



## Restoration of the Marconi Multiple Tuner

Introduction: The thought of owning a museum-quality piece of early wireless equipment is forever present in the minds of many radio collectors. For one collector this dream has come true. Presented through words and photos, this month's feature article details the dramatic transformation of an ultra-rare Marconi Multiple Tuner into a beautifully restored piece of equipment.

The restoration work is the result of Art Albion's determination and skill in bringing back this neglected piece of equipment to its former glory in the development of wireless history. Needless to say, judging from Art's excellent photos during the restoration process, he has accomplished this feat in splendid fashion.

And who may be the fortunate owner of this historical and rare tuner? One would expect to find this piece in a museum, but a remarkable collector has managed to acquire this set for his own private collection. The proud owner is Jim Kreuzer of Elma, New York. His collection of early wireless artifacts is one of the finest in this country and one of less than a handful of collections (museum and private) in this country known to have a Marconi Multiple Tuner.

Jim will present in a future A.R.C. article the history and development of the Marconi Multiple Tuner. Another article will tell about the developer of the tuner, Charles S. Franklin, and the process that led to the patent of the tuner way back in 1907. (Gary Schneider - Assistant Editor)




When I first saw the Marconi Multiple Tuner, I didn't know whether to hit it with a stick or run. Anyway, I soon found out what it was, and the idea of restoration was mentioned. That's when I left the room. A year later and after a few hours of deep thought, I decided to take a crack at its restoration.

The tuner was in very bad condition. Years of use and neglect had left effects on the piece. The brass parts were badly pitted with lots of corrosion. The screws and nuts were frozen. The base top was badly pitted; from what, I can only guess. The wooden base cabinet had a few mouse chews. The first step in restoration obviously was to decide whether it could be brought back to life without destroying it permanently. It appeared all the parts were there, excluding a small portion of the lever switch. Then came decision time. I plunged in. Had I hesitated, I probably would have put it aside and said to myself, "Forget it."

As I studied the tuner, the biggest problem seemed to be disassembly. Where to start was the question. I started to remove the bottom cover to take a look. I don't think it had ever been removed. The screws were frozen solid: since the screw driver slots were very fine, a minor adjustment to the blade of the screwdriver had to be made so the slots would not be destroyed and the screw heads not distorted. Well, the removal was accomplished and I got my first look inside. Not too bad! The rubber insulation on the main coil had deteriorated and turned to dust at first touch. Strangely enough though, the insulation on the variocoupler was in excellent shape; it was composed of different material than the insulation on all the other wiring. OK, I could fix that.

The next operation was to remove the top base. After lengthy examination I found that the only way to separate the top from the rest of the tuner after removing the screws was to pull it away from the body as far as I could and unsolder the connections. That was a chore. The solder was badly corroded; the wire is 16 gauge and fastened to very heavy brass connections. A lot of heat was necessary. I used a large soldering copper normally used in sheet metal work. It did the trick, and in a while I had the leads unsoldered and the top separated from the body.




Bottom view showing mounting arrangement of various coils in relation to tap switches.

I'll stop here for a minute. It is usually good practice to make a rough sketch of the whole set, get some tags, and, as you remove each wire, tag it and draw the wiring into the sketch. If this isn't done, you always have some connections left over, and it is almost impossible to figure out where they belong.

Now I had the top and the body separated and made some progress. I put the body aside and concentrated on the top base. I decided that since the variable condensers were frozen, they would be the first to be worked on. They turned out to be the biggest problem with the restoration.

I'll try to explain the disassembly of one of the three variable condensers. I hope I can do it adequately. I had to free them up. I tried spraying penetrating oil through a couple of screw holes on the top of the left condenser housing. No luck, so I turned the light out and went to bed.

My next attempt to free up the condensers proved fruitful. I sprayed silicone into the same holes; after working the knob for a while, there was some movement of the dial. I finally managed to rotate the dial 180 degrees, and it loosened up fairly well. After looking at the mounting of the condensers from the bottom

of the base top, I realized that the whole unit had to be disassembled from the top of the base top. I removed all the screws I could. rotated the dial, and noticed a screw slot below a screw hole in the top of the dial. I put a small screwdriver into the hole and managed to loosen the screw. There are two of these hidden screws on each condenser unit, and they hold the stator to the base top. When I had these out, the whole unit came away from the top base. This allowed the large brass ring on the condenser to come free also. Going back a bit, the whole top of the condenser rotates, and this is the rotor. Connections to it are by means of two wipers on the outside of the unit. Also, on the top of the knob, there appears to be a brass screw. This screw is actually a cap nut. It has to be removed, and underneath it on the same shaft is a round nut with spanner slots. Once the cap nut, round nut and wiper parts are removed, and the stator unscrewed as I mentioned earlier, the whole unit is free of the panel. What remains is to polish the brass parts.

As I mentioned earlier, the brass on the tuner was corroded very badly. It was necessary when cleaning it to first soak it in a solution of mild citric acid, then sand it with 340 waterproof abrasive paper. Next it was polished with ordinary brass polish. This was standard procedure used with all the brass parts on the tuner. Ready for the next operation!


The same procedure was repeated for the other two condenser units. Filling of the dial markings could be done at any time. Incidentally, the reason the variable condensers were difficult to rotate is due to the dielectric. It is made of thin hard rubber that had swelled over the years causing the whole unit to bind. Tolerances are very close on all the parts of the tuner. (Continued on following page)



The base top was next. All the other parts were completely removed. The top base panel was cleaned using 4-0 steel wool and then waxed. The name and serial engravings were filled with whiting. All the brass pieces were cleaned and laquered. The spark gap is worth mentioning. This is the small unit located in front of the left-hand variable condenser. It is a very finely machined unit. Adjustment is made as necessary by the operator. The unit is adjusted by means of left-hand threads. The gap points are made of zinc; it was used to ground static discharges and also discharges from the local transmitter if the T/R switch was inadvertently not thrown. Once the base top was cleaned, everything was re-assembled and the unit was complete.


One detail that I should have mentioned earlier is the fact that all machine threads and screws used on the tuner are early English metric, not modern metric. Great care had to be taken when working with them. To strip or break a screw would turn out to be a major problem.

The restoration is straightforward. The front panel, with the switch points, was removed from the body of the tuner. Unsoldering the leads is necessary here also. The same tag and mark procedure followed. Brass parts were removed, cleaned and lacquered. Dial engravings were filled, and the panel reassembled. What I call the second section was complete.





Marconi Multiple Tuner - overall view after restoration.




Rear view of front panel and various coils.

The third section consists of the main coils, loading coils, two fixed condensers, the variocoupler and the three-sided mahogany cabinet. This was also completely disassembled. Next, the variocoupler knob located on the right side of the cabinet was removed. It is held onto the brass variocoupler shaft by a tapered pin. The pin has to be driven out. Care must be taken to drive it from the proper direction: if not, the knob will split. The knob, as all of the black parts of the tuner, is made of hard rubber and has become fragile over the vears. The remaining coils were removed by ursoldering the leads. The main coil needed new insulation on the tap leads. I used the white rubber from a triple 18 gauge extension cord for that, and it looked very good. The three-sided cabinet had a couple of large mouse chews on the corners. These were repaired to blend into the original finish, and a light coat of shellac was sprayed onto the cabinet. The cabinet was assembled to the coils and other parts to complete this phase of restoration.

Now all of the three sections were complete and ready to be put together. The assembly is complicated. I cannot honestly say that I remember the sequence I used in assembly. It cannot be put together and then wired. Referring to my sketches, I proceeded. A few nights and a few mistakes later, the tuner was together. I believe no thought was given by the builders as to how any work could be done on the tuner if it developed any troubles.

Since all the brass parts had been laquered to prevent any further corrosion and discoloration, no attempt was made to see if it would receive any signals. The fixed condensers were checked for quality, and the wiring was double checked. One must keep in mind the wavelengths for which this was designed to

operate on. I'm not too sure if one could tell whether it would work. This piece is more mechanical than electrical. There are too many spots in its construction where poor connections might give problems. Mechanically, it is beautifully constructed and a tribute to the machinist who built it. I was completely satisfied with the results. The restoration required over 120 hours to complete. (Art Albion)



Front view of completed Marconi Multiple Tuner. (GBS)






## **PHOTO REVIEW**


CROSLEY - This "Dual Seventy," Model 179, seven-tube Superhet was one of the many "Crosley Moderne Radios" offered by the Crosley Radio Corp. The graduated shoulders and base were finished in black and the decorative front flutings were finished in silver paint. The same chassis and speaker were also used in the "Dual Seventy Lowboy" console. (Scott L. Hagerman - Cary, IL)



FADA - The FADA 1000 "bullet" radio. Cabinet is catalin and was made in many different color combinations. This one is yellow with red trim pieces. Manufactured by FADA in the early '40's. (Doug Heimstead - Fridley, MN)



STEWART-WARNER - Gray metal cabinet with cutout of woman's head for the speaker grille. Four-tube radio with resistance line cord manufactured in 1933. (Doug Heimstead - Fridley, MN)



LEWOL - This six-tube shortwave set is shown with an Art Deco styled cabinet adorned with nickel plated trim. It was manufactured by Lewol Mfg. Co. The same 61 chassis was used in several other cabinet styles during that time. (Scott L. Hagerman - Cary, IL)


### **PHOTO REVIEW**



MAJESTIC - This "Century Six," Model 463, was one of several six-tube Superhets offered by the Grisby-Grunow Co. of Chicago, IL. These were advertised as "The Smart Sets for 1934." With the use of gleaming chrome plated grille trim and escutcheons, Majestic felt that their sets were far more stylish than sets offered by other radio manufacturers of the day. Sales literature said that "Every Majestic chassis employs the new exclusive Majestic Duo-Valve tubes, which add the efficiency of at least two extra tubes to every set." (Scott L. GRUNOW - This tombstone, Model 500, was offered as shown with a distinctive chrome grille piece. However, the same model was available with a conventional wooden grille. Both Grunow and Majestic manufactured a wide variety of chromefront sets during the height of this Art Deco inspired period, around 1934. Grunow was the name adopted by General Household Utilities Co. of Chicago, IL. (Scott L. Hagerman - Cary, IL)



HALSON - Halson Radio Mfg. Corp. offered this small four-tube table model, shown here in blonde and contrasting black lacquered finish. It was available in a conventional finish as well. The decoinspired set is highlighted with chromeplated nameplate and escutcheons, and has a red jeweled panel lamp. Halson also manufactured these sets for others, including the Spiegel Catalog Company. (Scott L. Hagerman - Cary, IL)



CROSLEY - This "Travette Moderne," Model 182, is a 5-tube AC/DC Superhet. Crosley advertised these sets as "Supreme Beauty in Line, Color, Form!" Crosley sales literature stated, "In its zebrawood and satinwood overlays, and the non-tarnishing silvery gleam of its chromium plated grille, the Crosley Travette Moderne is truly a new conception of radio beauty." During the 1930's, Crosley made perhaps only this one model with a chrome-plated grille. (Scott L. Hagerman - Cary, IL)



# **RESTORATION TOPICS**

"RESTORE: To bring back to the original state; to improve, repair or retouch (a thing) so as to bring it as nearly as possible to its original state."

Oxford English Dictionary.

The stated goal of many collections of radio and television apparatus is to show later generations what the apparatus of their parents' and grandparents' generations looked and sounded like. This is a worthwhile and generous idea. Implied is the notion that these radios, televisions and their accessories are historical artifacts as well as being a source of pleasure and satisfaction to their owners. They show what listening was like in the 1920's and 1930's. They reveal how we communicated in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

The conclusion is inevitable. Artifacts deserve respect; they have their own integrity.

Recently the Glenn Baird collection was auctioned. Many sets drew high bids. The auction should remind us that we are not immortal, that we need to think ahead to those for whom we are preserving this apparatus, for we have and we hold, as so many deeds say, but we don't own forever. Our collections will pass on. What will they say?

"...there is, today, an additional reason for the appreciation of antiquities: private individuals enjoy collecting them. Serious collectors keep that in mind, because the number of authentic documents of the past is limited, and the number of collectors is growing, daily.

"Such a situation produces a humming sellers' market, and spurious, 'improved,' and 'cheered-up' artifacts purporting to be genuine antiques come to light continually. It therefore between the informed collector to be always careful about acquiring new pieces for a collection."

Included in "cheered-up" must be "refinish-

ed." Numerous collectors say in print: "When the decision is made that refinishing is required..." I would like to advance the idea that refinishing is never required. Refinishing, like many operations, is often undertaken to please the person collecting an object, and it always constitutes a fundamental alteration. So many finishes can be repaired with proper technique. Polyurethane substituted for tinted lacquer is not restoration. Polishing the finish off brass escutcheons and dials to "jazz them up" is not much of a way to show one's grandchildren how radios looked fifty years ago. Altering the circuitry for improved performance will not show how a set sounded in 1928, only what it sounds like in 1988. We hold these things for a time, but they move on.

There are two basic principles used by museum and furniture conservators of which we might want to be aware: respect for integrity of objects and reversibility of any changes made to the object.

From the Code of Ethics of the American Institute for the Conservation of Historic and Artistic Works:

"Respect for Integrity of Object

All professional action of the conservator are governed by unswerving respect for the aesthetic, historic, and physical integrity of the object."<sup>2</sup>

In the introduction to McGiffin's Furniture Care and Conservation we read:

"The prime concentration...is on the object: do not compromise its integrity; do not remove anything that shows the way it was used; do not let replacement of missing parts disfigure the object and distort the intent of the original maker. All these prohibitions clarify and vocalize what sensitive caretakers have felt for years. A great merit of this book is in its intimacy to the thoughts of its readers.

"In discussing the principles that guide contemporary conservation treatment, reversibility is stressed: try not to do anything in the course of a remedial treatment that cannot be undone in the future without exposing the artifact to harm.

"It may also be remarked that certain oper-

ations where reversibility is seldom weighed are, in themselves, irreversible. Take cleaning, for instance: how do you put back what you took away, except by attempts to replace it? A cleaning can go too far, can take away what it should have left in place, can break the surface of an ancient finish. Not consciously visualized as moments of irreversibility, cleaning activities nevertheless are such."

Certainly the key word is "reversibility." I know good and careful people who nevertheless remove and discard all capacitors including filters from the top of the chassis, refinish the cabinet, polish the chassis and tube shields to a high brilliance, polish the dial brass and put upholstery cloth in the grille. There are economic considerations - many earn income from servicing, and no one wants the call that says, "My set went poof and smoked. I thought the house was on fire. Don't you know how to fix radios?" Many customers understand or even exaggerate the value of their radios and televisions, and are willing to listen to arguments for the preservation of their historical value, though. We can strike a compromise.

The other side of this coin is overworked objects. A 100-point show car is "restored" far beyond what factory-fresh ever meant. Let us hope that radios never attain the \$6.5 million that Harrah's Bugatti Royale brought. Then we will be rubbing 36 coats of lacquer on the inside of the cabinet!

One collector I know touches nothing – a set comes to him as it is – its dings are honest statements of its past life. However, most of us want to clean and repair, to "bring it back." Our obligation should be to think it through.

Three guiding principles ought to be:

- 1. Preserve the integrity of the object.
- Preserve as much as possible the original surface.

3. Make whatever we do reversible.

A corollary should be that any reproduction parts used should be marked. As Ray Hutt at the Smithsonian once remarked, future students and conservators tend to look at their collections as authoritative. If the Smithsonian's set has a certain feature, then all such sets must have had it. An unmarked reproduction part may become gospel.

Finally, a word of caution:

"In actively treating any artifact, one must be willing to admit one's own limits of knowledge and skill, to avoid ruining the very object that

should be saved. Even trained conservators are expected to recognize and concede their own limitations — since no individual can be expert in all areas — and call on specialists for assistance whenever necessary.

"No matter how conscientiously the information in this book was prepared, or how careful its instructions may be followed, it is inevitable that some attempts at cleaning or repair of some objects will fail. Even conservators who have devoted years to working with one single kind of material occasionally run into failures through some quirk in treat-

The two books quoted in the adjoining article are worthwhile additions to any restorer's library. Both books are available from: American Association for State and Local History, 172 Second Ave. North, Suite 102, Nashville, TN 37201.

Per E. Guldbeck and A. Bruce MacLeish: The Care of Antiques and Historical Collections, 2nd ed., 248 pages, index, paperback.

The Care of Antiques and Historical Collections is a conservation handbook covering subjects like documentation, environment, storage, workroom and other museum considerations, and has ten chapters devoted to the care and conservation of many kinds of materials such as wood, leather, textiles, glass and so on. There are three appendices, the third one being suppliers of materials and equipment. Mr. MacLeish says that he "...implores all concerned to consider the well-being of each object before dashing

headlong into an indiscriminate program of gluing and polishing."

Robert F. McGriffin Jr.: Furniture Care and Conservation, 233 pages, index, hardcover.

McGriffin, in Furniture Care and Conservation starts with a definition of the distinction between restoration and conservation, restorer and conservator, and draws lines of approach to artifacts. It is written in part to "...provide recommendations for the private collector." He exposes "sound principles of collection care."

There are twelve very interesting chapters on subjects like cleaning, repairing or replacing wood and metal parts, care or repair of surface finish, housekeeping for collections, insect pests, health hazards and so on. There are six appendices, an index, a glossary and a bibliography. This one should be in every restorer's library.

ment; but they usually test carefully while working, to preclude a major disaster, and they have the accumulated knowledge about many kinds of treatment to fall back on. Anyone who is inexperienced in the scientific treatment of objects had best be quite circumspect in treating any object — test carefully and proceed slowly, because you usually have no alternative to try."

In conclusion, your objects should tell the truth. McGiffin's book, which is well worth reading, tells the story of how one restorer created a piece that lied and was ambiguous; a characteristic of the authentic object was lost forever. Even if you disagree 100% with the foregoing paragraphs, bear in mind what the clock price guides say - that to bring the top dollar a clock must be either mint original, or restored. There are properly literally millions of refinished clocks out there, many of them spoiled beyond help with replacement works. Many radios are going the same route. Radios, like clocks, are gaining in dollar value and radio price guides may in the future be telling us - that to bring top dollar, a radio must either be mint original or be properly restored.

At least you can bear in mind your pocketbook. We may have lived in a time when radios were taken to the dump, and poor designs were improved by rebuilding. Perhaps we can today come to respect radios as documents as well as toys, and be kind to them.



### THE PYE MODEL G (And a Short History of Pye Radio Limited)

Pye Radio Ltd. of Cambridge is one of the pioneer radio manufacturing concerns of England. The firm, W.G. Pye & Co. was founded by William George Pye in 1896, with the help of his wife and two brothers, to make physical and electrical instruments on a parttime basis for school and laboratories. The company grew, and by 1914 employed forty people. With the coming of World War I, the company expanded to meet the great demand for precision instruments. Height-finders, telescopes, gun-sights, and signaling equipment were among the products Pye made for the war effort. But by 1921, the market for scientific instruments had virtually collapsed and the company looked to diversify.

Towards the end of 1920, the head of Pve's Electrical Department had designed a wireless set for himself. This inspired a partner in the company to branch into wireless receiver production. The first products were equipment to teach students the rudiments of wireless. The equipment proved so successful that they were much sought after by radio amateurs. With the beginning of broadcasting near the end of 1922, demand for wireless receivers greatly increased. During 1923, Pve was producing 2, 3, and 4-tube receivers. In 1925, Pye introduced the model 555, one of the first mass-produced portable sets.

In 1927, one of the most enduring radio cabinet motifs was introduced, the "Rising Sun" speaker grille of the Pye model 25. It continued on most models until the late 1930's. It was reintroduced on the model M78F portable of 1948. Unfortunately, for the first time it was used without clouds. To many it resembled the national flag of Japan, then England's recent enemy of World War II. The resultant public outcry caused the sets to be withdrawn from retailer's shelves and a great bonfire was made of them at the Pve works. No more than 200 were sold, making them extremely rare today.



During World War II, Pve was in the forefront of radar and proximity fuse development. Pve designed and built over 40,000 two-way infantry radios and a Pye designed two-way tank radio became standard with Allied armies. Three other British companies were brought in to make them along with six more in the U.S.A. and Canada. At war's end Pve's employees numbered over 14,000.

A leader in television before the war, Pve was ready when the B.B.C. resumed telecasting in June of 1946. Pye remained in the forefront of TV development introducing a power transformerless model in 1948, black screen TV which enabled daylight viewing, automatic picture control, 13 channel switch tuning, and public demonstration of 3-D and color TV in 1949. Other developments included instrument landing systems for blind flying, stereo records, and closed-circuit TV. In 1960, Pve merged with E.K. Cole Ltd., manufacturers of Ekco radios. In 1977, Pye was bought by

Philips Industries of the Netherlands, where it remains today, with the backing of Philips, a world leader in audio/video technology.

The Pve Model G of 1932 is a 3-valve (tube) TRF set that operates on 200-250 volts AC. covering the two standard European broadcasting bands 200-500 meters and 800-2000 meters (1500-600 and 375-150 KHz). The set is 20" tall. 16" wide, 9" deep, and weighs an amazing 40 lbs. It cost 18 Pounds, 18 shillings. or about ninety-five 1932 dollars. It was considered a mid-priced set on the English market. Mazda brand tubes are used, an AC/SG screen-grid tetrode in the single RF stage, an AC2/HL triode as detector, and an AC/PEN pentode output tube. DC voltage is obtained via a Westinghouse metal rectifier smoothed by 2-8 Mfd, electrolytics and a 2 Mfd, paper capacitor, filter choke, and the field coil of the 8" electrodynamic speaker.

The chassis of this set is unbelievably complex! Two sides extend the greater part of the height of the set. A horizontal panel is mounted between them about two-thirds of the way up with a vertical panel beneath it and another in front above it, upon which the con-

trols are mounted. The drum dial, which is calibrated in meters with the station names, is friction-driven off of the tuning knob shaft. On the drum shaft is a sprocket driving a chain connected to a larger sprocket on the tuning condenser shaft in the bottom of the chassis. The volume control is a dual unit, one controls radio volume, the other the phono input. The third control is a variable condenser controlling regeneration, beneath it is the wavechange switch

I cannot give an accurate assessment of the operation of the model G. Mine is original and although working, it doesn't work as it should. Pye "Rising Sun" sets are among the most popular among English collectors. Due to large production runs and excellent workmanship, they are still quite common and reasonably priced.

Much of the information on Pye used in this article is from *The Story of Pye Wireless* by Gordon Bussey and the excellent history of Great Britain's radios and broadcasting, *Radio! Radio!* by Jonathan Hill. I heartily recommend it! (Frank Heathcote)

## Letters: Glenn Baird Estate Sale and Field Seed Company

Paul Gunzenhauser of Garden Grove, lowa, writes, "....I certainly enjoy the A.R.C. publication. You are doing a great service for the collector of antique radios.... The May issue was of particular interest to me because of the coverage of the Glenn Baird Estate auction. My son Robert, age 14, and I attended the sale. It was educational to see a variety of sets in one location.

"The article on the Shenandoah Five and Super Six by Glenn add to the meaning of early radio in this part of the country. I have an old set of which the call letters KFNF and KMA are written in pencil at the appropriate spot on the dial. KFNF came on the air February 12, 1924, with a 500-watt transmitter. Another seed house and nursery owner from Shenandoah, Earl May, put his station KMA on the air August 12, 1925. It began broadcasting on 252 meters. Henry Field and Earl May were good friends so they did not compete for air time. This bit of information is from the book KMA Radio, the First Sixty Years."

Phil Weingarten of Forest Hills, N.Y., writes, "Your May 1987 issue with the Henry Field Seed & Nursery Company story was most interesting." Phil calls to our attention the February 1925 cover of *Radio News* which shows, along with others, the radio stamp for KFNF.

ANTIQUE RADIO SPECIFICATIONS - This column provides the collector with specifications, both physical and electrical on individual radio sets. Performance is measured and operation evaluated giving collectors a relative guide to expected results. Comments and suggestions concerning the evaluated radio are welcomed as well as additional radios you would like to see. (Henry Rogers)

The Crystoflex Company of New York was one of the many early radio companies that began with a good idea but didn't have the money or technical knowledge to compete with the major manufacture's.

The Crystoflex receiver has a reflexed circuit utilizing two tubes and a crystal detector. The RF amplifier is reflexed for the first AF amplifier giving the equivalent of one RF stage, crystal detector and two AF amplifier stages. No bypass capacitors are used in the circuit, probably a cost saving measure at the expense of performance. The hand engraved panel also attests to a limited budget.

Performance is only fair. The tuning is extremely broad due to the tight coupling in the RF coils. This poor selectivity, in addition to the limited frequency coverage, makes DXing nearly impossible. The set has ample volume on local stations and would have been economical to operate as only two voltage supplies are required. Best DX was KOMO in Seattle, WA, due more to receiving conditions than circuit performance.

There are other similar types of crystal-reflex sets existing. Some with names, others appear to be kits or homemade. Performance of these sets should be comparable to the Crystoflex. (Henry Rogers)



### THE GOLDEN AGE OF RADIO IN THE HOME

John W. Stokes Craigs – Printers and Publishers New Zealand 1986, 162 pages

The Golden Age of Radio in the Home by John W. Stokes has outstanding virtues and is pleasant reading. Mr. Stokes both informs and entertains you. Like Radio! Radio!, reviewed recently in these columns, it is a piece of quality work, nicely packaged with an attractive jacket photo and high quality illustrations.

If you think that radio in New Zealand is limited and of restricted interest, that is not the

case at all.

The ten chapters trace the beginnings of broadcasting and the development of hardware, including tables of technical developments, manufacturers and brand names. The third chapter on the development of cabinets and their materials I found unusually interesting. One chapter is about New Zealand manufacturers. Next are historical sketches of major manufacturers whose sets came into New Zealand; these are lavishly and finely

illustrated including some mouth-watering ads. Examples are Philips (forming a nice complement to the French Philips book) and Ultimate. The chapter on other manufacturers is a real collector's directory and reference with wonderful illustrations.

There is a chapter on American receivers, such as Atwater Kent, Philco, Majestic and RCA, sold in New Zealand. There are many makes, and the photos are often sets I have not seen in print in popular books. Chapter eight covers British imports, and chapter nine the Australian imports. This book is worth it just for the Australian version of the Radiola 24. Who wouldn't kill for one of those Radiolettes in jade green? Chapter ten covers collecting and dating.

This book is thorough, knowledgeably written, carefully researched, nicely presented, and easy to read – a nice feature for the beginner or noncollector who wants to feel the atmosphere of early radio in his easy chair. You'll enjoy owning it although it may start you collecting "down-under" radios, and then you'll need more space...



### National HRO Receiver Survey

Conducted by Charles Fisher

Antique Radio Classified June 1987



The HRO receiver was manufactured by the National Company of Malden, Mass., and was announced in the October 1934 issue of *QST Magazine*. The HRO was a 9-tube superheterodyne communications receiver with continuous frequency coverage from 500 Kc. to 30 Mc. using plug-in coils and providing band-spread on the amateur bands. An additional range, 175 to 400 Kc. was also available. Remarkably, the HRO-60 – introduced by National in 1964, 30 years later – still was recognizable in appearance as an HRO receiver.

Charles Fisher of 161 Belknap Road, Framingham, Mass., has been studying details in the evolution of the early National HRO receiver. Previously, in June 1986, an invitation to participate in this study appeared in the Antique Wireless Association's Old Timer's Bulletin. Many accurate and helpful replies have been received as a result of that request, but more would increase the survey coverage. Antique Radio Classified is printing the questionnaire in full in this issue to make it easy for you HRO owners to report on your receivers' details.

Charles Fisher hopes to develop and publish details about the evolution of the HRO which were not previously available. It is expected that dating of the changes made to the receiver over the years will show how they relate to the well-known "versions." Even rough production figures may emerge.

The HRO receivers of interest for this current survey are the early types, the sets before the HRO-5's, -7's, -50's, etc. A later survey may cover these other sets. Your set is of specific interest if it has a plug-in crystal filter located in the right-front corner of the chassis under the lid.





No. 9: The BSW terminal strip is often found <u>added</u> to early sets. The opening in the chassis may be crudely shaped, and the strip can be fastened with screws instead of rivets. The authentic item is a brown bakelite wafer strip with 'BSW' in white letters; other sorts of terminals are home-brew.

#### INSIDE FEATURES:

Nos. 1-3: Chassis and gearbox should be same color, but black bottom plates do occur under gray chassis.

No. 4: The condenser spacers are the 8 metal posts, pairs of which position each of the 4 sections. They may have hex ends (like bolt heads) or be plain. The insulators to which the rotor contacting springs are fastened are in pairs either side of the two shields – between 1st and 2nd section, and between 3rd and 4th section.

#### **COIL FEATURES:**

A set serial number is usually stamped on one of the cans, but may be on the flange with the 8 screw heads. If you have differing or various serial numbers, give the data separately. If you find <u>no</u> numbers, don't bother with the data unless you are <u>sure</u> that the coils came with the set when delivered.
