

New Pact with Kirshner Entertainment Expands (BS's Music Publishing Strength

NEW YORK — CBS Records and Kirshner Entertainment have formed a new music publishing company, it was announced last week by CBS president Walter Yetnikoff and Don Kirshner. The deal, which involves the present Kirshner publishing catalogue, ifs staff of writers and future activities of Don Kirshner Music (BMI) and Kirshner Songs (ASCAP), is a first for CBS, which has never before gone into an independent music publishing partnership.

Formation of the company, to be known as Kirshner/CBS Music Publishing, represents a major thrust by the corporation into the territory of copyrights, royalties and songwriting. Yetnikoff's comments about the new partnership bear this out: "This new agreement with Don Kirshner," he said last week, "is the most important move we have made in the music publishing field and is a major part of our long term plans for growth. Don Kirshner's extraordinary record of success in all segments of the entertainment industry with over 20 years as a leading figure in music publishing will bring a high degree of expertise to this new undertaking."

The new company will be managed by Kirshner people under Kirshner executive VP Herb Moelis in conjunction with Rick Smith, vice president and general manager of April/Black-

wood, CBS Records' music publishing arm. "We are running our own ship—completely independent," Don Kirshner told Record World last week, explaining that the relationship with CBS is comparable in organizational philosophy to the one enjoyed by CBS' custom labels. "This is not just a holding company situation—it will be a creative situation," he added. "They respect what I'm doing, and they're letting me do it."

Kirshner is exuberant about what he calls "the incredibly far-reaching implications of this partnership for the music business and publishing in particular. I am proud and honored that this great record company—they've kind of chosen me, they want to get into publishing in a big way and their putting their (Continued on page 34)

Tax Reform Bill Stretches Deadline For Deduction of Record Returns

■ WASHINGTON—The 1978 Tax Reform Bill, passed last week by the Congress and awaiting the signature of President Carter, contains some important relief provisions concerning the time period in which record companies can deduct returns from annual sales.

Although the House version of the tax bill contains no such provisions, the Senate version featured a section of vital concern to the industry—a time allowance of four months, fifteen days beyond the calendar year for record companies to include deductions for returns.

Compromise

The House, according to IRS officials who have paste-up copies of the yet-to-be-signed bill, met in conference with the Senate just

as the Congress adjourned, and went along with many of the Senate provisions in order to secure passage of the bill.

White House officials feel confident the President will sign the bill, even though many of his pet provisions were watered down or even excised.

One conceptual aspect of the bill was of great help to the passage of the time extension feature—a Congressional commitment to lower not only individual taxes, but business and investment taxes as well.

Accrual Method

Under present tax law, record companies, along with publishers of magazines and paperbacks, all of which use the so-called "accrual" method of determining sales deductions, could only deduct returned merchandise within the bounds of a calendar year. This had been looked upon by the industry as a prohibitive and unfair situation, especially considering the amount of sales generated at the very end of the year during the Christmas season.

(Both NARM and RIAA were instrumental in forging a grass-roots movement within the Industry to inform Congressmen of the issue.)

Structure

Named to the post by corporate president and chief operating officer Sid Sheinberg, Bergamo will head a branch system that will, he says, somewhat resemble WEA in its corporate relationship to MCA and its MCA Records and Infinity Records divisions.

"There are 19 locations," he explained, alluding to MCA's existing warehouses and sales offices. "All of those offices will report to my office, as will the manufacturing sites." While Bergamo himself will report directly

CBS, Jet Sue Again Over ELO Product Sale



■ NEW YORK—CBS and Jet Records filed suit last Monday (16) to stop the sale by a New Jersey company of more than 1.2 million Electric Light Orchestra albums and tapes which CBS and Jet claim are their property.

The suit, filed in the Chancery division of the New Jersey Superior Court, charges that Promo Records, a budget-product distributor, and Morris Levy, its president, purchased from United Artists Records the 865,000 ELO lps and 380,000 tapes which are the subject of a pending CBS-Jet lawsuit against UA.

CBS and Jet claim that those records and tapes, all copies of ELO's "Out of the Blue," are (Continued on page 77)

Styx (A&M) "Blue Collar Man (Long Nights)." The group's latest disc is showing excellent action as it keeps pulling in the heavies, with good sales acvity reported.

Warner Comm. Reports Income, Revenue Marks

■ NEW YORK — Warner Communications Inc. last week reported record third quarter revenues, net income and earnings per share. Revenues and net income were the highest for any quarter in the company's history.

Fully diluted earnings per share from continuing operations were \$1.32, up 20 percent from \$1.10 in the same period last year. Income rose 27 percent from \$15,-621,000 to \$19,802,000; revenues rose 16 percent from \$272,853,-000 to \$316,563,000.

Revenues for WCI's recorded music and music publishing division climbed 15 percent, from \$119,947,000 in the third guarter of 1977 to \$137,379,000 in the period ended Sept. 30. Operating income for the division was up only one percent, from \$17,158,-000 to \$17,303,000. WCI chairman Steven J. Ross attributed the decline in profit margin to "an increase in promotional and advertising expenditures required to launch a wide variety of new artists."

Earnings Per Share

For the nine months ended Sept. 30, WCI earnings per share rose 12 percent, from \$3.36 to \$3.77; income rose 16 percent from \$47,973,000 to \$55,858,000; and revenues rose 21 percent from \$745,893,000 to \$904,427,-000. All represent highest-ever levels for the company.

Casablanca Sales Hit **All-Time High in '78**

■ LOS ANGELES — Casablanca Record and FilmWorks president Neil Bogart has announced that domestic gross sales for the company's record division reached an all time high of 102 million dollars in fiscal 1978. The announcement was made at the Casablanca - Polygram board meeting held October 6 at the U.N. Plaza Hotel in New York City.

In making the announcement, Bogart emphasized that this figure does not reflect revenues for the company's motion picture, television, music and book publishing and international record divisions. The 102 million dollar mark represents a 176% growth over last year's figure.

Platinum LPs

The last quarter of fiscal '78 was highlighted by the platinum certification of each of the four Kiss Ips, plus platinum certified sales of Donna Summer's new two-record set, "Live and More." Certified gold is Village People's latest album, "Cruisin'," which (Continued on page 88)



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
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Kenny Loggins' Solo Breakthrough Takes Team Effort

■ NEW YORK—The current success of Kenny Loggins as a solo artist defies the notion that once a duo breaks up, the individual members fade into oblivion. With Loggins' new single "Whenever I Call You 'Friend'" standing at #6 on RW's Singles Chart, and his latest album, "Nightwatch," nearing platinum, Columbia executives, along with Loggins and his manager, discussed the manner in which Loggins has escalated into national recognition as a solo artist.

As a former member of Loggins and Messina, the task before Columbia was to reveal to the public that Loggins was viable, not only as a solo recording artist, but also as a performer. Commenting upon Loggins' association with Loggins and Messina, VP of artist development Arma Andon said, "We weren't starting with an unknown. Kenny had a tremendous following and history. Before the group broke up, they were playing 20,000 seat halls." Cognizant of the problems of establishing a group artist who has gone solo, Andon continued, "The reason artists fade after going solo is largely due to poor management, and the lack of a strong follow up record. In Loggins' case, we had his life planned from six months to a year."

One of Columbia's major goals in breaking Loggins was to hook him up with the right tour, thereby exposing him to as many people as possible. Opening for the Fleetwood Mac tour in 1977 set the stage for Loggins' first solo lp "Celebrate Me Home," and also established Loggins as a viable solo performer. Larry Larson, who has managed Loggins since 1971, explained, "Although we didn't headline the Fleetwood tour, we were assured of 100 per cent attendance, without the obligation of selling tickets."

Bob Sherwood, VP of national promotion noted, "Kenny's success is due in no small part to Kenny. Not only did he produce a top ten lp, and prove that he could deliver it live, but he also became very involved with the company and promotion of his album. He realizes that he has to work for his career, and he's very accessible." Describing Loggins as "the best to work with," Sherwood also commented, "If you see Loggins perform, you know that he really puts out on stage, and I've never known him to refuse to talk to people after a performance. This is not the case with many artists."

Discussing his involvement with the promotion of "Night-

watch," Loggins said, "Going solo meant extending my involvement with the record company even further. I helped design the advertising copy so it would reflect my music, and I also designed the album cover so it would reflect mystery and intrigue, not the happy smiling boy from southern California of Loggins and Messina."

The departure from the southern California genre of music, according to Loggins, was more a reflection of the expansion of his music than a change of image. Consequently, it was Columbia's intention to maintain Loggins' image, visually and personally. "We all knew that Log-gins had mass appeal," said Ron McCarrell, VP of merchandising, "because of his history with Messina." Sherwood also commented upon Columbia's thrust to promote Loggins as a solo artist, as opposed to changing his image. "I'm leery of packaged images," said Sherwood, "so I concentrated on Loggins as an individual. At times, this presented some difficult times for me. For example, the single off of Loggins' first album was particularly hot in Cincinnati; so big, that they were fighting for us to release a Loggins and Messina song, 'Danny's Song.' The song

Wes Farrell Bows New Publishing Firms

■ LOS ANGELES — Wes Farrell, who sold his music publishing organization in June 1977, has re-entered the music publishing field.

Following two months of preparation and organization, Farrell has formed two new music companies, Wescraft (BMI) and Bullhorn (ASCAP).

Farrell's new companies already have acquired approximately 100 songs for motion pictures, television and commercials. Among the represented composers are Leslie Bricusse, Bob Merrill, Bradford Craig and Farrell himself.

Management personnel still are being hired, Farrell said, and their names will be announced within the next few weeks.

Grease: Platinum Single

LOS ANGELES—"Grease," the second single released from the RSO double-lp soundtrack to the original motion picture "Grease," has been certified platinum by the RIAA. With the platinum certification of "Grease," performed by Frankie Valli and written and produced by Barry Gibb, RSO Records has achieved a total of five platinum singles in the first ten months of 1978.

was a hit, but it would have meant putting out a single that was a Loggins and Messina collaboration. It wouldn't have been good for Loggins' career, so 1 turned it down. It's a tough decision to turn a record down that's a hit, at least in call-outs." Sherwood went on to say that he was even slightly reluctant about releasing "Whenever I call you 'Friend"." "Once again," said Sherwood, "we had the situation of a two-man show because of Stevie Nicks' participation in the song, but the song was so hot that we went for it. When you have a hit song, it breaks all radio format barriers. Knowing we had a hit, we pushed it to all formats, and the song came through." McCarrell commented that a special advertising campaign had been instituted to promote the single as well, particularly in the trades and tip sheets.

New Single With a new single a matter of weeks away, continued back-up tours by Loggins, and a major media blitz planned around Loggins' tour dates, Columbia executives view Loggins' national recognition and album sales to be on the increase. "The most outstanding thing about this project," said McCarrell, "was that Loggins delivered a dynamite album, and that's given us the edge. Anything we've done has simply complemented the record because the music was there."

Casablanca Taps Rosen As Promotion Vice Pres.

■ LOS ANGELES—Bruce Bird, executive vice president of Casablanca Record and FilmWorks, has announced the appointment of Howard Rosen, national promotion director, to the post of vice president of promotion.

Rosen, an eight-year veteran of the music industry, who has been affiliated with Casablanca for the past year and a half, fills the post held by Bird prior to his appointment as executive vice president.

ABC Names Moyers N.Y. Branch Manager

■ LOS ANGELES—Arnie Orleans, vice president of sales and merchandising, has announced the appointment of Henry Moyers to the position of branch manager, ABC, New York. In addition, Moyers will retain his duties as east coast regional manager for ABC Records.

Friday The 13th Sees 3 Promo Shifts

■ LOS ANGELES—Even skeptics were forced to ponder Friday the 13th's legendary perils as top promotion posts at three labels were simultaneously vacated last week.

First, RCA Records displaced promotion VP Ray Anderson in an apparent restructuring of that label's promotion hierarchy. As Anderson was reportedly mulling over his options with the company in another, as yet unspecified post, Epic's national promotion director, Jim Jeffries, departed his position, while Gary Davis, most recently VP, promotion, publicity and artist development for ABC Records, likewise exited his office.

Replacements?

Although unrelated, those three shifts also triggered other personnel changes while generating industry speculation over possible successors for Jeffries and Davis.

Anderson's plans remained under wraps at press time, but an official RCA statement explained the deletion of his prior office as a structural realignment, reporting, "The position

of division vice president of promotion is being discontinued at RCA. Ray Anderson is currently discussing future plans with the management of the company." Also affected by the move are national promotion director Michael Abramson, who had reported to Anderson's west coast-based office, and is now expected to assume a merchandising slot overseeing RCA and Grunt acts in the west, and west coast regional promotion director Allen Meis, who has left the label.

Meanwhile, E/P/A is said to be looking first at its own staffers for Jeffries' successor, while former ABC VP Davis attributed his move to "a difference in philosophies" between his office and the rest of the label's management team. Davis, who joined ABC last year as VP in charge of promotion and sales, was subsequently given added duties over marketing and creative services, only to have his post again shuffled to its most recent configuration of promotion, publicity and artist development responsibilities.


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'Grease' Scores Fifteenth Week on Top; **Billy Joel Secures Chartmaker Honors**

■ Album chart positions in the top 10 vary little from last week, with the soundtrack from "Grease" (RSO) retaining the

#1 spot for the 15th consecutive week. The Rolling Stones (Rolling Stones) pick up a spot, drawing

sales curve into what could be a relatively long peak period. Last week it dropped from #5 to #6; this week the sales reports indicate just the opposite movement with a #5 bullet. Styx (A&M) moves up a spot to #6 bullet with good sales on a climbing single, as well as a good retail/rack sales mix indicating a broad base. Donna Summer (Casablanca), going from #9 to #8 bullet, and Funkadelic (Warner Bros.) the week's only entry into the top 10 at #10 bullet, share broad-based, retail and rack

Other top 10's include #2 Boston (Epic), #3 Ronstadt (Asylum), and #4 Foreigner (Atlantic), all unchanged in chart position from last week. The Who (MCA) drops two places to #7, with Fogelberg & Weisberg (Full Moon/Epic) down a notch to #9.

The top 100 this week include 38 bullets. Ashford & Simpson (Warner) exhibit strong r&b sales and strong crossover account movement in climbing to #17 bullet. Chicago (Col), #18 bullet, adds more rack to its solid retail base, playing off a single. Yes (Atlantic), #19 bullet, continues strong retail sales, as does Al Stewart (Arista) at #24 bullet. Gino Vannelli (A&M), #28 bullet, moves up on all levels, helped by a single, similar to

Billy Joel (Col), Chartmaker of the Week, centers at #39 bullet with huge retail sales. Retailers are apparently confident looking at

Anne Murray (Capitol), #35 bullet.

his last lp. Last week's Chartmaker, Neil Young at #44 bullet, continues to build steady growth. Barry White (20th), #46 bullet, pushed by a strong r&b single, has strong r&b account lp sales, as well as continuing support from pop accounts. Switch (Gordy) is crossing over to main-stream accounts at #47 bullet. Jethro Tull (Chrysalis) at #48 bullet is staying strong on all levels with noticeable increase on retail. Waylon Jennings (RCA), #49 bullet, shows solid rack sales in moving to the top of the country lp chart. Player (RSO) is #50 bullet, on mostly retail. Washington (Motown) at #52 bullet has a broad base. Village People (Casablanca), #53 bullet, is climbing faster than the #55, with strong rack and retail.

Nick Gilder (Chrysalis), with the #1 single, climbs to #57 bullet. Pockets (Col) is at #61 bullet, on primarily retail activity with a broadening base. At #65 bullet is Weather Report (Arc/ Col) with similarly broad-based sales. The "Wiz" (MCA) soundtrack is at #66 bullet with the movie vet to explode. Gil Scott-Heron & Brian Jackson (Arista) is at #67 bullet with strong r&b and jazz levels, Ace Frehley (Casablanca) is #69 bullet on strong rack and solid retail, with Paul Stanley #70 bullet, and #71 bullet Peter Criss, also Casablanca Kiss stablemates, on close levels.

Bee Gees Sampler Album Uterano Promoted Spotlights Group as Writers

By PAT BAIRD

■ NEW YORK — Stigwood Music, Brothers Gibb Music and Unichappell Music have launched an extensive joint campaign to support the international release of the first Bee Gees' publishing sampler album. The disc, entitled "The Words and Music of Maurice Gibb, Barry Gibb and Robin Gibb," contains portions of 50 songs from the Gibb catalogue and is geared to spotlight the three as songwriters, as opposed to a performing unit.

According to Irwin Schuster, vice president, creative at Chappell, the project has been in the works for more than a year, or "before the explosion happened," he explained. "We felt now was the time to get it on and get it out. It had to be done because their success as songwriters has been amazing. Sometimes you lose sight of certain aspects of an artist's talent because one aspect shines so bright."

Eileen Rothschild, vice president of the Stigwood Group of Publishing Companies, explained that the 50 songs represented were selected from nearly one thousand written by the Gibbs during their 20 years in the music business and range from such early hits as "Holiday," "How Can You Mend A Broken Heart" and "New York Mining Disaster 1941" to the current "Grease," 1941" to the current "Night Fever" and "Stayin' Alive."

"They consider themselves songwriters first," Rothschild said. "This is a very special project for RSO as we hold them in the highest regard and we want their songs to get the attention they really deserve."

The album will be used as both a publishing and promotional tool and will be sent to producers, artists, record companies and press worldwide. Accompanying

the package will be a press kit containing a complete discography, selected cover list, award listing, biography and a sticker which matches the record's cover art. Some six to seven thousand packages will be made available.

"We think this package will answer the demand for people to hear both the songs they know well and those they are not familiar with," Rothschild said. According to RSO statistics, in a one-year period, Barry Gibb wrote or co-wrote nine songs that attained the #1 chart spots and held that position for 31 out of 58 weeks. He was also responsible for five out of the top ten songs two weeks in a row. The Bee Gees', as a writing unit, had the #1 and #2 songs for 12 consecutive weeks this year.

Since the next Bee Gees album isn't slated for release until sometime in the spring of 1979, Rothschild feels this sampler "will not compete with any new material."

The record is currently available and will be distributed in the U.S. through Chappell Music offices in New York, Los Angeles and Nashville. Chappell and Intersong offices around the world will distribute the albums internationally.



More Cities Seek 'Paraphernalia' Bans, Controls

By MIKE FALCON

■ LOS ANGELES—While record retailers are apparently enjoying a healthy share of the burgeoning paraphernalia sales market, a variety of governmental, religious and educationally-oriented associations are seeking to eliminate the display or sale of these products. Drug enhancement devices can account for up to 20 percent of a retail record store's business, and although figures of two to 10 percent are more common, the income generated by the high-profit items sometimes provides the small or discount record retailer with a means to battle the giant chains or simply stav afloat.

Not that the big chains ignore the paraphernalia market. It becomes difficult to ignore any item with a markups of 50 to 100 percent in the extremely competitive retail record field, especially when that item, and its related papers, bongs, bowls and mirrors account for \$1 billion to \$1½ billion in yearly sales.

Smoker Estimates

According to Sid Crown, managing editor of Paraphernalia Magazine, those figures are the best approximations possible. But he does take exception to another estimate: the 30,000,000 marijuana smokers who provide the paraphernalia industry with customers. "That's a government figure," says Crown, a 20-year Marine Corp officer who is now one of the major voices attempting to keep restrictive paraphernalia laws off the books. "Actually, I think it's probably twice that amount."

Governmental activity designed to halt paraphernalia sales centers on two aspects—harassment and legislation. While the harassment level varies according to each locale, it is often difficult to complain or prosecute real or imagined offenses in this area. "I guess you could say that we're

just visited a lot by policemen," said a record store manager in Alabama who asked his name not be mentioned in print. "They seem to like the paraphernalia section a lot, because they ask a lot of questions. I don't know whether you'd call it harassment or not, though. They never seem to bother anybody."

The laws take various forms in attempting to curtail the sale of the devices and papers, and often get immediate legal challenges from the retailers and their paraphernalia trade associations. Some of the more notable recent proposed or enacted laws in this area include:

- Illinois: a number of separately incorporated suburbs in the Chicago area have enacted statutes forbidding the sale of paraphernalia, including Palatine, Alsip, Mt. Prospect, Niles, St. Charles, Hoffman Estates, Buffalo Grove, Des Plaines and South Suburban Oaklawn. These towns typify the attempt by the relatively provincial communities to ban sales on what appear to be shaky Constitutional grounds, in that the statutes forbid the sale of items which are not illegal to possess. In Rainbow Holding Company vs. Palatine, the legal aspects of these laws should be tested on broad grounds.
- Georgia: Three laws were signed by Governor George Busby in April of this year. Two forbid the sale of paraphernalia devices. The third forbids the dissemination of literature that is "drug-related" to persons under 18 years of age. This last law has resulted in a state appeals judge granting a permanent injunction against enforcement of the stature, although the state is appealing this. The other paraphernalia laws, one for those over 18, the other for persons under that age, are being appealed in the U.S. Court of Appeals 5th Circuit, in High Ol'

Times (a head shop) vs. Busby. Attorney Reber Boult is optimistic about the outcome for High Ol' Times, but his assistant, attorney Bruce Molloy, points out that there are still prosecutions pending and that retailers sell paraphernalia with some risk.

· California: The City of Lakewood, which borders Long Beach, approved an ordinance that would ban paraphernalia to separate rooms or enclosures. Those customers under 18 would not be allowed entrance to the restricted areas. The measure is due for a second reading Oct. 24, and would become effective 30 days after that. Members of the Paraphernalia Trade Association, one of the two major industry organizations, will try to dissuade the Council from final approval, using a tactic they are employing outside the courts.

The P.T.A. and its members will attempt to convince the City Council that the legal expenses a small community would have to pay in defending their law would be an unreasonable burden on taxpayers, a particularly sensitive issue in California these days. "You could literally bankrupt a small city with legal hassles," observes Vaugham Ermoyan, publisher of Paraphernalia Magazine, "especially if you consider injunctive relief."

On the other end of the battle, however, the retailer finds himself caught between two desires. One, to keep clear of expensive legal costs, as a few retailers reportedly have already been driven out of business attempting to support extensive legal defenses. Two, to maximize the potential of this profit center in a tough market.

Although the P.T.A. and other trade alliances attempt to help the retailers with a \$50,000 legal defense war chest, it is impossible for them to defend every plaintiff with a good case. Instead, they have had to consolidate their efforts in an attempt to locate cases which will provide strong precedents, preferably in small communities.

Sometimes, the threat of a suit will mandate a compromise with a small community. Music Plus, a successful chain headquartered in Southern California, was threatened with revocation of a business license, as well as violations of the United States Tobacco Act by the City of Placentia in Orange County. When the management pointed out to local police that the federal act prohibitted only the sale of tobacco papers to persons under 18 in this case, and that a neighboring drugstore

also sold rolling papers, the city at first wanted the matter in court. After thinking about it for awhile, the city fathers finally agreed to a compromise: Music Plus would decrease the number of paraphernalia display cases from three to two-six-foot fixtures and move the remaining cases 10 feet from the front panel windows.

"We certainly didn't want to enter a suit, and neither did the city," said Lou Fogelman, president of the chain," but we had to hold the line somewhere, and I do feel this is a Constitutional matter."

The Lakewood anti-paraphernalia statute was reportedly prompted by City Councilman Paul Zeltner's visit to a Big Ben store, a subsidiary of the Integrity Entertainment Corp, which also operates the 100-plus-outlet Wherehouse Records and Tapes chain. According to the Los Angeles Times, Zeltner views the paraphernalia devices as a "lure for young people." Officials of Integrity have refused comment thus far regarding the law, but some other retailers involved with similar operations have not been so reticent.

"How can you tell what these items can be used for?," said John Houghton, vice president of Licorice Pizza. Licorice Pizza and Integrity are both supplied with paraphernalia by Berney-Karp Distributors, which acts as a rack service, providing buying and stocking services, as well as handling returns.



Cream/Hi Sets Triple Al Green Pkg.

LOS ANGELES.—In what label vice president/marketing Paul Culberg is calling "a first," Cream/Hi Records will simultaneously release three records, in three separate configurations, by singer Al Green. All three discs are due by November 1, Culberg said.

The three Green records include a studio album, "Truth n' Time," a single lp with a gatefold jacket and a \$7.98 list price; a seven-inch single, a remake of Lulu's "To Sir With Love," which Culberg said is "for both top 40 and r&b formats"; and a twelveinch single, "Wait Here," which will be aimed at disco-oriented stations and progressive black radio and will also receive "full service through the disco pools," according to Culberg. He added that "a special, commemorative type of package" containing all three will be sent to publicists, trade publications, and "key and special accounts," a total of some 1000 mailings.

"Al's winning at the Tokyo Music Festival was another reaffirmation of our belief that he goes beyond one area of service," Culberg told RW. "Not since 1973 has he had the major acceptance that we are now seeking for him. But we're not looking for him to be accepted only by the white audience—we're looking for total acceptance, white and black. We're working with Al to help him cross all bridges."

Linnum to 20th

■ LOS ANGELES—Barry Goldberg, national director of pop promotion for 20th Century-Fox Records, has announced the appointment of Rod Linnum as regional promotion director for the label. Linnum will be responsible for Michigan, Northern Ohio and Western New York, reporting to Goldberg directly.

Culberg added that a tentative concert date at the Greek Theater in L.A. should highlight both Green's and the label's intention to re-broaden the artist's audience. He also indicated that a short promotional tour of key markets, involving Cream executives, Al Bennett (president and chief executive officer), Don Graham (vice president/promotion), and Culberg, is another possibility. The tour, which would be designed to debut the records for local publicists, radio and distribution personnal, would initially focus on the east coast and the midwest. "We're hopeful that the time factor will allow us to do that," Culberg said.

Radio Replay

By NEIL McINTYRE



Well those L.A. Dodgers sure showed us New Yorkers a thing or two. As you read this, there's a flow of money crossing the United States, mostly ones, fives, and ten dollar bills. The shipments of lost bets are starting out on the west coast, at record companies, radio stations, and trade magazines, for all the people on the east coast; we thank you. Don't worry, you'll just have one less tennis lesson, or skip breakfast one day at the Beverly Hills Hotel. We're real sorry your Dodger boys didn't get the treatment they felt they de-

served when they were in Yankee stadium; we're also sorry the fans in L.A. didn't get to see a seventh game, but I think six games against the Yankees was enough. Remember there's always next year. Oh! that's what they said last year—well, that's baseball.

AND NOW A WORD FOR OUR SPONSOR... THE PEOPLE. Radio has such power to motivate the listening audience, but unfortunately many stations don't take advantage of their position in the community. The FCC encourages editorials on radio, since stations have an obligation to respond to the public's needs. However, the bases for editorials on the radio are generally either weak in content, or are not interesting enough in presentation to command a response for or against the subject of the editorial.

The proof of what I'm saying can be found in the files of most radio stations under comments about editorials. If I collected all those reactions from the public, it wouldn't fill one folder. If the audience is moved by the music that is played, or by the advertisement of a product enough to buy it, why are the editorials something that interferes with the programming rather than blends in with the sound of the radio station? It's important to get the listening audience off their fat apathies and do something about problems that are presented in editorial form. I believe that one of the many problems with editorials on the radio is that many times the radio station management takes a position in favor of subject matter that won't offend anybody, like scouting, good crops, and sunshine.

Getting action from city hall or the industrial world takes more than just one editorial. There must be a follow-up that will help create an urgency about the problem that your radio station thinks should be solved. You might explain to your audience how they might go about getting action, help show them the way. A way to get the attention of the audience is to use the medium "in a way that will enhance the editorial," by incorporating music or sound effects that will help get the point across. The lyrics of many songs are protests of the times in which we live, and can help present your point of view. I don't believe a sound editorial should be so contrived that the music becomes the reason for doing the editorial but it can underline the thought, or the solution as your radio station sees it.

Radio has the ability to be on the move at a moment's notice, and editorials should be done at the scene of the problem, much like news stories. A sharp production person can turn a dry piece of editorial copy into an exciting piece of sound and comment that will make the audience respond to the voice of influence in the market place, rather than waiting for the newspapers to force the issues of importance in the community. Sound editorials on your radio station will help keep the public informed and in the forefront as the media leader, and in particular your radio station.

Arbitron Announces Two New Services

■ NEW YORK — Arbitron Radio announced two new services last week for client stations who, like the Godfather, want the bad (or good) news immediately.

Beginning with the October/ November survey now in progress, Arbitron will offer Federal Express delivery of its reports to clients. The service will provide next-day deliveries to cities in the next-day delivery zone. Stations not in that zone may have their reports delivered to another address that does fall within the next-day area.


Such delivery, which was requested by Arbitron's radio advisory council, will bring reports to stations one to three days earlier than does regular mail service. The service will cost \$25, for the Federal Express charges and for two additional copies of the local market report.

Also effective with this survey, Arbitron is beginning an "advance ratings" service, which will give stations the opportunity to obtain certain information from local reports up to seven days before the book arrives.

Arbitron will telephone those subscribers who want the service with ratings information when its diaries are processed. For \$30, a station may receive the metro share trends for all stations in its market in one demographic category, total persons 12+, men 18+, women 18+ or teens. Each additional demographic category will cost another \$25.

Or, for any single station, a client may receive metro share, average quarter-hour and cume audience estimates for the five major day-parts and two of a larger list of demographic categories for \$30. For each additional station and/or pair of demographic categories there is an additional \$25 charge.

KKSS-FM Sets Pay Incentives For Air Staff Ratings Success

■ NEW YORK — KKSS-FM in St. Louis has given its air staff another reason—besides pride—to do well in the current Oct./Nov. Arbitron survey.

Joe Amaturo, the owner of black-formatted KKSS-FM and the Amaturo group, has set up an incentive plan with operations manager Al Ramirez, that will mean bonuses for the air talent if they reach station goals in the 12-plus category.

This plan is on a graduating scale, with an increase in the bonus depending upon the level of rating achievement reached. The payment of the bonus would be made over a period of time in order to make the tax bite less severe.

"The reaction to this plan is one of incredible confidence in the company," Ramirez said. "Many air personalities are insecure. This bonus plan has built confidence, and they feel more secure in their job, they are also more relaxed, and because of this, they are performing better than ever on the air. They feel a real interest in the radio station. We realize we have to win as a group, it's amazing the effect it has, as everybody pulls together to reach the bonus goals."

Black radio stations in the past have been accused of not having a high enough pay scale for their air talent. At KKSS-FM, the news people and music people will have a chance to share in the

(A weekly report on current and upcoming discotheque breakouts) By VINCE ALETTI

■ More than a little under the weather this week, I'm afraid all I have the energy for is a quick list of new releases that just can't wait -more detailed reviews of the key items will follow in the next issue. THE ESSENTIAL ALBUMS: "Cerrone TV: The Golden Touch" (Cotillion), the album Cerrone considers his most serious, includes four tracks in strikingly different styles and moods, all more densely vocal than most of his previous work but all bearing the unmistakable Cerrone touch. No sustained, side-long production numbers here, but "Je Suis Music" ("I Am Music") and "Look for Love" are especially stirring and "Music of Life" is Cerrone's lightest, loveliest, most seductive piece of music so far . . . Kikrokos, the group that came together for "Jungle D.J." (Polydor), includes ace Trident session musicians who were key members of Kongas and Voyage, so the sound here is supple Eurodisco with pop overtones. The title track, which appears as a three-part, 15-minute cut on side one as well as a sevenminute medley/reprise on side two, is bright, spunky, quite entertaining and stylishly produced with alternating male and female vocals and mucho changes. One of the most popular imports on the disco round in the past few months, its American release has already popped it into the Top 20 this week, so watch this one . . . Gregg Diamond's latest Bionic Boogie collection, "Hot Butterfly" (Polydor) covers much the same ground as the group's first lp and the current Starcruiser album-sharp, invigorating pop disco with a fine funk

edge and involving vocals. As usual, there's not a wasted track here, but the standouts immediately are "Chains" and "Cream (Always Rises to the Top)," though the latter suffers slightly from repetition; "Fess Up to the Boogie" and "When the Shit Hits the Fan" are strong runners-up. Rather more predictable than one would hope, but immensely attractive nonetheless . . . El Coco's "Dancing in Paradise" album (AVI) is similarly predictable—we know most of the Michael Lewis and Laurin Rinder moves by now-but they, too, have a kind of effortless pop assurance that gets under one's skin after only a few listenings. The title cut and "Love in Your Life," both previously released on a disco disc, are included here full-length and, of the new material, all three cuts on the second side are noteworthy: the atmospheric instrumental "Afrodesia" (8:24): "It's Your Last Chance" (5:58), a catchy dance-floor drama; and the sly, slick and wicked (Continued on page 83)

(A Report on the Music Publishing Scene)

By PAT BAIRD

■ LAST LAUGH: Paul McCartney's acquisition of the Buddy Holly catalogue several years ago struck some inveterate rock & rollers as peculiar, if not foolhardy. Well, we've all lost track of the covers released just over the past few months but two more out this week deserve some note. Santana's new single "Well All Right" was indeed written by Holly-Petty-Allison-Mauldin but the original version was never a hit single. If was an AOR (known as FM in those days) hit by Blind Faith on their one and only album released in 1969. Santana's version has but a smattering of Latin in the grooves and it could be his biggest hit single in some time . . . Jesse Colin Young, late of the Youngbloods, has released the first single, so far, on one of Holly's rockiest numbers "Rave On." It's already the encore number for a few major artists and its ripe for a hard rock treatment as well as Young's acoustic version.

HAPPY: **Don Oriolo**, vice president and general manager of Intersong, U.S.A., reports the first two Intersong releases. "A Simple Love Song" has been released by **Madison Street** (known back in the 60s as **Randy and The Rainbows**—"Denise") and **James Montgomery** has released "New England Sunshine." Both are picking up adult/contemporary airplay . . . Also at Intersong, longtime British madman and brilliant lyricist **Pete Brown** was in the U.S. recently bringing around tapes of his latest project. In the past Brown wrote the lyrics for nearly everything recorded by **Jack Bruce** et famille and he's now published by Intersong world-wide. NEW JERSEY REVISITED: Sam The Band, mentioned here last year, has just signed with April/Blackwood Music and recent showcases at N.Y.'s Gildersleeves brought out a host of record execs . . . Rubber Rock, featuring the dynamic Colleen Heather, is currently appearing around the state. The group had two disco records out (the original "Disco Lucy" and "Hello Stranger" both on Henry Street Records) and they're due back in the studio soon. It was in December, 1948, that the company Som Industria & Comercio S/A was born. Its first two labels were Copacabana, and Star, through which it started manufacturing 300 records per

The first plant was built up in Jacarepaguá, a borough near Rio de Janeiro, and it started to make 2000 records per day.

Since the beginning, the spirit of the company has been to discover new talent and, throughout its history, the record company has brought to the Brasilian artistic scene many artists of great merit that soon became important names in show business during a time when there was no TV, radio was the most important channel of promotion and great shows were the most desired exposure for any artist.

But when the record company first started to have hits there were not enough records to deliver! At that time engineer Joao Fernando Blumenschein, who is still the plant director, came up to the company, and built up and supervised every gear of the great machinery that is Copacabana today. Shortly after his coming, Blumenschein enlarged the production to 9000 units a day and started to improve the product; a process he never stopped and still does never being happy with his own standards. Blumenschein was already in the company when "Irmaos Vitale," one of the most important music publishers in the country, joined the comand Emilio Vitale Blumenschein worked hard to make the little plant reach a point where the building could not house it anymore.

So the moving to Sao Paulo was planned, and conducted with perfect execution. The place chosen was the Brasilian Detroit, Sao Bernardo do Campo, in a place near Santos Harbor, and it is now situated on the Immigrants Road, one of the most perfect and safest highways in the world. Around 1966 the moving started; the Rio plant kept on producing, while the new and modern Sao Paulo plant was being built and finally activated on October 23, 1967.

At the same time the company that already owned a studio in Rio de Janeiro, built the first Brasilian 4-track studio (remember this was 1965), that soon converted to 8-track and was somewhat wonderful for the time. Still, by the same time, when all stereo mothers were imported by all companies, Copacabana started to make stereo cuts in Sao Paulo, almost forcing all other companies to go stereo. And that studio, in the Fundação Casper Libero Building, became a landmark since many of the most important sound and artists experiments have taken place there.

The first record manufactured in Sao Paulo was "Apelo," by Elizeth Cardoso, one of the most important Brasilian singers, and that is almost a landmark in Brasilian music.

Benito di Paula is the Brasilian artist representative of the genuine Brasilian musicthe Samba—that has been a best-seller for many years. His yearly album is a Christmas gift for the Brasilians. His performance, in 1975, at the Brasilian Gala (MIDEM), "Charlie Brown" a worldwide hit. With an extraordinary power of communication, it is very common to present him for sixty thousand people at a time. Now he has, for the first time, one Ip in Spanish released in all countries of the Spanish

The new plant built by Blumenschein never stopped enlarging its production, and the numbers increased and increased, growing from 23,000 records in 1970, to the 60,000 produced in a normal workday of eight hours in 1978, not counting the 15,000 cassettes.

In 1973, the car crash that killed Emilio Martine Vitale (Joao Vitale had died two years before) convinced the remaining ones that to conduct that company, that was always expanding and

growing, would not be possible. So they transferred the control of the company to a newly formed group of Adiel Macedo de Carvalho, the founder of Beverly, a company that used ideas and revolutionary methods of production, Rosvaldo Cury, who came from Beverly, too, and Gunter Cszasnik, with a past of recognized work and good jobs in other industry fields.

The three, together with Blumenschein, decided that the space was not enough and expanded to the 6300 square feet of today. But many things have happened in the last five years:

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
Adiel Macedo De Carvalho:

Today, his times as a young clerk working for record dealers are very far away, but he likes to mention that he remembers very well the times when, instead of money, he was paid . . . in records. And this is how the career of Mr. Carvalho started, the founder of a record company named Beverly, that launched many of today's most famous Brasilian artists.


Everything started because Carvalho obviously could not have foreign hits, nor originals; then, he signed and produced Os Carbonos (The Carbons) that were, and still are, recording anything, any style, perfectly!

in the market; nobody could understand how a company, comprised only of an office and

lots of will could defeat the all-powerful big ones. And then came Paulo Sergio, coming from a still minor label. And also along came Angelo Maximo, Suely, Carlos Lombardi, Genival Santos, Pinduca, Tony Damito, and many, many others.

Rising Careers

When he, Cszasnik and Cury acquired control of Copacabana (Som Industria & Comercio S/A), the traditional company started a revolution in the market. His magic touch gave birth to Morris Albert, Benito Di Paula, and supported the rising careers of Nelson Ned, Wanderley Cardoso, Elizeth Cardoso, Claudio Fontana, and many others.

Even being the company's president, he likes to be considered as "a record producer." And many of the new ideas came from him, coming from the daily contact he likes to have with the production and the sales personnel, exchanging ideas and points of view, using his experience in the record market, and his many years of constant contact with the customer itself.

An active member of the industry, Carvalho, a young president, believes in a strong market and is prepared for any revolution in the future (from new developments to an ever better artistic achievement). He is one of the best expressions of a company that completes, with him—

30 years of work, and says that this is only the beginning.

Safes

One of the most important divisions of any company is the combined sales, credit, shipping operations, and collections which obviously work closely hand in hand. You may have the best records, the most important product to offer, but if the above rings of the chain are not strong enough, or do not work properly, the chain can break.

And when the company is in a country like Brasil, of continental dimensions, there is much difficulty in controlling everything.

Rosvaldo Cury is the director that is in charge of that task. He constantly travels throughout the country to supervise everything, contacting each part of what he calls "an oiled machine," and keeps it running.

Cury comes from the same Beverly that was founded by Carvalho, and is a man of imense energy and an extraordinary memory.

■ Som Industria & Comercia S/A is like a parent with the years passing by, it gave birth to several "children" that apparently have the same hereditary trait: expansion and constant growth. Managed today by Herbert Cszasnik, this company distributes Copacabana Records to the U.S., Canada, Puerto Rico, etc. with the only exception of the licensed ones to local companies. Besides that, Brasilia is now importing and distributing the







Bianco's Involvement Covers Several Areas

■ Having started to work for Som in 1962, Olavo Bianco was successively promoted, until he was elected to the board two years ago. He is responsible for the international division of the record company, for the export activities, and the board connection with the publishing group, as well as the relationship with entities, associations, and the other companies.

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



a printing facility with the most modern machinery was built, and today, everything from stationery to jackets, record covers, cassette and record labels are printed—technically perfect—for its own use and for third parties. The company does not depend on anything out of its own walls for record production; only three things are bought outside: blank tape, plastic compounds, and cardboard.

Production Credits

Carvalho, the company's president, still likes to be considered a producer. His credentials stand out as he gave production strength to Nelson Ned, today an established name throughout the Latin world; advised the appearances of Morris Albert who became a worldwide success; and improved the already existent qualities of Benito Di Paula, making him the second largest recordseller in this country, and who already created a standard, "Charlie Brown," a big hit in Europe, Japan, etc. He also aided the development of Wando, Sueli, Paulo Sergio, Angelo Maximo, Sara, Celio Roberto, Claudio Fontana and many, many others.

Cury improved a "sales machine" that is one of the best in the country by travelling constantly throughout this continent.

Cszasnik, together with Blumenschein, is developing constantly new improvements. From a cassette purchaser, Som is today an exporter to many countries in South America. From a pressing machine purchaser, Som is now a manufacturer of its own presses, designed, created and crafted by their own technicians and engineers.

In the international field, Som is represented worldwide through licensees and represents many companies from most corners of the world.

And two years ago it established its own distribution in the United States of America, Brasilia Records & Tapes Corp. in New York, destined to import and introduce Brasilian music to the American market, possibly the most competitive in the world.

And, while it seriously considers the moment when the plant will start producing 100,000 records a day, it is time to stop one moment, and thank our friends, executives, employees, and representatives, licensors, not only here, but everywhere, for their cooperation in making all this happen. Thanks, all of you!


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

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THE COAST

■ WELCOMÉ TO THE WORKING WEEK—And weekends as well, if the newly revamped music section of L. A.'s Herald-Examiner is any indication. Once holding a distant second to The Times, the paper has undergone a series of changes in recent months, including the addition of music biz columnist Mitchell Fink (a former RW editor) and feature writer John "Larry Talbot" Mankiewicz, another RW alumnus.

With space in the daily edition already greatly increased, the paper debuted its new separate Sunday music section last week, spotlighting the event with a reception Thursday (12) evening. There, the editors also introduced their newest addition, **Ken Tucker**, a first-rate New York writer imported to complete their music staff as rock and pop critic, as well as the section itself, dubbed Sound. Apart from its significance as one of the first regularly published music sections for any newspaper here, Sound will doubtless challenge The Times' traditional domination of music coverage here. We'll be watching.

COMMAND PERFORMANCE—Although the rumor began spreading during dinner, **Elton John's** one-man show during the final night of the MCA/Infinity meeting here last week was still mostly a surprise to the staffers on hand. While no one's interpreting the generous solo performance as harbinger of any new tours, the artist's ebullience as a live performer was undiminished, and the context afforded an intimate rapport amplified by the setting, the Westside Room of the Century Plaza Hotel.

If his program of oldies (his own and others, ranging from Marvin Gaye to Elvis) and new material from the just-shipped "A Single Man" package was entertaining his between-songs patter was revealing as well. Long an astute observer of the business, John candidly admitted his own dissatisfaction with the response to his most recent work, as well as the problems his label had weathered; the sense of shared frustrations became a key to his commentary, while Elton's good-natured cracks at MCA execs underscored what is by now a long working relationship with the label.

ALL PREZENT AND ACCOUNTED FOR: One of the nicest musical developments of recent years has involved taking classic solos by certain jazz immortals and adapting them to an ensemble setting; all-instrumental outfits transcribe and harmonize such solos for several players, thereby turning them into what amounts to rehearsed improvisations. The first and probably best known of such groups are **Supersax**, who perform **Charlie Parker's** music, and a quintet of guitarists led by **Tony Rizzi**, playing the solos of six-string great **Charlie**

A couple of weeks ago, at Donte's in North Hollywood, we were treated to a fine performance by Dave Pell's Prez Conference, a seven-piece group paying tribute to saxophonist Lester "Prez" Young. Leader Pell, who plays tenor, was joined by three other outstanding horn men, Bob Cooper and Gordon Brisker on tour and the delightful Bill Hood on baritone. Each is a fine soloist in his own right, but the really magical moments came when the four of them ran through arranger Bill Holman's charts of Young's solos on chestnuts like "Lester Leaps In" and "Jumpin' at the Woodside." The four saxists must have well over 100 years of experience between them, and it showed: they were relaxed, and obviously having a fine old time, but they were also completely professional and utterly swinging. Check these guys out—they have a record, also called "Prez Conference," on the GNP/Crescendo label.

FOOTNOTES: Local rocker KMET's B. Mitchell Reed underwent open heart surgery last Wednesday (18) at St. Vincent's Hospital in L.A. "Beamer," as he's known, apparently suffered from chest pains while on the air during his 10 a.m.-2 p.m. slot on Thursday of the previous week, and was taken to the hospital. The operation-a coronary by-pass-was to be performed by Dr. Jerome Kay. We wish B.M.R. a very speedy recovery indeed . . . Pianist Paul Smith has recently signed on as regular accompanist/music director for Ella Fitzgerald. Smith has worked with Sammy Davis, jr., Dinah Shore, Sarah Vaughan, Tony Bennett, Vikki Carr and others . . . Graham Bell's second set at the Starwood the other night saw Eddie Money, Terry Reid and Michael DesBarres joining Bell on vocals, and Carmine Appice sitting in on drums . . . Despite typhoon Nina, with winds of over 110 mph and extensive flooding in the streets, over 4,000 Leif Garrett fans turned out for two of his store appearances in the Philippines. Garrett will also hit Australia and New Zealand on his current promo sweep . . . Derek St. Holmes and Rob Grange, formerly with Ted Nugent, and Denny Carmassi, formerly with Montrose, have formed a group called Paradise.

Phonogram Sets Rush Campaign

■ CHICAGO — The new Rush album, "Hemispheres," is being backed by one of the most intense marketing campaigns ever mounted for an Ip released by Phonogram, Inc./Mercury Records, it was announced by Lou Simon, senior vice president/director of marketing for Phonogram/Mercury.

In addition to an elaborate foldout album cover plus a four-color poster inside every lp, there will be two merchandising pieces available: a four-color mobile and a three foot square color poster, both designed by George Balos, merchandising manager.

■ CRYBABY BLUES: As if the New York Post didn't say enough in one headline—"Comeback champs rout L.A. crybabies in their own park"—we're here to add insult to injury. Once again the New York Yankees have proven that junk ball pitchers and mealy-mouthed infielders are no substitute for class and talent. Knowing how buoyed the entire city was by the Yankees' World Series triumph, we checked in with that most knowledgeable of baseball fans, Southside Johnny, figuring that if anyone has his finger on the town's pulse, and can speak for all of us, it is he. So what happens? "I was hoping for a seventh game," said the staunch Yankee supporter. "I wanted Catfish to pitch a good six or seven innings, leave with a lead, and then have the Dodgers come back against Paul Linblad (the name came to him only after considerable coaching) and win it in the last inning. I wanted that tension of the seventh game, everything riding on one game, with Guidry on the mound."

Clearly Southside is not going to endear himself to Yankee fans with thoughts such as these. But his new album, "Hearts of Stone," might do the trick. Some of us thought the Jukes' first two albums were something special too, but you know how it goes. "Hearts of Stone," however, finds the band progressing: the sound is less r&b, more contemporary rock; the songs-most written by Steve Van Zandt, with the notable exception of the title cut, which ranks as one of Bruce Springsteen's finest tunes, are superbly crafted, as usual (some of us have thought Van Zandt a superior songwriter from the beginning, but you know how it goes); the band (helped along by Max Weinberg, who is fast proving himself as the finest rock drummer around) plays intelligently and passionately—on the edge. A fanatic might say the same was true of the Jukes' other albums-yet those records didn't go out of stores at the rate of 100,000 + (according to our source) in the first three days. ("Hearts of Stone" in fact has, as of this writing, sold almost as many copies in its first week as have "I Don't Want To Go Home" and "This Time It's For Real" to date).

Southside says the reason is in the grooves: "The last album was good, but it had no focus. It was too open ended; the songs were going everywhere, and it was hard for someone who didn't know about us to tell what we were all about. Every song seemed to sound different. 'Hearts of Stone' isn't like that. It's more contemporary, if you want to use that word; there's much less of that 'old' sound to it, even though the horns are still there. But the songs—whether they're Steve's or Bruce's or the one we all wrote together—are just better than any we've done before over the course of a whole album. And too, we've all improved as musicians in the past year."

We asked Southside what must be an old, old question but one we thought particularly relevant when the Jukes' career is considered in toto: Has the band sugered from being aligned so closely with Springsteen and particularly with Van Zandt, who contributes so much on record and is such a dynamic presence in the whole scheme of things, yet is often unable to appear in concert with the group? "No not at all," Southside answered unhesitatingly. "Wherever we've gotten so far—and whatever anyone thinks, we have accomplished something in the past couple of years—it's been because of the direction Steve's given: It's been his songs, his production, his management, his ideas that we've depended on. He's done it all. Maybe in concert he has contributed something extra that we couldn't replace when he wasn't there, but we've got this new guitarist who's real good; he'll help; and of course Willy Rush is playing the best he's ever played right now."

JOCKEY SHORTS: Teddy Pendergrass is doing another "For Women Only" concert on October 29 at Chicago's Arie Crown Theater (he's done others in New York and Philadelphia). Once again the "Teddy Line" has been installed, featuring a prerecorded message from the artist himself. The curious can phone 312-236-4777. Ground rules for Teddy's previous "For Women Only" concerts will also apply in Chicago: men will be allowed into the theater but will not be permitted to purchase tickets; indeed, men are being "actively discouraged" from attending. Once inside, all females will receive free Teddy Pops ... Joe Cocker has obtained his new driver's license ... Elvin Bishop's new LP, "Hog Heaven," will be released on November 6. It's the first one Bishop's produced and features special guest vocalist Maria Muldaur and guitarist Amos Garrett. Elvin begins a seven city promo tour this week, with one of his stops scheduled to be at the ruins of Nut Central . . . Maynard Ferguson interrupted his current U.S. tour for two days to help out on the soundtrack of Burt Young's movie, "Uncle Joe Shannon." The music is by Bill Conti. Ferguson is also set for a November 15 appearance at Carnegie Hall, which will be his eighth headlining appearance in New York City this year.

Cover Story:

An Unusual Approach from Ambrosia

By MIKE FALCON

Ambrosia is one of a rare breed in contemporary music: a group that defies easy classification. Although they formed in Southern California, Ambrosia does not typify the "Los Angeles" sound. Nor do they fit those easy categories critics seem so fond of creating. They exhibit sometimes forceful playing, but to label them a "rock" act would not be totally accurate, as classical and lyrical influences that figure heavily in the band's repertoire are of equal import. Instead, you have a melodically-oriented core to the music that is augmented by intricate harmonies and sophisticated use of voices, both present in some other "pop" groups, but rarely with such eclectic imagina-

Although the group has had some musical changes of pace, (and if a characteristic mode has to be enunciated, this serves as well as any), the personnel remains constant, save for the departure of one member. David Pack, lead guitar; Joe Puerta, bass; and Burleigh Drummond, percussion, all contribute singing talents as well as instrumental expertise, a trademark of the band since its inception in 1970.

The unusual musical conceptions formulated by Ambrosia find divergent expression. Classical music engineer Gordon Perry, hearing the band early in their career, arranged for them to meet Los Angeles Philharmonic conductor Zubin Mehta. He subsequently featured the band in his 1971 "All American Dream Concert." Producer Freddie Piro then signed the group to 20th Century, where "Nice, Nice Very Nice" surfaced as a principal success for the band. Typically untypical,

this Ambrosia hit was co-written (lyrics) with author Kurt Vonnegut Jr. who used the passage in his novel, "Cat's Cradle." Alan Parsons, who would later achieve fame as an artist with the album "I Robot," produced "Somewhere I've Never Travelled," their second album. Both "Ambrosia" and "Somewhere I've Never Travelled" received Grammy nominations and are slated for re-release on Warner Bros. Records, Ambrosia's current label.

Their new album, "Life Beyond L.A.", is currently climbing national charts and is the band's biggest success to date. "What makes 'Life Beyond L.A.' different" observes Puerta, "is that some of our influences, like r&b and jazz, came out more on this album. Overall, it has more drive."

The band is currently on tour, supplementing the activity with an ambitious in-store appearance schedule and guest spots at radio stations. 

to Sheinberg, he notes that MCA and Infinity field promotion staff will report to their respective label promo chiefs while headquartering in the MCA Distributing offices.

Bergamo doesn't anticipate any sweeping personnel or operational changes before next year, characterizing the remaining months of '78 as a crucial study period during which he'll visit branches and pressing plants to familiarize himself with the existing operation. "I've set a goal for myself of January 1," he commented. "I want to be in a position to make any changes that are needed after that, during the first billing quarter next year." That waiting period is necessitated by Bergamo's determination to minimize any disruption in operation as a result of shifts, as well as the greater priority currently being given fourth-quarter product just shipped or due for release in the coming weeks. "You can't disturb whatever records you have at that time," he said, alluding to the holiday peak season, adding that lps from such artists as Elton John and Olivia Newton-John will be among key releases.

Most recently vp of merchandising, west coast, for Epic/Portrait/Associated Labels, Bergamo headed CBS Records' Seattle branch; both posts, he notes, underscore a marketing orientation, as well as potential influences on the new distributing wing. "From what I can gather, MCA has a good fix on data at the branch level, but I don't know exactly how sophisticated their research is," says Bergamo. "We often hear CBS touted as the number one marketing operation, but regardless of how you view that, their market research really is the most sophisticated." Hence, his study of MCA Distributing's data base will be the first phase of his plan "to make our field force as strong, or stronger."

One key will be a shift in the relationship between the Universal City home office here and the various branches. "I feel that MCA has always operated with more control from headquarters," Bergamo continues, "and I've always felt you should give your field people the latitude to function on a local basis and respond to whatever it takes to break a record in that market, without having to go to headquarters at every step of the way.'

Further strengthening the new corporate arm is the recent activation of Infinity Records, headed by Ron Alexenburg, which he notes broaden's MCA's overall product base. "It will also be strengthened because the distribution division will control its own destiny," he added, referring to the new autonomy within MCA's corporate structure, alongside the two record divisions.

Bergamo's other early study topic, manufacturing, is necessitated more by his background than by any specific goals, he notes. "It's something that's new to me," he says of his duties in that sector, "so I'm really going to be looking closely at it. My background at CBS included eight years as a branch manager, so I know that field with respect to marketing and sales. But while I had regular contact with CBS' pressing plants in that capacity, I wasn't directly involved with overseeing that aspect.

"I think it's probably one of our strongest areas right now, so I suspect it won't need many changes, if any."

Bergamo, who will be based at MCA's Universal City site, is also slated to receive "special assistance" from MCA, Inc., assistant treasurer Gene Froelich, according to an official corporate release on the appointment.

(Continued from page 3) rightfully theirs under the terms of their purchase of ELO's master records and inventory. let bought them from UA for \$10.5 million when it switched its distribution from UA to CBS last May.

Levy called the suit "basically one of harrassment" last week, and said, "We're going to countersue both CBS and Jet. All they really want to do is stop us for three or four weeks until the Christmas buying season is over."

CBS and Jet won a temporary injunction against the sale of those records and tapes last Wednesday (18). The injunction will be in effect until a Nov. 1 hearing on the case.

The original CBS/Jet suit, filed July 26 in Superior Court in Los Angeles, charges that UA held back the contested albums and tapes when it delivered the masters and inventory to CBS. After a preliminary hearing, the California court declared a moratorium during which negotiations for a settlement would take place, and during which the product at issue could not be sold. Levy participated in those negotiations, "more or less in the role of mediator," according to the new suit.

The negotiations were broken off Sept. 18, and, according to the new CBS/Jet suit, UA sold the records and tapes to Promo the next day, with the intent of marketing them as cut-outs.

CBS and let claim that such a sale would damage their ability to sell copies of "Out of the Blue," still a catalogue item. They further charge that as much as 70 percent of the product bought by Promo is defective, and that Promo planned to sell the records and tapes despite the alleged defects. Levy denied those claims last week.

The original CBS/Jet suit is seeking more than \$300 million in compensatory and punitive damages from UA.

Record Business Reports U.K. Sales Figures

LONDON — The U.K. trade | pertoire magazine Record Business has published its first quarterly figures covering the period July/ September. The figures are based on recorded sales of records appearing in the Record Business top 120 singles and top 60 albums during the thirteen-week period. However, as the Record Business computer system for albums only became functional in August, full market share breakdowns are not published for albums.

RSO Scores

Featuring strongly in the results is the RSO label, which between July and September accounted for 11.6 percent of chart singles sold and an estimated 14.5 percent of albums, scoring the top individual single, "You're The One That I Want" by John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John, top album, "Saturday Night Fever" soundtrack, and top male and female singers, John Travolta and Olivia Newton-John.

RSO's continual chart dominance gave Polydor the number two singles slot behind the combined forces of EMI's group re-

pertoire and licensed labels division with an overall 23.7 percent share of chart sales.

Polydor figures in the runnerup position with 16.1 percent followed by CBS (12.5), Phonogram (11.8) and WEA (11.1).

In the albums section the leading companies were CBS, EMI WEA and leading labels were RSO. CBS and Atlantic which included the Atlantic/ Hansa label product.

Meanwhile Capital Radio, the U.K.'s leading commercial radio station has started using the Record Business top 30 for its Sunday chart show and in addition RB will be researching and providing the Capital countdown, the London area sales based top 40 chart which attracts an estimated 1,000,000 listeners per hour on Saturday mornings.

Capital previously used a chart compiled by the Gallup Market Research Company.

Apart from Capital Radio, Record Business now supplies charts to Radio Tees, Beacon Radio 210, Thames Valley Radio and the London Evening News and the Black Echoes Magazine.

after "three-martini" business deductions evaporated once the bill was run through Capitol Hill, certain sections of the bill will still restrict deductions for such extravagances as buying or maintaining yachts, hunting lodges and other "entertainment facilities." Other than the "facilities," very little of the original plan to cut each business deductions made it through the House or Senate, and deductability for business entertainment expenses is unchanged. This includes such expenses as theater and sports tickets, meals, club dues and fees for using or attending other facilities.

Mignon from Columbia

By SPEIGHT IENKINS

■ NEW YORK—Mignon is one of the French operas of the mid-19th century that has largely disappeared from every repertory, with only an occasional performance in Paris. Columbia has now brought out an extremely rewarding recording of all of Ambroise Thomas' music for the opera.

For the retailer, the record can be sold in several ways. First of all, it is a first recording in modern stereo of an opera that used to be very popular, with at least two very famous arias, Mignon's 'Connaistu le pays?" and Philine's "Je suis Titania." Secondly, it has Marilyn Horne in the title role.

Mignon is a very unusual character, often drab, a little crazy but occasionally brilliant. Miss Horne's characterization is rich, and she has the style totally in hand. Her "Connaistu le pays?" is a lyric effusion, while the aria when she as an itinerant "gypsy" tries on the actress Philine's clothes has all the brilliance and fioritura that her unique mezzo-

soprano is capable of. Ruth Welting makes as much of the empty(Continued on page 88)

Classical Retail Tips

top 25 on the RW BOA chart. Airplay is showing in the east and midwest and should continue to build. "Friend To Me" shows a platinum group on the rise.



CHOICE CUTS: Cheryl Lynn's debut album on Columbia is terrific; she combines the vocal styles of Dee Dee Sharp and Jean Carn while coming up with something different and fresh of her own. Aside from the already recommended "Got to Be Real," which opens up the album (though in a shorter version than the disco disc currently available), there's a pulsing, exciting cut called "Star Love" (7:23) that is already causing a lot of comment and another up number titled "You Saved My Day"—both not to be missed . . . The new Isaac Hayes album, "For the Sake of Love" (Polydor), contains a new version of his classic movie theme, "Shaft," now titled "Shaft II" and running nearly 10 minutes. Jim Burgess did the mix here and the result is interesting but somewhat reserved; not the total revamp the track needs to jump in a truly contemporary way, but perhaps Hayes didn't want to tamper with the original too radically. Still, worth attention for the nostalgic thrill of it all and the brilliant crackle of the production. Also check out "Zeke the Freak."

ETC.: My favorite after-disco cool-out record these days is **Steve Reich's** penetrating "Music for 18 Musicians" (ECM/Warner Brothers) which is shimmering acoustical music with voice accompaniment that has a distinctly electronic feel. The voices are used as instruments, so there are no identifiable words and the effect is both soothing and energizing, eerie and coolly elegant.

■ A year ago I wrote that the Italians seemed to be becoming world leaders in jazz record production, largely on the strength of some outstanding new releases on the Black Saint and Horo labels. Well, Black Saint (distributed by Rounder Records, 186 Willow Avenue, Somerville, Massachusetts 02144) has continued to release quality recordings by some of the most interesting new jazz musicians, as this column has noted, and this week a package of thirteen new Horo releases arrived in the mail. Ten of them are two-record sets, and quite a few of them are exceptional. Horo records are not widely available in the U.S.probably the best bet is Dan Serro, an importer at 165 William Street, New York, N.Y. 10038, although the people at Rounder say they are trying to acquire the line—but serious fans will want to seek out some of the latest releases.

Three two-record sets are devoted to the music of Sun Ra, and two of these, "Other Voices, Other Blues" and "New Steps," find the keyboard master and sonic explorer in a quartet setting, with the redoubtable John Gilmore featured on tenor saxophone and playing more than he has played on records in years. Since Gilmore was named by John Coltrane as an influence, the release of these four discs is an event of some importance. Gilmore is also heavily featured on "Unity" by the Sun Ra Arkestra, which includes some of Sun Ra's treatments of material from the Fletcher Henderson and Duke Ellington repertoires. Another double album, "African Children," presents more work by the superb quintet trumpeter Lester Bowie took to Europe earlier this year-his Art Ensemble of Chicago bandmate Malachi Favors on bass, Phillip Wilson on drums, Arthur Blythe on alto saxophone and Amina Claudine Myers on piano. The group, which also made "The 5th Power," a recent Black Saint release, plays in a more lyrical, Coltrane-oriented idiom than the style the Art Ensemble usually favors. Then there are two Archie Shepp releases on Horo, "Body and Soul," a single album, and "The Tradition," a double.

Musica Elettronica Viva, a band that includes some classical composers and some jazz players and occupies a middle ground somewhere between the more classically oriented new jazz and the more improvisational new classical music, has a significant release on Horo, "United Patchwork," with compositions by most of the players-Karl Berger, Alvin Curran, Steve Lacy, Garrett List, Frederic Rzewski and Richard Teitelbaum. David Murray has a solo album, "Sur-Real Saxophone." Steve Lacy's "Catch" is a duet album with bassist Kent Carter. The other new Horos, all double albums, are "Duplicity" by alto saxophonist Lee Konitz and pianist Martial Solal; "Changing the Time" by Karl Berger; and two solo piano sets, "It's All One" by Narada Burton Greene and "Elvira Madigan . . . And Other Dances" by Michael J. Smith. Anyone interested in more details can write Horo directly at Via Asiago 2, Roma 000195, Italy.

Son Seals, the hottest of the younger Chicago bluesmen, is "Live and Burning" on his third album for Alligator (Box 60234, Chicago, Illinois 60660). This is a definitive album of live blues, with a gritty,

pummeling band sound and some top-notch vocals and guitar . . . RCA has released "Fats Waller: a Legendary Performer," and as one might have expected, all the tunes includes out of RCA's treasure trove of vintage Waller are tunes associated with the Broadway hit "Ain't Misbehavin'." There's a nice booklet enclosed, full of period photos and good notes by Mike Lipskin. The notes partially make up for the lack of recording information and personnel . . . Jazz producer Norman Schwartz' new Gryphon label has released four albums. "Together Again-For the First Time" (about time somebody used that one) brings together **Mel Torme** and **Buddy Rich.** "Class of 78" is by Rich and his big band. "Fusion Is..." is by **Barry Miles** and his group, and "Song for Sisyphus" is by the Phil Woods quintet . . . Sarah Vaughan has made her first album for Pablo, "How Long Has This Been Going On," with Oscar Peterson, Joe Pass, Louie Bellson and Ray Brown . . . Dollar Brand, the South African pianist, has a new one out on Chiaroscuro, "Soweto" . . . Munoz, a distinctive electric guitarist who has recorded with Pharoah Sanders, has a first album, "Rendezvous with Now," on India Navigation (P.O. Box 559, Nyack, New York 10960) . . . Michael Moss and his group Four Rivers, who synthesize jazz, ethnic and classical strains, have a new album, "Cross Current," on 4th Stream Records, 192 Ave. of the Americas No. 2R, New (Continued on page 88)



The dispute between Angel Canales and T.R. Records has resulted in a lawsuit. Canales' attorney has served the company with papers asking for \$250,000 in damages. Problems developed between Canales and T.R. with the release of the album, "Angel Canales Live At Roseland," at which time a legal problem was created between T.R. Records and Fania Records. The companies have since worked out their problems . . . The Puerto Rico All Stars will be presented in the "Segundo Concierto de Salsa Internacional" which will take place on November 10, at Madison Square Garden jointly with Dimension Latina and Andy Montañez of Venezuela and Wilfrido Vargas and his Beduinos of Santo Domingo . . . Hector Lavoe and Faiardo will be performing at the "Golden Tierra" of Chicago on October 28th . . . Celia Cruz and Pete "El Conde" Rodríguez will perform in three televised concerts, during November 1st. thru the 6th, in Germany and Holland . . . 





The featured artists are Evie Tornquist (Word), Nancy Honeytree (Myrrh), Tom Netherton (Word), Tennessee Ernie Ford (Word), The Imperials (Day-Spring), Andrae Crouch (Light), The Bill Gaither Trio (Word), B. J. Thomas (Myrrh), Walter Hawkins (Light), Billy Preston (Myrrh) and The Boone Girls-Debby, Lindy, Laury and Cherry (Lamb & Lion).

The "Gospel Fever" promotion kit provides various merchandising aids for retail outlets including a floor dump for 100 lps with a header card, a full-color mobile, record bags, a "Gospel Fever" newspaper, a window banner, newspaper ad slicks, 30 and 60 second radio spots and an instore airplay kit. Extra items available for store use include a 60 second TV spot, T-shirts and bin divider cards. A special 90 minute radio documentary featuring the artists involved in the campaign will be available to all radio stations for airing at their convenience.

A publicity blitz covering major secular trade and consumer publications and religious periodicals is planned throughout October, November and December with artist interviews and feature articles. Artists' TV and concert appearances will also be tied in with the campaign wherever possible.

bookstore and secular retail outlets alike. "The program was originally designed to go through our secular rackjobbers and distributors," says Lundy, "but due to the phenomenal response we got from Christian bookstores, we're opening it up to that market during the last part of the quarter in hopes that we'll have a 'Gospel Fever' prepack in just about any type of record store.

"We put our most recognized and best selling artists in this package hoping that people who like gospel music but are not as knowledgeable as to where to find it will discover these artists in their normal shopping outlets and expand the artists' total marketplace."

The underlying motive for "Gospel Fever" goes beyond the immediate benefits for Word, Inc. and its artists to affect gospel music as a whole. "Our attempt here," asserts Word's marketing vice president Stan Moser, "on behalf of our artists, our company and the entire gospel music industry, is to better isolate for front door view these displays of gospel product in secular outlets and show retailers, radio stations and consumers that when gospel product is properly represented in a given outlet and properly promoted through the secular channels of radio, print, etc., the product really does sell, because there is a large gospel music buying audience."

"All the companies in gospel music are getting more aggressive in merchandising," declares Lundy, "but I don't think there has ever been anything this broad and innovative taken to the secular market. As gospel product is not something secular outlets readily accept, they have to be sold on it; and the more that 'Gospel Fevers' are successful then the more product they'll be putting in their stores."

CMA Board Meets in Nashville

■ NASHVILLE—The fourth quarterly board meeting for 1978 of the Country Music Association was held on Oct. 17 at Nashville's First American Center, It was the final meeting for the 1977-78 CMA board of directors; a new board for the coming year was elected at CMA's annual membership meeting at Opryland Oct. 19.

Among the items discussed at the board meeting were the results of the 1978 annual awards show. TV committee chairman Irving Waugh reported that the show once again led the ratings during its time period, capturing a 39 share of the total viewing audience, as compared to ABC's tootball game with a 28 share, and NBC's movie with a 33 share. Also for the first time in CMA history, this year's show was simulcast over 55 radio stations across the United States, representing 31 states and 25 out of the top 50 markets. Reports received from several of these stations indicated a tremendous audience response to the broadcast.

Banquet committee chairman Jim Fogelsong reviewed plans for CMA's 20th anniversary banquet and show. Bud Wendell reported on the artist/DJ tape sessions to be held at the Municipal Auditorium Oct. 20 and 21 during the Grand Ole Opry birthday celebration.

PR committee chairman Charles Scully advised the board that a Nashville PR firm, Holder-Kennedy, had been retained by CMA to aid in the organization's extensive country music month activities. The next board meeting, with the newly elected 1978-79 board in attendance, will be held in Nashville on Nov. 17, at which time officers will be elected.

CMA's first quarterly board meeting for 1979 will be held Jan. 10 and 11.

Talent Buyers Seminar Attracts Record Crowd

■ NASHVILLE—A record crowd of more than 300 persons representing a broad speetrum of the entertainment industry gathered here Oct. 13-15 for the Country Music Association's 7th annual Talent Buyer's Seminar.

Chairman Don Romeo and cochairman Shorty Lavender, who also serve on the CMA board. called the seminar the best yet.

This year's program began on Friday morning and ran through Sunday evening. The seminar was highlighted by a Friday night trip to the Opry, four showcases for new talent, and was climaxed Sunday evening by a supershow.

Keynote speaker for this year's program was Charley Pride, followed by Charlie Daniels and Joe Sullivan of Sound Seventy Corporation discussing the relationship between manager, artist and agency. The afternoon session featured a tour of the Opry House, a cocktail party and the Friday night Opry.

Saturday morning's program included panels on music licensing and trade papers, as well as a discussion of the record company's role in promoting new acts. In the afternoon, Bill Anderson presented his country music audiovisual show, and mini sessions dealing with insurance, computerization, legal concerns, licensing and artist requirements were held.

Saturday evening the Nashville Association of Talent Directors were hosts at a cocktail party.

Sunday afternoon's program included a disc jockey panel with WSM's Ralph Émery and WIRE's Lee Shannon, a discussion of the obligation of the buyer to the public, and a wrap-up session with CMA president Joe Talbot, board chairman Don Nelson, and executive director Joe Walker.

The awards, inducting the songwriters as members of the NSAI Hall of Fame, were presented at the Ninth Annual Hall of Fame Ceremony and Dinner at the Sheraton South.

President's Award

Wesley Rose was the recipient of the President's Award. Presenters included Charlie Williams, Cindy Walker, and NSAI board members Harlan Howard, Marijohn Wilkin and Danny Dill. NSAI president Bob Jennings gave the annual presidential message. Other speakers were Billy Edd Wheeler and ASCAP southern regional executive director and NSAI board member Ed Shea.

Bourke, along with treasurer Patsy Bruce and executive director Maggie Cavender, appealed for donations to NSAI as well as suggestions for fund-raising.
