

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

The BIG EVENT of the year is here — the Antique Wireless Association's Annual Conference in Canandaigua, New York. September 23 to 27, 1987, are the dates for this five-day, world's-largest meet devoted entirely to antique radio. The meet is being held at the Sheraton Inn in Canandaigua, New York (near Rochester). Over 800 people attended last year and over 200 flea market spaces were sold. Every year this A.W.A. meet gets bigger.

The start of the meet—Wednesday noon—is the best time to begin your flea market browsing. Thursday is also a good flea market day. The equipment auction is Friday afternoon, with more good flea market activity on Saturday. The conference ends Saturday night with the grand banquet. Other activities include a vacuum tube auction, a ham equipment auction, talks, a Friday night banquet, antique equipment demonstrations and an old equipment contest.

Lodging will be hard to find if you are just now making plans to attend; as of August 10th, a few motel rooms were still available in the area (the Sheraton was full). See the advertisement on page 17 and the listing on the Coming Radio Events page for more information.

Don't feel too bad if you cannot make it to this or other meets. A lot of sets from these meets will be passing through the A.R.C. classified ads over the next few months.

Antique Radio Classified begins its fourth year with this September issue. This month marks the third anniversary of A.R.C.'s first regular issue, September 1984. Today, over two thousand subscribers have made A.R.C. the leading antique radio monthly publication.

"It will be talked about. Its performance will be marvelled at. It is so tiny – so compact and yet so efficient that it bids well to be the radio sensation of 1926. It is going to introduce radio to thousands."

RADIO IN THE TWENTIES

FREED-EISEMANN AND THE NEUTRODYNE

Joseph David Roth Freed was born in New York City on October 18, 1897. After graduating from the College of the City of New York where he had studied radio under Dr. Alfred Goldsmith, Freed became, in 1917, an Expert Radio Aide at the Radio Test Shop, Washington Navy Yard (Alan Hazeltine was consultant here); he left in 1918 to join Emil Simon. From early 1919 to mid-1921, he was designing engineer and assistant chief engineer with the Wireless Improvement Co. In 1921, Freed organized the Radio Manufacturing Co.

Freed's first product – a crystal set outfit named the Marvel, shown in Figure 1 – sold like hotcakes, so fast that within a few months he needed capital to expand. In January 1922, having been introduced by a mutual friend, he and businessman Alexander Eisemann incorporated the Freed-Eisemann Radio Corp. Marvel crystal set sales continued to boom. When the company was short of headphones, Freed's associate Victor Greiff persuaded his former partner Hugo Cohn to make them; Cohn founded the Radio Receptor Co. in January as a result. (Cohn and his company both outlived the Freed-Eisemann Radio Corp. by many decades.)

Radio World of July 1, 1922, profiled Freed as a "captain of industry"; this was stretching a point as his business was already declining severely. After a boom in radio sales, makers of crystal sets had a particular problem, aside from the bust when radio stopped selling, causing scores of small companies to go under. Since the Wireless Specialty Apparatus Co.'s patent position in crystal technology was its only toehold in the "radio group" with RCA, GE, AT&T, and Westinghouse, Wireless advertised its status in June 1922, claiming that any other company making or selling crystal detectors was liable for patent infringement and damages (See box on following page). This had the effect desired by Wireless Specialty of scaring off Freed-Eisemann's dealers, and began, incidentally, a series of events that dramatically changed the whole radio industry.

Freed-Eisemann's advertising manager was quoted in August 1922: "We have had in our employ here 138 operatives. Conditions are so bad that we have reduced the working crew to 26. There is nothing doing here. I only come around an hour or two a day myself. We are trying only to sell our radio apparatus to the radio departments of dry goods stores, anyway, for we feel that from such customers we have a good chance to collect our money. We cannot collect our bills from radio retailers or jobbers. If we try to dun them, on long-standing accounts, they promptly assure us that

they are perfectly willing to return our radio manufactures as sold to them – for the goods didn't sell. Idon't know what is going to happen in radio; there is no action around here. We can't even sell our Marvel cheap sets."

Freed-Eisemann went to court to enjoin Wireless Specialty from publishing these notices and to sue for damages of \$150,000. To aid in these suits the company gathered a group of other New York crystal-set makers together into the Independent Radio Manufacturers, Inc. (IRM), retaining the prominent law firm of Pennie, Davis, Marvin and Edmonds (PDME). In September 1922, the court did grant the injunction sought by Freed-Eisemann which restrained Wireless from continuing its advertising.

Through its PDME lawyer, Walter C. Russ, the Independent Radio group learned of an invention of Prof. Louis A. Hazeltine which was then being processed through the Patent Office by another young PDME member, Willis H. Taylor, Jr. Hazeltine's invention was a way of stabilizing a tuned radio-frequency amplifier which tends to become unstable and oscillate if not neutralized by some means. If Hazeltine's new circuit could be made to work commercially, then the IRM members could abandon crystal sets and the associ-

"Warning to Patent Infringers"

is the headline on the advertisement placed by the Wireless Specialty Apparatus Company in the July 1922 issue of Radio News. The advertisement continues:

"Various types of crystal detectors, renewals therefor, and crystal detector radiophone receiving sets now being offered for sale employ the inventions of one or several of the following United States patents (commonly referred to as the Pickard patents) the property of the Wireless Specialty Apparatus Company."

After listing 21 patent numbers, the ad continues: "The above patents cover, among other things, the most efficient circuit arrangement of apparatus commonly used in crystal detector radiophone sets, various kinds of crystal members, means for mouning the crystals and holding the mounting, special forms of contacting conductors for the crystals, and mechanism permitting the user's selection of contact points of the contacting conductor on the crystals......

"The Wireless Specialty Apparatus Company purposes to prosecute, vigorously, all infringers of its patents and, therefore, those manufacturers, distributors, jobbers and dealers who have not been authorized as yet are warned to cease the manufacturer or the sale or distribution of crystal detectors, renewals therefor, or crystal detector radiophone receiving sets or any other radio devices which infringe these patents."

"Unauthorized distributing or selling, wholly independent of manufacturing, is just as much an in-

fringement

"For their own protection, the distributors, jobbers and dealers should demand a guarantee from the manufacturer from whom they purchase radio equipment holding them harmless in case of damage suits arising through their distribution and sale of radio apparatus which infringes the abovementioned patents."

ated problems with Wireless Specialty, avoid the regenerative circuit now controlled by Westinghouse, and take up the new "Neutrodyne," so named by Taylor.

Hazeltine and his asssistant John F. Dreyer, Jr. occupied a lab at the Stevens Institute of Technology. Freed built a prototype from Hazeltine's notes and took it to the lab where, after some attention from Dreyer, it worked.

Three IRM members lost no time getting into production. Frank A. D. Andrea (FADA) was first, with a reflexed four-tube design shown at the third annual Radio Convention in New York. March 1

3, 1923. Freed-Eisemann's model, the NR-5, see Figure 2, was demonstrated by Hazeltine at the regular Radio Club of America meeting on March 2, where it created quite a stir. The Garod Corp. started advertising its reflexed model a month later, and production began in September. Freed-Eisemann and FADA also sold kits with the key Neutrodyne components.

Freed-Eisemann did rather well in 1923; sales practically quadrupled in succeeding quarters

At the end of 1923 the company moved into a new factory of 50,000 square feet in the Sperry Building in Brooklyn. It also turned against PDME. bringing suit against its former benefactors and refusing to pay royalties to Hazeltine, Freed-Eisemann claimed that PDME's lawyers were financially interested in the Hazeltine Corp. at the same time that they were advising their client Freed-Eisemann to sign the royalty agreement. Hazeltine in turn sued Freed-Eisemann for breach of contract. Freed-Eisemann was hoping to have its royalties reduced, from 6% of the wholesale receiver price, to 6% of the neutralizing condenser alone, and offered Hazeltine \$30,000 a year. Freed-Eisemann eventually lost, and reluctantly went back to paying the full royalty amount.

1924 sales were also excellent, enough to attract the attention of outside investors, who bought majority stock control by April 1925, reportedly for \$2.5 million. The same group, Hugh Prichitt and his two brothers-in-law (named Howard), also controlled the Ware and Dubilier companies. Prichitt was a "boy wonder" who owned a Stock Exchange seat and controlled or had a hand in such diverse enterprises as Caddo Oil, Ajax Rubber, even Duz soap flakes. But his timing was unfortunate.

Not wanting to tamper with a successful formula, Freed-Eisemann brought out its NR6 in October 1924. It was nearly identical to the NR5 and sported the same \$150 price. But Charles Freshman had introduced his Masterpiece in August for \$60, and Atwater Kent, his \$100 Model 20 Compact. Against them, Freed-Eisemann didn't stand a chance. Sales plummeted; Prichitt




Figure 3. Freed-Eisemann Portable Receiver "with Geniune WD-12 tube in solid Mahogany cabinet."

suffered a mental breakdown as his overextended empire collapsed. (He died in 1928 at 44.)

The three Freeds (Joe, Arthur and Leo) and two Eisemanns (Alex and his father Emil) managed to buy back control of their company when its stock price hit bottom. However, it took several years for it to regain anything like its former glory ... just in time for the stock market crash and the depression. Freed-Eisemann went into receivership in December 1929.

Joe Freed then joined Warner Bros. which in May 1930 bought Brunswick; Brunswick had bought Bremer-Tully for a very high price in Dec. 1928. However, this venture fizzled when Warner Bros. discontinued radio production. Joeseph Freed died of leukemia in 1941; Alexander Eisemann died in 1953. @ 1987 Alan Douglas

This story, on the beginnings of Freed-Eisemann and of the Neutrodyne, is extracted from my forthcoming series of three books on radio manufacturing in the 1920's. The Freed-Eisemann chapter will appear in Volume 2, scheduled for 1988.

Although only a few Freed-Eisemann models are covered here, the book will picture every advertised model to December 1929.

Further information on the early Marvel models, and a Model 234 or similar portable, is solicited from readers. There is still plenty of time to revise this chapter before layout work on Volume 2 begins.

ANTIQUE RADIO SPECIFICATIONS - This column provides the collector with specifications, both physical and electrical on individual radio sets. Performance is measured and operation evaluated giving collectors a relative guide to expected results. Comments and suggestions concerning the evaluated radio are welcomed as well as additional radios you would like to see. (Henry Rocers)

COLIN B. KENNEDY CO. MODEL 281/521

Early manufacturing of the Kennedy 281/521 took place in San Francisco; however, by late 1922 most sets were being assembled in St. Louis. Designed primarily for amateurs, the 281 is labeled a shortwave receiver. Selling initially for \$200, the price dropped to \$145 by the end of production.

The Model 281 receiver is a three-circuit Armstrong regenerative detector. The Model 521 amplifier is a two-stage, transformer-coupled unit. San Francisco 281 models have two adjustment knobs for the Primary Inductance along with a single antenna input. St.

Louis models eliminated one inductance adjustment knob and installed two antenna inputs instead. (See specs. for additional variations.)

Performance of the 281/521 can be very good depending on the set-up. Best results were obtained by running about 19 volts on the plate of a UV-200. (Adjust the plate voltage for optimum sensitivity for the particular detector tube used.) As pure tungsten filaments are used in UV-200s, keep the filament voltage as low as possible. A disadvantage is that the set has no shielding and is very sensitive to body capacitance. Also, switching from longwave to shortwave on St. Louis models requires moving the antenna lead-in from post A-L (Antenna Longwave) to post A-S (Antenna Shortwave), in addition to changing the L-S switch (wavelength switch).

Best DX was KTWO from Casper, Wyo. and KOMO from Seattle, Wash. Several amateurs, mostly W6's from Calif., were copied on 160

meters also.

Note: There are sets which contain some of both SF and SL variations as Kennedy was constantly changing their design and assembly to keep up with the competition. The set shown is an example, a 521 with an SF panel but with SL bakelite binding posts.





CROSLEY REVIEW

CROSLEY PUP

Editor's note: Two articles on the Crosley Pup were received within a few days of each other. Rather than presenting them separately, the two were combined by the editor into this single story.

Powel Crosley called it his "Sky Terrier." Canine mascots adorned its advertising. It was aimed at the youth market, and its price was a mere \$9.75 (25¢ cheaper than the lowest priced one-tube Kodel, the smallest radio yet on the market).

First advertised in August of 1925, the tiny radio was given the name of "Pup." It was Powel's idea of just what should have been available in 1921 when he unsuccessfully went looking for a "toy" radio set for his son's birthday...and one of the main reasons why Powel went into the radio business in the first place.

In 1925, the "Pup" was compared to a great American automobile; it was called the "Lizzie" of radio. Articles of the time also compared it to a cough drop – small enough to swallow by mistake, and to a speck of dust that the maid might sweep under the rug or out the back door.

The radio was well-built mechanically and electrically. The Pup, in reality, was nothing more than Crosley's highly successful Model 50, a one-tube




Figure 2. Interior view of the Pup. The book condenser is on the left, the rheostat on the bottom of the photo, and the coil assembly on the right. The Pup has a snap-in bottom cover with a paper label and four battery leads with tags and lugs. On the rear (top in the photo above) are the terminals for the antenna, ground, phones and mounting for a grid leak resistor.

Armstrong regenerative receiver, crammed into the tight confines of a stamped metal can. The components are the same, except that space restrictions dictated the redesign of the "book" condenser, which was cam-operated, to operation by a knob connected to a fine-threaded screw acting on one of the plates of the "book" condenser. (The famous Crosley book tuning condenser was developed by Mr. Hugo Gemsbeck, the editor of Radio News Magazine.)

Also inside is a flat disk-shaped lattice grid coil that is also used as an antenna coil. The lattice tickler is moved by a sliding rod connected to a knob, common to large Crosley sets of that time

period; it has a standard Crosley rheostat and tube socket. The grid and bypass condenser are of the

copper-foil and mica type.

When the user installed the recommended WD-12 tube and listened in on a good pair of phones (which were offered at \$3 extra), the reception was remarkably good. The Pup worked quite well and supposedly had excellent headphone volume on local stations; with the correct antenna at nighttime, it could bring in stations 1,000 miles distant. Of course, this was with careful tuning, a lot of ear straining, and perhaps a whole lot of luck.

The Pup at \$9.75 was considered quite a bargain; it cost the same as a couple of theatre tickets. The Pup, one of the first inexpensive but reliable tube radios, was one of the few single tube sets to attach the tube on the top of the cabinet.

Despite the fact that many were produced, the demand for existing examples keeps its collector value high. Many antique radio collectors are not satisfied until an Atwater Kent breadboard and a Crosley Pup are in their collections.

Interesting to note is that the "Pup" name was reissued in 1933 to another bottom-of-the-line radio. The four-tube superhet receiver enclosed in

a metal case with a round speaker grill in the center was called the "New Pup," and its selling price was \$26.

The Marconi Multiple Tuner and Charles S. Franklin

One of the most important breakthroughs in wireless was the development of the Marconi Multiple Tuner. This invention eliminated the need to tune the antenna with primitive coils (jiggers) and unwieldy switches. The selectivity desired for long distance communications was greatly enhanced.

The Multiple Tuner was the outcome of many years of experimental research at the Marconi Company by Mr. C. S. Franklin. Although he first developed the tuner in 1904,* a patent was not actually applied for until 1907. Finally, the patent was awarded – patent #12,960, on June 4, 1907.

The June 1987 issue of Antique Radio Classified contained an article by Art Albion on the restoration of the Multiple Tuner owned by the writer of this article, Jim Kreuzer. The restored tuner was featured in color on the cover of the June issue.

This issue's article describes the historical development of the Marconi Multiple Tuner and presents a biography of the tuner's inventor.

Part 1 The Marconi Multiple Tuner

The Marconi Multiple Tuner was built to withstand severe climate and rough usage; the tuner was a very solid instrument. It weighed 32 lbs., having dimensions of 8"H x 19"W x 9 1/2"D. It was electrically sound, utilizing an adjustable micrometer spark gap connected between the aerial and earth as protection against static discharges. The principle function was tuning the detector apparatus, including wavelengths from 500 to 8000 feet! This capability proved valuable in the measurement of wavelengths and estimation of the approximate distance of known stations.

Designed to serve as a companion to the famous "Maggie" or "Magnetic Detector," the Multiple Tuner was a true "state of the art" installation for shipboard and coastal stations. After many years of use, Maggie was replaced by the valve detector. Marconi operators were instructed on its application to the Multiple Tuner, and, after World War I, the Marconi Type 55 Valve Amplifier was




Figure 1. The Marconi Multiple Tuner.




Figure 2. The Marconi Shortwave Multiple Tuner. (The Marconigraph.)




Figure 3. The Marconi Time Signal Receiver. (The Marconigraph.)

also adopted.

The earliest version of the Marconi Multiple Tuner is shown in Figure 1 (The photograph is from the collection of the Antique Wireless Association.) The basic construction consists of a wooden top, with the individual components mounted on it. The condensers are of the earliest design, with binding posts at the top. The antenna loading coil is a different version from the late 1907 tuner. It utilizes a tapped switch assembly, located on the left front. Brass plates identify the binding post connections.

In late 1907, the tuner was redesigned, using ebonite (hard rubber) as the front panel and top base plate. The brass identification plates were no longer used; instead the ebonite was engraved. On the right side, a new control was added, aftering the degree of coupling between the intermediate and detector sections.

Figure 2 depicts a 1910 variation of the Multiple Tuner, containing only the antenna and detector tuning stages. It was known as the "Marconi Shortwave Multiple Tuner." The tuning ranged from 250 to 1,750 meters, the smaller size reflecting the desire for more compact apparatus in the wireless shack.


Still another variation of the Multiple Tuner is shown in Figure 3. Known as the Marconi Time Signal Receiver, it was designed in 1911. The case measured 22"L x 8"D x 8"H, and included a variable condensor, an aerial tuning includance and a magnetic detector. The tuning ranged from (Continued on following page)

Theory of the Marconi Multiple Tuner

A major problem in the early wireless days was interference between operating stations. Provided transmitting stations utilized different wavelengths, the solution fell to the receiving stations and their ability to sharply tune to the desired station, while at the same time tuning out the interfering station.

It was well known that if the coupling between the antenna and detector circuits was very loose, the tuning was more sharp than if the coupling was close. Likewise it was found that (1) if a tuned intermediate circuit was placed between the antenna and detector circuits and inductively coupled both to the antenna and detector circuits, (2) if all three circuits were put in resonance with the received wave, and (3) if the coupling were made very loose, the receiver could tune even more sharply to the desired signals, thus tuning out the undesired signals. Although the additional intermediate circuit reduced the strength of the desired signal in the detector, undesired signals were reduced even more (the signal to noise ratio was improved). The Marconi Multiple Tuner was based on this principal.

In the simplified circuit below, the antenna, A, is connected to the antenna circuit represented by the antenna tuning inductance, B, and antenna tuning condenser, C₁. E represents the ground/earth connection. The inductance P₁, also in the antenna circuit, is loosely coupled to inductance S₁, part of the intermediate tuning circuit formed by the two coils S₁ and S₂ and the intermediate tuning condenser, C₂. Coil S₂ is loosely coupled to the detector tuning circuit formed by coil P₂ and condenser C₃ which are connected to the receiver, R, where the signal is detected.

100 to 2,500 meters, enabling clock makers, astronomers and shipboard operators to keep abreast of Greenwich time.

The Multiple Tuner, which was pictured on the front cover of the June 1987 issue, has been in my collection for two years. It was obtained through a fellow collector in Canada, who bought it from an antique dealer in England. Originally used in a costal station until World War I, it was then taken out of service and stored in a barn for 70 years. Restoration was sorely needed.

Part 2 The Biography of Charles Samuel Franklin

Charles Samuel Franklin was born March 23, 1879, in Walthamstow, England. He was the youngest and weakest of 13 children, brushing close to death several times during his youth.

Cultivating his interests in electricity, he studied science and engineering with Professor Silvanus P. Thompson at the Finsbury Technical School. After graduation, he worked in Manchester and then with the Norwich Electricity Company.

In 1899, he secured a job with the Wireless Telegraph and Signal Company, forerunner of the Marconi Company. He was sent directly to South Africa, in service for the Boer War. Wireless telegraphy was first used in the field there, persevering through many problems with the antenna masts and interference from static discharges. The installations impressed the British Admiralty sufficiently enough, though, and a contract was awarded on July 4, 1900, for the installation of wireless aboard twenty-six naval vessels and six coastal stations.

In February 1902, C. S. Franklin sailed west

with Marconi from Poldhu, England, on the S.S. Philadelphia. Acting as chief wireless operator, he received signals from 1550 miles away and single S's up to 2100 miles. Marconi had set up a Morse inker tape to record, and had proof authenticated by the ship's captain. Signals became too weak in daylight to operate the tape machine past 700 miles; on this voyage they realized the effect of darkness on signal strength.

Two years later, the Marconi Company was requested to set up installations in Russia, for use in the Russo-Japanese War. C. S. Franklin was one of the engineers. While in Russia, he sent

home sketches and drawings of the first disc capacitor (variable). The design significantly simplified the adjustment of the receiver-tuned circuit. Then he went further, constructing a compact assembly of three coupled-tuned circuits, variable in wavelength and coupling. This invention became the Multiple Tuner, patented in1907. Used in conjunction with the Magnetic Detector, it was adopted as the standard equipment for many years in ship-to-shore service.

Franklin patented several inventions for the Marconi Company over the years. He instituted a research and development department in 1912. Small and frail, he was happiest when working in seclusion. He had a general disregard for author-

ity, excepting that of his idol, Marconi.

On June 12, 1913, Franklin filed patent #13636, upon his discovery of a valve being capable of producing continuous oscillations (CW) and the magnification of signals when coupled from plate to grid circuits. Thus, he too was involved in the discovery of regeneration.

In 1916, Marconi and Franklin developed apparatus which operated on a wavelength of two meters, proving successful in line of sight communications. He continued experimentation with different apparatus and a variety of wavelengths throughout the war years.

In late 1919, Marconi purchased an ex-enemy steam yacht, the Rovenska, renaming it the "Electra." Outfitted as a floating wireless laboratory, the Electra became the receiver of Marconi's and Franklin's shortwave experiments. Here, Franklin invented, improved and patented the Beam Shortwave System. Following years of investigation, he coupled a highly efficient antenna hookup with a valve transmitter, using his "concentric feeder" system, basically our present-day coaxial cable. By 1923, he succeeded in copying signals 2,320 miles away, at night, on 97 meters using his perfected equipment.

Broadcasting made its appearance in Britain, and Franklin was assigned to design the stations; London's first broadcast station – 2LO – was the result.

He was instrumental in building the Marconiphone "Crystal Junior," the first receiver to obtain British Post Office approval. He also designed the Marconi Type V-2, a receiver of great interest to collectors on both sides of the Atlantic.

By 1925, the Marconi Research Department consisted of six engineers and twelve technical assistants. Through the 1920's, Franklin, H. J. Round and others advanced the broadcast transmitter to a remarkable state of efficiency.

However, in 1931, times changed, and management underwent new leadership. They formed a different structure in research and development. H.J. Round resigned, and Franklin's staff disbanded, so he was forced to return to the main plant at Chelmsford.

One of his last achievements was the design of the sound and vision antenna for the BBC's first television station at Alexandria Palace. When he retired from the company in 1937, sixty-five patents were registered in his name. He went to live near the site of the famous Poldhu station until his death in 1964.



The Antique Wireless Association (A.W.A.), founded in 1952, is a world-wide organization of 3,000 members dedicated to researching and documenting the history of wireless communications. The A.W.A. accomplishes its goals through a quarterly journal - *The Old Timers Bulletin*, sponsorship or co-sponsorship of historical meets, an annual national conference, and a public radio museum. The A.W.A. is a non-profit historical society chartered by the State of New York.

Thé Old Timers Bulletin (OTB), published since 1960, now averages 36 to 48 pages with exceptionally sharp photos. Articles in the quarterly cover such subjects as early broadcast receivers and loudspeakers, amateur and commercial tubetype receivers, television, radio and telegraph keys, pre-1910 wireless and electricity, and vacuum tube development. Other subjects include early amateur transmitter operation, commercial and broadcast station history, and reviews of books and articles relevant to early radio.

Although the OTB accepts no paid advertising, it prints several pages of ads for the use of members who want to buy, sell or trade. Back issues

are available at \$2 per copy.

The A.W.A. also has published several monographs and books on radio history. In 1986, the 123-page Volume I of the A.W.A. Review was completed, Volume II is expected in late 1987.

Annual historical meets are held in the United States and Canada. In 1984, A.W.A. joined the British Vintage Wireless Society for an international conference in London. A.W.A. co-sponsors

regional meets in different locations throughout the year. Meeting notices appear in the OTB, and flyers are mailed to members in the regional area.

The A.W.A. annual conference - a four-day event each September - features a large flea market, three auctions, seminars, banquets, seminars and demonstrations. This world's largest historical radio conference draws international participation with well-known historians and radio personalities attending.

The A.W.A. Historical Museum houses 25,000 historical radio artifacts, boasting a collection larger than the Smithsonian's. Exhibit areas include early broadcast and television receivers, rare tube collection, Western Union office and telegraph key display, replica of a 1925 radio store, several ship installations including a 1901-07 Marconi wireless room. Of special interest to radio amateurs are several replica stations using spark transmitters.

The museum, located in East Bloomfield, N.Y., is open May 1 to Oct. 26, Sunday 2 to 5 PM; June 1 to Aug. 31, Sat. 2 to 4 PM and Wed. 7 to 9 PM. Admission is free and open to groups by appointment (716-657-7489).

THE MECHANICS OF TELEVISION BY PETER F. YANCZER


The Mechanics of Television – The Story of Mechanical Television, is a technical book for the television enthusiast discontent just to have a mechanical television sitting on his shelf. In addition, with this book one can enjoy the wonders of mechanical television without being among the fortunate few owners of such antiques.

But even if you do not plan to build or even operate a mechanical TV set, this book is a fascinating and informative study into the wonders of the very earliest television systems.

This 5 1/2 x 7 1/2 paperback has nine chapters and six appendicies. The first chapter contains a brief history of television from the early 19th century up to the 1930's.

The next six chapters go into the details of the mechanical television system. This begins with scanning methodology and various disc (and drum) arrangements. Also included is a section on scanning motion picture film. Next follows a detailed discussion of motors and synchronizing methods used in early TV. A chapter is devoted to the various television lamps originally employed, as well as light emitting diodes (LEDS) and enclosed arc lamps which can be utilized in the construction of "modern" mechanical systems. Photo electric devices are covered in a chapter which includes discussions of photocells, photo multipliers, and photo-sensitive semiconductors. The television optics chapter takes one from the physics of light to the applications of lenses and mirrors

The chapter on electronics is a rather detailed

treatise of how the miniscule television signal is amplified and modified so as to operate the appropriate television lamp. Also covered are the design of power supplies for the electronics and circuits for a disc position sensor, a ziconium arc lamp supply, and a strobe lighting system.

Chapter eight describes early television systems. The last chapter covers the actual construction of a modern mechanical television system. The ample detail enables the advanced enthusiast to build working mechanical TV pickup and display units. The six appendices make acditional details available to the constructor.

Given my own interest in working with mechanical TV, I found *The Mechanics of Television* a most useful book. Illustrations are profuse and well done. Unfortunately, a bibliography is not included in the book.

I can recommend *The Mechanics of Television* highly to any antique TV enthusiast as well as to any antique radio collector who wants to become knowledgeable about this fast-growing segment of the antique communications hobby.

20¢ per word plus 10¢ per word for shaded ad.

Please do not forget to send in the extra 10¢ per word when your classified ad runs over the free 20 words; your payment will be appreciated, and it will help to keep A.R.C. healthy.

COUNTING WORDS

The standard headings: WANTED, FOR SALE, etc., count as one word each time used in an ad.

Name, address and telephone number, count as 6 words, regardless of length. Ham call letters and business name can be included in the 6 words and do not count extra. (Note: "Jim, (111) 111-1111" also counts as 6 words.) So, please include complete name & address in your ads.

After the above "seven" words, 13 words are left for the rest of the text of a free 20-word ad.

BOXED CLASSIFIED AD DETAILS

Boxed classified ads run unchanged for three months or more. No words are free. Ads may be shaded and may include bold and all-capitalized words freely. The ad need not begin with For Sale, etc. Boxed classified ads are placed with the display ads on the lower portion of the page.

BOXED CLASSIFIED AD COSTS

Minimum run is 3 months, prepaid.

Nonshaded ads:

10¢ per word for all words,* none free, plus 10¢ per word for each bold word plus

10¢ per word for each all-caps word.

Shaded Ads:

aded Ads: 20¢ per word for all words* plus

10¢ per word for each all-caps word.
Note: All words in shaded ads are bold.

Non-Subscribers:

Add 10¢ per word to above costs.

*Three of the total words can be bold-all-caps at no extra charge.

PHOTO & DRAWING DETAILS

The deadline for ads with drawings or photos is the first of the month.


Although the column on the magazine page you are holding is 2 1/4" wide, the artwork given to the printer has columns 3 9/16" wide. The printing process reduces everything to 63% of the original.

Drawings should fit within the 3 9/16" column. If a drawing is too large or too small, it must be resized photographically for an extra charge. Photos may be of any size since all must be converted to a half-tone for printing; in the process, the photo size can be changed.

PHOTO AND DRAWING COSTS

One-time charge of \$5.00 (no charge for drawing if size is OK) plus \$1.00 per 1/2 inch (on artwork) per month.

Drawings also may be requested to be run free and will be printed at the option of A.R.C. and as space permits.
