

ON THE COVER

The Sparton Bluebird on the cover was photographed by Robert Bigelow, 5205 Duggan Plaza, Edina, Minnesota 55435. The film used was Ektachrome 4x5 transparency. A single Norman P2000 strobe was used with a Chim'era light bank. A double exposure was used: 10 seconds at 122 was used to capture the dial lamp, and a 400 watt-second strobe was used to capture the radio. A matte white backdrop was used in front of and behind the radio.

Doug Heimstead's article in this issue provides complete treatment of the Sparton mirrored sets.

Mirrored radios have always been treasured by vintage radio collectors. They are a combination of beauty and function, making them uniquely desirable. The Sparks-Withington Company (Sparton) produced some of the most interesting mirrored radios from 1935 to 1939, and their radios are the subject of this article.

Sparton The Company

In 1900 the Withington brothers founded the root of the company in Jackson, Michigan. They began by making small metal parts for farm tools, buggies and early automobiles. Captain William Sparks joined the company in 1920, and in 1922 the name Sparton emerged.

Sparton introduced its first battery operated radio in 1926, and produced a series of battery sets in the late twenties. In the early thirties, Spar-

ton produced a tew cathedral models and some ornately carved console radios. In 1935, Sparton produced two mirrored radios – the Bluebird and the Nocturne – which nicely complemented its more traditional line of wooden console and table radios.

The first Sparton TV was introduced in 1939. Like most other radio companies, the production of Sparton commercial products was halted during World War II. After the war, Sparton resumed manufacture of commercial products until the late 1940s. The Sparton Company is still in business today, producing industrial and military electronic products.

The Design of the Sets

In the mid-thirties, Sparton, like many other manufacturers, commissioned an industrial designer to help them design a radio that would have more appeal to the consumer. Sparton hired Walter Dorwin Teague, a prominent designer who at the time was also commissioned by Eastman Kodak. Teague worked for Kodak until his death in 1960, and had worked on many interesting products during his lifetime, from the interior design of a Boeing 707 to the front panel of an E.H. Scott 800B radio.

Teague's influence gave Sparton's radios a cool and sleek appearance. The ebony lacquered wood, chrome accent pieces and colored mirrors provided a simple but very modern style. The asymmetric geometric shapes and accent designs are distinctively Art Deco in appearance. The chrome strips on the 557 and 558 radios are strongly reminiscent of the "speed lines" used in Art Deco illustrations of the period.

The 506 Bluebird

Sparton introduced the Bluebird late in 1935. Illustrated on this issue's cover and in Figure 1, it is simply a radio in a wooden box affixed to a 14 1/2 inch diameter blue mirror with some chrome trim, but as Sparton describes it...

"The beautiful circle of rich, dark midnight blue mirror surface slants backwards at an artistically correct angle, concealing a dependable five tube radio receiver of finest design and construction. The repertoire of the Bluebird embraces not only the usual broadcast programs, but interesting police, airplane and amateur events as well."

As with all of the Sparton mirrored radios, the choice of mirror color could be cobalt blue or old rose (peach). The Bluebird was also sold with an optional plateau mirror – a mirror of the same size and color upon which the Bluebird would sit.

The radio is a typical five-tube, AC-DC superheterodyne circuit with a resistance line cord. A switch on the back of the set allowed for broadcast or shortwave reception. Please note that this particular radio can be very hazardous. Since the knobs on the front are made of chrome-plated brass, one may plug it in so that the only thing separating the user from the 120-volt power line is a choke in the power supply. If you cwn a Bluebird and plan to operate it, be sure to read the article by Bill Fox in A.R.C., October 1987, "Owner Safety and the AC-DC Radio," ard use an isolation transformer as he recommends.

The 1186 Nocturne




Figure 2. Sparton Model 1186 Nocturne, an original promotional photo.

Sparton introduced the Nocturne early in 1936. Pictured in Figure 2, this is probably the most spectacular radio ever produced! Seling for \$350 [over \$10,000 has been offered for these sets today], the Nocturne was not the typical family radio; it was destined for the foyer of some posh hotel. The Sparton ad tells it best...

"Daring and brilliant ensemble in glass and metal by Walter Dorwin Teague... A circle of midnight blue Tufflex mirror glass rests in a satin chrome cradle... Beautiful stage setting for High Fidelity receiver cleverly concealed behind the chrome bærred grille..."

The receiver is a 12-tube quality built racio with a 12-inch electrodynamic speaker. It fea-


tures a tuning eye "Viso-Glo" tube, push-pu'l audio output, 1 RF and 2 IF stages and an adjustable IF bandwidth control. All of this is behind a 46- inch diameter mirror.

The 557 and 558

The Sparton 557, shown in Figure 3, was introduced late in 1936; it was a departure from the round Bluebird and Nocturne styles. Another classic design, it featured mirrors on the front, top and left side, in contrast to the ebony lacquer finish and chrome-plated accent pieces.




Figure 4. Sparton Model 558, a top view.




Figure 5. Sparton Model 558. Note its four knobs.

The Sparton 558, shown in Figures 4 and 5, was the "deluxe" model. It appeared late in 1937. and was manufactured through 1939. The deluxe version is the same size as the 557, but sports more engraving in the mirrors and a distinctive black line across the front and top mirrors. Both radios are similar in design - five-tube superheterodynes with both broadcast and shortwave tuning. The deluxe model used the newer octal tubes available in 1937. The only real difference in the circuit was the addition of a tone control.

Both radios are a study in motion. The left end is streamlined, and the right (Continued on following page)



peach mirrored 557 and 558. The wooden body and knobs are finished with a dark chocolate brown lacquer without the crystalline effect. The fins and knob inserts are copper plated instead of chrome. These are much warmer looking than the bluechrome-black models, but they are still very striking in appearance. Sparton's model numbers for the 558 identified the mirror color blue mirrors on the 558-B and peach (copper) on the 558-C.

The 409-GL

In 1938, Sparton introduced the last of its mirrored radios, the Model

end has the chrome fins which give the illusion of motion and speed. The lacquer finish on the blue mirrored models is a decorative finish typical of many items produced in the thirties. The black nitrocellulose lacquer was mixed with naptha and sprayed onto the wooden parts of the radio. Naptha caused the lacquer to dry into a crystalline pattern similar to ice crystals on a winter windowpane. It is easy to tell whether the radio has been refinished because the distinctive finish would be missing.

A different color scheme was used on the




Figure 6. Sparton Model 409-GL with its seven-sided mirrored front.

409-GL, a seven-sided "personal radio," shown in Figure 6. This radio sold for \$18.95, and was

dio sold for \$18.95, and was marketed as a second radio for the den or boudoir in the home. As

Sparton tells it ...

"Here is beveled Midnight Blue Mirror Glass modeled in a rhythmic, modern design enriched with touches of silver glints and ebony black. It is a magnificent, artistic coalition of contour and colors... a worthy successor to the widely accepted Sparton Bluebird Model... a radio thoughtfully

designed to harmonize with all interiors, whether modern or traditional. Truly an original and imaginative gift whose beauty and character are too elusive to be trapped in words."

As companies do not build radios like this anymore, no one writes ad copy like this anymore, either.

The radio is a fourtube, AC-DC superheterodyne circuit with both a ballast tube and a resistance line cord. The two feet on the radio were finished with black lacquer. A grey flock finish was used on the back of the mirror and the wooden cabinet. This

provided a very unobtrusive matte finish.

Closing Comments

These are the mirrored radios which Sparton produced. Many other companies made mirrored radios in the thirties, but none of them could match the flair and classic styles that characterized the Sparton radios.

If you decide to collect them, beware. They are hard to find, very fragile and relatively expensive. The rewards are great though. They are always a

LETTERS

HERTZ - THE FIRST EXPERIMENTS Dear Editor.

I think it was a great idea to feature Hertz in the November A.R.C. A.R.C. gets better all the time.

But, I question one point in your article – the suggestion that it was the coherer that made Marconi's system successful. Actually, the coherer made only a modest improvement in performance (as it had also for Lodge, two years earlier). What made the big difference in Marconi's system over the Hertz-Lodge circuit was the antenna.

When Marconi buried one of his oscillator capacity plates (C, C' in Fig. 3) in the ground, and mounted the other on a tall pole, two things were achieved: 1) The frequency changed from one in the 2-meter range to a much lower and more tractable one; and 2) The grounded vertical antenna that resulted, with its strong ground wave radiation, gave much better signals over the distances and paths he was working with.

Yes, I agree that the antenna devised by Marconi was equally significant to his use of the pleasure to own and to appreciate intimately. These Spartons are truly the jewels of vintage radios.

coherer. The much longer wavelengths generated by Marconi when he attached his antenna were more practical for communication over distances. Short wavelengths were used by Hertz as they were necessary to observe wave phenomena within the confines of a laboratory.

Hertz never used a coherer in his experiments. Although he tried several detection schemes, including frog's legs, he found the spark gap his best detector. After Lodge had read about Hertz's experiments, Lodge used a coherer in his own verification of Hertz's work.

According to Aitken in his book "Syntony and Spark," a coherer was used to detect electromagnetic waves by Hughes in 1878, but he was unable to convince his scientific contemporaries of the significance of what he had done. Branly wrote about his coherer in 1890, Lodge in 1894, and Marconi in 1896. Hertz's work was accomplished from 1887 to 1889. Look for further instaliments of "The Wireless Years" to expand on these early developments in wireless. (John V. Terrey, Editor)

AUCTION AND MEET REPORT

VINTAGE RADIO & PHONOGRAPH SOCIETY AND ANTIQUE WIRELESS ASSOCIATION – CONVENTION '87

Over \$19,000 was bid in the large, seven-hour auction at the Vintage Radio & Phonograph Society (VRPS)/Antique Wireless Association (AWA) 1987 Convention. This annual event ran from October 16 to 18 in Duncanville, Texas, just outside of Dallas. Over 120 collectors registered during the three-day convention.

The radio and phonograph contest yielded over 80 contest entries, including some very rare Marconi and Nesco equipment as well as early TV and a few transistor sets. Over 87 collectors attended the Awards Banquet Saturday night where awards were presented. Guest speaker Bengt Svennson of Sweden presented a 16 mm film and slide presentation on the Alexanderson transmitter.

A popular indoor swap fest topped off the convention Sunday morning. Items shown included a very nice matched panel DeForest Interpanel, along with an early military BC-7 unit. Both foreign and U.S. crystal sets were in abundance. Some very early English tubes of the spherical audion type and the German multi-tube Loewe also appeared at the swap fest.

At the VRPS/AWA general auction, Saturday, October 17, 628 items were offered for sale. 528 items were sold for a total of \$19,012. The highest bid of \$1,200 was for an early English Spark Gap set, serial No. 90.

SERIAL NUMBERS AND SET PRODUCTION of the E. H. SCOTT RADIO LABORATORIES

BY NORMAN S. BRAITHWAITE

For some time E. H. Scott radio enthusiasts have been interested in determining the number of sets produced for each model by the E. H. Scott Radio Laboratories. I know of no surviving production records of the Scott Radio Laboratories, but the mysterious serial numbers on the Scott receivers manufactured between 1932 and 1942 can give us a clue to production. Unlike most other radio manufacturers, the Scott Radio Laboratories did not issue consecutive serial numbers. Scott's serial numbers from 1932 through 1937 consisted of a letter and up to three digits as shown in Figure 1. Beginning in 1938, until home receiver production halted for World War II, the serial numbers consisted of two identical letters and up to three digits as shown in Figure 2. With the exception of the serial numbers found on a few Scott Special Communications receivers of very limited production, the serial numbers appear to have been issued at random. This may have been done to keep competitors from knowing how many sets were being produced and sold.

I believe that the Scott Radio Laboratories maintained a log of serial numbers and cus-

tomers names. This log probably had 260 pages numbered A0 through Z9. On each page numbered A0 through Z9. On each page there were 100 numbered entries (0 through 99). Just before each set was shipped out, a serial number was selected by opening the log to a random page and placing the customer's name on a random entry. The serial number for the set would consist of the page number and entry number. Near the end of 1937, the log book was probably nearly full, at which point the Scott company switched to a second log where the serial numbers consisted of two identical letters and up to three digits.

The first of the two logs would have a maximum of 26,000 entries (26 letters of the

alphabet, times 10 pages per letter, times 100 two-digit combinations). The second of the two logs would also have a maximum of 26,000 entries (26 letters of the alphabet times, times 1000 three-digit combinations). The maximum number of entries using both logs would be 52,000.

Each Scott radio used two serial numbers, one for the tuner chassis (on license notice), and another different number for the power supply chassis (this number can often be found written in grease pencil inside the chassis). Therefore, the probable maximum number of Scott radios manufactured between 1932 and 1942 would be 26,000 – two full books. This figure represents an average production rate of 2500 sets per year or 10 sets per working day. I believe that it is unlikely that more than 40% or approximately 10,000 have survived.

In comparison, Philco built nearly 300,000 model 70B cathedral radios in the year 1931, and a total of over 2,000,000 radios in their entire Baby Grand line (one of several lines of Philco receivers) from 1930 through 1938. These radios had a much lower selling price and survival rate.

however.

With a few assumptions and the available facts, it is possible to estimate the quantity of each model of Scott set produced. I have run rough calculations using two methods to estimate set production. One method was to use a known sample of set serial numbers to determine a ratio of sets of one model to the total of sets from 1932 through 1942. The sample used was the serial number list presented in the rear of *The Classic Radio Collectors Handbook* by J.W.F. Puett (availa blefor \$8.95 postpaid from Puett Electronics, P.O. Box 28572, Dallas, TX 75228). The numbers of sets from this list were adjusted for possible reporting deficiencies (sets of lesser stature are less likely to be reported), and ratios were calculated. Estimated maximum quantities of each model were then determined by multiplying the 26,000 maximum total by the ratios.

The second method consisted of assuming a 1942 production rate (sets per year) equal to twice the production rate of 1932. The production rates were also determined such that the total of all years (assuming a uniform increase in production rate) was equal to the 26,000 maximum. An estimate of the quantity of each set was then determined by multiplying the length of time the set was produced (in years) by the production rate(s) for the year(s) the set was produced. Both methods produced similar results.

Table 1 presents the probable maximum number of sets of each major model of Scott set produced from 1932 through 1942, within the accuracy of the study.

Although it is unlikely we will ever know the exact number of each model produced, we can be relatively certain that the quantity of each model produced was between the numbers above and 50 percent of the numbers above. This is because the first book of serial numbers was likely filled, and the second book must have

AN UNUSUAL HORN SPEAKER BY FLOYD A. PAUL

From time to time an unusual horn speaker comes my way in the form of a picture and/or description. If I can develop enough information about it, I write an article. Sometimes not much information surfaces from magazines, brochures, or letters to some fifty collectors with whom I correspond periodically. This horn, belonging to AI Monroe of Northfield, Ma., is one which has not yet yielded much information.

This unusual horn speaker seems to have been made to sit near the edge of a table or a flattop radio cabinet as the driver housing extends about one inch below the bottom surface of the speaker base.


The bell has twenty-four solid-wood tapered strips about 3/16" thick. Al Monroe has ascertained that the neck, bell, and driver housing are made of a green-grained wood called locust wood, a native New England tree. The wood is a natural finish. The dark streaks in the bell are greenish in color. The speaker bell is 16 1/2" across the front, 12" to the throat, and 21" overall in height. The solid-wood base is 14" long, 11" high and 5" wide and is constructed in two halves, divided lengthwise; the seam is barely visible in the photograph. The throat opening is 4" in diameter. The Nathaniel Baldwin driver (it came with the horn) is threaded and just fits into the 7/8" diameter opening in the neck. The Baldwin driver has wood screws holding it into the wood cup housing, and the cup is 3 1/2" deep and 3 1/2" in diameter.

Neither Al nor I have seen or heard of another

been at least 1/2 filled, judging by the quantity of the second type of serial numbers reported.

These figures are for the common Scott chassis produced. When considering a particular Scott in a cabinet remember that each chassis was offered with a choice of approximately five (later sets) to thirty (Imperial) cabinet styles from which to choose. The inexpensive cabinets seem to be relatively common, and the expensive and unusual cabinets seem to be quite rare with some exceptions. I will write more on Scott cabinets in the future. (Norman S. Braithwaite, P.O. Box 2443, Redding, CA 96099.)



horn made of locust wood. The horn is too professional to have been made by a layrnan and undoubtedly represents an attempt by a company in the 1920's to enter the speaker market. The horn's failure to become a viable marketed product may have been due to production cost, lack of marketing resources or a company marketing group, or manufacturing difficulties.







JACKSON-BELL MODEL 62 (ART DECO): There were some other shaped cabinets in this model per Frank Heathcote. It has two interesting screw-in copper capacitors with one top lead each, copper socket being ground. (G. Hausske -Wheaton, IL)



KADETTE - Two tube pocket portable radio, uses #30 tubes and compression type tuning condensers. Has battery plug in rear for 4-prong supply. (Walter Worth - Wollaston, MA)



LEUTZ - This receiver is a Leutz model "L" superheterodyne manufactured 1922 or 1923. It was the first commercially available superheterodyne. The set consists of two boxes, size 8 x 8 x 40 inches, connected end to end for best performance. There are ten tubes, two in the upper unit and eight in the lower unit pictured. The upper unit consist of the tuner, oscillator and first detector. The lower unit has six intermediate frequency amplifiers, a second detector and a single stage of audio amplification. There is a separate filament rheostat for each tube plus a bias (gain) control for the IF stages. The first IF stage is tuned from the front panel (two large knobs to the right of upper unit) and the last IF is fixed tuned. All other IF's are broad band transformer coupled. Binding posts and a phone-jack are provided at the first detector to be operated as a one-tube regenerative receiver for strong stations. The receiver itself may be operated with either a long wire antenna or a loop antenna. Standard tuning procedure with this set was to set a test oscillator of f. This is a rare set; only about a handful are known to have survived. (*Larry Wright - Lake-In-The-Hills, IL*;




MODEL 5-75 - The 5-50 model could be purchased as a console with Musicone attached for \$75. It was the "5-75" model and was extremely lightweight. Although advertised as "solid mahogany", the cabinet was rather thin with Mahogany veneer attached.



MUSICONSOLE • The "top of the line" Crosley speaker was a "Musiconsole" which served as a radio platform table with space inside to store batteries if necessary. Its price was \$22.50.



MODEL RFL-90 - "Top of the line" battery console at this time was the "RFL-90" at 41 inches high. Obviously the price tag was \$90, but this model offered double drum tuning for greater selectivity. Inside the cabinet was space for batteries.



MODEL 601 BANDBOX - The first all metal cabinet radio offered by Crosley was this six tube Model 601 "Bandbox". It was battery operated and outputted to a metal cased dynamic power speaker called a "Dynacone -E". Its price was \$55 without tubes and the speaker sold for \$25. The "Bandbox" featured a licensed Neutrodyne circuit, a first for Crosley in 1928. A 7-tube version (Model 602) was also available.
