

Legal Battle Rages Over New Lennon LP

■ NEW YORK—While John Lennon, EMI, Apple and Capitol Records have issued a public statement claiming that the TV-marketed "Roots" album is "unauthorized," the company currently offering the package, Adam VIII, has filed a multi-million dollar action with the Supreme Court of New York seeking damages from the above parties on several counts, as well as from Lennon attorney Harold Seider.


The Capitol statement takes the stand that the Adam VIII package "is being manufactured from tapes which have not been completed nor approved by John Lennon with regard to quality. The use of the recordings in this album and the use of Mr. Lennon's name and likeness have not been authorized. The only recordings approved by Mr. John Lennon for commercial release are contained in the album 'Rock 'N' Roll,' on the Apple label, distributed by Capitol Records and EMI."

Success of The Average White Band Keyed to Instrumental Soul Trend

■ NEW YORK — The Average White Band (Atlantic) has followed the lead of Mercury pop/ soul act Ohio Players (RW, Feb. 1) in capturing three number one slots in one week. The Atlantic group which becomes the first white act to top both The R&B Singles Chart and The R&B Album Chart while going all the way pop on The Singles Chart and up to a strong 3 on The Album Chart. Their Scottish backgrounds add further interest to their current success story, as does the hit single which propelled them to the top, the instrumental "Pick Up the Pieces."

"Pick Up the Pieces" began as an r&b single and from the start aided "The Average White Band" album in bulleting up both soul and pop charts. The group's current (and second) single from the package differs from their first in that it is instrumental,

although the band is predominantly a vocal/instrumental combo. Utilizing a philosophy which helped propel the Edgar Winter Group to number one slots (with "Frankenstein"), the Average White Band has reached the mass market from an initially black audience appeal.

While the Average White Band has made their mark by showcasing their instrumental prowess with only minor vocal augmentation, other instrumental acts of a soul and/or jazz orientation have been going the opposite route with increasing success. The Blackbyrds (Fantasy) have seen their "Flying Start" album jump to the 34 spot pop as fueled by their bulleted single "Walking in Rhythm," a more vocally-oriented cut than their past efforts. (The band members are students of Donald Byrd.)

Sire To Market Immediate Catalog

■ NEW YORK — Product from England's Immediate label will be released by Sire in the United States and Canada, following an exclusive agreement reached by Immediate's founder' Andrew Loog Oldham and Sire managing director Seymour Stein. The agreement covers the entire Immediate catalogue with all product being released on the Sire label.

Immediate made its debut in 1965. American promotion methods under the direction of Oldham's associate, Tony Calder, helped make Immediate an important factor in Britain's pop music scene. In addition to Oldham, producers for Immediate during the late '60s and early '70s included Mick Jagger and Keith Richard, Glyn Johns, Mike d'Abo, Steve Marriot and Ronnie Lane.

Perhaps the most important group to come out of the Immediate stable were the Small Faces, who combined writing and producing talents into British chart hits including "Itchycoo Park," "Tin Soldier" and "Lazy Sunday." Their albums "Ogden's Nut Gone Flakes" and "Autumn Stone" are highly sought after collectors' items to this day. The group eventually split into two units, Humble Pie and Faces, both of which had their initial success on Immediate. Immediate also recorded Rod Stewart's first hit solo recording, "Little Miss (Continued on page 25)

"My Eyes Adored You" has been on the singles charts for 16 weeks and "Good Times Rock & Roll" by Flash Cadillac and The Continental Kids made its first apearance in the top 100 four weeks ago. Additionally, three new singles, "Bumpin' Bus Stop" by Thunder & Lightning, "A Little Pain Ain't No Big Thing" by Sherri Jarrell and "Wait For Me (Busted Bad)" by the Addrissi Brothers are also generating in-

Next, he gives each record a maximum promotional effort and he stays with a promising hit until he brings it in.

Sales for the six months ended December 31, 1974 were \$15,142,148 with profits for the same period \$432, 171, up 38 percent and 62 percent, respectively, over the year before. Earnings per share for the six months rose from \$.08 to \$.13 (fully diluted).

McCartney Press Conference Held on New Orleans Riverboat

■ NEW ORLEANS — Paul Mc-Cartney, who has been in this Louisiana city since mid-January, took time out from current recording sessions to meet with local press and representatives of the national news media.

The site for the informal press reception was the New Orleans riverboat Voyageur, and by the time the McCartneys arrived at the dock, more than 100 members of the press had arrived.

The press reception, designed to be more an informal gathering, turned into a fun jaunt along the Mississippi on a 50 year-old riverboat which is one of the few capable of making the trip through the Bayou country.

Paul, Linda and Wings

Paul and Linda McCartney, as well as their group, Wings (comprised of Denny Laine, Jimmy McCulloch and Joe English, who has been doing the session drumming during the band's stay in New Orleans) were greeted on the dock by the Tuxedo Jazz Band.

Press representatives questioned the McCartneys on a broad range of topics concerning present sessions in the studio and future tour plans, among other things.

McCartney, when asked about his new album, expressed hope that it would be ready for release by mid-April. "We've been working 10 hours a day on it," he said, "and everything has been going splendidly."

The album, which is being recorded at Allen Touissaint and

Marshall Seahorn's Sea-Saint Studios, has no title yet. It will feature several New Orleans touches. One is expected to be on a song called "My Carnival," which Wings was in the process of recording the morning of the press party.

New Album

The new album, which Capitol will release, will consist of rock, ballads and some "good old McCartney and Wings music." McCartney said he plans on taking Wings on tour around the U.S. sometime in the not too distant future, but no specific dates, cities or venues were discussed.

Tony Dorsey has been in the studio with Paul and Wings handling some of the arranging chores.

When the press disembarked, the boat was taken over by celebrities from New Orleans, musicians and friends of the studio where a five hour party—boatride to the Louisiana Bayou took place. Two bands, the Meters and Chocolate Milk provided nonstop entertainment for the party goers.

Floating Notables

Some of the names from the music business who were aboard included Allen Touissaint, Lee Dorsey, Ernie K-Doe, Clarence "Frogman" Henry, Earl King and Willie West.

Partygoers were treated to an impromptu series of jams including a rollicking finale featuringing Paul McCartney, the Meters and some of the musical celebrities on hand.

Creative World Emerges With Jazz Product

■ LOS ÁNGELES—Having begun as a mail-order label featuring the product of one artist, Creative World Records, formed by Stan Kenton in 1970, has grown to become a full-time independent with a catalogue listing over 75 titles. The success of the company, previously somewhat unheralded in the industry, was underscored recently Creative World's artists and product were the recipients of three Grammy nominations, including a Hall of Fame nomination for Stan Kenton.

The mail order operation grew out of Kenton's constant touring with his 19 piece band; at each gig, names of interested members of the audience were placed on a mailing list that now includes over 107,000 big-band jazz afficionados. Beginning with a few titles, the catalogue gradually expanded to include Kenton's earlier Capitol recordings, such artists as Charlie Barnet, John Van Ohlen and Les Hooper; the latter artist accounts for two of Creative World's 1975 Grammy nominations.

In addition to Kenton, who remains the firm's principal, the company is staffed by sales and promotion man Ray Lawrence, general manager and director of a&r Bob Curnow and production man Bill Stillfield. The label plans for additional expansion this year, and Curnow reports that he is "very interested in acquiring new talent in all musical areas, and especially those artists who would prefer working in a small-company atmosphere."

■ NEW YORK — Screen Gems-Columbia Music/Colgems Music has acquired exclusive United States and Canadian publishing rights for the music on George Harrison's new Dark Horse record label by arrangement with Ganga Music Publishing Company, announced Lester Sill, president of the music division of Columbia Pictures Industries, Inc. The rights include all material, exclusive of songs written by Harrison.

The deal was negotiated by Irwin Robinson, vice president and general manager of Columbia's music division, and David Braun and Michael Pearlstein of Hardee, Barovich, Konecky & Braun, Harrison's attorneys.

Dark Horse releases include "Shankar Family & Friends," featuring Ravi Shankar and George Harrison, and the United States debut of the British duo "Splinter," made up of Bobby Purvis and Bill Elliott and augmented by Harrison, Billy Preston, Alvin Lee and Mike Kelly. Both albums were produced by Harrison. Dark Horse Records is distributed by A&M.

Lyrics like: "You've got 19 inches baby/And that's a real good size." Or how about: "I could twist your knobs right off and fool around with you/I don't need no TV Guide to tell me what to do." Now those lyrics are obviously about a television, right? And the song is almost just as obviously a hit, which is why RCA is ex-

pected to unleash it on the world come the first week in March . . . Flo & Eddie currently negotiating with a major network for their very own TV variety show. And, on the strength of their phenomenally well-received tour with the re-formed Turtles, will head into the studio in March to begin work on their first lp for Columbia . . . A quiet visitor to our city was James Taylor, who sneaked in to lay down some tracks at Amigo. He's being produced by Lenny Waronker and Russ Titelman, with musical guests including the like of Russ Kunkel, Lee Sklar, Danny Kootch, Andy Newmark and Willy Weeks.

THERE'S NO BUSINESS LIKE BIG BUSINESS: Rumor has it that Elton John was recently the proud recepient of the largest royalty check ever issued, the figure supposedly running well into the millions . . . In rumors elsewhere, we're told that Led Zeppelin arrived at an airport not long ago to find that all the airport limos were in use. Manager Peter Grant's solution? He bought six of 'em on the spot. It might not be true, but it's good rock mythology . . . "Young Americans" is the title of David Bowie's album due March 18. It would've been here a tad sooner, had Bowie not decided at the last minute to record four new tracks with the assistance of John Lennon, among them a Bowie/Lennon song called "Fame," and a version of "Across the Universe." Bumped to make room for the new material were Bowie treatments of two Bruce Springsteen songs . . . The Hollies, however, are set to release a Springsteen song, "Sandy," as their next single. According to Marty Cerf (who knows about such things), it's the band's best ever . . . Hasn't Bob Krasnow's car been spotted in a certain Burbank parking lot suspiciously often of late? . . . It's ironic to note that "Peggy Sue," the old **Buddy Holly** number that **John Lennon** does on his "Rock 'n' Roll" album, is credited as being published by McCartney Music. It appears that somewhere along the line Paulie secured rights to the Holly catalogue . . . Jackson Browne has scored one of this city's very finest bassists, Dennis Kovarik, for his touring band. Together with fellow Detroiter Larry Zack they constitute a rhythm section that producer Bill Szymczyk has dubbed the "Hamtrack Hammer" ... Sure bet for a lot of big noise is a new band called Buck, featuring ex-Wings drummer Denny Siewell, ex-Spooky Tooth bassist (and Jimi Hendrix discovery) Chrissy Stewart, ex-Steppenwolf guitarist Michael Monarch and dynamic ex-Silverhead vocalist Michael Des Barres. Other film work includes songs written with John Barry for "Thunderball," "You Only Live Twice," "The Knack" and the theme for "The Ipcress File," and title songs for such films as "Two For The Road," "In Like Flint" and "How To Steal A Million," which were written with such film composers as Henry Mancini, Jerry Goldsmith and Johnny Williams.

Georgia Legislature Passes Piracy Bill

■ ATLANTA, GA. — The Georgia Senate has passed an antipiracy law by a vote of 52 to 0. The statute makes it a felony for any person or corporation to possess, sell, distribute or circulate any sounds recorded on phonograph record disc, wire, tape or film, without the consent of the person who owns the master or article from which the sound is derived. The Georgia House passed the legislation recently by a vote of 174 to 0.


The penalty for a person or corporation found guilty of pirating, for the first offense, is either a fine of \$25,000 or one year in prison, or both. The penalty for a subsequent offense carries a fine of \$100,00 and/or up to three years in prison.

The antipiracy bill will go before Governor Busbee on February 27 to be signed into law.

Passport, Billingsgate Pact for Distribution

■ CHICAGO — Passport Records will distribute product from the Chicago-based Billingsgate label as the result of an agreement reached between Passport chairman Seymour Stein and Billingsgate president Gary Pollack. Records will be released on the Passport label with split logo identification for Billingsgate. Passport is currently rushing release of its first product under the new agreement, Lucifer's Friend's third American album, "Where The Groupies Killed The Blues." Other acts featured on the label include Epitaph and Neu, all from Germany, and the Belgian band Pazop.

With regard to the agreement Pollack said, "When it became apparent that we could not continue through independent distribution, many of the larger companies offered us their marketing services. Through our stores in Chicago, we had had a long and close relationship with Passport president Marty Scott, and his JEM import operation. He and everyone at Passport are totally knowledgeable as to what is going on musically in Europe. Giving up our independence was hard enough, but we could not tolerate being with a company that might not understand our product and ideas. For that reason we chose Passport."







Roy Clark: The Entertainer

■ As a descriptive phrase, "The Entertainer" may well have been used about more show business personalities than any other. But rarely if ever has it been applied with more justice than to Roy Clark. A consistent hitmaker for ABC/Dot Records, Clark currently

ing artist is only one facet of the man's career. He is also a superb instrumentalist, playing everything from banjo to fiddle to classical, steel and 12-string guitar; a seemingly tireless live performer, on the road an average of 300 days a year; a naturally gifted comedian, and a respected businessman, who coowns a Tulsa, Oklahoma, radio station as well as numerous real estate holdings. On top of everything else, he is a nationwide television star, reaching some 37 million viewers weekly as co-host of the syndicated "Hee Haw."

That the Country and Western Music Association, the Academy of Country Music and the American Guild of Variety Artists each presented Clark with its Country Entertainer of the Year Award last year should come as no surprise-nor that, the week before last, he received his own star on Hollywood's Walk of Fame, climaxing ABC/Dot's designation of February as "Roy Clark Month."

"A Pair of Fives," Clark's most recent ABC/Dot album, features a series of banjo duets with his sideman Buck Trent, and in a way, it brings his career full circle, for it was as a banjo player that he first set upon the path to musical stardom. He was 14 then, living in Meherrin, Virginia, near Washington, D.C., and under his father Hester's tutelage he soon grew accomplished enough to win the nation's Country Music Banjo Championship two years running. Part of the prize the second year was a special guest appearance

has two albums on Record World's country chart, "Classic Clark" and "Roy Clark Family and Friends." But Clark's success as a recordat the Grand Ole Opry, and Clark was on his way.

As soon as he was old enough. the young banjo player began playing clubs in the Washington-Baltimore area, all the while polishing his skills on a variety of instruments and as a humorist. It was the latter talent that led to his first television job as a regular on a local show, "The Hayloft Conservatory of Musical Interpretation," and that job in turn led to another as a comedian and instrumentalist with George Hamilton IV. Subsequently he worked with Wanda Jackson and then with Hank Thompson, first as a sideman, then as a featured singer.

First Hit

Before 1964, Clark had made a few records for small labels, some of which got airplay, but it was in that year that he recorded his first nationwide hit, "The Tips of My Fingers." The success of that single and of a string of others after he signed with Dot enabled him to move once more into television, where he spent three years on the Jimmy Dean show, co-hosted his own program, "Swinging Country," and

made numerous guest appearances. (Aficianados of "The Beverly Hillbillies" will remem-ber him as the Hillbillies' Cousin Roy and as Roy's mother, Big Mama Halsey.) Then in 1969 CBS tapped him for the original network version of "Hee Haw."
In the past few years, Clark

has been solidifying his reputation with middle-of-the-road as well as with country audiences. Equally at home with romantic ballads and humorous ditties, he was one of the first country artists to appear in Las Vegas, where he holds a multi-year contract with the Hughes Hotel chain, and he will next play Vegas when he opens a threeweek engagement at the Frontier March 3. And in yet another addition to his career, he will become a published author in the fall, when Price/Stern/Sloan is scheduled to bring out his "Roy Clark Stuff Yourself Diet Book."

What the coming years may hold for Clark is anybody's guess. Movies perhaps, certainly more recording success. Says Clark himself, "I don't know what the future will bring. There may be another door that opens up for me, and I want to be ready for it. It's always been the attraction of the unknown."



Peter Asher: The Power of Good Music

By DAVID McGEE

■ Entering his eleventh year in the music business, Peter Asher can already look back on a manyfaceted career as a rock and roll star (as one-half of Peter and Gordon), as Apple Records' first a&r director and as manager and producer for James Taylor and Linda Ronstadt. Had he produced only the albums "Sweet Baby James" and "Heart Like A Wheel," he would indeed cast a long shadow in the business. Obviously Asher has done much more; his reputation deservedly rests on an entire decade of productivity. In the following Dialogue, Asher discusses his career and the two artists under his management.



Peter Asher

Record World: After seeing Linda Ronstadt in concert at Avery Fisher Hall a few weeks ago, it seems apparent that she is a much better performer than she was one year ago. How do you account for her

Peter Asher: It's everything actually. There've been some changes in the band since then and it's better; she's singing better—who knows why?-and she's in an altogether better frame of mind. Plus, of course, success of its own is stimulating. The fact that you're there as a headliner and playing Philharmonic Hall and it's sold out and the people like you makes it easier to be good, because you have a head start; you're feeling good before you go on, because of the nature of what's happening.

RW: How long have you been associated with Linda?

Asher: I was trying to remember; it's probably longer than it seems. I probably started managing her a couple of years ago. I've known Linda a long time. She's been a good friend of mine and my wife's for numerous years and we actually had talked about management some considerable time ago, at which time we'd both decided it wasn't a good idea. At that time I was managing Kate Taylor, who was just starting out, and I thought that it would be difficult to manage Linda and to manage Kate because to a certain extent they were aiming for the same people and the same songs. I was already committed to Kate, in whom I believed very strongly, but as it happened she retired after a promising beginning. So it was no longer a relevant considera-

Then after Linda had been through various other changes, much more recently, she reapproached me and asked me if I would be interested and I definitely was.

Producing her was an entirely separate consideration. We were trying to decide who to get to produce the album and initially I had doubts about doing it myself, only on the grounds of whether I was the right person to do it. When you're a manager trying to decide on a producer, it's hard deciding about yourself. I didn't know very much about country music and I still don't. But in the end, there were various other people we considered who nearly did it or who couldn't do it or who couldn't do it at that time. So we decided to do it together.

RW: Once you became Linda's manager, did you have any specific aims in mind for her? Were there any specific things you wanted her to do as an artist?

Asher: No, not really. Thinking in those terms overemphasizes the Svengali aspects of managing, which really are hardly true. If I had to lay out what I wanted for Linda, they would all be truisms; what I wanted to do was help her make as good a record as I knew she could make and had not yet made, and help her achieve the kind of success that she should because she already had a lot of people who liked her. She had fans everywhere, but she had never broken through to a broader number of people. So essentially if I had to say what the aims were, they were just to organize things so that hopefully

she played to the right kind of audiences in the right kind of halls; to be sure she didn't do tours that were so long they were debilitating; to be sure she didn't play with the wrong acts.

RW: Was there any sense of urgency on your part or on Linda's part that "Heart Like A Wheel" had to be the album that made it? In the industry we hear rumblings of this sort, that "She's got to do it this time."

Asher: People say things like that. I actually don't think that's ever quite true if someone is really good. There are all kinds of people who are good but haven't made the right record yet. Someone like Terry Reid, who I haven't heard of lately, is one who comes to mind. People have often said that about his albums-"This has got to be it"-and it's never been it yet. But it still could be. I believe very strongly in the power of good music to come through in the end, no matter what. It's true of anyone; there are very few people whose careers cannot be saved by making some exceptional music.

We felt the pressure, of course. But "Don't Cry Now" had done very well, that album sold almost 400,000; it'll be gold any minute. But it was a semi-stardom thing. So if this album had been the same as that, it certainly would not have been the end of the world.

RW: You also manage James Taylor. What is he doing now? Asher: He's about to start making an album with Lenny Waronker and Russ Titleman.

RW: Why are you no longer producing him?

Asher: Because we decided that it would be good to change. He'd never worked with a producer other than me at any point. So after the last one we did together, which was the one we probably like the least out of the ones we've done—the "One Man Dog" album—he thought and I agreed that it might be a good idea to try someone else, just to get a change of mood. And that's why he did the last one with David Spinozza, which was a qualified success. It was a good album and there's a lot on it I like, but there're some things . . . well, that's true of any album, you look back on it and see things that you'd do differently. But I think this next one will be extremely good because Lenny is an exceptionally good producer and a nice person and God knows his track record at the moment is unequaled.

RW: What's the difference between working with an artist like Linda, who is not a writer and relies on other people for her material, and somebody like James who can come into a studio with several songs all ready to go.


Asher: The difference is—it sounds silly—but the only difference is that you have to go through a song-choosing process in advance. Of course, sometimes that's true of people who write their own songs because they write lots. When I did an album with John Stewart some time ago, it was a case like that. He writes a lot of songs and it was the same as with Linda, in the sense that we had a list and we chopped it down again and tried it this way and tried it that way. James has never had spare songs.

RW: He's never been a prolific writer.

Asher: No. Mainly because he has a kind of automatic reject process that works. He's never written a bad song in my opinion, and I'm prejudiced of course, being a big James Taylor fan. But I really believe it. There are some people that write a lot, but there are some songs that they've written that you can just forget about. They're not major contributions at all. Whereas when James comes up with a bad song, it never sees the light of day; it gets aborted at some early stage, so that every song he finishes is, I think, an exceptional song. So, the difference is, in working with James, you'd sit down with his songs and the only discussions would be as to how we were going to do them and what the approach would be to each. Whereas with Linda, there's a preliminary meeting to choose from the songs available before you talk about arrangements.

"The Jerry Herman Songbook," subtitled "Tune the Grand Up," contains the best-known numbers from the composer's roster of Broadway musicals: "Hello, Dolly," "Mame," "Milk and Honey," "Mack and Mabel," "Dear World" and "Parade."

Sepia Paper

Printed sepia-textured on paper, the folio features a section on Herman, a picture gallery of "legendary ladies" who have starred in his musicals on Broadway and on tour, and a foreword by producer David Merrick. In addition, there are photos depicting highlights from the various shows and behind-thescenes stage and recording activities.

Lower Singles Price Called for by Fioto

■ NEW YORK—Fred Fioto, president of Delite Records, has called for a rollback of the price of single records to below the one dollar figure at which they are now being retailed.

According to Fioto, "Record executives have deliberately turned a deaf ear to retailers all over the country who have found that while the price increases on albums have been generally accepted, the approximately 20 percent increases in the price of singles is hurting their business. The lower unit sales reported on even hit singles in the last quarter of 1974 and so far in 1975 are a reflection of just that fact coming home to roost.'

Seeks Major Support

Fioto, whose De-Lite label has been scoring on the singles front with a string of hits by Kool & the Gang, indicated that the price drop, to be effective, must be initiated by the major companies.

■ News & Notes: Bataan's Salsoul Records has been picked up for distribution by Epic, so his current single, "The Bottle (La Botella)," and the "Afrofilipino" album on which it appears, will soon be more widely available on an Epic/Salsoul label, already being shipped . . . Cotton Records (distributed by Arista) has pressed a 4-minute version of Dooley Silverspoon's ecstatic "Bump Me Baby" on a speciallydesigned disco DJ label marked "prepared for Discos only" and also

shipping immediately.

Titanic, the French rock group which has had considerable success on the discotheque level, is showing up in a number of stores on a Canadian import album titled "Macumba!" (Columbia Canada) which includes "Rain 2000," "Sultana" and the title cut-all in versions longer than their previous American single releases. "Sultana," in particular, is a classic disco instrumental and is in itself worth any trouble you may have locating the album . . . Producer Norman Harris (for W.M.O.T. Productions) is working with Blue Magic on a long re-make of Ultra High Frequency's great "We're on the Right Track" for inclusion on their next Atlantic album, tentatively titled "13 Blue Magic Lane." Harris produced the original UHF single (on Wand) with Stan Watson.

The Broaddus brothers can always be depended on for an out-ofthe-ordinary (if not off-the-wall) list, and James, known at New York's Liquid Smoke as "Tank," reports cuts by Grand Funk, Loggins & Messina and the Doobie Brothers this week along with the more familiar disco fare. The most interesting of his unexpected selections, however, is Honk's "Hesitation" (Epic), a light, attractive song which doesn't quite sustain its fine instrumental opening but comes through nicely nevertheless. The song, which has a kind of Average White Band feeling, is available on a single but "Tank" prefers its album length (4:05) for the saxophone solo toward the end. Three major FM stations in the city (WABX, CJOM and WWWW) announced the give-away saying that all the members of Lynyrd Skynyrd at some time in their past had all been unemployed and wished to make it possible for those currently out-of-work to go to a rock concert. Those interested were asked to come to the Ford Auditorium box office an hour before the concert began where the 300 tickets were distributed to the orderly and good-natured

■ Perhaps the next area of station promotion involvement will be in the bluegrass festival field. Several stations are talking of looking into costs, space requirements, availability of acts and someone to tell them how to do it. The bluegrass festival phenomenon has grown to huge proportions within the last few years and there seems to be no slacking in sight. In a recent conversation with Jim McReynolds, he brought to light a few points you might need to consider: it takes 50 or more acres, preferably wooded; trailer hook-ups are not too important since the devotees are pretty well willing to "rough it;" distance from the neighboring largest city is of great concern as long as there are fairly good roads and the location is well marked and promoted. Bill Monroe has a talent agency for Bluegrass acts and would be as good a bet as any to get whatever information you need—might as well talk to the boss.

Live Radio Concerts:

Exposing Talent and Building Images

By IRA MAYER

■ NEW YORK — "In this economy, with mid-range acts not drawing, the live radio concert is an important medium for exposing talent," says Gil Colquitt, music director of WLIR-FM in Hempstead, Long Island. And although only certain stations around the country have facilities available and access to talent for such broadcasts, the concept, spurred by the popularity of such nationally syndicated radio concert shows as the King Biscuit Flower Hour and the BBC Live From London Concerts, is definitely gaining momentum.

With WLIR and KSAN-FM in San Francisco both in their fourth year of weekly live:concerts, Colquitt and KSAN operations director Bonnie Simmons share certain observations on the development of their respective series. On the technical side, both stations use professional recording studios as the base of operations (Ultra Sonic Studios for WLIR, Pacific High Recording at first and currently Record Plant in Sausalito for KSAN), occasionally taping the concerts when schedules necessitate it. Both maintain tape libraries of their concerts, and when groups approve, cull a track or two for regular airplay. The two also sometimes trade out concerts with other stationsbut only when sound quality is up to their own standards and when the group in question would not otherwise be available to them.

Artists Presented

The list of artists WLIR and KSAN have presented is impressive, ranging from the likes of Seals and Crofts and Jackson Browne at the former to the Grateful Dead and Linda Ronstadt at the latter. Yet in almost all cases such acts made their radio concert appearances prior to their emergence as nationally recognized talents. The radio concerts, the stations feel, help contribute to the build-up of a local following for artists whose names might be known but whose work might not be all that familiar.

Some stations, such as WMMS-FM in Cleveland, have different arrangements whereby the concerts are independently (but cooperatively) produced for the station — by Agency Recording Studios, a facility coincidentally

located on the second floor of the Agora club there. WMMS is also the only station contacted which said that the concert series is a good money maker for the station. (WLIR says it is a loss-incurring venture and KSAN says that remote casts from other than the Record Plant must be advertiser-supported, but that some concerts in the regular series do go on unsponsored.)

Basic Fears

The two basic fears on the part of record companies and/or local clubs as regards the live broadcast of concerts and shows are bootlegging and the possible loss in gate receipts, both of which have (Continued on page 34)

Country Radio Seminar Continues Promo Ban

■ NASHVILLE — The Country Radio Seminar has again adopted a strict program banning individual promotion activities through this year's event. The Seminar, scheduled for March 14-15 at Nashville's Airport Hilton Hotel, has maintained this policy since its inception in 1969.

The policy includes the banning of promotional displays, handouts and any activities involving the marketing of a specific product such as a particular record or record company, radio station or broadcasting firm.

John Brown, chairman of the 1975 Country Radio Seminar, stating the purpose of the ruling said, "The Seminar is singular in its purpose; that of giving country radio a forum for professional broadcasting concepts. Ric Libby, and the members of the Agenda Committee have planned a full schedule, and we have no time or purpose in pursuing individual promotion activities. The country music industry has provided several major events throughout the year that can be used for promotion purposes, therefore this program should remain free of personal sales pitches."

Registration for the Country Radio Seminar has been established at \$60 per person affiliated with broadcasting and \$75 per person with other industry affiliations. The registration cost includes entrance to the seminar, and one ticket to the "new faces show" to be held on Saturday evening, March 15. The seminar has outlined plans for a maximum of 500 registrants.

Hot Chocolate (Big Tree). Continued positive action on this tasty tune. New airplay on CKLW and WFIL. Some very decent jumps on recently acquired stations include 37-25 WCOL, 37-30 WIXY, HB-27 WHBQ and 28-22 WLS. Also, 14-11 13Q, 23-17 WOKY, pick-35 KIMN, 29-25 WDGY, 28-26 WIBG and extra-28 KJR.

Phoebe Snow (Shelter). In a veritable blizzard of positive action, this first single success continues snowballing into what looks like a top 5 record. New ads include KHJ, WSAI (30), WFIL and WNOE. Movement as follows: 16-12 KFRC, 27-18 WRKO, 18-11 WHBQ, 23-17 KDWB, 14-9 WCOL, 27-16 WIXY, HB-27 WIBG, 11-9 WDGY, 30-26 WMAK and 25-20 WTIX.

Rufus (ABC). "Once you get started" — it's off and flying! Looks like no one is stopping this one. R&B action — it goes without saying — is super. New pop heavies this week include WTIX, WCFL, WIXY, KJR and WCOL. Also on are KlOO, WNOE, WLPL, WQXI and WFOM.

NEW ACTION

Ozark Mountain Daredevils (A&M) "Jackie Blue." Supported by a host of key secondary stations, this disc adds some majors to the picture, giving it ballpark proportions. Going with the record are KDWB (21) and WDGY (30); secondaries are WCOL extra-38, KJRB extra-29, WLPL 25-22, WBBQ 30-24, KEEL 23-19 and KTLK 40-32.

The Country Music Seminar is looking like a bigger winner than ever. Many radio folk have indicated they'll be going this year for the first time and there are dozens of three timers heading back for number four.

The recent statement from the Nashville Record Promoters Association about the united front in a refusal to provide "major" or "superstar" acts for station-promoted free shows was an interesting bit of flack. And it'll be even more interesting to see who will be first to break ranks. This rumble of discontent among the promo men has been going on for years in all fields, but the use of the show promoters as an excuse to not provide talent is a fresh approach.

The reaction of most stations I've talked to is one of quiet rage; some don't care, some say they'll just ease up on those artists they are specifically turned down on, and one says it sounds like collusion and ought to be investigated by the Federalistas. Those stations who ask for major acts are usually in major markets and provide a tremendous amount of exposure for the acts. A couple of the record people say, to me anyway, not so, they've just got their hand out and it does the act no good at all; and besides that, they say, it's a form of payola. I guess only time will tell what the outcome will be. The consensus among stations I've spoken with is if the record people won't cooperate, we'll go directly to the managers of the acts and seek help there. Three stations indicate they will bring it up at the seminar.

not been difficulties for these stations, or for Denver's KBPI-FM which broadcasts regularly from Ebbett's Field (a club). Colquitt, Ms. Simmons, WMMS' John Gorman and KBPI's Frank Felix have kept their eyes open in local record and head shops and all insist that bootlegging has been almost non-existent. All also report that follow-up store reports indicate increased sales in most cases for artists who have made broadcast appearances.

Heavy stress is placed on the importance of local identification with these concert programs and while expenses can be prohibitive if facilities are not readily avail-

able (cost of phone lines, for example), the listener response has been such as to warrant continued experimentation—with remote feeds (WLIR from Nassau Coliseum, KSAN from Winterland and WMMS from the Swinging Dog Saloon, a jazz club, for example) and with replays and "best of" compilations.

New Talent

As a method of exposing and building new talent, and as a programming tool to be used for its musical content and for its image building (for the station and the locale), live radio concerts are becoming increasingly

significant.

NEW YORK—Charles Fox has just finished scoring the Universal film "The Other Side of the Mountain." Norman Gimbel has written the lyrics for the film's title song, called "Richard's Window," and sung on the soundtrack by Olivia Newton-John. The picture is the true life story of skier Jill Kinmont. It is directed by Larry Peerce and produced by Ed Feldman.

Similarly, vocal augmentation on new product from instrumentalists Bobbi Humphrey (Blue Note), Ramsey Lewis (Columbia, with two cuts on his "Sun Goddess" album featuring Earth, Wind & Fire) and Jimmy Castor (Atlantic) have helped each act to renewed chart heights.

Pure Instrumentals

With the exception of Yes, all of the currently charted-and-rising heavily instrumental acts are r&b and/or jazz-based. The pure instrumental variety includes George Duke (BASF), George Benson (CTI), Stanley Clarke (Nemperor), Gene Page (Atlantic) and Love Unlimited Orchestra (20th Century), while B. T. Express (Roadshow) is doing well with an instrumental, "Express." One of the hottest instrumental attractions of the past year, Return to Forever Featuring Chick Corea (Polydor) has just released "No Mystery," hot on the heels of their most successful album to date, "Where Have I Known You Before."

The fact that the success of black music has grown to include widespread pop appeal for its instrumental as well as vocal forms has seemingly opened the door for an act like The Average White Band to score big with both black and white audiences.

Damone Delights Rainbow Grill

■ NEW YORK — Kicking off the debut under new management of the Rainbow Grill atop the RCA building here, Vic Damone (13) drew one of the largest crowds in that room's recent history in the nightclub entertainment field. And Damone did not let the patrons down. He was every bit the suave, cool and casual singer/performer remembered from yesteryear—this being his first nightclub appearance in this city in eight years.

Damone started his set slowly, building to high peaks with sensitive deliveries on such selections as "I Can't Stop Loving You," "Sunshine of My Life," "The Way We Were" and an especially moving medley in tribute to the late Duke Ellington.

The new music policy at the Rainbow Grill, booked by Stan Seidenberg, will seek to raise the entertainment level to standard nightclub artists, with the next attraction set to be Lana Cantrell. Also, recorded music between shows has been replaced by the Monty Jay Orchestra.

Damone was accompanied by the Joe Parnelli Orchestra, featuring the leader's keyboard work and strong brass and rhythm sections. The dual returns—of Damone and the Rainbow Grill—are welcome re-additions to the New York night scene. **REA**

Butts Band, Clinton Spark the Starwood

LOS ANGELES—Once in a blue moon, somewhere on the bottom of the bill you run into an act that combines incredible flashenergy with good musical values in a manner that earmarks them, with near-certainty, for future headliner status. The George Clinton Band (ABC) is such a group, and their recent L.A. debut at the Starwood conveyed enough excitement to make them an instant odds-on favorite in the pop-rock music derby.

Their assets are numerous, but primary among them is the control and range of Clinton's voice, as well as a flexibility that enabled him to adapt it to a variety of pop and r&b song types. His style is well developed and revolves around the big-band, funky music provided by his excellent instrumental backing; accompaniment included a 5-piece brass section, a tight rhythm section including congas, and a pair of well-chosen ladies-Susan Morse and Phyllis Brown-on back-up vocals. Clinton himself fingered piano and synthesizer.

Although Clinton's stage performance seemed rife with gestures and movements reminiscent of early Elton John, there was a certain ingenuous quality that gave the act a degree of originality and flair. Most impressive of the songs performed — all of which were written by Clinton—was their new ABC Records single, "Hold On To Your Lady."

Headlining the show was the newly spruced-up Butts Band (Blue Thumb) who have benefitted immeasurably from the addition of a Ms. Alex Richland on keyboards and vocals. With the exception of the ex-Doors guitarist Robbie Krieger and drummer John Densmore, all member of the band are newcomers and the sound that they presented at the Starwood was considerably tighter, more polished and more interesting than that that was characteristic of their previous outings.

Island Music Shifts Conway to West Coast

■ LONDON — Island Music U.K. managing director Lionel Conway is transferring to the company's U.S. west coast office. Conway has appointed Allan Rider, formerly with Almo-Irving Associates, and Frank Loesser, as professional manager for the Island Music group which has two companies — Ackee (ASCAP) and UFO (BMI). Martin Humphrey, a director of the company, and Peter Cornish, administration chief, will now run the U.K. company.

It's almost disconcerting, because on the strength of "Heart Like A Wheel" being a hit, everyone ranging from some really exciting great people that I'm calling—like Neil Young and Lowell George—and asking for songs, are saying yes. Ranging from that at one extreme to the other extreme with publishers who call up and say "We've got 20 great songs for Linda" and I'm obliged to say "Listen, why don't you choose the best two and send them to me" because we've got hundreds already. As soon as I get back to Los Angeles this time I have to start sifting and I'll do a kind of basic sift because this one is literally a matter of hundreds. Then I'll work with Linda in choosing the actual songs.

RW: Linda is an artist of whom most critics and fans say very little bad. But James Taylor started out with great press, was hailed a new superstar and then everyone became disenchanted with him.

Asher: Oh, it'll happen to Linda too. People love you when you're on your way up, because people think they've discovered you. The same thing happened to Carole King. When people are finding out about you, they're saying how great you are and telling everyone to go see you. In that sense what's happening to Linda now is the best time because everyone's going "Oh Linda's new album is great." Now the next album, there will be a number of reviews that will say "Well, it's good but it's not quite as good as . . ." because they always do, and maybe they're right. I'm not saying critics are right or wrong, but inevitably people judge you against the best you've ever done. So on a very obvious level, when you achieve extreme success like James did, inevitably following that there has to be a period when people say "Oh well, maybe he wasn't that great." Because it's the way the press and the media work. If they decide someone's good or very good, they instantly make them into the all-time genius. You can only be on the cover of Time magazine once. But the penalty you pay for extreme success is that it cannot be lived up to by definition. You can never beat being number one.

RW: What about the emotional penalty? What did James go through when that happened to him?

Asher: Not a great deal. He has a certain faith in his music. He knows he's good, not in a conceited sense, but in a self-assured sense. He worries about it, of course, as does everyone. There isn't an artist who doesn't worry about bad reviews, chart positions and losing their bullets and all those things. As long as you know you're good, it's okay. The biggest question is how good is the music you make, because it all comes down to music.

RW: If you don't mind, let's go back a little bit in your career. After we heard no more from Peter and Gordon, you, a few years later, suddenly appeared in the pages of different publications as a manager and producer. How did the transition come about?


Asher: First of all, I had produced the last few records that Gordon and I made. They were not the hits—John Burgess produced most of the hit records—but towards the end of our recording career I'd started doing a lot in the recording studio and I found that I enjoyed working with musicians and with the sound of records. So I'd started doing that and the first person to ever actually ask me to produce was Paul Jones, who used to be the lead singer with Manfred Mann. When he had a solo career I made a couple of singles with him, one of which achieved some little success and the other achieved none. But I enjoyed doing them and I learned a lot by doing them. That was the first thing I produced, pre-Apple, at EMI.

Following that, the whole Apple idea was being formulated and Paul McCartney and I were close friends at the time. Lately I see him only rarely because we live far apart, but I was in on the whole conception of Apple. Paul had heard some of the things I'd done with Paul Jones. In fact, he played drums on one of them, a single we made of a Bee Gees song called "And The Sun Will Shine" and that was the one that did achieve some success in England. I must say I assembled this rhythm section of which I was quite proud: Paul Samwell-Smith on bass, who was then with the Yardbirds and about to become a famous producer; Jeff Beck played guitar and Paul McCartney played drums. Nicky Hopkins was on piano. If one could get the tape, that's a classic rhythm section.

RW: Has this been revealed before?

Asher: I don't think so. Something about revealing things, as far as discographies are concerned, this is an interesting "first." Someone did a Rolling Stones discography and missed out the fact, unknown to most, that Brian Jones played harmonica on the Peter and Gordon albums extensively, he being a good friend of Gordon's. Wherever

Columbia's New Carmina

■ NEW YORK—A few weeks ago the Masterworks division of Columbia Records invited a large group of reporters, critics and others in the record business down to a studio on East 30th Street in the Murray Hill section of Manhattan to hear, in quadraphonic sound, their new recording of Carl Orff's Carmina Burana. The number of people and pressing commitments kept this correspondent from listening to the whole recording at that time.

Though unable now to hear it in quad, the stereo sound is quite a satisfying experience. Michael Tilson Thomas finds in the Orff chestnut music that appeals to his innermost nature: this is by far his most sensitive work on disc. The Cleveland Orchestra justifies its continued reputation as one of the finest in the world: its sound is clean and sensuous, and Thomas handles the score's rhythms expertly.

Carmina Burana, the now familiar writings of defrocked Bene-

dictine monks in Bavaria in the thirteenth century, is very much a vocal piece, and in this regard both Thomas and Columbia have excellent resources. The chorus of the Cleveland Orchestra, coached by Robert Page, responds with hair-breadth accuracy and plenty of depth.

Judith Blegen

Of the soloists, Judith Blegen contributes one of those magical performances that combine youth, sensitivity, great musicianship and lovely tone. Her control always impressive, it comes to the fore in the tricky "Dulcissime." The "Roasted Swan" gets its best performance on records from Kenneth Riegel. An impossible aria to sing, stratospheric, intentionally parodistic and flat cruel to tenors, Riegel handles its rigors with flair. Peter Binder sings the baritone part well, but not in a manner to efface earlier memories: his voice is less rich than some of his predecessors.

Melissa Makes Magic at Bottom Line

■ NEW YORK—At previous live appearances, Melissa Manchester (Arista) had displayed Midleresque mannerisms from her Harlette roots, and it was sometimes hard to find the real Melissa Manchester amidst the affectations. At a recent (6) Bottom Line performance however, Ms. Manchester made it clearly obvious that she is a star in her own right, and the real Melissa Manchester stood up and took the bows quite graciously.

The five piece back-up band that performed with Melissa (most notably Kama Sutra recording artist James Newton Howard on keyboards and David Wolfert on guitar) is the same ensemble that accompanied her on her latest Arista outing, "Melissa," and if the onstage performance could in any way be related to the studio experience, more studio bands should be encouraged to go on tour with the artist. The tight and vibrant quality of the performance is remarkable, with an onstage oneness held together by expertise and exhuberance.

Infectious Energy

Melissa consistently whirls infectious energy from the stage to the audience during the course of her performance. She balanced the performance with up-tempo selections and ballads from her three albums: the aforementioned Arista set and two earlier efforts under the Bell banner, "Bright Eyes" and "Home to Myself." Highlights of her set included the compelling Stevie Wonder/ Syreeta Wright - authored "Love Havin" You Around;" "Let It

Ride," which served as a vehicle to display that homey Manchester feel; "Easy," a composition that could quickly become the lady's theme song, aptly exemplifying her sturdy vocal prowess; and one of the gems from her recently-released set, "Midnight Blue," which flows both lyrically and melodically.

Stanky Brown Group

Another Arista recording act, the Stanky Brown Group, opened the show. And, while their repertoire was tightly performed, the act seemed to have a "suburban lounge"-like quality that can perhaps be remedied with experience. Topping their set was a strong rendition of J.D. Souther's "The Fast One" and their recently released single, "Rock 'N' Rolling Star."

LOS ANGELES — The Mighty Clouds of Joy (ABC) demonstrated to a jam-packed Whisky audience recently that they have made a smooth transition from gospel music to a more broadly-based pop-r&b sound. In doing so, they've brought their vast experience and the beauty of the gospel idiom to a wider audience, creating a niche all their own for themselves.



Más bien, pienso, que de esa designación absurda de un jurado que está mediatizado de antemano por causas ajenas a la canción, esto, es quizas, el único pero que se le puede poner a este Festival (para mi gusto) el mejor organizado de España y que será subsanado en futuras ediciones por que de no hacerlo así, la organización corre el peligro de que el mismo se acabe y se vayan al traste todas las ilusiones que se pusieron en su dia. Y vamos con los premios: Paloma De Oro y 150,000 pesetas, a la canción "De Igual Color," letra de Sonny Marti y música de Danny Daniel que defendió Cristina; Paloma De Plata y 50.000 pesetas, (premio a la mejor letra) a la canción "Mambru No Volvera" de Sergio Fernandez (letra) y Nino Sanchez (música e interprete); Paloma De Bronce y 30.000 pesetas al mejór intérprete del Festival a Julio Ramos. 

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

there's any blues harmonica on a Peter and Gordon album, that's Brian Jones.

Anyway I've digressed. Paul, on the basis of liking what I'd done with Paul Jones, asked me to produce some things for Apple. The next day he called up and said "Well, why don't you be head of a&r for Apple?" and I agreed to, but in reality what that job turned out to consist of mainly was listening to 50,000 billion trillion tapes that came in every day. I had six people working for me listening to tapes all the time. That was the period when Apple was saying "Come to us!" and God did they come! We got tapes and poems and weird people walking in and just incredible amounts of stuff. Unfortunately, none of it was very good but it was very interesting. And it was at that time, in fact the day following the day Paul asked me to be head of a&r for Apple, that James called me.

I had met James before; we had a mutual friend in Danny Kortchmar, a guitarist of extreme excellence in L.A., who had played with Peter and Gordon, leading a band that backed us on our first two tours. Then he'd been in the Flying Machine with James and when that group broke up and James was going to England, Danny gave him my phone number. So he called me up and came over with a tape and played it and I can remember just being completely amazed at the things on that tape.

So I said to him, "Listen, I've just become head of a&r for a new record label, why don't you sign with us and I'll produce the record," and he agreed. So that's what we did.

I didn't know a whole lot about producing then, and if there is a criticism to be leveled against the Apple album, it's certainly that it is overproduced. It is produced with a capitol P. At that point, if I was going to produce it, I was really going to produce it. It was after that and after a great deal of rethinking that I arrived at "Sweet Baby James," which was a whole other approach, a great deal more simplistic. On the Apple album I was really trying to make him a masterpiece, and when you try and do that it can be a little bit overloaded.

RW: When was the decision made for you to manage James Taylor?
Asher: It was when it became apparent to us that Apple was becoming a strange situation to be in and that we wanted not to be in it. I was resigning anyway. I resigned and James went back to America.

RW: Were you heavily involved in Apple?

Asher: In a sense. I was closely involved in the original conception of it, when Paul first had the idea and talked about starting the whole thing. It was the first time someone had that idea, which since then lots of people have tried and most have failed: Be an artist-oriented, fair-to-everyone record company. It was a good idea.



Apple . . . got tapes and poems and weird people . . . Unfortunately, none of it was very good but it was very interesting.



RW: What went on at Apple while you were there?

Asher: Most of the things in the books are true, and a lot of them leave out a great deal. Some of them concentrate exclusively on all the boozing and frolics that went on, which definitely did go on. Derek Taylor's office was always a pleasure, always full of interesting people and interesting things to ingest and everyone had a great time. At the same time, there were a lot of people there—more than are given credit—who actually were trying to run an interesting, new kind of company and new kind of record label and did quite well. It was a strange company because of it being the Beatles and because of the ten thousand people arriving every day waiting to be discovered. Plus all the mad people that came—every day there would be two or three people who were mad, people who would come and say "I'm a reincarnation of so-and-so" or "In a previous life I was married to John Lennon." That would go on all the time, so it was very weird but it was great.

RW: Going back even further in your career now, how did Peter and Gordon get together?

Asher: We went to school together and we started singing together because we both liked some of the same kind of music and different kinds too. I was mostly listening to Woody Guthrie, Cisco Houston and that kind of music and Gordon listened mostly to the Everly Brothers and Elvis and we combined interests.

However, EMI's new One-Up mid-price label showed in third place in this category, with Bell coming home as top singles label and the CBS label heading the top album category.

Important deals concluded by Phonogram, which has signed 10cc on a world-wide basis; Pye, which is now pacted with former Cube soloist Jimmy Helms; Decca, which launched John Entwistle's Ox with a single "Mad Dog;" and Rak, which plans a massive campaign on new album act Smokey, currently being produced by Nicky Chinn and Mike Chapman, who were responsible for several hits by New World, Sweet, Mud, Suzi Quatro and Arrows.

Anchor band Ace working on a new single and album in Rockfield Studios in Wales; Wayne Bickerton working with the Rubettes and Mac & Katie Kisoon, also in the country; Russ Ballard is completing Roger Daltrey's next solo set, and news, too, from New York that John Lennon is in the studios with Bowie.

Supertramp and Bachman-Turner Overdrive are both playing London's Hammersmith Odeon in the coming weeks. Tramp plays the venue on March 9 as a "one off" while BTO completes their forthcoming, Derek Block promoted U.K. tour there on May 4. Robin Trower (Chrysalis) has already commenced an extensive series of dates and played the Lyceum, London on February 20-21. Gary Glitter has left for New York with co-manager Ray Brown for talks with Arista chief Clive Davis.

Fourth Annual Tokyo Music Fest **Announces Rules and Regulations**

■ TOKYO—The deadline for applications for entry in the Fourth Annual Tokyo Music Festival has been set as March 20, 1975 with international winners to be announced July 13 and national winners June 29.

Further rules and regulations for entry for the 10 million yen (\$34,000) prizes and awards are

Applicants shall apply for participation through a Japanese music publisher, production or record company, and may take any or all of the roles of lyricist, composer, arranger and/or singer. The song involved will be considered an entry from the nationality of the singer.

In the case of an applicant who has no contact with any Japanese music publisher, production and/ or record company, submission may be made directly to the Tokyo Music Festival; T.M.F. will recommend such an agent to the applicant.

Song Requirements

Submitted songs must meet the following requirements: Words and music shall be original; it shall be a "popular song" with lyrics; it shall be no longer than three minutes; it shall conform to the restrictions on special instruments and on the number of instruments.

Participants and copyright owners of the participating songs shall agree and give consent, free of charge, with T.M.F., to the following: Agreement to perform at the contest which will be broadcast on radio and television; consent to recording of performed song at the contest for library and

RW: And how did "World Without Love" happen to come to

you rather than another group?

Asher: Paul actually had played me the song sometime previously as a song he had half written. The Beatles didn't want to do it; they didn't think it was right for them. And to my recollection, he offered it to Billy J. Kramer first and he turned it down. I really liked it and at some later point when we got offered a recording deal by EMI we were choosing the songs to record for our first session and I went back to Paul and said "Listen, that song, if no one's doing it, we'd like to do it, but it needs a bridge," which it didn't have then. So he wrote a bridge for it and we did it.

RW: A few years ago when Lennon did the long interview in Rolling Stone, he described their early tours as "Satyricon." Does that

description apply to your tours with Gordon?

Asher: Well, yes and no. They were kind of disappointing in the sexual aspect, which is what everyone has in mind when they talk about Satyricon. Half the time, the girls would be disguising themselves as maids to get into the hotel or climbing up drainpipes, but when they got in the room they really weren't sure what they should do because they were probably 15, and 15 in '64 was different than 15 in '74. So very often the Satyricon aspect of it was not as fulfilling as one might have wished, because it would have been uncomfortable on both sides. So it was occasionally Satyricon, but mostly satirical.

RW: Of the songs you recorded as Peter and Gordon, which ones

did you like best?

Asher: "Woman," I liked a lot; "True Love Ways" I liked; "Lady Godiva" I hated. Those are my favorites. And "I Go To Pieces." Del Shannon wrote that. It's the only song of his that anyone else ever did to my knowledge. It's a great song and it's so unlike anything else he ever wrote. Everything else he ever wrote was always in A-minor. He's great, Del. He came up with a follow-up to that one and it was exactly the same; same chords, same melody, with different words. I said "But it's the same" and he said "Well, you know if you find a good thing . . . '

RW: Do you miss performing in the least?

Asher: Not in the least. I didn't especially enjoy performing but I think I would now if I could do it. It's different now; people can really hear you and they can see you and the whole thing has changed. I would enjoy it now I'm sure. I never was very comfortable with an audience and I never really knew what to say. I would miss it if I never sang, but sometimes I go out onstage and sing with James or Linda and I enjoy that too. I'm just a backup musician when I do that and I enjoy it a lot. In terms of doing what James or Linda do, to take responsibility for entertaining a few thousand people for an hour, I wouldn't want to do that.

RW: Ten years have passed since you entered the music business and in that time you've seen a lot of changes, both personally and in the business itself. Do you care to speculate on the future?

Asher: I really don't know what's ahead. When I was at school, I didn't know what I was going to do and that's why when I finished school I wanted to go to the university and when someone asked what I was going to read, I chose philosophy. It was the vaguest possible subject, I enjoyed it and it seemed so non-commital. And I had no idea when I went to the university that I'd end up being a rock and roll singer, touring America and having my boots ripped off. And when that was happening I had no idea that I would end up being a manager and producer. So who knows?

Ten years from now, I don't expect to be in the music business, but that's not to say I don't plan to be in the music business. I just have a feeling that I probably won't be. I have no idea what I'll

be doing. 🚱

She'll also guest on one of six Glen Campbell Specials being produced in London by BBC-TV, as well as a segment of the weekly "Top of the Pops" series.

Miss Murray, who'll guest on another of the Glen Campbell TV specials, is set by Ember Concerts for 16 days of television appearances, in Scandinavia, Holland, Belgium, Germany, Austria and Spain.

Thereafter, she'll come to England for the Campbell program, an "In Concert" BBC special, and two concerts at London's Victoria Theatre.

Tull Takes Charge At L.A.'s Forum

LOS ANGELES — For the first time in two years, Jethro Tull (Chrysalis) returned to L.A. to present a totally dynamic performance to the capacity audience at the Forum (3).

The crowd virtually shrieked with delight as the group's leader, lan Anderson, leaped onstage, sporting a flashy codpiece, armed with flute in hand. An incredible amount of theatrics were incorporated into the perfectly-paced presentation, including a young lady who frequently came out in different costume changes, ranging from tuxedoes to bunny-suits, handing Anderson various instruments and props, and a fake zebra who loped about the stage dropping striped tennis balls which bassist Jeff Hammond-Hammond immediately swooped up and began to juggle. Four string players dressed in long black dresses and white wigs, whom Anderson fondly referred to as "four of Great Britain's leading drag artists," were also part of the zany theatrics, and added a fine polish to the show.

Anderson maintained a truly amazing level of energy throughout the presentation, not letting up for a second, and constantly encouraged audience participation, with the crowd being right there behind him. His expertise as a flautist and showman were made apparent via several tasty passages, and he offered some notable acoustic guitar work on "Thick as a Brick." Other material presented included "Aqua-" "Bungle in the Jungle," "Ladies" and a scintillating version of "War Child."

Anderson has truly mastered the art of totally enrapturing an audience for a lengthy period of time, keeping their constant attention at all times, and raising them to a frenzied pitch. A hall full of lit matches brought him back for an encore, with everyone in the house hoping that Jethro Tull won't take two whole years to come back next time! Karen Fleeman

Meanwhile, Big Seven Music and Adam VIII, corporations under the Morris Levy umbrella, have filed a suit which asks for damages based on prior arrangements stemming from a copyright infringement action first brought by Levy's publishing company against Maclen Music and provisionally settled in October of 1973. The suit goes on to state: "In or about October 1974, Lennon, individually and on behalf of Apple, agreed that the October 1973 settlement would be modified to provide that Lennon would record . . . 15 . . . songs . . . which would be sold as a record and tape under the title 'Roots' . . . on a world-wide basis through mail orders . . . by means of television market-

The multi-count document also contains the pivotal point in the plaintiff's view that: "Lennon, Apple and Seider each represented to Big Seven that neither Lennon nor Apple had any contracts with anyone which prohibited Lennon from making the album for Big

"I've dreamed about and planned this company and this album for years," Bennett explained. "I feel strongly that an artist must have total control over his material in order to produce the best that is in him. This is the first time I've had that complete freedom, and it really works. The title song, 'Life Is Beautiful,' was written for this album by Fred Astaire. I feel that the fans who made 'San Francisco' will have the same feeling about 'Life Is Beautiful'.'

The label name was not disclosed pending trademark clearance. Corporate officers include William D. Hassett, Jr., president; Jack Rollins, vice president; and Richard Roemer, secretary and general counsel.

Hassett is one of Buffalo, New York's leading citizens and businessmen. His realty holdings include several landmark office buildings, apartments and the

Buffalo Statler Hilton, where he has pioneered in returning bigname entertainment to the downtown Buffalo scene. He is also a trustee or director of many business and educational institutions across the state.

Rollins, Tony Bennett's personal manager, is well-known in the show business industry. With Charles H. Joffe, he also serves as personal manager for Woody Allen, Dick Cavett, Robert Klein, Tom Poston and others. He and Joffe have produced Woody Allen's hit movies, and they are now completing a new Allen feature film.

Roemer is a well-known entertainment industry attorney with offices in New York City.

Corporate offices for the new label will be at 130 West 57th Street, New York City. Further details about the album's content and distribution plans will be announced shortly.

John Entwistle on the Move

■ NEW YORK — "I just wanted to do it," shrugged John Entwistle, heretofore noted bass player for The Who, "I'm in the business of playing live concerts; I want to play my material and this is the easiest way to do it."

Entwistle was referring, of course, to the first American tour of his group Ox. Accompanied by Graham Deakin on drums, Mike Deacon on keyboards, Robert Johnson on guitar and Jeff Daley on sax, Entwistle will appear in 19 American cities, headlining with the likes of the James Gang, the J. Geils Band and Joe Walsh.

False Starts

Several false starts have hindered Ox's American debut, according to Entwistle. Because of Britain's three-day work week, Ox's album ("Mad Dog") was a year in the making; add to this the fact that the neighbors lodged a complaint against the studio used by Entwistle and band, resulting in the studio bolting its doors every night at midnight, further limiting the time the group had for recording. Then Entwistle had to take a break for the filmed version of "Tommy" (wherein he plays a bass player!?) and the subsequent work on the movie's soundtrack. Ox finally began rehearsals for its American tour last Christmas.

The obvious question regarded the reaction of Messrs. Daltrey, Townshend and Moon to Entwistle's going it on his own in the States (he has toured Europe with his previous band, Rigor Mortis).

"Daltrey didn't want me to do it at first," Entwistle said.

Why?

"He just didn't want me to do it." Smile. "Actually I think it helps keep The Who together if we all go out and do our own projects. Roger has the film, Keith has his solo albums, Pete is mixing the sound for the 'Tommy' soundtrack. I've got to play live concerts."

While the proper focus of the Entwistle interview was on Ox, all the talk of the "Tommy" project gave rise to the thought that The Who must be getting a little

"We're not really getting tired of it," Entwistle said, "but when we went in to record the soundtrack - and we were recording it as The Who - we found that we couldn't add to it. So we brought in some new people to play on the sessions and we added six new songs and we succeeded in injecting a bit of new life into it. So it wasn't a strain."

And when Ox is finished with its tour?

"The Who will go into the studio in mid-April to record an album; at the end of that session I'll go back into a studio with Ox for another album. And then we'll (Ox) try to fit a couple of tours in at the end of the year."
