There's Life In The Old Girl Yet

The way some people talk, you would think the record business was on the verge of total collapse. All because of a bureaucratic interpretation of a codicil in the Federal Communications Act which might cost radio stations some ten or fifteen dollars to audition most of the new releases in a single week, if they had to pay for each reoord auditioned in that time.

To save that ten or fifteen bucks, we are expected to believe that radio is going to lay down dead, and that the record business, like some ancient Hindu bride, is going to cast itself into the grave out of sheer compassion, misery and helplessness.

But the picture is not quite as dark as it is projected. It is only the screen that is blurred. After all, there is still a good deal of bounce and romance in an industry where Elvis Presley's first release in two years (despite the FCC interpretation) has already passed the one million mark. And Capitol Records informs us that not since Tennessee Ernie's *Sixteen Tons* has the label had such an initial reaction to a record as to Jeanne Black's *He'll Have To Stay*. Old Town takes paid space in the trade press to inquire if business is bad, and answers: "Not here!"

And where else in modern American business can a few people get together to form a little record company—and with its first outing beat one of the giants in the industry all the way up the charts. This actually happened to *The Madison* on Amy vs. *The Madison Time* on Columbia.

With so much zest and life and opportunity in what is still a very much open industry-open for talent and imagination and business acumen-things cannot be so bad, after all.

As Archy's Mehitabel used to say, toujours gai, there's life in the old girl yet.

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

FCC Ruling Suspended

As predicted last week in Music Vendor, the FCC's interpretation of Section 317 of the Federal Communications Act has been rescinded until further notice.

The FCC's announcement that the ruling is temporarily lifted now leaves the interpretation of the section solely in the hands of the radio stations.

Section 317 stipulates that "all matter broadcast by any station for which service or money . . . is directly or indirectly promised . . . shall at the time of the broadcast be announced as paid for or furnished."

Since the Federal Communications Act was passed in 1934, stations have interpreted this section broadly.

Jack Schwartz Joins Music Vendor Staff

Jack Schwartz has left the Long Island Press to join the staff of Music Vendor as news editor. This is in keeping with Music Vendor's policy of sound news coverage as a corrective to so much of the puff stuff that invariably finds its way into many of the trade publications. Schwartz, who served as a regional reporter for the Press, formerly was on the public relations staff of Grossingers. At The City College, of which he is a graduate, he edited The Campus, an undergraduate newspaper.

Mercury Leads In First Quarter

Mercury Records was the most successful label in the nation for the first quarter of the year, according to the Music Vendor charts.

Mercury led the field placing 19 discs among the top ten hits. It ran number one for three consecutive weeks with Johnny Preston's "Running Bear." This was followed up with the lucrative "Baby," and the revamped version of "Harbor Lights."

Other labels scoring high on the charts for the first three months this year were Columbia, MGM and ABC-Paramount.

Code of Ethics Adopted, Section 317 Discussed At Initial DJA Confab

MINNEAPOLIS-Adoption of a Code of Ethics by the Disc Jockey Association which specifically spelled out that no members would accept favors or allow anyone to influence them on record-playing and an offer to the National Association of Broadcasters for DJA to help NAB in recommending changes of Section 317 to the FCC were the highlights of the first official membership meeting of the group held here at the Plck-Nicollet Hotel April 8-10.

Practically all officers, headed by President Jim Rawthorne of KFWB, Los Angeles, were re-elected and the board of directors was reduced to 28 members.

DJA again spelled out that it was strictly a professional organization and that its bylaws specifically forbid it from bargaining with stations or negotiating in any way regarding salaries, working conditions, etc.

This was stressed to allay any fears on management's part about the status of DJA. In fact, several top management representatives attended the meeting including Todd Storz, head of his five-station radio group; Chuck Blore, vice president of the Crowell-Collier group of stations including KFWB, Hollywood; and Lionel S. Baxter, executive of the Storer Broadcasting System, Miami. Additionally, other top executives expressed their regrets at their inability to attend. John F. Box, Jr., managing director of the Balaban group of stations, wired his regrets from St. Louis stating that union negotiations prevented him from coming to Minneapolis for the conclave but wishing the DIA best success and promising to work with the group in every way possible. Gilbert McLendon, too, was unable to attend, being in Europe at the present time.

No record company executives were invited to attend the DJA meet and none were in attendance. Storz' presence was interpreted by many that he himself would not sponsor any more dee-jay conventions but that should DJA eventually work out

some arrangement whereby record firms might legitimately exhibit their wares at future meetings, he (Storz) would support such a move.

Section 317 of the Communications Act came in for considerable discussion at the meeting. Originally, it was planned to send a two paragraph resolution to the FCC advocating the continued practice of stations receiving promotional records but calling for support of the FCC interpretation whereby record giveaways would be forbidden at hops or for prizes.

After considerable discussion it was decided to forward any DJA comments to the National Association of Broadcasters, who as management representatives, could then study the DJA recommendations and forward them on the FCC.

Additionally DJA thought it might be helpful to the NAB if the disc jockeys could "sit in" with the NAB when Section 317 discussions were being held and sought permission to do so.

The DJA resolution, stated in part, "The members of the DJA agree that the recent FCC interpretation of Section 317 needs revision and offers its complete support to the NAB resolution seeking relief since the ruling vitally concerns the disc jockeys of America and their association as well as management and as we may be able to offer suggestions in areas where we are, perhaps, more knowledgable, we respectfully solicit an invitation to be represented and contribute whatever and whenever possible to this matter."

Questions of raising money for the organization were discussed. Turned down was the proposal to increase annual dues from \$10 to \$20, the feeling being that the higher dues would keep many smaller-town disc jockeys from joining. President Jim Hawthorne said that, while temporarily tabled, Producer Robert Lippert, releasing through 20th Century-Fox, was still inter-(Continued on page 23)





MGM Records Expands Staff

Tom Edwards, the city slicker turned country boy, would have everybody know that he's now heading up a large C&W show featuring name guests every other week on WADC-Akron, O.


Harold Friedman To Europe For Rank Records Conference

ested in making a deejay film in co-operation with DJA, and that talks on this matter might be resumed later this year. A portion of the film proceeds, or a flat fee, would be given DJA for its co-operation on the film.

Some 50-odd members were present in Minneapolis with proxies from other mem⁴ bers accounting for nearly 100 votes in the deliberations. Present strength of Disc Jockey Association is approximately 150 members according to Bill Gavin. Gavin, who is a free-lance programming executive in San Francisco, was elected treasurer, while Bill Enis, KSWB, San Francisco, was elected the new secretary.



 A bouncy rendition of the country hit by the two youngsters, who make a charming couple. Could be a big pop number.

YOU ALONE (Mills Music Inc., ASCAPI - Lori Parker - CORAL 62191

 New teenage thrush gets a nice string backing and sympatico Latin beat on her first Coral outing. A very nice ballad which could be the first of many.

CONSPIRACY OF HEARTS (Jaro-Peer Int') Corp., BMII - Johnny Costa - TOP RANK 2043

 An exceptional instrumental by pianist Costa, Hearts, which has the makings of another Summer Place, is a fine ballad given superior piano work and unusual string backing. It's the top o' the charts for this one.

ONE LITTLE GIRL (Compton Music Corp., ASCAPI / EXCLUSIVELY YOURS (Rumbalero Music, Inc., BMII - Carl Dobkins, Jr. - DECCA 31088

 Two uptempo, teen-slanted ballads welldone by that Dobkins boy. Sprightly combo and choral backings should help either up the charts.

HAPPY-GO-LUCKY-ME (Pambill Music Inc., Lyle Music, Inc., ASCAPI - Paul Evans -**GUARANTEED 208**

 A delightfully wacky novelty by Evans, Happy finds Paul in a manic mood, so much so that he "cracks up" in the middle of the side. Could follow Midnite Special up the charts.

MACK THE KNIFE (Harms Inc., ASCAPI -Ella Fitzgerald - VERVE 10209

 Recorded in concert in Berlin, Ella's rendition of the recent hit theme from The Three-penny Opera is a real gem and a tribute to the versatility of this magnificent performer. Ella's own innovations, including a great impersonation of Louis Armstrong, add to her intriguing rendition. Mack should be a best seller again via this version.

YOU UNDERSTAND ME (Planetary Music, ASCAPI - Sam Cooke - RCA VICTOR 7730

• Sam's second for the Victor label is a bouncy ballad which suits his familiar style to a T. A good reading here, Cooke's really cooking with this one.
