





announcement of the new 20th Century-Fox "The Sand Pebbles" sound track seems just an indication of big things to come from the label, which has been relatively quiet on the sound track scene with the exception of "Zorba the Greek" action.

Waxerv has secured sound track rights to the new \$15,000,-000 "Dr. Doolittle" movie to be released in September. Rex Harrison stars in the adaptation of the well-known children's series which will feature songs by Leslie Bricusse.

Label will also release the sound track of "Star!", the life story of Gertrude Lawrence, which goes before the cameras next month with Julie Andrews starred and Robert Wise directing. This twosome previously teamed for "The Sound of Music." "Star!" will include songs by Cole Porter, Noel Coward and Rodgers and Hammerstein, among others.

Other upcoming label trackers include "In Like Flint," the follow-up to "Our Man Flint"; Paul Newman's "Hombre" and Michael Caccoyannis' "The Day the Fish Came Out" with a score by the composer of "Zorba the Greek."

Fox Getting Live World' Right Theme At ABC Product Unveiling

22 Packages Bow in Miami

HOLLYWOOD, FLA. — ABC Records product came flying at distributors from all sides last week when label introduced at the Hotel Diplomat their new releases via a beautifully produced and received 60-minute, four-screen slide presentation with narrative and music built around the convention theme "The Live World of Entertainment."

Out to top last year's recordbreaking business, the waxery pitched 22 new disks highlighted by a two-record Ray Charles retrospective package, "A Man and His Soul," 12 new Impulse! disks, four Dunhill releases featuring a new Mamas and Papas package, two 20th Century-Fox sound tracks -"The Sand Pebbles" for one (see separate story) - and the first four initial releases on the new Bluesway label.

Label president Larry New-

ton presided over the meeting, during which the full attendance of distributors was assured that label plans its "most extensive, most expensive" promotion campaign to back the new product. The major part of the promo will bolster the Charles package, with a special feature being browser boxes built to accommodate the new package and other Charles catalogue albums. Label also plans a Charles radio promotion week.

Big Promo Boost

Another big promo boost will go to the Impulse! product with a "How To Enjoy College on Impulse!" motif for a campus sales pitch. Newton, label sales manager Bud Katzell and Howard Stark, vice-president in charge of ABC Records, stressed heavy consumer mag push which will take in all major magazines and spread, in the case of individual albums like the new Babby Sisters' "A Time to Remember," to specialized magazines.

MGM Acapulco Convention Sets \$5 Million Plus High

Ruby Dies as Cap Releases JFK Assassination Package

NEW YORK — Capitol Records held a "press screening" on Jan. 3 in the Americana Hotel of its much-talked-about Kennedy Assassination documentary LP, only hours after the death of featured interviewee Jack Ruby in a Dallas hospital.

The record, titled "The Controversy," contains a three-minute 55-second interview with the killer of Lee Harvey Oswald, President Kennedy's alleged assassin, recorded secretly last December in Parkland Memorial Hospital, Dallas. where Ruby was undergoing treatment for a massive cancer infection. It is the only interview that Ruby was known to have given to the press after the Oswald shooting, it was pointed out by the package's producer, Lawrence Schiller, who also answered questions from the dais.

In the interview, Ruby, who was questioned by members of his family, said that his shooting of Oswald before a nation-

wide TV audience "happened in such a blur" that he didn't know what he had done until two police officers were holding him on the ground. Ruby said that he had never known Oswald or seen him before and that there was no truth to the stories that Ruby had plotted the shooting in advance, or that Oswald had ever visited his Dallas strip-tease club.

'Ironic Part'

Ruby added, "The ironic part of this is that if I hadn't made an illegal turn behind the bus to the parking lot [near the jail where Oswald was being held], had I gone the way I was supposed to go-straight down Main Street—I'd of never, I would never have met this fate. Because the difference in meeting this fate was 30 seconds. One way or the other."



ACAPULCO, MEXICO -MGM Records kicked off a year-long 20th anniversary celebration with a gala convention and product presentation at the Las Brisas Hotel here, Jan. 1-7. According to MGM Records' President Mort L. Nasatir, company racked up a \$5 Million plus figure in sales of new product, catalog albums, tape player and cartridge producta new high for the company.

For the first time in MGM's history one of its four quarterly conventions was held outside the United States. The Las Brisas Hotel is a jet-set rendezvous located in Acapulco on Mexico's Pacific coast. London's Take-Off Party

Biggest LP Release In Send-Off. Too

More than 150 members of London Records' Britain-bound 20th anniversary party of distributors and their wives, along with members of the company's own exec staff, will gather Saturday (14) at the International Hotel, adjacent to New York's Kennedy International Airport, for a gala bon voyage cocktail party and dinner. The following morning, the party will take off via BOAC and TWA jets for eight days in London.

On Tuesday (17) London sales executives will present the company's largest single album release in its history. Among the vast assortment of product to be presented during the all-day sales session at Decca House will be LPs by a host of the company's top artists including the Rolling Stones, Joan Sutherland, Mantovani, Edmundo Ros, Leopold Stokowski, Leonard Bernstein and Tom Jones.

All phases of repertoire will be represented in the new release, including pop, classical and Phase 4, as well as new material from such London-American group labels as Hi, distributed by the company.

Sightseeing, Social Activities

In addition to witnessing the new product presentation, guests will have ample opportunity for sightseeing and social activities culminating in a banquet to be hosted by Sir Edward, British Decca board chairman, and Lady Lewis. The distributors are also expected to meet a number of the label's biggest selling British stars during the special events. One of these is a banquet to be hosted by the major stars of the British Decca family, such as Stanley Black, Ronnie Aldrich, Mantovani, Frank Chacksfield. Edmundo Ros and others.

The second event will be a special appearance by a group of artists, producers and personalities in the modern pop idiom at one of London's wellknown discotheques.

Rodgers Duties Multi at A&M

Rodgers completed his fiveyear tenure with Dot Records last month as both singer and artist-repertoire chief of the Folk Music Department, during which time he scored many hits including "No One Will Ever Know," "Two-Ten, Six-Eighteen," "The World I Used To Know," "Strangers," "It's Over" and "Morning Means Tomorrow." Prior to his association with Dot, Rodgers recorded for Roulette for which he had five big singles in a row, "Honeycomb," "Kisses "Kisses Sweeter Than Wine," "Oh, Oh, I'm Falling In Love Again," "Are You Really Mine" and "Secretly."

Under his new A&M pact, Rodgers will not only record for the label but will continue his song writing and arranging chores for himself as well as for other A&M artists. first single is due later this month.

based Trinity Record Distributors, which recently opened a branch here at 240 W. 55th St., has announced the appointment of 22-year disk biz veteran Frank Cama as New York Branch Manager.

Cama was with Decca in New York for 16 years, going from shipping foreman to branch manager. This was followed by two and a half years managing United Artists' Big Town in New York City, until they closed the branch. Cama also was three years as Branch Manager of All State in New York, exiting when All State closed and consolidated with All State of New Jersey.

Furthermore, Cama spent seven months with Beta Record Distributing here as General Manager.

Growing Sales Dept.

At Trinity, Cama will be in charge of the entire New York operation, which includes four New York City salesmen: Lee Amsterdam, Mort Waters, Jerry Katz and Jerry Packard. A fifth salesman will be named shortly.

Cama will be handling all promotion pertaining to the 331 accounts Trinity is now servicing in the New York area. At present, Trinity is distributing Musicor, Dynamo and Rojac Records. It also was revealed that Trinity will be acquiring another major independent label within a month's time.

'Film on Film' 5th Project 3 LP

All selections in the album are movie film themes recorded on 35mm magnetic film. (All Project 3 albums are recorded on 35mm magnetic film.) Its "Theme From Sand Pebbles" was released as a single last week.

All Project 3 album releases will be accompanied with simultaneous releases of open reel tape, 4-track tape and 8track cartridges. The product will be merchandised through normal record channels.

ties were kept to a minimum so that the distribs could make the most of the vacation atmosphere.

The product presentation was based upon the idea: "MGM Records' 20 Years As the First Family of Recorded Music." It drew heavily upon many of the hits in the label's history and presented new product in a novel way. Executive personnel were spoofed but the product was presented seriously. Distributor confidence was at an all time high as each album was greeted enthusiastically.

MGM Records and its affiliated labels presented one of its strongest line-ups of album product to date at this convention. On the parent MGM label there was overall acceptance of all product with special emphasis on the sound track recording of "Grand Prix," from the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer picture.

'Lion Power' Film

Underlining the importance that Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Inc. and the MGM Records wing place on the close cooperation between motion picture and record company, David Mc-Grath, Director of Exploitation for the movie firm, was on hand to meet distribs and show a special MGM product preview show. The film, titled "Lion Power," outlined many new feature pictures coming up in 1967.

Three other sound tracks also came in for unusual attention: "Blow-Up," on the MGM label, "The Deadly Affair" on Verve and "You're a Big Boy Now" on the MGM distributed Kama Sutra label. The Kama Sutra LP features the Lovin' Spoonful, and John Sebastian composed the score for this 7 Arts film. A second Kama Sutra LP showcases the best of the Lovin' Spoonful; all of the group's hits are in this deluxe package that also contains four 8x10 framable portraits of the boys.

Other big scoring line-leaders in the MGM release are by Herman's Hermits, Eric Burdon and the Animals and Rov Orbison. Solid sales were also registered by a trio of country albums that featured Hank Williams and Strings, Molly Bee and Steve Sanders.

Verve sales were impressively over quota with many star-studded albums. The line was led by the Righteous Brothers, Walter Wanderley, Astrud Gilberto and Wes Montgomery. In addition the second





NEW YORK — Things are even more heavenly than usual these days with Artie Mogull and Paul Barry and their Celestial Music pubbery.



Command Plans to Produce More Singles Just for That Market

HOLLYWOOD, FLA.—Command Records' 1967 activity will be the same only different, according to Loren Becker, label head who introduced new product to distributors at last week's Diplomat Hotel meeting.

Diskery will be the same in that Becker plans to maintain the same smaller release schedule that has been company policy since inception.

What also, hopefully, will be the same, will be the source of product for the label, which in 1966 had its second biggest year to date.

What will be different, said Becker, who introduced and played the new product, will be a slightly changed approach to singles. He estimated that 25 singles will be released to the market—many, in fact, most of them, cut on single dates for the single market rather than pulled from albums. (If successful, of course, the cuts will eventually be included in packages.)

Becker also announced that label personnel are currently working on a new process of sound reproduction—no further specifics—that will be introed to the public in the spring.

Label also plans a new approach to classical repertoire. The "warhorse" policy will be altered to include light classical pieces. Becker hopes to use these packages to build a new group of buyers who may all be scared off by the heavier classical offerings. The first in this series will be William Steinberg conducting Stravinsky's "Petrushka."

New Additions

Two new artists have been added to the Command roster as of the new year. They are Robert Maxwell and trumpeter-fluegelhornist Warren Kime, who will kick off a new concept in the use of brass and voices via his "Brass Impact" LP. (Maxwell and Kime joined last year's new Command additions Mitchell Ayres, Count Basie, Toots Thielemans and Bobby Byrne.)

Another new addition to Command is Lanny Lee, just signed on as New York based promotion and publicity direc-

Becker announced that the new product would receive merchandising and advertising boosts in the form of newly designed walnut browsers for instance and heavy consumer and trade ads.

Becker introduced three singles — most notably, the Ray Charles Singers' "Birds of a Feather."

He also introduced eight albums—five for immediate release and three for March 1st release. The first five include: "Petrushka"; Charles Magnante, "Carnival in Faraway Places"; Tony Mottola, "Guitar U.S.A."; "Doc Severinsen and 'Friends' Swinging and Singing"; and "Brass Impact."

The March releases include: Dick Hyman, "Sugarloaf Brasil /S.A."; Robert Maxwell, "Anytime!"; and Count Basie, "Hollywood Basie's Way."

All the brothers and sisters are extremely proud that Atlantic Records' Jerry Wexler was voted "Record Executive of the Year" in the annual Bill Gavin Poll. The top pop and R&B deejays and PDs and Music Directors and people in the record industry did the voting. This is the first time Jerry has won this award, and he is proud, not so much for himself, but for the recognition of Atlantic Records, and of R&B music having

arrived as an integrated part of pop music.

More and more of the big pop hits are moving right into the play-lists of the big pop stations, even in areas where very few Negroes live. The most current example is "Stand By Me," Spyder Turner, MGM, which is #3 R&B nationally, and is being picked by PDs like Paul Christy of WOKY, Milwaukee. However, a glaring exception to this trend currently is, "I'm Gonna Miss You," Artistics, Brunswick. Although this record has hit #1 R&B in almost every R&B list and is now going #1 in Detroit, it has been played and broken pop only in N.Y.C., Philadelphia and Hartford. Since it is a soft "Chicago Sound" R&B record from genius-producer Carl Davis, and since much harder R&B records like Calla's J. J. Jackson went top 10 pop, it is very difficult to ascertain what the hang-up is. We know that Messrs. Salkin and Schneider and Lenny Salidor of Decca have made it a top priority pop push, and that the road is going to be worked! The new Artistics LP has three potential hit singles. The strongest cut is "Girl I Need You" (side 2, cut 1); next, "Sweeter Than Sugar" and the ballad, "Glad I Met You," is sure sayin' a taste!

Everyone's Ready for Freddy

"Are You Lonely For Me," Freddy Scott, is \$2 R&B nationally behind the #1 Aaron Neville, and this record is now making the big move pop. It is a great soul ballad that touches everyone.

Ernie Durham in Detroit reports that Howard Tate is now a giant, and the biggest new giant in town is "Mercy Mercy," Cannonball Adderly, which was busted first in Baltimore and Pittsburgh, and then L.A., where it's a pop giant. Ernie reports solid hit sales on Bobby Bland; Tommy Hunt; Robert Parker; and the Precisions: Ernie confirms the hit sales in Cleveland on "Tip Toe," Robert Parker; AND he confirms "Man or Mouse," Jr. Parker, Duke, which Ken Hawkins charts at \$4 at WJMO, Cleveland! . . . "Such Misery," Precisions, Drew, is now very big in sales in Detroit and is starting in Baltimore. Steve Mancha is #7 in Detroit and the Metros on RCA is #9. Ernie is very high on: "Every Time," Linda Carr, Bell; "A Good Love," Lorraine Ellison; "Hold To My Baby," Cavaliers, RCA; "Much More of You," Magnificent Men, Capitol; James Brown; "Something Good," Carla Thomas; Jimmy Castor; Jimmy Soul; and he agrees with Al Jefferson, PD of WWIN, Baltimore on the "Just Be Sincere" side of Jackie Wilson over the "I Don't Want To Lose You" side. Nat Tarnopol can expect split play!

"Feel So Bad," Little Milton, is a smash in Chicago, Balti-

more and Philadelphia at WDAS.

The reaction to "Something Good," Carla Thomas, has been fantastic, starting with Picks at WWIN, Baltimore; WCHB, Detroit; WABQ, Cleveland, and you name it . . . WWIN is all out on the new Solomon Burke, "Keep a Light In the Window." There is also a lot of reaction to the flip, "Time is a Thief."

To illustrate the kind of person Jerry Wexler is, and why the top record execs in the business like Larry Uttal, Larry Newton, Art Talmadge, Irv Biegel, Neil Bogart, Pete Garris, Al Rosenthal, Leonard and Phil Chess, Bert Berns, Joe Kolsky, Phil Kahl, etc., consider him to be the record man's "Record Man," we'll quote his comments on the instant success of Hy Weiss' new Barry label. Jerry stated that he was "thrilled by the giant sales" on "At the Party," Hector Rivera, and that "he has never heard a better soul record" than "Never Leave Me," Thelma Jones. Bill Curtis, WCHB, Detroit, confirms Baltimore and other markets on strong sales on "That's How Strong My Love Is," Mattie Moultrie, Columbia . . . Nickie Lee digs Roy Thompson; Sol Burke; Jimmy Hughes; Carla Thomas. "10 Commandments of Man," Nickie Lee, Atlantic, is a giant! ! Nickie wrote it.

At KSOL, S.F., "She's Looking Good," Rodger Collins, is \$3. The hottest record building through the South is "My Special Prayer," Joe Simon . . . "The Biggest Man," Tommy Hunt, Dynamo, is biggest in Baltimore, then Detroit and Cleveland "96 Tears," Big Maybelle, is large in Cleveland. Also large in Baltimore are Ideals, Ovations, Hector Rivera, Tito Puente, Albert King, Tyrone the Wonder Boy, Clarence Carter. And we may credit Hot Rod with personally breaking "If You Go Away," Damita Jo. Howart Tate is big.

The big new news in Baltimore and Washington is the fact that "When I Stop Loving You," George Jackson, Double-R, broke for top 10 sales close to 15,000. It is in the WWIN chart top 10. It doesn't have national distribution. Columbia is very excited about the sales in Baltimore and Washington on "That's How Strong My Love Is," Matti Moultrie, and it is getting big play and sales in all the mid-West markets.

Robert B. Q., KATZ, reports the "KATZ People's Choice" is "Oo Baby," Bo Diddley. He reports that Atlantic has picked up the local St. Louis smash, "If It's All the Same," Luther Ingram.



Taking Care of Business

By DEL SHIELDS

There is a sinister plot afoot in Hollywood. With the new that Oliver Nelson, alto and tenor saxophonist, composer and arranger has joined the growing group of jazz composers now residing in the film capital to write for the movies, the creative writers of jazz are slowly being swallowed up.

Now we are not against progress. And certainly we are not against jazz musicians coming to the attention of Hollywood and having an opportunity to add to their credits by way of

There is a question, however, as to why? Is it possible that Hollywood, known more for its commercial pap and lack of realism, has finally matured and recognized something that most American institutions have not learned? That jazz is an American art and its academy is filled with some of the most talented performers in music? And that this talent can be transferred to the screen and help to mold a movie? And that since movies are still a great family tradition and has tremendous influence on Americans, it should contain all of the American influences and institutions?

Perhaps this is true. I would hate to think that Hollywood's reasons for tapping the jazz composers is due to a dearth of new and stimulating blood in the writing groups. Although this would not be wrong. I would only like them to acknowledge the truth in the situation.

As jazz struggles for recognition and survival in possibly every quarter, Hollywood is turning out movies with million dollar budgets with the credits, "Music by (a former jazzman)."

Admittedly most of the jazzmen now writing will not admit that there is any attempt on their parts to subtly influence the movie audience with jazz. They will say that when an assignment is given, they will make every effort to add music that will enhance the picture. Ift here is a great deal of jazz employed in the scores, well, it's just one of those things.

But it is good to know that jazz can serve healthful, and entertaining purposes. After all, is this not what jazz is all about? And in this day of the under-25 generation, where everything is happening now, we are experiencing rock and roll groups gladly shouting to the roof tops that they listen to many of the jazz masters and much of their influence has come from jazz.

With this youthful admission, the old head shake their graying heads and say pity the youth. Yet, they, too, are making the admission that Hollywood has not owned up to. Jazz is creative and stimulating. Its deep personal message can convey a truth like no other music. And it carries with it a message.

That this music has helped to make more motion pictures interesting and entertaining has been a great help to the entire jazz world. Yet, no one says anything about it.

Some years ago, we advocated that jazz was badly in need of a vast public relations campaign to sell America on its own homeground product.

Little did we realize at the time that jazz was already a big part of the total scene. After all, what better program could one ask for than to be married to Hollywood?

With the addition of television and its commercials, jazz is being played, exposed, integrated more than ever before.

Even if the movie moguls will not admit the fact, the fact is that when jazz is being used in movie scores and television scores, we have arrived.

However, we do hope that in their newfound wealth the jazzmen will return on occasions and keep us reminded that their craft is still best in their familiar setting of doing what comes naturally.

14 RCA Disks Certified for RIAA Gold

In 1966, RCA Victor had 14 gold records certified by the Record Industry Association of America, more than any other company in the industry.

These included 11 albums and three singles on several of the labels in the RCA Victor catalog.

Four of these gold record awards came from simultaneous certification of a single and album by the same artists, and one was the first album ever to win certification on an economy line label.

To qualify for certification, a single must have sold one million copies, an album must have accumulated a minimum of \$1 million in sales at the manufacturer level, and an economy line album must have done both.

Barry Sadler and the Monkees were the artists who had single records and albums certified simultaneously. Sadler's "Ballad" and "Ballads of the Green Berets" constituted the industry's first big hit of the year.

Certified Simultaneously

"Last Train to Clarksville" was the single and "The Monkees" was the album which were certified simultaneously late in 1966. These recordings, on the new Colgems label, were followed by a second Monkees single, "I'm a Believer," which was certified the week it was released, and which had sold over two million copies before the end of the year. The first Monkees album had sold more than 3,000,000 copies by the beginning of 1967.

Champion among all RCA Victor artists once again was Elvis Presley who had three more albums certified during the year.

Perry Como, who has had numerous gold records on the RCA Victor label, became the first artist ever to have an album certified on an economy label when his "Perry Como sings Merry Christmas Music" was certified on the Camden label

Other RCA artists who had product certified during the year included Al Hirt's "The Best of Al Hirt," Eddy Arnold's "My World," the late Jim Reeves' "The Best of Jim Reeves," the original cast album of "Oliver" and an album from the past which proved the lasting popularity of stars from another era, "Jeannette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy Favorites."

Everyman Series To \$2.50 Per LP

NEW YORK—Vanguard announces an increase in the suggested list price of its Everyman line: \$2.50 per disk, effective immediately.

The decision to raise the price, declares Vanguard National Sales Director Herb Corsack, "was a desire to keep the label at its zenith. We've always been proud of the fact that respected critics have often referred to Everyman records as 'The best buy at any price,' and we want to keep it that way. We've completely revamped the look of the package, and we will continue to produce a prestige product as always."
