

HOLLYWOOD - Stanley M. Gortikov, President of Capitol Records, and Jack Grossman, President of Merco Enterprises Inc., announce an agreement in principle whereby Capitol Records, Inc., will offer \$16 per share in cash to all Merco stockholders for control of the Long Island-based record rack jobber and collegiate record store service specialist.

Under the proposed agreement, Capitol will buy from Jack Grossman and members of his family, approximately 53% of their Merco stock. In addition, Capitol will offer to purchase Merco shares from the other stockholders-and if more than 53% of their shares are tendered, they will be purchased on a pro rata basis. NEW YORK-Edwin H. Morris announces the acquisition of the exclusive services of Phil Kahl and Joe Kolsky, together with certain of their music companies and Diamond Records. Inc.

Morris is anxious to secure extensively managerial talent in order to expand in all music areas as successfully as he has in the musical theatre.

Kahl will act as Executive Vice-President of the music companies and will report directly to Buddy Morris. Kolsky will become the Executive Vice-President of Diamond Records, and will also report to Morris.

Prior to joining the Morris Organization. Kahl was employed by Santly-Joy Music and Walt Disney Music. He then became a stockholder in Planetary, Patricia and Kahl Music Publishing Companies, as well as being a stockholder of Rama-Gee-Tico and Roulette Records.

Record World Augments Radio Exposure Chart

Beginning with this issue the number of stations listed in Record World's Radio Exposure Chart will be increased from 20 to 49, thus giving a much wider range of stations and making the Chart even more current in reflecting the airplay of new records.

Of primary importance in the new Chart will be the station Picks, Extras and records appearing on the station charts for the first time. Records that are listed on only one of the station lists, and those that have gone above 50 on Record World's Top 100 or those that have been on the list for several weeks, will not be listed.

Also, the stations listed will no longer be a mixture of both primary and secondary nature in their markets. Only stations highly rated in their markets will be utilized.

Record World feels that these steps will serve to more quickly spotlight the airplay of newer records.

Steve Sholes Dead

Stephen H. (Steve) Sholes, Division VP, Popular A and R, RCA Record Division, and responsible for the company's Nashville operation as well as for RCA's Camden and Vintage labels and religious recordings, died in Nashville on April 22 of a heart attack.

The record industry has

suffered an irreparable loss

in the death of Steve Sholes.

His career spanned such a

wide spectrum of recording

activity, that it will take

some time to accurately as-

sess it all. From his early

days in jazz, through his

well known part in bringing

Elvis Presley to RCA Victor,

up to his participation in

Sholes, who first worked with RCA in 1929 while attending high school in Camden, N.J., was born on Feb. 12, 1911, in Washington, D.C. After attending Rutgers University, he rejoined the Record Division in 1935, and two years later began

the modern idiom, he contributed his own special insight to the industry he loved.

But even more than that, he contributed a quality that can best be described as gentleness. For Steve Sholes was in its deepest meaning a gentle man. Those of us who knew him will sorely miss him.

Moldonados Receive Sentence

NEW YORK-Mr. and Mrs. Santos Moldonado, arrested last week for selling counterfeit and pirated records, have received sentence.

The husband, Santos, has received a \$500 fine or 90 days in jail, plus a suspended sixmonth jail sentence before Judge James Yeargen in New

Decca Joins EMI In Rack Business

LONDON — Decca Records has joined the EMI label in its rack jobbing project, a surprise development in view of Decca's reputation of abstainance in such new developments.

Thinking behind the Decca move is that the need to maintain its sales volume seemed worth the risk of injuring relations with dealers. With rack jobbing likely to become a major trend in England, the new partnership should be influential in persuading any hesitant big labels to make similar moves.

Martin Melcher Dead at 52

HOLLYWOOD—Martin Melcher, 52, film producer, music publisher, label head and husband of Doris Day, died here April 20 at Mt. Sinai Hospital of a stroke.

Since marying Miss Day 17 years ago, Melcher produced most of her films and owned the Daywin Music Co. and the Arwin Music Co. He also adopted Miss Day's son from a previous marriage, Terry Melcher, head of the Equinox record label.

Melcher, born in North Adams, Mass., started his career by packaging shows for network radio. He then became general manager of Exclusive Music, a pubbery; founded Century Artists talent agency; sold the company to MCA Artists Corp. and formed, besides the Arwin and Daywin pubberies, Arwin Records. chandisers, Ltd., will be operated from the EMI factory. In charge will be General Manager Frank Pearce, who's been handling the EMI racking from the start, and Decca staffers will be integrated soon. Outfit will also have a board, jointly composed of top brass from the two companies, as yet unnamed.

RML will have access to 20 labels, including the two companies' own product, plus EMIdistributed CBS Records, MGM Records and UA Records, and the Major Minor and MCA disks distributed by Decca.

his work in the Artists and Repertoire field, involved primarily with the major RCA jazz artists, including Sidney Bechet, Jelly Roll Morton and Mezz Mezzrow.

From 1943 to 1945, he served in the Army and produced V-Discs in all musical categories, ranging from Piatigorsky to the Original Dixieland Jazz Band and including the last recordings made by "Fats" Waller.

In 1945, Sholes was named Studio and Custom Manager of RCA Records. That same year, he was appointed Manager, Country and Western and Rhythm and Blues Artists and Repertoire. He helped develop many of the nation's outstanding artists including Chet Atkins, Eddy Arnold, Elvis Presley, Hank Snow, Jim Reeves, Hank Locklin, Homer and Jethro and the Browns.

In 1957, Sholes became manager, Pop Singles, and a year later, he was appointed Manager, Pop Albums, as well. RCA promoted him in 1961 to Manager, West Coast Operations. On that assignment, Sholes planned and directed all A and R functions in addition to coordinating activities and policies related to West Coast Marketing, Sales Custom, Recording and Administrative operations.

Sholes returned in 1963 to New York where he served as Division Vice President, Popular Artists and Repertoire, RCA Record Division, until his death. He was also the first vice-president of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences.

In Country Hall of Fame

In addition to being former Chairman of the Country Music Association, President of the Country Music Foundation in 1966, and a foundation trustee, Sholes was elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame last October, one of only four non-performers to receive the honor. He was cited for his work in establishing the recording industry in Nashville and in promoting Country and Western music.

Sholes lived in Tenafly, N.J., with his wife, Katharine (Kay), and his daughters, Lelia Karen, Katharine Leslie and Kimberley.

Funeral arrangements were scheduled for Friday, April 26, at the Presbyterian Church in Tenafly.



DR. MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. IN THE STRUGGLE FOR FREEDOM AND HUMAN DIGNITY Unart S 21033.

For those collecting the impassioned, sincere, temperate speeches by Martin Luther King, this package will be welcome. It's a tribute to the record industry that words live on through records. And these words may still provoke the proper deeds.

BRAHMS PIANO CONCERTO NO. 2 IN B FLAT ANDRE WATTS, LEONARD BERNSTEIN-Columbia MS 7134.

Considered by many to be the best of the young pianists, Watts shows expertise bordering on genius in this interpretation of the warhorse concerto. The Bernstein conducting is tempestuous and charged with the usual unusual excitement.

THE GOLDEN TRUMPET OF HARRY JAMES London SP 44109.

Although "Satin Doll" is just one of the cuts, each number is like shining satin—smooth, lovely, vibrant, nostalgic. Most of the tunes here have been associated with James since the '40s from "Ciribiribin" to "I've Heard That Song Before" and more.

WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM MY FRIENDS SUE RANEY—Imperial LP 12376.

JONI MITCHELL

A recent issue of the Village Voice carried not less than two features on the Big Brother and the Holding Company lead singer-the first on her clothes, and the second an inside-with-Big Brother-in-Philadelphia-at-the-Electric-Factory piece, by Richard Goldstein.

And not noted for devoting a lot of space to photos, the Voice accompanied the fashion article with two; the caption for one, beneath a Linda-Eastman-shot of a wistful Janis satirizing mannequins everywhere, said: "THE TOTAL JOPLIN LOOK is wearing everything and anything from her gypsy cape to the antique lace tablecloth bell-bottoms to her rabbit fur cossack hat which she made herself."

Will Vogue and Harper's Bazaar be honking Joplin-inspired fashions a year from now? Probably. Will America soon be reading articles in Reader's Digest putting down a Janis Joplin morality trend in a new wave of emancipated young ladies, who cuss, swing and swill Southern comfort? You betcha! They have to put the blame on Somebody.

Big Brother's second album is progressing sporadically in



Columbia's New York studios. Miss Joplin recently told Nat Hentoff, who wrote the New York Times Janis piece, "Making this record hasn't

been easy. We're not the best technicians around. We're not the kind of dispassionate professionals who can go into a studio and produce something quick and polished. We're passionate, that's all we are. And what we're try-

The stations, meanwhile, continue to broadcast the same format with staffs made up of hastily recruited substitutes. There have been some negotiations, so far unsuccessful, and a lot of name-calling by both sides. The strikers have been supported by benefits in their behalf at the Avalon in San Francisco and at the Kaleidoscope in L. A. The stations claim that 90% of their major advertisers, most of whom pulled out shortly after the strike, have resumed their buys. But the strikers say otherwise, and continue to picket and urge secondary boycotts of those businesses still advertising on the stations.

FLASH OF THE WEEK: New York (New Jersey) radio station WPAT-AM-FM, whose image has been anything but liberal, and in fact a half-step from Muzak, is programming a cut from the United States of America album. A call to the station and a chat with music director John Stern revealed that two more cuts from the electronic-rock LP will soon join the first on the air. This is in keeping, said Stern, with PAT's desire to program "good music" whatever its source, and therefore listeners have





Owner Emanuel:

Nashville Room a Success Despite Press-ing Problem

By DOUG McCLELLAND

NEW YORK—On July 4, the Nashville Room (at the Hotel Taft) will celebrate its first year of Big City existence with a bang, according to owner Lazar Emanuel. But there have been problems.

"One of the problems is to get the general press—not the trades, which have been very good to us—to give the Nashville Room the same importance it would give to any other club of comparative significance. I think it's an outgrowth of New York's basic attitude toward Country and Western music in general," country pioneer Emanuel remarked.

Emanuel, also owner of the all-country station WJRZ in Hackensack, N. J., until its purchase recently by Lin Broadcasting (he still operates it), continued: "There are always articles in, say, the New York Times about rock and roll and jazz, but there are almost never stories about Country and Western music."

Greater, Growing Audience

And Emanuel feels there is a greater, growing audience for country music in the area than is generally acknowledged. "When WJRZ converted to allcountry in 1965, there was a group just waiting and they welcomed it immediately. Today, it may well be—I don't know how we could get the exact information — that WJRZ has the largest audience of country listeners anywhere."

Stars at the Nashville Room, which has scored especially in its presentation of newer talent, appear for five days, from Tuesday through Saturday. "This may change in the fall," Emanuel revealed. "We may extend engagements for longer periods. With artists of large appeal like Glen Campbell and David Houston, that appeal builds and this takes time. People were still coming in a week or 10 days after Glen's engagment and asking if he were still there."

During the summer, the Nashville Room may close briefly for some renovating, but Emanuel noted that "basically, our policy is to operate through all seasons."

The biggest successes at the Nashville Room to date have been Glen Campbell, Bill Anderson, David Houston, Willie Nelson (due back May 7), Bob

Willis and the Sons of the Pioneers, the owner reported.

A lawyer, Emanuel had many clients in the music business and this intrigued him sufficiently so that "around 1959 or '60, I originated a company to move into radio and television. I thought I could do both, be a lawyer and work in radio and TV. But as I moved along, I decided I liked radio better."

WJRZ, also the flag station for the New York Mets, is one of the oldest stations in the country. Now owned by Lin Broadcasting, Emanuel feels "we will now have more strength to face our competitors in the New York market. And, since Lin is Nashvillebased, this will improve our ability to have immediate contact with talent and other factions down there. Additionally, Lin's ability to advise and consult with the help of other radio and TV experts will obviiously be an advantage for the station, too."

Country and Western trends? "I think Glen Campbell and Eddy Arnold reflect the trend today," he said, "to a sound more acceptable to all kinds of ears. WJRZ reflects this trend, too. While the Nashville Room will continue to reflect *all* tastes in Country and Western music."

If things go as planned, Emanuel hopes to open a chain of Nashville Rooms in major cities throughout America. He thinks increased TV exposure in recent months has helped the country cause greatly, as have the recording dates in Nashville on country projects of such stars as Frank Sinatra and Trini Lopez. "More important than this, though," he opined "is for pop stations to program country artists playing country tunes. The same goes for TV stations."

NEW YORK—Just returned from England where he presided at the opening of the new Bell offices in London, Bell Records President Larry Uttal announces two coups with the signing of Cilla Black and the pacting of Eurovision Song Contest winner Massiel, both with boiling singles to be rushreleased by Bell in the U.S. and both in agreement with Dick James Music.

Cilla Black, discovered by the late Brian Epstein, is in the British Top 10 with "Step Inside Love," written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney, while 20-year-old Spanish thrush Massiel took the Eurovision Song Contest prize with "La La La."

Uttal said the records are "so hot that I brought the master tapes home in my briefcase and went directly to the office when I landed." The urgency of releasing the masters, Uttal said, fore-stalled their appearance on a joint label now being formed between Bell and Dick James Music for the distribution here of Dick James' product.

Fireball in Solo

The latest member of a popular singing combo to release a platter under his own name while remaining an active participant in all other group activities is Jimmy Gilmer, lead singer in the Fireballs, whose solo Atco disk, "Three Squares and a Place to Lay Your Head," has just been issued.

Aldrich, who appears as the performer on twin pianos with the London Festival Orchestra on his new album, "For Young Lovers," has keyed on the most modern kind of hit pop material in a move which represents an expansion of the phase 4 catalog to include current song product as well as more traditional standard fare. Aldrich will make a month-long fall concert tour of the United States next October

London is releasing the track versions of two new pictures, "Bedazzled" and "30 is a Dangerous Age, Cynthia." The music for both was composed, arranged, conducted and played by Dudley Moore.

Completing the line-up is the new Hi set by Cannon, "The Incomparable Sax," which features Cannon's current instrumental single version of Jim Webb's hit, "By the Time I Get to Phoenix." The Cannon release coincides with a general merchandising effort on the entire Ace Cannon Hi catalog consisting of 11 earlier albums.

Exec on the Rise: **Scepter's Sam Goff**

NEW YORK—Scepter/Wand Records VP Sam Goff—in his three years with the hot independent label—has proved himself to be a young man to reckon with in the record industry.

"I started in the business at Beta Record Distributing in New York," Goff told **Record** World last week. "Florence Greenberg, President of Scepter and whose daughter, Mary Jane, I married, had been asking me for a while to join the company. Around January, 1965, I took her up on it and got started at Scepter in manufacturing and purchasing.

"Then about a year and a half later, when classical budget became popular, Florence asked me to take over our Mace classical line. I became VP in Charge of Mace, and was totally responsible for everything but product selection. It became an autonomous line. I was helped a great deal by Stanley Greenberg, Florence's son, Director of A&R at Scepter for six years now."

Shares Sales, Promo Duties with Schlachter

A short time later, Goff was paged to get involved with the regular line product at Scepter, sharing sales and promotional duties with Marv Schlachter, Scepter/Wand VP with tenure who has charge of the East and West Coasts, plus the South; while Goff is responsible for the mid-West and south-West, c overing approximately 20 cities.

"Recently, Florence, Marv and I sat down and discussed a regional singles testing program with which we have had excellent results," he related. "Rather than release every record nationally, we decided to release singles (mostly on unknown artists) regionally when we feel we can get maximum exposure in these areas, take the feedback and make it available to our distributors and radio stations. This way, we determine whether we have a record worth releasing nationally. We have found we get three times the mileage out of our personnel. A perfect example is the Dionne Warwick smash, 'Valley of the Dolls.' Originally a B side, it broke in Dallas on KLIF and in New Orleans on WTIX. Initial response was so fantastic in sales and play requests, we re-servcied it immediately.



"It would have been more difficult under our previous setup. We feel this method is the only answer for us to the enormous amount of product coming out today."

Indie Producers Significant

Another strong point for the label nowadays, Goff went on, is that "we have been developing an association and relationship with strong independent producers with track records, such as Bill Sheppard, Chips Moman. Capitol does thereby acquire 53% from the other stockholders, Jack Grossman and members of his family (who presently hold approximately 60% of the Merco stock) will sell up to a maximum of 663/3% of their present holdings.

For a period of four years, commencing on a date in 1969, Grossman and members of his family will have the right to cause Capitol to purchase the balance of the Grossman shares at a price equal to 13 times audited earnings per share in the prior 12-month period. If Capitol purchases the Grossman shares, it will be obligated to make an offer to all Merco stockholders to purchase their

share at the same price. The present management will be continued, with Grossman remaining as Chairman and President of Merco and with Capitol assured a majority position on the Board of Directors.

The arrangement is subject to the execution of a definitive agreement and the fulfillment of closing conditions.

On April 22, the low bid and ask prices as reported by National Quotations Bureau, Inc., were \$13 and \$14.50 per share.

Grossman, the Merco President, stated, "Merco will continue to operate autonomously under its existing management with free choice of product to be stocked, and the individual objectives of our customers will, as always, shape Merco's servicing policies."

Goldsboro Smash a 'Honey' Mrs. Freidus Mgr. For All Concerned **UA** in Nashville Booming

Florida-born Bobby Goldsboro, now enjoying the satisfying fruits of million-seller success with his smash single. "Honey," has also brought United Artists its fastest-selling single, its first gold record single in two years and has placed the spotlight on the company's expanding and increasingly important Nashville operation.

The Goldsboro hit was a cooperative production effort of the singer-songwriter himself and Bob Montgomery, UA's executive A & R producer on the Music City front. The joint effort illustrates the broad, allmarket direction now becoming the thing in Nashville. Goldsboro's record has scored on country charts, too, where he has not previously been active. and it has become one of the top easy-listening entries as well.

Writer Role Blossoms

Goldsboro's role as a contract writer for UA's music publishing wing has also blossomed with the disking of his song, "Pen in Hand," by Johnny Darrell, the rising UA country star. The record is breaking out in the country field, and drawing pop action as well.

Goldsboro's current overall success reflects the increasing tempo of chart activity being generated by Montgomery's forces, which currently in-cludes "Wild Blood," by Del Reeves and "Ordinary Miracle," by Bobby Lewis. The fastmoving Darrell disk plus these three hot singles combine to give UA its most impressive country chart showing to date. But much more is expected to be happening shortly on that front, according to Mont-gomery, who spoke to **Reco**rd World last week before leaving for a fortnight visit to Europe with Goldsboro.

Inks Don Tweety

Montgomery said that UA has signed arranger-conductor Don Tweety, who scored the background for "Honey," to an artist contract. Tweety has already sliced an instrumental of "Pen in Hand," the budding Darrell hit written by Goldsboro. An LP is now being cut as well.

UA country star Del Reeves, who has scored with each outing since his major hit, "Girl on the Billboard," has also been signed for his first movie role,

Montgomery said. Reeves flies to the Coast shortly for his role in the United Artists film, "Whiskey's Renegades."

Montgomery also indicated that the Four Lads, longtime hit makers and stars of the club and concert scene, will shortly arrive in Nashville for their first recording sessions there. Material is presently being screened for these sessions. Beyond this, the firm is presently negotiating new recordwith several ing contracts other artists.

As for Goldsboro's European trip, he will be returning for his first visit since appearing at the San Remo Festival of 1967, and will make an intensive round of TV and radio promotional appearances in Britain and on the Continent.

He will also cut the vocal of "Honey" in French, German and Italian, as he has done in the past with several other hit songs.

Jim Webb's Career Up, Up and Away

By DAVE FINKLE

NEW YORK—If you're Jim Webb and if you've written "Up, Up and Away" and "By the Time I Get to Phoenix" in one year, you're bound to be very busy.

Well, Jim Webb dropped by **Record World** offices last week and there were no ifs about it. The forthright, articulate, enthusiastic, 22-year-old (!) fellow has almost as much work as he can handle. Barbra Streisand has called. Frank Sinatra has called. TV, the movies, even David Merrick has called.

And so here's a brief rundown of up-coming doings shortly.

He's finishing up four songs for Barbra Streisand, which he'll then arrange and conduct for the gal. He's writing an instrumental for Doc Severinsen. He's preparing a second album with Richard Harris. (Their first combined effort. Dunhill's "A Tramp Shining," is moving up the chart currently.) He's three weeks into pre-production work on a filmmusical for release within the year. ("The whole movie will be a song. The songs will come out of the background. We want it to be unique-different.") He's planning a TV show for the fall tentatively called "An Evening with Jim Webb and Friends. For that one Jim will write a few new songs for himself and friends, the Fifth Dimension, Glen Campbell and Richard Harris. He's working on the production of a new group called the Picardy for his own Canopy label. ("They are two boys and two girls. I want a new sound-nothing that's reminiscent of the Fifth Dimension.")

He's also producing another group for Dunhill, the Waterproof Candle. ("Two of the members, Bob Siller and Steve Simon, have to be the next two big songwriters.") And he's thinking about doing an album of his own.

Doesn't Write To Be Commercial

About his work Jim effervesces thusly: "I never write anything to be commercial. I just do what I want to do, what I feel like. I don't know how to explain it, but I have a feel for a song. I think about it for awhile, sometimes even when I'm not thinking about it. Subconsciously I work out songs. But I'm able to monitor this

subconscious. It happened that way with 'Up, Up and Away.' I worked it out in my head. When I went to the piano, it was in the final stages of completion. I finished it in about 35 minutes. If I sit at the piano for over an hour and a half. I usually throw the song away. because I realize it isn't working out. Of course, with 'Mac-Arthur's Park' it was different because the song is so much longer. The most surprising and gratifying thing in my career is that the song is becoming a hit. I never expected it. I just wanted to write it completely on an artistic basis."

'People Are Best Ideas'

"Sometimes I feel like there are two Jim Webbs-the one sitting here and another onethe genius songwriter-sitting over there somewhere, whom I talk to whenever I want a new song, but whom I don't really know. Other times, I feel the song in me and then I have to write it. If I don't, I may lose it. A song I write now may not be the same as one I'd write 10 minutes from now. My mind is always working. While I'm sitting here, you may have said a number of things that I've filed away. Phrases or just ideas. People are the best ideas for songs. I love people. They're real. They're great.

"I'm beginning to find that there is such a thing as physical limitations. It never occurred to me before. On the other hand, now that I find that people like what I'm saying, I find that I have much more I want to say. It never occurred to me that I could be this successful. It was a dream I had for a long time. But when you find that it's not magic, that it's something you can do with your mind, with your fingers, you do it "







BMI Honors 14 Composers

Fourteen young composers will share a total of \$10,600 in the 16th annual Student Composers Awards (SCA) competition sponsored annually by BMI. The award recipients range from 14 to 25 years of age. This year's awards, BMI President Edward Cramer announced, bring to 130 the number of young people in the Western Hemisphere who have been presented with SCA prizes to be applied toward their musical education.

1967 Student Composers Awards are being made to the following: Richard S. Ames, 24, of Princeton, N. J., a student at Princeton University; Stephen S. Danker, 23, of Bayside, N.Y., a student at Queens College; Stephen Dickman, 24, of Glencoe, Ill., a student of Brandeis University; Primous Fountain III, 18, of Chicago, Ill., a student at DePaul University School of Music; Harley Gaber, 24, of New York, N.Y., studying privately with William Sydeman; Dennis Kam, 25, of Honolulu, Hawaii, a student at the University of Illinois; Howard Lubin, 14, of Merrick, N.Y., a student at the Juilliard School of Music; William David Noon. 21, of Pomona, Calif., a student Pomona College; Eugene O'Brien, 22, of Lincoln, Neb., a student at the University of Nebraska; Dennis Riley, 24, of Urbana, Ill., a student at the University of Illinois; Joseph C. Schwantner, 24, of Evanston, Ill., a student at Northwestern University; Daria Semegen, 21. of Rochester, N.Y., a student at the Eastman School of Music; Kathleen Solose, 16, of Niagara Falls, Ont., a student at the Royal Conservatory of Music, University of Toronto; and Greg A. Steinke, 25, of Moscow, Idaho, a student at Michigan State University.

Established in 1951 by Broadcast Music, Inc., in cooperation with music educators and composers, the SCA project annually gives cash prizes to encourage the creation of concert music by student composers (under the age of 26) of the Western Hemisphere and to aid them in financing their musical education. All awards are made on the basis of creative talent evidenced by original manuscripts which are submitted and judged under pseudonyms.

BMI annually makes the sum of \$7,500 available to the National Judging Panel, in addition to all monies not previously distributed. Prizes ranging from \$250 to \$2,000 are awarded at the discretion of the judges, who have the right to determine the amount and number of all awards. Next year, the panel will have a total of \$11,200 available for distribution. This includes \$3,700 which the judges chose not to present previously.

Schuman, President of Panel

The permanent chairman of the judging panel for Student Composers Awards is William Schuman, President of Lincoln Center for the Performing Arts.

Others who served as judges in the 1967 competition were composers Norman Dello Joio, Charles Dodge, Alberto Ginastera, Udo Kasemets, Ulysses Kay, Carlos Surinach, Alexander Tcherepnin, Francis Thorne, Lester Trimble and Frank Wigglesworth; Serge Fournier, conductor of the Toledo (Ohio) Symphony Orchestra; Donald Harris, assistant to the president for academic affairs at the New England Conservatory of Music, and Oleg Kovalenko, conductor of the Green Bay (Wis.) Symphony Orchestra.

Tony Martin to Audio Fi LP Due In Mid - May

NEW YORK --- Tony Martin has his first album in some time coming out-literally by popular demand-in mid-May on Audio Fidelity Records, wth whom he's just signed.

"Wherever 1 play in the world"---and the veteran entertainer has played the farthest corners-"I am asked by radio people and fans for my latest album, and I haven't had anything for too long to bring them. There was no LP on Tony Martin! Now there is," Martin told Record World last week. (His last album was Dot's "Fly Me to the Moon" some seasons ago.)

The working title of the new package is "Tony Martin-That Beautiful," inspired by the new Arthur Hamilton song in the collection called "That Beautiful." It includes lovely oldies like "Auf Wiedersch'n" and promising newies like Sammy Cahn's psychedelically treated "Imagine." Martin said he "sneaked a tape of 'Imagine' to a discothèque on the Coast where my two kids go." It was played, and went over big.

Audio Fidelity had originally planned to release the Martin album in August, to kick off the label's fall-winter campaign. But diskery president Herman D. Gimbel became so excited when he heard it, and when privileged key Audio Fi distributors sent in their glowing responses, that it was decided to release the package fast.

Martin was in town for his starring role in "Guys and Dolls" at the Wedgewood Dinner Theater in Glen Cove, L.I., followed by the Meadowbrook in Cedar Grove, N.J. He would like very much to do a Broadway show - "Incredibly, I've never done a show in a pro-scenium theater," he revealed. He is also going to be doing

more dramatic TV, including, for the fall, a "Bonanza," among other shows.

In the meantime, he will be doing plenty of promotion for his new album. "The most important function of anyone with an album is to have it played. You must take it to the major domos, the disk jockeys and the program directors," he advises.

Martin admitted his distaste for Top 40 programming. "Five men sit in a room and say this is a hit. It's like Hitler."

Tony has starred in such films as "The Big Store," "Two Tickets to Broadway," "Casbah" (with an outstanding Harold Arlen-Leo Robin score), "Here Come the Girls," "Hit the Deck," "Till the Clouds Roll By" and "Easy to Love" (with a choice Martin movie number, "That's What a Rainy Day is For," sung to a gang of senior citizen ladies - "We had to keep doing it over and over because the old girls kept getting distracted").

He is, of course, married to one of the screen's lovliest, leggiest dancers, Cyd Charisse. When asked why a TV "special" starring the two of them



Injunction Prohibits Pirating of A & M Recordings

A preliminary injunction prohibiting pirating of Tijuana Brass and other recording products by A&M Records was issued recently in Superior Court, Los Angeles, Calif.

The edict was directed against Edward F. Knasin, Jr., and Barry K. Pressman, doing business in Lancaster as Superba Tapes Co. A&M, headed by Herb Alpert and Jerry Moss, complained that Superba has copied Herb Alpert & the Tijuana Brass instrumental recordings and those of two vocal groups, the Sandpipers and the We Five, on tapes and then sold them to the public.

Knasin and Pressman admitted these contentions. Judge Robert S. Thompson, noting that Superba pays no royalties to the artists or the record companies and was operating without the consent of the recording companies, issued the injunction under laws dealing with unfair business practices.

Jerry Moss indicated that A&M Records will bring legal action against any unauthorized tape duplicators, wherever located, to put an end to the practice of tape duplication without the consent of the owners of valuable master recordings. Moss stated that this was being done to protect the interest of record companies, but also to protect the rights of the artists who are being deprived of royalties as a result of this unfair practice.

Patty's Last LP Under UA Contract 'Best I've Made'

NEW YORK — While Patty Duke's newest album for United Artists fulfills her contractural commitment to the label, the title is not necessarily prophetic: "Time to Move On."

It is, however, "the best al-bum I've made," Patty, veteran of five UA LPs, proudly told Record World last week. (She was in town from her Coast base for the Ed Sullivan show and to finish her LP.) "It was produced by Ernie Sheldon. who was one of the Limeliters. and the album also contains several songs written by Ernie. They weren't written for me . . . but after we did them, it seemed as if they were. Ernie and I had a marvelous rapport right off which made for a stimulating work atmosphere.

"This helped to make it all fun. Previously, in my straining to do it right, it became something of a chore."

Patty's new single, "And We Were Strangers," was written by Ernie and was pulled from the album, due in a few weeks. The LP will find Patty in perhaps a gentler mood than on previous packages—"the orchestrations and arrangements are simpler. You can really hear me. The others had a lot of echo and stuff. This one hasn't been sweetened."

But Patty had, fresh-faced "Miracle Worker," O and cheerful following her bout Duke.—Doug McClelland.

Magnificent Men R & B Pioneers



NEW YORK-Although Ron Gittman, manager-discoverer of the Magnificent Men, disclaims any "pioneer" status via the white Rhythm and Blues group's wide acceptance on the R&B beat, the facts indicate otherwise.

Significant inroads in improving race relations, for instance, seem to have been made when Capitol Records' Men played a couple of engagements at New York's Apollo Theater, and were received with thunderous enthusiasm. "At one perform-ance there," Gittman recalled, "the Men joined with James Brown for a 45-minute stint that people who were there still talk about. And James has been beautiful. Wherever he goes, he talks up the boys."

Gittman admitted that while they were doing "95% of their business on the R&B circuit when they started two and a half years ago, it is less than that now." Last summer the riots around the country forced

many cancellations on them. "Then the college kids heard about the seven white kids who played 'soul,' and that was when they started to trickle into the college market, where they are now extremely busy.

Triumph at Howard

But they are still R&B artists. "They had one of their biggest triumphs last August at the Howard Theater in Washington, where they broke all attendance records," Gittman said. "After the first day, they were made the headliners of the show-no one could follow them. The wire services came down, and the Men got standing ovations. The white attendance during their engagement at this theater-which is the Apollo of Washingtongrew larger than ever before during their engagement, too, and everyone out there was obviously having a ball."

The Magnificent Men-leader Bob Angelucci, Dave Bupp, Buddy King, Terry Crousore, Billy Richter, Jim Seville and Tom Pane-picked up their R&B bent naturally in their home state, Pennsylvania, growing up in strong "soul" areas. Gittman manages several other acts including a jazz act called the Andy Angel Quartet, the leader on which first touted Gittman on his kid brother's group, the Magnificent Men. Since then, according to Gittman, "They have never had a record on Capitol that went under 50,000. Three went on the charts and one went over 100,000. Their albums have shown steady growth, too."



months, he informed. "In this one we want to bridge the markets. We're not trying to emulate the so-called 'white soul' of some artists. The Magnificent Men are legitimately R&B. But we have tried to be a little more commercial in this album. For instance, we do 'Alfie' and we augment their sound with cellos, vibes, harps, etc. And on other numbers we revert back to their original six-piece sound."

The new album is to be called "The World of Soul" and is due early in July, Gittman noted, for a big send-off at Capitol's sales convention. Also coming up in a summer the Magnificent Men will do their R&Best to make a less "hot" one is an invitation to appear at the NATRA Convention in August.

Although the group is yet to get their deserved exposure on TV ("the shows don't want to pay so many people"), Gittman is optimistic. "Their greatest asset is that they're musicians. They pack them in at college concerts just like Tony Bennett, Johnny Mathis and Judy Garland."

Gittman was pleased with a new appellation the Mignificent Men recently received from a dj in the Baltimore-Washington area: "He called them 'the seven gray boys'-neither black nor white."



Bill Dana:

'My Name? Jose Hyphenitis'

NEW YORK—Talk to A&M's Bill Dana for a while and you get a mixture of sobriety and *shtick*.

As the interview begins, he spots a long black couch, immediately lies flat on his back and begins: "Well, it's this way, Doctor. I'm stuck on my mother. You see, she has this great body. My sister doesn't have anywhere as nice a body, but that's because she's really my brother."

And then suddenly it's down to strict business. Bill Dana has started what he hopes is the first of a series called "The Bill Dana Comedy Theater." The first album, already in release, is "The Mashuganishi Yogi" with Joey Forman as the gone guru.

"I hope to follow it up with some other comedy cast albums. I have some ideas, but I don't want to give them away just now. I would like to do a 'Best of Jose Jimenez.' I'm thinking of calling it 'Mondo Jose'."

Dana, without being specific, said that other albums would exploit topicality (much like the Mashuganishi) and take advantage of the record as a radio type medium.

"I like to say about myself partially in jest and partially in truth that I'm trying to find out what I'm going to be when I grow up." What Dana meant by that was that his career, as

he put it, is a case of "hyphenitis."

He's a TV personality and is readying right now a special called "Discover America with Jose Jimenez" for May 17. Dana is mulling movie offers and thinks he's found something he'd like to do very soon. He's also writing a screenplay. "I've got so many things going at the same time that it's difficult to exercise any kind of writer's discipline, but every day I scribble down a little bit of script."

And, last but not least, Dana is the current Playboy centerfold personality. Well, that's not exactly true. As he tells it, he's on the backside (no pun) of the Playmate of the Month in an ad. "I'm going to be facing a lot of walls," he concluded.

Record World's First Annual Jazz Issue proved conclusively through the fine commentaries and contributions by some of the most important names in the field of jazz recording that there is a great deal of thinking going on. Certainly a review of the articles indicates that contrary to common opinion JAZZ IS VERY **MUCH ALIVE**.

As one who has been involved in the jazz scene for a number



of years, I particularly welcomed the fresh ideas presented. Many of the men writing the articles have been a part of the scene for

years; however, their ideas are far from the conservative tainted by refusal to change with the times. Their observations in the special will prove to be a valuable guide line for years to come.

The issue proved that there is unamimity of opinion that jazz is a vital American art and should enjoy a position of prestige in the total music picture in this country. In addition, one finds that most of the men are deep devoted jazz fans and the art has been an important part of their lives. They believe in it.

It is within this framework that all of our projections during our association with **Record World** as Jazz Editor has stemmed. You first have to be a believer.

Record World takes no credit for what should have been done years ago. We are delighted most with the cooperation from the industry in putting the edition together. And we hope that this will be the first step towards a marriage of ideas that will see Jazz freed from the neglect and haphazard position it has been buried in for so long.

When we read the news last week that A&M Records had

signed J. J. Johnson and Kai Winding to record together again, it caused us to think how much the jazz picture has changed since these two trombonists first recorded together back in 1956.

At that time, they produced one of the most lyrical and smooth sounds that crossed all tastes in jazz, as well as the commercial public. Most of the musicians were in one bag, with the proponents of bop suffering the same negativism the avantgardists are experiencing today. Today, jazz is in a totally new bag. There are those still clinging to the hope that there will be a return to the old days. But time is progress, and there will be no return.

There are new settings. Jazz is being presented in discothèques along with records and some of the top rock groups. People are returning to the dance floor. The adults are no longer criticising the kids, claiming that the lindy hop was more artistic.

But adults also listen. And there are club owners finding success in presenting the discothèque as well as jazz.

Jazz was always a social commentary. The only difference, was that a few years ago, few people listened. Today, as **Bob Thiele** has pointed out, there are those critics who are attempting to brainwash the jazz public that much of the new music is hate music. That young black jazzmen are using their music to preach nationalism.

Is their music, which is social commentary, any different from much of the music heard from successful rock or underground groups who are disturbed by conditions in this country and find music their way of stating how they feel?

And then today's conditions are causing musicians to think more about business. Man must live by bread. There is no disgrace in an artist knowing how to count his money or negotiate a contract. The exploiters are the ones who are screaming the musicians are not cooperating and are pricing themselves out of the business.

Yet, these same musicians are pooling their efforts to produce and promote their own concerts and programs. The bread may not be heavy but they are finding satisfaction in doing it themselves.

The times have also produced a more technically trained jazz man than 10 years ago: Herbie Hancock, Freddie Hubbard, Wayne Henderson, Garnett Brown, Pat Patrick, Odell Brown and the Organizers, etc.

Jazz has moved well into the commercial areas. Jingles, station breaks, openings and closing of shows, background themes are using the music.

The scene has changed over the years and jazz is about ready to step forth and claim its place in the sun. We no longer need to apologize for it. Jazz is here to stay, all you have to do is to love it.

The third member of the Skye Company is Gary McFarland who is an exceptionally talented musician with a dazzling array of credits and who feels strongly that with the new company he will be able to project freely all of his myriad talents. This album obviously took a great deal of time to prepare and the results are excellent. "By the Time I Get to Phoenix," "O Morro" and "Flamingo" are impressive poems.

DUKE PEARSON'S BIG BAND BLUE NOTE-84276

The long-awaited recording debut of Duke Pearson's Big Band is well represented here. The band has been working weekends on special gigs in the New York area and steadily building up a large following. Those who have heard the band in person will not be disappointed. It cooks, swings and burns; but through it all, Pearson's lyrical approach is ever present. "Ground Hog," "New Girl" and "Straight Up and Down" are lead cuts.


Szabo Hospitalized
