Capitol Stands By Beatles Pact

HOLLYWOOD-Salvatore J. Innaucci, President, Capitol Records, Inc., made the following comment in response to a rumor that since Paul McCartney, alone, has a record due for release April 17, the Beatles might never record together again as a group:

"Capitol's recording contract with the Beatles, through EMI, has 61/2 years to run, and it covers all recorded performances, not only by the group as a whole but by any of its individual members.'

George Goldner **Dies Suddenly**

George Goldner, veteran music industry producer and executive, died Wednesday morning, April 15, in his sleep. He was 52.

Founder of Tico Records some 22 years ago with his cousin Sam Goldner, George introduced such standard acts as Tito Puento and Tito Rodriguez. He then formed Rama Records and was responsible for one of the first rock hits, "Gee," by the Crows. Forming a subsidiary label, Gee, George struck gold with the first Gee release, "Why Do Fools Fall In Love," by Frankie Lyman & the Teenagers. Rama and Gee also discovered and recorded the Wrens, the Heartbeats, the Cleftones and the Drifters

Dave Berger Dead at 54

David Berger, Vice President of ABC Records, a subsidiary of the American Broadcasting Company Inc., died at his home Wednesday (15). Berger was 54 and lived in Rego Park, Queens, New York City.

Berger joined Am-Par Records Corp., the predecessor of ABC Records, in 1958, as Promotion Manager for the New York market area. Prior to this, he had been in charge of promotion for the Brooklyn Paramount Theater, over a period of years. Four years later, he was named National Promotion Manager for Am-Par and in 1968 he was appointed Vice President in charge of the company's expanding international operations.

Decca Handles Young Blood Label in the U. S.

NEW YORK — Jack Loetz, Exec VP of Decca Records, and Miki Dallon, President of Young Blood Records (England), have jointly announced that Decca Records will manufacture and distribute Young Blood Records product in the U.S. on the Decca label.

The Young Blood label has had considerable success in penetrating the English R&B and pop record markets within the past year, including "Indian Reservation," by Don Fardon, which went Top 20 in the U.S. charts.

The Decca-Young Blood deal will involve several artists. First release, scheduled for late April, will be the single "Sugar Man," by Jimmy Powell (which went Top 10 in the British charts) to be followed shortly by an album by the artist. Another project close at hand will be a progressive rock concept album, "Julian's Treatment Pre-

sents a Time Before This." Other Young Blood acts will be announced in the near future.

Dallon and his work were brought to the attention of Decca by Richard Broderick, head of MCA Records International. Broderick had worked closely with Dallon when Dallon appeared as an artist on the RCA Records label during Broderick's tenure there.

Trimble Starday Marketing Assnt.

NASHVILLE—Col. Jim Wilson, VP of Starday-King Records, announced the appointment of Lee Trimble as Assistant National Director of Marketing.

His other chart successes have been "And Suddenly" by the Cherry People for Heritage; "Abraham, Martin and John" by Moms Mabley for Mercury; and "The Hobo" by the Good Rats on Kapp. He's produced albums with the Cherry People and the Good Rats and has also made albums with London Lee (Philips) and Sugar Shoppe (Smash).

Oriolo has produced two acts for Mercury including Some Other Animal and Mel Wynn. He's produced an album with Bobby Breen for his own record label, Cypher Records. He has also scored several cartoon features including "Casper the Ghost," "Felix the Cat" and "Chaquita Banana."



The Changing Face of **Talent Booking**

Album Acts Become Increasingly Important Say Action Execs

NEW YORK-Jeff Franklin and Sol Saffian, who are reshaping Action Talent, Inc., the relatively new booking agency, took time out from their phone calls recently to talk to Record World about the burgeoning and changing booking field, and more specifically, the rock concert field, which constitutes a large part of their business currently.

Franklin said that it is becoming increasingly difficult to book acts on single sales. because of the importance of album acts. He explained that the increased album airplay is upping the demand for album acts and also cutting down exposure for single artists. The bubblegum field has fallen off drastically, he noted.

An act has to have an act, Franklin went on to say. "This is show business and that means you have to show people something," he said. "You can't come out and be impassive. An act has to build excitement, has to communicate with an audience. If an act can do that, then you can book it for years, even without hit record prod-uct."

"Records," Saffian added, "make it a lot easier. An act can go into clubs."

Saffian talked about some of the duties of the agent in the concert field. "An agent," he said, "should only get involved in a performer's act where he something drastically sees wrong. And an agent has to tell the buyer exactly what he's getting. The agent is the middle man between the performer and the buyer, and he works as much for one as for the other.'

Dig Out Dates

Both Franklin and Saffian feel that an agent's job is to get on the phones, "dig out dates" and not wait for them to call you. Saffian has devised a method, to that end, of searching out potential promoters and helping them get into the concert business.

ATI has been expanding quickly under Franklin and Saffian, respectively Chairman of the Board and President, and a new LA office has just opened under Leo Lichter and Roy Robinson.

Dan Langdon, formerly of the Richard Gersh PR office, has just been added to the staff as in-house public relations man, because Franklin feels that press info on groups can flag between record releases and that Langdon will be helpful in filling these gaps. Also, Franklin explained, proper press kits et cetera, enhance the image of a performer and can bolster prices.

ATI currently has over 60 acts on their roster, among them the Brooklyn Bridge, Brook Benton, the Isley Brothers, Small Faces, Isaac Hayes, Roberta Flack, the Four Seasons and Illustration.







Warners-Reprise Into The '70s with a Bang

The Warner Brothers-Reprise complex is emerging as one of the hottest diskeries in the business during the early months of the new decade. This '70s surge has created what the firm's new President, Mo Ostin, terms "the payoff of a sustained campaign to build new talent to take its place with our established stars."

The chart performance story for the two labels bears out the thinking, in that of the dozen current LPs now riding the charts, five key items are by artists who've hit with their very first outings. Singles-wise, the label combine is showing equal strength, with seven disks riding the first 100, of which four again reflect the payoff on artists new to the company, and scoring with their first efforts.

Looming very big is the midwesterner with the unlikely monicker of Norman Greenbaum, now in the top five on the singles chart with "Spirit in the Sky," and zooming up the LP charts with his album bearing the same title.

Just behind Greenbaum are John Sebastian, James Taylor, Van Morrison and Neil Young and Crazy Horse, all moving at a fast pace with their first LPs for the Warner-Reprise group.

On the singles side, new talent also abounds with the new group the Ides of March, close on the heels of the Greenbaum disk with "Vehicle." Also on the upswing is Van Morrison with "Come Running," and Charles Wright and the Watts 103rd Street Band with "Loveland." Also new to the label, and to the charts, is Turley Richards with "Love Minus Zero-No Limit." Warner-Reprise singles action this week is rounded out by the First Edition with "Something's Burning," and "Add Some Music to Your Day," with the Beach Boys, who though certainly not new to the charts, are nevertheless on with their first for Warners and, in fact, their first in well over a year.

Hard-Hitting Policy

The chart performance represents the fruition of a hardhitting merchandising policy at Warner-Reprise which combines the distinctive, much commented upon ad program engineered, masterminded and tailored for the underground by Stan Cornyn, Vice President for Creative Services; plus aggressive and imaginative merchandising and p.r. efforts, all directed by Cornyn's personal team of Hal Halverstadt, Merchandising Director; Pete Johnson, editorial chief; and Laurel Holiday, Publicity Director.

The labels have been on an extended campaign of new signings but not, as one of their key production execs put it, "signings for signings sake." Quality has been the yardstick in grabbing talent, and although every company obviously tries to adhere to such guidelines, Warner-Reprise has been eminently successful.

In addition to the proven first-timers on the charts as outlined above, the company has managed to corral such "at loose ends" acts as the Youngbloods and the Beach Boys, Little Richard, and Liberace from whom much more is expected at a very early time.

On the album front, the labels have a solid proportion of proven activity to back up the newcomers. Sharing the chart stage with those already mentioned are such familiars as the Mothers (on Warner-distributed Bizarre label); Joni Mitchell, Peter, Paul and Mary, Rod McKuen, Arlo Guthrie, the Association, the Grateful Dead, Frank Sinatra, the teaming of Anita Kerr with McKuen and the San Sebastian Strings and two British hard rock outfits, Jethro Tull and Fleetwood Mac.





Lowery Sets 1-2-3 Realigning

Atlanta music man Bill Lowery announces the realignment of his 1-2-3 record label under the terms of a new agreement reached with Capitol Records.

Capitol executives Karl Engemann and Artie Mogull paid a visit to Lowery's Atlanta headquarters to announce Capitol's affirmative dedication and concentration on the label's product. Engemann and Mogull negotiated the final terms of the agreement and discussed plans for promotion of 1-2-3 product.

Mike Clark has been appointed to serve as Executive A&R Director of the label and with Lowery will make all final release decisions. These decisions will be very selective in regard to artists and product released on the 1-2-3 label. Clark said, "We will only release product that we feel has a good shot and will not schedule releases just to have a record on the streets."

Tom Takayoshi of Capitol in Hollywood will be responsible for coordinating the promotional efforts. Capitol Coordinator of Independent Production, Artie Mogull, will be responsible for coordinating releases and for the signing of new talent.

Mike Clark, who will take over as Executive A&R Director for 1-2-3, has served as the Director of Bill Lowery's large promotion staff for the last three years. Clark was responsible for "bringing home" through heavy concentration in the secondary markets, super sleeper hits "Spooky," "Reach Out in the Darkness" and "Cherry Hill Park."

Stage Review

Marx Lads Make Musical One for the Family

NEW YORK — In the late '40s, James Agee's review of a film called "Give My Regards to Broadway" consisted wholly of the following sentence: "Vaudeville is dead; I wish to God somebody would bury it."

Well, here it is 1970 and the corpse is still having spasms, one of the livelier ones being the current inhabitant of the Imperial Theater, "Minnie's Boys." Starring Hollywood's Shelley Winters but stolen by the lads who portray the young Marx Brothers in this musical about them and their stage mother, the new show still manages to evoke pleasant nostalgia for a bygone show biz era. There eventually probably will be hosannas to the old two-a-day on the moon, and a Jewish mother to lead the singing.

Which is not to suggest that Miss Winters gets any mileage out of hers, Madame Minnie. True, the role is one big, today increasingly tiresome cliché with, in the Larry Grossman-Hal Hackady score, no real musical chance for Miss Winters to come up roses. Yet the star imbues the part with little except a rather distracted sportsmanship and, unfortunately, a conspicuous uneasiness on the stage. Considering her brash screen image, Miss Winters was expected to bring at least a certain authority to her starring debut in a legitimate musical, but such is not the case. "One-two-three, one-two-three," Mama mutters when dragged into dance numbers, and the audience is not sure whether it is the character or Shelley speaking. Heavier than she has ever looked in films, and gallumphing around for one number in a bunny suit that looks like she has inadvertently trapped her dresser in it with her, she can't keep pace with her "Boys." They easily make mince meat, or chopped liver, out of Mama.

While given no more than minimal characterization ("Groucho is the bookworm," "Harpo is the slow one," "Chico is the girl-chaser," "Zeppo is the charming one," "Gummo is the dressmaker"), Lewis J. Stadlen, Daniel Fortas, Irwin Pearl, Alvin Kupperman and Gary Raucher are extraordinarily apt facsimiles of their real-life counterparts. Stadlen stands out in an excellent imitation of the acerbic Groucho, walk, talk and all; and close on his nimble heels is young Fortas, who in a less showy assignment is winningly skillful at suggesting the smiling, gentle nature of Harpo. Pearl, meanwhile, probably looks more like his character, Chico, than any of them.

Most Affecting Moment

The show itself doesn't give the boys a great deal of help. Most of their laughs come from Marx-or Marx-inspired-material. Perhaps the most affecting moment is the concluding one when they first pull from a trunk on a bare Philadelphia stage the costume accouterments that made them physically the Marx Brothers we know and love from films. But that bit, too, with all the memory and emotion it evokes, belongs rightfully to the Brothers, although we are grateful to the young actors who comprise the vehicle for this touching, modest finale tableau.

The rest of the cast is generally adequate. The veteran Roland Winters is fine as a Douglass Dumbrille-type foil for Marx madness, but Julie Kurnitz is somewhat too girlishly, goosey Carol Burnett as the matronly Margaret Dumont-like object of Groucho's wiles in the "You Remind Me of You" song. Stanley Prager's direction follows the old vaudeville axiom to keep things moving.

As suggested, the score just gets by; and the sets are surprisingly skimpy for a \$15 top production-could it be the day's grosses that Miss Winters has with her in that Abominable Snowman of a bunny suit? But the Marx Brothers once again have come to the rescue, not without mishap but they were always able to deal with those, and are still. There are times when they all live again on the Imperial stage, for which the actors playing them must be thanked. It will be interesting to hear how much of this is captured on the RCA original cast album.

Aside from one female impersonator and a few references to Chico playing piano in a bawdy house he claims is



Salvation Co. Forms First Rock Repertory

The Salvation Company, consisting of eight cast members of "Salvation," the off-Broadway hit, have formed the first rock musical repertory company. The company will comprise a permanent self-contained unit, writing and composing original material and performing and directing themselves for all phases of the musical entertainment field.

Their new Capitol LP, "Earl of Ruston," released prior to the show's premiere, heads the list of five shows in the group's repertoire. The material, all written by the Salvation Company, includes "Earl of Rusby Peter Link and C. C. ton" and Ragan Courtney, "The Lottery" by Northern Calloway and Jean Beck, "The Fairytale" by the Salvation Company and two shows as yet untitled.

Moving toward what writer Peter Link terms "a new pop theater." the Salvation Company will fit the category of both repertory company and rock group, playing both rock concerts and their plays separately or in tandem on the same bill.

"During our cross country tour in the fall," said Link, "I expect the group to alternate locales from small university theaters and playhouses to large auditoriums and even legitimate houses. With our format there is absolutely no limitation as to where and how long we can play."



A New Mann

Remember that 15-second sax riff on the "I Put a Spell on You" cut of Manfred Mann's "Pretty Flamingo" album?

Maybe you don't. But Manfred does.

His newly-founded jazz-rock amalgamation, Chapter Three, has resurrected that riff, compounded it, increased the audio volume, formulated a repertoire of about a dozen tunes employing "a similar riff-and-carry approach, and generally emerged as one of the more refreshing little-big-band fusions. For Manfred Mann, of "Do Wah Diddy Diddy" fame, it's a new

For Manfred Mann, of "Do Wah Diddy Diddy" fame, it's a new realm to experiment in, far apart from the schlock (but consistently top-selling) commercialism that's characterized his bands to date. For the audience that attended his West Coast debuts at the Fillmore West and the Whisky last week, the music represented a significant departure from the normal bill of fare (particularly the Whisky, which lately has hosted an onslaught of American rock-and-brass bands, in the Blood, Sweat, and Tears vein, but predominently of a fifth-rate calibre).

For a good-sized segment of the opening night crowd at the Whisky, the "new sound" of Mann's group brought back memories of some of the avante-garde jazz experiments of the early and mid-'60s; the essential difference being Mann's greatly-increased volume. A close parallel to the forceful urgency of Mann's sound in today's jazz can be found in the **George Duke Trio**. The instrumental emphasis in both groups is a heavy use of keyboard; both as a lead and a bridge, though Mann uses horns as a vital part of his arrangements (more so on his album than in person). Although the majority of their live set is instrumental-oriented, the Dr. John-like vocal approach of original Manfred Mann-er Mike Hugg nevertheless pushes to the forefront as one of the group's major assets. The inherent dissonance of Hugg's singing meshed well with the complex rhythms of the six-man group and combined to bring Chapter Three into the limelight as one of

the year's better, un-super-hyped surprises.

First to emerge will be "Celebration: The Big Sur Festival," a chronicle of the 1969 folk festival at Esalen Institute. The film features Joan Baez, Dorothy Morrison and the Comb Sisters, Crosby, Stills, Nash and Young, Joni Mitchell, John Sebastian, Mimi Farina Melvin, and Sal Valentino. It runs 90 minutes and is expected out before June.

Slated for a New York opening in early June is the Maysles Brothers film on the Rolling Stones' American tour. (which, in its unedited form, contains the scene where spectator Meredith Hunter was allegedly killed at Altamont by a Hells Angel).

D. A. Pennebaker, in hiding since his "Monterey Festival" success, will re-surface soon with a cinema-verité look at last year's **Toronto Rock and Roll Revival Festival** (featuring John and Yoko and their bag, among others). He's also got that "other" **Dylan** film in the can, the sequel to his "Don't Look Back."

In September, a cinematic look at Joe Cocker's current Mad Dogs and Englishmen tour will flash across your neighborhood theater screens. The focal point of the film will not be just Joe's stage performances, but a behind-the-scenes look at the complexities of traveling across country with a 42-member communal-rock entourage (complete with dogs, cats, babies, and stray groupies).

Speaking of groupies, a movie titled "The Groupies" will be in release shortly, with glimpses of such touring British groups as Ten Years After, Spooky Tooth and Terry Reid.

And Wadleigh-Maurice Productions has "Woodstock II" in the can, already edited and ready for release. It'll presumably be released when his current film runs it course, which could be as

The Move to Taos

NEW YORK-In the waning days of the San Francisco rock scene not everybody who remained after the "flower people" fled were into shooting speed and watching teeny acid freaks. Friends still into making music began to realize it was about time to move on and get as far away from what had become super-commercialized psychedelic-noise-rock. Among these were three lads who had come to 'Frisco after working together in Woodstock, N. Y. And so a beginning.

Steve Oppenheim, Burt Levine and Albie Ciappa arrived in San Francisco during the closing months of 1967 with the fond hopes of making music that would keep them going and make other people happy as well. Lacking a keyboard man they sent for Jeff Backer in New York to come out as fast as possible. Kit Bedford, a native of the city, was recruited as bass player completing the present coalition. But soon after Kit joined things started to change and everyone involved began to get a little restless for a new environment. hence a bit of good old $inspi {\scriptstyle \downarrow}$ ration.

"The idea of leaving," Steve "had been hanging recalls. around for some time. We'd thought about splitting but it was hard to decide where the band wanted to go and what all of us wanted ultimately to achieve. It was all resolved when the West Coast was threatened with falling into the Pacific Ocean. It wasn't that we were scared; just very wary. Until one morning; I was shaving and Albie was down on the street as the ground began to quiver and then to actually shake. It was



a tremor with more force than the famous quake of the 1800's. The next afternoon we had all packed and were headed for the small mountain town of Taos, New Mexico."

"We picked Taos," Albie continued, "as a destination and a name for the band because it corresponded to what we were trying to express musically, It's hard to fit descriptions to a total living experience such as Taos. You must actually go there and live with the people to see how the whole idea works. Everyone is quite together-physically as well as cerebrally. Couple this with an almost total lack of internal tension with everything concerned and, well, you've painted an outline anyway."

Taos' music is a sort of smooth rock with country influences lingering as an afterthought. But essentially their songs speak for themselves. Quiet bass player Kit explains, "We don't like to classify the songs we play in any one category. Our music tends to exist for the purpose of making ourselves and those who listen feel a little better. We like to get off and play, and hope to communicate this elevation to our friends and ultimately to the audiences who come to hear us.'

So say hello to Taos. Mercury Records has signed them and has already released their debut album, "Taos," and a single from the LP, "Everybody's Movin'." The group is presently negotiating dates around the country and while staying in New York they were seen at the Electric Circus. This is only the beginning as more and more people around the country are picking up on Taos —the town and the group.

In searching for ways to help unite black people, we here at SCLC find that music is one of the dominating factors, and since we as blacks have no song that we all stand behind, the idea of James Weldon Johnson's lyrics, thoughts, and feelings of "Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing" is the one song that we feel is delivering the message.

In Chicago radio station WVON agreed with us in every respect, and they have incorporated in their program, for the next two months, to play "Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing" by Kim Weston every hour on the hour. If your station would adopt the same policy as WVON, starting April 17th, our people would become united spiritually and mentally with this song, and it could become the Black National Anthem.

As Afro-Americans our brotherhood is not in our skin color, because it varies from black to brown to white. We are a hybrid group, having been bastardized by the dominating, sexually assertive majority group. Our brotherhood is founded, rather than in color, in our common experiences. Our souls have the same longings and yearnings, anguish and pain. Our souls have these things. A people needs an experience, a style, a language, a song, a common interpretation of at least one strand of our heritage. No poet captured it more beautifully than James Weldon Johnson. 

Club Review

The Superior Peggy Lee

NEW YORK—Women's Liberationists, so vocal these days, could learn an important lesson from another vocal party —

Miss, if you please, Peggy Lee, who brought her platform to the Waldorf's Empire Room last week.

The feminists are merely fighting for equality. Miss Lee goes them one better. She aims for and achieves female superiority, with the kind of overriding confidence Lysistrata had demonstrating that the battle between the sexes is mockingly weighted in favor of the girls.

Does Miss Lee use wiles? Yes. Does she resort to female tricks? Yes. Does she know there's a difference between man and woman that should be recognized and preserved? Yes. Does she know she's a woman? Yes. Is it wonderful, natural, miraculous? Yes.

Looking young and sleeker than she has in a while, Capitol's Miss Lee showed at the Empire Room that being in command of her artistry and in touch with her emotions is all she needs to place her (bewigged) head and shoulders above the crowd.

Two Types of Songs

She is singing now, and has always sung, two types of songs -songs that allow her to unveil her soul and songs that allow her to have a good time singing. She chooses them from three or four decades, implicitly suggesting that songsmiths still write them like the used to. She finds as much fun and feeling in "Brother Love's Travelling Salvation Show" as she does in her swashbuckling medley of "Someday My Prince Will Come/The Most Beautiful Man in the World."

What Miss Lee, herself a songwriter of originality, understands is that truly good songs, no matter in what rhythm or idiom they are framed, capture something universal she can release through interpretation. She chooses songs for their timelessness and communicates that quality, most notably this act around in Randy Newman's satiric and poignant (I think those were Miss Lee's words) "Love Story."

I would say that this song alone gives Miss Lee the chance to show off everything she is best at—gliding over a melody with that velvet glove of a voice, rolling her eyes with saucy suggestion, putting tongue-in-cheek, undulating those supple fingers and finally reminding listeners of life's frequently painful throb.

Among the other tunes Miss Lee sang were "Raindrops Keep Fallin' on My Head," her new single "Remember Me," something strange called "Something Strange," "I See Your Face Before Me," "Manana," which I hope won't come under the same attack from Mexican-Americans José Jimenez did recently, the Beatles' song of gay, psychotic violence, "Maxwell's Silver Hammer," and "Is That All There Is," a song I like strictly because Miss Lee sing-says it so well and not at all for its contrived, downbeat philosophy.

Life, contrary to the statement of "Is That All There Is?," is not a string of disappointments. Not when Peggy Lee is around to entertain.

Concert Review

Morrison Magical

NEW YORK — After Van Morrison's Fillmore debut last weekend, one had the feeling that he wouldn't be playing this type of house much longer. The Warner Brothers artist is truly a magical performer and the dynamism of this presence was more than enough to fill the Fillmore four times over.

He opened his set with "Mystic Eves" from his old Them days and then went on to an hypnotic "Astral Weeks." "Brown Eyed Girl," "Stoned hypnotic Me," "These Dreams of You" were a part of his repertoire at the Fillmore. His delivery of these songs was dramatic and direct and had a virtually cosmic effect on his audience. Not enough can be said of this man's manifest genius and tremendous talent and, in fact, nothing really need be said except that this emerging giant had better be seen before he becomes inaccessible. Superlative, superlative, superlative; and that's nothing more than the truth.

Schwarz Opened

Opening the evening was a group and individual known as Brinsley Schwarz. The man who goes by that name plays guitar but their sound is one of a group. They are English and quite good at what they do. They perform original material with wit and a marked absence of pretense so common to selfstyled "heavy" groups. The group has a sound similar to Traffic's but with its own distinctive signature.

Heading the bill was Capitol's Quicksilver Service which has been augmented by the services of Dino Valenti and Nicky Hopkins. In spite of Hopkins' strong keyboard work they are still a guitar-oriented group and showed up with what seemed like more than 15 amplifiers. They play rock music and play it well with squealing guitars, chunky chords and the proverbial driving beat. They look the part, too, with tight pants and California good looks and real rock and roll star moves. They have a pretty large following and their records sell well, too. I guess it's their very self-conscious goodtimeyness which irks me.

Columbia's Tom Rush, Young Veteran

NEW YORK—Tom Rush has come upon us quietly while our heads were perhaps momentarily turned. But that he has arrived there is no question. Presently enjoying chart action on his first LP for Columbia, "Tom Rush," Tom came by Record World to talk about himself and his current musical directions.

He has been around for some time and people will recall his single folk guitar act a while back. Since then, however, he has moved away from the solo sets and gradually added sidemen.

"The first people I worked with were studio musicians whose job was to back me. The sessions always came out technically well and they satisfied me at the time they were done. But afterwards I began to think that things could still be tighter so I started to consider putting together a band. You know, working with back-up men is one thing; you go in to do some tracks and they are there. You leave and they say goodbye. The idea of a band is to work together and live together so communication can be as complete and as whole as possible," Rush feels.

Tom has travelled quite a bit in the last few years, extensively covering the U.S., Canada and Europe. These journeys have brought him in contact with many contemporary songwriters and he has been responsible in part for the unearthing of such writers as Joni Mitchell and James Tay-

"I'm always open to new writers and material. There is so much great talent out there. All you have to do is keep your

ears open and you end up with a major writing talent. Joni was working in Detroit when I met her. After talking with her a little I decided to do a few of her songs, one of which later became the title tune for my album. I met James in Boston. We got together and I learned a couple of his tunes which were also included in an album. If you want to figure a time thing into it, my LP was released before Jim's, so it turns out that I recorded his songs before he did."

On Tour

Tom Rush is presently on a tour connected with his Columbia record. This will cover most major markets with stops here in the East in Providence, Boston and New York. The New York visit will include a fiveday stay (through May 3) at Greenwich Village's hip café, the Bitter End. After the New York date, Tom and his band will head West. Then it's back East for six weeks of longawaited vacation, and thoughts and ideas about the next al-—John Kornblum. bum.



Johnnie Taylor And 'Sweet and Sour Soul'

In the two years since his "Who's Making Love?" struck the gold record mark, Johnnie Taylor has become one of the most consistent sellers in the soul and pop markets. Taylor's singles since the two million seller include "Take Care of Your Homework," "Testify," "I Could Never Be President" and the present chart-rider, "Love Bones." None have sold less than 600,000 units.

Taylor's roots and initial musical experience were in the gospel field, where he began with the Highway QC's. He subsequently replaced Sam Cooke as lead singer for the famed Soul Stirrers gospel quartet when Cooke left to work as a single. He later became Cooke's protégé, and recorded for the late singer's SAR label until his death in 1965. He moved then to Memphis' Stax Records where his growth as an artist has paralleled, and perhaps accellerated, the growth of Stax into a major recording power.

The musical style for Taylor's recent hits was epitomized by "Who's Making Love?," a hard-driving R&B sound, often provocative lyrics and a delivery which earned him the nickname "Wailer Taylor."

A new and different Taylor album, "One Step Beyond Soul," will soon be released and producer Don Davis, newly-appointed head of Stax' production, commented on it from the company's Memphis studio: "I think the best description of Johnnie Taylor's style is 'sweet and sour soul.' Up to now, the public has only been aware of what might be called the sour side of his music—hard blues. The majority of cuts on the new album will reveal what I call the 'sweet soul' facet of Johnnie's talent. The soul is the same, strong and honest, it's just in a different groove. We have several old standards and some contemporary ballads. I think Johnnie's gospel roots really did good things for the tunes."

Happy About Expansion

Taylor himself is happy about the expansion of style on his new LP. "I've always done this type of material, and done it well," he said, "but the company thought that we should stick with the success of the soul-rock sound. I was happy to get the chance to record some great ballads, from standards like 'Time After Time' to modern pop things like 'Never My Love,' which will both be on the album."

Davis believes this move to record Taylor in a wider format is only the beginning of a trend at Stax. "We feel," he said, "that it is time to stop limiting artists to what is considered the most commercial style for them. We hope to show in future albums from Stax, the range and versatality of artists who have been pigeon-holed by the trade and the consumer."

The "One Step Beyond Soul" album is scheduled for a late April release on the Stax label.

'Cryin'' Single Silver Fox LP

NASHVILLE — Silver Fox artist George Perkins, whose "Cryin' in the Streets" has become one of the hottest R&B singles in the nation and is also breaking wide open in heavy pop markets, is adding final touches on his first LP for the label

Lelan Rogers, VP of the label, stated that the Perkins album, to be titled after his hit single, will contain a wealth of self-penned material and will be the subject of a fullphase promotional drive by the Silver Fox label.

Rogers added that sales are now in excess of 350,000 on the single, and "We are gearing for tremendous trade and consumer response to his initial LP for Silver Fox."

Taking Care of Business

By DEL SHIELDS

Part II: The Atlantic Credo

(This week's column concludes the dialogue begun last week between Atlantic Records' Nesuhi Ertegun, VP, and Joel Dorn, producer, and writer Del Shields.)

Del: When you talk about companies having been deficient in jazz promotion, it is reasonable to say that Atlantic has done by far one of the best jobs of jazz promotion. Yet you say you have been deficient. Why?

Nesuhi: Well, because I think you can always do bet-



ter. I'm not satisfied that we have achieved the ultimate. I think we can do better. But what we have done is to have a separate jazz promotion de-

partment. Joel: We have guys that run on the road just as hard.

Nesuhi: Many companies don't do that. Now we have people working full-time on nothing but jazz programs, and this is expensive. It took us a while to make that decision, but as long as we are committed as we are to jazz, we felt it important to try to bring it to the attenion of potenial consumers. So now we have people traveling around the country all the time with jazz records only. They don't work on the rock and roll; we have other people do that. But we have a separate jazz department and the results, frankly, have been very encouraging which I think teaches us a lesson, and it is that jazz is not hard to sell if you really get after it.

Joel: One thing is that people are hung up with labels you and I have talked about this a lot of times in private conversations. So, what is a **Les McCann** "With These Hands"? Is that a jazz record?

Well, it is only a jazz record if you insist that it is. You know, it's a musician whose identity has been with the jazz community, who sat down and played and sang and got a hit record. Or Eddie Harris' "Lis-ten Here." Every R&B and pop station in the country played it or "Memphis Underground" or a "Roberta Flack." In other words, things can start in the jazz community, but if you see that you have a chance to go with it and you promote it and you make enough people aware of it, then it's no longer jazz. Just like Aretha Franklin is not an R&B artist if every station in the country is playing her record. And you know, peoples' tastes are so broad now that if you can make them aware of something or if you can have them listen to something, they'll hear it, they'll decide what it is, you don't have to tell them.

Nesuhi: Let it be hard. The first thing is to get it out there and bring it to the attenion of disk jockeys around the country, get window displays, do merchandising, do things that people often have not done for jazz. You can't start with the preconceived notion that the jazz audience is limited, so we are just going to sell a few records, let's do that.

Special Approach?

Del: Does jazz promotion call for a special approach? Is there anything different that you do in promoting jazz as opposed to your R&B or your soul or your pop?

Nesuhi: It is basically the same but the important thing is that the people who do the promoting should have an affinity for jazz, should know what makes each one a little different from the other, what is unique about it and bring it to the attention of the people. So we try to. I don't want to sound pompous, but we try to educate our distributors, day salesmen. Eddie Harris is a very special talent, for instance. Don't treat him just like anybody else. This is the track that might appeal to people, so bring this to their attention.

Joel: And we don't say like it's not like a big thing, you know. When a promotion man in a local market gets a jazz record, you know that's becoming a term, and he takes it to the jazz disk jockey, that's fantastic. But the jazz disk jockey's going to get it anyway, we're going to mail it to him. If a new Herbie Mann record comes out, of course the jazz disk jockey's going to get it. But what about the promotion man who sits down and says. "Ah, I know so and so over at the underground station or the R&B station." That's the trick, you get it out there. If you can get it out there somebody's going to like it because every one of our jazz records that went top 10 or top 20 nationally started at a jazz station. But then another kind of station picked it up and really busted it wide open. Now your station, for example, is a little bit different in that you have a pretty broad cross-section of people listening here in New York. I was out with some people the other night you wouldn't dream listen to you, and they told me something you had said on the air about Gene McDaniels. In four million years I would say they would be the last people to listen to Del Shields, so you see it's wider than you think. The whole scope of this thing is wider than you think; that's how we break records.

firm. With this trip by Reiter, United Artists Music Group is taking a further step in extheir organization panding throughout the world.





Leaders Demand Music City Blvd.

By CHUCK NEESE

One of the reasons that Nashville has become a leader in the music business is because of the closeness of its music community both in the area of cooperation and physical location.

During Music City's formative years most of the publishers, record companies and related businesses followed studio owner Owen Bradley to a low rent section of town bisected by 16th Ave. So. now nicknamed 'Record Row." Today, 80% of Nashville's music offices are located in a one-mile square area adjacent to the Belmont, Peabody, Scarritt and Vanderbilt University complex with "Record Row" as its nucleus. Within the "square mile of music," several million dollar studios and spanking new music office complexes inter-mingle with old, dilapidated residences. Although new buildings are being erected every day, the area is still far from being a showplace for the enormous amount of tourist traffic visiting the studios each weekend.

Several years ago the Nashville Housing Authority began making plans to renovate the entire university area to divert heavy traffic from the streets that divided the four colleges. In doing so a boulevard was planned to siphon traffic to the east and inadvertently the boulevard passed directly through the "square mile of music." The music community was elated and began making plans to build its new edifices facing the proposed tree-lined, four-lane divided Music City Boulevard. Alas, local funding became bogged down and planning came to a standstill.

Renew Interest

Last week, "Record Row" business leaders got together to try and renew interest in the Music City Blvd, project. A public relations firm called a press conference and music leaders predicted that planned expansion of studios might be moved to Memphis or Atlanta if government officials didn't do something to up grade the "blighted Record Row area." Several record companies said that they were investigating moves to Memphis. Record World talked to Memphis Mayor Henry Loeb concerning the mentioned expansion moves into his city, and the progressive thinking mayor said he would be "delighted" to work with record companies planning a move to his city.

The play for public sympathy for the Music City Blvd. was picked up by local newspapers who carried extensive articles and editorials for three solid days following the property owners press conference.

John Van Ness, Supervisor of Urban Renewal Planning, told **Record World** that local funding was the only problem facing the project. In 1968 an ordinance passed council that would condemn 82 lots that border the west side of "Record Row." No building permits can be issued for building improvements on those 82 parcels. "It would take about 3¹/₂ million


new releases by David Houston, Tommy Cash and Charlie Rich, all recent entries in its country catalog.



Book Review

Williams Biog a Must

Time Magazine Atlanta Bureau Chief Roger Williams has put Hank Williams into the biographical setting in which he belongs in his book "Sing a Sad Song" (Doubleday, \$5.95).

Hank's problems, both physical and psychological, and his inability to cope with them led the Drifting Cowboy to an early death. Roger Williams' biography of Hank's short life is probably the best account ever written on the highly frustrating career of a country music singer-songwriter. Journalist Williams digs deeply into all facets of Hank's 29 years. researches associations He Fred Rose, with publisher booker Jim Denny, first wife Audrey, second wife Billy Jean, pseudo-medic Toby Marshall, songwriter Vic McAlpine and members of the Drifting Cowboys hand.

The book is highly readable, but will probably evoke controversy regarding Hank Williams' family life. A must for country fans.

Epic Records' Tammy Wynette has been awarded a gold album—certifying over a million dollars in sales—for her LP "Tammy's Greatest Hits."

The album contains 11 of the songs that have kept her consistently at the top of the country charts for the past several years, including "Stand By Your Man," which won her a Grammy this year for the Best Female Country Vocal Performance. 

Loretta Lynn Sales Soar

NEW YORK — Loretta Lynn has just been awarded her first gold record for the Decca album "Don't Come Home a Drinkin' (with Lovin' on Your Mind)."

The album, released last year has just been certified by the RIAA. At the same time, Tony Martell, Vice President of Marketing and Creative Services for Decca, reports that sales figures now in on the special January "Loretta Lynn Month" promotion show sales "in excess of \$1.5 million."

Martell noted: "It is very unusual for a pure country album to reach the \$1 million sales mark, and it is a tribute to Miss Lynn that she has achieved such stature. In addition, we fully anticipated that our 'Loretta Lynn Month' campaign would be one of the most successful promotion

Before the week ended, we had something and took 'Little Bit Late' to Mr. Jim Wilson at Starday-King Records in Nashville. Luckily, Mr. Wilson thought we had something too, and agreed to put out a single on it right away.

"Now that 'Little Bit Late' is doing so well as a single, we're bringing out our first album, and it's called . . . 'Little Bit Late'. Just me and my younger brother Hank doing our thing."
