

EDITOR'S COMMENTS

As the saying goes, "Variety is the spice of life." Well, how better to start a New Year than with a celebration of the tremendous variety in radio collecting. One way to do that is to take a look at what is offered at an outstanding meet like ARCI's Radiofest. It makes you realize that there is plenty of spice in a radio collector's life.

Daniel Schoo's report and photos attest to the wideranging collector interests on display especially at a flea market. Dan's meet photos run the gamut of decades of radio history from a 1920s Magnavox hom speaker, to 1930s-1940s Art Deco wooden cathedrals, to later TVs, pocket transistors, and Ham equipment. A flea market touches on just about everyone's interest.

In addition to a flea market, a major meet has other standard ingredients in its offerings: an auction, a banquet, and a contest. But each meet also has its own character. Radiofest, for example, offers free admission to the flea market, an appraisal tent open to the general public, a Ham radio station that operates throughout the meet, and a Boy Scout merit badge program, capturing the interest of a possible next generation of collectors. The boys can actually eam their badges at the meet. All of these special offerings add up to variety with a capital "V" and make Radiofest one of the major shows in the U. S.

Sometimes we're also struck by the infinite variety in radio history. Dave Crocker diverged from his usual pursuit of Crosley history when he came across the story of a 1919 Navy contract for four airplanes intended for World War I use. However, the war ended before the planes could be put into action; instead, they were entered into a trans-Atlantic crossing contest. Only one finished, and Dave credits the radio operator for the success. You'll be interested in the photo of the plane's equipment and an identifying schematic.

Good photos always tell even a small story well. Ian Sanders picked up on the Heathkit IT-28 capacitor

checker in the October "Photo Review" and sent in photos of his three similar sets. Manufacturers created variety in products with color, in this case, light or dark front pages.

Color obviously gives variety to a collection. The turquoise plastic case of an Emerson transistor portable caught Bob Enemark's eye, and with a little repair, it made a bright addition to his collection.

Claude Chafin's good photo of a Viscount 1660 multiband portable radio with a description of his repair job is an example of how a short article can often fill our bill. Articles need not be pages long to impart valuable information.

Some of us, of course, don't necessarily require variety in our collections. Roland Jennings championed the Thompson "Minuet" Neutrodyne in a 1997 A.R.C. article and still looks for ways to make repair of these sets easier. In a follow-up, he suggests a Chidester prefab cone for use by the next generation of restorers.

And some of us, despite the invasion of modem technology into our lives, hang on to the old as long as possible. Chris Jones describes his exhaustive effort to mix the old and the new when he was forced to replace his 27-year old TV. Somehow the audio in his modem replacement didn't suit, and he put together a vintage sound system to meet his standards. Now we know that no matter what new gadget appears, vintage equipment collectors will carry on.

Speaking of standards, we all have our own, and for Howard Stone, they involve excellence in research. That's what he found in Eric Wenaas's book *Radiola: The Golden Age of RCA*, and that's what compelled him to write an unsolicited review. For Howard, the book is a model for how to go about researching and writing a book on "this earth-shaking invention." We appreciate Howard's addition to the praise the book has already received.

MEET AND AUCTION REPORT

Antique Radio Club of Illinois Radiofest XXVI August 2-4, 2007

The Antique Radio Club of Illinois (ARCI) 26th annual Radiofest was hosted by the Willowbrook Holiday Inn Conference Center in Willowbrook, Illinois. The hotel is easily accessible at its suburban location about 25 miles southwest of Chicago's O'Hare airport. It is on Illinois Route 83, Kingery Highway, just a short distance north of Interstate 55.

The Willowbrook Holiday Inn was an improvement in location this year with its much more comfortable environment. The weather, always a concern for outdoor events, was beautiful with warm sunny days for the entire duration. The tree-lined parking lot with a landscaped island, grassy areas, and angled borders provided an atmosphere more like a friendly company picnic. In addition a beautiful outdoor pool surrounded by a nicely landscaped courtvard with trees and flowers made the event more enjoyable.

On Thursday, August 2, preregistration began at 4 P.M. This year the main auction was scheduled for 6:30 P.M. Thursday evening outdoors in the hospitality tent, and it continued for more than two hours. Former ARCI president Harry Blesy was the auctioneer.

The auction attracted 122 bidders on 110 lots for a total of \$11,280 in gross sales making it one of the most successful in several years. The top selling item was a rare model Philco Predicta television closing at \$1,200. After the auction, the club supplied free pizza for attendees at the opening party, and everyone had a great time.

Donna and Larrived early Friday morning about 6:20 A.M. to find a flurry of flea market activity. A sellout of 215 seller spaces was up significantly from 202 at the previous location last year. Registration opened at 7 A.м., and as always, the general public was welcome to come in for flea market shopping at no charge. This year I saw a wonderful selection of collectible radios, everything from Zenith "Walton" sets. Fada bullets, chrome chassis Scotts, and even a Zenith Stratosphere for sale. There was no shortage of the more affordable sets either.

The ARCI hospitality tent supplied tables and a shady place to sit down. Our favorite hostess Janet "cookie lady" LaVelle hosted the hospitality tent again this year with cold drinks, chips, cookies and other goodies, all for a free-will donation. The Holiday Inn also had its own tent with coffee and an assortment of sweet rolls for breakfast and the typical outdoor cookout style food for lunch at an attractive price.

Jim Novak, WA9FIH, coordinated the special event Amateur Radio station KC9IEQ. Ed Schumacher, WA9GQK, and Chris Farley, KC9IEQ, provided equipment, and along with Dale Svetanoff, WA9ENA, took turns in the shack. They made 62 contacts on 75, 40, 20 and 2 meters during the event. This was about double the number of contacts made last year. The club owes a special thanks to the Amateur operators who worked so hard.

expertise at the radio appraisal tent. The appraisal service is for anyone from the general public who brings in a radio and wants to know its approximate worth. The club also hosted a Boy Scout merit badge program again this year for badges in radio and collections. This is an excellent opportunity for scouts to get merit badge credit from experts in the field and have a good time doing it.

The popular old equipment contest registered 33 entries. Among the several rare and unusual entries were a 1909 Gebruder Bing Model 10201 spark coil transmitter/coherer receiver set; a one-of-a-kind, 1935, RCA laboratory, developmental, iconoscope

tube; and a 1928 Golden-Leutz Universal Transoceanic Phantom screen grid TRF receiver in restored working condition. Public viewing began at 5 p.m. and continued until 9 p.m.

The regular series of radio-related presentations in the main ballroom attracted between 35 and 45 people and covered several interesting topics. Dr. Alexander Magoun, Executive Director of the David Sarnoff Library in Princeton, New Jersey, outlined the history of RCA's development of all electronic television. He covered the work of the RCA research staff led by Vladimir Zworykin, including the development of the iconoscope camera tube. He also described the David Samoff Library and the recent flooding disaster that water-damaged thousands of irreplaceable historical documents. Details may be found at www.davidsarnoff.org, Information on sending contributions to help recover these documents can be found there.

In the next presentation, Bob Dobush discussed the various aspects of tube collecting. Using many samples and original advertising displays, he gave an interesting history of some of the obscure types, the manufacturers who made them, and how they fit into the early radio business. He gave some interesting tips; for example, the use of marine varnish for regluing loose bases. He also recommended tube testers, such as the popular Hickok models for determining whether a particular tube is good.

Peter Yanzcer, noted authority on mechanical television, introduced the audience to a history of the people and the work they did in early electromechanical television systems. Before camera tubes and electronic scanning methods were invented, early sys-

tems used mechanical scanning techniques with very limited resolution and sensitivity. Intense light and the associated unbearable heat from the lamps were necessary to get the most rudimentary live images.

Yanczer demonstrated two of his home-built televisors, one having 48 lines of resolution, and the other, a 24-line device. Using a digital scan converter, Yanczer fascinated the audience by playing a modern DVD disk on each of the two televisors. Necks craned to see the dim barely recognizable images that the devices produced. Yanczer gave us a rare look into the past with his recreations.

Bret Menassa, an authority on radio restoration

and a leading producer of restoration video tutorials, covered a subject near to every collectors heart — the means of restoring aged and damaged radio cabinets.

For the ladies, Janet LaVelle hosted 23 guests for the Ladies Luncheon at noon in the hotel restaurant. Janet provided individual door prizes for everyone. Always the gracious hostess, Janet knows how to throw a good party

Close to 100 guests attended the banquet this year. The banquet speaker, Rebecca Schreiner, Director of the Western Electric Hawthorne Works Museum at Morton College in Cicero, Illinois, presented a history of the famous Hawthorne Works. She described how it was built, what was done there, and who the workers were. She also told us about the museum and the Western Electric artifacts and products that are showcased there. This is an incredible place for anyone interested in telephone equipment history and development.

The banquet meal and service were a big improvement over last year. Following the dinner, the guests were treated to the West End Jazz Band who played (Text continued on page 11)



RADIO AND AVIATION HISTORY

Radio and the Historic Flight of the NC-4

BY DAVE CROCKER

Dave Crocker has a knack for unearthing odd bits of radio history. Here he tells of a Navy 'flying boat" that made history in 1919 most probably because of a great radio operator. (Editor)

I am sure you are all familiar with the Trans-Atlantic flight of the NC-4 in 1919. No? Well, I'm not surprised. Most people are unaware of this historic event, as twas quickly overshadowed by many "Across the Pond" aviators, including Charles Lindbergh. Here's the background story.

In 1917, Congress appropriated funds for the construction of four huge, multi-engine "flying boats" capable of escorting U.S. convoys to Europe, thus, thwarting German submarine attacks. The contract went to the Curtiss Aeroplane and

Motor Co. of Buffalo, New York, and work began on building the biggest sea-going airplanes the world had ever seen. The planes were designated "NC" for "Navy-Curtiss" — NC-1 and NC-2.




Figure 1. The Navy-Curtiss NC-4 flying boat of 1919.

Just after construction of the NC-1 and NC-2 had been completed, World War I ended. However, it was then agreed that the NC-3 and NC-4, shown in Figure 1, would be finished, not for war purposes, but to compete in the British *Daily Mail* newspaper prize of 10,000 pounds to the first "aeroplane" to cross the Atlantic Ocean. The Navy decided to go for it, not for the money, but for the prestige.

BASIC DESCRIPTION AND RADIO EQUIPMENT

These 4-engine "flying boats" weighed in at about 28,000 pounds each, loaded. They carried a crew of six: a navigator, two pilots, two engineers and a radio operator.

The basic radio equipment in the NC-4 consisted of an SE 1340 tube-type transmitter, an SE 1310 spark transmitter, an SE 950 receiver, an SE 1605-B receiver/amplifier, an SE 1441A radio compass control panel, a radio compass condenser, and a rotatable direction-finding loop antenna for the radio compass equipment. Ancillary equipment included a change-over switch (transmit/receive), storage batteries, a dynamotor, radio/intercom selector switches, an antenna wire reel for deploying and recovering the trailing wire antenna, plus a key, microphone and headsets. All of this equipment was placed in a cramped radio compartment at the after portion of the flying boat's hull, except for the rotatable loop used with the radio compass and the spark transmitter and a wind-driven




Figure 2. Photograph of the radio equipment aboard the NC-4.




Figure 3. Diagram of the individual radio components and their placement in the radio room of the NC-4.




Figure 4. Illustration of the radio compass direction finder loop antenna, which is housed in the rear compartment of the NC-4's hull.

generator used with the spark transmitter. Figures 2 and 3 show the equipment layout in the radio compartment. As Figure 4 shows, the loop antenna was located aft of the radio compartment. The spark transmitter and its generator were installed outside the hull. The strut-mounted generator is shown in Figure 5.

THE SE 1340 TRANSMITTER

There were two configurations of the SE 1340. The first version used three Type CG-1162 tubes, one as the oscillator and two as modulators. The second version, used in the NC-4, had only two tubes, one as the oscillator and the other as a single tube modulator. The second version was smaller in size and added a provision for CW transmission. Thus, the transmitter installed in the NC-4 could be operated in three modes: CW, voice, or buzzer-modulated code. It operated on wavelengths of 600, 850, 952, 1,600 and 2,200 meters with a power output of 5 watts. Using a trailing wire antenna, its normal operating ranges were 100 nautical miles in the CW mode, 75 miles when buzzermodulated and 60 miles in voice mode. Operating power was supplied by storage batteries and a batteryoperated dynamotor. The 12-volt tube filaments drew 3.5 amperes and the dynamotor supplied 350vdc at 55ma. This transmitter was used for short range communications. One source states that this transmitter was removed before the longest leg of the flight in order to reduce weight.

THE SE 1310 TRANSMITTER

The SE 1310 was the primary transmitter used for long range communications. A 500-watt spark

transmitter, it was installed outside the hull. Also mounted outside the hull was the wind-driven generator that supplied power to the spark transmitter. This transmitter maintained reliable communications with land-based stations over distances as great as 650 nautical miles (about 748 statue miles) and with destroyers up to 520 nautical miles.

THE SE 950 RECEIVER

This receiver was a 3-tube regenerative set with two

stages of audio amplification that tuned from 300 to 2,500 meters. It used Type CW-933 tubes and was powered by A and B batteries. The set was modified for use as a radio compass receiver when used in conjunction with the SE 1441-A compass control panel.

THE SE 1441-A COMPASS CONTROL PANEL

This unit contained a reversing switch and two variable capacitors. The capacitors were used to (Continued on following page)

tune the direction-finding loop and an auxiliary coil that was employed when the SE 950 was used in the radio compass system. The reversing switch changed the phasing of the coils in the loop antenna.

THE SE 1605-B AMPLIFIER

Although identified as an amplifier, this set was really a 6-tube radio receiver. It consisted of three RF stages, a detector stage, and two AF stages. It was powered by a set of A and B batteries. The tuning range of the B version was 1,500 to 5,400 meters. This receiver was used for both communications and direction finding.

ANTENNA CHOICES

In addition to the direction-finding loop, a trailing wire antenna was used in flight communications. A wire antenna strung across the top wing's skid fins was used when the aircraft was in the water.

CREW

The captain and navigator chosen for the NC-4 was Lt. Commander Albert C. Read. The radio operator was Herbert Rodd, who was an exceptionally gifted radio technician. Of all the radio operators chosen for the NC boats, Rodd was unique in his passion for radio. This was an important fact that

would play a key role throughout the flight.

FIRST FLIGHT

On May 8, 1919, the NC-1, NC-3 and NC-4 took off for Halifax, Nova Scotia, their first leg of the journey to Europe. (The NC-2 never flew, as it was damaged by fire in the hangar, and became a parts plane instead.) While off Cape Cod, the NC-4 had two engine failures and had to leave the formation. After taxiing to the Chatham Naval Air Station, it had serious engine work done. Later the NC-4 or "Nancy Four" rejoined the other two planes in Newfoundland. From there all three set off for the Azores, 1,200 miles away.

The Azores trip was the longest and most dangerous part of the flight. The Navy had placed destroyers every 50 miles as check-off points and radio contacts. However, the NC-1 became totally lost and off course in the fog. Its radio seemed useless, so, deciding to wait out the fog and reorganize, the crew opted to land in the ocean. Big mistake!

The huge sea swells soon carried off one pontoon and the bottom fabric of the tail assembly. Unable to fly, the NC-1 was out of the race. After many hours adrift, it was found by a destroyer which had to sink it, as it had become a hazard to sea navigation.

Like the NC-1, the NC-3 became way off course in the fog and also chose to land. As with the NC-1, the huge waves damaged the plane so badly it was unable to take off again. Unknown to the crew, vibrations had worked the ground wire connection loose, so they could not send any messages. Without power, they let the winds push them backwards for 60 hours to the Azores. A truly remarkable feat. Two down and one to go.

REASONS FOR SUCCESS

Even the NC-4 drifted off course from time to time, due mostly to an inoperative magnetic compass, and it missed sighting destroyers. But, because of Herbert Rodd's radio compass expertise, it was soon back on course. The NC-4 arrived safely in the Azores, continued on to Portugal and Spain, and then, to the last leg of the trip — Plymouth, England. History had been made on May 31, 1919.

As for the prize money, the U.S. Navy turned it down, since the achievement itself was the goal. The NC-4 was dismantled in England and returned

by steamer to the U.S. with its crew.

Most of the NC-4's success was attributed to Commander Read for his navigational skills. Some say that the "Four" was a faster airplane which contributed greatly to the flight. And there are those who attribute it all to luck. But many think that it was Herbert Rodd's expert use of the radio compass for staying on course that made it all happen. I tend to agree with the latter.

Today the NC-4 can be seen in all its glory displayed at the Pensacola Naval Air Museum in Pensacola, Florida. If you go to see it, make sure you take this issue of A.R.C. with you and ask to see the

antiquated radio equipment on board. Also notice the cramped quarters Herbert Rodd had to deal with for 23 days and over 4,000 miles. Amazing!

Book Review Radiola: The Golden Age of RCA By Eric P. Wenaas

In the August 2007 issue of A.R.C., Alan Douglas wrote an incisive review of Eric Wenaas's new book on the early years of RCA. Even before I read that excellent review I knew something about the research that Eric was doing.

I happened to attend a informal dinner gathering at the Rochester AWA meet a couple of years ago. (In fact it was the editor of this journal who invited me.) I had never met Eric Wenaas, and it was my good fortune to sit next to him at the table. We talked about our various radio collecting interests. When I told him of my fascination with pre-1920 wireless, especially Marconi, he described some of the research he was doing for this book. It was obvious then that this was going to be more than a pretty picture book of RCA radios. He was doing serious, substantive historical study.

A good portion of my career has involved research, and so I can sometimes be hard to please when it comes to research design and methodology. *Radiola: The Golden Age of RCA* did not disappoint. I have always been somewhat mystified by the complex early years of RCA, and especially how Westinghouse, GE, and Wireless Specialty worked together to create RCA products. *Radiola* goes into great detail to shed light on the interworkings of what became — with the U.S. government's backing — almost a monopoly. The book answers many of

the questions we collectors and historians have had about the early years of RCA. It even answered some questions I never thought to ask. The documentation is excellent. The photos and scans of radios, labels, and old documents are of high quality and will be useful for radio collectors for years.

This is an unsolicited response to Radiola. It was the quality of the research that sheds so much light on RCA and the early years of radio that impelled me to write. Eric Wenaas has done a real service for those who value history and especially the impact of radio technology upon it. For future radio historians and collectors, Wenaas's work will serve as a model for how to go about studying and writing about any historical aspect of this earth-shaking invention.

I really cannot take any major issue with the book. (All right, I could wish for fewer than the few typographical errors, but that would be picky.) This is a really good, solid contribution to the field of the history of radio technology, and I am indebted to the author for giving so much time and effort over the last five years to the writing of Radiola: The Golden Age of RCA. As soon as I finished reading it, I ordered a second copy.

Oh, did I mention that I liked the book?

WITH THE COLLECTORS

Emerson Model 847 Transistor Portable

BY ROBERT B. ENEMARK

All "early" radios seem to have a special attraction, be they tube or transistor sets. The Emerson portable described in this article uses plug-in transistors and qualities as "early" in the world of transistor radio collectors. (Editor)

The 1957 Emerson Model 847, shown in Figure 1, really struck me with its smooth, turquoise plastic appearance and very nice condition when I saw it at the Antique Mall in Queechie, Vermont. So, I bought it, of course.

What stood out when I opened the back cover were the two, dead, 9-volt, No. 276, batteries. When I connected up 9 volts to the battery input, very loud motor-boating rattled the speaker. The 80 mF section of the filter capacitor was bad, so I snipped it out and substituted a 200 uF/25-volt unit. Reconnected, the radio worked nicely and was pretty sensitive.




Figure 2. A rear view of the of the Emerson portable with its back cover removed reveals its component layout. The replacement filter capacitor is shown in the upper right corner of the cabinet. The modified battery holder is located at the bottom right.

After that, I installed a Radioshack 8-slot, AA battery holder, jumpering two unused slots to get 9 volts with 6 cells. These modifications are shown in Figure 2. I then easily cleaned and polished the cabinet.

Emerson Radio and Phonograph Corp., located in Jersey City, New Jersey, at that time, took care to use sockets for easy repair in case the transistors went bad. Three RF, NPN transistors for converter and IF stages were used, but strangely, unknown PNP units constituted the driver and push-pull AF amplifiers. All transistors are made by Texas Instruments Corp. and are metal-cased.

The carrying handle on the Model 847 houses Emerson's "Miracle Wand" ferrite loop antenna, which, being fairly large, contributes to the radio's good sensitivity. The schematic is pretty straightforward, and the RF transistors were rated at

about 30db gain with a cutoff frequency of 6 MHz. This is a pretty good performance for junction transistors only nine years after point-contact types were invented.

Sprucing Up the Thompson "Minuet" Neutrodyne

In the February 1997 issue of A.R.C., Roland Jennings wrote a very comprehensive article about restoring his Thompson Minuet. The following article shares his discovery of a source of cone speakers that would make the job of restoration easier for fellow collectors. (Editor)

Since my article ten years ago on the Thompson "Minuet," I've become an octogenarian, and so I'm wondering why I've considered writing another article. I suppose the reason is quite obvious — I believe it becomes a duty of sorts to pass on to succeeding generations knowledge gained through diligence, the school of hard knocks, some "been there, done that" situations, and not ruling out a bit of déjà vu.

MY "MINUET"

As Ted Baxter, the pompous TV anchorman in the 1970s MTM sitcom would say when asked about his career, "It all started in a small 5000-watt radio station in Fresno, California. Well, I too began my budding career as BC station engineer in a 5000-watt AM'er, although in a different locale. In 1953, as described in my 1997 article, I discovered this rare Thompson Neutrodyne radio while browsing through a mishmash of household items at a neighborhood estate sale in my hometown.

The set appeared to be in good condition, even the exposed paper cone. The cabinet's exterior surface had been the target of an errant paintbrush and received a generous spattering of grey Kemtone, a water-based interior paint marketed in the 1940s. I was able to remove all vestiges of the paint by meticulously chipping it off a speck at a time.

The tapered, disc-like object in the center of the cone serves as a connector between the apex and the speaker driver, a Crosley Musicone. I suppose this could be compared to a "spider," a device used in the electromagnetic speaker era, whose purpose was to hold the voice coil in an accurately centered position. Early photographs of the Minuet indicate that several different disc designs were incorporated. The one on my set is rather plain, yet functional.

SPRUCING UP THE "MINUET"

Recently, I was in contact with a radio enthusiast and collector from California who was in the midst of restoring his Thompson R-81. This model is similar to my set which has no model number. To complete the project he needed a replacement cone. In lieu of fabricating a cone, as I had done, he opted to look into the possibility of duplicating the ones used on the earlier Minuets.




Figure 1. Roland Jennings's Thompson "Minuet."

His efforts were successful. He located Buford Chidester who can reproduce this product complete with a Crosley name emblazoned on the surface of the paper cone. Chidester is well known as the author of the handsome book Classic Cones and may be reached at speakerpeople@comcast.net.

This turn of events prompted me to seek a prefabricated cone also, which upon installation will give my Model R-81 prototype a new look. Though I do not yet have a prefab cone in hand, the fact that such an upgrade is possible may serve to bring other collectors up to date in the world of Thompson Minuet.

My initial article in 1997 seems to have generated considerable interest from collectors and owners of the R-8 nationwide and appears to be gaining momentum. In fact, there is a movement afoot to establish an R.E. Thompson Radio Owners Organization (RETRO).

Black Beauty — Sony LCD TV A Retro-Technology Tale

For a dyed-in-the-wool old technology aficionado to face having to invest in HDTV is almost traumatic. Chris Jones tells the tale of how he dealt with the challenge. (Editor)

While the pace of consumer electronics technology is continually accelerating today, this, I must admit, hasn't affected our household. And so it was last winter that we realized that our main TV, nearly 27 years old, was perhaps the last remaining set in the county incapable of remote control.

There seems to be some genetic basis for this resistance to modern technology. My brother, a mechanical engineer and car buff, has, as his policy, never to buy a car manufactured in the decade in which he is living. He thrives then on the effort needed to keep these interesting but high-mileage steeds running.

But in our case, last winter, we caved in. The consumer press was indicating that, if one had been holding off buying an HDTV, now was a good time. We were pushed over the edge by the gift of a DVD player for which our trusty vintage set didn't even have an input!

A HORSE OF A DIFFERENT COLOR

We chose an LCD set that was reviewed well for picture quality and ease of use — a 32-inch Sony Bravia KDL-32S2010 digital, color TV. It was also among the better rated for audio quality, although we couldn't evaluate the latter in the shop. Once set up at home, our new, sleek "Black Beauty," shown in Figure 1, did, indeed, display a spectacular picture, and once configured (there are 80+ parameters to fuss with, if you desire, but, sadly, no horizontal and vertical hold), it was easy to use.

But, the audio quality from the set's speakers (1.7" x 6") was lacking, in spite of 10 watts/channel, independent bass and treble control, and a built-in digital signal processing feature to

accentuate the sound. There just wasn't much bass content. A quick test with an audio generator—the TVs 30+ inputs and outputs are, I must admit, handy—revealed that below 200-300 Hz things really dropped off, as judged both by ear and by a microphone and cassette-deck VU meter.

IMPROVING THE AUDIO

What to do? There would certainly be none of them newfangled, surround-sound Dolby whatever home theatre systems in this household, and just using a standard external stereo amp and speakers wasn't very interesting. However, it occurred to me that perhaps a common external bass channel was the answer. This isn't a new technique, as a 1960 vintage RCA stereo console we have uses that exact thing. It has tweet-

ers and mid-ranges for each channel and a big honker (15inch) common woofer in the middle with its own bass-only (below approximately 70 Hz) amp.

Aha — a sub-woofer you say! Well, yes, but given that most of the energy below 300 Hz seemed to be missing. I'm not sure the term "sub" applies. Instead, I lashed together an experiment using a home-brew, solid-state amp I had built in the 1970s, one of two Radioshack speakers I had lying around, and a simple parts-hung-in-the-air. left-plus-right combiner/filter passing below only 300 Hz. Varying this filter ±100 Hz didn't seem to have noticeable effect. All of this kluge was fed from Black Beauty's line outputs.

The speaker was ultimately placed in the corner behind the TV per one of audio legend Paul Klipsch's "Klipschorn Principles" for hopefully additional bass effect. The only subtle part was getting the phasing of the external audio channel matched to the TV's internal audio for maximum low-end reinforcement.

A few tracks from a Salsa music CD and the music from *Dream Girls* played on the DVD player helped determine the correct speaker lead polarity and validated the overall phasing concept — a big difference in sound quality! Now one might say that, given the nature of our hobby, I should have used recordings of "In the Mood" or "Sing, Sing, Sing," but I didn't have those on CD, and so had to go with what was on hand with a strong bass line.

With my wife now remarking that on some programs the TV sounded as if you were in a movie theatre, the system was obviously working, but what should the final setup be? My homebrew amp didn't have much appeal. Since it was built into an old tube-type Knight Kit amp's wooden case, it would have trouble fitting into the new equipment stack under the TV stand where the DVD player, a VCR, and a cable converter resided so far. And the Radioshack speaker, while serviceable, didn't have much classic or nostalgic appeal either.

THE AMPLIFIER




Figure 2. The Heathkit AA-14 provided only source, volume, bass, and treble controls. Speaker and power on-off are push-pull activated by bass/treble controls. The panel is side-lit when on.

I thought I remembered that in the 1960s Heathkit made a small, basic, solid-state stereo amp which might be perfect. A little Googling and eBaying revealed that the Model AA-14 was what I had been thinking about. Shown in Figure 2, this 10 watt/channel unit has only the most basic functions and is only three inches high. Just what I needed!

When it was introduced in 1966, along with the related AJ-14 tuner and AR-14 receiver, the AA-14 had a product review rating it highly for low distortion and wide power bandwidth (extending from 10 Hz to over 100 kHz), albeit at its relatively low maximum power output. It sold for \$59.95

less case.

The eBay gods must have been smiling on me because very soon an AA-14 came up for bids, followed a few days later by a manual. When the amplifier, reportedly a refugee from a TV repair shop that had closed in the 1980s, arrived with its homemade wooden case, it was in reasonable shape. When powered up, it seemed to work, although it had a relatively high level of hiss on both channels regardless of volume setting. Testing revealed the amp met its hum and noise spec though, so I figured that's the way they were.

Someone had added preamp outputs, perhaps for recording, and I removed these, plugging the rear panel holes. Further work revealed that the headphone output behaved strangely — no output with both channels operating, but output on both sides with any one channel active. It turned out that there was a missing ground wire on the jack.

The most interesting quirk, however, was that the right channel exhibited a parasitic/RF oscillation when approaching full power, and also had considerably higher intermodulation distortion than the left channel. Adding a small bypass capacitor, base to ground, on one of the output transistors eliminated both effects. I then saw that the manual schematic showed a cap there which my circa-1968 unit didn't have. No doubt this was a problem that appeared/worsened in production and was corrected in later units.

Even more interesting, when I located the previously referenced product review in *High Fidelity Magazine*, I found that it mentioned this oscillation also! With the amp now apparently meeting specs, I just listened to it on the bench a little, finally deciding that the hiss just can't be right!

Troubleshooting revealed the culprit was the transistor following each channel's volume control, and replacement with a similar part eliminated the hiss entirely. My assumption is that humidity penetrated the plastic transistors over the years and degraded the parts. With the technical issues (Continued on Iollowing page)

(Black Beauty LCD TV, continued) resolved, a little cosmetic work followed on the chassis and case, plus some structural improvements on the case, and she was ready to go.

THE SPEAKER

My thought was to keep using the Radioshack speaker and just watch for a more interesting target of opportunity at a yard sale or flea market. This happened sooner than expected when at the Antique Wireless Association's Conference in May 2007, I spotted two bookshelf speakers below one seller's table. These turned out to be KLH Model Thirty-Twos that he was selling for the original owner, a lady friend who had used them in her living room.

The KLH Model Thirty-Two, shown in Figure 3, was introduced in 1971 with full-page adsemphasizing its good sound for low cost — \$95 per pair, and

they were sold only in pairs. Made until 1975, this acoustic suspension type (air-tight cabinets) measures only about 19" x 7" x 11". It contains an 8" woofer and a 2" tweeter.

The woofer uses a cloth surround and thus avoids the problem with old speakers with woofers using foam surrounds. These can be found with the foam completely disintegrated and useless. On the other hand, I've seen some published indications that foam-surround woofers may have been used in some KLH models (mine are date-coded 1971).

I haven't seen a contemporary product review on the Model Thirty-Two, but a 1964 review of Acoustic Research's similar-appearing AR-4 noted that, while it certainly wasn't a great speaker, it was definitely a very listenable speaker. A 1996 article on classic speakers also recommended the Model Thirty-Two as providing nice sound for the size.

These two speakers were in tolerable cosmetic shape, and removing the front grilles showed that the woofers, indeed, looked fine. An audio generator bench test proved that the woofers and tweeters were all working, so all the speakers needed was cosmetic touch-up, and they were all set. I briefly tried one on my tube-type Sherwood receiver in place of one of the larger 3-way bassreflex units I use. I found it had less low end and was significantly less efficient, as expected, but it did seem similar in sound quality to my KLH Model Eight FM receiving system's speaker.

OFF TO THE RACES

With the final amplifier and speakers connected, all that remained was to once again make sure the phasing matched the TV's audio system, since both amp and speakers were now different. So, with my wife donning a slightly skimpy dress

and the largest, most dangly earrings in her collection to set the mood, we again tried the Motown-like movie and Salsa CD tracks. We found that the speaker leads had flipped from their prior connections.




Figure 4. The new system with the Heathkit and the cable box. The converter generates the most heat, so it's on top. The KLH speakers, partially obscured, are behind the TV stand.

The final system, shown in Figure 4, uses both Model Thirty-Twos, one driven from each channel of the Heathkit, with the amp set for mono-operation. The combiner/filter, made of just resistors and a capacitor, is packaged in a small Bud/Hammond box. Fed from Black Beauty's stereo line outputs, the single output from the combiner then drives the amplifier. The AA-14 is powered from the switched AC outlet on the cable converter, and the amp fits perfectly in the equipment stack.

The only quirk in the system, which somehow I didn't realize until late in the game, is that the TV line outputs are varied. They don't vary with the volume control when the TV speakers are active. If you turn the speakers off, however, you then have a choice of whether the outputs are fixed or vary with the volume control. Wouldn't you know it, with over 80 parameters/features to play with, the one I need isn't provided!

This isn't a significant issue it turns out, as the Heathkit's volume is set for the right bass content with a fixed setting of Black Beauty's volume. Then the loudness is usually controlled by the cable converter, which essentially uses the TV as a monitor, so that the balance stays constant. Changing the TV's volume for antenna reception does cause the balance to change, but the improvement is still marked.

Certainly other solutions to our new TV's limited bass output — at least two off-the-shelf and involving less work — were possible, but none as interesting, I think. With the project reaching the finish line, the combination of Black Beauty, the Pacific Rim thoroughbred HDTV, and two solid retro-tech

products from Benton Harbor and Cambridge now provides us with a blue-ribbon entertainment system.

This is a Viscount Model 1660 multiband portable transistor radio. I found this set at a local flea market for \$10. The antennas were broken off, so I replaced them with a pair of old rabbit ears. Also, the plastic tube that holds four "D" cell batteries was missing. I replaced it with some 4 oz. plastic hair spray bottles end-to-end. I just cut the ends off, rinsed them out, and taped them together.

The radio works pretty well. But for this class and era of radio, my favorite is still the Zenith Royal 3000-1. In fact, the Viscount Model 1660 was probably sold to compete with the transistorized Zenith Trans-Oceanic models in the early 1960s.
