.

"Sam started in the business in 1925, I came in around 1935, Ike in 1940 and Al has been in since 1945," Lou recently recalled.

"Sam started out in retail at the old Klayman's Music Store on W. Sixth St. in Cincinnati, which was the Harlem of the city, and he stayed in retail exclusively until around '34 when Decca Records came into existence. Sam became a sub-distributor for them until the opened their own branch in Cincinnati the next year.

"Sam remained in retail, and his shop, which also could have been the original one stop, prospered — records were sellthrough the Sixth St. location, and this plus the fact that their own ideas were changing caused them to leave the retail business completely."

Still Successful

Al and Ike ran A&I, Sam ran Supreme. After a few years, Supreme became so strong that Al had to move over to Supreme and Ike ran A&I. Both firms are running successfully to this day. Ike died two years ago.


Lou began in the record business as a shipping clerk and counter boy at Decca.

ing for 35 cents, three-fora-dollar then. Through his sub-distributorship with Decca, he started to get into the distribution end more and more with some of the smaller labels. At this time he worked closely with Decca's Dave Kapp and A&R man Mayo Williams."

Sam, Lou explained, maintained his retail business until the mid-'40s, when Mercury Records was founded. He then became a full-time distributor, forming Supreme Distributing Co., which is located at 1000 Broadway in Cincinnati.

Ran Distrib End

"When Ike came to work with Sam in the retail business," Lou continued, "they more or less ran the small distribution end together until it started to grow. Ike was in the service from '41 through '45, serving in the African campaign, and when he came out, they decided to start another distributing firm, A&I (named after Al and Ike), where they distributed a lot of the indie labels.

"In the meantime, the expressway was preparing to come

to Decca as manager of the Buffalo branch. In 1950, I came to New York to manage the Decca branch there until 1954, when I opened up Mercury's first New York branch.

"In March, 1959, I started my own distribution set-up, Action Records, where we distributed Dot, Reprise, Roulette, Stereo Fidelity, among other labels. I sold that business in '63 and went into partnership with Al Levine in the New Deal Record Service Corp., opening branches all over the country. We handled the U.S. Army singles program for the European theater. In '66, New Deal was bought by ABC Records. I stayed on as Vice President."

New Deal Complex

New Deal is a complex operation that includes distributing, rack jobbing and one-stopping, with locations in New York (headquarters in Long Island City), New Haven, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Detroit, Chicago and Los Angeles, with representatives out of St. Louis and Kalamazoo, Mich.

Folk - Country Report From Europe . . .

By MURRAY KASH

LONDON—In the folk world, the number of clubs over here has grown tremendously in the past few years. The amount of record releases by English and American folk artists along with a fairish amount of airplay has helped the cause.

Elektra has been very big in this direction. They started out in England a few years ago by releasing many of their U.S. albums by such as Tom Paxton, Judy Collins, Phil Ochs, etc. Since these artists have made a number of concert tours and TV appearances following their English releases, the folk scene has become very lively.

has helped put their album at the top of the folk best seller list. Also high in the charts, the Watersons (two sisters, a brother and boy cousin) from Yorkshire, and their LP, "Yorkshire Garland"; (on Topic) followed by "The Best of British Folk Music" (a variety of British artists); Tom Rush, "Folk Songs, Blues and Ballads," and Cyril Tawney, one of England's leading traditional folk singers.

Another Elektra release that is catching on is "Beattle Country" by the Charles River Valley Boys. Just issued by Elektra, the Judy Collins LP that she recorded in London last year called "In My Life," with compositions by Brecht, Weill, Brel, Donovan and Dylan, should be a big seller.

With approximately 400 folk clubs with a total attendance of 20,000 members per week, the local and visiting folk artists can get lots of exposure. On TV, BBC producer Yvonne Littlewood has a series, "Tonight in Person," that has featured international names like Pete

Seeger; Peter, Paul and Mary; Tom Paxton; the Clancy Brothers with Tommy Makem, and many others. British folk artists like Martin Carthy (guitar) and his partner, David Swarbrick, have made such an impact via records (Fontana) and P.A.'s that similar duets are springing up all over the country.

Other Britons making a big reputation are Bert Jansch (Trans-Atlantic); Young Tradition (Transatlantic); the Spinners (their "Family of Man" LP on Fontana is great).

On the Country Side

As a look at the recent British charts will tell you, country material seems to be the open sesame to getting to the top of the charts, e.g. Tom Jones' "Green, Green Grass of Home"; Englebert Humperdinck's "Release Me." Now Dave Berry has just come up with "Stranger" (formerly recorded by such country stars as Lefty Frizzell), hoping he can repeat the formula. Meantime, Tom Jones is doing nicely with his "Detroit City."

Other country disk favorites on this side of the Atlantic: Jim Reeves' "I Won't Come In While He's There"; and "Almost Persuaded" by the Hillsiders (a very up-and-coming British group). Recent British releases by American artists include: Slim Whitman's "What's This World A-Comin' To" (Liberty); "The Girls Get Prettier" by Hank Locklin (RCA); as well as a considerable number of LPs by Jean Shepard, Hank Thompson ("Six Pack to Go"), George Jones, Johnny Cash ("Happiness Is You"), Hank Snow ("Gospel Train"); and a variety of stars in an LP called, "Great Country and Western Stars Sing Their Biggest Hits."

Needed are more visits by country stars from Stateside to do PA's. Recent U.S. visitors who have done so include Melba Montgomery and Leroy van Dyke. Coming soon: Hank Locklin and Bobby Bare.

EMI Buys Grade for \$21 - Mil

LONDON — With the announcement of the purchase of the Grade Organization by Electric & Musical Industries, headed by Sir Joseph Lockwood, for a reported \$21,000,000, England's top record manufacturer now controls the UK's largest talent agency. Takeover is set for April 12.

The deal had the backing of the Grade directors who with their associates own more than 40% of the shares. Under the deal, the famous show biz brothers of Lew and Leslie Grade and Bernard Delfont continue to run the operation as a separate entity.

Leslie Grade and Bernard Delfont are directors of the Grade Organization and built up the group into one of the most powerful organizations in show business. Lew Grade is Managing Director of the ATV television group.

Among Grade Stars

Among the stars signed up with the Grade Organization are such top names as Dusty Springfield, Dave Clark, Frankie Vaughan, Johnnie Dankworth, Norman Wisdom, Morecanbe & Wise, Albert Finney and Sir Alec Guinness. It also takes in the Shipman & King chain of cinemas and has produced such films as "The Servant" and "Sparrers Can't Sing."

John Read, Deputy Managing Director of EMI, said that the deal with the Grades was only completed last week in the offices of merchant bankers Lazards.

Kash on Country In Record World

Murray Kash, who has the BBC radio program "Call It Country Style," this week begins writing a column on folk and country music exclusively for Record World.

Kash was born in Toronto, Canada, and was graduated from the University of Toronto as a Bachelor of Arts. In Canada he worked in commercial radio for the CBC. He came to England in 1955 and has been broadcasting on the British Broadcasting Corp. and Radio Luxembourg ever since.

He also has acted on stage, TV, radio and in films.

"We both had separate meetings with our financial advisors, talked on the telephone, then met. First talks were held from two to three years ago. Very informal chats began again recently and these sparked off the rumors but we could not agree on terms then," Read stated.

Buying Management Skills

EMI is keeping all the Grade directors on the payroll and Delfont will join the Board of EMI. "We are buying management skills," said Read.

Although Grade will continue to be run as a separate entity, it will obviously work alongside EMI's show business interests, including its vast record business. The stars that are signed up with EMI include the Beatles, Adam Faith, Dave Clark, Cilla Black and Manfred Mann. By this deal, EMI gains control of the Harold Davidson group, a wholly owned subsidiary which represents the top pop groups such as the Animals and the Hollies.

Through the Tito Burns Agency taken over by Grade a year ago, they become agents for Dusty Springfield, Bob Dylan, Peter, Paul & Mary, Dionne Warwick, the Searchers and the European representatives of the Rolling Stones.

PGS Pubbery Set

NEW YORK — The publishing team of George Pincus and Paul Siegal, who hit #1 on both sides of the Atlantic a few years ago with "Calcutta" (Lawrence Welk) and "Itsy Bitsy Bikini" (Caterina Valente), have formed a non-exclusive new German publishing firm Pincusgil-Siegel Musikverlag (PGS), recently admitted into Gema.

The firm has initial action on Brenda Lee's "Rusty Bells," recorded by Lolita of Polydor with the James Last Orchestra; "Humba Tatara," recorded in the USA by Frank Yankovic on Columbia and Will Glahe on London; and "Candles Glowing," written by Lotar Olias and Paul Siegel, recorded on Decca with Marlene Dietrich in USA and Pye, England.

PGS is located in Berlin, where Siegel has charge. Pincus heads the New York end of the operation.

Sinatra's 7 - City Tour

Frank Sinatra has signed contracts to make a limited sevencity concert tour in July, backed by the Buddy Rich Orchestra.

The tour will be the singer's first since his record-breaking concert schedule in the summer of 1965, which began at the Newport Jazz Festival. The Rich "big band" will be augmented by a special string section.

Arrangements for the Sinatra tour will be handled by two separate firms, starting with a Sunday night concert in the Pittsburgh Civic Arena on July 2. Other cities to be visited include: Cleveland, on July 6, at the Public Auditorium, Dade County Fair Ground; Detroit, July 9, at Cobo Hall; Chicago, July 11, at the International Amphitheatre; Philadelphia, July 13, at Convention Center; and winding at Baltimore's Civic Center on a Saturday night, July 15.

The Madison concert will be

the only date in which Sinatra will give two performances—a matinee and evening.

Ticket prices for the tour are being scheduled from \$12.50 to \$4.50, with the price range remaining constant for all the engagements. Potential audience for the entire tour is 86,000.

The \$4.50 bottom price per ticket is relatively low for major concert attractions, according to both firms handling the tour. This bottom price figure was insisted upon by Sinatra to afford an opportunity to those who could not pay the usual \$7.50 to \$12.50 prices obtained for such engagements.

Handling local tour arrangements in Pittsburgh, Philadelphia and Baltimore will be Irving Feld's, Super Attractions, Inc. Similar assignment will be handled in Chicago, Cleveland, Detroit and Madison by Franklyn Fried's, Triangle Productions, Inc.







Mr. Reneé Moreti, from Remo Records, distributor of "Papeles" by Carmita Jiménez (Sonoradio), was being affected by the distribution of such pirate recordings. Other records which have been pirated: Puchito's "Guantanamera" b/w "La Noche de mi Amor" by Tomás de San Julián, records by Felipe Pirela and others. Several recordings on the Ansonia label, originals from RCA, which are reproduced and distributed by Ansonia under an agreement with RCA. were intended to be reproduced illegally, among them "El Despertar," and "Te Doy dos Horas" by Marco Antonio Muñíz. An album by Los Violines de Pego, "Nostalgia de Cuba," which has been selling for several years on the Kubaney label, and "En su Momento" by Blanca Rosa Gil (Velvet) were also so scheduled. Clark Phonograph Record Co. was supposed to manufacture some of these records for those apprehended and their action helped several manufacturers and distributors to stop these activities. If the action taken by Clark is followed as an example by other pressing plants, the situation in the Latin market will change completely and will permit a more profitable and secure business in the near future.

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

Film Review

Thoroughly Modern **Blockbuster**

By DOUG McCLELLAND

You may have never thought you'd see Julie Andrews mixed up in white slavery, but that's what happens in "Thoroughly Modern Millie," and with surprising emphasis for a lighthearted, Technicolor, ostensibly unsocially-conscious filmusical.

Overall a pleasant spoof of the 1920s that should prove a boxoffice (Universal) and sound track album (Decca) blockbuster, "Millie" nevertheless suffers from an acutely modern movie condition: it is too long. For its basically frothy content, the picture should have run an hour and a half. It runs an hour longer than that, and has an intermission. By then, some of the earlier sparkle has dimmed, and the dialogue - Richard Morris', and straight (well, maybe straight isn't quite the word) from the now pooping "Batman" camp - has grown repetitious.

Much to Enjoy

Still, there is much to enjoy in this fractured fable of two young innocents and their romantic misadventures, as played by Mary Tyler Moore, of the wide-screen mouth, and Julie, Miss Intermission herself, in the order of diminishing innocence. Miss Andrews opens the show with her best work therein, amusingly going through secretary Millie's modernization at various Manhattan shops (Jazz Rags, etc.) while her chipper voice sings the cute new Sammy Cahn-Jimmy Van Heusen title tune on the soundtrack under the credits.

Interestingly, quite a bit of the vocalizing is done on the track while non-musical action is taking place on screen, indicating the producer and director's (Ross Hunter and George Roy Hill) original plan to make a straight comedy of the screenplay . . . until lark Andrews became available.

Also on the plus side is the lively "Stumbling" dance Mary (Mary Tyler?) and Julie do to keep a cantankerous elevator from stalling in their young ladies' residence. There is a rather choppily presented "Tapioca" song and dance, and a gratuitous Jewish wedding production number, "Trinkt le Chaim"—both seemingly staged more for the three walls of legitimate theater.

And speaking of gratuities, about now Carol Channing pops up as the marvelously named (but not written) merry widow Muzzy Van Hossmere, with an endless supply of "Raspberries!", bugged eyes and statements that curiously end with question marks. How she really figures in the plot which involves heroes Jimmy Smith (James Fox) and Trevor Graydon (John Gavin) will not be divulged here. But it will be familiar ground.

As for the white slavery business . . . villainous Chinese are shown coveting and caging white girls for export to a "tart shop" in Peking, all masterminded by the evil Mrs. Meers (Beatrice Lillie)-who, despite her Butterfly combs, pigeon Pekingese and treacherous ways, actually appears to be an occidental in an oriental mood for slave trading. (If such race stereotyping is now permissible, Negroes may be expected to be back working the cotton fields in films in 30 years or so.)

Lillie, Fox Score

These occasionally labored shenanigans are very lucky to have Miss Lillie working for them, and in spite of her material's descent into one or two Three Stooges routines, she is the film's biggest fun provider. She should do more movies. Engaging, too, is young British actor Fox, totally disarming as a slightly goofy young millionaire in mufti, never mind the unfunny, overlong Harold Lloydish slapstick he has to go through with Julie on and off window ledges.

Miss Andrews gets most of the footage and vocals, and does prettily by them, and her rendition of the evocative Jay Thompson tune, "Jimmy," is charming; but she is hard put to make her endless whizzes!" palatable.

Miss Channing's big song, "Jazz Baby," while lavishly set on the character's Long Island estate, comes off as "Ed Sullivan Show"-type grandstanding in which the erstwhile Dolly caps her croaking by playing several musical instruments. Oddly, Miss Moore doesn't sing, nor do Miss Lillie or Gavin, although many wonderful stand-

It isn't often that this column takes time out to salute an individual performer, but of late I have been thinking more and more of the Divine Miss Sarah Lois Vaughan.

opinion is not only that of the writer, it is the concensus of the entire jazz academy. Oh, yes there are some girl singers who do a marvelous job with some tunes. There are some who display a fantastic amount of showmanship on stage. There are others who possess a fine recording sound. But there is not one who is as gifted with all of the talents as is Sarah Lois Vaughan.

Possibly because Sarah does it all with such effortless grace and artistry, there are some music fans unable to appreciate her since she lacks gimmickry.

Ask a musician what he thinks of Sarah and his face lights up. There is a pause and sometimes there is a search for the right words. Finally, when he feels he can offer an adequate explanation, it is usually, "She just does so many things right. She has pitch, her musicianship is peerless. She never sings off key. She is almost like an instrument." And that about sums it up.

Few Challengers

There are few singers who have challenged the different types of material and come through as successfully as Sarah. From the "Mancini Song Book" to the Farnon Singers, she has produced masterpieces. On her in-person recordings, "Live at the London House," where she forgot words to "Thanks for the Memory" and it became a classic; "Live at the Tivoli in Copenhagen,"

where she swept through her charts in a soulful and beguiling manner; her outings with Basie and the Basie band; her sharing with Billy Eckstine many albums and her endless number of interpretations of the new pop tunes, where she brought a new freshness to songs that had been the launching pad for America's new mode singers, Sarah has been really divine.

Possibly if I were to register a complaint, it would be that Sarah should not be reduced to being listed in any girl singer's poll.

However, if I am biased, I admit it. For in jazz, Sarah is among the leaders and the innovators. Her truth will stand for years as a polished artist and a gifted woman who has no peer. Her style is free and loose and her approach to a song is truly a labor of love. She can mold new dimensions to each and every tune as well as find little phrases that she can hang her hat on . . . and one realizes that in listening to Sarah she is at all times tasteful and inventive.

A musician who worked for Sarah told me that while working for her he would sometimes become so enthralled with her singing he would stop playing and watch her.

Feminine Response

If I were asked by my readers "How do you think a female singer would respond to the Divine Sarah's interpretation of a song?", I would try to first think feminine, and then think as a singer. As impossible as the two would be for me realistically, I honestly believe that the female singers would share my opinion. Sarah is an inspiration to all singers who truly put their heart and soul into their profession. No singer wants to just sing a song, but deliver. The deliverance is her own emotion, warmth, style and soul . . . and with Miss Vaughan, there is no getting away from this, for her singing is pure and one does get the message she is trying to convey. Although every singer wants to be recognized for her own individual ability to sell a song, I'm sure

Vic Damone Better Singer Than Zinger

NEW YORK - Vic Damone has a solid if not especially colorful voice, and he would be smart to stick to it.

On his recent opening at the newly refurbished Basin St. East, the RCA songster went in for a lot of cutesy extracurricular hoke with the orchestra (backing into trombones, etc.), plus not so cute, tasteless chastising of the lighting effects man and the poor waiters. The latter business seemed offensively premeditated, indeed part of his act, especially when Damone, following his succession of weary complaints, threw up his hands and segued into "Who Can I Turn To?" What ever, Damone does not need all this. Ridiculing the little people around is, at best, an unwise device for humor.

When he keeps to the vocals, Damone is in good shape. If his repertoire lacks imagination ("The Shadow of Your Smile," "Strangers in the Night," etc.), it is always pleasantly rendered. And he does an effectively moody bossa nova medley that is a highlight. He is looking nifty, too.

The singer, who had an outstanding TV credit in the fewseasons-old "The Lively Ones" summer replacement series, has another interesting summer job coming up, he announced: Damone will be in charge of "The Dean Martin Summer Show." No waiters here — a bartender or two, maybe.



Catalog, New LP Figure in Drive

Eddy Arnold is the subject of a unique one-man RCA Victor merchandising campaign for the months of April and May, which includes a "new look" for 26 of his best-selling albums in the catalog, including a new album, "The Best of Eddy Arnold."

The theme of the campaign is based on an honor bestowed upon Arnold last October, when he was elected to the coveted "Country Music Hall of Fame" (an honor shared by only nine other historically recognized country-music greats).

During the two-month campaign, Arnold will (between concert commitments) be touring the country for promotion and publicity purposes, starting with an appearance in Chicago on April 3, at the National Association of Broadcasters' annual convention, where he is one of the guest performers. Arnold will also be seen on the Danny Kaye television show on April 19 and May 24.

For this campaign, Victor has re-packaged all of Arnold's 26 best-selling albums with a special logo, "Country Music Hall of Fame Series" (a likeness of the actual award presented to Arnold last October). Thirteen of the albums have been repackaged entirely, with new, revised cover art. Six of Arnold's albums, previously available in monaural only, have been electronically reprocessed for stereo. All 26 albums bear the new logo as well as new liner notes.

The new April album, "The Best of Eddy Arnold," will be shipped in cartons specially designed for quick conversion to a counter merchandiser.

Full-Scale Ad, Promo Push

In support of the campaign, RCA Victor has planned a full-scale advertising and promotion program. Two - page spreads will run in all the music trade papers. Full-page ads will run in consumer publications, such as the Saturday Evening Post and TV Guide. The ads will feature Eddy himself and all of his RCA Victor album product. They will reach millions of potential buyers.

Twenty, thirty, and sixtysecond special radio transcriptions featuring "The Best of Eddy Arnold," and plugging the complete Arnold "Country Music Hall of Fame Series" are also being made available for local advertising. Each disdistributor will receive five different transcriptions.

Point-of-sale display materials include a six-bin Hall of Fame Series Rack Header, a six-bin Rack Title Strip, specially designed for this promotion and Browser Divider Cards, listing all Eddy Arnold Albums.

every major market in the nation as well as the hinterlands in the past.

One thing proved in the country radio approach still holds true, and that is the believeable, honest, intimate acceptance of the country personality, who's added the sharp, up-to-date showcasing that sells in modern radio. The honesty of the country song is matched by warm and penetrating sounds of the seasoned, knowledgeable airman who sells. This marks the big difference in C&W and contemporary radio today. The good country jock can sell as well as meld a format of country music come to town.

The veteran country personality is still on the contemporary country radio scene, which parallels the country performing vet. Another indication that the country fan is not so fickle as the "pop" follower.

Singleton Produces All-Star Disk to Promote Tourism

NEW YORK - Some of the best known names in country music, as well as leading civic spokesmen for the city of Nashville and the state of Tennessee, have been secured by Shelby Singleton to lend their support to a government-sponsored program promoting tourism in the U.S. with Nashville as the focal point.

Singleton, through his Shelby Singleton Productions, will produce a 45 r.p.m. single to be distributed by the U.S. Travel Service, a division of the Department of Commerce established by Congress to promote tourism to this country.

The record will feature music by the Tennessee Guitars, exemplifying the C&W sound long associated with Nashville. Additionally, there will be recorded messages by Elvis Presley, Roy Acuff, Eddy Arnold and Roy Orbison as well as Nashville's Mayor Briley and Frank Clement, former Tennessee Governor and U.S. Senator.

Their recorded messages will identify Nashville not only as the home of C&W music, but also as a scenic area, home of several universities, commercial and industrial sites and easily accessible to attractions such as the Oak Ridge Atomic Energy Center and the TVA outside of Knoxville.

With global distribution set through the facilities of the U.S. Travel Service, the messages will be accompanied by translations for respective area deejays.

Singleton plans recording in Nashville within the next two weeks and will make the record available to the government agency for distribution in May.

The promotional disk, Singleton added, also will be distributed to travel writers, news services and the travel trade both here and abroad.

Singleton is coordinating the project for the Department of Commerce agency as a public service.



Arnold Record

A world record was broken on a recent Saturday evening for attendance at the Houston Livestock and Rodeo in the Astrodome in that city: Eddy Arnold played to a crowd of 41,956 for the record-setting single performance in the evening.

This was preceded by a matinee performance drawing 23,868. Eddy played to over 100,000 people during his four sessions this weekend and promoters reported a gross in excess of \$220,000.

Louis M. Pierce Jr., President of the show, announced the record gate at the conclusion of Arnold's performance. Arnold received a standing ovation. It might be difficult to single out the one song Eddy sang that got the biggest response from the audience but his lat-RCA single, "Lonely est Again," was certainly one of them

Coast Land Of Opportunity: K - R's Klein

LOS ANGELES-Gary Klein, who heads the Hollywood office of the Koppelman-Rubin music pubberies and is a VP of Koppelman & Rubin Associates, Inc., has called the Coast "the land of opportunity for publishers with good material."

Tim Hardin, who wrote Bobby Darin's "If I Were a Carpenter" and "Reason to Believe" by Andy Williams and is himself a recording artist (Verve), is California-based, as is the writing team of Jeff Hild and Roger C. Williams who just had one of their tunes cut by Wayne Newton. The Turtles, a West Coast act, now have a success in Chardon's "Happy Together" and Klein has great hopes for "Amy's Theme" from the score of "You're a Big Boy Now" which he has had recorded by Nick De Caro's Orchestra and by Peter Nero. Also on the way from California is "Melancholy Music Man," the first Righteous Brothers production by Koppelman and Rubin Associates, and "Spoonful of Jazz," an LP by Bud Shank, produced by Joe Wissert and featuring songs by John

Sebastian.

A non-believer in the "California sound," Klein calls this expression "nothing more than a blanket term used to explain the greater daring and creativity of much of the music that emanates from the Hollywood record studios."

Songs into Good LPs

One of his key functions is "getting our songs into good albums." Klein stated that this is a constant activity in order to maintain the vigor of all phases of a growing catalog.

An additional activity for Klein is the supervision of all sheet music and folio activity for both Chardon and Faithful Virtue music firms. Currently, Klein said, he is working on the third "Lovin' Spoonful Song Book."

"The true test of a publisher," he stated, "is the ability to think in terms of the next session, the follow-up song and to be there with it first. This requires both knowledge, taste, a flow of material and the conconfidence of the writers so that material can be adapted to the immediate needs without delay or hesitation.'

Klein has hired Johnny Bond to handle promotion and Gill Kleiner, who doubles in brass secretary-office manager. Klein maintains an open door.
