Ronstadt is at her best with the right song, and few have suited her remarkable voice as well as this powerful Karla Bonoff composition. DONNA SUMMER, "CAN'T WE JUST SIT DOWN (AND TALK IT OVER)" (prod. by Giorgio Moroder and Pete Bellotte) (writer: Tony Macaulay) (Macaulay/Almo, ASCAP) (3:56). Summer demonstrates an impressive versatility with this slow, melodic ballad, sans erotic sound effects, that showcases a good, soulful singing voice. Casablanca 884.

KANSAS, "WHAT'S ON MY MIND" (prod. by Jeff Glixman) (writer: K. Livgren) (Don Kirshner, BMI) (3:27). Kansas should follow up its new-found pop success with this second "Leftoverture" rocker. Its structure is much simpler than "Wayward Son," its high-energy hooks just as compelling, and the result should be similar. Kirshner 8-4270 (CBS).

COMMODORES, "EASY" (prod. by James Carmichael & group) (writer: L. Richie) (Jobete/Commodores Entertainment, ASCAP) (3:58). With their latest album firmly ensconced in the top 10, the Commodores become the latest r&b outfit to shift gears and offer a ballad—it's one of their best melo-dies, and a likely r&b hit and pop crossover. CROSBY, STILLS & NASH, "JUST A SONG BE-FORE I GO" (prod. by Crosby-Stills-Nash-R. Albert-H. Albert) (writer: Graham Nash) (Thin Ice, ASCAP) (2:06). The group's reunion is a sure sales and FM smash; thus, pop attention to this advance single seems sure. It's a quiet, melodic song with a dreamy air, fit for a range of formats. Atlantic 3401.

SUPERTRAMP, "GIVE A LITTLE BIT" (prod. by Supertramp) (writers: Davies-Hodgson) (Almo/Delicate, ASCAP) (3:32). The "Tracks" pick from this British group's third lp has launched their greatest album sales to date, and its easy, flowing style could well hit pop. AM radio action has already begun to build on it and its FM base is strong. A&M 1938.



Retailers Confirm Tape Sales Surge; Album Price Increases A Major Factor

(The following is the conclusion of a two-part series on the national tape sales climate, prepared by RW west coast editor Sam Sutherland and assistant editor John Mankiewicz.)

the nation confirm the manufacturer consensus (RW, May 14) that tape sales, in both 8-track and cassette configurations, have risen over the past year. Moreover, both retail and wholesale forces are paying more attention to the distaff configurations, and are coming up with merchandising ideas that will, perhaps, push tape sales even farther along.

A major reason cited by virtually every retailer contacted by RW is the recent list price hike levied by the manufacturer. Said one: "Tapes are up because lp list price has gone up. When we

■ LOS ANGELES—Retailers across | run a \$7.98 list price album on sale we set the tapes, both 8tracks and cassettes, at the same price as discs. Customers have gotten used to the idea that they're going to pay a dollar more for tapes, so the same price is a good hook, and something we can do now."

> Merchandising techniques for tape (especially cassettes) are loosening up as an experiment, in an attempt to find a way so that customers can see the tapes but not take them for free. Strength in the cassette is at least partially founded on its handy size; it's terrifically easy to just

slip one into the pocket, "I've seen more retailers putting cassettes out on wall racks,' Steve Boudreau, buyer for the Music Plus chain in Southern California, "Our cassette and 8track racks are not self-servicing, but our customers can see what's up there. We front-face the hits; the catalogue is placed spine out, so they can be read." Boudreau has seen a six percent rise in the (Continued on page 47)

Rights of License Challengers Broadened

■ WASHINGTON—The rights of citizens groups and individuals who challenge station license renewals were significantly enlarged recently in two separate opinions issued by the U.S. Appeals Court here. Especially when charges of racial discrimination are involved, the court said, citizen challengers should have greater access to station records before the Federal Communications Commission decides whether to renew a license in dispute. The court decision is another setback to broadcast industry and FCC officials attempting to stabilize the process of license renewals.

The decisions could significantly alter the way in which licenses are renewed by providing citizens groups with legal standing to question broadcasters and inspect their records before the FCC decides to commit a license renewal to hearing.

Groups charging racial bias can only lodge their complaints with the FCC now, with the commission soliciting a response from the licensee, before it decides whether the charges have enough validity to move to full hearings. The unsigned decision came in a case involving WTVR-AM-FM-TV in Richmond, Va.

A group of local citizens charged the station with hiring discrimination in 1972. The FCC, however, "delayed for three years" a decision on the renewal, the court said, and then found no hearings necessary based on information supplied by the station for years subsequent to 1972. The judges ordered the commission to hold hearings on the WTVR renewals adding that "there must be a meaningful accounting for conduct during the contested license period and more exacting standards established in the future."

The second case, with an opinion written by U.S. District Judge Gerhard Gessell, mandated greater rights of "discovery"—the legal mechanism for obtaining documents and other information from a party under legal challenge—for citizen groups during the prehearing phases of FCC renewals. Challengers must have greater access to station records and policy papers, the judge said, in order to present a full case on which the FCC can decide whether a hearing is warranted.

At present, Gesell said, "the commission often places reliance upon a licensee's untested explanations of poor past performance and accepts its generalized state(Continued on page 25)

Eagles Sue Geffen, Three Publishing Cos.

LOS ANGELES—In a nine-count antitrust suit filed in the U.S. District Court for the Central District of California, Eagles members Glenn Frey, Randy Meisner, Don Henley and Don Felder, together with former member Bernie Leadon have charged former manager David Geffen, their present publisher, Warner Bros. Music, and former publishers Companion Music and Benchmark Music with violations of the group's rights under the Sherman Antitrust Act. Other key points in the suit include breach of fiduciary duty and, in the action against Warner Bros. breach of duty of good faith and fair dealing.

Damages being sought are expected to run into millions of dollars, and the Eagles' attorneys are demanding a jury trial for the (Continued on page 22)



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

Sayer, Stevie Top Singles; Eagles Edge Fleetwood Album

Three Singles Enter Top 10

■ Leo Sayer (WB) retained his leadership of the singles market as "When I Need You" topped the chart for the third consecutive week. However, Sayer's once prodigious lead over the field has been cut significantly, and Stevie Wonder (Tamla) now sits in the #2 position with a bullet and a good chance to move to the top next week. Wonder is gaining and all of the sales momentum is pointing in his direction. Also charging towards the top is the latest hit from KC & the Sunshine Band (TK), which has now garnered the #4 slot with a bullet.

This week's top 10 was barraged by three new entries, two of which are making a significant move right towards the top 5 or better. Marvin Gaye (Tamla), who has now held the #1 position on The R&B Singles Chart for a solid month, it attempting to duplicate that charttopping feat on the pop side. His sales have been sensational from the day the record was released, and now the pop radio marketplace is reacting with strong movement on the record, sending it to #7 this week. Fleetwood Mac (WB), which now has scored with five consecutive hits, appears headed for their biggest this time as "Dreams" is moving and selling exceptionally well, especially considering the quantities of album product that have already been moved. Also entering the top 10 was the Climax Blues Band (Sire), which is the first top 10 for the ABC distributed label since the Focus hot streak some years back. The Climax single has struggled and forced its way into the top 10 and could move further by scoring with increased sales in the major

In the 10 to 20 area are some extremely strong hit records. Kenny Rogers (UA) is only lacking a few markets now to complete the difficult crossover from country to pop. Sales continue strong on the single, which now rests in the #11 position. Close behind are Joe Tex (Epic), with strong r&b sales and exceptional action in the south leading; Bill Conti (UA), the winner of the "Rocky" battle, now heading towards the top 5; Andrew Gold (Asylum), now ready to close in all markets and deliver the big sales push predicted here some weeks back; Foreigner (Atlantic), which is selling singles and albums for this new rock band; and Alan O'Day (Pacific), with continued growth on this sure shot.

Others showing good growth patterns this week were the Sylvers (Capitol), with the third straight biggie selling both pop and r&b; Eagles (Asylum), with the third hit from their incredibly strong album; Jimmy Buffett (ABC), with continued slow and steady growth on this hit; Andy Gibb (RSO), breaking big nationally with solid positive movement everywhere played; Hall & Oates (RCA), with a good airplay spread and early sales action reported; Waylon Jennings (RCA), breaking quickly as a pop item with solid country support; Peter McCann (20th Century), spreading well each week; England Dan & John Ford Coley (Big Tree), with exceptionally strong radio support early on a ballad; Rita Coolidge (A&M), breaking big in the south and southwest and spreading elsewhere this week; Shaun Cassidy (Warner/Curb), the teen sensation of the year to date; and Frank Lucas (ICA), starting to make a crossover move.

New on the chart with bullets this week were Barbra Streisand (Columbia), Kris Kristofferson (Columbia) and Supertramp (A&M). The Streisand received strong initial airplay from the Paul Drew consulted markets; Kristofferson, which first broke at B100 in San Diego, is now starting to make a decent spread; and Supertramp is receiving good initial response.

Gaye "Live" set (Tamla), which has now forced its way into the #3 position with a bullet. Gaye is incredibly strong at retail and in the urban cities, but is trailing significantly at rack locations. However, as his single is gaining, more and more racks are reporting sales increases, and the Gaye album could be one of the few successful black sets for the racks. Overall album sales held steady in a week that was highlighted by the first sales burst on the new Beatles live album (Capitol).

Isley Bros.

There were no new entries in the top 10 this week, but significant sales gains were recorded by the Isley Brothers (T-Neck), and the Commodores (Motown). The Isleys fought their way up to the number five position with a bullet, and the Commodores, which had been slipping a bit, surged back up to six with a bullet. The "Rocky" soundtrack (UA) also nudged up a bit into the #9 slot.

The big commotion on the streets this week was caused by the new Beatles package on Capitol. The release of the live recording from the mid-sixties exploded at retail nationally and debuted on the chart at #17 with obvious Chartmaker of the Week honors. The response was quick and significant for the latest revival of the boys from Liverpool. The

Beatles album scored in right ahead of the charging Leo Sayer (WB), whose current single has exploded the sales on the album into the #20 position with sales spread evenly among retail and rack accounts and growth reported everywhere. Foreigner (Atlantic) is also continuing its growth pattern with the racks now starting to make gains on this new retail sensation, and Supertramp (AM) is proceeding along a similar road with their latest and by far their biggest.

Other hot items on the chart this week were Slave (Cotillion), which is quietly turning into the r&b breakout smash of the year; Brothers Johnson (A&M), with a high debut on their second al-bum; Dave Mason (Columbia), selling well with his first studio set in the last year; 10cc (Mercury), scoring with an album behind their hot single; Johnny Guitar Watson (DJM), with his second straight big album; Little Feat (WB), with strong initial sales on their latest; Ronnie Laws (Blue Note), with pop, r&b and jazz sales on his latest; Waylon Jennings (RCA), with sensational country and strong pop response to his latest; Parliament (Casablanca), with a super strong second week on their live album; Cat Stevens (A&M), another with a strong first week debut; KC & the Sunshine Band (TK), selling behind their hit single; Kris Kristofferson (Columbia), breaking quickly with his hits package; and Jerry Jeff Walker (MCA), with solid first week sales.



NAIRD Convention Focuses On Promotion and Merchandising

CHICAGO—In his keynote address to the seventh annual convention of the National Association of Independent Record Distributors and Manufacturers, David Crockett of Father and Son's Records in Indianapolis called on the independents to be more aggressive in their merchandising and promotion techniques. The convention was held last week in Chicago to discuss the problems confronting the manufacturers and manufacturers of "alternative" or esoteric product and how to expand the small labels' share of the market.

In his address, Crockett pointed out that "as musical tastes broaden, mass markets are opening up for different types of product that didn't exist before. After all, 15

years ago Motown product was considered 'esoteric'."

"The Industry," Crockett said, "is now a better supplier to the musical demands of the public than ever before. This expansion makes the small independent NAIRD member a very viable part of the record industry." The first priority for the independents, according to Crockett," should be to establish and maintain an ever growing demand for their product. This is something that the major companies have been doing en masse for years, and if the independents want to grow they have to do the same thing.

Crockett warned the independents that the only way for them to achieve their full growth potential is by taking merchandising and promotion as seriously as the major companies do. He called the retailer the key for independents because it is at the retail level where the consumer makes a choice between product on an independent label or that of one of the major companies. One of the biggest mistakes the small label makes, said Crockett, "Is not seeing that you're competing with the major labels. While it is true that the product in an independent's catalogue is different from the major catalogues, there is only a certain amount of money spent on records every year. The first step for the independent is to recognize that he is competing with the major labels for those

Crockett suggested to the group that they could greatly increase their sales by paying more attention to getting exposure and familiarizing dealers with their product. "Catalogues and artist biographies may cost a few cents, but they make a real difference, because without them you cannot expect the retailer to take an interest in your product." Another inexpensive tool that should be used more often, he said, is "sending promotional copies of product to retailers for in-store (Continued on page 47)



Special Songs: Music Publishing Cooperative

■ LOS ANGELES—In its first year of operation here, Special Songs, a cooperative music publishing combine formed by personal managers Norman Epstein and Allen Shapiro on behalf of seven songwriters, has been testing an approach to artist-owned businesses already familiar—and successful—in the film and television industries.

While structured as a small publishing company, headed by general manager Evan Archerd, Special Songs is actually owned by songwriters Andrew Gold, Marie Cain, Rick Nelson, Kenny Edwards, Karla Bonoff, Fred Bliffert and Jesse Roe. Each retains full ownership of all copyrights; expenses and salaries are paid collectively by the songwriters, with certain individual costs billed directly to each while overall operating costs are drawn from the group, but no percentage points are held by Epstein or Shapiro.

As both are quick to point out, the concept of artist ownership for a creative company is hardly new; United Artists, First Artists and MTM Enterprises are only among the most obvious examples of successful production companies developed and owned by artists. Within the music publishing field, however, the idea is comparatively new. While Archerd notes that Barry Manilow and Paul Simon reportedly employ their own professional managers to exploit their catalogues, most songwriting contracts are still structured in accordance with traditional publishing channels, either retaining ownership—as in a management operated company — while sacrificing promotional support, or exchanging royalties for the full-service capabilities offered by a major publishing company.

"Norman and I were at the point where our clients were starting to make some progress professionally,' Shapiro recalled. "We were faced with the problem of trying to determine what kind of publishing arrangement made the most sense for our clients, and it seemed this was really a logical situation." Epstein had signed Gold to Asylum, Shapiro had signed Bliffert and Roe's band (with Amy Madigan), Jelly, to the same label, and Cain to Columbia. Gold, Edwards, Bonoff and Cain had all garnered their first covers by established artists, largely through the efforts of their managers, but both artists and managers were concerned about maximizing exposure.

The idea of a cooperative publishing venture met with little support from other industry observers, however. "Everyone

thought it would cost five to ten times more than we thought it would," Epstein commented. "It did cost a bit more, but nothing like what was predicted to us. One of the comments we got about our initial estimate was that it would just about cover postage."

In fact, the initial projection of \$15,000 operating costs, less salaries, was only slightly shy of the first year's expenses, which Epstein estimated as nearing \$20,000, considering the first year's publishing activity. "We're getting a cover every week and a half, at worst, and it's usually brisker," Archerd says—that tally is impressive, particularly in view of the stature of the artists who've covered the combine's material.

Shapiro stresses that the range of musical styles represented by the approximately 200 copyrights now in the catalogues of the seven writers has been largely compatible, accounting for the spread of artists covering the songs: Gold's songs have been cut by Leo Sayer (the title song for his current album), Judy Collins, Cliff Richard, Linda Ronstadt and Barbi Benton; Cain's material has been recorded by Cher, Helen Reddy, Maureen McGovern, Gloria Gaynor and Sarah Johns; Edwards is represented by songs on albums by B. W. Stevenson, The Nitty Gritty Dirt Band, Cilla Black, Linda Ronstadt and Gabriel; and Bonoff has seen covers of her songs by Bonnie Raitt, Karen Alexander and Ronstadt, who has three Bonoff songs, including the most two recent singles, "Someone To Lay Down Beside Me" and "Lose Again," on her most recent album alone.

Archerd observes that the separate recording careers of Special Songs' principal writers both contributes to the operation's financial stability while necessarily controlling growth. "We don't have to come up with as much money for demos, since those costs are often handled primarily

by the record company during the course of an album project," he noted. Yet Special Songs' twin objectives of steady publishing growth and separate career momentum do lead Archerd to withhold some songs in deference to the writer's own recording needs.

Right now, international publishing arrangements for each of the member companies is still channeled through separate overseas deals, and Epstein, Shapiro and Archerd are cautious about overextending their current operational size and its corresponding operating costs. But Archerd feels the company may ultimately justify additional offices in the U.S. and possibly abroad. "If the idea, as it stands, proves successful," Shapiro said, "then Special Songs will become a full-fledged publishing operation in a broader sense. For the time being, though, the objective is to make it work in its current format."

The individual companies comprising Special Songs include Gold's Luckyu Music (BMI); Cain's Raisin Music (ASCAP); Edwards' Purusha (BMI) and Valgovind (BMI) companies; Bonoff's Sky Harbor Music (BMI) and Seagrape Music (BMI); Roe's Temporary Secular Music (BMI); Bliffert's Mukunda Music (BMI); and the most recent addition, Nelson's Matragun Music (BMI), which includes most of his early hit songs like "Travelling Man" and "Poor Little Fool."



Bruce Wendell on the Ins and Outs of Promotion

■ Bruce Wendell, vice president of promotion for Capitol Records, has been with the company for five years. He joined Capitol as assistant to the promotion VP, and was promoted to national promotion manager before assuming his current duties. He is also a corporate vice president and a member of the board of directors of Capitol Records, Inc. His career began in 1958 at WINS-AM in New York, one of the early top 40 giants, where he was music director. In 1960 he took a similar position at KDAY-AM in Los Angeles, leaving that station in 1965 to become pro-

gram director of KBLA in Burbank. In 1967, he became vice president of west coast operations for Koppelman and Rubin, working in the music publishing and production areas.

Record World: Capitol has always had a direction towards the hit single and has been able to work a multiplicity of hits at the same time. What are the reasons behind this?

Bruce Wendell: Capitol for the longest period of time was having trouble bringing albums home. With the type of roster we had, we really had to have hit singles to deliver the acts, to break albums like a Glen Campbell or a Helen Reddy. We needed the hit. A&R gave us extremely viable artists, but ones that needed the hits. We didn't have the AOR acts, the concert acts that we have today. We had to devise plans for hit singles, we had to have game plans that would enable us to break singles consistently. If you just take our r&b roster, for example, we have three big acts all of whom were delivered with hit singles. We were forced to deliver a solid promotion force to have our people deal with bringing home lots of hits.

Hit singles remain the backbone of promotion. We have just turned Bob Seger into a platinum album seller with the exposure afforded him through hit singles. Steve Miller has gone from a gold album artist to a triple platinum seller due to hit singles. We did not have the AOR staff we have now, so we concentrated on hits. Pop stations launched these gigantic sales for Miller, Frampton, and others. I learned when Pink Floyd had the "Dark Side of the Moon" album that an album at 700,000 without benefit of a hit single turned into a multi-platinum seller which is still selling because of a marginal hit record. This was based just on exposing product to a whole new audience.

RW: Is your game plan for spreading records developed by national or regional priorities?

Wendell: It is set by areas. There are times I will look at a local man's line of stations and find five or six of our records on already. So what I do is try to plan the next logical move for a particular record and make it a major priority in an area. Then the next week I come in and give the local man all the information from the other areas so he can crush on the next record. It is all carefully planned by area, it's not done by buckshot. We supply as much information as we can with airplay, sales, trade numbers, tip sheet mentions and whatever. Promotion is an exact science, it is continuously growing. It's not like a couple of years ago when a trade can have sixty bullets and everyone will believe it. We must constantly be in communication with the field, build our credibility, make our people totally aware of all the alternatives, and then come in for the crush. We keep the credibility going, then move a record to the next market. We cannot afford to have everyone working one record. This is far too costly. I don't need one record, I need them all. If any station goes on a Capitol record, they will be supported as we spread it and take it as far as the record

RW: You have been very successful with crossovers. Would you

elaborate?

Wendell: The soul staff was originally put together by Larkin Arnold, who is the vice president/soul division and has been a tremendous asset as far as helping me. He has been instrumental in acquiring the top producers and providing quality product that can break r&b and then cross to pop. We all work very closely. In the beginning Capitol was not successful in crossing black records. But now I have done my research, my homework, and have a game plan for crossing in areas that can start big r&b and cross to broader demographics. I first build my soul base, and where I have my peak sales I do my cross. Matt Parsons, the national r&b promotion manager has a strong staff and we work hand in hand on these projects. They hand us the baton when they have done their job and it's time to come in for the crush when sales are building well black, and not after they are peaking.

Every record that is going to be a hit at Capitol will be worked to reach the complete demographic that the record is capable of. I want all avenues of exposure for a record. This holds for country crossovers too. Glen Campbell's #1 "Southern Nights" had a country base, an adult base, and a top forty spread.

RW: What makes you able to cross records at the right time and to spread records quick enough to maximize sales and chart position consistently?

Wendell: Capitol has built up the believability in the field by working hard and being dedicated. That makes people feel assured that when they take a shot with a Capitol record it's with a winner. Every single promotion man takes pride in our game plan and radio knows that they aren't shooting at something that they won't be supported on. Radio believes that we know what we're doing and that we're not going to string them out. I also believe in Capitol's product and that we are successful because our records are great sounding records which enable us to have a better chance to get out-of-the-box shots at radio stations. The records aren't automatics, but they stand up time and time again.


RW: As album product continues to grow in volume potential, do you see the possibility of breaking four singles from one album?

Wendell: I think not. For example, in the case of Steve Miller with three hits from his album, it's been around a long time and we have new material available. His album has sustained itself for a year and is still a major seller, but I think the move is to the newer, fresher product. It is possible to get a fourth hit, but it would be a very rare occurrence since I think the public and radio stations especially are looking for something fresh and new. There comes a time when enough is enough, AOR play slows and to push an album further becomes actually boring. I'd rather work new product personally, that's the excitement element. Unless radio does it themselves, it's probably useless.

RW: Your field force people must be constantly approached by other companies. How do you deal with this?

Wendell: I would expect other people who are looking for talent to go to the best. My people are approached, and they come to me and they tell me that they were offered such and such a job at such and such a price. We evaluate it, and I don't want to hold anybody back who has a chance to do something. But if it's a lateral move, with a company in which the national man himself isn't approaching the local, it wouldn't make sense, it would be like me leaving Capitol. Why should I leave Capitol? They're good to me and I've had some offers, but I've got it all together here. I've got everybody trained and I've got everything, why go across the street and have to start all over again and go through all that? They feel

■ BEFORE THE FLOOD: Rainstorms may be common enough in other burghs, but in Southern California the occasional deluge is practically regarded as a mystical event with traumatic overtones. Last weekend's brutal downpour was no exception, with most Angelenos reduced to stark terror behind the wheel when confronted with slick freeways and flooded city streets.

COAST's carpetbaggers, on the other hand, can rely on prior experience to deal with the damp, and deal they did. Fearlessly, if somewhat erratically, they were dispatched to Oakland, Santa Barbara and other points only slightly closer to the big enchilada itself.

In Oakland, the weather dampened **Fleetwood Mac's** show a mite, and their Santa Barbara date was subsequently cancelled as the waters rose over the turf at UC Santa Barbara.

But while Sunday's sortie turned out to be a long haul for a short slide, Saturday evening rewarded the feisty Abu Ali ben Hekkt with a rare glimpse of David Carradine playing his own songs, not Woody's, at the Corral in Topanga. His pickup band for the one shot gig was fairly provocative on its own, with original Buffalo Springfield drummer Dewey Martin sitting in and ELO's Hugh McDowall on cello. Carradine himself wore jeans, a tee-shirt and no shoes, one-upping the local punk contingent with his sense of anti-style. Playing a Les Paul and smiling cryptically for most of his set, he rather baffled the Corral crowd.

Indeed, most of the folks in attendance were more excited by **Buckdancer**, a midwestern band that relocated here some months back and has since cut the equivalent of an album with **Bob Margouleff**. A tight country-rock unit with a greater emphasis on acoustic instrumentation and bluegrass soloing, the band proved more powerful live than on Margouleff's already concise, polished tracks. And any band that can do yet another kilowatt reading of "Orange Blossom Special" and make it fresh bears watching.

NATAL BE THE DAY: Over the past few months, Michael Lippman has gone to embarrassing extremes to get coverage in this column. Now the always organic Lippman and wife Nancy have done the ultimate, producing a son, Joshua, who was born at 4 a.m. last Wednesday morning. Just in time for the deadline . . . Also new parents, lan and Shona Anderson are reportedly grinning over their first, born last Monday (9).

RUMOR DENIED: Rocket Records has emphatically denied that label act **Blue** is actually **Klaatu.**

MONEY TALKS: We were down in the bank situated in the RW lobby (actually, the bank owns the building, which figures), trying to cash food stamps, when our eyes were drawn to teller Janet Money. The combination was too good to be true, and so COAST's entrepreneurial finesse has been given a nudge. We were all ready to put Janet with a band that could really clean up, and even began mapping out auditions: Johnny Cash, Kevin Coyne, Penny Nichols, Nicky Buck (now with Hot Tuna), Richard Greene and, of course, Zoot Money seemed like hot prospects, as did a first single of "Everything Must Change." 





A FIND: The Museum of Broadcasting is housed on the third floor of a thin, unimposing building located at 1 East 53rd Street. From its austere facade one would hardly guess that contained therein are treasures of inestimable value, a wealth of history, in the form of tapes and videocassettes, spanning, in the words of the Museum's bulletin, "the entire period from the 1920's to the present, with the initial emphasis on the earlier years."

The Museum has two rooms: one for a card catalogue, the other for eight separate consoles (each with three sets of headphones) on which to monitor the programs. Newcomers would be wise, but are not obligated, to view the 17-minute introductory videotape in which the erudite Alistair Cooke explains the purpose of the Museum and how to avail oneself of its facilities.

The procedure is much like checking out a book from the library: you locate a program in the card catalogue, fill out a request form and give it to the staff member in the console room, who promptly brings you the program.

Open since November, the Museum—founded by CBS chairman William S. Paley, with network chiefs of NBC, ABC and PBS serving on the board of trustees-houses more than a thousand selections, and is adding to this number daily.

One of the videocassettes we requested was a new acquisition that had not yet found its way into the card catalogue-The Beatles' 1964 premiere on the "Ed Sullivan Show." Other musical performances we noted as being on file (and we hardly had time to scrutinize the catalogue thoroughly) included: an Art Tatum radio broadcast from February 27, 1934 ("The Blind King of the Ivories Plays Five Songs"); a "Toast of the Town" show of November 5, 1950 featuring Nat King Cole singing "Orange Colored Sky" and "Calypso Blues;" opening night at Lincoln Center, September 23, 1962 (a 125-minute videocassette); "What Does Music Mean?"-a Young People's Concert first televised on November 8, 1958 and featuring Leonard Bernstein; the complete videotape of "Peter Pan," starring Mary Martin, first televised on December 8, 1960.

Also, you'll find the premiere episode of "I Love Lucy" on file (there's one that's close to our hearts), as well as two episodes of the 'Amos 'n' Andy" TV series, several of Edward R. Murrow's "See It Now" broadcasts (including one with Harpo Marx at home), "Studio One" and "Playhouse 90" productions, the Kennedy-Nixon debates, "Classic TV Commercials, 1948-1958," Judy Garland's radio debut in 1934 (complete with Wallace Beery's introduction of the young singer), and the first telecast of Toscanini's performance of Beethoven's Fifth Symphony.

We overheard a fellow say, "Mr. Paley has guaranteed funds for five years," but the Museum can of course use some outside support. A contribution of one dollar is suggested of visitors to the Museum, and four different membership plans-ranging in cost from \$30 to \$1,500-are available, any one of which allows you to reserve a console in advance. The Museum is open to the public from noon until 5 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday.

Also in the situations vacant category, we hear that Nektar is looking for a new guitarist since Roy Albrighton joined Quantum Jump. They better find someone soon because there is a New York date being advertised for the Palladium on June 4 . . . Last week Atlantic announced the signing of the Temptations with a gala bash at Club 54. Now we hear that another Motown stalwart, a former lead singer of that group, is leaving the label for an east coast based company . . . Lily Tomlin gave a special performance of her "Appearing Nitely" show for a theatre of invited guests, press and Arista Records staffers. Among those in attendance were Roberta Flack, Harry Nilsson, Patti Smith and Sally Kellerman, but not Ira Mayer . . . Foreigner drummer Dennis Elliott broke his hand while the band was in Kansas City recently, but managed to play two more nights with the group until a replacement could be brought in. 



REAR VIEW MIRROR

Margot Chapman, Taffy Danoff, Jonathan Carroll and Bill Danoff offer an appealing vocal combination on their second Milt Okun produced album. "Liberated Woman," "Don't Say Forever" or "Rear View Mirror" could find these "Afternoon Delight"-ers back on the charts with another hit single.

THE RUBINOOS

Beserkley PZ 34778 (CBS) (6.98)

The group previously made their mark via Beserkley's "Chartbusters" lp but here they show what they really can do with a set of pop originals (save for "I Think We're Alone Now" and "Peek-A-Boo"). A bread and butter album for all pop aficionados as the memorable "Leave My Heart Alone" makes clear.

MAKIN' MAGIC

PAT TRAVERS-Polydor PD-1-6103 (6.98)

It has not taken very long for Canadian guitarist Pat Travers to emerge as one of the world's premier axemen. This second album puts him comfortably in the spotlight with a fuller sound than on his previous effort. "Makin' Magic" and "Statesboro Blues" are among his most realized efforts. You'll hear from him.

MERRILEE RUSH

United Artists LA735-G (6.98)
The "Angel Of The Morning" girl has not been heard from in awhile but makes up for lost time with this set produced by Denny Diante. Her Chip Taylor-penned hit has been re-cut, and is contrasted by her version of Frankie Miller's "A Fool In Love" and Guy Fletcher's "Save Me." An excellent vocal performance throughout.

THE OUTLAWS—Arista 4135 (6.98)

The triple pronged guitar attack of the group has never been sharper and the material never as consistent. Producer Bill Szymczyk takes all that the group has going for it and puts it together into one attractive package. With this third album, the group has come into its own and is headed for the top.

CLARKE, HICKS, SYLVESTER, CALVERT, ELLIOTT

THE HOLLIES—Epic PE 34714 (6.98)

Epic has taken two excellent Hollies lps that were never released here ("Write On" and "Russian Roulette") and has assembled one superb collection. The album is equally divided between ballads and rockers, with "My Love" and "Write On" the best of the former and "Star" and "Russian Roulette" typifying the latter.

AMERICAN GYPSIES

GALDSTON & THOM—Warner Bros. BS 3037 (6.98)
The duo was the winner of the 1975 American Song Festival with "Why Don't We Live Together," a ballad which is included here. The emphasis is on light, mid-tempo tunes which are framed by John Simon's sympathetic orchestrations. The group can at times sound like Orleans ("When The Silence Stops") but is more comfortable with the softer stuff.

OUT OF THE MIST

ILLUSION-Island ILPS 9489 (6.98)

Group members Jane Relf, Louis Cennamo, John Hawken and Jim McCarty founded Renaissance several years ago but subsequently left the group. Here they are reunited with a similarly sounding classical influence. Relf's vocals have a sonorous quality on "Isadora," "Everywhere You Go" and Candles are Burning."

AMERICAN ROULETTE

DANNY O'KEEFE—Warner Bros. BS 3050 (6.98)
O'Keefe has come up with some of his strongest material in years for this Warners debut. The songs are mainly of the introspective variety with O'Keefe's vocals and guitar supplying the punch. The title track is a moving statement while "The Runaway" is a low-keyed rocker.

ULTRAVOX

Island ILPS 9449 (6.98)

With the new wave groups dominated in large part by two chord wonders, it is particularly refreshing to come across an outfit such as this—a cross between early Roxy Music and the Doctors of Madness. Brian Eno produced this flashy collection, best represented by "The Wild, The Beautiful and the Da Dam Damm Dammned."


LIVE AGAIN

Key counts in the case include the plaintiffs' charges that Geffen and the various publishers violated antitrust laws through the interrelationships between Geffen and his own label, Asylum Records, and Companion Music, in which he also had a financial interest. The complaint also alleges Geffen made the signing of the group's Asylum recording contract contingent upon individual publishing contracts with Companion, a move characterized as "a contract and combination to foreclose and limit competition in the music publishing industry."

Also sought is declaratory relief for breach of fiduciary duty, in connection with the group's allegation that sums of money obtained by Geffen as the group manager, along with monies received by Geffen following the sale of his interests in Asylum, Companion Music and Benchmark Music, are owed to the group. Likewise, the group's action also maintains that there are monies due them, outstanding, attached to those songs published

through Warner Bros. Music.

In addition, a breach of good faith and fair dealing duty is being claimed against Warner Bros. Music for assigning all grand rights, including possible dramatizations and films derived from the group's songs, to Leber-Krebs, Inc. without obtaining sufficient compensation and insuring subsequent creative controls over such projects would be retained by the group. Under that relationship, it is also alleged, the group will now be forced to buy back the grand rights for their songs should they elect to initiate their own film or drama projects.

Final charges include the plaintiff's assertion that Warner Bros. Music contracted with Elektra/Asylum Records for a royalty rate higher than the rate the group was already being paid by the label, with Warner Bros. securing an additional half-cent royalty per album, "at the expense of the Eagles."

At press time, neither the group's manager, Irv Azoff, nor the defendants could be reached for comment on the proceedings.

Maze Injunction Denied

■ LOS ANGELES — A federal court in New York has denied a preliminary injunction which was sought against Capitol Records and Capitol's act "Maze Featuring Frankie Beverly" to enjoin them from using the name "Maze."

In a decision handed down April 15, 1977, by Judge Charles Metzner of the District Court in the Southern District of New York, it was held that the plaintiff (a band headquartered in Massachusetts) failed to demonstrate the requisite hardship or harm that would justify the issuance of a preliminary injunction."



placement of FCC "prosecutor" Keith Fagan. Fagan was transferred to another division within the commission and replaced on the trial staff by Theodore Kramer.

As well, when the hearings resume Monday (16), one of the main protagonists in this investigation, Mel Edwards, a former WOL jock and president of DJ Productions, the deejays' concert production company, will not be present. Edwards was fired by the station last month for what management called "gross misconduct." Edwards conceded on the witness stand in March that he had continued producing shows after WOL management had ordered the jocks to cease for the rest of the year. Since Edwards is no longer a WOL employee, the commission has released him from his subpoena, the radio station's attorney said last week.

Edwards reportedly appeared last week before the District of Columbia's Unemployment Compensation Board to argue that he was unfairly dismissed and was due unemployment benefits, at first denied him because of his "misconduct" firing. Edwards claimed that he had in fact informed the station's attorneys that he was still promoting shows -a claim the station denies-and that WOL fired him only to minimize damage from the plugola investigation at the FCC. No word is available on the outcome of his appeal.

Testimony

When the hearings resume, the commission says it will take testimony from WOL program director Cortez Thompson, general manager Jim Kelsy, and another Sonderling Broadcasting official, John Doubleday. Sonderling is the owner of WOL. But Record World learned last week that the commission also plans to call two former WOL deejays, Bill Haywood, now a promotion man for Mercury Records in Chicago, and Carol Hinson. The commission also plans to recall Bobby Bennett, sources close to the probe say. Bennett pulls WOL's afternoon shift and was suspended for four weeks last month in the same action that caused Edwards' dismissal. Two other WOL regulars, Raymond St. James and Gregory Hines, were also handed one month suspensions for their participation in concerts after the management ban last spring.

Word from the newly reconstituted trial staff surfaced last week that these proceedings are ready to travel to other cities and investigate other, similar charges of payola/plugola in the radio industry. Early in the hearings, the staff said they were considering expanding the probe to Detroit, Chicago, Cleveland and Los Angeles. Later they retracted their statements. Now it appears that FCC "prosecutor" Kramer does indeed want the investigation to move outside of Washington but that funds may not be available. Moving the so-called broad-based investigation to other cities will entail thousands of dollars in expenses for the three-lawyer staff and administrative law judge presiding at the hearings, as well as stenographers' time and rent on a suitable hearing room. FCC budget hearings on Capitol Hill have just passed and the payola trial staff may be too late to get funding for their travelling investigations.

■ It's rumored that The Entertainment Company, headed by Charles Koppelman, is involved in heavy negotiations for the purchase of the Wes Farrell Organization's publishing catalogues. Look for an official announcement next week.

Also, the Warner Brothers/Belwin-Mills deal still seems very much alive.

Phil Galdston and Peter Thom, writers with Chappell since 1974 and 1975 winners of The American Song Festival, stopped by the RW offices this week to talk about their first album, "American Gypsies" (WB). They admitted that they had a number of offers immediately after winning the Grand Prize at the Song Festival but waited to sign with Warners because they wanted time to develop their writing and performing techniques and "concentrate our energies." The two collaborate on both lyrics and music and, according to Thom, "It's easier to collaborate than to write independently. There's something about having someone to bounce off of." They are especially enthusiastic about the support given them by Chappell over the past three years ("Their contribution to our success can't be stressed enough," Galdston said) and feel the Song Festival was also a major step. They are currently performing in the New York area in preparation for their first major tour. The album was produced by John Simon and includes their winning song, "Why Don't We Live Together."

APPEARING WEEKLY: Another N.Y. group, The Cruz Brothers, have been making regular appearances at Home and Friends Again and have picked up a more than respectable following. They specialize in slick jazz/rock/disco tunes and are managed by actor/singer/songwriter Mike Millius. Millius was the leader of Five Dollar Shoes. that way too. So they're happy. They're a great team and everybody likes one another and we feel confident in one another. If my man in Seattle goes out and gets a record played, he knows that we will spread. He doesn't sit there and go, "I'll be strung out." He knows that bang, we would spread, we would get others and he wouldn't be left alone. We pay the price, our guys are paid well, we have quarterly bonuses and they all have leased cars, also.

RW: Would you say that your people are at or near the top of the pay scale now?

Wendell: Well I think some of the more independent labels, if that's the right wording, might pay a few extra dollars because they are small, they don't have the distribution, they don't have the merchandising things at their disposal, they don't have the product in the market as quickly as a major company with their own machines. So I think that probably some of the smaller labels might pay a few extra dollars. They have to, otherwise why work there!

RW: Do you talk to every one of your people every week? Or close to it?

Wendell: Between Steve Meyer, who is the national promotion manager, Ray Tusken, who is national AOR, and myself, we talk to everybody every week. I don't talk to every single person every week because my duties now are so spread out, there's so many corporate things and overall functions of the company.

RW: What is the promotion department's position in choosing product? Does the promotion department get a vote in the choice of singles?

Wendell: Very, very heavy opinion. I don't say we control it, but we work as a team. We work between A&R and reaction from the field. A&R wants our input. Ultimately we have to go out and make a hit record. A&R wants us to have hit records. They don't want to fight us. Our managers—Jeff Wald for example—if I said to Jeff such and such a record out of Helen's next album is the one that everybody wants. I don't care about the publishing, I don't care about the writer, I don't care about that—this is the hit record as a consensus by the field, and so on and so forth—he's going to say, "Hey, I want a hit record." So the hell with the egos. We want hit records so we sit around and we discuss it openly.

RW: Who's involved in the decision?

Wendell: Jim Mazza, who is the vice-president of marketing, Don Zimmermann, who is the executive vice president and chief operations officer, I'm in there, Steve Meyer is in there, of course Rupert Perry, who is the vice president of A&R, and his people. And we kick it around. The manager of the act also, and we kind of try to come up to agree.

RW: The reason I'm pushing this point is that there seems to be a consistency of choosing the right song.

Wendell: Right. For example, the Bob Seger record of "Night Moves"—there were different opinions. We got down to "Night Moves" because it was this one or that one and I felt with the right edit for AM and with a full version on the B side for AOR or who ever, it would be the best shot. Everybody agreed.

RW: Let's talk about the future. Say with Bob Seger. Seger obviously has broken through now to the public and has a catalogue of good songs on Capitol.

Wendell: Right.

RW: Is there any possibility of moving backwards? To some of

his earlier product?

Wendell: Absolutely. I spoke to Punch Andrews recently—Bob's manager—and we always felt that Bob was a star, a great performer who has the potential to be a major superstar. He had all of his foundation done, he just needed a hit single to reach the masses. And songs like "Beautiful Loser" and "Katmandu"—we are not against going back and going with those because I believe if they are exposed to the masses they will be hits. They were successful in several markets, but at the time Seger wasn't a major star.

RW: How about new projects, new artists breaking?

Wendell: We're very, very, very high on Sammy Hagar. We feel he also falls in the category of Bob Seger. One big pop record and all of a sudden he goes gold, possibly platinum, fills arenas all over the country. So he's a major. . . . Of course Starz is to us filling the void that maybe Grand Funk had. A major, major album act, singles act. Also a continuation of Sweet and Little River Band will emerge as a major act for us in the future, too. The continuation of Dr. Hook, who we're very proud that they left CBS and had a second life with us, and I think we're well on the way of continuing their career which I always felt that they should have had. And

then just continuing from Natalie Cole to be the supreme artist in not only the soul field, but in the world. A national star. Glen Campbell is back on the track and giving one hundred percent to his career again. And Helen Reddy who year in and year out is always in the ballgame, always coming up with hit product. At the end of each year she's always had tremendous chart actions. She has just finished "Pete's Dragon" for Disney and could add another dimension in her career. I think that the biggest growth areas will be in our soul department with Maze, Sylvers, Tavares, Natalie Cole as our base, and more to come and of course our AOR acts.

RW: Do you use independents?

Wendell: I have a great promotion staff that covers every major market. If I do use an independent it's basically in an area where I don't have a local man living. And it's sometimes cheaper budgetwise to use a man—to use his services rather than have a man go in week in and week out with airplanes, whatever. It's cheaper to do that. We used an independent in New Orleans who then after working for me as an independent for two months said, "I would like to be your local man." And he dumped his business and joined us as our local man. So the independent promotion man is very valuable and I know he's important, but I don't depend on him like a small label that has a small staff because they don't have the coverage. Because I have coverage and good people and knowledgeable people. And I've discussed independents with radio stations and they say "you have your man-woman covering us and it's not necessary to double team me." I will use an independent from time to time in an area where I'm short.

RW: Could you define Capitol's direction as a company?

Wendell: Careers. Basically Warner Brothers had that concept. We are doing it also. I think that our advantage at the point of the operation now is that we're capable of bringing hit singles in faster than they did way back when they started. They're doing it now obviously. All their acts are having hot records. I know that because Capitol presses their product. And we fight for the presses. But that's going back to the hit single. That's why we try so hard because that's getting us from first to third. We don't have to stop at second. The hit single just takes you right to third base. I think in summation the key to the turnaround of Capitol Records is the total team work of sales and promotion and a&r. Working really as one. Even though we all do different things, we do them with the same goal.

RW: Would you like to make any comments about where you

see your direction within the next couple of years?

Wendell: Well me, personally, right now I'm very, very content and very happy being in the position I'm in. In the earlier stages of promotion I didn't have the confidence that I have now or the knowledge. You learn by being out there. And right now I feel that I have as much ability and as much knowledge as the next guy. And I'm enjoying doing it. And the results are starting to come in for Capitol, we've been showing a nice profit. And I think for the time being I'm in the right spot, I'm playing the right position. They are letting me do things my way which is basically Capitol's way of doing business. I feel very comfortable in the position I'm in. They don't hassle me with day to day things and they're not on my back every second. The pressure that is on the job—most of it—is brought on by myself. I strive to do better every time at the bat than I did the last time. And so I feel great right where I am.



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

Cat Stevens Returns with 'Izitso'

■ Born Steven Georgiou in 1947, Cat Stevens recorded his first single 19 years later. The song, "I Love My Dog," was the first record for the Deram label and became a modest hit in the U.K. His following singles were likewise characterized by elaborate productions by Mike Hurst and strong melody lines: "Matthew and Son," "Here Comes My Baby" (successfully covered by the Tremeloes), "The First Cut Is The Deepest" (recently covered by Rod Stewart), "I'm Gonna Get Me A Gun" and "I Love My Dog." Stevens was on the verge of becoming a pop idol in the late '60s when he contracted TB and was forced to spend over a year recuperating in a clinic.

He made his comeback in 1970 with his first A&M album, "Mona Bone Jakon," produced by former Yardbird Paul Samwell-Smith. A string of very successful albums followed it up the charts, demonstrating, a softer, more sensitive side to the artists' music. Of these, "Tea For The Tillerman" and "Teaser and Firecat" won him a wide audience

Harold Spivacke Dies

■ WASHINGTON — Harold Spivacke, chief of the Library of Congress music division for nearly 25 years and a world renowned musicologist, died last week in Washington at the age of 72. Spivacke's long career at the Library was marked by his extensive expansion of its collection of music memorabilia, manuscripts, recordings and personal papers. Spivacke plunged the Library into a collection and preservation effort that nearly tripled the size of the Library's music holdings during his tenure there.

Spivacke was known around the world for his close friendships with some of the world's most famous composers, including Aaron Copland. In fact, it was Spivacke who commissioned Copland's "Appalachian Spring." As well, Spivacke established one of Washington's most popular musical fixtures, a weekly series of chamber music concerts at the Library featuring world famous musicians at 50 cents a ticket.

But Spivacke's most lauded accompishment was his acquisition of materials from such composers and musicians as George Gershwin, Richard Rogers, Charlie Parker, Jelly Roll Morton and Igor Stravinsky. In 1965, he was presented the Library of Congress' Distinguished Service Award for "his unique and unusual service to music."

with songs like "Father and Son," "Wide World," "Moonshadow" and "Peace Train" striking a responsive chord.

With his next album, "Foreigner," Stevens' interest in Eastern mysticism manifested itself in his music and lyrics. "The Foreigner Suite," a collage of themes related to this belief comprised a total side of the lp. His subsequent records, "Buddah and the Chocolate Box" and "Numbers" (released in 1975) had a similar slant.

Nothing further was heard from Stevens until earlier this year when a live album, "Saturnight," recorded in Tokyo in 1974 was brought into this conutry and leaked to radio stations as a Japanese import. The lp, containing a dozen of his greatest hits, seemed to spark a new interest in Stevens and primed the public for "Izitso," released shortly after.

The first album produced by Stevens and David Kershenbaum, "Izitso," features a wide ranging line-up of musicians including Roger Hawkins, David Hood, Andy Newmark and Chick Corea. It is a return to the innocence and simplicity of his earlier Ips with songs like "I Never Wanted) To Be A Star" and ("Remember The Days Of) The Old Schoolyard" and previews this week on The Album Chart at a bulleted #79



Stirring Verismo from RCA

■ NEW YORK—What Harold C. Schonberg has often called the "Romantic Revival" is obviously upon us. Though some have claimed that Schonberg, the senior music critic of the New York Times, has willed the revival himself by so often writing about it, the public was obviously ready for it. Curiously, on records and in the opera house the revival has recently developed into an area not particularly a favorite of Schonberg's—the Italian verismo opera. This listener, on the other hand, finds the verismo works a mine of interesting and often moving lyric drama and certainly welcomes whatever appears.

A few weeks ago, RCA's new Andrea Chenier was discussed; rumbling from the stores indicates that London's new recording of Franco Leoni's L'Oracolo has taken off in sales like a comet. Coming up for release this week is an opera with an even more distinguished past, not yet slated for

revival. It should be on somebody's planning board, because it would be a splendid piece of theater and could, at least, internationally, be splendidly cast.

The opera is Italo Montemezzi's L'Amore dei Tre Re, a work from 1913, which had a distinguished history at the Metropolitan up until the advent of Rudolf Bing, in 1950. In a well-written and interesting liner note in RCA's new album, Washington Post music critic Paul Hume points out that Toscanini's careful hand at the Metropolitan Opera premiere in 1914 may well have been the reason for the opera's continued success there after Maestro's exit. The first Fiora was Lucrezio Bori, famed for much lighter roles; the Avito was not too well known, but the Manfredo was Pasquale Amato and the Archibaldo Adamo Didur. Soon thereafter, in Chicago, Mary Garden made the role of Fiora (Continued on page 64)



percentage of tape sales to disc over the last year: 26% this year, 20% last. "Obviously, more people in southern California are putting tape machines into their cars. 8-track sales are still good, especially in the rock area. Cassettes have the edge in more esoteric kinds of music."

Indeed, the west coast, retail wise, has seen a rise in cassette sales all over the last one year. Says Everybody's Records' Michael Reff: "The more discriminating buyer is becoming more aware that cassette is the way to go. Soundwise, well, it's simple: cassettes are just better."

Different types of music have varying degrees of success in tape configurations, depending, in large part, on geographic region. Retailers agreed that country music, for example, sold well, especially on 8-track, especially in the south. In the west, rock is the big 8-track seller, with a primarily teen (and pre-teen) consumer group. In the midwest, tape sales are heaviest with MOR and rock artists. Said Ira Heilicher, of the Pickwick Rack Services Divison: "The general rule of thumb, which has not changed in the last year, is that we do 30-35% of total sales on tape, both 8-track and cassette. There has been a small shift to cassette over the last year, but the increase has come at the expense of 8-tracks, and has not hiked up total tape sales."

How Much Breadth?

Pickwick, stated Heilicher. stocks 2700 cassette titles, 4000 in 8-track, and about 21000 album titles. What would happen if the company made more titles available on tape? "Luckily," said Heilicher, "the overmerchandising mania that is commonplace with albums has not reached the tape market. It would be crazy if the chart number mentality applied to tapes; we'd be overstocked, we'd have the same kind of returns problem as we do with records. I think the current ratio is excellent; if we went any higher with tapes it would be a little risky in terms of inventory."

Although tape and disc pricing is on its way to achieving parity. Heilicher noted that, in the past, consumers were "more cautious when purchasing tape." Still, in most retail instances, tape is more expensive, and "purchases, in tape, do not extend to anyone but the established artist. People just don't want to take chances, especially with the bigger investment. For that reason, I think, Greatest Hits packages do extremely well on tape, and have a longer life than discs." Heilicher also noted that comedy records are success-

ful in tape configurations: "Richard Pryor and George Carlin do terrific sales, I think because the automobile is a more private place, psychologically, and people like to listen to comedy in their cars."

A number of retailers, while enthused at possibilities of tape sales growth, remarked on the sometimes poor quality of the merchandise: "It wouldn't cost the manufacturer much more," said one east coast indie operator, "to use good quality tape in the cassettes. Right now, I think it's probably the cheapest available, and we get considerable defectives." Michael Reff agreed: "Defectives on albums now run us 3-5%, for tapes it's 5-10%, which is a lot."

Another problem with tapes is lack of information, according to retailers. "A discerning consumer," said a Discount Records manager, "wants information.

(Continued from page 3) coming a year and a half later. There were 17 outlets, total, but three were closed at the end of last year because "they weren't making any money," according to Orville and Louis Lambert, founders of Eucalyptus. "Expansion was just too fast," Louis Lambert told RW. "We knew we wanted growth, but the quickness of it all turned out not to make

as much sense as it could have." What happened, then, was that the Eucalyptus chain, characterized by Pennington as "more high-profit than volume," had its priorities turned around, and found itself trying to do a higher volume business than was necessary, just to keep up with the rapid expansion. Now, Pennington hopes to give the store, which has been admittedly foundering, a new direction. "Our locations are great," Pennington said. "In lots of places, most of them in fact, we're the only record store around. Last week I spent a lot of time talking to credit managers at all the labels, and I think we've got most of the problems straightened out. We're back on the track."

Louis and Orville Lambert will stay with Eucalyptus as co-general managers. Louis is going to Seattle, to oversee the New Dawn, Inc., distribution arm of Eucalyptus, Orville Lambert will concentrate on the Fairfield New Dawn branch operations. Pennington stressed the fact that he and the Lamberts are also looking for additional outside personnel to come into the Eucalyptus operation, "We want as much expertise as we can get," Pennington said.

When he buys a cassette or an 8-track, there's nothing. No liner notes, nothing. Manufacturers, I know, were investigating the possibilities of a fold-over booklet, but nothing ever happened."

A good barometer of the cassette vs. 8-track climate is blank tape sales. Right now, retailers agreed that cassette blanks were outselling 8-tracks 10-1. Those blank cassettes are filled with home-taped music, which obviates the consumer's need for the purchase of pre-recorded cassettes. Recently, Music Odyssey, an independent retailer in Los Angeles, had success with a buyfor-taping program, in which its customers would get a refund on original purchase price when the records were returned after home taping. This practice, retailers agreed, was becoming increasingly popular, but primarily in the urban marketplace.

Sir Productions Prom. Medley and Zysblat

NEW YORK — Peter Rudge, president of Sir Productions, Inc., has announced that New York will become the mainstream for his worldwide corporations. In this regard, Mary Beth Medley, managing director of Sir West in Los Angeles, will relocate in New York and assume the position of vice president of artist affairs. Ms. Medley, who has been with Sir since its inception in 1973, will be responsible for overseeing all artists activities in Sirs' London, Los Angeles and New York offices.

Bill Zysblat, who joined Sir as chief financial officer in August of 1976, has been named comptroller of the international publishing companies of Cat Loose and Feelgood Music, as well as the newly established Rubber Records Ltd., whose debut artist, 38 Special, has just released their first album for A&M Records.

Columbia Raises List On Classical Albums

■ NEW YORK — Columbia Records has announced that due to continually increasing manufacturing and recording costs, the suggested list price of Classical lps will be raised one dollar to \$7.98, effective July 5.

The list price of some classical multiple sets and specially priced sets will be raised accordingly. There will be no change in the suggested list price of Odyssey lps. Columbia Classical eight-track and cassette tape suggested list price will not be affected by the price change—these remain at a \$7.98 suggested retail list price.

(Continued from page 8) play and empty jackets for display purposes."

Crockett concluded his remarks by telling the audience that the major labels provide the best possible example of how to sell reccords. If their example is followed, he added, and their techniques employed on a scale that makes sense for the independent, "there is no reason why the smaller labels cannot continually increase their share of the market and continue to be financially healthy."

According to NAIRD publicity chairman Bruce Iglauer, president of Alligator Records, the convention's workshops were designed to help the independents function more effectively by sharing information on a variety of common problems facing small record companies, "If we can help people out by showing them where the walls we ran into are, then maybe we make their jobs a little easier, and that's what we're trying to do here. The point about small record companies is that we're not really in competition, because when you think about it if one of us succeeds, we all do."

John Bertrand, a member of the Service Corps of Retired Executives (SCORE), advised the attendants of the workshop on finance that as small businessmen they were entitled to low interest loans guaranteed in part by the Small Business Administration (SBA), of which SCORE is a part. Bertrand told the gathering that they should "take advantage of the availability of SBA money because it is one of the least expensive ways to get financing for a small business." He explained, however, that the loans are made in conjunction with local banks and "therefore it behooves the potential loan applicant to create a good relationship with his banker. In practical terms this means keeping a good balance and providing the bank with an annual statement whether it is requested or not."

The convention's best attended workshop was on starting a new label and provided a forum for the discussion of both the advantages and disadvantages in starting an esoteric label. The discussion included problems in mastering, duplication, album graphics and production. Workshop chairman Bob Koester, president of Delmark Records summed up the attitudes of the convention's participants saying, "Despite the enormous technical and financial problems of trying to sell esoteric product, we can put out only the music we really like and deal with only the people we get along with. Certainly that is not the case with the major companies.

LIVE! AT THE STAR-CLUB IN HAMBURG, GERMANY; 1962

THE BEATLES—Bellaphon BLS 5560 (Germany) With the court battles out of the way, this album has already been released in Germany and Britain. There are 26 tracks, half of which were never before heard (including "Little Queenie" and "Talkin' 'Bout You"). The quality of the recording may be uneven-sometimes crude, but it stands as an important historical document.

EROTIC NEUROTIC

THE SAINTS—EMI 062-82359 (U.K.)
Australia's contribution to the new wave may have been fostered in the relative isolation of the country, but the group is no less volatile for it. The single, "(I'm) Stranded," which was harkened last year as one of the very best of its kind hinted at what was to come from the foursome and it has been more than delivered with a set that includes a torrid version of Elvis' "Kissin' Cousins."

MIRAGE

KLAUS SCHULZE—Island ILPS 9461 (U.K.)

Schulze is currently enjoying his biggest success to date with the import of the soundtrack to "Body Love." His latest synthesized pastiche, however, should go a long way in establishing him as one of the world's foremost composers of electronic music. His "Velvet Voyage" and "Crystal Lake" sides are state of the art works.

BURLESQUE-Arista ARTY 151 (U.K.)

An unusual debut by this group in that their album was recorded live, but it is on the concert stage where the satirical nature of their lyrics are best expressed. While the music at times suffers from a thin sound, the lyrics of the title song and "Lana Turner" best represent the group and the high acclaim it has garnered.

RATTUS NORVEGICUS

THE STRANGERS-UA 30045 (U.K.)

The most successful of the groups comprising England's new wave, their Ip entered the top five in the U.K. after only two weeks. The group's songs (especially "London Lady" and "[Get A] Grip [On Yourself]") are the main strengths, with a sound reminiscent of the Doors.

FOREPLAY

SAHB (WITHOUT ALEX)-Mountain TOPC 5006

Like the Glitter Band without Gary, the Sensational Alex Harvey Band without Alex plays a perfunctory and competent program of songs but lacks the spark generally ignited by the absent frontman. Originally a group that went by the name Tear Gas, they are sharp on their own but lack personality.

WHITE SNAKE

DAVID COVERDALE-Attic LAT 1026 (Canada)

Coverdale is the young singer who re-placed Ian Gillan in Deep Purple. With this first solo album since the dissolution of the group, he unveils a gravelly Paul Rodgers/Frankie Miller type of delivery which has a striking effect over a set dominated by his bluesy, mid-tempo songs. MIDNIGHT LIGHT

LE BLANC & CARR—Big Tree BT 89521 (Atl.) (6.98)

The first album by the duo of singer Lenny LeBlanc and guitarist Pete Carr, two veterans of the Muscle Shoals studio family, is a solid rock outing. The group has composed some engaging melodies, most of which are in the lighter vein. Holland-Dozier-Holland's 'Something About You" gets things off to a strong start.

STAND ON THE POSITIVE SIDE

PAUL KELLY—Warner Bros. BS 3026 (6.98)

Kelly has a smooth and sophisticated sound with southern roots. Gene Page arranged and produced the set, which ranges from soft, soulful sounds to orchestral arrangements and occasional gospel overtones. A fine line-up of studio musicians, including Ray Parker, Jr., Wilton Felder and James Gadson packs a potent punch.

BLOWIN'

THE JESS RODEN BAND-Island ILPS 9496 (6.98)

Roden's last couple of albums were never released in this country, but this live Ip with his big, seven man group brings things up to date. The Temptations' "Can't Get Next To You" is a good indication of his soulful leanings while the other group contributions maintain a high standard.

SO FAR SO GOOD

JOHN MARTYN—Island ILPS 9484 (6.98)

Martyn's idiosyncratic styling has developed over the course of nine albums. The liner notes to this compilation of tracks from three of his lps describes him as "having an aptitude for taking risks," a point brought out here by his treatment of Skip James' "I'd Rather Be The Devil."

THIS CLOSE TO YOU

LUTHER—Cotillion SD 9916 (Atlantic) (6.98)

One of the bright new emerging talents in the r&b field, Luther Vandross has produced, written and sings all songs on his second Ip. Showing an affinity for ballads with the title song and "This Is For Real," he hits emotional heights and carries the momentum throughout the record.

SIMPLY CARRIE

CARRIE LUCAS-Soul Train BVL1-2220 (RCA) (6.98)

With an engaging and at times sultry voice, Lucas opens her debut Ip with a rousing disco-styled "I Gotta Keep Dancing." The tempo is modified with the ballad "Me For You" which shows the song-stress' ability at handling diverse material. Instrumental support is provided by some seasoned sessionmen.

FALLIN' OFF THE EDGE

THE SEEDS-GNP Crescendo GNPS 2107 (6.98)

There are no liner notes accompanying this album, but it appears to be new recordings by the group. A new version of "Pushin' Too Hard," which remains very faithful to the original highlights, while the remaining ten tracks have a time capsule effect. The title song was produced by Kim Fowley.





her own, and Hume points out that Miss Garden used to lie on the bier all during the third act so that she could act "even in death." Claudio Muzio sang the role later at the Met, and Rosa Ponselle was famous for it although she apparently sang it only four times. Fiora is a wonderful part and one wonders first why Maria Callas never sang it (the answer no doubt is that the aforementioned romantic revival had not occurred when the soprano was singing; verismo meant Puccini Cav/Pug and Andrea Chenier, and Miss Callas had quite enough to do in revivifying the whole bel canto school) and second why Renata Scotto does not now sing it.

Hume mentions that Virgilio Lazzari was the great Archibaldo; it must have been wonderful also to hear Ezio Pinza as the old, blind king, a role magnificently suited to any great singing actor. The other roles are equally full. One question may be why Caruso did not sing the first Avito; the role is certainly big enough and would have lain well for him. And most baritones would also enjoy Manfredo; he has a beautiful arioso and several moving scenes.

Benelli Is Source

The opera is a direct transfer to the stage of a hugely popular play by Sam Benelli. An old blind king, Archibaldo, had conquered Italy, called Alturia, some 40 years before, and recently had forced the princess of the previous rulers, Fiora, to marry his son, Manfredo. She at the time was in love with her fellow Alturian, Avito. In the first act the old king almost surprises Fiora and Avito together; he fails, and she coolly greets her returning husband, who is obviously madly in love with her. In the second act, Manfredo goes back to war, sadly taking leave of Fiora and asking her to wave a scarf from the balcony as he disappears in the distance (a reverse echo, of course, of Tristan). Avito comes in and although she waves to Manfredo for a while, she forgets. Lost in her passion with Avito, she does not hear Archibaldo as he comes in, and this time even though Avito runs away, Archibaldo knows Fiora was with a lover. He demands the name, goads her and when she defies him that she has a lover, he strangles her. His son returns worried about why Fiora stopped waving the scarf and finds her dead. In the final scene Avito returns to the corpse, kisses her and is poisoned. The old blind king had cleverly poisoned her lips. Avito dies and Manfredo, who even now cannot hate him

because he loved Fiora so much,

kisses her lips and dies too, leaving only Archibaldo to live in

Montemezzi did not have Giordano's, much less Puccini's, melodic gift, but he was inventive, clever in harmony and knew how to orchestrate; he also had learned a lot from Wagner and Puccini. The result is a brilliantly colored score with some excellent leitmotifs and very expressive music. This is not a theater opera with background music; the score is passionate, full-blown and exciting with more than a few suggestions of Tristan. But one does want here and there more expressive melody to flesh out the arias. Still, the love duets were brilliant. With the right cast, this should be a tremendously successful opera onstage.

Particularly wonderful is the role of the old blind king, and in RCA's new recording Cesare Siepi is nothing short of marvelous. His voice easily encompasses the high notes, and the famous low E flat at the end of Act II is thrilling. His characterization of the old man as filled with passion, hate and blood revenge for the harm done his son is gripping. Vocally, he sounds wonderful, with the patina of age in his voice exactly right for Archibaldo. Siepi is too poorly represented on records for a singer who cut such a large swath across the world; this is a fine testament.

Elvira Impressive

In his first major role on records the N.Y. City Opera, baritone Pablo Elvira shows a clear, wellfocussed voice as Manfredo. His conclusion to Act I is thrillingly passionate. The role is peculiar in that the singer is constantly around high F and G; Elvira has

no trouble. If the end of Act II which is dramatic recitative, could be more exciting, the fault is a combinaton of Montemezzo's and the baritone's youth.

Ideal Role

Though Placido Domingo is not at his freshest as Avito, he still is ideal for the role. He does not quite get into the part until the big second act Love Duet, with its echoes in structure of the Tristan duet, but there his high notes ring out and the sensuality of the voice is employed to great effect. The final aria is magnificent. If one did not know what Domindo could do, this would be great. As it is, it is first class, but the Spanish tenor could bring even more to the role.

As Fiora, Anna Moffo does her best work in a long time on records. The opening scene is not strong; she seems to be reading the lines and there is little if any passion and a few vocal problems. In her major scenes in Act II-the love duet and the confrontation with Archibaldo, however, she is fine indeed. Her B-flats and one extended B-natural ring true, and she supplies a lot of passion to the role.

Nello Santi does an adequate job with Montemezzi's brilliant orchestration. One would hope for more sensitivity in the more subtle moments, but where it counts, the orchestra is thrilling and supplies the appropriate heat. This album is a sure one to sell heavily; most opera buffs know that L'Amore dei Tre Re exists, but few have heard it. This is a fine introduction to a score that surely will appear somewhere in the United States before too many seasons have past. And why not soon, when Siepi can sing it?

■ TORONTO—GIMME TAX SHELTER DEPT.: Some corporate moves have been making news here. Standard Broadcasting, one of Canada's most successful chains of radio and television stations, has just acquired Eastern Sound Studios, where Elton John, Gordon Lightfoot and Anne Murray, among others, have laid down tracks. The acquisition was made by a Standard subsidiary, St. Clair Productions, which specializes in jingles and commercial spots. Another Standard subsidiary already owned VTR Productions, a film company located in the same building as Eastern. This will probably mean that the facility will concentrate more on jingles than record production in the future. Quality Records' branch distribution offices have been grouped under a new corporate name, Metrodisc Distributors. This new company will handle distribution of all Quality product and its licensed lines while Taylor, Pearson & Carson will continue to handle the quality lines in British Columbia and Alberta. GRT in Canada has a new VP of marketing in Gord Edwards, a man who certainly knows his way around the record distribution business. GRT has also picked up distribution of Dick James Music in Canada, which will remain in the hands of Amherst in the U.S. DJM is probably best known for Johnny "Guitar" Watson, whose two DJM album releases have both sold over 400,000 units in the U.S.

BMI Canada recently held their annual awards banquet and honored the following: Hagood Hardy, Ken Tobias, Burton Cummings, Randy Bachman, Domenic Troiano, Ray Materick and George Thurston, whose "Boule Noire" (Black Ball) is a popular favorite in Quebec and received mentions in Rolling Stone, an achievement for any Quebecois artist.

While Concert Productions International and Donald K. Donald Productions have already lined up summer tours for Blue Oyster Cult, Todd Rundgren, Supertramp and Kiss, CPI is also planning a series of outdoor shows during the summer which are being billed as the greatest entertainment package on the planet. Not usually given to hyperbole, CPI may be hard pressed to live up to the promises. Only time will tell. Music Shoppe International has signed a dozen acts for exclusive representation, including the much-touted Sweetheart, who are recording some demos for consideration by WEA. FM, the two man multi-media show, is now a trio with the addition of Martin (Continued on page 71)

GERMANY

■ FRANKFURT—Bellaphon Records chief Branco Zivanovic has scored another coup by landing most of the BASF catalogue, much of which had supposedly already been transferred to other companies. Zivanovic worked out a deal with BASF's Ludwig Vondersand which gives the Frankfurt firm immediate control of some 700 recordings, many of them classical. The BASF classics, together with material recently acquired from French Decca, gives new Bellaphon classical chief Otto Gerdes a substantial basic catalogue. Gerdes says negotiations are underway with many former BASF artists for future Bellaphon recordings. With the addition of Casablanca, Chelsea and now BASF, plus The Beatles Star-Club album, this has been a very good year so far for Bellaphon. Despite bad reviews for its sound quality, over 350,000 copies of the Beatles set have been sold, many of them export. Overall, Zivanovic expects a minimum 50 percent jump in the company's 1977 sales, made possible by boosting capacity at Bellaphon's pressing and duplication facilities.

K-Tel German general manager Jens R. Boldt estimates his firm loses over \$7 million in sales annually due to record piracy, especially product smuggled in from Italy. K-Tel is not the only victim; the German Phonograph Industry Association considers the problem so acute it has hired a detective to track down the pirates. But with cooperation from wholesalers and retailers lagging, Boldt and K-Tel are offering a reward of 100 recordings (retail value about \$800) to dealers who provide information leading to the arrest of those involved in piracy.

Other signings this week take Caravan to Arista after conclusion of a deal with BTM, and first release on their new label is an album and single, both titled "Better By Far," produced by Tony Visconti; Paul Brett to RCA, which will immediately re-issue his "Earth Birth" suite for solo 12 string guitar album, previously released on his own privately distributed label; gives Norman Beaton, star of "The Fosters" TV series, his debut outing on Calendar Records with "Family Man;" and takes John & Johanna Hall's Siren Songs to April Music for U.K. representation.

10cc leaders Eric Stewart and Graham Gouldman have announced the reformation of the group after Lol Creme and Kevin Godley left late last year. New members are Paul Burgess (drums), who participated on previous 10cc live performances as well as on their "Deceptive Bends" album; Tony O'Malley (keyboards), ex-Kokomo; Rick Fen (guitar) and Stuart Tosh (drums), formerly with Pilot.

Arista launched Neil Innes' "Taking Off" album at a party held in his honor at Ronnie Scott's club. Innes performed a selection of titles from the album which opens with "I've Got My Hand Up The Skirt Of Mother Nature," and announced plans for a "world tour" which takes him as far as two nights at London's Nashville Rooms later in the week!

Also "taking off" is Jet Records, whose entire catalogue is re-launched by United Artists along with a massive promotion campaign during June. First off is ELO's new single, "Telephone Line," followed (Continued on page 71)

ITALY

■ Only a month after the celebration of the San Remo Song Festival, more than one million records of the participating songs have been sold throughout Italy. The group Matia Bazar is ahead in sales although they did not finish in the top three at the Festival . . . An agreement has been reached between Ediciones Ricordi Musica Ligera and Carlos Santana's Light Music. Ricordi will represent the Santana catalogue, starting with the "Amigos" album. Ricordi also concluded deals at the recent MIDEM to represent the catalogues of the Beach Boys, Judy Collins, Boz Scaggs, Keith Carradine, Kris Kristofferson, Jefferson Airplane, Hot Tuna and others.

Arista has re-signed with EMI for distribution in Italy . . . The Brazilian song "Moca" is a big hit here, sung in Italian by Brazil's new idol Wando. The other versions of the song have been released, including one by Marcella and another by Cristiano Malgioglio, one of the authors of the Italian lyrics.

The performances of Astor Piazolla at the Paris Olympia are becoming better each time. He's the first Argentinean artist in many years to achieve recognition in that country . . . CBS Sugar has printed the first edition of their monthly magazine "Descorriere." The magazine is produced directly by the record company to promote their artists.

As in North America, the Italian market is reacting to the release of the "Superdisco" 12 inch singles . . . Also doing well here is "Cin Cin Pon Pon," a children's song from Japan's 19th Festival of Zecchino D'Oro.

It looks to be about the size of a "Barbie" doll, in height that is, and about the size of Dolly herself in upper strata circumference—and one can just glance at it and think of nine dozen on-air promotions which could well become the talk of the town. The doll comes with what they call her "show" costume, which is a very modest affair, and there are available a couple of other changes of outfits. I haven't taken it out of the box yet, so I don't really know whether it will stand alone—or tip forward. Anyway, if you need some, at wholesale, drop me a note and I'll put you in touch with a company which can supply them for about \$5.00 each.

It appears that WCOP (Boston) will definitely drop its country format, and that **Bob Knight** will remain with the station as PD...WDEE (Detroit) has been sold by Globe to Combined, and the Bayliss folks (Combined) are saying there won't be any format changes...**Dean Hallam** at WFEC (Harrisburg) is looking for an air personality for the station...**Karl Shannon** at WBIR-FM (Knoxville) is accepting tapes and resumes...**Big John Trimble** is off and running at WRVA (Richmond)...WIOD (Miami) has a new GM in the person of **Bill Viands** and hopefully there will be no change in the night-time country programming...**Jim Healy** of KLAC (L.A.) has been tapped as Best Sportscaster for the second year in a row by the Greater L.A. Press Club.

The wild-eyed, feared fiends from OSHA have caused not a small amount of concern in several areas of the broadcast industry, particularly in their unannounced appearances and incredible amount of paper work. A new piece of legislation introduced by John Stennis (D-Miss.) would "restrain and curb many of the excesses of the agency." It would exempt all employers of 25 employees or less, and secondly, will make the act more flexible for all employers and provide some relief from the arbitrary rules and regulations. While the broadcaster as an individual industry operative has not been hit nearly as hard as many—an example would be the ridiculous ruling of one obviously highly intelligent and well-versed inspector who ruled that cowboys, or is that cowpersons, must be provided with sanitary toilet facilities on the open range—any additional paper work from Big Brother is less than welcome. I would imagine that the legislation would have a better than average chance for passage, if Congress is at all responsive to the reported hundreds of thousands of complaints from constituents.

CMF Elects New Board Members

■ NASHVILLE—In their quarterly meeting held May 6, the board of trustees of the Country Music Foundation elected several new members and re-elected many current members. In addition, they made plans for future growth at the Country Music Foundation, which is the non-profit organization that administers the Country Music Hall of Fame and the Country Music Foundation Library and Media Center.

Frank Jones was re-elected as chairman of the board, while Bill Lowery was elected as its new president. Joining Lowery as new board members were Jim Fogelsong as vice president and Don Gant as secretary.

Returning to the CMF board in executive capacities were Brad McCuen as executive vice president, Roy Horton and Pee Wee King as vice presidents, and Joe Talbot as treasurer.

In addition to Jones, other board trustees include Grelun Landon, Frances Preston, Bill Denny, Connie B. Gay, Dorothy Owens, Wesley Rose, Bud Wendell, Joe Talbot, and Mike Milom, legal council. Executive director of the Country Music Foundation is William Ivey.

Also discussed at the meeting were various programs and plans for the future of the CMF and the Hall of Fame and Museum. Among the items discussed were plans for the creation of a small newsletter to the music industry as one means among many by which the Country Music Foundation can develop a closer relationship with artists and executives within the music industry.

In addition, priorities for new exhibits for the recently remodeled and expanded Hall of Fame were discussed, including a revision of the area of the Museum which is the Hall of Fame itself.
