

Two regional clubs (Niagara Falls Wireless Association and New England Radio Club) had extremely successful meets recently which are reported this month under the *Club Spotlight* banner. The *Photo Review* also is included this month.

Some of you have asked when Volume 2 of Alan Douglas' *Radio Manufacturers of the 1920's* will appear. Although we reviewed the first volume in our March issue of last year, it appears that Volume 2 is still a month or two away. We will have a review as soon as a copy is available.

Other "old business" includes the survey on the Federal 61 (October 1988 issue) and the "very old business" National HRO survey (June 1987 issue). The response for the HRO survey was very good, and the results are complete. Since the survey was conducted initially through the Antique Wireless Association, it will publish the results first this fall; later this year, A.R.C. will have its report.

Not quite as successful was a request to owners of Federal 61 receivers. None of the respondents offered any information the survey sought (frequency response and other detailed measurements), although most wanted to have a copy of the results. Last month we listed a few hints for buyers of old radios; here are a few tips for sellers...

1. Please read the A.R.C. advertising policy and adhere to it. (In fact, please do not advertise in A.R.C. unless you agree to it!)

 You will find that if you are accurate (and preferably conservative) in your descriptions, your buyers will be pleased when they receive your set rather than being disappointed. You will have fewer returns and spend less time handling problems.

3. Accept telephone calls; it allows you to detail the condition of items and to finalize the sale. You also can discuss shipping methods and costs. If the item is sold, you can avoid receiving checks which have to be returned.

4. Please ship quickly and within a few days.

5. Pack the item well, or arrange for a delivery or pick up.

6. Of course, advertise in A.R.C.; over 4200 subscribers will receive your ad.

A hint for both buyers and sellers. As I have mentioned before, thousands of successful transactions have taken place through the pages of A.R.C.; however, each buyer and seller should always be cautious when dealing with someone for the first time. It certainly is acceptable to ask either a buyer or seller whom they have dealt with and to call them. In fact, I recommend this! Also, it is not uncommon to ask for (and pay for) a photo of an item. Ask others about someone you don't know; word travels quickly about a lessthan-straightforward person in the hobby. Attending meets is another way to meet collectors face-to-face. I do not mean to imply that you cannot trust other collectors; you usually can. However, as with all activities, where there is the possibility, the unscrupulous sometimes are quick to take advantage.

So folks, keep those cards, letters, ads and articles coming in. A.R.C. will be at the April meets in Nashua, N. H., and Weston, Ma. Later in the year, we will be at Mystic, Ct. ARCA-89, Elgin, III. Radiofest and the Canandaigua, N. Y. AWA meet. So stop by and say "Hil"

Troubleshooting AC Radios

This is the sixth and final part of a series on basic AC radio repair. Jim Fred has been involved in radio for over fifty years, and in this series presents useful hints for both the new collector and the veteran. Antique Radio Classified is pleased to have Jim contribute this series.

Refer to Parts 1 and 2 of this series (Feb. and Apr.1988) for details on tools, test equipment, safety, etc. IMPORTANT: do not plug the radio in until you have read the safety tips and warnings in these two installments!

Part 3 (July 1988) covered the TRF radio and Part 4 (Sept. 1988) covered the Superheterodyne radio. Part 5 (Jan. 1989) covered Vacuum Tube Basics. (Editor)

In this installment of basic AC radio repair, we will discuss large AC radios; the most important phases of troubleshooting AC-DC radios have been covered in the previous installments.

Electronic differences between large AC radios and AC-DC radios include more tubes, shortwave bands, push-button tuning, tone controls, tuning indicators, and motor driven automatic tuning. This isn't to say that small AC-DC table radios have none of these features, but these features are most likely to be found in large table models and console radios.

AUDIO AND POWER SUPPLY STAGES

First, let us consider more audio output power. larger speakers, push-pull output tubes and better audio fidelity. To handle the extra audio power, the radio must have more power from the B plus power supply. The AC-DC radio needed no power transformer because 110 volts DC were adequate for the tubes plate voltage. The increased audio output of the push-pull output tubes requires at least 250 volts DC on the plates of the tubes. As you can see from the diagram, a transformer (70), with a center tapped high voltage winding, is required to provide full wave, rectified, direct current. A rectifier tube (8) with a five-volt filament and two anodes or plates is used. The high voltage is approximately equal to one half the high voltage from the transformer winding. The voltage is smoothed by two filter capacitors (9) and (9) and the 4000 ohm resistor (67). The speaker (72) has a permanent magnet field.

The audio output push-pull stage, two 6V6 tubes (6) and (7), gets its name from the fact that one tube provides power on the plus half of the audio wave form, and the other tube provides power on the minus half of the wave form. Thus a push-pull stage provides more than twice the power of a single audio output tube. To match two tubes to a single speaker voice coil, a center tapped output transformer (71) is used.

In most sets the tone control circuit, consisting of either a switch and several capacitors – (86), (17), and (18) – or one capacitor in series with a variable resistor, is connected to the audio driver plate or grid. In our circuit it is connected to the grid of the 6J5 audio driver-phase inverter. The idea is to bypass higher frequencies to ground, giving the illusion of adding more base notes to the speaker.

The push-pull tubes must have the right amount of grid bias which is provided by the voltage drop across the common cathode resistor (66).

On the input side we must have two signals, 180 degrees out-of-phase, to apply to the pushpull grids. There are several ways to get these signals. In this circuit we get one signal from the plate of the 6J5, through the coupling capacitor (14) to the grid of tube (6). We get the 180 degree out-of-phase signal from the cathode of the 6J5, through the coupling capacitor (15) to the grid of tube (7).

MULTIPLE-TUBE RADIOS

It might be wise to mention a practice followed by a few radio manufacturers in the 1930's. They would add a bunch of tubes to a radio, which would contribute nothing to the technical excellence of the radio. There are two companies that come to mind – the International Radio Corp., of Ann Arbor, Mich., and the Midwest Radio Corp., of Ann Arbor, Mich., and the Midwest Radio Corp., of Cincinnati, Oh. I have no experience with Midwest, but will tell you of a Kadette radio made by International Radio.

The Kadette radio chassis was from an inexpensive console cabinet; it had a large colorful dial and twelve tubes, but played very poorly. It had two 25-volt filament rectifier tubes with all the plates and the cathodes connected in parallel. This made the two tubes equal to one tube. The two audio output tubes were connected in parallel so that the two put out very little more than one tube would. There were three ballast tubes in series with the filaments of the other tubes. This allowed the radio to operate without a power transformer. The "active" tubes were a converter tube, an IF amplifier tube, a detector tube, and an audio output tube. This radio played like an ordinary five-tube AC-DC radio.

There were radios with as many as twenty-five tubes that played no better than many six- or

seven-tube radios. Finally the U.S. Government decreed that a company could advertise only the number of tubes that actually processed the signal plus the rectifier tube. In other words the Kadette radio could only have been advertised as "six tubes plus two rectifiers and ballast tubes." This decree soon put an end to the extravagant claims.

Of course, there were many deluxe multi-tube radios that used every tube to improve the efficiency of the radio. Each manufacturer – for instance Philco, Zenith, GE and others – made a top-of-the-line, very expensive radio with twelve or more tubes. These sets are not to be confused with the above mentioned "cheapie multi-tube radios." There was another group of manufacturers – namely Scott, McMurdo-Silver, Silver-Marshall, and some models of Capehart that became "Classic" radios. By definition "classic" means "the very best of its kind."



TUNING SYSTEMS

There was a period of time when every set maker had an expensive radio with an electric motor-driven tuning capacitor. These systems were electro-mechanical and are not to be confused with much later signal-seeking automobile radios. The electro-mechanical tuners had to be "set-up" to stop at certain points on the dial corresponding to stations the set owner wanted to hear. None of these systems were very reliable, and after an initial trial period most people went back to using the regular tuning knob. If you are working on one of these sets, it would be wise to get a copy of the manufacturer's set-up procedure before trying to repair it.

Most consoles and many table models had push-button tuning. Push-button tuning fell into two general categories – mechanical and electrical. Most manufacturers except Philco used mechanical push buttons. Belmont radio used a series of cams, one for each button, which were unlocked by a screw in the center of the tuning knob. Other mechanical systems had push buttons which often concealed the adjusting screws. If you have a set with mechanical push-button tuning, you should obtain a copy of the user's manual before trying to set the push buttons.

Philco was the chief user of the electrical push-button tuning system. The Philco sets used a separate set of oscillator coils, one for each button, and separate converter coils, one for each button. To set up a push button, you would first tune in the station you wanted on the dial. and then you would select "PB" on the wave change switch. After pushing the button, you would probably hear a station, not necessarily the desired one. By turning the adjusting screw in the oscillator coil, you could tune in the same station you had on the dial. You would then adjust the screw on the converter trimmer until you had the best sounding signal. You might have to switch back and forth between dial and push button and adjust the tuned circuits until the station came in perfectly. Each button had a definite (Continued on page 7)




Figure 1. The Clapp Eastham HR (left) and the HZ (right).

CLADD EASTHAM HD/H7 SDECISICATIONS

Clapp-Eastham introduced the HR/HZ receiver-amplifier early in 1922. The original selling price was \$35 per unit without accessories. Eventually dubbed the "Radak," manufacturing continued through 1922 with the price lowered to about \$60 for the pair by production's end. Along with the HR/HZ, Clapp-Eastham offered what was basically the two units installed on one panel in one cabinet, the RZ model. It followed the same evolution as the HR/HZ sets.

The HR circuit is a single circuit Armstrong regenerative detector using a soft detector tube.

A small, five-plate, variable condenser is utilized for a Vernier effect in tuning. Three frequency ranges are available via the ANT IND switch. The HR's frequency coverage is fairly wide when compared to to its contemporary, low-priced receivers. The placement of the detector B battery between the plate variometer and the earphones is unusual and probably a hold-over from earlier designs. The HZ is a two-stage, transformercoupled audio amplifier. For compatibility with the HR, the input audio transformer is wired to A-, allowing a single A supply for both sets. Clapp-Eastham manufactured most of the components for their radios. Their transformers, called "Maximus," have unusual circular-shaped laminations,

frequency range as indicated. After you get one button set, you can repeat the procedure for the rest of the buttons. This type of push button was the most reliable of all I've seen.

SHORT WAVE

Shortwave listening became very popular in the late 1930's. The public demanded new features in their radios just as they did in their automobiles, but they also expected the radios to be less expensive each year. Shortwave bands could be added in several different ways. Table models usually just put taps on the oscillator and converter coils with a switch to short out part of the coil for the higher frequency bands. Needless to say, these sets weren't very sensitive on the shortwave bands.

The larger better built console sets had individual coils for each stage in the radio and for each wave band. A long multi-wafer switch chose the set of coils for the band you selected. Some of the shortwave bands were so crowded with stations that it was difficult to separate them. By using a second small capacity variable capacitor in parallel with the main larger tuning capacitor, it was possible to spread the stations apart. This was soon to be known as "Band Spread Tuning." and their rheostats are also quite unique using adjacent Nichrome wire coils which are shorted by a copper strip moved by the associated knob.

Construction consists of components mounted on an engraved bakelite panel which is placed into an oak cabinet on early models. Shortly thereafter, a mahogany cabinet was used along with bakelite binding posts. Late models had the name "Radak" engraved on the panel and used phone jacks to replace the panel-mounted knife switches used on the HZ amplifier.

It is possible to obtain reasonably good results with the HR/HZ; however, selectivity is poor due to the single circuit tuning. The Vernier-effect tun-

ing helps, but for the highest sensitivity and selectivity, keep the set at the oscillation point and tune for zero-beat. As with most receivers using a soft detector, with tungsten filaments, e.g. UV-200, results are highly variable from tube to tube, and different plate and filament voltages should be tried. Using eighteen volts on the detector plate, about 4.5 volts on the detector filament and 67 volts on the amplifier plates, the best DX was WBAP in Ft. Worth, Texas. This is a difficult station in N.W. Nevada as the 50kW station, KROW, is just 40 kHz away.

The set pictured and used for testing is an electronically original example of an early version HR and an intermediate version HZ.

Band spread tuning was available on top of the line consoles and also on communication and amateur radio receivers.

Surprisingly these console radios worked quite well, and it was possible to pull in Moscow or Australia if you had an outside antenna. Their popularity reached a peak during World War II, but with the return of civilian radio production interest in shortwave bands faded away. If you have such a radio, try to restore the shortwave bands too because it is very interesting to listen in on foreign stations.

We have covered most of the features that separate the quality radios from the "bare bones" All American Five AC-DC radios. You will really enjoy your console, deluxe, or classic radios if you restore them to their original playing condition.

Mechanical Television A Stop on the Road to Modern TV – Part 1

An old American expression says, "Necessity is the mother of invention." But one might ask if this could truly be applied to television. Nearly two-hundred years ago, most folks were content with board games, patchwork quilts, and quiet evenings beside a fire. But a few men were not so easily satisfied. They conducted experiments based on hunches, chance happenings, and well-reasoned theories; soon they began to see a pattern. Striving for something more, these men gradually advanced scientific knowledge, and,

building upon one another's discoveries, developed television.

One of the many systems tried was mechanical television. An inquisitive mind might ask, "How did it work? What experiments preceded it? What was it like to be televised by such a TV? What system is used to day?" Exploration of these questions will provide a basis of appreciation for technology, both past and present, and for the wonder called television.

Mechanical television (circa 1930) consists of two parts: the transmitter and the receiver. These are simply the television camera and the television set. As an example of mechanical television, I shall describe the equipment reconstructed by Richard D. Brewster, a television collector, who fol-

lowed a system originally developed by Hollis S. Baird in 1929.

THE TELEVISION TRANSMITTER




Figure 1. Illustration of a scanning disk (top) and scanning drum.

For an easy explanation, the transmitter can be divided into two sections: the scanning and the sensing equipment. The first consists of a scanning drum, a light, a lens, and a motor. The drum (some models have a wheel or disc) looks like a circular, upside-down cake tin (see Figure 1). It is 14 1/2 inches in diameter, with a 2 3/4 inch edge all around. This edge is perforated by 60 holes spaced one inch apart. The holes encircle the drum in a spiral fashion; no two holes are on the same level. Also, there is never one hole directly beneath another; the bottom hole immediately precedes the top hole.

Beneath the drum is a motor which spins it; in the center of the drum is a high intensity light. This system is enclosed in a square wooden box (17x17x10 inches). A lens is mounted on a 1 1/4 inch square opening at the front of the box. Light passes through each hole and the lens as the drum spins past the opening. The holes are positioned on the drum so that only one hole is in front of the lens at a time; light only leaves the

box in one spot at a time.

The lens projects the light onto the scene to be televised. If the spot of light is from a central hole on the drum, the spot will illuminate a middle point on the scene. As the drum spins slowly, this light is seen to move from right to left in a straight line across the scene. (Of course, the direction depends on the drum's; Brewster's drum spun clockwise, so the spot of light, after inversion by the lens, went from right to left.) When that spot has moved across the entire scene, another, slightly lower, appears at the far right and scans the scene just as the first did. Therefore, the transmitter only focuses on one "light spot" of the scene at a time.




Figure 2. A photocell used in a 1930 mechanical TV.




Figure 3. A complete photocell box.

The second section of the transmitter makes use of the light spot's reflection from the scene. This light must be

captured and converted into an electrical signal. Four photocells serve this purpose. Photocells (light sensitive vacuum tubes) are spherical, six inches in diameter, and made of glass as shown in Figure 2. The front half of each is clear, while the inside of the back is coated with silvery, photo-sensitive material. The photocells are mounted in a three-foot square, nine-inch-wide wooden box. In the center of this box is a ten-inch square hole through which the light from the scanning drum passes. As Figure 3 depicts, the four sides around this hole slope inward, allowing the photocells to "look" at and collect light from the screen from different angles.

Now consider the spot of light discussed ear-

lier. Suppose that at the far right position, the light hits the white background of a screen. The light reflected is high, and it passes through the front glass of the photo-cells and contacts the photo-sensitive material on the back of the cells. This material gives off electrons in response to the reflected light's intensity. These negatively charged electrons make up an electric signal and are attracted to a positively charged metal rod in the center of each photocell. The rod is connected to a vacuum tube amplifier which increases the signal. This signal is then sent by

wire (or radio) to the receiver. Each signal from each spot of the screen represents only a part of the total picture; thus, in order to be televised, the picture is taken apart bit by bit.

Let's step back and look at this process in the normal time frame. The drum's operating speed is 20 rotations per second. As it starts slowly, the spot of light can be seen moving (scanning) across the scene, followed by another spot slightly lower, and so on, until it reaches the bottom; it then returns to the top, and begins to descend again. Each spot of light, seeing only a tiny portion of the scene, re-

flects different light intensities which enter the photocells and cause different levels in the signal produced by the photocells. As the drum moves faster and faster, the spot of light appears as a solid line followed by another and another, streaking from top to bottom, scanning the scene sequentially (in order). As the drum reaches top speed, the "flying spot" looks like a fixed pattern of white stripes.

THE TELEVISION RECEIVER

The second part of a mechanical television is the receiver. A neon light inside this receives the

electronic signals from the transmitter. The light glows according to the signal from the photocell output, varying in intensity according to the brightness of each "spot" on the original sceen. As with the transmitter, a scanning drum spins around the neon light. These drums must be synchronized (moving at the same speed) so that each recreated spot of light is replaced to its proper position in the scene. The light emitted through the holes in the drum is that which meets the observer's eye. Because the electronic signals can pass so quickly between transmitter and

receiver, and because the drum spins at such a fast rate, the viewer sees the transmitted scene as a whole, and not as individual spots of light. This is called persistence of vision. and is still a basic principle behind TV. An early televised picture of Felix the Cat (Figure 4) is a good representation of the final picture transmitted by a 1930 mechanical TV. The light spots cause visible lines, although the picture is complete, and not individual spots.

PRE-TELEVISION EXPERIMENTS

The prestigious title "Inventor of Television"

cannot be given to a particular man. Television evolved gradually from private experiments performed with homemade equipment; men from different backgrounds and cultures developed ideas and concepts into tangible, if not always workable, forms, fairly independent of one another. It is hard to designate a specific date which began the experiments that led to television; some in the 1700's that explored magnetic force had at least an indirect influence. Probably the first and most direct experiment was that of Edmond Becquerel in 1839. He observed the

electro-chemical effect of light, meaning that light could be changed into electricity. This led to the development of the first primitive photocell.

In 1873, a cable operator named May noticed that the element selenium had a varying resistance to electric current when exposed to different light intensities. This meant that selenium was photoelectric. Many researchers latched onto this discovery, which heightened interest in changing light to electricity. Eventually, selenium's photoelectric quality led to the first TV methods.

Two years later, American scientist G. R. Carey invented the first television system, incorporating the photoelectric qualities of selenium. His system was modeled after the human eye which has many photoelectric nerve endings in the retina. For these nerve endings Carey substituted a mosaic of selenium cells. Each cell he connected separately by wire to an electric light in a bank of lights; each cell in the mosaic occupied the corresponding position as its counterpart light. An illuminated object's reflection was picked up by the cells, each of which responded with an electric signal. Then the light array received the signals and lit up, rendering a crude picture of the original object.

In 1878, Frenchman Constantine Senlecq made a mosaic similar to Carey's; however, these cells were connected to a distributor which sent the signals through a single wire to the receiver. This was one of the first scanning methods. Until this time, no effective method of scanning was known.

Maurice Leblanc focused his attention on the scanning problem. In 1880, he theorized breaking the picture into tiny spots of varying shades of light and dark. Then he transmitted each spot (in the form of electricity) in precise order to receiver, where each piece was restored to its proper place, putting the picture back together.

Two years later, William Lucas made the first significant proposal for a scanning system. He realized that the success of scanning depended on a phenomenon known as "persistence of vision." The spot of light must move so fast over the picture that the human eye sees only an entire picture, and not a moving spot of light.

At last, in 1884, German researcher Paul Nipkow suggested a scanning method that would work. His idea sequentially scanned a scene by projecting it through holes punched around the circumference of a rotating disc. A different part of the scene would pass through each hole as the disc rotated. At the end of one complete rotation, therefore, the entire scene would have been scanned. His receiver and transmitter called for a highly illuminated scene which shone through the disc to a selenium cell. This cell gave out electric signals in proportion to light intensity. These signals traveled to a light source in the receiver which glowed according to each electric current strength. This light would pass through a second disc and be projected on a screen. By synchronizing these two discs, Nipkow reported, "the sequential scanning of light variations... makes possible the accurate reproduction of the

original scene."

Nipkow's TV in 1884 was essentially the same as the mechanical TV described earlier in this article. The main difference between them is that Nipkow used very bright lights on his subject and projected that light through holes in the disc to a single photocell; in 1930 system described, the light itself was projected through the holes onto the subject.

In 1908, French researcher Regnoux and Fournier positioned the light source inside the drum (or, if a disc was used, behind the disc) so that it went through the holes and hit the scene. This eliminated the need for the scene to be placed under high intensity light, and was much easier on the actors. Thus, since only a narrow beam of light scanned the object, it was called the "flying-spot method." The light then reflected from the object and was collected by several photo-sensitive cells infront of the sceen to produce the signal. This exactly defines the 1930 mechanical TV.

In 1923, a man named John Baird began experimenting with this kind of television. He began transmitting pictures in 1924, and held his first public demonstration on March 25, 1925. It lasted for three weeks and had three daily shows. At first, Baird's TV only produced silhouettes, known as "shadow-graphs." In 1926, the silhouettes yielded half-tones, meaning that shading was visible. By 1929, the British Broadcasting Corporation began regular experimental television broadcasts. The images were blurred and faint, but details such as facial expressions could be detected. Television was born!

As John Baird performed his experiments, another man named Hollis S. Baird (no relation) was developing and bringing TV to the Boston area. During years of research, he built his own mechanical TV, and this design is what Richard Brewster followed when he built a 1930 mechanical TV system, using an original 1930 receiver.

By now, you may have realized that the author of this article is Richard Brewster's daughter. Richard is an avid mechanical television collector and a contributor to A.R.C. His apparatus was demonstrated at the Antique Wireless Association's annual convention several years ago.

The article was written for a college course in technical writing. Meghan writes, "I wanted to convey to readers about watching and being on television in the 1930s. We made our own studio, and I donned the white make-up of a 1930s actress while Dad watched me on the receiver. It was a lot of fun, and certainly something not everybody gets to do!"

In the second part of this article, the experience of being televised on a recreated 1930's television system is described.

RADIO RAMBLINGS..

Whither Radio Collecting – Part 2

I find it impossible to ignore the implications of the *Radio Ramblings...* commentary by Mike Adams in the January '89 issue of A.R.C.

My reply: Radio and TV collectors, don't worry! It WAS all a bad dream. There is not now, nor will there ever be, a shortage of old radios or vintage televisions!

Way back in 1977, I bought my first collectible camera, and decided to augment my pay by buying and selling in this relatively new field. You could walk into any photo shop back then, hit any garage sale, or stop in any antique shop and find an easily resaleable photographic item. I sold a few cameras throughout the camera classified, then started selling at the several yearly shows that were set up by and for camera collectors.

I bought hundreds of collectible cameras, while hundreds of my competitors were buying 100's and 100's more. In the next three or four years, I found every camera that could be found in Northern New Jersey. At least five other major collectors did the same thing, just in this area. The camera classifieds grew until thousands of collector/dealers were buying and selling dozens of items each and every month! A local collector organized over twenty camera meets per year in this section of the country – and I managed to sell loads of cameras at every single show.

By 1984 (seven years later) the market was still booming; the price of nearly every camera was headed to the moon, and dozens of new dealers were scouring the territory in my neck of the woods. It seemed that every photo shop became a used camera center! Obviously the camera supply in this area was about to run out! I'd wake up, maybe in early 1985, and find not a single camera, lens, or accessory in town.

The funny thing is, I can take you out for a day trip tomorrow, and we'll come back with several good camera buys. And when we take them to this month's camera show, forty to fifty other dealers will be displaying dozens of freshly purchased cameras. No, the cameras never did run out. I might not be able to find that one particular camera I want, but there are lots of items turning up daily.

About two years ago a fantastic collection of 1000's of early cameras were sold, and in September a collection of over 300 rare and desirable cameras were auctioned in Europe. Many of these cameras were museum quality, and several were considered unique.

I'd like to use this experience to say, "No, never!" We'll always have old radios and TV's being found, down the street, or at a swap meet. It's no harder to buy a Predicta today than three years ago when I first bought one! More pre-war televisions turned up this year than five years ago: two scanning discs locally, one for free when another was bought, and several electronic TV's for under \$500 each!

A collection of early battery and crystal sets turned up in Southern New Jersey this summer. Some super-rare radios were found at Radiofest, and several rare 1930's novelty and chrome radios were offered at a December New York City antique show! This pattern will be repeated in 1989, 1990, and 1999! Take my word for it: they didn't make ten FADA Bullets – they made thousands and thousands. Philco didn't produce 200 Baby Grand cathedrals; they made over two millionl

We will all be finding radios and televisions in the attics of estate sales; we'll all be offered sets in the classifieds. And even collectors get bored with current interests and sell rare and outstanding condition sets and collections all the time.

Maybe the price is going to get higher, but let's look at the relation between collections and price... I could have bought a house locally when I started collecting cameras, for about \$50,000. Today I need nearly \$200,000 to buy an older house in this area! That's something I need to live in, keep warm in, and grow old in. I can't feel sorry for anyone who could have bought a FADA two years ago for \$35 but now has to shell out over \$400 for this toy! Don't buy Catalin if it's too expensive for you. Beautiful Art Deco console radios go begging for under \$100 at nearly every swap meet. Pretty brown bakelite and interesting wood table sets are everywhere for under \$75 in this area. You can still find early 1950's televisions at any swap meet for under \$50.

And this ignores those "lucky" purchases. Those rare battery and crystal sets mentioned above sold for only \$50 each, and one of the scanning disc TV's went for \$20! We have all seen rare vacuum tubes sell at flea markets for under \$5. I travel over 40,000 miles to find bargains in this section of the country. If you'd like to collect radios, or anything else, just chase a little.

It's fairly easy to accumulate an impressive collection today, and it will be possible to add to this collection in the future. Tailor your interests to items you can afford, have room for, and like aesthetically. Novelty transistor radios can form just as interesting a collection as rare Leica cameras!

Good hunting... and don't let 'em scare yal
