


JDM Record Corp. Acquires Jay-Gee, Select Sound

NEW YORK — Jay-Gee Record Co., Inc., including the Jubilee and Josie labels, Select Sound Recording Studios and the Jubilant Music Publishing wing, have been acquired by the newly formed JDM Record Corp.

Principal officers of JDM Record Corp. are Steve Blaine, President, and Mickey Eichner, Vice President. JDM Record Corp. acquired all the stock of Jay-Gee Record Co., Inc., and Select Sound Recording Studios. The acquisition also includes all existing artist contracts as well as the entire tape, single and album catalogs of Jubilee Records and Josie Records and their subsidiary labels.

Artist roster includes the Meters, the Happenings, Wild Man Steve, Emmy Lou Harris, Honey & the Bees, Mary Wells, Doug Clark and Rusty Warren.

The new company will concentrate solely on contemporary product

Terming the acquisition "The first move in a complete overhaul and redirection of the Jubilee and Josie labels."

Blaine said the "accent of the new company will be on youth—in administration, in thinking, in production, merchandising, promotion, packaging—everything." JDM Record Corp. is a young man's company."



Viewlex to Purchase Jubilee Common Stock

HOLBROOK, N. Y. — Ben Peirez, President of Viewlex, Inc., has announced that the company had entered into an agreement with Jerry Blaine, President, Director and controlling stockholder of Jubilee Industries, Inc., by which Viewlex has agreed to purchase all of the shares of common stock of Jubilee owned by Blaine and certain members of his family.

The shares, which constitute approximately 60% of the total outstanding shares of Jubilee, are to be purchased by Viewlex. Inc., for \$1 million in 6% five year subordinated debentures, a substantial part of which can be converted into Viewlex stock at \$18 per share.

Peirez noted that this was a change from Viewlex' earlier announcement of a proposed acquisition of the assets of Jubilee. He said that immediately following the closing, tentatively scheduled for June 5, details will follow. The approximate purchase price of each share of Jubilee is \$2.85.



Brian Auger, Trinity to RCA

RCA Records, England, has signed on a world-wide basis the super-star of organ and piano Brian Auger and his group, the Trinity.

Their debut RCA album, "Befour," is scheduled for release in the United States the middle of June, with the group due to tour this country June 20-July 10.

Auger began his musical professional career in 1963. Jazz critics garnered his playing with the highest of praises, but after a while the inward-looking modern jazz scene didn't appeal to the broad musical outlook of Auger, so he quit to think. Within a few months, Auger was back on the music scene with an enlarged group, into R&B, but still on piano, which eventually led to the Hammond organ. The Trinity was bridging jazz and pop with appearances all over Europe and major jazz festivals and pop clubs. Vocaliasts and instrumentalists came and left and one singer who stuck was Julie Driscoll. The foursome made enormous strides throughout Europe, becoming a top attraction in every country, including the United States. Julie Driscoll has since left to pursue a solo career.

The Trinity, Gary Winston Boyle on lead guitar and vocals, David Ambrose, bass guitar and Clive Thacker, drums and other percussion instruments, have since musically evolved into a tight heavy group.





NEW YORK—It's "One Year After" for Polydor Records, and to highlight their June release, Polydor is staging specially-planned sales meetings with distributors, retailers and rack jobbers in local markets, starting on June 8 and concluding on June 12.

This is the first such series of country-wide meetings that Polydor has held to kick off new product since its establishment in April, 1969.

According to Jerry Schoenbaum, President, "Tremendous consumer acceptance and heavy sales response to Polydor product" has made it necessary to expand the current sales staff to cover all areas of the United States and to carry out the national "One Year After" campaign.

Each market will be tackled by teams of salesmen under Irv Trencher, Director of Sales for Polydor's Pop Division, and Sid Love, National Sales Manager for the Classical Division and Director of Sales for all tape product.

Regional Sales Managers now include Bernie Wechsler out of the East Coast; Lu Fields out of the West Coast; and Joe Berger out of the Midwest.

Increasing tape sales across the country in all Polydor product have created the need for three additional tape sales reps as well: Chuck Dondero and Jerry Denkers will be covering 11 Western states and Vincent Fsadni will be handling the Midwest region.

During Polydor's national sales drive, new product will be introduced to distributors and retailers.

"Area Code 615," an original best-seller produced by Elliot Mazer and featuring Nashville's top studio sidemen, including Kenny Buttrey and Mac Gayden, have recorded a second LP of instrumentals and vocals at Cinderella Studios in Madison, Tenn. (Volumes I and II) entitled, "Turn It Over," "Albion Doo-Wah" is number two by Cat Mother and the All Night Newsboys. Ten Wheel Drive with Genya Ravan have their second album, "Brief Replies."

"Rock Encounter" is an international release with flamenco guitarist Sabicas; vocalist Domingo; and rock guitarist Joe Beck, backed up by members of Jeremy Steig's Satyrs and Tim Hardin's band. Andy Pratt, a young and innovative producer, writer and performer, presents his first album for Polydor.

Polydor's sales staff is planning promotion and advertising campaigns for the "One Year After" release.

Rydell also has pacted for recordings with Sixuvus Productions, which is owned by Kama Sutra artists the Jaggerz, who will produce his disks. A single on Kama Sutra is expected this month.

Rydell has a film coming out in the fall, too: "Girl from Peking."

NEW YORK — Jay & the Americans have taken a long-term lease on an 8-track recording studio in order to meet heavy production and recording commitments, announces Jata Enterprises General Manager Vic Catala.

Through their Jata Enterprises, the group is currently producing their own albums and singles for United Artists Records as well as producing three acts independently—Becker & Fagen, Ersel Hickey and the New Tradition.

MORNING WAY

TRADER HORNE—Janus JLS 3012.

Simple, soft, supple folkish singing from a sensitive new group. Most of the songs were written by group member Jackie McAuley. The liner notes describe them as "songs to find under your pillow when you wake," which indicates where Horn's heads are.

**** JIM SULLIVAN

Century City CCR 5000.

A new troubadour singing songs about highways and blowing in the four winds. Jim Sullivan has a feel for blues crossed with folkrock, and fans will share his enthusiasm. This tasty package deserves attention.

SHORTY FEATURING GEORGIE FAME Epic BN 26563.

Sweet Georgie Fame, as songbird Blossom Dearie has dubbed him, is back with a large jazz organization aiding him. He plays a few things he wrote himself and numbers by the likes of Mose Allison, just to show where his head is at. Juicy music.

**** THE WALL I BUILT MYSELF BOB BROWN—Stormy Forest SFS 6007.

A new and introspective songstersongwriter has appeared on the folkrock horizon. He's Bob Brown and he writes palpable, pungent ditties (sometimes with David Franks). There are eight of them and fans will follow.

EDGAR LEE MASTERS' SPOON RIVER ANTHOLOGY

DICK WHITTINGHALL, LINDA WOOD— Ranwood R5000,

Edgar Lee Masters' immortal poems—portraits of citizens of the mythical American small town—are read with versatility and sensitivity by Dick Whittinghill and Linda. Musical director Bill Justis has chosen appropriate background themes. Randy Wood produced.

PRESENTING THE FABULOUS MAE WEST Decca DL 79016.

Swinging her richly-swathed hips and patting her platinum coif, Mae sashays through some of her signature tunes. Mae's tongue is embedded so far in her cheek that her dimple is convex, but what the hey! "They Call Me Sister Tonky Tonk," et cetera.

**** FIRST SLICE

JELLY BREAD—Blue Horizon BH 4801.

Pete Wingfield, group's vocalist, pianist and liner notest, lets it be known that the group shies away from tags. He admits the trio's primary influence is blues. Blues it is. The combo play Wingfield's tunes and a few of Percy Mayfields, among others.

Famous Music Corp. Completes Restructuring, Revitalization

NEW YORK—Famous Music Corporation, a Gulf & Western Company, has now completed a restructuring and revitalization program under the direction of David N. Judelson, President of Gulf & Western Industries, and William P. Gallagher, President of the music corporation.

Famous, a separate operating entity within the G&W complex, is the parent organization for five major divisions: Paramount Records (including the Dot and Steed labels); Famous Music Publishing Companies; Stax-Volt Records; Seaway Distributing of Cleveland and Famous Music Corp. Ltd. (the International division).

The music complex, which is based in the new world headquarters building of Gulf & Western Industries at 1 Gulf & Western Plaza in New York, is the focal point for the operation of the Paramount Records and Famous Music Publishing divisions. The Stax-Volt division will continue to operate in its headquarters in Memphis. Seaway Distributing is operated from Cleveland and headquarters for the international division is in London, under the banner of Famous Music U.K.

Efforts Varied

In announcing the new complex, Gulf & Western President Judelson stated: "The Famous Music Corporation under the direction of Bill Gallagher is an exciting new corporate structure within the G&W family, designed to garner for this corporation a rightful share of the continually growing leisure time market. Although the efforts of the new corporation are varied, including publishing, record distribution and other facets, it is a primary intent of Famous to place the Paramount Records Division squarely within the record industry. I have given Mr. Gallagher the challenge to create a major music industry enterprise and to develop talented artists into the major attractions of tomorrow. I will personally see to it that the strength of Gulf & Western, which is certainly a major asset, will stand behind the efforts of Mr. Gallagher and Famous Music Corp."

Within the restructuring of the Famous Corporation Gallagher has rebuilt the staff of Paramount Records, utilizing both existing personnel and a number of people new to Famous.

The top level executives of Famous, who directly supervise the Paramount operation include, in addition to Gallagher, Executive VP Jack Wiedenmann; Financial and Administrative VP Aaron W. Levy; Marketing VP Joe Lyons; Director of Business Affairs Neil C. Reshen; General Counsel Robert L. Young and Londonbased International Director Leslie Gould.

In addition to these men the promotion, merchandising and distribution set-ups of the labels have been completely revised.

Paramount, no longer selling through branch operations, has gone completely into independent distribution.

The Paramount, Dot and Steed labels will be sold through 27 indie distributors (list attached).

In the promotion and merchandising departments, marketing VP Joe Lyons has Worthy Patterson in the position of National Promotion Director responsible for the field activities of the 13 exclusive Paramount promotion managers operating out of key cities throughout the U.S.

Patterson's counterpart in marketing is Larry Baunach, whom Lyons has named Director of Field Marketing. Baunach will supervise the company's four regional sales managers: Murray Kaplan (East); Topper Schroeder (Midwest); Dick Hughes (West Coast) and Jim Wardlaw (South).

Wardlaw Continues in N'ville

In addition, National C&W Promotion Director Bob Wardlaw will continue to operate out of the company's Nashville office and report to Patterson on the extensive Paramount/Dot country music roster.

In another move to bolster the key promotional area of singles, Don Masters has been named Singles Sales Manager. Reporting to Baunach, Masters, who has relocated in N.Y. from the label's Boston office, will be solely engaged in maintaining a flow of singles product from plant to distributor and keeping the entire organization abreast of developments in this fast breaking area.

In the A&R department, Exec VP Jack Wiedenmann will

oversee the flow of product from staff and indie producers. Wiedenmann has appointed Ed Matthews as Director of West Coast A&R for the Paramount and Dot labels. Marty Torbert (N.Y.) and Tim O'Brien (L.A.) were named coordinators of independent production for their respective halves of the country. Both Torbert and O'Brien will travel and audition new acts and available masters. Tom Mack continues as a West Coast staff A&R producer with special emphasis on soundtrack recording, and O'Brien will also produce for the two labels. Both Mack and O'Brien report to Matthews.

Will Name Additional A&Rers

Wiedenmann will shortly name additional members to the labels' A&R department.

London-based International Director Leslie Gould, who has already scored with a number one record for Paramount in the English market with Lee Marvin's "Wanderin' Star," will direct the Paramount operation worldwide through both company owned and affiliate labels. Gould will both develop U.S. originating talent and product for the international market as well as find and sign new talent from abroad.

Gould's assistant at Famous Music Corp. Ltd. in London is Ralph Mace.

The international operation is staffed in N.Y. by Mrs. Helen Nerko, who will deal directly with worldwide affiliates as well as assist Gould in the flow of artists and information from here abroad and visa versa.

In the area of creative services, Rick Bolsom will direct Paramount's publicity and artist relations departments and Ruby Mazur has just been named Art Director for the company.

Advertising for both the labels and the corporation will generate through Creative Crowd Advertising Agency.

Another pair of key executives in the Famous set-up are Corporation Controller Don Cuzzocrea and Production Manager John Lemmermeyer.

In other major revisions, a large number of titles were pruned from the labels' catalogues and all outstanding merchandise has been taken back from outlets, clearing the way for a flow of contemporary, heavily promoted product. Also, the labels' artist rosters in both the pop and country areas have been revised and broadened with the addition of some dozen acts. The first of these new acts to be released by Paramount was Ambergris with an LP titled after the band, which has established itself and is climbing the charts.

Steady Single, LP Flow

A steady flow of singles and LP product in the rock, middle-of-the-road and country areas has been scheduled for upcoming months, with emphasis on Roy Clark, Andy Kim, the Illusion, the Mills Brothers, Hank Thompson, Peggy Little and other new as well as established acts.

The labels will function on the theory of releasing product which is coordinated for mutual promotion, e.g. a hard rock, a C&W, and a m-o-r single in a given week. This will avoid the self-defeating situation of sending a promotion man out with more records than he can effectively work in a given period of time.

The key to the entire system is an overlapping communications network between field and home office staff. Field, distribution and office personnel and each individual group, employing both verbal and written reporting and feedback, as well as a series of newsletters designed to put all the facts about current records in the hands of everyone with a need to know.

Plans to Expand

Through this operation Gallagher plans to expand the company's operation in all musical areas.

In addition to the A&R facilities in N.Y. and Los Angeles the Nashville operation of the labels is being bulwarked with the addition of a soon to be announced Executive Director, who will increase the labels' activities with an increasing roster of country artists and producers.

In the Famous Music Publishing Companies, headed by VP and General Manager Marvin Cane, the scope and depth of the publishing operation, which is completely independent of the record operation, has been greatly enhanced. Famous Music, and its associated companies Ensign Music, Memphis/East and others, is one of

the largest publishing operations in the U.S. Through its association with Chappell Music worldwide (Famous/ Chappell) it is a competitor in every market internationally.

Cane, in addition to developing ever-new areas for the corporation's existing catalogue, is working with new writers of today's pop music with an eye to both commercial product and the scoring of films and TV. Famous VP William Stinson will continue to act as the company's liaison with the Paramount Pictures Corp. in Hollywood.

Bill Gallagher said, in assaying the public debut of the newly formed complex: "The development of the Famous Music Corporation as a total music complex is an exciting challenge to me. Its potential

Metromedia Inks Elephant's Memory







Ragovoy's Hit Factories Live Up to Name

NEW YORK—Jerry Ragovoy, whose reputation as a hit producer is legend, considers himself in the studio business "by default." His two Hit Factory studios have lived up to their name in spite of the unintentional way Ragovoy got into the business.

The original Hit Factory at 701 Seventh Ave. was started when Ragovoy found space at too high a premium to suit himself. He started the studio, and the people who worked it "fell in love with it," as he describes it. "The gospel spread, so to speak, and the place was fully booked within the first 90 days."

The studio is surely one of the funkiest in the world with a marked absence of plush rugs (except on the wall for baffling) and Danish furniture; in fact, there's not much at all except the recording equipment (featuring what Ragovoy likes to call a "con-s-o-u-l").

He pointed out "the quality is very high despite it's not-so-window-dressed appearance; it's got the greatest rhythm sound around — the room is tight, the tapes prove it." The Band's "Cripple Creek," Iron Butterfly and John Sebastian sessions were all done at the "tit Factory.

Because of the popularity of the original (and still funky) Hit Factory, a Hit Factory "West" has opened at 353 W. 48 St. This one is quite a bit larger, more comfortable but retains much of the original charm, as it were, of the 47th St. establishment. Ragovoy has "tuned" the new studio so he can get the same tight Hit Factory sound out of both studios. Another feature is a full-length mirror in the men's room and none in the ladies room. Ragovoy explained that he thinks men are more vain then women.

Ragovoy accounts for between 15% to 20% of the recording going on at the Hit Factory and has worked with Paul Butterfield, Canada Goose, Howard Tate, Mort Schuman, Miriam Makeba and Lorraine Ellison. He's very excited about Lorraine's newest single on Warner Brothers, "You Really Got a Hold On Me," as well as some new projects he's working on. These include a group called the Farquahr and Jenny Dean.

Roulette Master 'There'

NEW YORK—A master, currently one of the fastest selling records in the Connecticut area, "Love is There" by Bridge, has been purchased for national distribution on Roulette by Red Schwartz, VP of Product and Promotion.

There Are So Many Kids Waiting to Be Heard'

By JOHN KORNBLUM

NEW YORK—Charles Greene not only has the distinction of owning one record company, but has two to his credit. If this seems like rather a large task for a group of one you might be right; but don't take it up with Charles because he'll try to tell you about some of his projects and all of a sudden 10 labels won't be enough to incorporate everything.

But creativity must rate very high in Charles' head as the executive end of the business is only a part of his entire gig. There is production, A&R and just plain scouting around the field for new talent to sign. So the Los Angeles-based executive/producer hurls himself from coast to coast, lighting only long enough to take care of business at hand. Then he's gone again, this time to hibernate in the recording studio or trip out with Dr. John.

While in New York City recently, Charles did get a chance to visit Record World and we immediately took that opportunity to ask him what it's all about

"Hi, Charles."

"Hello."

"What's it all about?"

"What?"

"You know, your labels and groups and all."

"Of course. I knew what you meant. I was just putting you on. Well, where shall we begin, past, present or future?'

"How about history? It's always comforting to know how things got going."

At Start, Sonny and Cher

"Actually, I started with talent management a while back. At the beginning it was just Sonny and Cher. Soon after, Buffalo Springfield and the Iron

Butterfly were added and things began to get a bit hectic. So I started thinking about making records and not just groups. I still do a little management now, but it's exclusively Dr. John. I feel that it's too involved to try to work with more than one act at a time and get satisfying results. In this way I can direct all concentration at the one thing and make it all come out fine. Anyway, that's where it began. You can see we had a pretty solid foundation from which to build, even after Springfield split up.'

"It's more than just management with Dr. John, isn't it?"

"Oh yeah. Dr. John and I have been long-time friends. He's got to be one of the most beautiful cats ever to come along, not to mention one of the best musicians anywhere. He and I work together all the time and have become the best of personal friends. I, along with Tom Dowd, produced John's latest LP for Atlantic, 'Remedies'."

"Producing someone like Dr. John must be a little different from the usual session."

"It is and it isn't. I believe that everyone should be an individual and therefore set certain standards for themselves. This idea is carried through to my production work so that I end up setting my own pace, following my own technique, thereby making my own standards. So any session I work on is different from whatever you want to term 'normal.' I think the most important concept is to keep your head open to all and any ideas at all times. In other words, don't be afraid to experiment with anything. This attitude clears the air and prevents a barrier from forming between the producer and the artist. The role of the producer actually is to become part of the group as much as possible and create the right atmosphere and proper setting for the given circumstance."

"Ok. So what about Tiffany and Etcetera?"

Signing Acts for Both

"Yes. These are my two labels, Tiffany Records and Etcetera Records; the former distributed by Scepter, the latter by Atlantic. I'm in the process of signing acts for both labels and by now should have had our first single release on Tiffany called 'Moonshine' done by a group named Samson. You probably know about Brethren. NO? Well they're three dynamite cats getting it on a bit. Their sound is really great so we put together a beautiful LP on Tiffany, 'Brethren,' that's starting to take off out of sight. They played with Joe Cocker at the Capitol Theater, and everyone there really dug them. So I guess we're starting off on the right foot."

"Any hints on what plans you have brewing?"

"Here again there is nothing definite, nothing planned; the theme being anything. There are so many kids out there with phenomenal ability just waiting to be heard that you can't tell what will happen. I could plan something for tomorrow and discover somebody today that will change everthing around. The only thing I can say is be receptive and stay cool."





RCA's Ace Trucking Company – Just for Fun of It

NEW YORK—As ex-Pickle Brother Mike Mislove explains it, RCA's Ace Trucking Company first got together about a year ago to do improvisational exercises just for the fun of it and as a change-of-pace from other activities they were involved in. No intention of trying to make a collective go of it.

Well, manager Joe Lauer saw them, booked them on Johnny Carson's gabfest. They did it for a lark, and look at them now. Semi-regulars on the "Tom Jones Show" last season and perhaps even more this season, busy on Jones' current stateside tour, involved in a new Ernest Pintoff documentary, the cutters of one RCA album, cutely titled "The Ace Trucking Company," about to cut a second elpee. They will also play an undisclosed New York nitery sometime this summer so the locals can see them.

Four Aces showed at Record World last week to wing an interview—Patti Deutsch, Bill Saluga, George Terry, Mislove and Fred Willard, who was absent.

The foursome reported that almost everything they do comes out of improvisation, indeed, out of in-performance improvisation (rather than inrehearsal improv) and that only infrequently for TV appearances do they write anything down.

They also said that recording posed a few problems, because, as spokesman Mislove explained, when you're recording before an audience, the most important thing is "getting laughs, and we went for them any way we could—a lot

of visual jokes. As we got into the recording session, we began to relax, however, and most of the album came from the end of the session."

Working in Las Vegas recently had its ups and downs for the group. Although the reports from trade on-lookers were rapturous, the Company felt that their satirical thrusts had to be broadened for the regular clientele. For instance, Patti Deutsch had to drop her well-reviewed "That Switched-On Nixon Feeling" spoof of the current administration much to her dismay and that of Record World's Dave Finkle, who penned the song with Bill Weeden.

Saluga said, "We also found we had to keep putting in fresh lines to keep the orchestra laughing. Otherwise, they'd sit on stage looking uninterested and that doesn't help a comedy group."

Of course, with an improvisational group, the itch to improvise takes over sooner or later. So when the Record World photographer showed up, the Truckers got down to business and up against the wall. See funny picture.

A graduate of City College and the Yale University Law School, Lorber worked for several years with the law firm of Rosenman, Colin and Kaye.

Club Review

Jake Holmes Very, Very Good

NEW YORK — Polydor's Jake Holmes seemed to have only two speeds at his recent Bitter End appearance: his music was very, very sad or very, very whimsical but, in either case, it was always very, very.

The fact that Holmes has been absent from the personal appearance scene for most of the past two years was not at all obvious as Holmes went through a brilliantly polished set of his own tunes.

Compelling Sense of Humor

He has a compelling, nearly slapstick sense of humor as witnessed in the delightful spoof of a love lost, "Mary Alice Johnson" (the name has been changed to protect the innocent). On the other end of the scale was the bittersweet memory of "The Moving Day."

Always intense, with either humor or melancholy, Jake Holmes was impressive, too, on "I Live in a Suitcase Room," "How Are You," "Animal Farm" and others. Jake is delightful and shows great promise for the future.



In Praise of Conglomerate

NEW YORK-In the midst of the conglomorate controversy, Chris Stone, East Coast Director of the Record Plant, a division of Television Communications Corporation, spoke of the merits of an intelligently planned conglomorate merger.

"While you can't chose your parents," says Stone, "you can pick your conglomerate. Last year, when the Record Plant was in its infancy, we needed capital for expansion plans, which inclded a West Coast facility and an equipment manufacturing division. We shopped around very carefully for financing. Mergers and conglomorates were being arranged like blind dates and many of them ended up like 'paper marriages'.

"We joined forces with TVC because it made practical and

Songwriting Experience Helps Luvlin **Professional Manager Rothstein**

NEW YORK—"As a publisher, I see my songwriting experience as a great asset," said Bruce Rothstein, Professional Manager of Luvlin-Jamilin Music, Inc. Rothstein, formerly Professional Manager of Beechwood Music, Inc., was a songwriter on the streets of New York before he became a publisher.

"I spent two years running into walls trying to get my songs heard by publishers. Everybody was just too busy. Sitting on the other side of the desk has given me a great amount of empathy and a tremendous perspective on the writer's problems.

"At Luvlin, we have Buzzy Linhart, Bert Sommer, Jerry Merrick, Robert Lee, Artie Kornfeld and a group called Swamp Gas contributing to our catalog. All of these writers are prolific and are actively making the catalog expand. I see my responsibility to them as direction and contribution rather than control. I want everything I sign and believe in to be done with master quality in mind. At a minimum, our catalog will have an excellent dub, at maximum our record company Eleuthera will have a finished master of that tune. I think you have to work in terms of the master quality today, or, as a publisher, you're just limited."

Rothstein continued. writer-publisher team must be able to communicate and work together. Besides just enlarging our catalog, we want relevant creative material. What I do is supply the business knowledge and the direction so that the writer can concentrate on his writing and at the same time, be confident enough to know that I'm able to jam with him. This system works for the writers and the publisher's benefit."

"We are especially trying to keep the front door open to new writers," he concluded.

will be to draw the attention of youth to the problems facing the United Nations, to provide youth the opportunity of expressing itself on problems concerning peace and progress and to invite the young to indicate the ways in which they would wish to support the UN.

In his appeal for funds—it is estimated that \$733,000 is needed to finance the assembly - Secretary-General Thant said: "It is essential that a relationship of mutual confidence and cooperation be established between generations so that we can transmit the goals and ideals with which the United Nations was brought into being a quarter a century ago, primarily to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war, which, twice in our lifetime has brought untold sorrow to mankind."

Included on the committee, in addition to Racusin and Butler, the latter of whom personally has pledged a large sum toward covering the estimated

cost of the assembly, are the company members of "Hair" in New York, Los Angeles, Chicago, Seattle, Las Vegas, Toronto and Boston; George Yahraes, Promotion and Sales Director of the ABC-FM stations; Kip Cohen of Fillmores East and West; Miss Minnie Cushing; Mrs. Adela La Fora Holzer; James Verner, London "Hair" producer; and Bertrand Castelli.

Starting on June 4, "Hair" companies will kick off fundraising campaigns in eight North American cities as well as in London, Glasgow, Paris, Manchester, Sydney and in Germany, Scandinavia and Yugoslavia.

"And," he adds, "I was the only hillbilly pianist in town at the time."

However, it is likely that Jarvis will continue to produce Elvis Presley's sessions, as well as other artists on the label . . . Birthdaying: Tom T. Decca Brass Predicts Top C&W Campaign Ever

NEW YORK—Decca Records held meetings in Nashville last week to unveil plans for their annual June-July country product promotion, and Jack Loetz, Executive Vice President, Tony Martell, Vice President of Marketing and Creative Services as well as Mike Maitland, MCA Records President, were unified in their predictions that recorded country music has stronger sales potential than ever. The trio flatly predicted that "This year's campaign will undoubtedly be the most successful in Decca's history."

In his keynote speech Martell took the position that "no mechanical or non-mechanical plan for selling and promoting product can ever equal the enthusiasm put forth by men who whole-heartedly back the product they take into the field. And the enthusiasm of our field men has never been higher, which was most recently evidenced by the fact that our January, 1970 'Loretta Lynn Month' promotion a lone reached a record-breaking \$1.5 million in sales."

Jack Loetz told the assembled field representatives that last year's country promotion was the largest in the company's history. "Country sales in 1969 were 80% over those in 1968, and current sales figures indicate that in 1970 we are substantially ahead of 1969." His conclusion, which was emphatically endorsed by Mike Maitland, was that 1970 will undoubtedly be Decca's biggest year ever in the sale of country music.

To Expedite Product

To expedite the product presentation, Bill Levy, Director of Creative Services, together with Harold Komisar, Director of Sales, coordinated an elaborate audio-visual presentation keyed to the theme: "Decca-Land of the Country Giants." Following the presentation, it was announced that each of the six attending district sales managers would be given a copy of the audio-visual presentation to take with them after the convention so that they could hold "district conventions" with the men reporting to them. At each of the "district conventions," a representative of Decca's home office sales team will be present to elaborate on the program and answer any questions which may be posed by the local field men.

Another highlight of the convention was the timely announcement by Loetz that Decca will expand its country music sales and promotion staff in Nashville. Chic Doherty, formerly National Country Promotion Manager, was promoted to the newly-created position of National Country Sales Manager. Gene Kennedy has been moved up to the post formerly held by Doherty. Loetz noted: "Augmenting our Nashville merchandising force with such experienced record men constituted a further expression of our total support of country product. Their combined contributions will be implicit in the imaginative merchandising of product emanating from Nashville."

Kennedy joins Decca after five years as National Promotion Director for Hickory and TRX Records. He began in the business as a performer, and recorded for Old Town Records. Later he joined Bill "Hoss" Allen of radio station WLAC in Nashville in an independent production and promotion company which he ran for six years prior to joining Hickory.

In Phase One

Decca will release eight country albums in June and these will be issued simultaneously on 8-track cartridge and cassette tapes. Phase one of the release will be made up of LPs by Loretta Lynn, Conway Twitty, Bill Anderson, Jan Howard, Jimmie Davis, Webb Pierce, Warner Mack and the Osborne Brothers. The 10 albums for July will feature Kitty Wells, Ernest Tubb, Jack Greene, Jeannie Seely, Rex Allen, Peggy Sue, Bill Monroe, the Wilburn Brothers, Jimmy Newman and Jimmy Martin.

MCA Music Moves

The Nashville operation of MCA Music, headed by Jerry Crutchfield, has recently moved to new offices in the Capitol Building at 806 16th Ave., South, after being located in the Decca building since 1962.

This move came about as the result of expansion by both Decca Records and MCA Music. Crutchfield explains that with the additional space in the Capitol building, MCA Music can be more receptive to new people bringing in creative ideas, inasmuch as a "creative work-room" will be available to writers, thus resulting in a more direct communication between himself and the writers.

Has Set Open Door Policy

MCA Music has an open door policy and is in constant search for new material and new recorded product that is available to be leased. Recent success in the country charts include "A Girl Who'll Satisfy Her Man" by Barbara Fairchild, "My Love" by Sonny James, "A Woman's Hand" by Jean Shepherd, and a new record on Starday by J. David Sloan, "Sleep Woman Sleep."

Glaser Publications Unprecedented Award

"Gentle on My Mind," written by John Hartford, exclusive writer for Glaser Publications, Inc., received BMI's top award as the most performed song in their catalogue for the year 1968.

This was the first time in BMI's history that the same

song had won this award two years in a row. It was also awarded as the most performed country song for the year 1968. It has logged well over a million performances, and to date has received a total of six BMI awards.

As a climax to the convention, Martell presented Owen Bradley, Decca Vice President and Director of Country A&R, with a plaque that read "to the biggest country giant of them all—in appreciation." In accepting the award, Bradley noted that Decca was one of the pioneers on the country music field, beginning its successful operation in 1934 when David Kapp signed Jimmie Davis to a recording contract.




