A happy new year to all! And, many thanks to all who have responded to our holiday subscription specials. By offering each of you a saving, our monthly revenue has actually risen because more of you resoonded to this opportunity.

So, in the spirit of the new year, we are continuing to offer discounted subscription rates: 1-year subscriptions by Periodicals Mail will be \$36; by First Class Mall, \$48. These 20 percent lower rates are part of an experiment to restructure our revenue, but, of course, they could be discontinued at any time. Foreign rates have been discounted, also.

We also will be offering a \$30 per year, web-only subscription. The web-only subscriber can read the magazine PDF on the web and will receive all subscriber benefits, such as book discounts, free ads, etc.; however, no copy is mailed. Of course, the full issue PDF is available on the web for all subscribers as well. For web-only subscribers, as with all print subscribers, a real U.S. postal address will be verified since permanent passwords will be mailed. Web-only rates will be most beneficial to our foreign subscribers where postage drives the price up considerably. Also, the \$9.95, 2-month, web-only subscription will be discontinued.

With these practical matters covered, on with what's in A.R.C. this month! Though it may be a new year, all of our January articles reflect the same collector spirit in the perennial hunt for an old radio or knowledge about radio in general.

In our lead article on the Cockaday LC27, Art Redman proves not only that he's an inveterate hunter of radios made by Northwest manufacturers, but also that he's a perfectionist. In this case, the radio he had found did not have a Cockaday circuit. And so, his hunt goes on for the perfect Cockaday.

But, Art also reports on a happy ending to a threeyear hunt for an Allwave 5 in his follow-up to his Hallock and Watson article in the June 2006 A.R.C. For that article, he had only ads for the set, but in this issue, he shows photos of the real thing, an Allwave 5 acquired at last from a fellow collector.

Help from fellow collectors is a sure way of enhancing our collections, but there are many other ways. John Miller lays them all out for us with eight tips for hunting down old radios that have led to his personal growth as a collector. John urges us to leave no stone unturned — or yard sale or curbside trash unexplored

We continue to receive reports from advertisers of e-mail responses to their classified ads proposing to pay them with a check, sometimes via a third party, in excess of the purchase price. To minimize problems, we suggest that you always know whom you are dealing with or ask for references. - in pursuit of a great collection.

In that same spirit, Paul Moens describes his penchant for adopting old radios in the same way some people adopt stray dogs. His GE H-87 console arrived at his door in a snowstorm. Already a basketcase, its future was even less promising when the chassis and various parts fell out in the snow on the way to his front door. However, even though it took five years, Paul has restored the GE H-87, a set that he hopes his grandchildren will treasure.

Something to treasure is perhaps the driving force behind every radio collector's hunt. Mark Fitzgerald describes how he rediscovered his early interest in old radio by a chance encounter with a Philco 41-296 on its way to the dump. Restoring the Philco to working order awakened all kinds of past memories of radio programming and performers of the past. And so a new and true collector was born.

Maybe Bob Murray's unusual GE Model GRC2, made in England, will fire up a reader of these pages and give birth to a new interest in foreign sets.

Needless to say, firing up interest is not an issue at radio shows like the highly successful Kutztown show run by the Delaware Valley Historic Radio Club (DVHRC). In location, size, and amenities, this show draws people of wide interests who might also be captivated by the radio technology on display. We're always grateful for Kutztown reports from both Stan Saeger and John Hagman.

On the other hand, Dave Crocker reminds that an event need not be large to be interesting. Dave introduces us to a new-to-radio auction house, Nest Egg Auctions of Connecticut. The Herbert C. Morgan collection offered many bargains and is an example of how checking out local auctions can be another way to enhance your collection.



ON THE COVER

One way to start your hunt for old radios in 2010 is at a radio meet auction or a private auction house. An example of a \$525 find is the Atwater Kent 82 on our cover. The photo is by Dave Crocker.

Laurence M. Cockaday designed several battery radio receivers along with shortwave sets bearing his name. Among them are the Cockaday Models LC-26 and LC-27, as well as the SC11, 620, and 630 marketed by Silver-Marshall. The Cockaday Model LC-27 sold in 1927 as a kit with four 01-A tubes and an 112A or 71A as an output tube.




Figure 2. Another view of the Cockaday LC-27 in a Corbett cabinet.

The Model LC-27, as shown in Figures 1 and 2, fits in a 12" x 10¼" x 27½" long cabinet made by the Corbett Cabinet Manufacturing Company of St. Mary, Pa. Figure 3 shows the company's logo.

The four controls on the panel are an on/off switch, resonance variable capacitor, volume rheostat, and a 2-gang capacitor serving as a station selector. Figure 4 shows a close-up of the station selector. There is also a speaker jack on the front panel.

There are three B battery terminals: +135v, +90v, and +22.5v; and three C battery terminals: -4.5v, -9v and -22.5v. The -22.5v terminal is used when a 71A tube is in the output stage.




Figure 5. A view inside the cabinet of the Cockaday LC-27 components.

The other major parts of the Model LC-27 kits, many of which can be seen in Figure 5, are four Alco-shielding plates to separate each RF stage and detector stage, a Thordarson R-300 audio transformer, two Jefferson interstage transformers, three binocular RF coils, a Glaston 2-megohm grid-leak resistor, and a Sam's No. 85 Helical Wound RF choke. The set also has two antenna posts, one for a short antenna and another for the long antenna.

The length of the antenna has little effect on tuning in the Cockaday circuit also known as the "four circuit" receiver. The semi-periodic primary of the antenna with the construction of a single-tum feedback coil makes this inductance tiny compared to the total inductance of the antenna circuit. The one-tum primary is wound around the secondary winding, which is shunted by a variable capacitor forming a separate closed tuning circuit coupled to

the rest of the antenna circuit.

Aerials of different lengths changed the tuning of the antenna circuit, which is the one thing manufacturers could not control or design unless the set included an enclosed loop antenna.

Many of the 1-dial sets still need an antenna trimmer control. In a TRF receiver designed to be a

1-dial tuner, instead of the common 2 and 3-dial sets, the largest tracking error from the antenna to the first RF transformer had to reduced.

Cockaday minimized this tracking error by loosely coupling the antenna to the secondary winding of the first RF transformer. That antenna length has minimum effect on tuning, makes the receiver more selective, and is the one advantage of the Cockaday circuit.

However, the Model LC-27 is in reality a 2-dial tuning set. The resonance variable capacitor on the left side of the set is not an antenna trimmer. Instead, this single-gang capacitor tunes the first RF stage while the 2-ganged capacitor tunes the sec-

ond RF stage and detector.




Figure 6. Three-tube Cockaday circuit diagram from Sidney Gernsback's "Radio Encyclopedia." Missing from Art Redman's set is the feedback provided by L4's connection to the plate of the left-most vacuum tube.

As I traced the circuit, I found to my disappointment that the wiring of the Model LC-27, assuming this set is correctly wired, does not include the famous Cockaday circuit shown in Figure 6. There is no single-wire coil or any feedback to the antenna circuit.

I wanted a Cockaday circuit receiver, despite one longtime Oregon collector's calling it the "Cockaday" circuit. My Model LC-27 is only another 5-tube TRF battery set from the 1920s sold up to the screen grid era. In fact, it is a Cockaday brand radio without the Cockaday circuit. I wonder if the LC-26 model or any of the Silver-Cockaday models have the Cockaday circuit. If so, I would like to acquire a true Cockaday battery radio.

RADIO RAMBLINGS

The Philco 41-296, Billie Holiday, and I

One chance encounter with a radio can a collector make. Mark Fitzgerald tells the story of his rediscovery of the science and ingenuity basic to the development of early radio and the beginning of his love affair with antique radio. (Editor)

It was 1998. I stopped off at the doctor's office where my mother worked to do a little computer repair. The office was in an old Victorian that had a huge wrap-around porch. It was a great building. and I remember thinking it was a shame that they had turned it into a professional office.

As I was leaving, I happened



throw that radio out?" I asked the receptionist. She said she would check, and when she came back, she told me that I could have it if I wanted it. I knew nothing about antique radios at the time.

However, radio as a technology has always fascinated me. When I was a kid, I would listen to the AM dial late at night, picking up the skip signal from stations in exotic locations like Chicago, New York City, Cleveland, and other cities. This signal was being beamed to me over absolutely nothing, which was almost like magic to my eightyear-old brain. The first thing

to glance over to my left. Sitting there, waiting for the garbage collector, was an old wooden radio. It was actually a Philco 41-296, although I didn't know that at the time. I had always been interested in antiques, and had been doing woodworking of various sorts for many years. I also played around with electronics, although that always tended more toward transistors than tubes. The tired old radio and its potentially gorgeous woodwork intrigued me.

I walked back inside. "Hey, are you going to

I did when I got the set home was to take it apart. Well, that's not entirely true. The first thing I did was get on the Internet and type in "antique radio." I was amazed at the number of hits that resulted.

It seemed there was an avid collector base out there that loved nothing better than to talk endlessly about antique radios of all sorts. I had absolutely no idea this world existed. Amazingly, I learned there were small companies making reproduction dials, knobs, and face plates, and places that stocked 60-yearold replacement tubes and other necessary restoration parts.

POWERING UP THE PHILCO

After many hours spent consulting with experts online, and many more with a soldering gun in hand, I was finally ready to power the Philco up for the first time. I plugged the radio in and turned it on. The dial lit up, glowing. The warm smell of the tubes heating up was like a perfume to me, and still is. Slowly, the set came to life.

At first it was just a slight hum and bit of static, and then suddenly I heard someone talking. I carefully tuned it to 810, and immediately picked up WGY out of Albany, New York, one of the most powerful and historic AM radio stations in the country. I called my father and screamed, "Listen to this!" and then held the phone up to the speaker. You would have thought I had just invented the polio vaccine or something.

After I hung up the phone, I switched to the shortwave band and heard what I thought was French. I moved the dial a little farther, and picked up someone speaking Japanese. I was listening to real people thousands of miles away, and the idea of that actually happening, the absurdity of a virtual impossibility, took my breath away.

I was listening to them live, grabbing their voices from thin air, on a piece of antiquated technology that came off the assembly line when Franklin D. Roosevelt was President — a wooden radio that was half art and half science, made by American workers in an American factory, at a time when nobody anywhere in the entire world could make them better.

It was then that it hit me. I was sitting there, listening to a machine that was an integral part of American history. In 1941, for its original owner, this brand new radio was a connection to the entire world. Similar to today's ubiquitous television, the radio was the lifeblood of home entertainment. It provided music, stories, news, information, and a focal point for nightly family gatherings. It was the media center of the 1930s and 1940s, and its very existence in a household brought people together.

And I had just brought one back from the dead!

THEN AND NOW

While working on the Philco, I got to thinking about what had prompted me to go back inside the office and ask about it in the first place. It was a visceral response, I think, perhaps stemming from the fact that I used to listen to CBS *Mystery Theatre* on the radio when I was a kid in the 1970s. Also, my father was always talking about how he used to enjoy old radio shows like *The Green* Hornet, The Lone Ranger and Amos n' Andy.

In addition, I had long ago discovered a love for big band music and artists like Billie Holiday, Satch, Count Basie and Artie Shaw. To this day I can still remember the chills I got the first time I heard "Strange Fruit," or the first time I heard Louie Armstrong play his horn.

As I listened, I was awed by the reality of the life-changing events that had once emanated from the Philco's 15" speaker. In my mind's eye, I could picture the original owners, leaning close, absorbing the horrible news that we were at war again. I could picture those same owners just a few years later, perhaps still silently mouming the death of their eldest child in Normandy, but finding enough hope within themselves to cry tears of joy and hug each other and thank God when they heard that the war was over and Germany and Japan had surrendered.

I had fallen in love with these technological wonders of another era — I couldn't help it. As my hobby progressed, and my collection of radios grew, I quickly realized that the AM dial was a veritable wasteland of talking heads with nothing much to say, so I built an AM transmitter that allows me to broadcast an AM signal to every inch of my house. Combined with a sizable MP3 collection, I have all the AM programming I'll ever need.

Some nights, when there's nothing on TV but inane reality shows and repeats of "King of Queens," I'll just turn off the television and flip on one of my favorite radios. I'll queue up some live Glenn Miller, or even a few episodes of Lux Radio Theatre or Phillips Playhouse. If I'm in a historical mood, I'll put on some original Edgar R. Murrow World War II news broadcasts.

But when it's time to just relax and enjoy the music, well, that's a different story. That's when I'll put on some Billie Holiday. Her sweet, sultry voice was, both literally and figuratively, made for these radios.

As Billie's voice envelopes me with the first notes of "Easy Livin," I pour myself two fingers of single malt, and kick back in my favorite chair. I close my eyes, and I'm instantly transported back to a simpler, more hopeful, somehow nobler time – and Lady Day and I have returned home once more.

Mark Fitzgerald has a collection of pre-1945 consoles, cathedrals and tombstones that he has restored both electronically and cosmetically. He focuses almost exclusively on "saving" basket cases, because he worries that if he doesn't revive them, nobody else will. Also, they are all he can afford. His wife wishes he were not partial to consoles — after all, the couch has to go somewhere.

In the following article, Paul Moens shows that with patience, a collector can rescue a basketcase set and make it an important part of his collection. (Editor)

Many people adopt stray dogs and cats. I guess my claim to fame is that I adopt old radios. A case in point occurred in the fall of 2009 when I completed a 5-year project involving one of those adoptions the 1939 GE H-87 console, shown in Figure 1.

It all started with family members being called upon to help rescue the bulky set that had been delivered to my front door at an unexpected time. It was snowing, and as we struggled with the cabinet during transport, the chassis fell out. It had not been secured to the cabinet by the retaining screws and was only held in place by the two front knobs. The Beam-A-Scope, shown in Figure 2, also fell out; in fact, we were all picking up parts out of the snow for quite a while.

THE REPAIR PROCESS

The radio's band switch was damaged well beyond repair. In the H-87, the band switch has three wires that attach to the Beam-A-Scope antenna which is part of the circuit wiring. After 70 years, the wires and the wafers on the switch are so fragile and brittle that the least little stress

probably has doomed many radios using this design. I'm surprised General Electric didn't provide some type of strain relief.

Most people would have thrown the radio away as junk at this point. Now I'm not a repair technician and only have very basic radio repair skills, but I like a good challenge. I spent the next four years attempting to find a replacement switch thru A.R.C. ads and the Internet --- no luck.

Next, I decided to try to obtain another chassis in workable and restorable condition. My efforts paid off in May, 2009, when I found that "Amazonmike" in Livonia, New York, had one for sale on eBay. I drove there to pick it up rather than risk shipping damage. There were issues with the band switch on this chassis also, but in this case, the band switch was repairable.

The set contained all eight of its original tubes, and all tested very good. The tube complement is as fol-

lows: (2) 5Y3 rectifiers, (2) 6Y6 AF outputs, and one each 6J5 inverter, 6SQ7 detector, 6SK7 IF amp, and 6SA7 converter. The set covers the BC and SW bands.

It didn't appear that any paper capacitors had ever been replaced, so I contacted Dave of Dave's Antique Radio & TV Restoration, an advertiser in A.R.C. He is a provider for some chassis repair work in Liverpool, New York. He corrected the band switch issues and replaced all 17 caps. Now I had a working chassis.

My next step and actually the easiest for me was restoring the cabinet. "Amazonmike" provided me with some additional cabinet parts, so I basically made one radio out of two. The lower third of the cabinet must have been subjected to moisture over the years as there was hardly any finish remaining. Again, I'm no expert at stripping and refinishing either, so I took the easier option of matching the mahogany finish, careful sanding, staining, blending and sealing. It really came out quite nicely. The happy ending to my story is that with some patience even a mere collector like me with limited skills can complete a restoration project. You might even help to stimulate the economy in the process.

According to the Bunis/Slusser Collector's Guides to Antique Radios, the H-87 is listed as a 1939 console, although most of the advertising I've seen is from 1940. The suggested retail price back then was \$79.95, which is today's equivalent of over \$1,200.

I obtained many of my radios in my collection at yard sales and curbsides during my 22 years as a letter carrier for the U.S. Postal Service, as well as by word of mouth. My most prized radio is another console, my father's 1939 Westinghouse WR-366. That was our parior radio into the early 1950s before my family had our first TV. The "H-87 Project" was tedious but very rewarding, and now this set also has sentimental value in my life. I hope my grandchildren will enjoy it as well someday.

Hallock & Watson Follow-Up

The June, 2006 issue of A.R.C. had a 5-page article by Art Redman covering the Hallock & Watson Radio Corporation. Art has been fortunate enough to add another Hallock &Watson set to his collection and shares photos of it in this follow-up article. (Editor)

Since I did not own the All-Wave 5 (AW-5) when I wrote the June 2006 article on Hallock & Watson, I showed only ads for the set. Made in 1926, the AW-5 was Hallock & Watson's last radio.

Recently, I was happy to obtain this set from Jay Johnston; a member of the Northwest Vintage Radio Society. Figures 1, 2, and 3 show my Model AW-5. The cabinet style is the short version style, 22" long. This style is shown in the 1926 Pacific NW Radio Exposition Program on page 15 and in the Portland Telegram for February 27, 1926. (My June 2006 article shows both of these advertisements.)

Jay sold this set to me only because he bought the longer 36" cabinet version on eBay. This version contains the side battery compartments. I consider the short version more rare because I have never seen one before. The longer version is the one in the hands of most collectors in the Pacific Northwest.




Figure 3. An inside view of the cabinet of the Hallock & Watson Model AW-5 showing the neat component layout.

The Hunt for Old Radios — Eight Tips

BY JOHN MILLER

Having been a collector for over three decades, John Miller gives us eight tips to find "something" for your collection. He also tells us how following the advice he shares here has helped him to grow as a collector. (Editor)

Back in the mid-1980s a new collector came over to view my collection, and after seeing several of my cathedral sets, he remarked, "Wow, I didn't realize how easy those are to find." While I certainly don't consider cathedrals, or many other old radios *easy* to find, I

have stumbled onto a few tips over the last 30odd years or so that you may find useful in locating old radios. As I reminisce about how my collection grew, perhaps you'll find an idea that will help you add more sets to your collection.

Back in the mid-1970s my collecting bible was A Flick of the Switch 1930-1950 by Morgan E. McMahon. That book and its companion Vintage Radio 1887-1929, also by Mc-Mahon, were the only reference books avail

able to collectors at the time. Since my interest leaned toward cathedral-style radios, I used to scan the pages of *A Flick of the Switch 1930-1950* dreaming of the day I'd locate my first cathedral.

It was, in fact, at least three to five years later before I located the first cathedral to grace my collection. A friend told me about a radio he saw advertised in the newspaper classifieds he thought I'd be interested in. There was no mention of the style or model number, just the description, "Old Philco radio, 110-volt." That Philco turned out to be a Model 20 cathedral that I purchased for \$25.

TIP 1

I'll never forget the thrill of finding that set and carefully bringing it home. In fact, for many years I kept a copy of that small classified ad. So TIP 1 is to look in the classified ad section of newspapers in your local area. You may also want to run a "wanted" ad in the same papers, although it has been my personal experience that those didn't yield very good results; however you may have better luck.

TIP 2

I then heard about a monthly flea market in Washington Courthouse, Ohio. That proved to be a fairly good place to find radios; in fact, I bought my 1938 Zenith 9S262 console (still one of my favorite sets) there for \$25 in 1979. If I recall correctly, I found perhaps three or four cathedrals there over a period of a few years, but not very many. Although my collection was increasing little by little, I wasn't finding the cathedrals I so

desperately wanted. In any case, TIP 2 is to hunt through flea markets whenever you see one. If you have to drive two to four hours to find a really large flea market, the trip will be worth your while. But get there early! Other radio collectors will be out in force, and if you sleep in, you'll most likely miss the best pickings.

On the other hand, if you happen on one during a late Saturday or Sunday drive, don't hesitate to stop. There's always a chance that a collectible radio showed up after the

early horde of collectors left, or the price that was initially too high has come down to a reasonable level. And don't forget about your local Hamfest. These huge events often have everything from old radios to modern computers — a great place to find parts at very reasonable prices. Once again, if looking for old radios, the key here is to get there early. It was at the 1980 Dayton, Ohio, Hamfest that I found the Philco 90 cathedral that still sits on my shelf today.

TIP 3

For me, the turning point from finding a radio scattered here and there to doing serious collecting was finding out about the Indiana Historical Radio Society (IHRS) in the late 1970s. Going to their annual spring meet, held at the time in Auburn, Indiana, was for me, like throwing a kid into a candy store! Rather than walking through a flea market trying to locate a "radio in a haystack," here was one location where the only thing people were selling were old radios!

To this day my fondest radio collecting memo-(Continued on following page)

ries are of the spring IHRS meets held at the Aubum-Cord-Duesenburg Museum in Aubum. It was at the first IHRS meet that I met my good friend and very prolific cathedral collector Frank Heathcote. It was also where, in 1981, I obtained my first West-Coast cathedral, a Zaney Gill Music Box in 1981 and my Zenith Walton in 1985.

Through membership in the IHRS, my knowledge of collecting, restoration, and historical significance of old radio grew. I've met many friends from those Aubum days in the late 70s and 80s, many of whom are still close friends.

Through the IHRS, I also learned of the Antique Wireless Association (AWA) and the Antique Radio Club of America (ARCA), which later merged with the AWA. The AWA had a very large an-

nual meet in Canandaigua, New York, later moved to Rochester, New York, whereas ARCA had its large annual meet at different locations each year.

The AWA flea market was larger than I ever imagined. Many radios in my collection came via the 10-hour drive to Canandaigua in the early to mid-1980s — sets like my Philco 70 and my beautiful Splitdorf Abbey battery set in 1981; a rare Emerson Model 35 and a rare Radiochron large cathedral with a clock in 1982; a Sterling Little Symphony cathedral in 1983; an Arvin Hopalong Cassidy and a rare Belknap cathedral in 1984, just to name a few.

It was during a June IHRS meet, back about 1981 or so, that Illinois radio collector Joe Willis came up with the idea of three radio clubs hosting a "mega" meet in Elgin, Illinois, called Radiofest that August. And the rest, my friends, is what you call "history."

After the first year, sponsorship of Radiofest has been handled solely by Antique Radio Club of Illinois (ARCI). Now in its 27th year, Radiofest has become one of the largest radio meets in the world, drawing collectors from not only the entire United States, but also from overseas as well. Where else could you find a New Zealand radio collector selling superb, laser-cut, wood reproduction grilles for an Atwater Kent Model 165 cathedral? Some of my most coveted sets have come from Radiofest. It was during these IHRS, AWA and Radiofest years of the 1980s when my collection really began to take off.

So TIP 3 is to join several radio clubs and attend as many of their meets as possible. Not only will you find old radios to add to your collection, but you'll also make new friendships and broaden your collecting knowledge through contests and seminars. At a radio meet you have the bonus of seeing the radio or artifact "in person," not having to rely on a vague description or fuzzy photo. Plus, you don't have to worry about the newest addition to your collection getting busted up during shipping.

TIP 4

It was during Radiofest in 1984 that Cleveland. Ohio, collector Gary Schneider debuted his sample issue of Antique Radio Classified (A.R.C.). Gary's vision was to have a monthly publication that would become the standard publication by which a collector could buy, sell or trade radio-related items on a large national basis. And what a standard Gary set! Gary eventually sold A.R.C. to collector John Terrey. That deal was also made during a Radiofest in 1986. and today A.R.C. still sets the standard for quality ar-

ticles, as well as a wealth of advertising.

So, TIP 4 is to subscribe to A.R.C. If you don't, you're missing out on the best monthly publication available for radio collectors. Through A.R.C., you'll have access to the best classified ads in our hobby, learn about new publications, read articles concerning collecting, history, and restoration, as well as have access to the most comprehensive calendar of events across the nation.

Your own local club is a great source for info via newsletters, collector meets, and another activity that is somewhat unique in the radio-collecting hobby; that is, regional members often have an occasional open house. Other members are invited over to a collector's house to enjoy his collection, visit with old radio friends, have some refreshments and sometimes do some buying and trading. I like to have one of these on occasion because it forces me to clean up my basement and make it presentable.

TIPS 5 AND 6

It was while I was hosting an open house a few years ago that a fellow local member told me about a pretty rare radio that I had been hunting for several years. This tip from a fellow collector actually led to the acquisition of one of my prize sets. Granted, the cabinet and veneer need some work (well, maybe a lot of work), but eventually this will be the pride of my entire collection. TIP 5, you guessed it, host an open house for local club members. You'll have a lot of fun, learn a lot from your guests, and if you're like me, you'll have a clean radio room for at least a few days.

Now, although I've never personally found a radio by the curb waiting for the trash collector, I know some collectors who have. So if you drive through an older section of your city on trash day, follow my TIP 6 and keep an eye out for old radios being thrown away. Consoles are easy to spot, smaller sets will be a bit harder. Last December 1 spotted a garbage truck that had a console radio strapped on the back that the trash collectors had kept. I saw that it was a style that could have been a later Scott! I wanted to follow the truck and find out what it was, but we were headed out of town and my wife was not amused at the thought of our chasing down a garbage truck. But next time --when I'm by myself, I'll follow that truck all the way to the dump if I have to!

TIP 7

TIP 7 will take you to auctions, antique shops, malls, estate sales, and yes, even the neighborhood garage sale. Late one afternoon on July 4th, on the spur of the moment, I stopped at a yard sale and found a nice, 10-tube, 1937 Zenith console for \$25. My friend and fellow collector the late Carl Bryant found a rare 10-inch Trophy baseball radio, ca 1941, for \$6! Auctions and estate sales can be both fun and/or boring, depending on how long it takes for your item to come up for bid, and, of

course, the final price. Steve Baron and I once drove two hours to an estate sale advertising a cathedral radio. Upon arrival, we found it to be a modem Franklin translator reproduction!


On the other hand, many nice and quite collectible radios are sold at auction. Antique shops and malls, especially in smaller towns often tum up old radios at reasonable prices. I found my 1939 17-tube Midwest console with electric motorized tuning for \$35 at an old antique shop in Lafayette, Indiana.

TIP 8

My final tip, **TIP 8**, takes us to the World Wide Web (www or Internet) via computers in search of old radios and related items. Almost everyone has heard about

eBay, the online auction service. On eBay, you can find anything, be it new or old. I personally don't buy old radios from eBay because I think some buyers have greatly inflated the prices. I also don't sell old radios on eBay because I'd rather do it at a radio meet and support our hobby. On the other hand, there are a lot of radio-related items, such as radio-related novelties, that I have gotten from eBay. I once spent an entire day going through Louisville antique malls and shops with the goal of finding just one radio-related novelty item. I found none.

On eBay, I have picked up at a reasonable cost Orphan Annie decoders, Crosley Bonzo postcards, and Hopalong Cassidy items to go along with my radios. Some of these items I would never have found, and if perhaps I did, they may have cost more than I paid for them. If you want something

badly enough, search eBay for it, but never bid more than you're willing to pay, and remember to factor in the shipping cost. I'm sure there are other online ways to buy or bid on radios, but I'll leave it to one of you fellow readers to write that one up. Happy Hunting!

Kutztown Radio Show XX Kutztown, Pennsylvania — May 8-9, 2009

STAN SAEGER REPORTS

Kutztown Radio Show XX, hosted by the Delaware Valley Historic Radio Club (DVHRC), was held May 8 and 9, 2009, at Renningers Antiques and Farmer's Market in Kutztown, Pennsylvania. The two-day show started early Friday morning, and by the time I arrived at 10 A.M., two-thirds of the dealer spaces were occupied.

In the past, shows run by the DVRC were held in a number of different venues in suburban Philadelphia. However, the DVHRC and Renningers of Kutztown soon joined forces to hold the Kutz-

town Radio Show. From fairly modest beginnings, the show has grown into one of the premier events in the country.

Again, Richard Estes of Estes Auctions, Burbank, Ohio, contributed his time for a Friday night auction. Approximately eighty lots were put up for auction, including a Sparton Bluebird, a number of Catalin radios, and an E.H. Scott. Prices for the higher-end items held their own, while some of the lesser items went for quite reasonable prices.

After the auction, many in attendance stayed for the unofficial bonfire, which includes burning wooden items, including junk radio cabinets. Snacks, drinks and friendly conversation made for a great end to the first day.

Saturday started bright and early with a few more dealers pulling in and quite a bit more traffic from the general public. The Saturday auction, run by the DVHRC, started at noon and continued until nearly 3 P.M.

What makes the Kutztown event so successful? There is not one reason, but rather a combination of factors. The first is locationlocation-location. The Renningers' large site is ideal: plenty of parking, easy to get to, outdoors in a rural setting, yet under a roof in case of rain. Nearby amenities: The adjacent Farmer's Market offers a myriad of things to see and buy. At what other radio show can you stock up on produce, get a haircut, and purchase a gravestone without leaving the area? The fact that there is no official starting time is a bit confusing at first, but setup and sales begin whenever dealers arrive. Free admission, free parking and free overnight camping make for a friendly, laid back atmosphere.

I had a great time meeting and greeting old and newer friends. By dusk, it was time for the usual steak dinner, excellent this year. Just after this was an auction conducted by Estes Auctions inside the "White Room" setup by Renningers, the provider of the site for the meet. I attended and noted that prices were pretty soft for phono and TV items. Still, nice sets went for decent money, such as a Sparton Bluebird selling at around \$2,000, if I recall correctly. However, since I don't bring as many nice sets to sell in spring due to the press of time (it's my busy time at work), I didn't mind too much. By noon, when the club auction started, there was the usual giant pile

will be sold at a later date. That task became the responsibility of auctioneer Ryan Brechlin of Nest Egg Auctions LLC of Meriden, Connecticut.

Nest Egg Auctions is a family-operated auction gallery and retail antique store offering a variety of services to the antique and estate solution industries. The Morgan auction was held on Saturday, July 18, at 30 Research Parkway in Meriden. Preview began at noon on Saturday. The auction itself began at 5:30 P.M. and ended before 10:00 P.M. Over 500 lots were sold in that time span with only a 15 minute break. A monumental task, indeed!

There were no Marconis, Kennedys, DeForests, or crystal sets, but Atwater Kent and Philco were well represented, and the short notice to the collectors made for some real bargains. It turned into a very interesting evening.
