
RCA RADIOLA MODEL 20

The Radiola 20 has the distinction of being the only non-superhet available from RCA for the 1925-26 season. The selling price was generally about \$100.

The circuit is TRF with a regenerative detector utilizing dry-cell tubes. Regeneration is controlled by linkage, coupled to the right drum-dial, which moves the tickler coil. The tuning condenser is ganged together and controlled by the left drum-dial and includes verniers for the RF stages.

Performance of the Radiola 20 is very good. Once set up and playing, the receiver is easy to operate. For best results use a filament voltmeter installed into the pin-jacks on the lower right (see photo). For best selectivity, select the proper ANT input (Long, Med and Short are provided) and, of course, keep the AMPLIFICATION control (regeneration) near the oscillating point.

The Radiola 20 was tested last November and the DX received was phenomenal. In one evening, WWL in New Orleans, WLW in Cincinnati and WCCO in Minneapolis were tuned in on loud-speaker. This was repeated the following evening. The conclusion is that even though the Radiola 20 was RCA's low priced, non-superhet, it can still do a fine job of DXing today. 
CRYSTAL SET REVIEW





RESURRECTING METAL BALLAST TUBES



How often have you purchased a 'new' metal ballast tube and then found it doesn't work properly in your set, or appears burned out? Recently I made a study of a fair sized group of tubes and if you work with ballast tubes, maybe the following will give you some answers.

Ballast tubes were made in a variety of types and sizes. The earlier ones were glass tubes filled and sealed with an inert gas such as nitrogen. Some European types used hydrogen. The resistance element was spot welded to the pin leads. This all created a nonoxidizing environment for the ballast section, and barring physical damage, a glass tube ballast 50 years old is as good now as the day it was made.

Later on, the metal types appeared, but with those we are not as fortunate. Most of those were mounted on 4 pin or Octal bases. The metal cases came in a wide range of sizes (some perforated) and were not hermetically sealed. The resistance element was usually crimped in a copper wire lead to the pins - very few were soldered. As such, they were subject to atmospheric conditions which promotes oxidation. A lot depends on how those tubes were stored the last 40 or 50 years. Some are as shiney new inside as the day manufactured; but generally the connections of the copper wires to the resistive element are oxidized or even green with corrosion, creating high-resistance junctions, or even opens. This then is most of the problem, the other being a broken element. With patience and care, these problems in your tube can be corrected. But first, some details of how they are constructed are in order.

Almost all have a mica card with sawtoothed cutouts at each end that fits in the metal shell. At the bottom, soft copper wire leads are wrapped through holes to support the mica, and they are routed to the proper pins of the tube base where they are soldered. The resistance element is wrapped around the mica, top to bottom in the V-shaped slots and then led to the copper wire terminals where they are crimped to make connection. Sometimes the resistance wire is wrapped 2 or 3 turns before crimping, but the majority used only one loop. This type connection was used by JFD, Hytron, Clarostat, Zenith and others. In some cases, the pin leads were fastened to the mica with eyelets and the resistance leads soldered. GE is the only one that used this that I have seen.



So, if you have a metal ballast that doesn't act right, the first thing to do is check it out. From a schematic of the set its used in, or a ballast handbook, determine the pins involved and approximate resistance that should be between those pins. A few ohms one way or other doesn't matter as tolerances were broad on these. But if its way high, or you can't get the same result twice, its probably bad connections inside.


To remove the shell, first carefully pry up the 4 crimps to the base. A 1/8 inch screwdriver works fine for this. By prying and twisting, the tabs can be straightened. Then carefully slide the shell off the base and mica card. Use care when first separating base from shell as in some rare instances the resistance wires were brought directly to the base pins and soldered. The mica card is not then fastened to the base. This type usually doesn't have any connection problems though.

Next, check if the resistance element is ok. If it has broken off near a crimp terminal, unwind about 1/2 inch of the spiral and reconnect to the terminal. The small difference in resistance usually will not present any problem. If the copper wires are oxidized, using a small knife blade, carefully open up the crimped end and slide the element wire out of the way. Then gently scrape the inside of the crimped wire until bright. Using tweezers or small long nose pliers, reinsert or wrap element wire and recrimp the copper; use a little heavier pliers for this. If there is only one loop through the crimp, try to wrap in one more. In some cases this might not be advisable, but it makes for a more realiable connection. Proceed to each connection until all are redone. Some manufacturers used a hard compound to hold the elements to the mica. This can be carefully chipped away if need be to make your connection repairs.

In the case of the type that used eyelets and soldered connections—this would seem to be the ideal way to go. But some of those have problems too. Apparently a flux (not rosin) was used in the soldering process that over the years has also corroded. I don't know whether it was the flux, or the soldering heat, or both: but the corroded portion of element is extremely brittle near the soldered joint. This usually is no longer than 3/8 inch. Naturally, with any jarring such as in shipping or handling, they break and you have opens in a 'new' tube, no fault of the dealer. The solution here is to cut out the corroded part of the element and rewind a couple of turns around the pin lead and resolder. Common rosin core solder seems to works well for this

When all connections have been completed and are acceptable, the last step is to reattach the shell to the base. The first tendency here would be to use a hammer and punch to reseat the shell tabs - but DON'T DO IT!! Any hammering or tapping on the base is inviting trouble in the form of broken elements or at least jarring loose the sealing compound. The only way is to gently squeeze the tabs onto the base. This probably can be done in several ways depending on your tool collection. The method I use is simple and effective, but requires a vise.

Drill a hole in a small block of 3/4 inch thick wood, a diameter that will accept the bottom portion of the shell (11/4 inch diameter for most). Cut a slot 1/8 inch wide and 3/4 inch long on the upper side. For the swaging le-



ver, get a piece of strap iron 1/8 inch x 3/4 inch x 7 inches long. File a notch out as shown. Clamp block in a vise as in cross-sectional view. Slip tube into block up to the base. Use the strap iron as a pressure lever to squeeze the tabs back into place. Gently is the key word in this whole process. Rotate tube and press tabs a little at a time until shell is tight to base.

Here's another idea worth considering: There are a lot of ballast tubes out there that were made specifically for high line voltages that are no longer usable on our 115 volt lines today. Many can be utilized by jumpering base pins so as to parallel some of the high resistances. A test setup would be required to determine the new operating parameters before using them. Might just work to replace one of the hard to find types. (Contributed by: Anthony Jacobi)






MODEL RFL-60 - Late 1926, early 1927 saw the introduction of the "RFL" series, which was the "Super Trirdyn" chassis reworked and two more tubes added for cascade amplification. This is the "RFL-60" and is housed in the same box as the Super Trirdyn Regular. Its price was \$60.



SUPER TRIRDYN REGULAR - Late 1925 and early 1926 saw the restyling of the three tube Trirdyn models. This new series all had the prefix "Super". All interior hardware was attached to a Mahogany plywood suspended panel. The front panel remained black Bakelite, the cabinet was solid Mahogany. The same metal stamped escutheons and dial indicators that first appeared on the 51-SD and 52-SD models were used. Its price was \$50 and was called the "Super Trirdyn Regular".

MODEL 52-SD - Like "small brother" (Model 51-SD) the 3-tube model 52 got a similar facelift to become the "Model 52-SD or Special Deluxe. Unlike the 51, the 52 version had a phone jack on the panel. The new flat, composition molded, fine fluted knobs gave a "new look" to the Crosley line.



MODEL 5-38 - Big brother to the 4-29 in 1926 was this model 5-38 (5 tubes... \$38 price). Like the 4-29, an oval wood cover lifted to service the tubes. Access to its innards was accomplished by unscrewing the base. This is the first version because it used the same stamped metal dial pointers sweeping over a stamped metal dial indicator plate.



SUPER TRIRDYN SPECIAL - The "Super Trirdyn Regular" chassis was also offered in a more spacious and ornate cabinet and called the "Super Trirdyn Special". It cost \$10 more but its workings were identical. The entire Mahogany cabinet top lifted for access to the chassis and batteries. A decorative Mahogany table base was available for \$25 more to give the set a console appearance.




A-K BREADBOARD REVIEW

The Atwater Kent "breadboard" review is an attempt to present in pictorial form each month some of the many variations of models produced. This will enable the collector to help identify the breadboards he may possess. The photos appearing each month are all reproduced on the same scale, so that variations in size can be visualized. ATWATER KENT MODEL 2 - PART NO. 3925: In 1922 a popular circuit was a detector-two stage audio amplifier coupled to the antenna by means of a simple resonant circuit. Atwater Kent produced several such sets, including the one pictured above which was actually the second model he made in the factory. Like the first one, reviewed in the March 1986 A.R.C., it could be made into a regenerator by adding a Variometer between the Tuner and the three-tube unit. The goal was to provide loud speaker volume so the second amplifier was a valuable addition, even though the cost of tubes was very high. This set used a type 200 for the detector and two 201's for the amplifiers. Because these tubes used tungsten filaments, they radiated enough light to be annoying. Tube shades were made available by AK to block the light escaping upward from inside the plate structure. Like the earlier set, the factory simply assembled the instruments (less variometer) on an already available board. Both sets used the same 18 1/2" x 8 1/2" mahogany board.



ATWATER KENT MODEL 12(B) - PART NO. 4620: The year 1924 saw many improvements in the manufacture of radio receivers, the most important of which was tuned radio amplifiers incorporated to provide selectivity and enough pre-detector radio-signal amplification to permit good grid-leak action on relatively weak signals. Even so, there were times when the audio signal was too small to let two stages of audio amplification provide loud speaker volume. Model 12B offered a third audio amplifier to boost these low level signals. This was the top-of-the-line feature. The set pictured is similar to the one shown in the January 1986 issue of A.R.C., but differs in having the bias potentiometer characteristic of the 10A and the 10B. Because the coils were arranged at right-angles like the 10B, the (B) is here used to distinguish the set. The coils themselves are like those on the Models 10C and 12C having end caps. The variable condensers do not have nameplates although a Model 12B may yet turn up with the older style condensers. The board for this set is the largest of the series, being 36" x 10".

AIRLINE - One tube receiver in an attractive cabinet 16" x 8" x 8". The panel is a burgundy mottled with black. Dials and knob are almost a reverse in color, black mottled with burgundy. Uses a single 201A tube. Requires only a short antenna. Sufficient space in cabinet for batteries. (David McKenzie - Eustis, FL)



HUDSON-ROSS INC. - Called the "Globe Trotter", this shortwave radio uses one 6F7 tube and has a plug-in coil. Made in Chicago, Illinois. (Greg Farmer - Minneapolis, MN)



TRIAD - A three side advertising sign made of cardboard. In the center of the sign is a place to plug-in a 5 prong tube. So assume age to be from late 20's or early 30's. (Gary Schneider - Cleveland, OH)



TELMACO - Type B-R, a one tube receiver manufactured by Tri-City Radio Electric Supply Co. for the Radio Division Telephone Maintenance Co. This set was advertised in Radio News magazine, May 1923. Notice the "fine tuning stick" attached to dial. (David Mckenzie - Eustis, FL)




SPARTON - Dealer's electric clock from a Sparton Radio showroom, circa 1930's. Metal-brown woodgrain look, has black letters and numbers, yellow flowers & "to buy your", and yellow and black "SPARTON". Manufactured by Lakeside Mfg. Co., Chicago. (Karl Rommel - Lansing, MI)

DICTOGRAND - It isn't a paper towel dispenser for the kitchen counter, nor is it a clumsy attempt at a stereo speaker. This early Dictogrand speaker actually has two diaphragms, each in the shape of a half cylinder. The "cones" are made of heavy paper. The unit has a screwdriver adjustment in back which affects the volume and clarity of sound. Volume and tone far surpass that of a horn "table talker". Why was this design abandoned? 


