

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TIC Acquires Attarack, Seymour Heller Management

NEW YORK—Transcontinental Investing Corporation has agreed to acquire The Attarack Corporation and the Seymour Heller Management Company, it was announced by Robert K. Lifton, President of Transcontinental.

Transaction, which will merge the two companies to form a subsidiary of TIC, was made through an exchange of stock, the amount of which was undisclosed.

Attarack, in publishing and production, is responsible for developing such record sellers as "Every Little Bit Hurts," "Love Letters," "Dirty Water" and "Sometimes Good Guys." Included in the acquisition of Attarack are the company's interests in three publishing companies: Equinox, Co-Jay Music and Honeycomb Music.

Seymour Heller Management, a personal management company, represents such clients as Liberace, Helen O'Connell, Pepper Davis & Tony Reese, the Treniers and Jane Kean, among others. The company is also noted for its development of such artists as Jimmie Rodgers, Frankie Laine, Tex Beneke, Lawrence Welk and Al Martino. The Heller Company also arranged with Van Bernard Productions for the up-

More Prices Going Up

Atlantic/Atco, MGM/Verve, London, Kapp, DGG and Vanguard and their subsidiary labels hiked their suggested retail list prices last week from the \$4.79 level to the \$4.98, et cetera levels.

The MGM/Verve and Kapp prices goes into effect Jan. 27; London, Atlantic and Vanguard Feb. 1.

London also announced that the \$2.49 lines, Stereo Treasury and Richmond Treasury, will not be increased. Special packages, like the new Frank Chacksfield, also will not be increased.

DGG's Heliodor line is being raised from \$2.49 to \$2.98.

Atlantic Sales Meet Hits \$8,000,000 Sales Mark

May Be A Record

Len Sachs, head of album sales and merchandising for Atlantic Records, announced that the most successful sales meeting in Atlantic-Atco history took place at the Sheraton Oceanus Hotel in Freeport, Grand Bahama Island, last week.

Distributor orders for the firm's 39 new albums and catalog product passed the \$8,000,000 mark, the highest figure ever reached at any sales meeting, and a figure that may well be the highest ever achieved at any record company sales meeting to date. The \$8,000,000 mark was substantially higher than the \$5,500,000 achieved at the firm's last major album meeting last June.

"The reaction on the part of our distributors to our new releases was absolutely fantas-

tic." said Sachs. "It was the greatest outpouring of enthusiasm I've ever seen at any of our sales meetings. One of our distributors, Amos Heilicher of Heilicher Bros. in Minneapolis, was so enthused about the program policies and the new releases that he grabbed the microphone and urged the rest of the distributors to support Atlantic-Atco's new program strongly, as it was the greatest lineup of product that he had ever seen at any company sales meeting. The orders placed by our distributors for our new releases and catalog items indicates their tremendous excitement about our product. They were also pleased with our advertising program, our new dealer point of sale material, our radio spot commercials and our in-store dealer commercials."

Recording, Distribution Pact by Reprise, Bizarre

Mo Ostin, General Manager of Reprise Records' and Herb Cohen, General Manager of Bizarre, Inc., announced jointly that an exclusive recording and distribution agreement has been concluded between the two. Reprise will control worldwide distribution for all product on the Bizarre label. Bizarre was recently formed by Frank Zappa and Herb Cohen.

The agreement, effective immediately, brings to Reprise Records not only Frank Zappa and the Mothers of Invention, but also other talents currently under the production wing of Bizarre. These include Wild Man Fischer and Sandie Hervitz, with others still to be recorded.

Ostin termed it a milestone in the history of Reprise. "The Mothers of Invention have already proved themselves, both artistically and commerically," stated Ostin. "In the future, as so-called 'underground acts' increasingly dominate the sales

picture, Frank Zappa and all the Bizarre acts can be in the forefront of record sales."

"To date," stated Ostin, "the Mothers of Invention have sold a minimum of 250,000 units for each album release. This has been accomplished with virtually no airplay or 'above ground' activity."

First release under the agreement is slated for next week. when a double-record album containing the last recorded performance of Lenny Bruce will be issued. The album, liner notes by Ralph Gleason, is entitled "Berkeley Concert." It is the only complete recording of a Bruce concert available on

The first Mothers of Invention album to be released on Bizarre-Reprise is scheduled for February.

Under the umbrella of Bizarre, Inc., Herb Cohen serves as head of the management di-

Pocket Discs N'west Hit

NEW YORK - Pocket Discs, the tiny (37/8-inch diameter) vinyl records produced by the Americom Corp., have received "tremendous teen response" in a Northwest test market, it is reported.

Test marketing of the disks, which are so thin that all of the initial release of 24 top records fit in a shirt or skirt pocket, has been underway in the Seattle-Tacoma area since late-September. Sales are running 250 to 400 per cent above expectations. "If we're right, we've got something here that will be as revolutionary as the transistor radio for the youth market," said Stewart Zuckerman, exec VP of Americom.

With the Northwest market area representing one per cent of the record market, Americom originally estimated four-month sale of 100,000 would make the program a success. In the first three months 150,000 records were sold. Now it appears possible that 300,000 or more records will be sold.

Merc Distribs Peachtree

Record Corporation has consummated another major manufacturer and distributing pact, this time with Peachtree of Atlanta, a local label established by Henry Wynn, veteran talent promoter.

The pact represents the fourth the corporation has entered into during the last six months.

Commenting on the venture Wynn said, "In my touring and booking of talent nationally, I have come across a lot of good talent which I felt was worth while record wise. I finally decided after seeing so much of this potential go into recording and succeed that I would set up Peachtree as my own medium for presentation of talent I find."

Wynn has been talent promoter for 17 years. Starting with local promotion 10 years ago he branched out regionally, then nationally, with Super Sonic Attractions.

At the present time Wynn estimates that he takes out about five tours per year from anywhere from three to five weeks. His present tour features Jerry Butler and utilizes headliners, semi-name supporting acts and sometimes local favorites. The negotiations between Wynn and Charles Fach,



Muni, who is the architect of TDI and the catalyst in





RCA Moves To Ave. of Americas

NEW YORK — RCA Records moved into the new office tower at 1133 Avenue of the Americas over the weekend.

At this time, the move to its new world headquarters involved most activities of RCA Records, the RCA Record Club and Sunbury Music, Inc., and Dunbar Music, Inc.

Still under construction at



the site are the four studios. It is expected the studios will be ready for occupancy and use this summer.

Announcement of the move was made by Norman Racusin, Division Vice President and General Manager, RCA Records, who said: "The new quarters and studios in the heart of New York's music and entertainment areas are expected to meet RCA's needs for the anticipated dynamic growth of recorded entertainment in the years ahead."

Initially, RCA is occupying seven floors and basement vault space in the building, and it has options on additional floors.

RCA Records headquarters had been at 155 East 24th St. since 1955. Since that time, RCA has seen its sales quadrupled, and its staff and space needs have increased apace. Until the move, RCA occupied space at four different East Side locations, which failed to meet RCA's growth needs.

RCA Records employes left their East Side offices Friday afternoon and reported to work in the new building Monday morning. The physical move was carried out by Neptune, Inc.



Mail Order Syndication Dept. Created by CBS

CBS Direct Marketing Services Division and Columbia Special Products have created and will jointly operate a new department whose function will be to coordinate the syndication of Columbia Musical Treasuries record packages to outside list owners. Announcement was made by Marvin B. Schwartz, Coordinator, Mail-Order Syndication, Columbia Special Products.

About a dozen different record packages, originally created by the Columbia Record Club for mail-order marketing to members, will be offered for syndication to publishers, catalog houses, department stores, oil companies and others with buyer or customer charge-account lists.

Each record package contains

from four to 10 different LP stereo records in individual sleeves, plus a bonus "keeper" record, all neatly packaged in a four-color box, together with a special index slip case. Retail prices of the packages range from \$10.98 to \$21.95, with discounts appropriately geared for mail-order marketing.

Columbia provides syndicatees with four-color invoice or package enclosures, or components for full-scale solo mailings, at cost, and then individually drop-ships orders from the company's Terre Haute, Ind., plant.

Custom Packages


In addition to syndicating record packages previously tested and marketed by the Columbia Record Club, the company is also developing custom record and tape packages for exclusive offer to subscriber, credit-card or mail-order customers. Currently, Columbia is developing such packages for several publishers and oil companies.

In the past two years, several hundred thousand Columbia Musical Treasuries packages have been sold to club members. Thousands more have been sold through syndication.




Kasenetz and Katz said the appointments have been made "not only to introduce creative people to organizational responsibility but to provide total communication between Super K Records' executives and outside talent."





RCA Records has announced that effective with its single records release of Jan. 28, it will begin releasing single product in stereo.

Stating that it is responding to the current needs of the entire industry, RCA said its stereo records can be played on all modern reproducing systems.

In becoming the first record company to have both its LP and single product in stereo, RCA stated: "We have tested and developed a proper mix which will provide stereo reproduction on stereo playback equipment and monaural reproduction as good as monaural equipment can provide from mono recordings."

RCA said that through use of its Dynamic Recording Correlator, it has reduced innergroove distortion assuring good playback of its stereo discs on both mono and stereo players, thus satisfying the marketing

needs for both formats.

It was noted in a recent bulletin released by the National Association of Broadcasters that: "Many broadcasting stations are faced with the problem of playing stereophonic discs even though their transmission is mono. Good sound quality along with non-destructive play of these discs is possible"

Prepared for the NAB by Dr. John Bubbers, VP for Field Engineering, Stanton Magnetics, Inc., the report instructed stations wishing to use stereophonic pickup for monophonic reproduction where equipment was aging how to convert this equipment for safe use. "The broad availability of high quality cartridges designed for use with standard EIA pickup arm mounting dimensions provides easy changeover to the use of stereophonic cartridges for playback," monophonic study said.

ASCAP Musicals Rock Broadway

ASCAP writers of pop hit tunes have clearly established the fact that they are equally capable of scoring successful Broadway shows. The 1968-69 season is further evidence that the next Broadway hit musical may come from pop writers, motion picture writers, rock writers — and Broadway show writers.

Burt Bacharach and Hal David have already proven themselves heavyweight Broadway contenders with their first show, "Promises, Promises."

The first big rock breakthrough came with the "Hair," which was produced Off-Broadway by Joseph Papp. Several tunes from the show, with lyrics by James Rado and Jerome Ragni and music by Galt Mc-Dermot, have turned into hot record items. Then came Hal Hester and Danny Apolinar's musical blockbuster entitled "Your Own Thing." The production is the first Off-Broadway show to win the New York Drama Critics Circle Best Musical of 1968 Award as well as the ASCAP Pacesetters Award. It is entering its second successful year and plans are underway for a movie version. Hester and Apolinar are currently working on a musical adaptation of "Alice in Wonderland."

The origin of the rock musical can perhaps be traced back to the Leonard Bernstein-Stephen Sondheim musical, "West Side Story," produced in 1957. By 1960, however, the teen-age gang was an anachronism but the legend of the guitar-strumming rock 'n' roll hero was stronger than ever. Along came Charles Strouse and Lee Adams' "Bye Bye Birdie," the tale of a teen-age singing idol.

A look at other ASCAP shows currently on the boards reveals that they have produced a large number of pop hits. The music from these shows—"Golden Rainbow," "Man of La Mancha," "Hello, Dolly" and "Mame"—while not rock, is certainly adaptable to the contemporary music scene.

Off-Broadway, Robert Dahdah's "Curley McDimple" continues into its second year; Clark Gesner's "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" continues its successful run; "The Believers" is currently in its 10th month for writers Josephine Jackson, Joseph Walker, Benjamin Carter, Dorothy Dinroe, Anje Ray and Ron Steward; and "The Fantasticks" is in its ninth year with no end in sight.

Jerry Herman's "Dear World," starring Angela Lansbury, will open shortly. Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt opened their new show, "Celebration," on Jan. 22. Jim Webb, one of ASCAP's hottest young chart-toppers, is also planning to enter the Broadway sweepstakes this summer with his operetta, "His Own Dark City." Webb, who is currently working on a movie version of "Peter Pan" for Mia Farrow and a movie musical for Richard Harris entitled "Ragamuffin," sees the possibility of a builtin record audience for his show. By packaging and releasing the album prior to its Broadway opening, Webb plans to stimulate interest via the pop charts. In addition to the Broadway production, Webb is currently negotiating with Universal on the film adaptation.

ASCAP has made it a policy to encourage creative writers not only with recognition but with over \$5,000,000 in ASCAP awards over the last nine years. This year alone ASCAP distributed \$658,450 to 1,813 writers

Songwriter Holler Turns Artist Too

NEW YORK — Dick Holler, who wrote "Abraham, Martin and John," by Dion on Laurie, was in town last week for a few chores, most notably recording himself and another group for Phil Gernhard Enterprises.

Holler works with Gernhard on most of the Enterprises there and that includes the Royal Guardsmen projects. (Holler is an aviation fan and "an amateur historian" and claims his interest in Baron von Richthofen instigated his penning the "Snoopy vs. the Red Baron" novelty.)

About the writing of "Abraham, Martin and John," Holler said, "I was in New York when Senator Kennedy died and I felt I had to write something. I don't want to say anything hokey. I can't say I had a vision, but when something like that happens, you feel kind of insecure. And that's the feeling I had when I wrote the song."

cut his first single as an artist (for Laurie) and says, "My thing is really writing, so I can be relaxed when I record. No need to be uptight."

A Mobile resident ("It's a quiet town to work in"), Holler feels that there is a strong liberalization moving through the South, starting at the college level. He credits this change in mood to the heavy play on "Abraham, Martin and John" in his section of the country.

And with that Holler was on his way to record the Gap—whose name will be changed from the Gap before release—with Gernhard.—Dave Finkle.

Don Davis On:

The Stax Secret

NEW YORK-Don Davis has been with Stax Records for about six months, and is now a full-fledged staff producer, working in all areas of record production.

He produces, among others, Johnnie Taylor, and is responsible for the million-selling "Who's Making Love." This record is indicative of what's happening in Memphis, which is to say, what's happening at Stax. First of all, Don is not one of the original Stax family of producers (mainly Booker T. & the MG's), but this doesn't mean that he can't reap the full benefits of the Stax family talents. As a matter of fact, this is what he values most in his relationship with Stax as a company.

Not all Stax product is recorded in Memphis anymore; Don produced the Goodees hit, "Condition Red," in Detroit. and is also working with Al Jackson producing the Mad Lads in Philadelphia. He also produces Carla Thomas and Darryl Banks. This is part of the Stax effort to expand from a basic Memphis sound, and as Don says, "You've got to go to Detroit to capture the Detroit sound." Of course, the same is true of Philadelphia, Memphis, etc.

Perhaps the best example of the way new blood is being infused into the Stax "sound" is "Who's Making Love," which Don describes as the basic Memphis sound with just a touch of Detroit. This is obviously a commercial combination. In the future, he hopes to have Johnnie Taylor working in a bag close to that of the late Sam Cooke, whom Johnnie once replaced as lead singer in the Soul Stirrers gospel group.

Don Davis' prediction: the new Carla Thomas, "I Like What You're Doing To Me," will be (in all modesty) a smash. Also, Stax Records will continue to expand, becoming an all-facets-covered record company. Word has it that they're even looking for a comedian to join their roster of talent.

In summing up his experience with Stax, Don says, "Hits are not made by one person. Every step is part of a critical process, and sometimes you need some outside help-that's why Stax is great. Everybody helps everybody else. Togetherness is happening." Amen.


Wexler Named to Trustees, California Arts Institute




Elektra Has Top Year

The Blues Revival: Where It's At and Where It Was

B. B. King, the undisputed King of the Blues, seems to be getting long overdue raves from the press of late.

B. B. was dubbed the King of the Blues long ago by the entertainers that made the onenighter circuit and ran into him in one of the Southern or Western towns he played for years, packing them in with his singing guitar, playing and soulfully chanting "The Message" (the blues to you). I first heard B. B. when he was doing a 30-minute live radio show on station WDIA in Memphis and the folks were raving about this new blues shouter just come up to Memphis from the Mississippi Delta, "The Cradle of the Blues," where he had long been a favorite in dance halls and night spots such as Tom Wince's Silver Dollar down on the waterfront in Vicksburg.

The sudden burst of recognition for B.B. brings to mind the revival of the blues. I can remember years back in the small towns and cities of the South when the travel preacher would come to town once a year and conduct a "revival" to give the folks a chance to renew their religion and refresh their spiritual background. This is what's happening with the blues: they are being revived, yet they have been here since the first ship landed loaded with slaves.

Before B.B. there were many great blues musicians and singers that the people who "dig" the blues today never heard of, and who never had a chance to let people know that "blues is beautiful," artists like Big Maceo, Memphis Slim, St. Louis Jimmy and Le-

roy Carr. Back in the late '20s and early '30s the piano was the most popular blues instrument with guys like Rufus Covington from Sheffield, Ala.; Sharp Sticks from Tennessee; Pete Johnson from Kansas City; Albert Ammons from Chicago; Earl Hines from Chicago: Sam Price from Dallas, Texas; Julia Lee from Kansas City; Mary Lou Williams from the Pink Rose in Memphis who later went to Tulsa to join Andy Kirk; Jay McShan from Kansas City and many others.

Among Traveling Players

At this time there were a few guitar players that traveled the South playing the beer joints and street corners. Among them were the master, Peter Wheatstraw, and later Lightnin' Hopkins, Lonnie Johnson, Tampa Red, Big Bill Bronzie and an unknown called "Legs." The recording companies weren't too interested, and they named it race music. as it was played and sung only by black entertainers. But when they started putting juke boxes in the Negro cafes and clubs, they had to have some music on them that the black folks dug. So they hired contractors to go out and dig up some of the race music makers. One of these contractors was Lester Melrose in Chicago who would bring the artists up from the South and record them. They got paid a flat rate for a session that included the rights to

all the tunes, which had to be original.

I was just out of school in 1938 and finished a tour for Jimmie Lunceford and Harold Oxley whereby I would work in front of the band on Southern and Western dates, going in town 10 days ahead of the band to contact the juke box operators and get the records on so the folks would know what they were going to hear when the band played there.

I ran into the original Sonny Boy Williamson in Jackson, Tenn. He asked me to go to Chicago with him to make some records. He bought three 50cent harmonicas and we caught an I.C. freight train (Illinois Central). I will never forget what Sonny Boy told me about the blues while sitting in that cold box car en route to Chicago. He said, "Nobody can play or sing the blues unless you've had them," and I'm inclined to believe he was right. He cut six sides for the Blue Bird label and got \$100 for the session which included six original tunes.

Where They Came From

The blues in Sonny Boy's time came from hard times, low pay, chain-gang boss, cheating women and no-good men, no money to pay the rent, segregation and discrimination. The blues today comes from ghetto living, wars, strikes, and riots, not enough jobs, education, bad housing, police brutality and the age-old cheating women and no-good men.

The sound of the blues has improved. When B.B. King, Bobby Bland, Junior Parker, Muddy Waters, Little Walter and Howlin' Wolf came up with the West Memphis Sound, and another cat from Memphis, Johnny Ace, started singing the blues sweet with a teardrop, they formed the basic pattern for all modern blues.

It's a sad thing when you realize that it took a group of kids from England to wake America up to a thing that they have overlooked for a hundred years or more.

I was born with the blues. The first word I heard was the blues when my Mama said, "Where will I get the milk to feed this child?" And I've seen the blues. When you hear Aretha Franklin, you hear Bessie Smith and Dinah Washington; when you hear B.B. King, you hear Big Bill, Johnny Ace and Big Maceo.

A hundred years from now some young cat will be singing B. B. King.

Great success for Tyrannosaurus Rex concert last week at the Queen Elizabeth Hall, London, In the audience was Artie Ripp of Kama Sutra and Buddah lending support to his artist Melanie who was also appearing on the bill . . . EMI has initiated a competition to tie in with sales of Tamla/Motown albums. Contestants buy one of the 10 new Tamla album issues, write a short slogan and make up an imaginary Motown chartbusters album. E.M.I. hopes that a Tamla/Motown artist will present the winner with the first prize of a mini car . . . Blue Horizon Celebrates 1st Year, CBS Distrib Pact

Blue Horizon Records, currently celebrating its first anniversary by having the number one record in Great Britain, Fleetwood Mac's "Albatross," has just signed a renegotiated long term distribution pact with CBS.

The contract was negotiated by Blue Horizon's directors, Richard and Mike Vernon, Seymour Stein and Richard Gottehrer with Harvey Schein, Vice President of CBS, Interna-

An immediate result of the new contract is the establishment of the Blue Horizon label in America, with Epic Records handling national distribution. Epic chief Mort Hoffman has proclaimed February as "Blue Horizon month" and will inaugurate the label with the simultaneous release of five albums: "O.K. Ken," the Chicken Shack; "Smiling Like I'm Happy," Duster Bennett; "When You Feel the Feeling You Was Feeling," Champion Jack Dupree; "Now Resident In Eupree; "Now Resident In Europe," Curtis Jones; and "Presenting the Country Blues," Roosevelt Holt.

The label expects to release a minimum of one album and one single a month in the United States and is now in the process of establishing exclusive promotion and production representation in various key American markets.

Blue Horizon now has its own labels in Holland and Belgium, France, Germany, Scandinavia and Canada. By the end of this year, Blue Horizon labels will have been set up in Australasia, Union of South Africa, Japan, Italy and Spain.

Mike Vernon, label Chairman, has just returned to England after a month's stay in America. Vernon recorded Fleetwood Mac in Chicago at Chess Studios. Additional sides were recorded in New York as well as an album with blues pianist Otis Spann, backed by Fleetwood Mac. Vernon also discovered and recorded two new artists in New York, Guitar Crusher and Garfield Love. Their records will be released in England next month.

Bell Expands O'seas Via New Producers

NEW YORK - Larry Uttal, President of Bell Records, announced the signing of British producers Derek Lawrence and Sandy Roberton to long-term production agreements in the label's first two moves to bow their British Bell logo with local talent.



One of the big areas his company has found cassettes most effective in is educational tape. Dubbings currently has the entire McGraw-Hill educational line available on cassettes.

Right now, Harris said, his company is using 30,000,000 feet of tape a week. Of this, he estimates that the company turns out 20,000 cassettes a day.

Dubbings, Harris added, is prepared and expects to duplicate for all configurations "as demanded and as they continue to be popular."

before. Tapes are expanding the record business just as rack merchandising did a few years



As Chief PR and Promotion for the local Fender combine, the former West Coast song cleffer has played a major role in marshalling a steadily soaring annual prestige promotion out of the Nashville head-quarters that today requires a staff of eight persons.


Snow Celebrates 20 with Opry



Dottie Rambo, 'Overnight Success'

It is often said of a performer that he became a success overnight. Of course, we know this is not usually true. Recognition sometimes comes on short notice, but there are often years of hard work and an interesting story behind these "overnight" successes.

Dottie Rambo, veteran popular gospel singer and authorcomposer, has emerged during the last three or four years as one of today's most articulate and effective songwriters.

Miss Rambo learned to play the guitar by ear; a guitar that her brother left when he entered the U.S. Navy. The brother was listed as missing in action and Dottie began to slip into his room and spend many hours with his guitar. She was only a child at the time, but she did learn to pick out some tunes by ear. At age 101/2, Miss Rambo suffered a serious illness which kept her bed-ridden for almost a year. She became despondent, but during this illness she wrote her first gospel song, as yet

unpublished, titled "I'm Waiting Until He Takes Me Away." Miss Rambo eventually recovered and continued her love for the guitar, for singing and for composing.

Dottie started traveling fulltime at the age of 12. At first, she sang and played music that she had known as a child in the hills of Kentucky. Later, after becoming a Christian it was a natural progression to gospel music. Miss Rambo says of her writing, "I only take dictation from the Lord."

Some of her current songs recorded by many gospel and country artists are: "He Looked Beyond My Faults," "Remind Me," "Don't Take My Cross Away" and "Come Spring."
