WITH THE COLLECTORS

The Kennedy Model VI

BY DAVE CROCKER

Longtime collector Dave Crocker knows excellent craftsmanship when he sees it. Here he tells us about the two versions of the Kennedy Model VI, which he considers eminently collectible. (Editor)

If you've ever owned an early Kennedy battery receiver, or even opened the top lid of one and peeked inside, you'll understand why they were known as "The Royalty of Radio." The chassis of these sets were built of the highest quality components with superb craftsmanship.

Just lift the cover of a Kennedy Model 110 or 220 and you will see what I'm talking about. You won't believe the work that went into those fantastic bank-wound coils. These two sets, along with the Model 281, were manufactured by the Colin B. Kennedy Company, in either San Francisco, Califomia, or in St. Louis, Missouri. Later, the company moved all radio production to the St. Louis plant.

THE MODEL VI EARLIER VERSION

So much for company history: let's get down to radio details. At one time or another, I've owned, almost all of the early Kennedy receivers, but I just recently learned that there were two versions of the 1924 Model VI. This model, which the company referred to as the Type 420, is a 4tube radio with all four tubes exposed on the front, slanted panel. It uses three stages of audio amplification and one stage of regenerative detection. Nothing new here. But how it is built and how it looks is its strong point.




Figure 1. The earlier version of the Kennedy Model VI with Bakelite panel.

However, two distinct versions using similar cabinets were produced. The earlier version, Seri-

al # 38539, has a slant panel of thick Bakelite, highly polished and fastened to the cabinet by four metal corner brackets. See Figure 1. The two




Figure 2. A rear view of the earlier Kennedy VI chassis showing the battery cables.

main dials, one for tuning and the other for volume control, have a black Bakelite knob and a nickel-plated, sometimes frosted, dial skirt. Both are scribed 100-0.

A smaller, fluted, Bakelite knob on the right side of the panel is labeled "Tube Control," (a rheostat). A similar knob on the left side is labeled "Fine Tuning." Both are scribed with arrows.

On the left side of the first tube are two jacks. These are labeled "Stage 1" and "Detector." Just to the right of tube #4 are two more jacks; one is labeled "Stage 3" and below that is "Stage 2." So much for the controls.




Figure 3. A rear view of the cabinet for the earlier Kennedy VI. Note that the four binding posts are external

The chassis of this earlier Model VI, shown in Figure 2, has a plethora of metal-tagged battery wires coming out the rear. Some are attached to the four outside rear binding posts, as shown in Figure 3, and some to the internal Fahnestock clips inside the cabinet. There was also a 3-tube version, known as the Model V, with a similar

Bakelite panel used in the Model III portable and the Model X large cabinet-style radio.

It is my understanding that this same chassis and panel were used in the 4-tube Kennedy Model XV "Sheraton" cabinet model. This larger set had doors for batteries and a bi-fold closing cover for the panel.

THE MODEL VI LATER VERSION




Figure 4. The later version of the Kennedy Model VI with the brass metal panel.

Now for the later Model VI set, which is shown in Figure 4. This version, Serial #58576, sports a unique brass, metal panel with a painted wood-grain finish. The controls are located similar to the earlier type, except that the two main tuning dials are entirely fabricated of molded red-rubber, or "mud." The left dial is scribed 100-0 and 100-200. The right dial is scribed 100-0 only. There is a large, Kennedy crest etched between the two. The same molded material is used on the two outer control knobs with arrows. The cabinets used are identical to the 1923 Model V and 1925 Model 20. All four have lift-top lids.

This later VI was the first Kennedy set to feature the metal panel. This metal panel style was also used on the later 5-tube, single vernier dial Model 20 and the 5-tube, 2-dial Model XXX window set.




Figure 5. A rear view of the chassis of the later version of the Kennedy Model VI. Note that the seven binding posts are mounted atop the chassis.




Figure 6. A rear view of the later Model VI cabinet. Note there are no external binding posts, but the cabinet is similar to the earlier version.

There are slight chassis design differences with the earlier and later Model VIs. The later version, shown in Figure 5, has larger internal binding posts attached to the chassis top. There are no outside binding posts, as shown in Figure 6. The tube sockets are of a different style, with fluted sides.

Could it have been that Kennedy planned this "new style" brass panel for its 1924 radios, but first used up surplus, old-style Bakelite panels like those on the earlier VI? Radio manufacturers were just beginning to shy away from "lab equipment-looking" apparatus and move to the more pleasing style having a "furniture" appearance? The lady of the house would agree.

MORE KENNEDY HISTORY

In my opinion, the Kennedy Vs and VIs were beautiful sets of pleasing design and size. The two Models X and XI are nice, too, but rather cumbersome in size. The 5-tube Model XV is just too dark and massive — the perfect size and design is not there. With the coming of the 1-dial Model 20, the Kennedy look turned drab, and its diminished desirability as a collector item reflects that.

Colin B. Kennedy continued manufacturing radios up until 1932. There were a few plain-looking table models — a "Coronet" tombstone, a cathedral, and some floor models, but the quality appeal and craftsmanship that set Kennedy apart from most other sets was no more. The classic

Kennedy design era was over.

Do yourself a favor. Lift the lid and feast your eyes on the workmanship on any of the Kennedys of pre-1925 vintage. You'll see why these sets are so desirable to collect.

RESTORATION TOPICS

Paper Capacitor Rebuilding

In this article. Daniel Schoo not only makes the case for a functional restoration by recapping a radio, but also for a cosmetic restoration. The cosmetic restoration calls for the rebuilding of all paper capacitors in a radio. (Editor)

Capacitors are one of the mainstays of electronics. Electronics manufacturers used them by the hundreds of millions over the years. Capacitor technology has improved greatly in modern times with new plastic dielec-

tric materials and construction methods. In the days of tube radios the prominent type was the paper capacitor so-called because the insulating dielectric was a special paper

called "capacitor kraft."

Capacitor kraft paper is a very thin brown paper that has been "calendered." Calendering is a process where the paper is squeezed between two very smooth rollers under pressure to make it denser and give it a smooth surface finish. After calendering, the paper is impregnated with wax to give it a high insulation resistance and protection from moisture. Capacitor kraft paper was not only used in making capacitors but also as insulation in transformers, small clock motors, and other electrical components.

To make a capacitor, the kraft paper was either coated with a metal film or rolled up between two thin sheets of metal foil. The entire assembly was slid into a cardboard sleeve and then potted in wax. In the 1950s capacitor manufacturers began to coat the capacitors with hard Bakelite or other type of plastic shell. You would think that something like that would be pretty durable but many of

them failed with age.

After decades of soaking in humidity and roasting in summer heat many of these capacitors have developed a significant amount of electrical leakage. Even if a capacitor hasn't failed profoundly the increase in leakage can cause the radio to perform poorly. Excessive leakage current will cause bias shifts in grid coupled circuits and lowered supply voltages in DC bypass and filtering circuits. When they are used in AC line bypass service, a failure can result in a loud report spewing

paper and foil bits all over the underside of the chassis.

Some collector/restorers put every radio through a process called recapping which simply means that every paper capacitor and electrolytic capacitor in the radio is replaced on sight. If it isn't bad, it will be, and may cause some serious damage when it fails.

There are two schools of thought on functional restoration (as opposed to cosmetic restoration) with regard to capacitor replacement. The first school reasons that anything under the chassis is not ordinarily visible so it is perfectly acceptable to replace the original paper capacitors with modern Mylar capacitors and be done with it. Anyone who has looked under the chassis of an old classic 1930s Zenith and beheld a handful of brightly colored Sprague "Orange Drop" capacitors might disagree.

The second school argues that the look of new capacitors destroys the originality of appearance of the radio under the chassis, even though it is hidden from view. This represents the custodial attitude that collectors are only a sort of custodian of the radio for future generations and should not tamper

with the historical accuracy.

I can understand both points of view, but my belief is that if you can do both, why not spend the little extra time and trouble to replace the capacitors and still have them look original? I take the under-chassis argument a little further and hold that if the capacitor looks original on the outside, whatever is inside makes no difference if you never see it.

This is how I got started rebuilding paper (Continued on following page) (Capacitor Rebuilding, continued) capacitors. Briefly, rebuilding a paper capacitor means removing the old capacitor from its cardboard shell and replacing it with a modern capacitor. The result is virtually indistinguishable from the original and it will probably take a very long time to fail, if ever A typical candidate for rebuilding is shown in Figure 1.

THE REBUILDING PROCESS

While the hard plastic molded capacitors of the 1950s can't be easily rebuilt the common wax filled cardboard sleeve types are almost too easy. You begin by removing the capacitor from the radio. To remove the sleeve, sup-




Figure 2. The capacitor can be heated with a heat gun or hair dryer.




Figure 4. The sleeve will be hot, so use a pair of long nose pliers to remove the sleeve.

port the capacitor vertically by one lead and gently heat it with a hot air gun to sweat the wax out, as shown in Figure 2. A household blow dryer for hair works as well but they tend to blow air at a higher rate and splatter the wax around.

Suspend the capacitor in a trash can or other receptacle to catch the dripping wax. The wax tends to blow off the capacitor and splatter in the direction of the airflow, so direct the airflow generally downward to direct the splatter into the receptacle.




Figure 5. The removed sleeve can now be restuffed with a new composition.

Not much heat is needed to melt the wax and soon it will become soft and drip out of the cardboard. After a short time, the cardboard sleeve will begin to slide off. See Fig-

ure 3. Grab it with long nose pliers and slide it down off the capacitor, as shown in Figures 4 and 5. Once the sleeve is removed discard the capacitor. You can try and catch the original capacitor wax in a small metal can for reuse, but there isn't much of it to work with. I don't bother to recycle the wax. I make up my own formula for rebuilding.

Now that you have an empty sleeve you need to put a new capacitor in it. Figure 6 shows the relative sizes of the old sleeve and the new capacitor. I use Mylar capacitors that I get from Bob's Antique Radios or from Antique Electronic Supply. They are almost always small enough to fit inside the old sleeve with plenty of room to spare.

There are a few exceptions. Midget battery-only tube radios used some pretty small low voltage paper capacitors. To save space some didn't even have cardboard sleeves. They were wrapped in a few turns of kraft paper and then dipped in wax. Those are too small to rebuild in the usual manner, but I'll discuss this issue further later on.

Choosing the replacement capacitor is fairly easy. No matter what the original voltage rating was, I almost always use a replacement capacitor rated at 630 volts. Unlike for electrolytic capacitors, a much higher voltage rating is never a problem for paper capacitors. The capacitance should be fairly close, but since most common capacitors are rated with fairly sloppy tolerances, the replacement value can be close but not exact. Old standards for capacitor values ran differently from modern ones. It would not be uncommon to find values such as 0.003, 0.02 or 0.05 microfarad. These values are no longer standard, but you can substitute the modern equivalent of 0.0033, 0.022 and 0.047 for these values, and they will work perfectly well.





Figure 8. Use a glue gun to apply a small amount of glue to hold the capacitor in place.






Figure 9. One end of the capacitor filled with hot-melt glue.

(Capacitor Rebuilding, continued)

You have your empty sleeve and your replacement capacitor ready and now you need to assemble them. I clamp the new capacitor vertically in a vise holding it by one of the lead wires. Slide the sleeve over the capacitor and adjust the height of the capacitor so that the sleeve is centered over it, as shown in Figure 7. Fill the top end of the sleeve with hot-melt glue to a point about a sixteenth of an inch below the rim, as shown in Figures 8 and 9. Allow the glue to cool and harden and then flip the capacitor over and do the other end. Some people don't like the bother of working with hot wax, and they stop at this point. It looks somewhat close to the original but not exactly.

FINAL STEPS

For the final steps, repeat the end fill procedure, but this time using wax. Figure 10 shows the wax being applied. Beeswax is way too soft and has a low melting point. Plain candle wax is the wrong color and it is also not the right consistency.

I use my own formula for capacitor wax. I harvest the wax from the ends of old electrolytic capacitors — the cardboard tubulars with wire leads that were popular in the 1950s. This wax is the kind that is dark brown and hard as a rock. I smash it up into a coarse powder and heat it in an old soup can using a

hot air gun. It takes quite a bit of heat to melt, and it flows slowly.

After it is melted, I start adding candle wax slowly and melt that into it stirring slowly. l also add some beeswax. never measured the amounts. The exact amounts of the different wax compositions are fairly arbitrary, and I just quess at when it seems right by pouring out a sample and allowing it to cool for testing. The hard brown wax mixes with the soft white candle wax and beeswax forming a fairly close match for capacitor wax. This is one of those things that you have to get by trial and error.

Never heat a container of wax from the bottom. Always heat just the surface from the top using hot air. Wax expands in size quite a bit when it heats, and molten wax under a hard shell can create quite a bit of force, causing the upper shell to pop releasing hot wax from below. Always wear appropriate hand and face/eye protection when you heat wax.

Set up the capacitor in the vise as before and pour the

wax into each end until it forms a dome. If it happens to run down the side don't be concerned — that's a good thing. Allow it to cool and harden. After both ends have been filled, hold the capacitor horizontally and drip a little wax onto the outside of the shell. Play the hot air across it while rotating it to melt and spread the wax evenly over the outside.

Watch that you don't get it too hot and melt the wax out of the ends. Allow it to cool and reinstall it in the radio. As you can see from Figures 11 and 12, it looks nearly identical to the original with the minor exception that the lead wires are a bit thinner. This rebuilt capacitor can easily pass as the real thing — only better. Figure 13 shows a rebuilt capacitor installed in a radio.

itor installed in a radio.

As I replace each capacitor I mark it off on a copy of the schematic diagram and make note on the diagram what capacitors have been replaced with Mylar types. When I'm finished I tuck the diagram safely inside the cabinet where it can be found later. Some future owner will be happy to find that diagram and know that the radio has been upgraded and will not need to have any of the paper capacitors replaced.

MINIATURE CAPACITORS

Now for the miniature capacitors I talked

about earlier. You can't actually rebuild these, but you can make an original looking copy. What I do in that situation is make my own paper sleeves. I use Adobe Photoshop™ on the computer to reproduce artwork from the scanned image of an actual old capacitor. I print the image on 30-pound kraft paper, cut it to size and wrap it directly around a Mylar capacitor. Then I fill the ends and coat it with wax. The details of this would take up an article in itself and are beyond the scope of this article.

The Silvertone Saga Who Wants an Old Tube Radio Anyway?

Leaming how a radio collector first became attracted to old radios is always an interesting part of the hobby. Paul Buresh tells us how he got hooked. (Editor)

A long time ago I resolved that I would write the story about how I got involved in collecting radios. Radio has always been in the background of my life. When I was a child growing up during the 1960s and 1970s, the kitchen radio was always on. Before everyone had a TV in every room and before the advent of cable, radio was a primary source of entertainment and news. My parents had a very nice "Realistic" radio in the kitchen, and it was something I always remember when I think of

the house where I grew up. But, a Silvertone figures even more prominently in my story.

EARLY LIFE OF THE SILVERTONE

I had a great uncle who passed away when I

was about 14 years old, and in the process of cleaning out his home, I came upon the old Sears Silvertone Model 7134 wooden table radio, shown in its restored state in Figures 1 and 2. I thought it was too good-looking to simply throw away, even though I had some doubts as to whether it would work.

I plugged it in at home and heard hiss and static. What a bummer! My father, who was truly from the radio generation, had obviously seen this type of thing happen before and told me he thought it could be repaired.

My father took me to see a friend of his who was not only a mechanic but also a TV and radio repairman. Apparently "Johnny" had been a radio operator in World War II and had become adept at repairs as well. He took me down to his shop and performed a little magic, tested the tubes, replaced a couple of them, and charged me two dollars.

I was back in business. After a brief warm-up the Silvertone came to life. It did not sound like the other radios I had heard. It had a softer, warmer sound than I had been used to. Sometimes it squealed a little when tuning and picking up a

signal it could not quite decipher.

To my delight it picked up more stations than I was aware existed. From Dedham, Massachusetts, I was able to receive New York City stations almost every night. Jean Shepard became a regular show for me. I could listen to Ernie Harwell on WJR in Detroit broadcast the Tigers games. I pulled in Cleveland, Philadelphia, Baltimore, all with pretty good regularity.

Some nights the reception was better than others, but there was always Larry Glick on WBZ in Boston on nights when the other cities did not come in. CBS Mystery Theater with E.G. Marshall was another great show to listen to on the Silvertone. Little did I know that Himan Brown who produced the Mystery Theater was the same person who produced Inner Sanctum. All I knew was that I liked to listen. Even the Red Sox seemed to play a little better when I listened to the game on my Silvertone.

I became interested in DX and shortwave and picked up a solid-state Grundig and Sony and began not to listen so much to the Silvertone. The Silvertone was furniture again, as other diversions took its place. I took it with me when I moved because it was too good-looking to simply throw it out. I plugged it in one night and got static and hiss, I picked up WBZ and then it faded to hiss. The Silvertone went down to the basement.

LATER LIFE OF THE SILVERTONE

I got married, we adopted a son, many years passed, and the Silvertone was still in the basement. When I had a little time one day, I cleaned it up, but I didn't like the scratches on the top, the thing did not work — why should I even keep it?

I had seen an article about a guy in Connecticut who fixed up old radios. In the article he said, "They're beautiful things; don't underestimate the strength of the straightforward electronics of that era." I decided he was right; someday I would pay him a visit.

On a brisk March day, I took a friend with me, and we took a drive to see Bob Eslinger at Antique Radio Restoration and Repair, http://oldradiodoc.com. My friend Jerry had a father who was an active Ham, an all-around extreme radio enthusiast. I thought Jerry would understand why someone would fix an old wood radio and probably get a kick out of seeing a guy who did that for a living.

We showed up in "radio heaven," or maybe it would be better put to say, "the land of radio resurrection" — maybe it is both. Bob looked over the Silvertone, and I heard, "uuuhhh and mmmm," just like what you might hear from a doctor. He said it was from the late 1940s, a 6-tube set, with an

antenna inside. A glimpse of the loop antenna and its label is shown in Figure 3. He said it should sound great with an overhaul; it was not too far gone. The cabinet could be redone as well. I left the Silvertone with Bob.

With a little research, I figured out it is more than a Sears Silvertone. It is a Sears Silvertone Model 7134, Chassis #110.448, shown in Figure 4. The tube complement is 12SQ7, 35L6GT, 12SK7, 12SK7, 12SK7, 12SK7, It was produced in Brooklyn, New York, by the Air King Radio Corporation, probably in 1946. Who even knew they made radios in New York? It was the best thing out of Brooklyn since the Dodgers.

A while later, the job was done, and the cabinet looks better than it probably did brand new. It sounded great. It was safe to play again, and I was back in business. Old radios were really interesting again. Who knew that these old things could sound so good and last so long? Who knew they could pick up all these long distance signals, and who knew that an old wood radio was still worth listening to? I did — I had just forgotten.

Say do you know where I can get an old Zenith AM/FM set?

HORN SPEAKER REVIEW

More on the Town Crier Horn Speaker

Responding to Dave Crocker's article on Town Crier speakers in our web edition of January 2009, Greg Farmer provides comments and additional information regarding these speakers. (Editor)

I just read with great interest the web edition of your article by Dave Crocker about the Town Crier horn speaker. I've had a few of these speakers over the years and like them because of their unusual appearance. Different varieties that I've owned are the goldish color with dark purplish trim, the greenish-gold color with green trim, and a black "Echo."

Figures 1 and 2 show the speaker I still own, which is a goldish color with purplish trim just like the one in Dave's article.

This is the only example I've owned with the Town Crier driver — others had a Utah driver or a no-name driver with no cover. I suspect Gale Radio Laboratories may have originally installed different drivers over the span of years that it manufactured this speaker, or maybe different drivers were supplied to different distributors or customers. The Town Crier in the article is the first I've seen with a Saal driver, so I hope readers don't conclude that the driver in their Town Crier speaker is wrong if it isn't a Saal.

Dave Crocker mentions that the speaker is made of heavy plaster. Unfortunate-

ly, I had someone ship one to me, and he didn't put any packing around it, so it broke into about eight chunks in the mail. It definitely isn't plaster, or cement either. The material appeared to be reddish-brown pottery and was fairly porous. The broken edges looked exactly like a thick broken pottery flower pot might look.

One other comment is that the Echo speaker I had looked exactly like the drawing in the article, with "Echo" molded right into the pottery. It was not the "same identical speaker" as the Town Crier being wholesaled with a new name, as the article says — it was a slightly different speaker being sold at a lower price. It had a cheaper black paint job, and although I don't remember what type of driver was on mine, it may have had a less expensive driver to keep the cost down.

AUCTION REPORT

Estes Auctions Burbank, Ohio — July 19, 2008

The July 19, 2008, Estes auction at Burbank, Ohio, contained radios from the Herndon radio collection of Lexington, Kentucky, as well as other consignments. This was a hot weekend. The temperature on Friday was 90 degrees, and although Saturday was a little better, the conditions in the nonair conditioned Expo Auction Center were somewhat uncomfortable. Several large fans were employed to keep the air moving, but they added to the noise level sometimes making hearing a bit difficult.

This was a pretty normal auction with something for everybody—the usual mix of battery sets, 1930s wood AC radios, consoles, Ham gear, plastic table radios, and tubes. The presale area of "fixer-uppers" and other low value goods was jammed full with the usual parts, box lots, and test equipment, but also with some pretty nice plastic radios. This pre-sale auction started at 8:45 A.M. and did not end until 10:10 A.M. I did not record any of these results.

The main auction included two rows of console radios, over 20 in all, as well as several console Victrolas and 12 plus lots of cylinder records. One outstanding item was the large Fada 212T tombstone, a seldom seen radio that sold for \$3,100. This sale also featured a nice selection of cone speakers.

During the main sale, there was a side auction to dispose of four tables of novelty and transistor radios. Other side auctions were also held to clear out batches of paper and books, 45-rpm records, test equipment, and bulk tube lots. I was not able to record any of these and missed recording some of the main auction items while I tried to run back and forth to bid on a few of these side items for myself. 
