



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Gary, Excellent publication! Very professional and well laid-out - nice look.

I have noticed several ads looking for round dial glass. This is easily available from clock repair shops, especially ones that do a lot of restoration.

Also, there is a place that does clock dial face restoration and could probably do that for any printed dial (either metal or plastic I would imagine): Burt Dial, Box 599, Exeter, NH 03833.

I would want to caution everyone again on the dangers of cleaning dials. Everyone has probably wiped the printing off of one at least once. Test the surface in an obscure area before cleaning. Some dials will take a lot of scrubbing without any wear, whereas others will smear if you look at them cross-eyed. I usually use window cleaner as a cleaner, but sometimes a milder cleaner like dishwashing soap is better. Experience will teach you to look closely at the dial to determine if the print is a weak surface job or imbedded between layers of plastic.

P.S. - How about a page of "sources" for stuff like knob repros, veneers, coil winders, etc. Also, a list of major collectors of particular brands like Zenith, Philco, AK, Freshman, RCA, etc. I don't know who they are but I'm sure as active as you are in the hobby (or a few others you might tap for this), you could put a strong list together off the top of your head.

Editors Comment: Concerning your list of "sources", I again agree there is a need for this. I briefly covered this subject in the April issue of A.R.C. on page number three. FINDS OF THE MONTH...

I have been collecting radios for over five years and have an excellent collection of rare and hard to come by radios. Though my collection has given me much enjoyment, I have never felt that it was "complete" until I could get an Atwater Kent breadboard. I guess every collector feels that way, there has to be a breadboard in order to obtain that "special felling" in a collection. My breadboard came about as follows:

We have a paper that is delivered to everyone in several counties for free. It contains only "for sale" and "wanted" ads. Also listings of auctions and flea markets. The last issue listed a "one time" flea market about 15 miles from my home. Naturally a flea market is a good place to find old radios, so I went. After asking twenty vendors for old radios, I received the usual reply - "sorry, we haven't any."

Then I asked the next vendor - "any old radios?" He looked at me and replied, "yes, I have one at home, but it has no cabinet, just sits on a board. It has three dials and five tubes. Look's like H--. Guess some guy tried to build a radio years ago. If you want to see it, I'll bring it tomorrow - for \$55.00." Well, I recognized the set as a breadboard, and couldn't sleep all that night!

Next morning I was at the flea market by 7:30. They opened at 8:00, but I couldn't wait. As I drove by the vendor I saw the radio on the top of the vendor's van. Even at that distance I

It only took 3 hours to clean up, and it now sets in my collection as my most honored prize. It is in excellent condition and is almost show room "new". EDITORS COMMENTS...

As you now know, A.R.C. has raised its yearly subscription price from \$15 to \$18 per year. It was hoped that this \$3.00 increase would alleviate some of our finacial problems. But to add more misery for us, the U.S. Post Office has just recently raised their rates to mail 2nd Class publications.

Two increases, one on March 9th and the other on April 20th, have almost doubled our postage cost. Unfortunately the Post Office gave us no advance notice of these increases. By the time it was found out about the rate hikes, it was too late to adjust our subscription rates to reflect the new mailing cost (advertising flyers and other promotional items were printed well before the rate increases were known). As you might imagine, postage cost are a large portion of our cost to publish A.R.C.

As of right now we are still sticking to our original \$3.00 subscription increase, however, something must change in the future to enable us to continue publishing A.R.C. At this time we don't know what the solution is, but we will gladly accept any comments or suggestions you might have to resolve some of our financial problems. (GBS)

COLLECTORS Q's & A's...

COLLECTORS Q's & A's - This column is available to the readers of A.R.C. to enable them to find answers to any questions they may have concerning restoration problems, sources to buy restoration supplies & parts, and other relevant questions pertaining to the "old radio hobby". COLLECTORS Q's & A's - In answer to collectors Q's & A's question #2 in the February 1986 issue of A.R.C. (on how to replace a defective tapped volume control when you don't have one), I can reply by giving my own solution to this problem when restoring a Zenith 7S685. The set required a 2.5 meg volume control with two taps. It was absolutely necessary to have such a control with the two taps, as the tone control circuit works through the taps on the volume control. A volume control with no taps could have been used to restore the radio to working condition, but the tone control circuit would be disabled, making a poor restoration as well (the shaft was an oddball size - 1/8" dia.).

My solution to the problem was to use an eleven position non-shorting switch for a volume control by placing fixed resistors between each switch position in series. The total added up to about 2.5 meg, and the taps could be connected at any two of the switch stops. To adapt the shaft to this radio I cut the shaft as short as possible, drilled an 1/8" hole in the center, inserted an appropriate length of welding rod in the hole, and brazed the welding rod to the shaft. A flat was filed on the end to accommodate the knob setscrew. Before brazing was done, the phenolic switch wafer was removed to avoid burning it.

Below is the schematic of the control. The values shown are for a 2.5 meg control. If another value is needed these values can be scaled in proportion to what is needed. For example - if a 250K control is needed, just divide all resistance values by 10. In selecting the given values, I selected the values given so as to provide the same semi-log taper as the original control would have. Here is the schematic:

With these values I get a smooth and continuous change in volume as the switch is rotated. If an attached on-off switch is desired, buy a switch with an extra gang and use the second gang for an on-off switch. I hope this will be of help to other restorers, as I have faced this problem many times before. (Peter Ivanchich, 30040 Jamestown, Romulus, MI 48174)

The public was insisting that I use only "fresh" replacement tubes, and in some instances show some kind of proof that they were "fresh", by date on sales invoices, etc. I presume they were associating tubes with the limited shelf life span of B batteries. LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Gary, if you would allow one more letter in the ongoing debate on dealers in our hobby, I would like to add a few brief comments.

I fully agree with the previous writer's assessment of the antique radio dealers who "save sets from the dump." These people, who spend their valuable time and money seeking out radios at flea markets, auctions and garage sales, are indeed doing the hobby a service and deserve whatever reward they get.

What I disagree with is the practice of buying a radio from one collector with the sole Intent of reselling it at a profit to another. To cite an extreme example: At a major radio meet last year, one collector/dealer bought an item from me. A few minutes later, I saw this same radio at the dealer's swap meet space, now on sale for more than double what he paid me for it. Before the day was over, several other radios had met this same fate.

This kind of behavior is reprehensible. Besides being obnoxious, in my opinion, it makes a mockery of any attempt to keep prices at a moderate level. Some inflation is natural, of course, and I see nothing wrong with making an occasional profit on a radio deemed surplus to one's collection. But what's the point of offering a radio for sale at an affordable price if a dealer is going to buy it and jack up the price?

I challenge that dealer to use this forum to present his side of the issue. Yours Sincerely - Steve Baron.


ROGERS BATTERYLESS R-641

Among the most interesting company histories is that of the maker of this months featured radio, the Rogers Batteryless R-641 manufactured by the Rogers-Majestic Corporation Ltd. of Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Edward Rogers, while not inventing the AC operated radio tube, solved the many problems that were keeping the AC operated radio receiver from being commercially feasible. The first line of Rogers Batteryless radios were displayed at the Canadian National Exposition held in Toronto in August and September of 1925. Eight models were available ranging in price from \$110 to \$370, having either a 5 or 7 tube chassis. The RF, AF, and detector tubes were similar to the McCollough/Sparton 401 and the half wave rectifier was similar to an O1A minus the grid.

In November of 1928 Rogers and the Grigsby-Grunow Company of Chicago (Maiestic Radio) consolidated interests in Canada and became the Rogers-Majestic Corporation Ltd. It was mutually beneficial as Majestic was just moving into radio production and needed the patents and expertise available at Rogers. Rogers was strengthened against the onslaught of AC receivers entering the market. Rogers survived the collapse of Majestic in 1934 and took over the DeForest-Crosley Radio Corporation of Canada in 1935 becoming the largest maker of Canadian radios. Rogers died in 1939 and in 1941 the company was sold to Rediffusion Ltd. of England. Now, Rogers-Majestic is part of the North American Philips Company.

The Rogers R-641 is a 6 tube TRF receiver and was introduced in 1931. Three type 24 tubes are used in the 2 RF stages and in the detector, which is transformer coupled to a push-pull audio output stage using 2 type 45 tubes. An 80 rectifier provides DC which is amply filtered by a choke, speaker field coil, and two 8 mfd. filter caps. Volume is controlled by varying the cathode voltage to the 2 RF tubes. A 2 position tone control is used.

The chassis of the R-641 is made of heavy gauge metal, the RF tubes and tuner are shielded, and the chassis is well ventilated. The



construction is quite similar to Majestic sets of the same period. The cabinet is of high quality and is available in a number of different styles. The set weighs 40 pounds and measures 19 inches high, 19 inches wide, and 10 inches deep. As with all TRF sets selectivity is lacking, however, sensitivity is very good as is tone quality.

As Rogers was one of the largest set makers in Canada, occasionally they can be found in the U.S. Like all Canadian radios they are very scarce as few, if any, were imported and little information can be found on them. One thing to watch for on these Rogers sets is warping of the tuner plates due to deterioration of the pot metal mountings. Luckily these can be replaced with units from Majestic models 20, 30, 50, and possibly other models which are quite easily found.

Most of the above historical information on Rogers is from "Rogers Batteryless Radio Receiving Sets, A Brief History" by Maurice Chaplin of Hamilton, Ontario. The next installment will feature an unusual AC table radio of 1928, the Shamrock model 28-29. (Frank Heathcote)


VIBROPLEX VERTICAL BUG -This "upright" or Wire Chiefs' key was made from about 1917 to about 1925 for the cluttered wire chiefs' desk so it would take up the minimum amount of space. Although they have a nice action, apparently not too many were made as very few can be found to-day. It is fashioned after the single contact mechanism incorporated into the Vibroplex "X" models made at about the same period. Courtesy R.W. Reinke.




TILLOTSON CAMELBACK - A post Civil War camelback, it was used on the landlines during the 1870's and onward. It is of heavy brass construction and built onto an oval hard rubber base. A small but well built piece of equipment made for rugged use. Courtesy R. Matson.



KENCO BUG - This bug was made bythe Kenmore Co. of Boston. It is built onto a piece of 1/8" bakelite, and that was mounted on a hollowed cast iron base. It looks very much like the Go-Devil bugs, and until I picked this one up in the original box, I though it was one. It dates approximately from the 1930's.



POSTAL TELEGRAPH BUG - This bug is built onto a cast iron base a full one inch thick, making it steady as a rock. Stamped into the top is the wording: "Property of Postal Telegraph Cable Co". A simple, but effective, instrument made for rough use it survived the modern day rough handling of the Post Office, but just barely. Courtesy M. Routt.






CROSLEY REVIEW

Of all the rodio monufacturers, one of the most popular with collectors is the Crosley Radio Corporation. Due to this wide-spread interest, Antique Rodio Classified in cooperation with Dave Crocker, a Crosley specialist, will present a series of articles showing the many models of Crosleys manufactured. This will help assist the collector in identifying the many types of Crosleys made, as well as increasing ones' knowledge on the subject. MODEL 4-29 - Late 1925 saw an entirely all-wood cabinet model 4-tube receiver. Tuning was done with two variable plate condensers (no "book" tuners). Tubes were serviced through a removable oval wooden lid on top. It was designated "Model 4-29", 4 tubes... \$29 price. The regeneration coils were the same as earlier Crosleys... but referred to as the "Crescendon" for volume control. The 4-29 was the last model to use Crosley's old faithful large-type tuning dials.




MODEL 6-60 - This "6-60" indicates it was a six tube receiver that sold for \$60. You got one tube more of amplification than the 5-50 model, plus an on/off switch on the panel. All stamped metal trim appeared as gold finished.

LOWAVE - In 1926 Crosley offered a unit for short wave reception. It was called the "LOWAVE" and used 3 tubes and two plug-in coils for various bandwidths desired. It connected between the antenna lead-in and the antenna input posts of any receiver.



MODEL 5-50 - In 1927 the first metal chassis base was introduced in this 5-tube "5-50" (5 tubes... \$50). Each of the three sections of the chassis was separate and shielded from one another. Single dial tuning made its entrance by means of a thumb wheel drum with a paper dial and had space to note desired stations.



MODEL AC-7 - Late 1927 had Crosley introduce its first A, B & C power converters from light socket plugs. It connected up to this AC-7 seven tube set that resembled the 5-50 except for the voltmeter on the panel. Its price was \$70. A console version was offered for \$15 more.



PRECISION "ACE" TUNER/AMP.

The set pictured is a double decker version of the TRU Concert Receptor and AV2 Amplifier that Precision Equipment was selling in 1922. I obtained this set from Glenn Baird who was most gracious to part with it. I'm making a guess that this set was sold by Crosley between January and August of 1923.

The regenerative tuner on the bottom is all Precision with ACE tube socket, condenser, variocoupler and rheostat. The knobs are not the ones shown in 1922 Precision ads, but are the same as pictured in the back of an early 1923 Crosley catalog. The binding posts are the same ones Crosley used on his Model X.


The amplifier on top is very different from the amplifier Precision advertised. Precision's original AV2 amplifier had a filament switch in the top center, a lever switch in the mid center, and two perforated peep holes in the panel. The amplifier pictured utilizes jacks in place of the lever switch, Crosley-like eyelets for the peep holes, and Crosley binding posts.

Inside, the amplifier contains ACE sockets and the distinctive ACE transformers. The bottom of the amplifier is actually the top of the tuner and is hinged. The entire amp must be lifted up on the hinges to gain access to the tuner.

The set is an excellent performer due to the Armstrong regenerative circuit. it covers the entire present day broadcast band. I used a 50 foot antenna strung up in the attic to pick up the stations shown on the log sheet (tap switch #6 is fully CW). I am unable to report on the performance of the amplifier since one of the audios is open.

The jacks on the amplifier of this set are a significant departure from Precision's philosophy, if Precision did indeed make this set. In advertising the original AV2 amplifier Precision states:

"The majority of amplifiers now available use the plug and jack method of changing from detector to one or two stages of amplification. The slipping




contact of this type we have found to be objectionable, due to its becoming dirty and greasy, and making poor contact, which causes interfering internal noises in the receivers. We have therefore eliminated the plug and jack, and have devised a special switching arrangment which provides an ideal changeover from detector to one or two stages of amplification..." Contrast this to the fact that Crosley announced a new model, the XJ, in an August 1923 ad of QST. It had... a jack on the front panel.






TUNER SCHEMATIC

However, under that I got down to the varnish and found it to be a butted walnut veneer. The front was in rough shape, but the sides were in real good shape. The clock on its side runs good but I am at a loss to know its real function with the radio. There is a motor that drives the variable condenser - this motor is controlled by the clock, which has 48 different settings. Each of these 48 have four colored coded settings with a wire which go to the back of the radio, where there are ten adjustable settings. The four leads have plug-in's on them which go into the adjustable jacks. A very simple set-up, isn't it!






